THE following report from the Chairman of the Destitute
Poor Department, for the half-year ended 30th June,
1874, is published for general information.

Sir—I have the honor to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Governor, the report of the Destitute Poor Department for the half-year ending June 30, 1874.

The annexed returns indicate a continued, though slight, decrease in the number of persons relieved, under almost every item, with one marked exception, in an increase of nearly sixty adult inmates in the Asylum—the present number being 264 as compared with 205 on January 1st last.

This, however, does not indicate any increase of destitution proper, but has arisen entirely from the numbers of convalescent patients transferred to this institution from the

Hospital.

And as many, though discharged from the Hospital, still suffer from chronic complaints, they will probably remain in the Asylum as permanent inmates. It is owing to this that while 150 adult inmates left the Asylum during the last half year of 1873, only 109 could be dismissed during the six

months embraced by this report.

By this system the Destitute Asylum is practically made an auxiliary hospital; a large number of its inmates requiring so much medical supervision and care as to render it necessary forthwith to make other arrangements for their accommodation, not only because these convalescents occupy the majority of the beds in each department, but also because there is not the machinery requisite for their proper treatment in the present Asylum.

The Board, therefore, can only renew their former suggestion, made at the close of 1871, that a sanatorium or convalescent hospital should be established for the reception of all chronic and convalescent patients who may be discharged from the Hospital, but who still require frequent medical treatment, in which they may be able to receive the

needed medical attention and appliances.

If this is not deemed desirable, and if no action can be taken by the Hospital authorities to diminish the burden thus cast upon this institution, the Board feel that the time has arrived to ask for immediate extended accommodation in both the male and female quarters of the Destitute Asylum.

While, however, calling attention to this special item of increase it is to be noted that it is to be attributed to disease alone. And, apart from the cases which are thus transferred from the Hospital, it may be feared that no diminution is to be expected under this head. With the steady increase in the numbers of the community it may rather be expected that year by year there will be additional numbers who have reached a period in which their strength no longer enables them to provide for their own maintenance; and those whose improvidence or inability have prevented them from providing against this contingency, and who have no children who are bound to maintain them, must seek support from the funds provided by the public.

But it is satisfactory to be able to report that so far as can be learned the Board have not a single pauper under relief

who is competent to earn his own living.

The classified tables of our inmates show that (apart from female inmates who rank mainly under the heads of disease or infirmity) the adults are entirely composed of the aged and diseased; and of the children in the three schools 48 per cent. are sentenced as criminal and neglected children; the remainder, as seen in Table 7, being principally the offspring of vicious and abandoned parents; and of the 1860 relieved outside, 50 per cent. have been driven to seek relief through disease and infirmity, the remainder comprising widows and deserted families.

The number of Asylum inmates able to engage in even light employments is very small. These are employed, when commissions can be obtained, in bag and sackmaking,

Arrangements are also being made for the manufacture of bottle envelopes by such of the inmates as are found competent for the work.

The total sum obtained as reimbursements during the past half-year from relatives, &c., liable for maintenance, and paid into the Treasury, was £103 0s. 8d.; and also the sum realized through the labor of the Asylum inmates in sackmaking, &c., £16 0s. 9d.

Magill School.—While death has removed many of the aged Asylum inmates during the last six months, at the Magill School, notwithstanding the general prevalence of epidemics during so many months, the children have been

free from illness of any kind.

While a larger number of children have been placed out for adoption without payment than at any former period reported upon, the admissions have increased in an equal ratio, principally by committals, viz., 64 as against 47 in the previous six months; and these have still further increased since the date embraced by this report, nine having been admitted within the last three weeks.

The educational progress is quite as satisfactory as can be expected from the tender ages of the children now at the

school.

The dairy department in this institution has yielded a credit during the last six months of £70 11s. 7d., including the sale of four cows for £33.

Since the last report the Board have continued to receive through the different visitors, apart from the official inspections of the Chairman, ample confirmation of the success of the boarding-out system, both with respect to the comfort of the children and the kindly treatment and affection of the foster parents.

It may be noted, however, that the Board have been enabled to discontinue the practice of subsidizing, except in special cases, from having found upon inquiry so many persons who are willing to adopt children without payment.

Strict inquiries are made into the circumstances of each child, and Table No. 8 shows that with respect to 299 children at present placed out, 545 reports have been received during the past six months—one child only remaining unreported on, under circumstances in which reports should, according to regulations, have reached the Board; the abscondings and unsatistactory reports being, it is considered, very few in proportion to the total number under supervision.

In any general measure of this nature, however, it must be expected that some failures should occur, though happily these have been very few in comparison with the number of children placed. All that the Board can do is to guard against abuse by careful investigation into character before a child is placed out, and by periodical investigation after-

wards (through their Chairman and through the visitors of the Boarding-out Society) and also by a prompt inquiry into any complaints which may reach them and an immediate removal of the child in cases where the complaints appear to be well founded. And the Board take this opportunity of inviting information from all persons who may have reason to suspect any neglect or ill-treatment of any child, assuring those who may furnish that information that it shall receive prompt and careful attention.

But so far as the working is already known it is a great success and a great boon to the children themselves, in raising them out of a position of neglect and isolation to that of members of a family, and loved and treated as such by their foster parents. And it may be hoped that this system will have a far more extended bearing than on the immediate happiness of the children themselves. The three hundred already so advantageously settled should cause an eventually notable reduction not only in the pauperism of the Colony but also in the amount of crime which, under other circumstances, might have been expected to prevail.

Accounts have been opened at the Savings Bank for 36 children placed out at service since the date of the Act, and

for wages received from their employers.

Boys' Reformatory.—The boys at the Ilfracombe Reformatory, with some exceptions, have rewarded the care and attention that has been bestowed upon them. I believe, as a whole, they are well trained and efficiently educated for the positions they are designed to fill. Four have absconded, two of whom were arrested and returned to the school, and two have remained undiscovered until last week, when one also of these was apprehended and brought back. They have done good service in the industrial branches—the shoemaking department yielding a net profit of £62 18s. 7d. and the dairy acount of £11 1s. 3d. Ten pounds has also been paid into the Treasury as the profit of their bottle-envelope making.

In view of the expiration of the lease of the Ilfracombe premises in December next, the Board have urged upon the Government very strongly the desirableness of establishing a floating reformatory or hulk as the best and most economical mode of treating these boys, whether as regards safe

guardianship or effective training.

The Board have therefore suggested the purchase of a hulk of from 200 to 300 tons for this purpose, and trust that their recommendation will be adopted by the Government.

Girls' Reformatory.—The Girls' Reformatory is proving a good training school for servants, and the Board are increasingly satisfied with the genial, kindly influence and training that is brought to bear upon the inmates by the excellent matron and her assistants, as shown in the general improvement and altered conditions and bearing of the children while under these better auspices. They regret, however, that the effect of these beneficial influences is too often destroyed by re-contact with former influences and companions at the expiration of their sentence.

There can be but little hope that any improvement which may be caused in their reformation can be permanent unless the girls are sent there for a sufficient time to allow of the formation of better habits; and it is therefore of great importance that they should be committed to the Reformatory for the longest period allowed by the law, viz., until

sixteen years of age.

The Board would again acknowledge the kind interest which is manifested by the Committee of the Visiting Society, as well as by many ladies and gentlemen in visiting and in ministrations to the inmates both of the Destitute Asylum and the Schools; as also the kindness of those gentlemen and ladies who have gratuitously provided entertainments for the enjoyment of the inmates. The thanks of the Board are equally due to those gentlemen in various corporate towns and country districts who have devoted much time gratuitously to the management of local destitute matters.

7. When any alien friend, now residing in or who shall hereafter reside within the said Province, desires to be naturalized, if he be of good repute and if he take the oath prescribed in Schedule A hereto, the Governor may, if he think fit, grant to him, under the seal of the said Province, etters of naturalization, subject to such conditions (if any) as he may consider necessary or advisable.

Naturalization to extend to wife.

8. When any alien woman is married to any natural-born or naturalized subject of Her Majesty, such woman shall thereby become and be naturalized within the limits of the said Provence.

Mode of obtaining naturalization.

9. When any person desires to obtain naturalization under this Act,

9. When any person desires to obtain naturalization under this Act, he may present to the Governor in Council a memorial signed by himself and verified upon oath, stating his name, age, birth-place, residence, and occupation, the length of his residence in the said Province, and his desire to settle therein, and praying that letters of naturalization may be granted to him, and also a certificate signed by some Justice of the Peace to the effect that the applicant is known to him, and is, to the best of his belief and knowledge, a person of good repute.

Applicant to take oath of allegiance.

10. If the Governor in Council think fit to grant such letters, he shall direct the applicant to take the oath prescribed by this Act before some one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, or before a Commissioner for taking affidavits in the said Court, and upon the certificate of such Judge or Commissioner that the applicant has taken before him the said oath, he shall issue letters of naturalization accordingly, which letters of naturalization shall be in duplicate, and one part shall be deposited in the Registry Office of the said Province.

Schedule A referred to.

I do sincerely promise and swear that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, as lawful Sovereign of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of this Province of South Australia. So help me God.

GENERAL ORDER UNDER SECTION 57

GENERAL ORDER UNDER SECTION 57.

Construction of Slaughterhouses, Stables, Cowsheds, and Pigstyes.

[Section 57.]

1. The Local Board of Health for the said Town of Glenelg, in compliance with, and under the authority of the 57th section of "The Public Health Act, 1873," being No. 22 of 1873, do hereby order and require that, from and after the sixth day of August, 1874, all abbattoirs, slaughterhouses, and other premises used for the slaughtering of any cattle, sheep, or other animal, and all stables, cowyards, goatsheds, and cattlesheds within the limits of the said Town, shall be paved or flagged with slate, stone, or such other material as the said Local Board may approve, and shall be provided with such drains and receptacles for offal, dung, or other filth or refuse as the said Local Board may direct.

GENERAL ORDER UNDER SECTION 45.

Reservoirs for Refuse.
[Section 45.]

2. Every distillery, manufactory, brewery, slaughterhouse, and every establishment for the boiling or preserving of any animal matter shall

be provided with a cesspool or reservoir for the receipt and deposit of the refuse of such works, so far as the same is offensive or dangerous to health; and such cesspool or reservoir shall be periodically emptied of its contents, and (after being deodorized) shall be kept continuously inoffensive; and the said cesspool or reservoir shall be kept covered if so directed, and the contents thereof shall not be emptied or allowed to flow into any surface drain or fresh-water stream.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

Slaughterhouses and Abattoirs. [Sections 45, 57, and 59.]

3. The construction and arrangement of all abattoirs or slaughterhouses shall be subject to the approval of the Local Board, and the occupier of every slaughterhouse or place used for the purpose of having cattle or animals killed therein within the Town of Glenelg, shall cause such slaughterhouse or place to be kept in such a state in respect of cleanliness as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall cause the blood accumulated therein to be collected in a fit receptacle to be provided for that purpose, which receptacle shall be emptied of its contents at least once in every twenty-four hours. Before any blood shall br removed from any premises, as hereinbefore mentioned, the occupier of such premises shall cause to be mixed therewith some efficient de-odorizer, sufficient to effectually deodorize and disinfect the same.

Houses to have Privy Accommodation. [Sections 48 and 51.]

4. All houses shall have attached to them proper waterclosets, earthclosets, or privies, and the situation, dimensions, materials, and construction of every watercloset, earthcloset, privy, and cesspool, now existing or hereafter to be constructed, shall be subject to the approval of the Local Board; and no watercloset or privy shall be of less dimensions than four feet wide by five feet long by seven feet high, and an air-tube shall lead from the space beneath the seat and communicate with the external air above the roof; and also every watercloset or privy shall have an opening as near to the top as practicable commu-nicating with the external air of the area of at least one hundred superficial inches, or shall be otherwise furnished with sufficient means of ventilation to the satisfaction of the Local Board.

Privy Accommodation to Schools, Factories, Public Buildings, &c. [Section 53.]

5. The owner of every house or building within the Town of Glenelg, in which persons above twenty in number are gathered or employed, or are intended to be gathered or employed, shall construct and provide a sufficient number of waterclosets, earthclosets, or privies, for the use of such persons; and if the persons so gathered or intended to be gathered together in such house or building are of different sexes, then the owner shall construct and provide separate waterclosets, earthclosets, or privies, for the use of each sex.

Houses to have Drains.

[Section 50.]

6. All houses now erected or hereafter to be erected or rebuilt within the Town of Glenelg shall be provided with properly covered drains of glazed earthenware socket piping, or other materials to be approved of by the Local Board, and shall be constructed of approved of by the Local Board, and shall be constructed of such diameter and with such fall, and connected with such sewer or other place as may by such Local Board be required. And in default of such drains not being provided, the Local Board may, by notice in writing from any authorized officer, direct the owner or occupier of any such house to construct such a drain as they shall think necessary or require, or may cause such drain to be constructed at the expense of such owner or occupier.

Privies, Cesspools, Drains, &c. [Sections 47, 48, and 51.]

7. All drains whatsoever, and the waterclosets, earthclosets, privies, cesspools, and ashpits within the Town of Glenelg shall be so constructed and kept as not to be or become a nuisance, or injurious to health, and so that there shall be no overflow, or leakage therefrom; and no cesspool shall be hereafter constructed in the said Town of Glenelg unless the walls thereof below the surface of the ground around it be built of stone or concrete of the thickness, as respects stonework, of not less than twelve inches, and concrete of nine inches, and of the following clear dimensions, viz., five feet wide, three feet long, and four feet deep, with the walls continued at least six inches above the ground level, and so constructed that the said cesspool shall be in every respect watertight; and no privy or cesspool existing or constructed of the translation of the translation. erected after the date of this regulation coming into operation shall, unless constructed as hereinbefore provided, be suffered to remain in use

after six days' notice in writing from any authorized officer of the Local Board.

Earthclosets. Section 48

8. The occupier of every house, building, or other tenement within the Town of Glenelg where the privy or closet attached thereto shall not be provided with a cesspool constructed in accordance with the provisions of the preceding regulation, number seven, shall at all times cause to be kept in such privy or closet a supply of dry powdered earth, ashes, charcoal, or some other material efficient for deodorizing nightsoil, and shall cause all nightsoil which may be deposited in any box, pan, bucket, or other receptacle in such privy or closet to be immediately on the deposit thereof covered with a quantity of dry powdered earth or other deodorizing material as aforesaid sufficient to thoroughly and effectually deodorize the nightsoil.

Cleansing Privies, &c. [Section 48.]

9. In case any privy, watercloset, or cesspool within the Town of Gleneig shall be in an offensive state, so as to require cleansing or emptying, notice under the hand of the Sanitary Inspector or other authorized officer of the Local Board shall be given to the occupier or owner, or left at his place of abode or business, requiring such occupier or owner to cleanse or empty the same within a time to be therein named; and if such occupier or owner shall neglect or omit to comply with such notice, then, and in every such case, the occupier or owner to or with whom such notice shall have been given or left as aforesaid, shall, for every such neglect or omission, forfeit and pay such sum as shall be hereinafter provided; and the filth and soil of the said watercloset, privy, or cesspool may forthwith, after the expiration of such notice, be removed by the Sanitary Inspector, or other authorized officer of the Local Board, at the expense of said occupier or owner.

Cleansing and Use of Deodorizers for Privy Cesspools. [Section 59.]

10. The occupier or owner of every house, building, or tenement within the Town of Glenelg shall cause every privy cesspool thereon to be emptied and cleansed from time to time as soon as any portion of the contents of such cesspool shall have so accumulated therein as to be within a distance of six inches from the top of the walls of such cesspool: Provided that the contents of any cesspool or other receptacle shall not be removed or discharged therefrom except by some nightman duly authorized or licensed as such by the Local Board, and that the contents of any cesspool or other receptacle shall not be removed or discharged except between the hours of eleven o'clock at night and five o'clock in the morning; and, provided also, that the contents of any cesspool or other receptacle shall not be removed or discharged therefrom until such contents shall have had mixed therewith a sufficient quantity of some efficient deodorizer.

A shpits.

11. The situation, dimensions, materials, and construction of every ashpit shall be subject to the approval of the Local Board, and shall be of sufficient size to contain ashes and dry refuse likely to accumulate between the prescribed visits of the scavengers; and the floor thereof shall be paved with suitable stone, and the level of the floor shall not be below the surface of the ground or yard in which such ashpits are

Deposit of Rubbish, Manure, &c.

[Section 60.]

12. No person shall deposit or cause to be deposited in or by the side of any street, road, or right of way, or in any creek, river, or reservoir, or any unsold land or public place, or so as to cause a nuisance to any person, any soil, manure, blood, offal, rubbish, filth, or other offensive matter.

[Section 60.]

13. No person shall deposit or cause to be deposited on any field, farm, garden, or other land in his occupation or otherwise within the Town of Glenelg any night soil, blood, offal, or other offensive matter, unless the same shall be immediately covered over by the person depositing the same with earth to a sufficient depth, so as to prevent the escape of effluvium, and so as not to cause nuisance or offence either at the time of the deposit or afterwards.

Scavenging and Removal of House Refuse, where Public Scavengers are employed.

Section 59.1 14. The occupier of every house, building, or other tenement or premises within the Town of Glenelg shall cause to be provided and kept thereon a box or other specified receptacle, which shall be of such dimensions as that the same may, with the contents thereof when full, be readily and conveniently moveable by the public scavenger; and shall cause all dust, ashes, rubbish, or other house refuse produced or accumulated on any such premises, to be from time to time placed in such box or receptacle; and such box or receptacle shall be placed in such situations and at such specified times as the said Local Board shall hereafter determine for the convenient discharge and removal of the contents of said box or receptacle.

Removal of House Refuse where there are no Public Scavengers. [Sections 59 and 60.]

16. The occupier of any house, building, or other tenement or premises within the Town of Glenelg shall cause the yard and ground adjacent or belonging thereto to be kept in a cleanly condition, and so as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health; and shall cause all ashes, subbish, filth, or other such refuse matter produced or accumulated on Auch premises to be collected in one place in such yard or ground, and to be there kept in an inoffensive condition, and so that the same shall not be productive of any nuisance, and shall cause all such refuse matter so sollected to be from time to time removed from such yard, ground, or premises whenever it amounts to one cubic yard; and if at any time the occupier, of any premises shall neglect or fail to have such rubbish or refure matter so removed as aforesaid, the Local Board of the said Town of Glenelg shall cause the same to be removed at the expense of the occupier or owner. Nothing in this regulation shall be construed or taken to prevent the occupier or owner of any premises from causing any manure, ashes, or other refuse matter as aforesaid produced or accumulated thereon to be kept for the purpose of being used for manure on any garden, or on any land contiguous to such premises, provided such manure, ashes, or other refuse matter shall be so kept as not to be a nuis nee or injurious to health.

Stables, Cowsheds, Goatsheds, or Pigsties. [Sections 57 and 59.]

16. The occupier or owner of any land within the Town of Glenelg on which there shall be erected any stable, cowyard, cattleshed, goat-shed or pigsty shall cause such premises to be kept in such a state, in respect of cleanliness, as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health; and shall cause all dung, soil, or other manure produced or accumulated ther on, to be collected in one place in the yard of such premises, and to be the ere kept in an inoffensive condition, and so as not to be productive of wy nuisance; and such dung, soil, or other manure shall be removed from such premises by such occupier or owner whenever it amounts to two pubic yards. Nothing in this regulation shall be construed or taken to prevent the occupier of any such premises as aforesaid from causing the Jung, soil, or other manure produced or accumulated thereon to be such as manure on any garden or land in his occupancy, provided that such dung, soil, or other manure shall be so kept as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health.

Stagnant Water in Cellars, &c. [Section 49.]

17. No person shall suffer or permit any waste or stagnant water to rems in in any cellar, yard, or premises, or about any dwelling-house of which he is the owner, occupier, or agent, or over which he has the chief care or control, within the Town of Glenelg after notice from the Local Board of Health or any duly authorised officer of the said Local Board, has been served upon him directing him to abate and remove the same.

Private Passages, Yards, Ways, and Premises.

[Sections 56 and 58.]

18. All private passages, yards, ways, and other premises within the said Town of Glenelg shall be kept in such a state in respect of cleanlines; as not to be a nuisance or injurious to health, and shall be levelled, paved, or drained in such manner as the Local Board of Health may require; and no accumulation of manure, dung, soil, or other offensive matter shall be allowed to remain in such places as above.

Ventilation of Buildings, &c.

[Sections 44 and 55.]

Sections 44 and 55.]

Every building in the Town of Glenelg used for public meetings, whether for worship, business, entertainment, or amusement, and every church, school, theatre, assembly-hall, concert-hall, manufactory, or place used for carrying on any business, or any such like structure, and every room in any dwelling-house not having a fireplace therein, shall be provided with air-flues and gratings, or special means of centilation, subject, however, to such directions or modifications as may be found necessary upon the inspection of such structure by or on behalf of We Local Board of Health.

[Cleansing and Whitewashing.

[Section 46.] 20. The Board of Health for the Town of Glenelg, may, proper representation made to them that any building for outbuilding requires cleansing or whitewashing, direct and give orders that the same shall be done within a time to be specified, and in default thereof, shall direct such whitewashing or purifying to be done at the expense of the occupant or owner of such building or outbuilding as aforesaid.

As to overcrowding in Houses, &c.

[Section 54.] 21. No keeper of any lodging-house or occupier of any house or building within the Town of Glenelg shall receive in such house, or in any room thereof, so great a number of lodgers or other persons as shall be dangerous and prejudicial to the health of the inmates or inhabitants; and every keeper of a lodging-house shall provide not less than 400 cubic feet of sleeping space for every lodger or inmate, or if no fireplace is attached to the sleeping room, not less than 500 cubic feet each.

Places of deposit for Filth.

[Section 60.]
22. The Local Board of Health for the said Town of Glenelg shall from time to time appoint or provide convenient places for the deposit of nightsoil, dung, dirt, ashqs, filth, dust, and rubbish collected and removed under the authority of the "Public Health Act, 1873," and for the keeping all cattle, carts, vessels, implements, and other things required for the above or any purposes of the said Act.

Sale of unwholesome Food.

Section 61.]

23. The Local Board of Health for the said Town of Glenelg or any officer deputed by them, may, at all reasonable times, enter into any butcher's, poulterer's, or fishmonger's shop, or any abattoir or slaughterhouse, or any place kept for the sale of food for human consumption for the purpose of inspecting any carcase, provisions, or articles of food offered or exposed for sale; and if such shall be found unfit for food may seize the same, as provided by the 61st Section of the Public Health Act.

Penalty for breach of Regulations.

[Section 30.]

24. Every person guilty of any breach of any of the provisions of the foregoing regulations shall be liable for any such offence to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds nor less than five shillings.
