DIRECTIONS TO THE 'NEW' IVY OFFICE

From New York and New England Take the New Jersey Turnpike (I-95) to Exit 9 (New Brunswick). After toll booth, stay to the right and get on Route 18 for a short distance. Keep in the two left hand lanes when the road forks and then take the exit ramp for Route 1 South. You'll be on Route 1 for 20-25 minutes. Eventually you will come to the Alexander Street exit, which you will take. At the top of the ramp, bear right towards Princeton. You will proceed past the Rusty Scupper Restaurant on the right to the stoplight at the corner of Alexander and Faculty Road. Proceed straight through the light to 228 Alexander Street (a two story brick building with white pillars). The parking lot entrance is immediately past the building. The Ivy Office is on the second floor.

From Philadelphia and the south Take I-95 into New Jersey. About 7-8 miles after crossing the Pa./N.J. border, you'll see the exit for Route 1. Take that exit and at the top of the ramp, bear left to get on Route 1 North. You'll be on Route 1 for 3-4 miles. Eventually you will come to the Alexander Street exit, which you will take. At the top of the ramp, turn left at the traffic light towards Princeton. You will proceed past the Rusty Scupper Restaurant on the right to the stoplight at the corner of Alexander and Faculty Road. Proceed straight through the light to 228 Alexander Street (a two story brick building with white pillars). The parking lot entrance is immediately past the building. The Ivy Office is on the second floor.

From Ithaca Find your best route to I-78 in Pennsylvania. Take I-78 East to I-287 South. After a short distance on I-287, you come to an exit for Route 206. Take that exit and follow Route 206 South for several miles. When Route 206 turns right in the town of Princeton (it's actually a deadend at a traffic light), you will turn left onto Nassau Street. At the first light, turn right onto University Place. University Place will deadend at Alexander Street (Wawa Food Market on left corner). Turn left onto Alexander Street. Before the next light, you will come to 228 Alexander Street (a two story brick building with white pillars). The parking lot entrance is immediately before the building. The Ivy Office is on the second floor.

Each year in February, the Ivy League honors the accomplishments of African-Americans with the online Ivy League Black History Celebration.

In that celebration, the League highlights both the rich history of African-Americans' achievements in Ivy League athletics and the diverse contributions which these graduates have made to their institutions, their communities and the nation at large.

"Ivy League Athletics' Black History Celebration" was originally developed in 1998, and has been updated and expanded annually. In effort to make the online Black History celebration more navigable, all of the parts mentioned above

will be narrowed to focus on the contributions of African-American student-athletes at each individual institution.

While this project would not have been a success without the help and contributions of the athletics departments and sports information offices from each of the eight schools, Ivy League Public Information Assistant Eddy Lentz will be the project coordinator and chief contributor this year.

The project has also gotten to this point because of the work of several former Public Information Assistants in the Ivy Office, including Dan Rosenthal, Erica Hurr, Jennifer Enke, Christian Green, Sherryta Freeman and Kevin Anderson.

The Council of Ivy Group Presidents

October, 1933 Stanley Woodward of the New York Herald Tribune first uses the phrase "Ivy colleges" in print to describe the eight current Ivy schools (plus Army). On Feb. 8, 1935, AP Sports editor Alan Gould first uses the exact term "Ivy League". [From Mark Bernstein, *Football: The Ivy League Origins of an American Obsession*, University of Pennsylvania, 2001]

1945 The first "Ivy Group Agreement" is signed, applying only to football. It affirms the observance of common practices in academic standards and eligibility requirements and the administration of need-based financial aid, with no athletic scholarships. The agreement creates the Presidents Policy Committee, including the eight Presidents; the Coordination and Eligibility Committee, made up of one senior non-athletic administrator from each school; and the committee on Administration, comprised of the eight athletic directors.

February, 1954 The Ivy Presidents extend the Ivy Group Agreement to all intercollegiate sports. Their statement also focuses on presidential governance of the league, the importance of intra-League competition, and a desire that recruited athletes be academically "representative" of each institution's overall student body. Although this is the League's official founding date, the first year of competition is 1956-57.

December, 1969 Clayton Chapman, Assistant Athletic Director at Cornell, becomes Executive Secretary of the Council, providing its first staff assistance.

March, 1971 The Ivy League becomes the last conference in the country to endorse the national change to freshman eligibility on varsity teams. Although the Ivy Presidents do not permit the change in all team sports, by 1980 the change is complete in all team sports except in football and men's rowing.

December, 1971 With women now enrolled as undergraduates at all eight Ivy institutions, the Presidents unanimously approve the proposal of the Coordination and Administration Committees that "The Ivy Group rules of eligibility shall not be construed to discriminate on grounds of sex."

July, 1973 The Presidents agree to appoint a full-time coordinator for the Ivy Group, and in December Ricardo Mestres, a Vice President at Princeton, attends his first Presidents meeting as the Ivy Group's permanent Executive Director.

May, 1974 The Ivy Group officially begins League championships in women's sports, as the Radcliffe-Harvard women crew wins the first official women's Ivy championship.

March, 1976 James Litvack, a Princeton faculty member, becomes the second Executive Director. A joint committee is formed to make specific recommendations for applying rules equitably to both men and women, and to consider rules for the number of contests, length of seasons, etc., in women's sports.

February, 1977 The Ivy Presidents approve a 10th game for football, previously limited to nine games.

August, 1977 The Ivy Presidents adopt the name Council of Ivy Group Presidents, and the Coordination and Eligibility Committee becomes the Policy Committee.

June, 1979 On the 25th anniversary of the 1954 Agreement, the Council of Presidents issues a 10-point Statement of Principles, reaffirming basic goals with regard to admissions, financial aid, and the role of athletics in the undergraduate educational experience.

May, 1980 On recommendations of the Athletic Directors and Policy Committee, the Council of Presidents unanimously adopts the "Parry-Ryan" report, a comprehensive approach to assuring that the scope of scheduling, competition and practice opportunities will be consistent with athletes' academic priorities. This basic structure remains in effect today.

Fall/Winter, 1981 Marking the 25th anniversary of the first Ivy season, sportswriters covering the League select all-time Silver Anniversary Football and Men's Basketball teams.

December, 1981 A special NCAA convention creates a "I-AA" football division and Ivy League members begin play in that division the following September.

September, 1984 Jeffrey Orleans, a Yale graduate and lawyer and author of the federal Title IX regulation, is appointed the third Executive Director of the Council of Ivy Group Presidents, and is authorized to develop a central "Ivy Office" for the League.

June, 1985 The Council adopts a structure to set minimum academic qualifications for all recruited athletes and to regulate the number and qualifications of recruited athletes in football and men's basketball and ice hockey specifically.

July, 1986 Constance Huston Hurlbut becomes the League's first Assistant Director, assuming responsibility for Ivy League sports publicity from the institutional sports information offices. In 1993, Hurlbut becomes Executive Director of the Patriot League.

June, 1989 The Council approves a third professional position, dividing the functions of rules compliance and sports information; Charles Yrigoyen III becomes Assistant Director for public information.

June and December, 1991 Coincident with reducing the permitted number of recruited football players, the Council agrees to freshman eligibility in football and to 12 sessions of spring practice for football rather than one spring "media day".

April, 1993 The Ivy League receives its first automatic bid to the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball championship, for 1994. In the next few years the Ivy League will become the only conference to attain automatic bids in every women's sport.

July, 1993 Carolyn Campbell McGovern succeeds Connie Hurlbut as Senior Associate Director. While extending and formalizing Ivy rules compliance activities, and assisting the eight Ivy institutions through the first NCAA "certification" reviews, she also will chair both the Olympic Sports and Women's Ice Hockey Committees of the NCAA.

June, 1994 The Council of Presidents approves the appointment of a Senior Women's Athletic Administrator to the Policy Committee, a position complementing the long-standing representation of a Director of Athletics.

August, 1996 Associate Director Chuck Yrigoyen oversees the inauguration of the Ivy League website (www.IvyLeagueSports.com), and begins the League's transition to electronically-focused sports information.

May, 1998-April, 1999 The Ivy League holds a year-long celebration of the 25th Anniversary of Ivy League Women's Championships, including events at each campus, a traveling photo-history mural, timeline exhibit, selection of the women's Silver Anniversary Team in all sports and a two-day symposium in April 1999, in New York City with 300 alumnae and other participants. The League's Silver Anniversary is remembered in print with the November, 1999 publication of *Silver Era, Golden Moments*, an authoritative 200-page narrative and photographic history.

July, 2000 The Council approves a fourth professional position to provide for the first time a focus on championships, scheduling, and other aspects of sport administration. Brett A. Hoover becomes the new Assistant Director for Public Information, focusing on web-based communication with the media and all Ivy constituencies.

2001-02 In the first year of a reconstructed League website, IvyLeagueSports.com draws nearly a million visitors and nearly 12 million page views.

June, 2002 & June, 2003 The Council amends its 1985 structure for monitoring the academic qualifications of recruited athletes by increasing its minimum qualifications, regulating the number and qualifications of the athletes who are recruited at each school, and reducing the permitted number of recruited football players. The Council also assures that athletes will have additional time for academic priorities and other personal interests by adding 49 days without practice or other athletic obligations, for all athletes, to the non-athletic time provided by Ivy rules since 1980.

The designation "Ivy League," premature of any formal agreement, was adopted by the press as a foreshadowing of an eastern football league which, at the time, was big news to everyone except the athletic directors involved.

For years, the Ivy members already had been allied in leagues in basketball, ice hockey, baseball and swimming. Further common competition was found in the Heptagonal Games Association, which included Army and Navy, in the sports of baseball, track and field, and swimming. Through these other scheduling arrangements, the Ivy athletic directors were used to dealing with each other in matters of administration or the exchange of calculated confidences.

As a result of these dealings, and through extensive presidential meetings and discussions, the first "Ivy Group Agreement" -- addressing only football -- was signed in 1945. While the 1945 statement did not address any scheduling issues, it did affirm the observance at the eight institutions of common practices in academic standards, eligibility requirements, and the administration of financial aid for athletes. These tenets are what still bind the Ivies together today and all continue to be based on the desire to secure competition with others having like philosophies. The athletic directors, at the direction of the presidents, were then more formally organized as a committee for cooperative endeavor in the details of athletic administration and a dean from each school was appointed to a committee to exchange information on eligibility and to act for the presidents in cooperation with the athletic directors.

In February 1954, what is more commonly accepted as the founding date for the Ivy League, the Ivy Group Agreement was reissued to extend its philosophical jurisdiction to all sports and to foster, insofar as possible, intra-group competition. In layman's terms, that meant a complete round-robin schedule in football, beginning with the 1956 season. Such an agreement -- assuring seven spots on an eight-to-ten-game schedule to Ivy opponents -- required numerous concessions from each institution and marked a high point in intercollegiate cooperation.

The basic intent of the original Ivy agreement was to improve and foster inter-collegiate athletics while keeping the emphasis on such competition in harmony with the educational purpose of the institutions. While football is where it started, the Ivy League today is nationally recognized for its level of success -- absent of athletic scholarships -- while rigorously maintaining its self-imposed high academic standards. The Ivy League has demonstrated a rare willingness and ability, given the current national pressures on intercollegiate success, to abide by these rules and still compete successfully in Division I athletics.

The Ivy League crowns champions in 33 sports and continues to sponsor inter-collegiate programs of national prominence for women and men. Lacrosse, ice hockey, fencing, soccer, rowing and squash are some of the sports in which the Ivies have been synonymous with national excellence during the League's recent history. On the average, Ivy members boast of 35 varsity teams per campus, well above the national norm.

Last season was yet another outstanding year for the Ivy League. In fact, it was such a great year that it concluded with the League finishing sixth in the Sears Directors Cup standings, behind only a handful of the nation's elite conferences and ahead of the perennial power Big East Conference. The Princeton women's lacrosse team won the NCAA national title for the second straight year. Harvard women's rowing took the national championship while the Princeton Tigers picked up their fifth straight title in the women's lightweight division. Harvard's men's heavyweight and lightweight eights each went on to open water victories in their respective grand finals of the IRA National Championships.

In addition to the team national champions, the eight Ivy schools produced several individual national champions as well as more than 100 All-Americans and fourteen Academic All-Americans.

Highlights included Brian Chaput and Sam Burley of Penn capping a stellar season by winning national titles in their events during the outdoor track championships. Chaput tossed the javelin 258-2 for a new Ivy League record, while Burley took home the title in the 800 meters by just one hundredth of a second. Cornell wrestler Travis Lee brought home a national title in the 125 pound class, going undefeated on the season, while Yasser El-Halaby of Princeton became a national squash champion. In addition to national champions, more than 50 individual athletes placed in the top 10 or reached the quarterfinals of the national championship in their sport.

More than 75 Ivy League athletes have competed at the last Summer (Sydney, 2000) and Winter (Salt Lake City, 2002) Olympics and a remarkable number -- twenty-four -- have brought home medals.

Cheering on Brown's soccer teams; the precision and artistry of Columbia's national powerhouse fencers; the speed and stamina of Cornell's cross country runners; the 17 league football titles won by Dartmouth; a workout on the Charles River for Harvard's crews; basketball games at Penn's storied Palestra; Princeton's lacrosse teams; the beauty and challenge of the Yale Golf Club. These are just some of the elements that have helped the Ivies foster a wonderful, rare spirit of competition, excellence, and camaraderie for athletes, spectators, and alumni.

Located on the campus of Princeton University, the Ivy League (still known officially as the Council of Ivy Group Presidents) continues to grow under the leadership and direction of Executive Director Jeffrey H. Orleans. Since taking the post in 1984, Orleans has become a respected voice on the national scene of intercollegiate athletics.

Ivy League Black History Timeline

1859

• On October 16, 1859, Harvard University announced the appointment of Abraham Molineaux Hewlett, an African-American, as its first director of physical education culture.

1892

• Harvard's football team featured the first black All-American in the form of William Henry Lewis, who had been an undergraduate at Amherst College. Lewis had initially attended Virginia Normal (now Virginia State), but moved north in 1889. He was voted as Amherst's captain in 1890. Lewis went on to Harvard Law School and continued his football career. He played in the Crimson's 6-0 loss to Yale in 1892, but so impressed Walter Camp that he was named to Camp's All-America squad. The Crimson center rusher was a repeat All-America honoree in 1893. Lewis became an assistant district attorney in Boston following graduation.

1895

• On April 21, 1895, the Penn Relay Carnival began and from its inception allowed African-Americans to participate in integrated events. It was the first major meet or organization to accept African-American entries.

1897

• A member of Harvard's class of 1897, Napoleon Bonaparte Marshall participated on the Crimson track team for four years. His specialty was the quarter-mile. Born to well-to-do parents in Washington, D.C., Marshall attended the prestigious Phillips Andover Preparatory School before enrolling at Harvard. He finished third at the intercollegiate track championships in New York in 1897, running the 440-yard event. His best time for the 440-yard dash was 51.2, which he set as a sophomore in 1895. Following graduation, Marshall became an attorney with a long distinguished career in the nation's capital.

• Eugene Gregory was the third African-American to play baseball on a white college team, as a member of Harvard's freshman squad. The pitcher/infielder went on to become an educator in New Jersey.

1902

• Matthew Washinton Bullock was an end on the Dartmouth football team and competed on the school's track and field team from 1901-03. He was named a Walter Camp honorable mention All-American in 1903. Bullock, born to slave parents in Dabney, N.C., was the first African-American to compete in football at Dartmouth and he was the second among the Ivies. Following graduation in 1904, Bullock was named the head coach at Massachusetts Agricultural College (now the University of Massachusetts), the first African-American head coach at a predominantly white college. Bullock earned a law degree from Harvard in 1907 and coached at the high school level and Atlanta Baptist College (now Morehouse College) before turning to practice law. He practiced law in Boston until he retired in 1949.

• William Clarence Matthews played shortstop for Harvard's varsity baseball team as a freshman. The Crimson altered its 1903 schedule after several southern schools vowed they would not compete against Harvard if Matthews played. During his three years with the team, Matthews stole 42 bases and batted above .300 in each season, while the Crimson went 54-16-1. William was regarded as one of the greatest players of his time and if he had been white, Williams would have definitely been a major league prospect. He did continue to play with the New York Black Sox in its Burlington, Vt. Summer Baseball League.

1903

• Track and field standout John Baxter Taylor entered the University of Pennsylvania. He was the first African-American to be selected to represent the United States internationally in any sport at the 1908 Olympics in London, where he was a member of the gold-medal winning 1,600-meter sprint medley relay. Taylor helped the Quakers to the 1907 intercollegiate championship title with his performance in the 440-yard run, when he set a new meet standard of 48 4/5. He repeated as the IC4A victor in 1908 and captured a gold medal at the 1908 Olympic Games as a member of the 1,600-meter sprint medley team that finished the race in a time of 3:29.4.

1912

• Theodore Cable, an Indianapolis, Ind., native and graduate of the Phillips Andover Academy, did not plan on participating in athletics when he entered his freshman year at Harvard. However, when he heard the track and field coach Pat Quinn's call for freshmen in the weight

events, he decided to get involved. Cable became a member of the Crimson squad and performed in the 220-yard dash, the hammer throw and the broad jump. At the 1912 Harvard-Yale meet, he became the first African-American to win the hammer throw event. Cable went on to become a two-time intercollegiate hammer-throw champion in 1912 and 1913. He also won the broad jump title at 22-10 1/4.

• Alexander Lewis Jackson, of Englewood, N.J., joined Cable at Harvard as a sprinter on the Crimson track team.

1916

• After several attempts to find a college where he could get a quality education and play football, Frederick Fritz Pollard ended up in a Brown University football uniform. He was accepted by his teammates quickly when he scored more than 10 touchdowns in his first season. Probably the greatest player to perform for Brown, and considered as one of the greatest African-Americans to perform in the college ranks, Pollard led the Bears to the first official Rose Bowl game (1916). The 1916 team also posted an 8-1 record, which is among the University's best. Pollard, a halfback, received accolades from several national newspapers and was selected to the Walter Camp All-America team. Walter Camp said of Pollard: "He is one of the greatest runners there eyes have ever seen." In 1916, Pollard scored all three touchdowns as Brown handed Yale its lone defeat of the season. When the National Football League was organized in 1920, Fritz Pollard was one of its original stars, and was one of only two African-American players that inaugural season. He played for the Akron Pros, the Milwaukee Badgers, and the Hammond Pros and finally ended up back in Providence with the Steamrollers. Pollard became the first African-American head coach in the NFL when he became co-coach of the Akron Pros in 1921. He was inducted into the Football Hall of Fame in October of 1954. Pollard also was a standout on the Brown track team. Born in Chicago on Jan. 27, 1894, Fritz died on May 11, 1986.

• Willis Nelson Cummings became the first African-American to run cross-country at Penn. Before his career was over, he would become the third black to gain a varsity letter, the first black to captain any varsity team at Penn as well as in the Ivy League. Cummings was the first runner ever to win both the senior and junior Middle Atlantic Association (AAU) championships in the same year. Cummings was born in Galveston, Texas, the son of William N. Cummings, a teacher and graduate of Fisk University. Cummings' mother was the first black woman to earn a Bachelor of Arts degree at Atlanta University, an accomplishment she achieved in 1886. Willis followed his parents' examples, earning a Bachelors degree at Fisk in 1916 and graduating sixth in his class of 259 students from the University of Pennsylvania School of Dentistry in 1919. Dr. Cummings practiced dentistry in New York City.

1918

• Columbia University and the Ivy League had its first black basketball player, John Howard Johnson, who began competing in 1918. During his career with the Lions, Johnson was consistently ranked in the League top ten for scoring.

1921

• A standout track athlete at his high school in Florida, Edward (Ned) Gourdin attracted national attention as a long jumper for Harvard. He broke the American mark in 1921 with a jump of 25'3". That same year, Gourdin won the pentathlon of the National Amateur Athletic Union. He won first place in three events: the broad jump, the javelin throw and the 200-meter dash. Following a successful collegiate career, Gourdin competed in the 1924 Olympic Games in France. He captured a silver medal in the running broad jump.

1931

• One of the greatest basketball stars of his time, George Gregory, Jr., scored 155 points in 17 contests in his freshman season at Columbia to rank fourth in League. Gregory helped his team to two consecutive Ivy titles and two Eastern titles. As a junior in 1930, he was named captain of the Lion team. He was named to the Helms Foundation All-America team in 1930-31, becoming the first African-American voted to college All-America status in basketball. He was joined on the All-America squad by John Wooden, the soon-to-be legendary UCLA coach. In his three-year career, Gregory, the second African-American to play at Columbia, recorded 509 points in 62 games. A graduate of De Witt Clinton High in New York City, Gregory took an active role in the community after graduation and maintained a connection to athletics. He went on to become the director of what was then the

largest youth project for African-Americans in the country - the Harlem Center for Children Aid Society.

• A versatile baseball player, Manuel Rivero played on the Columbia squad for three seasons during the 1930s. Rivero, a black Cuban, played third base, center field and pitched for the Lions during his career. Following his days at Columbia, Rivero had a long and distinguished career as the baseball coach for Lincoln University in Pennsylvania.

1935

• Columbia's Ben Johnson became the first black track athlete to be a Heptagonal Games first-team performer. Two years later, Johnson would win the NCAA 200-meter dash championship with a time of 21.3 seconds.

1937

• Cornell University's first African-American football player was Jerome (Brud) Holland. Holland, a native of Auburn, N.Y., was one of the most acclaimed football players in the 1930s. Two years after stepping foot onto the Big Red football field, Holland was named an All-American at the end position, becoming one of just five black players to be named All-America in the first half of the century. Holland was the second-leading votegetter for the 1937 All-America team, a remarkable achievement considering many southern newspapers wouldn't run his photo with the other 10 for fear of offending their readership. Holland became one of the nation's most distinguished educators in the 1960s as the president of the Hampton Institute in Virginia. In 1970, he was appointed the U.S. Ambassador to Sweden. Holland was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame and was presented the organization's highest recognition - the Distinguished American Award.

1941

• Harvard lacrosse player Lucien Victor Alexis, Jr., of New Orleans, La., was barred from playing a game at the U.S. Naval Academy because of his ethnicity. Sent home 24 hours prior to his teammates, Alexis' banishment set off a howl of protest back on campus.

1946

• Cornell track and field star Paul Robeson, Jr., who became just the second first-team Heps black athlete in 1945, won the IC4A Indoor High Jump Championship.

1947

• Harvard tackle Chester (Chet) Pierce became the first African-American player to play against a white college in the South when Harvard's football team faced the University of Virginia in Charlottesville. He received a standing ovation from the UVA crowd when he was removed for a substitute in the fourth quarter. Pierce said the incident "thrilled me beyond description."

1949

• Levi Jackson, a Branford, Conn. native, was named the first black captain of the Yale football team in 1949. Upon his graduation in 1950, Jackson held or shared 13 Yale football records. He would go on to become the first black executive at Ford (Motor Company).

1951

• Penn's Eddie Bell was picked as a football All-American two years in a row and subsequently became the first NFL player from an Ivy League school since the legendary Fritz Pollard of Brown. Bell, a native of Philadelphia, Pa. was a cornerback for the Philadelphia Eagles from 1955 to 1958 before becoming a linebacker with the New York Titans in 1960.

1952

• Cornell's Meredith Gourdine, who had won IC4A titles in both the long jump and the 220-yard dash, took the silver medal in the long jump with a leap of 24-8 1/4 at the 1952 Helsinki Olympics.

1953

• Competing in an event that wasn't a yearly collegiate event until the early 1960s, Columbia's George Shaw won the 1952 NCAA triple jump championship. Until the early 1960s, the NCAA contested the event only during Olympic years. Shaw would also make an appearance in the 1952 Helsinki Olympics. He became the 1953 AAU champion and went on to compete in the 1956 Olympics in Melbourne.

1957

• Irvin (Bo) Roberson of Cornell became the first African-American to be named the Heptagonal Games

Indoor Track Athlete of the Meet. Perhaps the greatest pure athlete in Big Red history, Roberson was a halfback in football, a pivotman in basketball and a sprinter/low hurdler in track. He went on to win the silver medal at the 1960 Olympic Games, and he broke Jesse Owens' 25-year-old world indoor record in the broad (long) jump with his 25'9" effort at the 1960 National AAU Track and Field Championships. Following the '60 Games, he began a six-year pro football career: San Diego Chargers (1961), Oakland Raiders (1962-65), Buffalo Bills (1965) and Miami Dolphins (1966). He was named the Raiders' MVP in 1962, led the league in kickoff returns in 1964, and was the leading receiver for the Bills' AFL championship in 1965. Bo, from Philadelphia, Pa., was part of the Black Renaissance in pro football, the emergence of African-American players, according to Al Davis, former head coach and then owner of the Raiders. After pro football, he obtained his doctorate degree in psychology.

1958

- Lawrence Ekpebu of Harvard became the first black soccer player named first-team All-Ivy League and the first black athlete in League history to be voted first-team by the Ivy coaches after the official formation of the League in 1955.

- Harvard's Edward (Ned) Gourdin, a 1919 graduate who won silver and gold medals in the long jump at the Olympics in 1924 and 1932, became the first African-American to become a member of the Massachusetts Supreme Court. Gourdin, a native of Jacksonville, Fla., had graduated from Cambridge Latin Prep before enrolling at Harvard. Although he had originally intended to play baseball at Harvard, after winning the long jump and the 100-yard and 200-yard dashes in a dual meet against Princeton, his fate as a trackstar was sealed. In 1921, he became the first person to surpass 25 feet in the long jump.

1961

- Cornell's Steve Machooka became the first African-American cross-country runner to earn first-team status in the Heptagonal Games Association.

1963

- Penn's John Edgar Wideman, an All-Ivy honoree and All-Big 5 selection in 1963, became just the second African-American to be selected as a Rhodes Scholar and the first to do so in more than a half-century, following Harvard's Alain Locke (1907). Wideman graduated Phi Beta Kappa in 1963. He was named to the Big 5 Hall of Fame in 1974. He was the first author to twice receive the PEN/Faulkner Award for Fiction, for the novels *Sent for You Yesterday* (1984) and *Philadelphia Fire* (1991). His latest book is titled *Hoop Roots* (2001).

1964

- Bulldog sprinter Wendell Motley became the first black athlete from Yale to earn a significant league-wide honor, earning the Athlete of the Meet award at the Heptagonal Indoor Championship. Motley would claim a silver medal for Trinidad in the Tokyo Olympics later that summer in the 400-meter dash. No Ivy Leaguer has won an Olympic medal in an individual race shorter than 10,000 meters since.

1965

- Dartmouth graduate Edgar Holley of Maywood, Ill. became the first African-American football player to be named first-team All-Ivy League.

1967

- Cornell basketball star Gregg Morris became the first black men's basketball player to be tabbed first-team All-Ivy League. A year later, Morris would become the first African-American from the Ivy League chosen in the NBA Draft when the Baltimore Bullets selected him in the 16th round.

1968

- Harvard's Ron Winfield became the first black fencer to be named first-team All-Ivy League.

1969

- Yale graduate and Baltimore native Calvin Hill was named the NFL's NFC Rookie of the Year for the Dallas Cowboys.

1970

- Dartmouth's Willie Bogan became the first black Ivy Leaguer to become a Football Academic All-American. Bogan, a native of Albion, Mich., followed it by becoming a Rhodes Scholar in addition to earning an NCAA

Postgraduate Scholarship.

- Columbia's Jim McMillian became the first black Ivy Leaguer to be chosen in the first round of the NBA Draft and would be joined by Penn's Corky Calhoun in 1972 and Princeton's Armond Hill in 1976. Hill, the first African-American in Princeton's history to be named as an Ivy League Player of the Year, became the first black head men's basketball coach at Columbia 20 years later.

- Princeton named Larry Ellis as its head coach of track and field and cross-country, becoming the first African-American head coach of any sport in the Ivy League. Ellis would lead his team to 19 Heptagonal titles in his 22 seasons and, in 1984, his efforts earned him the right to coach the U.S. Olympic men's track and field team in Los Angeles, where running greats Carl Lewis and Edwin Moses took home the gold. An accomplished collegiate miler in his own right at New York University, Ellis coached a long line of track stars that began with long-jumper Bob Beamon while Beamon was still in high school. In a letter from the longtime world record holder read at Ellis' funeral service in 1998, Beamon referred to his former coach as "a father figure."

1971

- Princeton's Brian Taylor became the first African-American to be named the Ivy League Men's Basketball Rookie of the Year.

1972

- Cornell graduate Jerome (Brud) Holland became the first African-American to receive the Theodore Roosevelt Award, given by the NCAA to honor a distinguished citizen of national reputation and outstanding accomplishment who earned a varsity athletic award in college and has demonstrated a continuing interest in physical fitness and intercollegiate sports.

- Yale graduate Calvin Hill became the first African-American Ivy Leaguer to win a Super Bowl.

1973

- Tom Sanders became the League's first African-American head men's basketball coach when he named the head coach at Harvard in 1973.

- October 6, 1973 ... When Brown lined up against Penn at Franklin Field, something that had never happened in the more than 100 years of major-college football took place. It was the first matchup ever between two starting black quarterbacks as Penn's Marty Vaughn and Brown's Dennis Coleman took to the field. Vaughn struck first with a touchdown scamper, but Coleman led his Bears to 20 unanswered points. It was then Vaughn's turn to get hot, connecting on one touchdown pass and leading the Quakers to another to take a 21-20 halftime lead. Penn scored the only touchdown of the second half to go onto a 28-20 victory in the historic game before 10,991 fans. Vaughn threw for 200 yards while Coleman ran for more than 10 yards a carry as the two went down together in history. Here's a quote from Mr. Vaughn: "I know that Dennis and I talked about it, because there were only four or five black quarterbacks in the country, but I didn't remember it as the first time two black quarterbacks met," recalls Vaughn. "We talked about it being the first time in the Ivy League and thought that was significant. I remember that we wanted to put on a good show." Vaughn, who lives in Philadelphia, has been an investment banker for years and now serves on Penn's Athletic Advisory Board while Coleman, who grew up in the Philadelphia area and now lives in the Providence area, serves entertainment and sports clients as a partner in a law firm and still works closely with the Brown athletic department.

1974

- The Ivy basketball season began with three black head coaches with Tom Sanders at Harvard, Ben Bluiitt at Cornell and Marcus Jackson at Dartmouth. Of the more than 200 major college programs at the time, fewer than 10 had African-American head coaches.

- Penn track star Denis Fikes ran the mile in a time of 3:55.0, the fastest time by an African-American at the time. His record stood for a decade. Now known as D. Elton Cochran-Fikes, he is the Coordinator of Compliance at Penn.

1975

- Columbia running back Doug Jackson became the first African-American to win the Asa S. Bushnell Cup as the Ivy Football Player of the Year.

- Penn's Ron Haigler became the first African-American to be named the Ivy League Men's Basketball Player of the Year.

- Dartmouth's Reggie Williams became the first black wrestler named first-team All-Ivy League, but he is better known for his exploits on and off the football field.

Williams, who starred for the Cincinnati Bengals from 1976 to 1989, was named as a Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year in 1987 as one of the Athletes Who Care. He had also been the first African-American to be named All-Ivy League first-team in football three times. Williams is currently the Vice President of Sports, Walt Disney World in Lake Buena Vista, Fla.

1977

- Princeton track star Jill Pilgrim became the first African-American woman to be a Heptagonal Games first-team performer and the first black woman in League history in any sport to be named to first team.

1978

- Cornell running back Joe Holland (the son of Jerome (Brud) Holland) became the first African-American to rush for 1,000 yards in an Ivy season (and just the second player ever after Ed Maninaro). But Holland made a bigger statement in the classroom, twice selected as a first-team Academic All-American and eventually an Academic All-America Hall of Famer.

- Columbia's Mike Wilhite became the first black baseball player named first-team All-Ivy League.

1979

- Charles Harris became the first African-American athletic director for an Ivy institution. He served in this role at Penn until 1985.

1981

- Brown soccer player Yvonne Goldsberry became the first black women to be selected to first-team All-Ivy League.

1982

- Cornell graduate Shea Maultsby became the first African-American field hockey player named to first-team All-Ivy.

- Yale's Patricia Melton became the first African-American female to be named the Heptagonal Indoor Track Athlete of the Meet.

1983

- Columbia's George Starke, a native of New Rochelle, N.Y., became a Super Bowl champion as the Head Hog for the Washington Redskins.

1984

- Brown's Michelle Smith of West Lynn, Mass. became the first African-American to be named the Ivy League Women's Basketball Player of the Year.

1987

- Yale footballer Kurt Schmoke was elected the Mayor of Baltimore City on November 3, 1987. He was the first African-American elected to the office of mayor of Baltimore. Schmoke, also a native of Baltimore, Md., is a 1971 graduate of Yale University and was a varsity letter-winner on the 1968 Ivy Champion squad. He attended Oxford University as a Rhodes Scholar and received his law degree in 1976 from Harvard Law School.

- In the mid-seventies, Dan Jiggetts was a standout lineman at Harvard (he would later be named to the Ivy Silver Anniversary team and enjoy a successful NFL career). One of his jobs during the Cambridge winters was to keep statistics for the basketball team, which featured "The Hardest Working Man In Sports" James Brown (who had picked Harvard over North Carolina and UCLA). In 1987, those two reunited to become the first African-American broadcast team for a network television as they covered the NFL for CBS Sports for two seasons.

1988

- Columbia fencer Bob Cottingham, of Orange, N.J., took the NCAA title in the sabre.

1990

- Princeton graduate Terdema Ussery II became the first African-American Commissioner of a U.S. professional sports league when he was named to head the Continental Basketball Association.

- Not only did Harvard's Meredith Rainey score in six events at the Outdoor Heps Championship, the New York, N.Y. native capped the season by becoming the first African-American woman in Ivy history to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

1991

- Penn's Doug Glanville was selected 12th in the first round of the Major League Baseball draft by the Chicago Cubs after a first-team Academic All-America season for

the Quakers. For the last three years, Glanville of Teaneck, N.J. has been the starting centerfielder for the Philadelphia Phillies.

1992

- Brown graduate and Phoenix, Ariz. native Steve Jordan was named All-Pro for the NFL's Minnesota Vikings for the sixth straight time. Only Concrete Chuck Bednarik (eight-time Pro Bowler) was named All-Pro more often among Ivy graduates.

1994

- The Ivy volleyball coaches selected their first African-American first-team All-Ivy honoree, Ayesha Attoh of Princeton.

1997

- Marcellus Wiley of Columbia became just the second Ivy African-American to be picked by the second round of the NFL Draft (joining Yale's Calvin Hill, who was a first-rounder in 1969). Wiley, a native of Los Angeles, Calif., was selected to participate in the 2002 NFL Pro-Bowl in Honolulu, Hawaii.
- Harvard's Tom Blake became the first African-American to be named the Ivy League Men's Tennis Player of the Year. Two years later, his brother, James, earned the same honor. The Blake brothers are from Harlem, N.Y.

1998

- Harvard's Allison Feaster became the first-ever Ivy League women's basketball player to be named an All-American. She also became the first Ivy League African-American female to play professional basketball in the United States when she suited up for the L.A. Sparks (Feaster now starts for the Charlotte Sting). Feaster, a native of Chester, S.C., led the Crimson to three-straight League championships and NCAA tournament appearances. She was named Ivy League Rookie of the Year in 1994-95 and then went on to collect an unprecedented three Ivy League Player of the Year honors. When she graduated, Feaster held several League records, including points scored in a season (389) and a career (1,173) and scoring average for a season (27.8 ppg, 1997-98) and a career (21.0 ppg 1994-98).

1999

- The Ivy League celebrated its 25th year of women's championships during the 1998-99 academic year. In honor of the many women who have excelled in their sport, the League announced its Silver Anniversary Honor Roll. Twelve African-American women were named to the list for the following sports: Basketball - Rhonda Anderson '83, Cornell; Allison Feaster '98, Harvard; Auretha Fleming '84, Penn; Soccer - Melissa Mc Bean '97, Dartmouth; Track and Field - Teri Smith '91, Brown; Teri Martin '96-C, Columbia; Heather Ruddock '88-C, Columbia; Meredith Rainey '90, Harvard; Frances Childs '88, Penn; Christelle Williams '89, Penn; Nicole Harrison '98, Princeton; Patricia Melton '82, Yale.

2000

- Princeton named John Thompson, a 1988 graduate, as its head men's basketball coach. With his hiring, all eight Ivy League schools have now had an African-American head coach of men's basketball. Thompson of Washington, D.C. led his Tigers to the Ivy title and the NCAA Tournament in his first season.

2001

- It would be hard to imagine the Taylor twins having a better year than this. Brenda, competing for Harvard, and Lindsay, competing for Brown, combined to win eight individual events at the 2000 Indoor and Outdoor League Championships and both were named Academic All-Ivy! Brenda would win a national title in the 400m hurdles the following year and qualify for the World Championships while Lindsay would claim her fourth straight Indoor Pentathlon title.

- Junior wide receiver Carl Morris led the Harvard Crimson to its first perfect season on the gridiron in 88 years. Morris, who entered his senior season with nearly every Harvard receiving record, was named the League's recipient of the Asa S. Bushnell Cup as the Most Valuable Player in the Ivies.

- Princeton's Ilvy Friebe, of Bonn, Germany, became the first African-American to be named the Ivy League Field Hockey Player of the Year as she amassed 37 points in seven League contests, nearly three times as many as anyone else!

- Two Ivy League African-American football players - Princeton's Cameron Atkinson and Yale's Billy Brown - are

named second-team Academic All-America by Verizon. With those selections, the number of times a black Ivy League footballer has been named Academic All-America has risen to ten. Brown is the first black Yale athlete to be named Academic All-American in any sport.

2002

- Penn junior forward Ugonna Onyekwe was named the Player of the Year in the greatest season of Ivy men's basketball ever. For the first time ever, the League sent three teams to postseason tournaments following an unprecedented three-way playoff for the NCAA berth. Two other African-Americans joined Onyekwe on the Ivy first-team, his junior teammate Koko Archibong and Brown junior Earl Hunt.

- Yale senior Thomas Hocker earned academic honors in addition to his success on the track. A recipient of the William Neely Mallory Award, the most prestigious athletic award given to a senior male at Yale, Hocker was awarded the prestigious Churchill Scholarship, an annual award given to 11 American students by the Churchill Foundation in Britain. He was also named as a first-team Academic All-American by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

- Princeton junior defensiveman Damien Davis was a USILA Second-Team All-American as the Tigers wound up in the NCAA Lacrosse Championship yet again.

- There were some remarkable efforts at the Outdoor Heps Championships in Annapolis as Princeton's amazing high jumper Tora Harris, who won NCAA titles both indoor and outdoor, cleared an all-time League-best 7-foot-7. But the Men's Outstanding Performer was Chris Lambert, Harvard's junior sprinter. Lambert won both the 100m and 200m dashes and both times would have set Heps records, except that each was deemed wind-aided. Wind-aided marks are not eligible for record purposes. His 10.19 clocking in the 100m dash was nearly a half-second faster than his nearest competitor. Another great performance came from the Penn senior Tuan Wreh, who was a double winner in the long and triple jumps. His triple jump victory was his sixth straight Heps triple title and broke a 25-year-old Heps record as he covered 53-foot-5.

- The 1999 Ivy Player of the Year, James Blake of Harvard, won his first ever ATP tour title at the Legg Mason Tennis Classic in Washington, D.C., over the summer. Blake is also a member of the United States Davis Cup team.

- Princeton field hockey player Ilvy Friebe became just the second Ivy Leaguer to be named first-team All-America twice.

- Harvard wide receiver Carl Morris became the first player in 25 years to repeat as the recipient of the Asa S. Bushnell Cup as the Most Valuable Player in Ivy Football.

2003

- Brown basketballer Earl Hunt of Rockville, Md., broke Arnie Berman's 31-year-old school career scoring record and became just the fourth Ivy Leaguer to amass 2,000 career points in leading the Bears to their first National Invitation Tournament.

- Yale freshman Joslyn Woodard shook up the Heps Indoor Championships by winning three events -- the 60- and 200-meter dashes and the long jump -- and being named the 2003 Performer of the Meet. In both events she knocked off Cornell's Katy Jay, the defending champion in each. In the 60, Woodard set a new meet record of 7.59 seconds, besting the old mark of 7.62 seconds, set only in 2002 by Jay.

- Cory Gibbs was added to the U.S. national team's January men's soccer roster. Gibbs is among the finest athletes in Ivy history. As a senior in 2000, he led the Bears to the Ivy Men's Soccer title and then to the Elite Eight of the NCAA College Cup as the League's Player of the Year and First-Team All-American. In addition to being a three-time All-Ivy performer, Cory also was a higher achiever in the classroom and was a member of the Academic All-Ivy Team. A native of Plantation, Fla., Gibbs is now playing at the highest level of professional soccer in Germany's Bundesliga. In the fall of 2001, the then-21-year-old Gibbs became the youngest American ever to score a goal in the German First Division.

- Columbia University named Joe Jones as its new basketball coach, replacing Armond Hill. Jones' brother, James, is the head coach at Yale, making them the first African-American brothers to be head coaches in the same Division I conference at the same time. In fact, it marked the first time since 1957 that any conference had brothers as head coaches (Clarence and Hank Iba in the Missouri Valley Conference).

- Penn's Ugonna Onyekwe became just the second player to win the Ivy Men's Basketball Player of the Year award outright twice, joining Princeton's Kit Mueller (1990, 1991). He led Penn to the NCAA Tournament and scored

30 points against Oklahoma State in the first round. Afterward, Cowboy Coach Eddie Sutton couldn't find enough praise for Onyekwe, who graduated with 1,762 career points, ninth all-time in the Ivy League.

- Harvard sprinter Chris Lambert found a new title -- that of World Champion. Lambert, running for the British squad at the World University Games in Daegu, South Korea, took the Gold medal in the 100-meter dash, posting a time of 10.44. At the NCAA Championships in June, Lambert had the best 200-meter times in both the preliminaries (20.71) and semifinals (20.73) before finishing fourth in the final in a time of 20.64.

- Princeton lacrosse standout Damien Davis, a unanimous All-Ivy selection, earned first-team All-America status for the first time. Davis captured a National Championship and four Ivy League titles while marking the opponent's best attackmen in every game of his career. The 12th pick of the Major League Lacrosse draft, Davis was a member of the Champion Baltimore Bayhawks in his initial pro season.

Ivy League Women's History Timeline

1972

- The Eastern Association of Women's rowing colleges holds its first regatta. Charter members Barnard, Princeton and Radcliffe participate. Princeton wins the inaugural race, while Radcliffe finishes in second place.

1973

- Lawrie Mifflin graduates in Yale's first class to admit women as freshmen. Responsible for the promotion of the field hockey squad to varsity status, Mifflin goes on to become one of the first woman sportswriters for the New York Daily News and The New York Times, and is the first Ivy League woman to be honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in 1998.

1974

- Radcliffe claims the first official Ivy League championship in a women's sports, winning the EAWRC Regatta in Middletown, Conn.
- Three years after Pembroke and Brown unify their athletic programs, a merger between Radcliffe and Harvard results in the Harvard Department of Athletics assuming complete administration of women's athletics on campus. Only the rowing team retains the Radcliffe name, by a vote of the team members.

1975

- Princeton wins the first Ivy League title in basketball. The following season, the Tigers win their second of four consecutive crowns, and advance to the National Small College Basketball Tournament.

1976

- For the first time in history, women are eligible to receive Rhodes Scholarships. Three varsity letterwinners are selected among the 13 women in the inaugural class, and all three are from Ivy League institutions: Alison Muscatine and Denise Thal, who both play basketball and tennis at Harvard-Radcliffe, and Princeton field hockey player Suzanne Perles.

- Dartmouth's Sandy Helve graduates with a combined 11 varsity letters in field hockey, squash and lacrosse, the maximum number possible at the college. Emily Goodfellow collects 12 letters in field hockey, squash and lacrosse during her four years at Princeton.

- Cornell wins the first Ivy League championship in ice hockey, also the first title to be awarded in tournament play. The Red strings five straight outright titles together, then shares the sixth crown with Brown in 1981.

- Yale crew members stage a "Strip-In" in Director of Physical Education Joni Barnett's office. Protesting the lack of facilities for women rowers, about 20 team members strip off their sweats to reveal "Title IX" painted across their bare bodies; the event receives national attention and produces an increase in resources.

1977

- Princeton track star Jill Pilgrim became the first African-American woman to be a Heptagonal Games first-team performer and the first black woman in League history in any sport to be named to first team.

- Dartmouth wins the first Ivy League outdoor track and field championship in a competition held at Cornell. That fall, Harvard captures the inaugural Ivy League crown in cross country, and Penn wins the first Ivy League volleyball championship.

- Princeton wins the first Ivy League swimming and diving championship, held at the University of Pennsylvania. The format for the championship remains the same until 1982, when other schools are added and the Eastern Women's Swimming League Championship begins. Ivy League schools compete in the EWSLs from 1983 through 1997, before the Ivy-only format is restored for the 1998 championship.

- Yale wins the first Ivy League title in gymnastics. The Bulldogs take seven of the next 12 crowns, while Cornell wins the other five, until Brown notches its first title in the final Ivy championship in 1990. Beginning the following year, there is one fewer gymnastics team than League rules require to declare an official Ivy champion

1978

- The Ivy League honors a women's soccer champion for the first time. Harvard wins the title, awarded in tournament play, with a 3-0 victory at second-place Brown.

1979

- The fall season includes the initial Ivy League crown awarded in field hockey, won by Dartmouth. In a little more than five years, the Ivy League has created championships in 10 women's sports.

1980

- Dartmouth wins its first League basketball title, starting a streak of four straight outright championships that produces the League's first appearance in the NCAA tournament in 1983. The Big Green has won or shared 11 League basketball titles, the most of any school.

- Three spring sports -- lacrosse, softball and tennis -- award Ivy League championships for the first time. Yale wins the softball title outright and shares the lacrosse and tennis crowns with Penn and Princeton, respectively.

1981

- Indoor track and field is added as a distinct sport with a separate Ivy League championship. Princeton wins the first title.

1982

- Yale captures the initial Ivy League crown in fencing, the 15th Ivy women's championship sport, and wins the AIAW national title. The Bulldogs' Andrea Metkus wins the individual crown at the same competition and is honored with the Broderick Award in fencing, awarded annually to the top performer.

- Dartmouth basketball star Gail Koziara, three-time Ivy Player of the Year and the League's second-leading scorer, becomes the first woman in League history to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

- Brown wins its second League soccer crown in the sport's five-year history. This is the first of Brown's nine consecutive triumphs, which produce four NCAA tournament invitations and quarterfinal appearances in 1983 and 1984.

- Princeton Associate Athletic Director Merrily Dean Baker ends her term as the final president of the AIAW, which loses a lawsuit to prevent the NCAA from governing intercollegiate women's athletics.

- Ivy League soccer and basketball championships are changed from tournament play to a full round-robin schedule (double round-robin for basketball). The ice hockey title is changed in the same manner the following season.

1983

- Nine years after Radcliffe's victory at the EAWRC Regatta marks the beginning of women's Ivy League athletic championships, Yale wins the first League title in squash, the 16th sport to award an Ivy crown.

- Penn begins a string of six consecutive Ivy fencing championships, winning the NCAA title in 1986.

- Cindy Cohen becomes head coach of the Princeton softball program after its first Ivy title in 1983 and leads the Tigers to 11 of the next 13 Ivy League crowns.

1984

- Princeton ice hockey defenseman Syrena Carlborn wins her third straight Ivy Player of the Year award in the first three years of the award's existence.

- Kate Wiley of Harvard becomes the first -- and still remains the only -- three-time winner of the Heptagonal Cross Country Championships.

- The Ivy League sponsors more sports, played by more women and more men, than any conference in the country, and the Council of Ivy Group Presidents begins a continuing pattern of increases in Ivy League Office resources to support these activities.

1985

- Yale wins its second straight NCAA championship in women's fencing, and Ivy League athletes take three of the four top spots in the individual competition, led by champion Caitlin Bilodeaux of Columbia.

1986

- Columbia advances to the NCAA Division III National Basketball Tournament in the first year after the Columbia-Barnard consortium is formalized for all sports, then moves up to the Division I level in 1986-87.

1987

- Yale captures its second of four straight Ivy cross country championships, and places third at the NCAAs, the League's best team finish to date.

1988

- Penn reaches the semifinal round of the NCAA field hockey tournament, the first League member to advance beyond the first round.

1989

- Columbia wins the first of its three straight Ivy League fencing crowns and finishes in second place at the NCAA championships.

1990

- Harvard becomes the first Ivy member to claim an NCAA women's lacrosse championship with a thrilling 8-7 win against traditional powerhouse Maryland.

- Charlotte Joslin, a member of the Harvard national championship lacrosse team, graduates with a combined 12 varsity letters in field hockey, ice hockey, and lacrosse. Princeton's Mollie Marcoux, graduating the following year, matches the extraordinary total with 12 letters in soccer, ice hockey and lacrosse.

- Not only did Harvard's Meredith Rainey score in six events at the Outdoor Heps Championship, the New York, N.Y. native capped the season by becoming the first African-American woman in Ivy history to earn an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.

1991

- Cornell wins the Heptagonal Outdoor Track and Field Championships by three points, the second-closest margin in history. The Big Red's fourth title of the decade comes in 1997 by an even smaller margin, a slim one-half point ahead of Princeton.

1992

- Harvard begins a streak of six consecutive seasons in which the Crimson does not lose a single League squash match. During that period, Harvard wins five straight Howe Cups, the national women's squash competition held at Yale since its inception in 1973.

- Two undergraduate women athletes file a Title IX complaint against Brown. The ultimate resolution of Cohen v. Brown sets benchmarks for future rulings on participation and resource opportunities for women athletes.

1993

- Princeton's Kristen Beaney wins the 5,000-meter run and is named the Outstanding Performer at the Heptagonal Indoor Track and Field Championships. She matches her performance the following year, adding a victory in the 3,000-meter run, and becomes the first two-time winner of the Outstanding Performer award.

- Cornell wins its third consecutive Ivy League volleyball championship and becomes the first League team to participate in the NCAA tournament, falling in the first round to national power Nebraska.

1994

- Brown outlasts Dartmouth in overtime in the first-ever League basketball playoff game and gains the Ivies' first automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. The Bears then enter the second half of their first-round contest tied with the University of Connecticut before falling 79-60.

- Princeton wins sole possession of the Ivy League lacrosse crown, the first time in eight years that Harvard has not at least shared the title. In the postseason, the Tigers win a 14-13 overtime classic against defending champion Virginia in the national semifinal and then outlast Maryland by a 10-7 count to win the national championship.

- Through private donations, the Ivy League enlists sculptor Timothy Maslyn to create a series of new championship trophies for several sports. Maslyn constructs his first work of art, the Lajos S. Csizsar Trophy, in the likeness of Penn fencer Mary Jane O'Neill, who won the NCAA individual title in 1984. By 1997, Maslyn has constructed trophies for four women's sports, including softball, tennis and rowing.

- The Council of Ivy Group Presidents approves the appointment of a Senior Women's Administrator to the Ivy Policy Committee. Penn's Carolyn Schlie Femovich is the first appointee.

1995

- Princeton wins the NCAA Softball Play-In against Rider. The Tigers, who at one point that season won 29 games in a row, then earn the right to host an NCAA Regional. With a win against Hofstra and two wins against Connecticut, Princeton becomes the first Ivy League representative in the College Softball World Series. The Tigers make the return trip to the World Series the following year as well.

- Penn's Barrie Bernstein becomes the seventh singles player in League women's tennis history to be a four-time first team All-Ivy selection, but it's Cornell's Olga Itskhoki who wins the League's inaugural Player of the Year award.

Ivy League Women's History Timeline

1996

- Princeton's field hockey team surprises national powers Iowa and Old Dominion to advance to the championship game of the NCAA tournament. The Tigers fall to North Carolina in the title contest, but the following season successfully maintain an undefeated streak of 25 games in the League dating back to 1993, and make a return trip to the national semifinals.

1997

- The Bethpage, N.Y. Golf Course is the site of the Ivy League's first women's golf championship, and Yale cruises to a 38-shot victory. Princeton senior Mary Moan is the first-ever individual medalist.
- The inaugural NCAA women's rowing championship is crowned on Lake Natoma in Sacramento, Calif. Princeton and Brown finish second and third, respectively, in the overall team totals, with Dartmouth, Radcliffe and Yale also receiving bids. Yale Associate Athletic Director Barbara Chesler is the inaugural chair of the NCAA Women's Rowing Committee.
- Columbia field hockey and lacrosse programs, recently elevated to varsity status, play a full Ivy League schedule for the first time, making a full eight-team league possible for both sports.

1998

- The United States women's ice hockey team wins the first-ever gold medal in the sport in the 1998 Olympic Games in Nagano, Japan. Eight team members have former or current Ivy League connections: Lisa Brown-Miller (former Princeton coach), Katie King (Brown '97), A.J. Mlezcko (Harvard '99), Tara Mounsey (Brown), Sarah Tueting (Dartmouth '98), Gretchen Ulion (Dartmouth '94) and Sandra Whyte (Harvard '92), and head coach Ben Smith (Harvard '68).

- Brown topples New Hampshire, 4-3, to become the first Ivy League school to win an ECAC women's ice hockey crown. The Bears receive an automatic bid to the inaugural USA Hockey national collegiate championship, where they beat Northeastern in the national semifinals before falling in the championship game to New Hampshire.

- Harvard basketball sensation Allison Feaster is the first-ever athlete in any sport, men's or women's, to be dually honored as an Ivy League Rookie of the Year and three-time Ivy League Player of the Year. Feaster leads the nation in scoring her senior season, averaging 28.5 ppg., and is the first Ivy League athlete in history to be named a Kodak All-American, an honor bestowed annually on the top 10 players in all of women's college basketball.

- The Harvard women's basketball team produces one of the biggest upsets in college basketball history, becoming the first No. 16 seed to beat a No. 1 seed in either the NCAA men's or women's tournament, with a 71-67 defeat at Stanford. The victory ends the Cardinal's 59-game home winning streak and moves an Ivy League women's team into the NCAA second round for the first time ever.

- Columbia's Cristina Teuscher, a member of the gold medal-winning 800-freestyle relay team in the 1996 Olympic Games, becomes the first Ivy League woman to win an NCAA swimming championship. She captures the 500-yard freestyle in a time of 4:35.45, the second-fastest time in U.S. history and more than three seconds ahead of the second place finisher. The following day, she wins her second title, this time in the 400-meter individual medley.

- The Ivy League begins a year-long commemoration of 25 years of Ivy women's championships. The celebration honors past athletes for their accomplishments, marks prominent transitions in Ivy League women's athletic programs during the 25-year period, and helps plan a future direction.

1999

- For the first time in League history, four Ivy teams are chosen for the NCAA Women's College Cup soccer tournament. Dartmouth, Harvard, Penn, and Princeton are all selected, and Dartmouth and Harvard advance to the second round. The League would again send four teams to the national tournament two years later.

- Harvard women's ice hockey claims its first League title in 10 years. The Crimson advance to the ECAC tournament where the squad defeats Dartmouth in the semifinals and New Hampshire in the final. Next, it was on to the United States Women's College Hockey Championship in Minneapolis where Harvard defeated League foe Brown in the semifinals and then squared off with New Hampshire for the second time in less than a week. The Crimson earned a 6-5 overtime victory over the Wildcats to become the 1998-99 national champion for

women's ice hockey. Harvard forward A.J. Mlezcko wins the League's Player of the Year award and goes on to claim the Kazmaier trophy as the NCAA's top women's ice hockey student-athlete.

- The Ivy League concluded its year-long celebration of 25 years of Ivy women's championships by publishing "Silver Era, Golden Moments." The book marks the cultural importance of women's athletics, narrating the integration of women into all eight Ivy schools, and into higher education nationally, and the growth of women's athletics following the enactment of Title IX in 1972. The 25th anniversary celebration culminates with the Silver Anniversary Symposium on April 23 and 24. The symposium is the final stop for the 25th Anniversary Traveling Exhibit and several of the League's most prominent former female athletes are welcomed as speakers and panelists.

2000

- Columbia's Cristina Teuscher becomes the first Ivy student-athlete ever to win the prestigious Honda Broderick Cup. The cup is awarded annually to the top female student-athlete in the United States. Later that year, Teuscher helps establish the Cristina Teuscher Women's Intercollegiate Sports Endowment. The endowment, which is the first of its kind in Columbia Athletic history, is part of the school's continued commitment to the growth of women's athletics, and "will be allocated to enhance the quality of the intercollegiate experience for women's sports participants" at Columbia.

- Dartmouth wins its fourth of five consecutive Ivy lacrosse championships, but it's the Princeton squad that upsets Duke in the quarterfinals of the NCAA tournament and advances all the way to the NCAA championship game before falling to Maryland.

- For the second straight year, Dartmouth wins the Ivy women's basketball championship and nearly pulls off an upset in the NCAA tournament first round. Trailing fourth-ranked and eventual national champ Purdue by 13 points at half (44-31), the Big Green outscored the Boilermakers 35-26 in the second half before succumbing, 70-66, on Purdue's home floor.

2001

- Harvard's Brenda Taylor wins the NCAA championship in the 400 and is named the Honda Award winner as the top woman collegiate athlete in Track & Field. Taylor is the second consecutive Ivy athlete to be recognized by Honda in their season-ending national awards for exceptional student-athletes.

- The Penn women's tennis team won their first-ever Ivy title, then pulled off a stunning upset of 19th-ranked Pepperdine before losing to Baylor in the second round. Quaker freshman Sanela Kunovac becomes only the second women's tennis player to win both the Freshman of the Year and Player of the Year in the same season.

- Princeton's field hockey team advances to the NCAA tournament semifinals for the fourth time in six seasons after defeating defending national champion and second-seeded Old Dominion, 2-1, in a classic field hockey contest. The Tigers would eventually succumb to eventual national champion Michigan in the semifinals.

2002

- Princeton's senior lacrosse players stepped up in the 12-7 win over Georgetown in the Women's Lacrosse National Championship game in Baltimore, Md. Tiger seniors scored seven goals as Princeton won the national title in front of some 4,400 people. "There was never a doubt in my mind that we would win this," said senior Lauren Simone. "We proved in the Maryland game that even a five-goal deficit is not too much to overcome. I think the whole team had complete confidence in our ability to come back and win this game."

- Twelve Ivy League women's ice hockey players — five Canadians and seven Americans — took home medals from the 2002 Salt Lake City Winter Olympics in February. On the gold-winning Canadian team were Dana Antall (Cornell), Jennifer Botterill (Harvard '02), Becky Kellar (Brown '97), Cherie Piper (Dartmouth '05, deferred) and Tammy Schewchuk (Harvard '01). Representing the U.S. and bringing back silver medals were Julie Chu (Harvard '05, deferred), Andrea Kilbourne (Princeton '03), Katie King (Brown '97), A.J. Mlezcko (Harvard '99), Tara Mounsey (Brown '01), Angela Ruggerio (Harvard '02) and Sarah Tueting (Dartmouth '98).

- JoAnn (Josie) Harper, a prominent figure in collegiate athletics and a highly regarded coach who had been Senior Associate Director of Athletics at Dartmouth since 1999, was named Dartmouth's Director of Athletics and Recreation. With that appointment, Harper became the first woman to hold such a position in Ivy League history.

- To honor the spirit and courage of Amanda Walton,

Yale University presented Walton with the first Amanda D. Walton Award, which is presented at the discretion of the Department of Athletics to an outstanding athlete who has excelled on the field of play and who has shown spirit and courage in transcending unforeseen challenges. After her sophomore year, Walton, who was a field hockey and women's lacrosse standout at Yale, was involved in an automobile accident which put her career on hold. She overcame a coma and physical injuries with hard work and dedication.

- Princeton's Lauren Simmons finished her senior track and field season in amazing fashion. After running a personal best 2:03.87 in the qualifying rounds at the NCAAs in New Orleans, she clocked another superb effort in the final. Finishing in 2:05.08, she trailed only North Carolina sophomore Alice Schmidt.

- Cornell lacrosse star Jaimee Reynolds, a senior from Baltimore, Md., became just the 13th Ivy Leaguer to earn first-team Academic All-America status twice in a career as she was named to the Verizon Academic All-America Women's At-Large Team. The 2002 Ivy League Player of the Year maintained a 3.77 grade-point average in Agricultural and Biological Engineering.

2003

- Two-time Ivy League Player of the Year Hana Peljto was named to the academically-America first team, while helping lead Harvard to a 14-0 Ivy record (22-4 overall) and ranking 10th in the nation in scoring with 21.3 ppg. The senior also was named Rookie of the Year and is majoring in Psychology.

- Twins Kate and Laura O'Neill were side by side throughout their career at Yale. Earning all-America status after finishing second and fourth respectively in the 10,000-meter run at the NCAA Championships, the two-some also earned academic all-America honors. The duo holds the fastest times in League history for the 5,000 and 10,000m, and were named co-athletes of the meet at the Outdoor Heptagonal Games. Additionally, Kate was named Mondo District Athlete of the Year and NCAA Woman of the Year for the state of Connecticut.

- Touted as one of the best defenders in the nation, Rachael Becker helped Princeton earn two consecutive national lacrosse titles and raked in honor after honor in 2003. The three-time all-American was the recipient of lacrosse's prestigious Tewaaron Trophy and the Honda Sports Award, as well as being named Ivy League Player of the Year. En route to the national title, Becker anchored a defense that allowed only 4.5 goals per game, culminating in a 5-3 victory over Loyola (Md.) in the national tournament.

- After 30 years, Radcliffe (Harvard) women's crew took the national team and varsity eight title, beating out rowing powerhouses such as Michigan, Stanford, and Washington in a time of 6:26.98 and 59 team points. The varsity eight also took All-Ivy first team honors, while head coach Liz O'Leary earned the Coach of the Year award from the College Rowing Coaches Association (CRCA).

- After finishing last at every Cross Country Heps in which it competed from 1978 to 1997, Columbia jumped to a fifth-place finish in 1998 before finishing third in each of the last three seasons. In 2003, the Lions raised the bar, dominating Heps with five top-10 finishers. Their 29 points was just six points off the League mark of 23 set by Dartmouth in 1995 and 1997, and their 63-point margin of victory was the widest in Heps history.

- Two-time Olympic medalist Jennifer Botterill has taken Ivy League women's hockey to a new level. The Ivy League Player of the Year and the only two-time Patty Kazmaier award winner led the nation in goals with 39 and is the all-time leading scorer not only at Harvard but in Division I ice hockey history, surpassing the record set by Michigan State's Tom Ross.

Ivy League Academic All-Americans

Every year GTE and the College Sports Information Directors of America choose Academic All-America teams in the sports of football, women's volleyball, men's and women's basketball, baseball and softball. Also, men's and women's at-large teams -- comprised of athletes from all sports not listed above -- are chosen. To be named an Academic All-American, an athlete has to maintain at least a 3.20 grade point average and be a starter or key reserve on his or her team.

† GTE and CoSIDA choose one athlete from each team as the Academic All-American of the Year. Paul Sorensen was so honored in 1988. Darren Eales was chosen as the At-Large Academic All-America Team Member of the Year in the spring of 1995. They are the only Ivy League athletes ever to earn the distinction.

In 1988, GTE and CoSIDA established the Academic All-America Hall of Fame. Princeton's Bill Bradley was a member of the inaugural class, Dartmouth's Willie Bogan was added a year later. Cornell's Joe Holland was inducted in 1991 and Ellen Mayer Sabik, also of Cornell, was named to the Hall in 1997.

Ivy League Postgraduate Scholars

The NCAA awards 174 postgraduate scholarships annually, 87 for men and 87 for women. The scholarships are awarded to student-athletes who excel academically and athletically and who are in their last year of intercollegiate athletics competition. The one-time grants of \$5,000 each are awarded for fall sports, winter sports and spring sports. 58 scholarships are awarded for each category, 29 scholarships going to both men and women. The scholarships are one-time, nonrenewable grants.

Eligibility is restricted to student-athletes at NCAA member institutions who, in their final year of eligibility, have performed with distinction as members of varsity teams in the sport for which they were nominated. Nominees must have a minimum grade-point average of 3.200 (based on a 4.000 scale), be nominated by the faculty athletics representative or athletics director and intend to continue academic work beyond the baccalaureate degree as a part-time or full-time graduate student.

2002-03 Year In Review

It was a remarkable 2002-03 season for the eight Ivy institutions as the Ivy League boasted nine national champions (four team, five individual) to go along with 38 athletes selected to the CoSIDA Academic All-District First Team.

Highlights included Brian Chaput and Sam Burley of Penn capping a stellar season by winning national titles in their events during the outdoor track championships. Chaput tossed the javelin 258-2 for a new Ivy League record, while Burley took home the title in the 800 meters by just one hundredth of a second. Cornell wrestler Travis Lee brought home a national title in the 125 pound class, going undefeated on the season, while Yasser El-Halaby of Princeton became a national squash champion. In addition to national champions, over 50 individual athletes placed in the top ten or reached the quarterfinals of the national championship in their sport. Here's a season by season breakdown of 2002 in the Ivy League...

FALL, 2002

Princeton won yet another Ivy League field hockey championship in coach Beth Bozeman's final season, as both the Tigers and the Harvard Crimson advanced to the NCAA tournament. Princeton and Ivy player of the year Ilvy Friebe made it to the second round where they were eliminated by Penn State. The Dartmouth men and Columbia women took home Heptagonal Cross Country titles this year at Van Courtland Park. Yale senior Kate O'Neill began her stellar year with a second place run at the national championships.

In football, Harvard's Cart Morris took home Ivy player of the year honors after catching 90 passes for 1,288 yards, including 21 catches in a single game. In the league race, the Penn Quakers managed to snap Harvard's unbeaten streak and dethrone the Crimson for the Ivy title. Penn finished with a 7-0 league record, a No. 16 national ranking by the Sports Network and nine Ivy first-teamers. ESPN's College GameDay made a stop at Franklin Field, marking the road show's first trip to an NCAA Division I-AA venue in history.

Penn men's soccer went 5-1-1 in league play to win the Ivy championship, while advancing to the second round of the NCAA tournament. Goalies swept the awards as Quaker junior keeper Matt Haefner was named Ivy Player of the Year and Dartmouth goalie Doug Carr took home Rookie of the Year honors as a senior playing his first year of soccer. Women's soccer sent three teams to the NCAA tournament. League champion Princeton made an appearance, along with Yale and Dartmouth. Scoring leader Katy Cross of Penn was awarded player of the year.

After winning in a playoff the year before, Penn achieved their second straight Ivy championship by handling Yale. Harvard's Kaego Ogbechie was awarded player of the year. She was an All-Region selection as well along with Elisabeth Kwak-Hefferan of Penn.

WINTER, 2002-03

Penn men's basketball remembered last year's three-way tie for first place and was sure to leave nothing in question this season. The Quakers went undefeated in league play on their way to a near upset of Oklahoma State in the first round of the NCAA tournament. Two-time Ivy Player of the Year and AP All-American Ugonna Onyekwe had 30 points in that game. Brown made its first appearance in the NIT and its third post-season appearance ever, falling to Virginia.

With the help of Ivy Player of the Year Hana Peljto, Harvard was crowned champion in women's basketball. Peljto, an Academic All-American, led the League in scoring at 21.5 points per game on her way to her second player of the year honor. The Crimson fell to Kansas State in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

2003 was a big year for Ice Hockey as three Ivy teams advanced to the men's and women's Frozen Fours. The Harvard and Dartmouth women took second and third place respectively. The Crimson blew away Minnesota 6-1 in the series, but lost to Minnesota-Duluth in the finals. Harvard senior Jennifer Botterill became the first-ever repeat winner of the Patty Kazmaier Memorial Award, given to the nation's best women's hockey player. While Harvard bested Dartmouth in the NCAA Championships, the Big Green managed to take home the ECAC championship. The Cornell men's hockey team, led by sophomore goalie and Player of the Year David LeNeveu, advanced to the semi-finals before bowing out to New Hampshire, 3-2, in a nationally televised game.

Princeton's Sarah Fraumann was the meet's Outstanding Swimmer at the Ivy League Women's Swimming and Diving Championships. Fraumann won three events during the meet and helped the Tigers to their fourth title in a row.

The Harvard men won the Eastern Intercollegiate Swimming League Championships with the help of All-American 1650 meter freestyle specialist John Cole. Princeton established three meet records at the championships, while Harvard's Ricky Roy was named the meet's outstanding diver.

Columbia reigned supreme in men's and women's fencing, as the Lions placed 13 fencers on All-Ivy teams. The Lions men and women rolled to the Ivy title and placed fifth at the national tournament, led by Emma Baratta, who was fifth in the saber at nationals.

The Lions shared the Ivy title with Penn in men's fencing. Cory Werk of Yale was the highest men's finisher on the national stage, finishing third in the foil competition. Princeton University and Harvard University were also in the top 10 at the national tournament, finishing sixth and eighth respectively.

Women's squash had seven All-Americans in a season that saw Harvard claim the Ivy League title for the third straight year. Yale, however, advanced to the final match of the national championship by defeating both Princeton and Harvard before falling to Trinity in the final. Penn's Runo Reta was named player of the year after going 19-3 overall on the season.

Princeton won the Ivy men's squash title behind the performance national champion Yasser El-Halaby. A freshman, El-Halaby was matched up against rival Bernardo Samper of Trinity and rallied from 8-5 down in the first game to take a 10-8 win. In all, seven men earned All-American honors. Six of the eight Ivy League institutions (Princeton, Harvard, Yale, Cornell, Penn, and Dartmouth) finished in the top 10 national-

ly.

Indoor track and field saw the Cornell men and women sweep the Heptagonal titles. The women were led by sprinter Katy Jay, who was dethroned in the short sprints by Yale freshman Joslyn Woodard, but rebounded in the 400 meters for a key victory. Yale's Kate and Laura O'Neill ran the 5,000 meters at the national meet. Both earned All-America honors, Kate finishing second and Laura fifth. On the men's side, Dartmouth junior Mustafa Abdur-Rahim accounted for an astounding 25 of the Big Green's 60 points, but it wasn't enough to overcome champion Cornell, who edged Princeton for the title with a strong showing in the 4x400 meter relay. Sam Burley of Penn was the Ivy League story on the national stage, barely missing his first national 800 meter title and finishing second.

Cornell defeated Brown to capture the Ivy wrestling title. This year's star was the Big Red's Travis Lee, who claimed a national title in the 125 pound weight class. Lee became the Big Red's first national champion since David Hirsch won the 126-pound weight class in 1994. Princeton's Greg Parker, a two-time All-American and a two-time EIWA champion, finished his career for the Tigers.

SPRING, 2003

Three way ties were in style on the lacrosse front this season. Princeton, Dartmouth and Yale all finished 6-1 within League play in women's lacrosse. Princeton's Rachael Becker led her women's lacrosse team to yet another national championship, while winning nearly every conceivable award. The Ivy League Player of the Year, Becker was named the national tournament MVP and was awarded with an All-America selection, the Tewaaratron Trophy and the Honda Sports Award.

On the men's side, Princeton, Dartmouth and Cornell each finished the year 6-1 in Ivy play. Dartmouth and Princeton advanced to the NCAA tournament, both losing to Syracuse. The Big Green fell in the first round, while the Tigers were knocked off in the quarterfinals. Cornell's Ryan McClay took home Player of the Year honors for the Big Red.

In baseball, Penn's Andrew McCreery batted .408 and hit seven homers in League games, while Princeton won the Ivy League championship and advanced to the NCAA tournament. Seven players from the Ivy League were selected in the 2003 Major League Baseball Draft. One, Princeton's Thomas Pauly, went in the second round.

Melissa Finley earned Player of the Year honors in softball after leading Princeton to its second consecutive outright Ivy League Championship. The Tigers ended their season at 24-21-1 overall and 11-3 in the Ivy League. The Tigers made it to the NCAA regional for the fifth time in history.

Yale took home both the men's and women's Ivy golf titles this season. For the women, it was their second consecutive championship. In the NCAA tournament, the team shot a three-day score of 1,002.

The Yale men's golf team won going away this year at the Ridgewood (N.J.) Country Club over second place Penn. Yale's Neel Williams fell one stroke shy of being one of just six collegiate golfers to advance to the NCAA Championships as an at-large individual.

In tennis, Penn's Alice Pirsu advanced to the quarterfinals of the women's national tournament, while Columbia's Oscar Chow did the same on the men's side. Harvard took both Ivy titles, though, advancing to the NCAA team tournament. Brown also advanced to the team tournament on the men's side. The Harvard women upset number 16 Arizona before losing to top-ranked Stanford.

Men's track & field yielded four All-Americans at the NCAA Championships. Penn athletes Brian Chaput and Sam Burley won national titles. Chaput tossed the javelin 258-2 for a new Ivy League record, while Burley took home the title in the 800 meters. Dartmouth's Mustafa Abdur-Rahim moved up seven places from his 13th seed to finish sixth in the decathlon, while Harvard's Chris Lambert finished fourth in the 200 meters. It was Cornell, however, who took the outdoor Heptagonal championship for the first time since 1985. The Cornell women also won the outdoor title, as Katy Jay won both the 200 and 400 meter races. Yale's Kate and Laura O'Neill became the first two women in Ivy history to break the 33-minute barrier in the 10,000 meters at the NCAA Championships.

Harvard women's rowing took the national championship, beating out last year's winner, Brown. Princeton picked up its fifth straight title in the women's lightweight division. In all, Ivy League women's rowing placed six boats in Grand Finals. Harvard's men's heavyweight and lightweight eights each went on to open water victories in their respective

grand finals of the IRA National Championships.

Without a doubt, it was a great year for Ivy League athletics in 2002. The opening of the 2003 football season marks the beginning of what could be another banner year for the Ancient Eight. The season begins September 20th, so get ready, stay tuned and enjoy the ride...

2001-02 Year In Review

The 2001-02 season was yet another outstanding year for the Ivy League. In fact, it was such a great year that it concluded with the League finishing sixth in the Sears Directors Cup standings, behind only a handful of the nation's elite conferences and ahead of the perennial power Big East Conference.

The Princeton women's lacrosse team won the national title with their counterparts, the Tiger men's team, advancing to the national final. The men's basketball campaign saw the Ivy League move up in the RPI conference ratings fifteen spots, the largest jump in NCAA history. In addition, three Ivy League crews won national championships. The Brown women, Princeton lightweight women and Yale lightweight men all took home national rowing titles.

World-ranked fencer Sada Jacobson of Yale earned another national championship, besting competition in the women's sabre, while Princeton's Soren Thompson, the 2001 national men's epee champion, reached this year's national epee final. Princeton high jumper Tora Harris soared over 7-foot-7 at the Heptagonal Games, before going on to win his second national title and garnering a top five world ranking. Penn's Sam Burley and Princeton's Lauren Simmons were second-place finishers at the NCAA track championships.

In all, Ivy athletes earned mention on All-America teams one-hundred-seventy times and 14 were national Academic All-Americans. At the 2002 Winter Olympics in Salt Lake City, 14 past or present Ivy athletes took home gold or silver medals for their accomplishments. Here's a season-by-season rundown of 2001-02 in the Ivy League...

FALL, 2001

Princeton field hockey rolled to another 7-0 league record and an appearance in the third round of the NCAA tournament. The Tigers defeated Northwestern and Old Dominion before losing to Michigan. Princeton's Ivly Friebe set Ivy League records for goals and points in a season on her way to becoming Ivy player of the year (15 goals, 37 points in league play). Dartmouth won their second Heps cross country title in a row behind the strength of individual Heptagonal champion Tom McArdle. Six Heptagonal runners advanced to the NCAA Championships. Yale took the team title in women's cross country. Kate O'Neill was the first place finisher at the Heptagonal championships.

Harvard bested the competition in Ivy League football, winning the conference title with perfect league record, their first in 88 years. The Crimson's own, Carl Morris, was named player of the year after catching a school record 71 passes for 943 yards and 12 touchdowns. Several Ivy Leaguers were named as Division I-AA All-Americans. Princeton and Brown both went 5-1 on the year in men's soccer, tying for the Ivy championship. Princeton gained an automatic berth in the NCAA's through the tiebreaker. The Tigers' Mike Nugent earned player of the year honors with 12 goals and 6 assists. The Princeton, Penn and Dartmouth women's soccer teams finished tied for title at 5-1 this season, with Princeton winning the tiebreaker. Dartmouth went to the third round of the NCAA's before losing to Santa Clara. Harvard lost to UConn while Penn lost to Villanova in first round tournament action. Princeton advanced to round two before falling to Rutgers. Brown and Penn were both crowned co-Ivy champions in volleyball with Penn winning the playoff 3-1 (28-30, 30-25, 30-24, 30-13).

WINTER, 2001-02

After a hotly contested league schedule, the Penn, Yale and Princeton basketball teams finished in the first ever three way tie for the Ivy League title. Led by Ivy player of the year Ugonna Onyekwe, Penn won the NCAA berth in a round robin tournament and went on to the NCAAs where they lost to California in the first round. Princeton and Yale were invited to the NIT where the Tigers lost to Louisville in round one. Yale defeated Rutgers but lost to Tennessee Tech in the NIT second round. Harvard sophomore Hana Peljto was the player of the year in women's basketball, averaging 20.4 points per game and leading Harvard back to the NCAA tournament. The Crimson lost to the University of North Carolina in the first round. Brown advanced to the frozen four championship game in women's ice hockey, losing to Minnesota-Duluth 3-2. Although Brown had the best post-season run, Dartmouth was crowned league champion with an 8-2 record. Carly Haggard of Dartmouth and Kristy Zamora of Brown shared the league MVP honors.

Player of the year Doug Murray led his Cornell men's ice hockey team to this year's Ivy League championship. League rival Harvard avenged that loss, however, beating the Big Red in a thrilling 4-3 double overtime confrontation to win the ECAC championship and an automatic NCAA berth. Harvard lost to Maine in the NCAA first round while Cornell beat Quinnipiac and then lost to New Hampshire. Yale's Susan Cooke was named the outstanding swimmer as Princeton won the Ivy League Women's Swimming and Diving Championships. Several athletes competed and had top 20 finishes at the NCAA Swimming and Diving Championships later in the year. The Princeton men claimed the title at the Eastern Intercollegiate Swimming League Championships in impressive, come-from-behind fashion. Trailing Harvard after the first day, the Tigers bounced back to grab the title. John Cole of Harvard garnered two top ten finishes at the NCAAs, placing second in the 1650 meter freestyle and third in the 500 meter freestyle.

Columbia won their 28th Ivy title in men's fencing and first since 1992-1993. Princeton's Soren Thompson, the 2001 national men's epee champion, reached this year's epee final at the NCAA championships. Yale won their sixth overall women's fencing title. Sada Jacobson of Yale won her second straight national title. She went undefeated on the collegiate level and achieved a ranking of No. 1 in the world for women's under-20 saber. The host Cornell Big Red took home the Heptagonal title in Indoor Track and Field behind athlete of the meet, sprinter Katy Jay. Yale junior Kate O'Neill ran to the best overall finish by a heptagonal athlete at the NCAA Championships, crossing the line in ninth for the 3,000 meters. Princeton ran, jumped and threw their way to a fifth consecutive men's Indoor Track title. Seven-time heptagonal champion Tora Harris of Princeton won his first national title in the high jump (7-5). Dartmouth junior Tom McArdle finished seventh in the 5,000 meters at the NCAAs while Penn's Sam Burley finished seventh in the 800m. Led by wrestler of the year Yoshi Nakamura, Penn continued to dominate the wrestling scene, finishing with a perfect 5-0 record and winning their seventh straight title. In what could have been the year's big stunner, Princeton junior Greg Parker surprised

top-seeded Otto Olson of Michigan in the NCAA tournament to advance all the way into the national final.

SPRING, 2002

In Men's Lacrosse, Princeton finished runner-up in the national championship this season after taking the title last year. Ryan Boyle had 44 points (17g, 27a) to become the Ivy League player of the year as a sophomore. The Tigers also claimed their eighth straight Ivy League men's lacrosse championship. Nine Ivy members were named All-Americans including first team selection Ryan McClay of Cornell. Princeton and Cornell both competed in the NCAA women's tournament, Princeton coming home with the NCAA title. The Tiger's Lauren Simone, Rachel Becker and Theresa Sherry were named first team All-America. Jen Newitt (Dartmouth) and Jaimee Reynolds (Cornell) were also named on the first team. Pitcher of the year Ben Crockett and his Harvard squad, the Red Rolfe Division champion, defeated Princeton, the Gehrig Division champion, to win the Ivy Baseball title and secure a postseason berth. The Crimson lost in the elimination round of the NCAA tournament. Princeton won their first Ivy League softball title since the 1996 season, going 13-1 in league play. The Tigers finished their season with a loss in the NCAA tournament, bringing their record to 34-18.

In golf, Yale defeated defending champion Princeton to lock up their fourth women's title in six years. On the men's side, Princeton won this year's Ivy Golf championship by 13 strokes over second-place finisher Yale. It was Princeton's third straight Ivy championship. Both Brown and Harvard made appearances in the NCAA Men's Tennis Tournament this season. Brown, the Ivy League champion with a 7-0 conference record, was defeated by Ole Miss in the first round. Harvard advanced to round two before falling to Baylor 4-0. Alice Pirsu earned player of the year honors in Women's Tennis while leading Penn to the second round of the NCAA tournament, where they fell to Duke. She also became the first Penn player ever to be invited to the NCAA Tournament singles competition.

The Cornell women added an outdoor crown to the indoor track and field championship they had won in the fall. Once again, junior Katy Jay had a huge heptagonal meet for the Big Red, sweeping the two short sprints. In the men's heptagonal track meet, Penn and Princeton entered the 4x400m tied with 121 points apiece. After Princeton ran 3:11.73, the Quakers did them one better, running a meet record 3:10.37 to steal the heptagonal championship from the Tigers. Princeton's Tora Harris, however, provided yet another stunning highlight, soaring over the high jump bar at 7-7 to set a Heps record and a personal best. He would go on to become national champion, adding to his indoor crown. The Yale lightweight varsity eight men's crew was ranked No. 1 in the nation and undefeated for the spring. They captured the EARC Eastern Sprints title. Harvard captured the Ivy title with a second place finish behind Wisconsin in heavyweight crew. The Brown women captured a coveted national championship in Women's Rowing as well as this year's Eastern Sprints title. The Princeton women lightweights won their fourth national title with a win in the Grand Final over Wisconsin.
