WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Province of South Australia, intituled "An Act to appoint District Councils, and to define the powers thereof," it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, by Proclamation in the *South Australian Government Gazette*, to designate and constitute Districts, and to define the boundaries thereof: And whereas such petition duly signed as by the said Act is required hath been presented to me, the said Lieutenant-Governor, praying that such Proclamation may issue in respect of the district hereinafter defined, and the same petition hath been duly published in the *South Australian Government Gazette*: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, by this my Proclamation, designate and constitute the "District of East Torrens" to be a District within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act: And I do hereby define the boundaries of such district as follows, that is to say—Bounded on the south by the Great Eastern Road, commencing at the point of intersection of the north side of said road with the south boundary of the Park Lands, and continuing by the said road to the southern corner of Section 1136; thence northerly along the southern boundaries of 1136

and 48 to the east angle of Section 48, thence by as direct a line as practicable to the south-east angle of Section 34, thence by the east boundaries of 34 and 35 to the northern angle of the latter Section; thence by as straight a line as practicable to the Stringy-bark Trigonometrical Station, thence by Hundred boundary between Talunga and Onkaparinga to the point of intersection with the River Torrens; thence westerly by the centre of the River Torrens to its intersection with the eastern boundary of the Park Lands; thence southerly, by the eastern boundary of the Park Lands, to their south-east angle; thence westerly, by the south boundary of the Park Lands, to the point of commencement, always excepting Preliminary Sections 260, 261, 277, 276, and the roads on their east and west sides, and preliminary Sections 289 and 290, which are not included in the District of East Torrens. And I do hereby appoint James Cobbledick, Daniel Ferguson, George Muller, Charles Bonney, and David Wark, to be the first Council for the said District.

WHEREAS by an Act of the Governor and Legislative Council of the Province of South Australia, intituled "An Act to appoint District Councils, and to define the powers thereof," it was amongst other things enacted, that it should be lawful for the Governor, by Proclamation in the *South Australian Government Gazette*, to designate and constitute Districts and to define the boundaries thereof: And whereas such petition duly signed as by the said Act is required hath been presented to me, the said Lieutenant-Governor, praying that such Proclamation may issue in respect of the District hereinafter defined, and the same petition hath been duly published in the *South Australian Government Gazette*: Now, therefore, I, the Lieutenant-Governor aforesaid, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, do hereby, by this my Proclamation, designate and constitute the "District of Hindmarsh" to be a District within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act: And I do hereby define the boundaries of such District as follows, that is to say—Commencing at the point of intersection of the River Torrens with the west boundary of the Park Lands; thence westerly, by the southern boundary of the Hundred of Yatala, to the sea coast; thence northerly, by the sea coast, to the north-west angle of Section 1006; thence easterly, along the north boundary of same section, to the Port Adelaide Creek; thence northerly, along centre of said creek, to the north angle of Section 926; thence south-easterly, by the southern side of the old Port Road, to its intersection with the Port Road; thence across the said road and north-westerly by the south-west side of Section 420; thence by the north-west side of same section; thence crossing the road to the south-west angle of Section 421; thence, by the west side of Section 421, to its north-west angle; thence the north-eastern boundary of the District is formed by the north and east sides of Sections 421 and 420; thence by the east side of 2071, the north and east sides of 2070, 411, 2069, and 396,

the east side of 2068, the north and east of 2067 and 374, and the east side of 2066 to its southern angle; thence crossing the road to the north side of 354; thence south-easterly, by the north-east side of 354 produced till it meets the west boundary of the Park Lands; thence southerly by the same west boundary to the point of commencement. And I do hereby appoint Thomas Magarey, James Gibson, John Ready, John Packham, and Robert R. Torrens, to be the first Council for the said District.

Police Commissioner's Office, May 23, 1853.

Sir—I have the honor to forward for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor the Police Report of occurrences for the quarter ended 31st March, 1853.

Probably it may not be out of place here to observe that, agreeably to His Excellency's wishes, I left Adelaide on the 28th February last, for the purpose of making a tour of inspection of all the police stations in the south-eastern and northern districts of the Province—a special report of my proceedings I had the honor of forwarding at various intervals; in accomplishing this duty I have travelled on horseback a distance of between 1,800 and 1,900 miles, hence the delay which has unavoidably arisen in the transmission of the present report.

The above table differs from that of the preceding quarter, inasmuch as the strength of the Gold Escort is omitted. A separate report of this establishment will in future be prepared, in compliance with His Excellency's commands.

Consequent upon the discovery of the gold fields in the adjoining Colony, the dismissals and resignations have been so frequent that it has been almost impossible to carry on the duties; but, notwithstanding, I have persevered in enforcing a high standard of conduct, and doubt not, if properly supported by my officers, I shall, ere long, succeed in bringing the force to its wonted state of efficiency.

On reference to the above return it will be seen that there are several vacancies in both divisions of the force; in explaining the reason why these have not been immediately filled as they occurred, I beg to observe that although there are at present no lack of applicants from persons desirous of joining the force, still out of the numerous candidates (specially for the Metropolitan Police) not more than one in three possess strength equal to the work. Those who merely observe a policeman quietly walking along his beat would hardly imagine the exceedingly laborious nature of his duty.

In the nature of an experiment by which I might feel my way to a sounder system, I selected some months back, two or three of the most efficient men of the Metropolitan Division to act as a Detective Force. I have now to state, that the results have been successful; several of the worse characters in the City and environs have thereby been brought to justice, and gangs broken up and hunted out of the Colony. I do myself the honor to submit, therefore, the expediency of placing a sum on the Estimates for the ensuing year, especially for this service. Should His Excellency approve of such a measure, I would respectfully beg to recommend that the detective branch should consist of two serjeants and six constables, who should be selected out of the whole force for this peculiar business, and be exempt from all regular duty; enabling them thereby to employ their time wholly in the actual pursuit of criminals, or in obtaining information as to facilities for the commission of particular offences, and the haunts and habits of the offenders. In this art depends much upon individual qualifications, sagacity in drawing inferences from slight things, fertility of resource, a blood hound tenacity of pursuit, intimate acquaintance with the habits of thieves, and their probable mode of acting in particular circumstances, and in the knack of making a cast in the right direction in search of a clue.

Next to a "Detective Force," I deem it most important to recommend for his Excellency's consideration, the establishment of a Water Police—to consist of one serjeant or coxswain; and five pulling hands as constables; the duties which would devolve upon them would be to watch the river and shipping, and to land refractory seamen from on board vessels, or to ship others whose time of servitude in gaol had expired—to serve summonses, execute warrants, and render aid to their colleagues on shore in case of need. In order to enable them to perform these duties with efficiency, they should be provided with a whale boat duly equipped, as best suited to board vessels outside the bar, at all times.

The above schedule exhibits how and where the whole of the police force of this Province are distributed. Three fresh stations have been established during the quarter, viz.—at Port Ferguson, Port Wakefield in the north, and at Port Elliot in the south. It has been deemed expedient likewise to strengthen others by the addition of a few men.

If it be considered the vast extent of country over which these men are disseminated, and the great distance from head quarters of many of the stations, it becomes necessary to suggest a scheme for the better supervision of them. To that end, I would therefore beg to submit for His Excellency's consideration, that the Province should be divided into four divisions, viz.—Northern, Southern, Western, and Adelaide Division. In each of the three former there should reside an Inspector, who would have the entire control of the stations and men therein posted, and be responsible to the Commissioner for the due performance of their duties.

In the event of any important occurrence happening at an out-post in the division, it would be the duty of the officer in charge to make known the particulars of the circumstance to the Inspector, whose duty it would then be to convey the intelligence to the head of the department. They would of course be required to visit the stations under their command frequently, and these again would be periodically inspected by either the senior Inspector stationed in Adelaide, or the Commissioner himself.

There is an increase of seven cases of felony during the quarter as compared with the preceding one. Among these, I have with much regret to record some of the most serious kind which can be perpetrated; the case of William Wright in particular, is one committed under circumstances the most revolting. The fearful tragedy occurred at Wellington, at the crossing place of the river Murray. It appears from the evidence which was adduced at the trial, that the murderer and his victim were journeying together to the Victoria Diggings; after drinking in company at the public house the latter discovered that he had been robbed, and taxed the former with it; thereupon the accused, who had an open bowie knife in his hand at the moment, deliberately plunged it into his throat, causing almost instantaneous death.

The wretched culprit has since been tried and found guilty, and suffered the extreme penalty of the law on 12th March last.

The next case which appears in the return under review, is that against Henry Hunt, Thomas Whitham, Sarah Kelly, and Ann Lynam. A lengthy investigation took place before G. Stevenson, Esq., the Coroner, which went to prove that all the above persons were more or less engaged in a riot, which took place at Port Adelaide, on the 19th of March last; they were subsequently committed upon the capital charge, but have since been acquitted.

With reference to the robbery of fifty-four sheep, reported to have been committed by the natives at Port Ferguson, I beg to state that I specially noted it in my report under date 24th April last, when in that locality. I trust that the distribution of flour and meat to the blacks, which is now made with regularity by the police at the newly-established station there, will deter them from committing further aggressions. On the whole, it affords me pleasure to report, that the conduct of the aborigines in the various districts of the Province has been satisfactory.

This return comprises all persons taken into custody during the quarter. On an analysis of the same return for the quarter ended 31st December, 1852, the number of apprehensions as shewn is greater by 122 than was reported in the preceding. It will be observed that a considerable increase again occurs during the quarter under consideration, namely, fifty-nine, the total being 483. Among these, I would observe, that six females have been apprehended on charges of larceny. As it becomes absolutely necessary for the ends of justice that when females are brought to the station, they should be immediately and carefully searched, I have the honor to suggest the expediency of a female searcher being attached to the Police Department. The person so appointed should reside as near the Station-house as possible in order to be available at all times when required: this unpleasant office has hitherto been performed by the apprehending constable.

In order to satisfy myself of the individual services rendered by every member of the police force, I am furnished with a nominal return of each constable, showing the number of persons taken into custody during the quarter, and designating the charge upon which he has been arrested. On reference thereto, I find that out of the 483 apprehensions, as exhibited by the above schedule, no less than 54 have been brought to justice by Serjeants Gard, Thompson, and Miller, and 86 by Police Constables Haggerty, Duffy, Vowles, and Clarke; thus, should His Excellency please to assent to the suggestion made by me in my communication of the 13th instant, relating to the future appropriation of fines, I shall be enabled at one glance to judge of those most deserving of reward.

HIS Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor directs the publication of the following Report from the Protector of Aborigines for general information.

By His Excellency's command,

B. T. FINNISS,

Colonial Secretary.

Native School, 24th May, 1853.

Sir—I have the honor to forward, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, my Report upon the Aborigines Department for the Quarter ended 31st March. The want of opportunities for forwarding the returns from the remote outstations has caused the Report to be delayed until the present date.

1. There have been no natives residing in Adelaide during the quarter; the Murray tribes were either in their own district, fishing, or in the suburban villages, engaged as occasional laborers. In January and February a group was residing at Kensington; but there were several, whose habits of intemperance were such, as sometimes to alarm the European females in the neighborhood. I visited them in company with the police, ascertained from what house they procured the liquors, but failed in procuring sufficient evidence to secure a conviction. There have been two charged before the Police Magistrate with drunkenness.

2. *Yorke's Peninsula*.—I have received no intelligence from this district of an unpleasant nature.

3. *Northern Districts*.—On the 10th January, a native named Berea committed an assault upon Mr. John Williams, a respectable settler to the east of Mount Arden. Berea was charged with the offence and committed for trial. Mr. Cudmore, who is located on the eastern side of Flinders Range, has suffered several losses of sheep from his flocks; he attempted to capture the culprits, but they were in the hills and repelled him by stones thrown from the heights.

4. In my last report upon the Northern Districts, I stated, that the settlers had many complaints to make of the natives taking away sheep; but plans were in progress which would, I hoped, be effectual in bringing the two populations together, and in establishing a friendly feeling.

5. These plans have been put into operation. On the 1st day of February, a feeding station was commenced near Mount Brown, under the charge of Mr. H. P. Minchin, as Sub-Protector of the natives, and two police-constables; with instructions to supply every adult native with half-pound of flour and half-pound of meat per diem, and half these quantities to children under twelve years of age. His aim will be to induce the wild natives from the hills to live at his station, and by keeping them some time in contact with himself and the police, so far civilize them, as to render them not only harmless but useful to the settlers.

6. *Moorundee*.—On the 28th February, Sub-Protector Scott states, "That no crimes of a serious nature have been committed by the aborigines within this district. A few months since, some natives stole a quantity of flour from Mr. Chapman, who resides at Paringa, near the boundary of the Colony. As yet I have not been enabled to punish them for the offence, but I will not fail to do so the first opportunity."

7. "One hundred and one natives have received flour at the general issues during the last quarter, and the wants of sick aborigines are always attended to when they apply to me for relief."

8. "I have further the honor to state, that in accordance with the instructions of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, conveyed to me in a letter from the Colonial Secretary, bearing date 23rd December, 1852, that I have selected and appointed six aborigines to act as constables, but up to the present time I have been unable to purchase suitable horses for their use, except at exorbitant prices—consequently, in a recent journey to the several stations in this district, I was unable to avail myself of their services. In the course of a month or two, I anticipate that horses will be sold at a reasonable rate; in the meantime I shall be compelled to purchase two, in order that the business of the station may be carried on."

9. "Trusting that the delay in not carrying out the instructions contained in the Colonial Secretary's letter relative to this subject, may not meet with the disapproval of His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor."

10. *Wellington*.—On the 10th day of March, Sub-Protector Mason states, "The only complaints I have heard against the natives of this district during the past quarter, have been from Mr. Potts, a settler residing on Langhorne's Creek, who states, that he has had his field plundered three times of potatoes and melons, and the last time in considerable quantities; but I am sorry to say that Mr. Potts could not succeed in detecting the guilty natives, the depredations having been committed during the night. About the time these robberies took place, there was a number of strange natives from the Coorong and other distant parts, assembled at a short distance from the residence of Mr. Potts, for the purpose of fighting or

settling disputes between distant tribes; and when these meetings take place near such a temptation as a potatoe or melon field, I am afraid natives will steal. If the orders, requiring the police to interfere and disperse the natives when they assemble for the purpose of fighting, were again strictly enforced, it would prevent many of those petty robberies taking place.

11. "The natives employed by the settlers during the last harvest in reaping have returned with a good supply of clothing, blankets, and money. I have never known them to be so well supplied with good warm clothing. Several have been constantly employed at good wages; on the Goolwa Railway several are employed at 15s. per week, and they are using the shovel and wheelbarrow nearly as well as the white man.

12. "During the past quarter, Sergeant Hall had occasion to employ some to assist him in apprehending two armed horse-stealers; and the natives succeeded in tracking them to where they were concealed, and rendered essential service to Sergeant Hall in capturing them, and conducting them to the police-station.

"The blankets given as presents by His Excellency the Governor to those natives of the Coorong who found and interred the bodies of three white men, as mentioned in my last report, have been distributed to them. I have not heard that any other bodies have been found, but several bags of flour have been found by the natives on the sea-beach, supposed to have drifted from the wreck of the *Margaret Brock*.

13. "The following number of births and deaths have taken place during the quarter:—births 2 males, 3 females; deaths 3 males, 1 female."

14. *Guichen Bay and South-eastern Districts.*—Captain Brewer, the Resident, reports the continued good conduct of the natives during the present quarter.

15. *Port Lincoln.*—During the quarter this district has been comparatively quiet. On the 7th January, a feeding station was established at Cheruru, near Venus Bay, similar to the one at Mount Brown. Two European and twelve native police-constables were placed there to protect the flocks on the one hand, and the natives on the other. Their presence has not yet been entirely successful in preventing the natives from taking away sheep, but they have proved that the natives are not always in fault, when supposed to be so. On the 16th February, Corporal Cussack received information that Mr. Pinkerton had lost 200 sheep, and that he repeatedly lost small lots of sheep of which the shepherds could give no account. On the 17th, Corporal Cussack, accompanied by Mr. Pinkerton and three natives, went in search of the sheep; and whilst engaged in the search, met with Mr. Pinkerton's overseer, who informed them that all the sheep, with the exception of six, had been found. The party continued their search for some time, and found three of the lost animals, that had been killed by the wild dogs.

16. The reports from the Salt Creek Station are, under present circumstances, really favorable. Mr. Tennant has four stations on his run, and but one station is supplied with a hutkeeper. The other three are left from morning till evening, every day, exposed to the natives, and I am not aware that any hut has been robbed of its contents.

17. *Schools.*—ADELAIDE: There have been no children in town during the quarter; consequently this school could not be put into operation. The scarcity of European laborers causes the native children to be in great demand as shep-

herds, &c., and I think we shall not have, for many months, a sufficient number in town to justify us in reopening the school.

18. *PORT LINCOLN:* This school was transferred from the care of Mr. Schurmann to that of the Archdeacon on the 31st December last.

19. *Training Institution.*—The Venerable Archdeacon Hale states, "The circumstances of this Institution underwent considerable alteration at the commencement of the present year, inasmuch as its operations are now extended to the aboriginal natives of the district in which it is situated, instead of being confined, as at first, to those natives who had previously received instruction in the school at Adelaide.

20. "A school for native children of *this* district was established in 1849, under Mr. Schurmann. This school is now united to the Institution. It consisted of eleven children at the period of this union, and I have received seven more into it since that period.

21. "With respect to the painful subject which I dwelt upon at length in my last report, viz., the great amount of sickness and mortality amongst our inmates, I am thankful to say that the past quarter has not been so distressing a one in this respect as the quarter which preceded it. No death has occurred since the one, January 5th, which was mentioned in a note to my last report. I lament to say, however, that a lad, who was taken ill about that time, has been ever since gradually declining, and is now apparently very near his end.

22. "I have still the same anxiety as I before expressed to have the benefit of the temporary residence of some medical man at the Institution, but I have received no communication from any quarter upon this subject.

23. "The spiritual advancement of the inmates has always been the great object of my solicitude; indeed, it is *the object* which I have in view in entering upon and continuing in the undertaking I have in hand. I have not said much upon this subject in former Reports. It frequently happens that the missionary, hurried on by his sanguine hopes, is too hasty in making statements with respect to conversions to Christianity. I have been fearful of falling into this same error, possibly too fearful, and perhaps I have not, in former Reports, dwelt as much upon this subject as I ought to have done. It is now my pleasing duty to state a most important and deeply interesting fact in connection with this matter, viz., that on the occasion of a recent visit of the Bishop to the Institution I had the happiness of presenting to him eleven young persons whom I was enabled to recommend for admission within the pale of the Christian church; and these eleven were accordingly baptised by his Lordship, at the Institution, on the tenth day of the last month. These were, for the most part, inmates of the longest standing. There are several others whom I believe to have a deep and serious concern for their souls, but it seemed advisable that the elders should first stand forward in the good cause, and make their public profession of their faith in the Redeemer of the world.

24. "The test which has been applied to the religious principles of our little community has been of the most severe and searching description in the great prevalence of sickness and death, and the faith in Christ of these poor children of the desert has been proved to be of no false or hollow character. In the minds of the dying it has shone more brightly and clearly as death approached: in the minds of the living it has remained firm and steadfast whilst the hand of death has been busy amongst their companions.

25. "Since my last Report Mr. Minchin has gone to enter

upon his duties as a Sub-Protector of Aborigines, having a large district assigned to him at the head of Spencer's Gulf. Mr. Wollaston, after an absence of nearly twelve months, has again returned to his former post as superintendent of the farming operations and overseer of the live stock."

THE following by-law, No. 1, to regulate, by means of standing orders, the proceedings of the Council of the City of Adelaide, sent to the Governor and Executive Council on the 9th April, 1853, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council left unaltered, is published for the information of those whom it may concern.

BY-LAW No 1.

A By-law to regulate, by means of Standing Orders, the Proceedings of the Council of the City of Adelaide.

Whereas, by an Ordinance enacted by the Governor of South Australia, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, being No. 11 of 1849, "To constitute a Municipal Corporation for the City of Adelaide," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Council of the said City to make, publish, alter, modify, amend, or repeal such by-laws and regulations as to them shall seem meet for (amongst other things) regulating their proceedings in any matters which may not be sufficiently provided for by that Ordinance, and which may not be inconsistent therewith: And whereas it is expedient to make divers regulations for conducting the proceedings and business of the said Council, be it therefore ordered and directed by the Council of the City of Adelaide, that, from and after the date of this by-law coming into operation, the proceedings and business of the said Council shall be conducted according to the following regulations only, which shall be and be

called the "Standing Orders" of the said Council, that is to say:

CHAPTER I.—ORDER OF PROCEEDING.

1. The business of the Council shall be conducted on all ordinary occasions with open doors; but any three members present may require the exclusion of strangers until it shall have been decided by the Council whether the question proposed to be introduced shall be discussed with open doors.

2. The Council shall commence business so soon after the time stated in the summons as there is a sufficient number of members in attendance to constitute a quorum; but, if at the expiry of fifteen minutes from the time specified in the summons there is not a quorum present, no business shall be then transacted by the Council.

3. That every member, who shall at the expiry of the fifteen minutes referred to in the preceding standing order be absent, shall forfeit and pay a fine of five shillings, except in cases of illness or reasonable cause shown to the satisfaction of the Council.

4. At all meetings of the Council when there is not one-third of the members present, or when the Council is counted out, such circumstance, together with the names of the members then present, shall be recorded in the minute book.

5. The minutes of any preceding meeting not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the Council, in order to their confirmation; and no discussion shall be permitted thereupon except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

6. At all meetings of the Council (unless otherwise provided for) the reading of correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, the presentation of petitions or memorials by members of the Council, and the bringing up of reports of committees shall have precedence of other business.

7. On the presentation of any petition or memorial, no debate shall take place thereon until notice has been given in the usual manner, and the only question that shall be entertained on the occasion of its presentation shall be, that the petition or memorial be received, and if necessary that it be referred to a committee.

8. The orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the Council, and any business which the Mayor may think fit to bring under consideration. Any member of the Council may, however, bring forward such business as he may consider advisable in the form of a notice of motion, such notice to be given in writing to the Town Clerk at least four clear days previous to the meeting at which the same is to be taken into consideration, and to be communicated by the Town Clerk to the members of the Council in the summons for such meeting, and all such notices of motion shall be considered in the order in which they were given.

9. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some member authorized by him, be present, when the business is called in order.

10. No by-law shall be finally passed or adopted at the meeting at which it shall have been first proposed, nor until the next meeting of the Council regularly convened.

11. No motion proposing any petition, memorial, address, by-law, or standing order shall be entertained unless the mover shall submit therewith a draft of such petition, memorial, address, by-law, or standing order; and the draft so submitted shall in no case be taken into consideration until it shall have been referred to the "Legislative Committee," who shall report thereon; and the mover of every such proposition shall be a member of such committee.

CHAPTER II.—ORDER OF DEBATE.

12. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the Mayor or other presiding chairman; and no member when speaking shall be interrupted unless called to order, in which case he shall sit down, and the member calling to order shall be heard thereon in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed or any other subject entered upon.

13. Any member desirous of proposing either an original motion or amendment, must state the nature of such motion or amendment before addressing the Council in support thereof.

14. Any member making a motion or an amendment shall put it in writing, sign and deliver it to the Town Clerk, who shall add thereto the name of the seconder; and no motion nor amendment so made shall be withdrawn without leave of the Council.

15. No motion nor amendment shall be entertained or discussed unless it be seconded; any member may, however, require the enforcement of any standing order of the Council, by simply noticing that such order is disobeyed.

16. Any Member moving or seconding any motion or amendment shall be held to have spoken on that question.

17. The members, in speaking, shall designate each other by their respective titles of Mayor, Alderman, or Councillor, as the case may be.

18. If two or more members rise to speak at the same time, the Mayor, or other presiding chairman, shall decide which is entitled to pre-eminence.

19. The Mayor, or other presiding chairman, shall, without waiting for the interposition of the Council, call to order any member proceeding to speak a second time on the same question, unless entitled to reply, or in explanation where he has been misrepresented or misunderstood.

20. No member shall speak twice on the same question, except by way of explanation, or in reply upon any original motion of which he may have been the mover, or as the mover of the amendment last carried; and after the reply, the amendment or the original motion, as the case may be, shall be immediately put to the vote.

21. No member shall digress from the subject matter of the question under discussion, nor impute improper motives to others; and all personal reflections upon any member shall be considered highly disorderly.

22. The Mayor, or other presiding chairman, when called upon to decide a point of order or practice, shall state the rule or precedent applicable to the case, without argument or comment, and his decision as to what is order or explanation shall be final in each case.

23. Any member who shall use any expression capable of being applied offensively to any other member, shall, if required by the Council, withdraw such expression, and make a satisfactory apology to the Council, under a penalty, in case he refuse or neglect to do so before the rising of the Council, of not less than one nor more than ten pounds, as shall be decided by the Council at their next meeting.

24. Any member may require the Town Clerk to take down any particular words used by a member, immediately upon the same being used.

25. Any member may of right require the production of any of the documents of the Corporation relating to the question or matter under discussion.

26. One amendment only shall be discussed at one time, but if lost another may be moved before the original question is put to the vote; but upon any amendment being carried, it shall be competent for any member to move one other amendment thereon, but not more.

27. Upon the adoption of any amendment by the Council, such amendment shall be held to have quashed the original motion, and for all purposes of subsequent discussion the amendment so carried shall be acted upon as an original motion.

28. The Mayor, or other presiding chairman, shall, in taking the vote on any motion or amendment, put the question—first, in the affirmative, and then in the negative; and he may do so as often as is necessary to enable him to form and declare his opinion from the show of hands as to which party has the majority.

29. The Council shall vote by show of hands, excepting in cases of elections, which shall be in the manner hereinafter prescribed; any member of the Council may, however, call for a division upon any question, in which case the members voting in the affirmative shall stand up, and those in the negative shall retain their seats until the vote is recorded.

30. No discussion shall be allowed on any motion for adjournment of the Council, but if on the question being put, the motion be negatived, the subject then under consideration, or the next on the notice paper, shall be discussed, or any other that may be allowed precedence, before any subsequent motion for adjournment, shall be entertained; but if the motion for adjournment be carried, the business then undisposed of shall have precedence at the next meeting of the Council.

31. No motion, the effect of which if carried would be to rescind any motion which has already passed the Council, shall be entertained during the same municipal year, unless a call of the whole Council has been duly made for that purpose, and no motion for rescinding any resolution of the Council, which shall have been negatived by the Council, shall be again entertained during the same municipal year, unless by consent of at least two-thirds of the whole Council.

CHAPTER III.—COMMITTEES.

32. There shall be four permanent committees of the Council, to be called the "Legislative," "Public Works," "Finance," and "Markets and Slaughterhouse" Committees, which shall be appointed annually at the meeting of the Council next after the annual election of Mayor. The Legislative Committee shall consist of the Mayor, the Aldermen, and one Councillor from each Ward; five to form a quorum. The Committee of Public Works shall consist of eight members—two from each Ward; five to form a quorum. The Committees of Finance, and Markets and Slaughterhouse, shall consist of six members each; three to form a

quorum: Provided, nevertheless, that the Council shall be at liberty at any time to fill up occasional vacancies.

33. The Town Clerk shall convene every committee within seven days of its first appointment, and at any time, by order of the Council, or the written order of the Chairman, or of any two members of such committee.

34. The Mayor, if appointed a member of any of the permanent committees, shall, when present, be the chairman thereof, but in his absence the committee shall elect their chairman, and in all committees of which the Mayor shall not be a member, the committee shall, at their first meeting, appoint a permanent chairman thereof, and in the absence of such chairman at any meeting, the committee shall elect their chairman for such meeting.

35. The standing orders of the Council shall be observed in committees of the whole Council, except the rule limiting the number of times of speaking.

36. The chairmen of committees shall have their reports fairly written out on paper of uniform size, provided by the Council, so as to admit of their being bound up at convenient intervals.

CHAPTER IV.—ELECTIONS TO OFFICES.

37. No election to any office at the disposal of the Council shall take place until at least five clear days' public notice shall have been given by advertisement in one or more of the local newspapers, inviting applications from candidates properly qualified, and until the meeting of the Council next after the day fixed for the reception and opening of such applications.

38. The salary or allowance attached to all offices at the disposal of the Council, excepting the office of Mayor, shall be fixed for the municipal year, in all cases, before proceeding to the election.

39. At all elections for offices at the disposal of the Council, such elections shall be effected in the same manner as is prescribed for the election of Mayor by the Municipal Ordinance, No. 11, 1849, Section 37.

40. No member of the Council, nor any assessor or auditor of the city, nor any officer of the Corporation, shall be received as surety for any officer appointed by the Council, or for any work to be done for the Council; and in all cases in which security for the due and faithful performance of any duty or contract is required, the expense of preparing such security shall be borne by the party giving the same.

CHAPTER V.—MISCELLANEOUS REGULATIONS.

41. For the consideration of any by-law, or for the raising or appropriating of money, or for the objects contemplated in standing order, No. 31, it shall be competent for any member, without previous notice, to move for a call of the whole Council for the consideration of any such subject at the next or any subsequent meeting; and upon such motion being carried, due notice thereof shall be given in the notice paper for the day, when the order of the day or notice of motion for which such call was made is set down for consideration; and any member (other than the member moving such call) not in attendance when such order of the day or notice of motion comes under consideration, or not in attendance at the voting upon such question or any amendment thereof, whether of adjournment or otherwise, shall be liable to a penalty of one pound; and the member moving such call, if he shall not be in attendance in any such case, shall be liable to a penalty of five pounds, unless reasonable cause for such absence be shown to the satisfaction of the Council.

42. The Town Clerk shall have the charge of the Common Seal of the Corporation, and shall be responsible for the safe custody and proper use of the same; each impression thereof being duly verified with the signature of that officer.

43. The Town Clerk shall not affix the Common Seal to any corporate document without the express order of the Council, nor unless such document bears the signature of the Mayor; but in the case of powers of Attorney and other legal instruments, not relating to the Corporation, the signatures to which require to be verified by declaration or otherwise before the Mayor, the said seal shall, and may be affixed, by the Town Clerk to the Mayor's certificate accompanying the same, on receipt of a fee of half a guinea for each attestation.

44. Any one or more of the standing orders of the Council may be suspended *pro tempore* in case of emergency, provided that at least three-fourths of the members present shall deem such suspension necessary, but not otherwise.

To His Excellency Sir HENRY EDWARD FOX YOUNG, Knight, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of South Australia, &c., &c., &c.

The memorial of the undersigned owners and occupiers of land in and adjoining the western portion of the Hundred of Yatala, sheweth—

That your petitioners being desirous of availing themselves of the privileges and advantages to be derived from the District Councils Act, pray that a district may be constituted for the purposes of the said Act, to be known and designated as the “District of Yatala,” and to be bounded as follows—that is to say:—On the north by the Little Para River; on the east by a line running from the said river, at the junction of the District Road, dividing Sections 2136 and 2144, along the said road to the south corner of Section 3045, then running due south, dividing the Sections known as the Government Reserve, and the several other Sections to the Dry Creek in Section 1566, then following down the Dry Creek to the boundary of Sections 313 and 312, then continuing along such boundary, and that of the adjoining Sections, south to the road, then crossing the road, and taking the boundary of Sections 508 and 509 to the River Torrens; on the south by the said River Torrens, also the road abutting on the Park Land, near North Adelaide (taking in Section 2081), and by the northern boundary lines of Sections 374, 2067, 396, 411, 2070, 420 and 421; and on the west by a line commencing

at the south-west corner of Section 2072, running north, crossing the road and running in a westerly direction to the south-west corner of Section 1190, then turning and running north by Sections 1184 and 1133 to the western corner of Section 1130, then again running north to the creek there, then taking as a boundary the several creeks to the northward, and also the sea coast, to the Little Para River aforesaid.

Your memorialists have to state it was agreed to at a public meeting of the ratepayers of the Hundred of Yatala that the District Road aforesaid should form the boundary line of the north-eastern division of the Districts of Yatala and Highercombe, and that each portion of such road will be kept in repair by the District to which it belongs, as being of essential importance to the interests of both to do so.

Your memorialists beg to nominate the following parties for District Councillors, viz.:—Messrs. Thomas Abbott, Daniel Brady, John Chamberlain, John Harvey, and John Ragless the younger; and pray that your Excellency will cause the necessary publication to be made in the *South Australian Government Gazette*, and also will be pleased to declare and constitute the District of Yatala according to the boundaries aforesaid.
