PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG,
 Knight, Lieutenant-Governor of Her Majesty's Province of South Australia,
 (L.S.)
 H. E. F. Young. and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Ordinance of the Lieutenant-Governor of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council, intituled an Ordinance "To establish the Legislative Council of South Australia and to provide for the election of Members to serve in the same," it is amongst other things enacted, that for each of the Electoral Districts of the said Province, there shall be a polling place within the City of Adelaide, and for each Electoral District there shall be within such District such other polling places as shall be declared by any Proclamation to be issued by the Governor fourteen days at least before the day of any Election: And whereas John Hart, Esquire, late member for the Electoral District of Victoria; George Hall, Esquire, late member for the Electoral District of Port Adelaide; and Charles Harvey Bagot, Esquire, late member for the Electoral District of Light, have severally resigned their seats as members of the Legislative Council of the Province, and it hath been established to the satisfaction of me, the Lieutenant-Governor, that the places of the said members have become vacant, and that it is requisite that writs should issue for the election of members of the Legislative Council to serve in the places so vacated during the remainder of the continuance of the present Council, and no longer, and to that intent it is necessary to declare polling places for the several Electoral Districts of Victoria, Port Adelaide, and Light: Now, I, the Lieutenant-Governor, do declare and proclaim that the polling places for the said several Electoral Districts shall be as follows, that is to say:—

That for the District of Port Adelaide the polling places within the said Electoral District shall be at Calton's Hotel, Port Adelaide, and at the Black Lion, Hindmarsh, both in the County of Adelaide; and that the chief polling place shall be at Calton's Hotel, Port Adelaide aforesaid.

That for the District of Victoria the polling places within the said last mentioned Electoral District shall be at Robe Town, in the County of Robe, and at Wellington and Tungkillo, in the County of Sturt; and that the chief polling place shall be at Robe Town aforesaid.

That for the District of Light the polling places within the said last mentioned Electoral District shall be at Kapunda, in the County of Light, and at Moorundee, in the County of Eyre; and that the chief polling place shall be at Kapunda aforesaid.

That for the said above-mentioned Electoral Districts of Port Adelaide, Victoria, and Light, the polling

places within the City of Adelaide shall be at the Freemasons Tavern, Pirie-street, in the City of Adelaide, in the Province aforesaid.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Province of South Australia, intituled "An Act to appoint District Councils, and to define the powers thereof," it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, by Proclamation in the *South Australian Government Gazette*, to designate and constitute Districts, and to define the boundaries thereof: And whereas such petition duly signed as by the said Act is required hath been presented to me, the said Lieutenant-Governor, praying that such Proclamation may issue in respect of the district hereinafter defined, and the same petition hath been duly published in the *South Australian Government Gazette*: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, by this my Proclamation, designate and constitute the "District of West Torrens" to be a District within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act: And I do hereby define the boundaries of such District as follows, that is to say—On the east by the west boundary of the Park Lands; on the west by the sea; on the north by the centre of the River Torrens and the northern boundary of the Hundred of Adelaide; on the south by the centre of the Bay Road, from the south-west angle of the Park Lands to the sea at Holdfast Bay. And I do hereby appoint Messrs. George Dew, John Foreman, A. H. Davis, C. S. Hare, and John Hector to be the first Council for the said District.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by a Proclamation by His Excellency George Grey, Esquire, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Province of South Australia, dated the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and forty-two, and published in the *South Australian Government Gazette* of the second day of June, in the same year, the said Governor, by virtue of the powers and authorities vested in him by certain Acts of the Governor and the Legislative Council of the said Province, did constitute the several divisions thereafter described as Counties of the Province aforesaid, and amongst others the County of Hindmarsh: And whereas by a certain other Proclamation, by His Excellency Frederick Holt Robe, Esquire, Lieutenant-Governor of the said Province of South Australia, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and forty-seven, and published in the *South Australian Government Gazette* of the ninth day of December, in the year aforesaid, the said Governor did constitute the several settled portions thereafter described as Hundreds, and amongst others the Hundred of Kanmantoo: And whereas the boundaries of the said County of Hindmarsh and the Hundred of Kanmantoo, respectively set forth in the above-recited Proclamations, were vaguely described and inaccurately defined: Now, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, in name and on behalf of Her Most Gracious Majesty, by virtue of the powers and authorities to me confided, do, by this my Proclamation, declare that the names, descriptions, and boundaries of the said County of Hindmarsh and Hundred of Kanmantoo, given and contained in the said above-recited Proclamations, are, and I do hereby declare the same to be rescinded and annulled; and, in the room and place thereof, I do hereby proclaim the names, descriptions, and boundaries of the County of Hindmarsh and Hundred of Kanmantoo shall be as follows, that is to say:—

COUNTY OF HINDMARSH

As the County of Hindmarsh, the country bounded as follows:—From the termination of the main range in St. Vincent's Gulf below Mount Terrible, by the coast line to the south, round Cape Jervis to the sea outlet of the Murray; thence, by the south east shore of Mundoo Island, in Lake Alexandrina, to Point Sturt, on the northern shore of the lake; thence, by a direct line across the lake to the mouth of the Bremer; thence northerly, along the centre of the said river to its junction with the Mount Barker Creek; thence, along the centre of the said creek to a point in section 4487, Hundred of Strathalbyn, opposite a spur running easterly through section 2205; thence, by the said spur through sections 2205, 2204, and 5016, to Mount

Barker Trigonometrical Station; thence north-westerly, by the main range passing through the following sections, 3834, 3831, 3839, 3828, 4500, 4501, 4499, 4432, 4431; thence by the north-eastern side of the road between sections 5298, 4417, 4415, and 5300, 5302, 5303, 5304; thence, through the south-west of 5212, and by the north-east side of the road north of 4411, to opposite its north corner, continuing southerly along the eastern range to Mount Magnificent; thence, by a course about north-west to the top of the Willunga range, where it is crossed by the southern road, and following the ridge to the sea below Mount Terrible.

HUNDRED OF KANMANTOO.

Commencing at a point where the boundary between the Counties of Adelaide and Hindmarsh meets the County of Sturt; thence, in a northerly direction, along the boundary between the Counties of Adelaide and Sturt, to the point where the boundary between the Hundreds of Onkaparinga and Talunga (in the County of Adelaide) meets the boundary of the County of Sturt; thence, in a straight line, to Mount Bevor; thence, in a southerly direction, to the north-east angle of section No. 1789 (on the Bremer); thence, along the east and south boundary of that section, to the River Bremer; thence, by the River Bremer, to its junction with the Mount Barker Creek; thence, by the boundary of the Counties of Hindmarsh and Sturt, to Mount Barker Trigonometrical Station, and along the aforesaid boundary to the point of commencement.

IN pursuance of the authority in me vested by a certain Ordinance enacted by the Governor of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, No. 11 of 1849, intituled "An Ordinance to constitute a Municipal Corporation for the City of Adelaide," I do hereby, with the advice of the Executive Council, proclaim that the provisions of the said Ordinance, with such modifications as are hereinafter contained, shall be extended to the villages of Kensington, Norwood, and Marryattville. And that from and after the date of this Proclamation the inhabitants of the said villages, and their successors, inhabitants of the same, shall be and are hereby consti-

tuted a body corporate and politic, by the name of the Mayor, Alderman, Councillors, and Burgesses of the Town of Kensington and Norwood: And further that the boundaries of the said Town shall be—on the west, the eastern side of preliminary section 255 and the western side of preliminary section 290; on the north, the northern sides of preliminary sections 260, 277, and 289; on the east, the western side of preliminary sections 288, 300, and 299; on the south, the southern sides of preliminary sections 261, 276, and 290—all the Provincial Survey marked with the letter B: And further that the said town shall be divided into three wards, to be called respectively West Norwood Ward, East Norwood Ward, and Kensington Ward: And that West Norwood Ward shall comprise sections 260 and 261, and the Government road between those sections and section 255; East Norwood Ward shall comprise sections 276 and 277, and the Government road between those sections and sections 288 and 289; and Kensington Ward shall comprise sections 289 and 290: And that there shall be three Councillors elected, as in the said Act of Council is directed for each of the said several wards: That whenever the said Act contains the word "City" and the word "Citizen," the same shall be read and understood to mean respectively, "Town" and "Burgess."

To His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG, Knight, Lieutenant-Governor of South Australia, &c., &c.

The memorial of the undersigned owners and occupiers of land in and adjacent to Highercombe, within the said Province, sheweth—

That your memorialists desire to avail themselves of the privileges and advantages to be derived from the District Councils Act.

They therefore pray that a district be constituted for the purposes of the said Act, to be known and designated as the "District of Highercombe," and to be bounded as follows, that is to say:—On the south by the divisional line of sections No. 508 and 509 on the Torrens, following the divisional line between sections No. 504 and 507 to the Dry Creek; thence through section 1506, continuing the line through the several sections on to and dividing the two sections known as the Government Reserve; thence north to the sectional road, continuing the line to the Para, following the Para and the remainder of the boundary line of Yatala, as laid down in the survey.

And they also recommend for your Excellency's approval the following persons to be District Councillors:—Joseph Ind, Little Paradise; Robert Milne, Dry Creek; George McEwin, Glen Ewin; John Gollop, Highercombe; and Henry Klapper, Hope Valley.

And they further pray that your Excellency will cause the necessary publication to be made in the *South Australian Government Gazette*, and will be graciously pleased to declare and constitute the said district, and appoint the above-mentioned persons to be the first Councillors.

DISTRICT COUNCIL FOR CLARE.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor directs the publication of the following memorial relative to a District Council for Clare.

To His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG, Knight, Lieutenant-Governor of South Australia, &c., &c.

The memorial of the undersigned inhabitants and rate-payers of the Hundreds of Clare and Upper Wakefield, respectfully sheweth:—

That at a meeting held at Clare, on the sixth of May, a memorial to your Excellency was adopted, praying that the Hundreds of Clare and Upper Wakefield be constituted one District, for the purpose of bringing them under the operation of the District Councils Act; and that E. B. Gleeson and William Slater, Esquires, Dr. Webb, Anton Sotolowsky, and Patrick Butler, be the first District Council.

That the said meeting was convened at an extreme point of the District, and was insufficiently advertised, so that the majority of the ratepayers were unaware that it was to be held, and were consequently precluded from attending to take part in the discussion of a question so deeply affecting the interests of them all.

That a considerable number of the names attached to the memorial, are those of persons who have no rateable property

in the Hundreds, and of others who are opposed to bringing the Act into operation in the District, but signed the memorial in ignorance of its purport.

That in the opinion of your memorialists, from the scanty population of the District and the comparatively small amount of property invested in it, it would be premature to bring these Hundreds under the operation of the Act.

That there are no important by-roads in the District in want of immediate repair, and no other work of importance requiring the attention of a District Council.

That under these circumstances, your memorialists respectfully request that your Excellency will reject the memorial previously alluded to, and defer to some future period bringing the Hundreds of Clare and Upper Wakefield under the operation of the District Councils Act.

The memorial of the undersigned inhabitants of the District of Encounter Bay, respectfully sheweth—

That your memorialists being two-fifths of the rateable inhabitants of the aforesaid District, are desirous that the said District should be proclaimed a District, and a District Council be constituted therein, for the purposes of Act No. 16, of 1852; and that the said District be designated the District of Encounter Bay, including the Hundreds of Encounter Bay, Goolwa and Nkangkita; and also that part of Waitpinga included within a north and south line, running from a point on the sea coast, six miles west of Rosetta Head.

Your memorialists pray that in terms of the second clause of the said Act, your Excellency will be pleased to appoint the Rev. Ridgeway William Newland, Messrs. Arthur Fidell Lindsay, Thomas Walker Higgins, James Chibnall, and Buxton Forbes Laurie, to be the first District Council.
