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#### **INTRODUCTION**

This is the twentieth Northwestern Oklahoma State University *Fact Book*. The publication is intended to provide a handy source of information concerning statistics and demographics about the university. Addressed are some of the most frequently asked questions. The first *Fact Book* published included data from Fall 1990 – Fall 1994. The J. W. Martin Library at the NWOSU Alva campus has the previous publications in the Government Documents Department. This book can also be found on the NWOSU website at www.nwosu.edu.

The entire campus enrollment of Alva, Enid, and Woodward is included in the *Fact Book*. Data has been collected at semester end from set-aside file copies of the actual student and course accounts from Fall 2009 to Fall 2013. The data can be accurately compared for this time period, and a five-year comparison spans enough time to be a useful study aid. Because of student enrollment fluctuations during the semester, numbers may not match other published enrollment figures that may be based on enrollment statistics at different times.

This is public information and should prove helpful in meeting the general needs of those on this campus. The reader should be cautioned to carefully read headings and footnotes. If there are questions concerning the proper interpretation of the data in this book, please contact Tara Sander, Information Technology. Use of this information for specialized reports or surveys is discouraged. Data can be presented in many different ways. Normally a survey question is very specific and a figure cannot be taken from existing reports due to variables.

Also, it should be noted that student data is only as accurate as the students maintain it. At times, students fail to inform the Registry Office of changes in pertinent information, and admission forms sometimes contain inaccurate information. The responsibility lies with the student to provide correct information and to inform the university when changes need to be made.

This *Fact Book* was compiled and developed by the Information Technology office. Tara Sander researched and compiled the data. Craig Ricke and Leeta Grimsley assisted with the charts and graphs. As you review the data please know that comments, questions, or suggestions for improvements, changes or additions will be gladly received. We want the information to be as useful as possible.

## HISTORY OF NORTHWESTERN OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY

Northwestern was established officially as a normal school in 1897 with the passing of a law by the Oklahoma Territorial Legislature. It has the distinction of being the second normal school in the state. The first faculty of this school was composed of the president, James E. Ament, and two teachers. Until a building to house the new college could be constructed, the classes were held in the Congregational Church. The school opened on September 20, 1897, with an enrollment of 68 students. By the fall of 1899, the first building had been completed, and the school was transferred to its present site. The cost of construction of the first building was underwritten by a number of private citizens since no appropriation for this building had been passed by the legislature.

The school became a four-year college and was designated Northwestern State Teachers College in 1919. The school was expanded to include degrees in Liberal Arts as well as Education in 1939, "Teachers" was dropped from the title, and the school's name changed to Northwestern State College. The final name change occurred in 1974 when it was renamed Northwestern Oklahoma State University.

By constitutional amendment in 1941, a newly created Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education was charged with fiscal policies and determination of function and courses of study for all of the institutions in the state system. Exercising this responsibility, the OSRHE prescribe the general curriculum requirements for Northwestern and the other state institutions.

In 1951, the OSRHE authorized Northwestern to offer courses, transferable to the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University, applying toward a master's degree in education. Then, in accordance with authority granted by the OSRHE on January 25, 1954, a fifth-year program in teacher education leading to a Master of Education degree was instituted at Northwestern.

The OSRHE authorized the implementation of a fifth-year interdisciplinary sociology and psychology program leading to a Master of Behavioral Science degree in the fall of 1978. A nursing program leading to a Bachelor of Science in Nursing degree was established in the fall of 1981.

In 1996 the Oklahoma State Legislature, with the approval of the OSRHE and the Board of Regents of Oklahoma Colleges, passed legislation that created two new campuses for NWOSU, one at Enid and the other at Woodward. With three campuses, NWOSU expanded its role in the delivery of higher education to the citizens of northwest Oklahoma. Northwestern now was authorized to extend all of its academic degree programs and educational services to the new sites as demand dictated. A new chapter in NWOSU history dawned as the institution approached its centennial year of 1997-98.

Northwestern Oklahoma State University has progressed from a normal school to an institution offering high levels of training for work in innumerable vocational and professional pursuits. More than one hundred years have passed since Northwestern Oklahoma State University opened its doors. The 40 acres and no buildings of 1897 have now become approximately 360 acres and 29 buildings. The three faculty members and 68 students have increased to more than 200 faculty and staff members and 2,000 students.




#### FALL 2013 ENROLLMENT BY CLASSIFICATION & ENROLLMENT STATUS





#### TOTAL FALL RESIDENT ENROLLMENT BY COUNTY







#### CREDIT HOURS GENERATED BY COURSE LEVEL 2008 - 2009 through 2012 - 2013








#### FALL TO FALL STUDENT RETENTION RATES








