Grand Slam Season Kicks Off Down Under

Serbs, Russians, Williams sisters dominate the seeds

MELBOURNE, Australia - With the intense level of competition and depth currently on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour, it is getting harder than ever to predict a winner for the first Grand Slam of the new season, the 2009 Australian Open.

With the No.1 ranking in hand and an obvious hunger for her first Grand Slam singles title, Jelena Jankovic is probably the player to beat in Melbourne. She first rose to No.1 for the week of the Olympics last August, but it was after reaching her first Grand Slam singles final at the US Open and during a three-title streak in the fall when she re-assumed the top spot with more of an iron fist. With three players threatening that world No.1 ranking - first and foremost world No.2 Serena Williams, a threetime former champion at the Australian Open, but also world No.3 Dinara Safina and world No.4 Elena Dementieva, Jankovic will have to be on top of her game if she wants to emerge from the fortnight with her ranking intact.

The fifth through eighth seeds will also have something to say, particularly Ana Ivanovic and Venus Williams. World No.5 Ivanovic reached her own first Grand Slam final here last year, finishing runner-up to Maria Sharapova (who is out this year due to a right shoulder injury); world No.6 Williams had a phenomenal finish to 2008, winning her last nine matches of the year - including notching wins over every single player ranked above her now. Rounding out the Top 8 seeds are Russians Vera Zvonareva and Svetlana Kuznetsova. Lower in the seeds but never one to be counted out, 2006 Australian Open champion Amélie Mauresmo can still play with the big guns, exemplified by her win over Ivanovic in Brisbane just two weeks ago. Apart from Serena Williams, she is the only one in the draw to have tasted success here.

With co-No.1s Cara Black and Liezel Huber gunning for the doubles title, a top class field has assembled to go for glory Down Under.

DEFENDING A MAJOR IS A DIFFICULT TASK

Successful major title defenses since 1946

Winning a Grand Slam singles title isn't easy; defending a Grand Slam singles title is even harder. This is especially the case at Roland Garros - while there have been 22 title defenses at Wimbledon and 19 at both the Australian Open and US Open, Roland Garros has only been defended 11 times since 1946. Justine Henin is the only one to have their lone Grand Slam singles title defense come at Roland Garros. Only 22 times since 1922 have all four Grand Slam singles titles in a calendar year been won by four different players. The most recent time this happened was last year, when Maria Sharapova (Australian Open), Ana Ivanovic (Roland Garros), Venus Williams (Wimbledon) and Serena Williams (US Open) each won Grand Slam singles titles. It has happened nine times in the Open Era. FINAL QUICK HITS

- The 2009 Australian Open final will be the first time the No.2 seed (Serena Williams) will face the No.3 seed (Dinara Safina) in the finals in the Open Era (since 1969). In the Open Era, the No.2 seed has won the singles title 11 times, while the No.3 seed has won four times. The last No.2 seed to win the title was Lindsay Davenport (2000), while Amelie Mauresmo (2006) was the last No.3 seed to win the title.
- Of the 40 finals here in Melbourne in the Open Era, the player who won the first set went on to take the title 83% of the time (33-7).
- Dinara Safina is aiming to become the 37th woman in Open Era tennis history to win a Grand Slam singles title. Since the Open Era of tennis began at the 1968 Roland Garros, there have been 36 different singles champions. The most popular site to win the first Grand Slam title has been the red clay of Roland Garros, Paris where 13 of the 36 Open Era Grand Slam winners have been crowned as first-time Champions, compared to nine (9) at the Australian Open, seven (7) at the US Open and seven (7) at Wimbledon.

SERENA WILLIAMS QUICK HITS

- Serena Williams advances to her 13th career Grand Slam singles final, equaling her sister Venus's total (13), although Serena's 9-3 record is superior to Venus's 7-6; it is Serena's fourth Australian Open final (3-0).
- Should Williams win the title it will elevate her to the world No.1 ranking for the 62nd week of her career. If Williams takes hold of the No.1 rankings, she is projected to hold the top spot for at least two weeks. It also marks the second-straight Grand Slam that Williams will be playing in a final that determines the No.1 ranking (2008 US Open, d. Jankovic).
- Williams has won the first set of five of her six matches this week. The only time Williams lost a first set this week was in the quarterfinals (d. Kuznetsova 57 75 61). She is 34-0 at the Australian Open when winning the first set.
- Additionally, the last time Williams won the first set of a match at a Grand Slam and did not win the match was at the 2004 US Open quarterfinals (I. to Capriati 26 64 64). Since the 2004 US Open, Williams is 52-9 at Grand Slam events, including a perfect 44-0 record when winning the first set at a Grand Slam.
- Serena is 408-0 when winning the final set of the match.
- During the Open Era (since 1969), Williams is one of eight players to have won three or more Australian Open singles titles, joining Margaret Smith Court (4), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (4), Steffi Graf (4), Monica Seles (4), Marina Hingis (3) and Martina Navratilova (3). NOTE: Smith Court has won a total of 11 singles titles in Melbourne (seven-straight between 1960-66, pre-Open Era).
- Williams is one of just two women in women's tennis history to save match points on her way to a Grand Slam singles title twice, coming back from the brink of defeat against Kim Clijsters in 2003 Australian Open semifinals and against Maria Sharapova in the 2004 Australian Open semifinals, eventually winning the event both times. (Margaret Osbourne DuPont also achieved the feat, flirting with defeat en route to titles at the 1942 French Open and the 1948 US Open.)
- Williams is trying to win back-to-back Slams for the first time since the 2002 US Open and 2003 Australian Open when she completed the "Serena Slam." The last player to win back-to-back Slams was Justine Henin (2003 US Open and 2004 Australian Open).
- By reaching the finals in both singles and doubles, Serena Williams becomes the all-time career prize money leader on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour, passing Lindsay Davenport (\$22,144,735 in career prize money), and also overtakes the LPGA's Annika Sorenstam (career earnings of \$22,573,192) for the record for career earnings among female professional athletes

DINARA SAFINA QUICK HITS

- **Dinara Safina** has advanced to the semifinals or better at three of the last four Grand Slams. The Russian advanced to the finals at 2008 Roland Garros and fell in the semifinals at 2008 Wimbledon.
- Dinara is trying to join her brother Marat as the first brother-sister to reach World No.1 ranking.
- After finishing the 2008 season with a 44-10 record (since Berlin in May), Safina has continued her stretch of consistent play and improved to 54-11 since May 2008. The 2009 Australian Open is Safina's eighth finals appearance since May 2008 and during that stretch has posted a 4-4 record.
- Safina is aiming to become the 37th woman in Open Era tennis history to win a Grand Slam singles title. Since the Open Era of tennis began at the 1968 Roland Garros, there have been 36 different singles champions at the 163 Grand Slam tournaments held during that time (not including 2009 Australian Open).
- Safina is trying to become the second Russian to earn the World No.1 ranking (Maria Sharapova)
- Safina is also trying to become the second Russian woman to win her country's second singles title in Melbourne; to date, six countries have won multiple Australian Open singles titles: United States (13), Australia (10), Czech Republic (5), Germany (4), Switzerland (3) and France (2).

SONY ERICSSON WTA TOUR NO.1 RANKING PROJECTIONS

After weeks of speculation and rank projections, the 2009 Australian Open final between **Dinara Safina** and **Serena Williams** will not only determine this year's champion, but the World No.1 ranking will also be on the line. After holding on to the World No.1 ranking for 17-straight weeks (10/6/08 to 1/26/09), bringing her total number of weeks to 18, Jelena Jankovic (I. to Bartoli in 4r) will fall to No.3 and the winner here in Melbourne will become the new World No.1.

- **Dinara Safina:** The Russian could become the 19th player since the inception of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Computer Ranking System (second Russian, along with Maria Sharapova) was introduced on November 3, 1975, by winning her first career Grand Slam singles title.
- Serena Williams: The American is aiming to return to the World No.1 ranking for the third time in her career. S.Williams has held the World No.1 ranking for total of 61 weeks (57 weeks: 7/8/02 to 8/10/03 and 4 weeks: 9/8/08 to 10/5/08). She can re-claim the top ranking position by winning her 10th career Grand Slam singles title.
- By advancing to the semifinals **Vera Zvonareva** is projected to make her Top 5 debut in the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings. Zvonareva will secure the World No.5 spot, improving on her previous career-best ranking of No.7, reached after the 2008 Tour Championships on November 10, 2008).
- After reaching the fourth round here in Melbourne, **Nadia Petrova** is projected to return to the Top 10 for the first time since the week of October 1, 2007.

TRACKING THE CHANGES ATOP THE SONY ERICSSON WTA TOUR RANKINGS

Since, May 14, 2008, when Justine Henin retired, the No.1 ranking on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour has been up for grabs with four players – **Ana Ivanovic, Jelena Jankovic, Maria Sharapova** and **Serena Williams** – all claiming stake as the world's No.1 women's tennis player.

- May 14: Justine Henin announces her retirement from tennis as the world No.1.
- May 15: At her request, Justine Henin will be removed from the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings, effective on May 19, 2008.
- May 19: Maria Sharapova becomes No.1 ranked player on Sony Ericsson WTA Tour; Sharapova stays at No. 1 for three weeks.
- June 9: Following a semifinal win over Jelena Jankovic at Roland Garros, **Ana Ivanovic** becomes new World No.1. The Serbian also becomes the 17th top-ranked player in women's tennis history, joining a distinguished list that is comprised of Chris Evert, Evonne Goolagong Cawley, Martina Navratilova, Austin, Serena Williams, Venus Williams, Justine Henin, Clijsters, Jennifer Capriati, Arantxa Sánchez-Vicario, Amélie Mauresmo, Seles, Graf, Hingis, Lindsay Davenport and Sharapova; Ivanovic held the No.1 ranking for nine weeks.
- August 11: Jelena Jankovic was crowned the No.1 ranked player. The Serbian reached the semifinals at both the Australian Open (falling to eventual champion, Sharapova) and Roland Garros (falling to eventual champion, Ivanovic) and reached the fourth round at Wimbledon. She became the second Serbian to reach world No.1 on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour as only two other countries have produced multiple top ranked women's tennis players United States (8) and Belgium (2).
- August 18: Ana Ivanovic re-claimed the World No.1 after the Olympics. Entering the week at Beijing three players had a chance at the No.1 ranking Ivanovic, Jankovic and Kuznetsova. Ivanovic withdrew with a thumb injury and Kuznetsova fell to Li Na in the opening round. Jankovic needed to reach the finals (win the gold or silver medal) in order to maintain her No.1 ranking. As a result of Jankovic's quarterfinals loss to Dinara Safina allowed Ivanovic to re-claim the No.1 ranking. Ivanovic held the No.1 ranking for three weeks (through the US Open).
- September 8: Entering the 2008 US Open, five players Dementieva, Jankovic, Kuznetsova Safina or S.Williams had a chance to take the No.1 ranking. Serena Williams emerged as the World No.1 by capturing her ninth career Grand Slam singles title.
- October 6: An opening round loss by S.Williams opened the door for Jelena Jankovic to re-claim the World No.1 ranking for the second time in her career. Building on momentum from the previous week when she won the title at the China Open, Jankovic responded by winning titles at Stuttgart and Moscow to solidify her position atop the rankings and would stay the World No.1 for 17 weeks (bringing her career total to 18 weeks as No.1), through the 2009 Australian Open.
- February 2, 2009: With Jelena Jankovic falling in the fourth round (I. to Bartoli), Elena Dementieva, Dinara Safina and Serena Williams each had a chance of becoming the World No.1 following the 2009 Australian Open. With Safina and S.Williams meeting in the finals, it marks the second straight Grand Slam event that the finals will determine the World No.1, as both finalists (Jankovic, S.Williams) at the 2008 US Open had a chance to emerge as the World No.1

CHANGES TO THE TOP 10 RANKINGS

By not playing the Australian Open, **Maria Sharapova** will fall out of the Top 10 for the first time since the week of July 5, 2004, snapping a string of 238 consecutive weeks in the Top 10. THERE'S NOTHING LIKE THE FIRST TIME

Dinara Safina is aiming to become the 37th woman in Open Era tennis history to win a Grand Slam singles title. Since the Open Era of tennis began at the 1968 Roland Garros, there have been 36 different singles champions at the 163 Grand Slam tournaments held during that time (not including 2009 Australian Open). Many winners have often referred to the first Grand Slam title as the most special championship of their career – 21 of the 36 total different winners have won multiple Grand Slam singles titles. The most popular site to win the first Grand Slam title has been the red clay of Roland Garros, Paris where 13 of the 36 Open Era Grand Slam winners have been crowned as first-time Champions, compared to nine (9) at the Australian Open, seven (7) at the US Open and seven (7) at Wimbledon.

DOUBLES FINAL QUICK HITS

- Venus Williams and Serena Williams, next to Lisa Raymond, are the only active players to have completed the career doubles Grand Slam (2001/2003 Australian Open, 1999 Roland Garros, 2000/2002/2008 Wimbledon, 1999 US Open); there are 10 others who have done it in the Open Era (Margaret Court, Martina Navratilova, Kathy Jordan, Anne Smith, Pam Shriver, Jana Novotna, Helena Sukova, Gigi Fernandez, Natasha Zvereva, Martina Hingis); Ai Sugiyama can join this group of players by capturing the Australian Open title, the only missing Doubles Grand Slam (2000 US Open, 2003 Roland Garros, 2003 Wimbledon).
- Venus Williams and Serena Williams will now go for their eighth Grand Slam doubles title, and third here (having won it twice, in 2001 and 2003); in five of their seven previous Grand Slam doubles title runs one of them also won the singles title: 1999 US Open (Serena), 2000 Wimbledon (Venus), 2002 Wimbledon (Serena), 2003 Australian Open (Serena), 2008 Wimbledon (Venus).
- Daniela Hantuchova and Ai Sugiyama will play their second career Grand Slam final as a team; they reached the final of 2006 Roland Garros and won three Tour Doubles titles.
- Venus Williams and Serena Williams would enter a two-way tie for the third-most successful partnership in the Open Era in terms of Grand Slam doubles titles if they win their eighth doubles title; the most successful was Martina Navratilova and Pam Shriver (who won 21), followed by Gigi Fernandez and Natasha Zvereva (14) and Virginia Ruano Pascual and Paola Suárez (eight).

- In 2008, Venus and Serena teamed up to win their seventh career doubles Grand Slam and a gold medal at the Olympics-Beijing; they also teamed up to reach the quarterfinals at Australian Open, Bangalore, Stuttgart

- Serena Williams has only played twice with other players, going 5-1 (1-1 with Martina Navratilova to reach the quarterfinals of Tokyo [Princess Cup] in 2002 and 4-0 with Alexandra Stevenson to win Leipzig the week later)

SEMIFINAL QUICK HITS

- The final four includes three players vying for their first career Grand Slam title (Elena Dementieva, Dinara Safina, Vera Zvonareva). Serena Williams has a resume that already includes nine career singles Grand Slam titles (2003/2005/2007 Australian Open, 2002 Roland Garros, 2002/2003 Wimbledon, 1999/2002/2008 US Open).
- During the Open Era (since 1969), Serena Williams is one of eight players to have won three or more Australian Open singles titles, joining Margaret Smith Court (4), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (4), Steffi Graf (4), Monica Seles (4), Marina Hingis (3) and Martina Navratilova (3). NOTE: Smith Court has won a total of 11 singles titles in Melbourne (seven-straight between 1960-66, pre-Open Era).
- Elena Dementieva, Dinara Safina, and Vera Zvonareva are each making their semifinal debut here in Melbourne. Zvonareva is making her Grand Slam semifinal debut.
- Dinara Safina and Vera Zvonareva have played head-to-head nine times, with Safina holding a 5-4 lead. The two Russians played each other three times in 2008 with Zvonareva winning all three matchups: 2008 Doha (r16), 2008 Miami (QF) and 2008 Moscow (SF).
- Both **Dinara Safina** and **Vera Zvonareva** will be making their semifinal debut here in Melbourne just one year after they both fell in the first round.
- **Dinara Safina** has advanced to the semifinals or better at three of the last four Grand Slams. The Russian advanced to the finals at 2008 Roland Garros and fell in the semifinals at 2008 Wimbledon.
- After finishing the 2008 season with a 44-10 record (since Berlin in May), **Dinara Safina** has continued her stretch of consistent play and improved to 53-11 since May 2008.
- Serena Williams is the only player among this year's final four that reached the quarterfinals last year, before the American lost to No.3 seed Jelena Jankovic. Dinara Safina and Vera Zvonareva fell in the first round at last year's event, while Elena Dementieva reached the fourth round in 2008.
- Dating back to last year's Sony Ericsson Championships Doha 2008, Vera Zvonareva has three-consecutive wins over Top 5 opponents. She is trying to extend that streak in the semifinals when she faces World No.3 Dinara Safina. Zvonareva collected wins against No.1 Jankovic, No.4 Ivanovic, and No.5 Dementieva (also No.7 Kuznetsova) at the year-end event in November 2008.
- Elena Dementieva is trying to win her first career Grand Slam title here in Melbourne in her 41st career Grand Slam appearance. Only one player had more Grand Slam appearances before winning their maiden Grand Slam title:

SONY ERICSSON WTA TOUR NO.1 RANKING PROJECTIONS

After holding on to the World No.1 ranking for 17-straight weeks (10/6/08 to 1/26/09), bringing her total number of weeks to 18, Jelena Jankovic (I. to Bartoli in 4r) has opened the door for three players to capture the No.1 ranking for the week of February 2, 2009. **Elena Dementieva, Dinara Safina** and **Serena Williams** can each claim the top ranking by winning the 2009 Australian Open. Here are the circumstances that will yield a change atop the rankings:

- Elena Dementieva: The Russian could become the 19th player since the inception of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Computer Ranking System (second Russian, along with Maria Sharapova) was introduced on November 3, 1975. Here is how:
 - o Win the singles title
 - o By reaching the finals if Safina does not also reach the finals
- **Dinara Safina:** The Russian could become the 19th player since the inception of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Computer Ranking System (second Russian, along with Maria Sharapova) was introduced on November 3, 1975. Here is how:
 - o Win the singles title
- Serena Williams: The American is aiming to return to the World No.1 ranking for the third time in her career. S.Williams has held the World No.1 ranking for 61 weeks (57 weeks: 7/8/02 to 8/10/03 and 4 weeks: 9/8/08 to 10/5/08). She can re-claim the top ranking position by the following:
 - o Win the singles title
 - o By reaching the finals if Safina does not also reach the finals

MORE RANKING PROJECTIONS

When the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings are release on Monday, February 2, 2009, there will be some changes to the top of the rankings. Here are the projected changes:

- By advancing to the semifinals Vera Zvonareva is projected to make her Top 5 debut in the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings. Zvonareva will secure the World No.5 spot, regardless of the results, improving on her previous career-best ranking of No.7, reached after the 2008 Tour Championships on November 10, 2008).
- By reaching her second career Grand Slam quarterfinal, Spain's **Carla Suarez Navarro** is projected to vault the into the Top 30 for the first time in her career. The Spaniard's previous best ranking is No.44 (her current ranking, first reached on January 12, 2009)
- After reaching the fourth round here in Melbourne, **Nadia Petrova** is projected to return to the Top 10 for the first time since the week of October 1, 2007.
- As a result of her run to the quarterfinals, Australian wildcard **Jelena Dokic** is projected to return to the Top 100 of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings.
- By advancing to the quarterfinals, current World No.17, Marion Bartoli is projected to climb to No.11.
- By not playing the Australian Open, **Maria Sharapova** will fall out of the Top 10 for the first time since the week of July 5, 2004, snapping a string of 238 consecutive weeks in the Top 10. The last time Sharapova ranked outside of the Top 10 was during the week of June 21, 2004 (No.15), prior to winning 2004 Wimbledon singles title. Among the current Top 10 (including the week of January 26, 2009), here is how many consecutive weeks each player has spent in the Top 10:

There is no better evidence of the depth on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour than the fact that in the last 10 years, Wimbledon has had five different champions, the US Open has had six different champions and the Australian Open and Roland Garros have each had seven different champions. Only seven times have Grand Slam singles titles been successfully defended (most recently last year at Wimbledon by Venus Williams). Below is a look at the Grand Slam singles champions over the last 10 seasons (from 1999 to 2008):

POSSIBLE HISTORIC ALL-COUNTRY FINAL

With three Russians in the semifinals, another all-country Grand Slam final is possible. In the Open Era, 45 Grand Slam singles finals featured two women from the same country, the most recent being the all-American final at 2008 Wimbledon when Venus Williams defeated Serena Williams 75 64. QUARTERFINAL QUICK HITS

- The top half of the bracket (Bartoli, Dokic, Safina, Zvonareva), features four players that will be vying for their first career Grand Slam singles title. Marion Barotli (2007 Wimbledon) and Dinara Safina (2008 Roland Garros) have each advanced to the finals of a Grand Slam, but finished as runner-up.
- The bottom half of the bracket (Dementieva, Kuznetsova, Suarez Navarro, S.Williams) includes two Grand Slam singles title winners: Svetlana Kuznetsova (1, 2004 US Open) and Serena Williams (9, 2003/2005/2007 Australian Open, 2002 Roland Garros, 2002/2003 Wimbledon, 1999/2002/2008 US Open).
- Of the eight quarterfinalists in Melbourne only Serena Williams and Svetlana Kuznetsova have reached the quarterfinals or better at the Australian Open. S.Williams has reached the QF or better five other times (previous results QF: 2001, 2008; Won: 2003, 2005, 2007) while Kuznetsova also reached the quarterfinals in 2005.
- Marion Bartoli, Elena Dementieva, Jelena Dokic, Dinara Safina, Carla Suarez Navarro and Vera Zvonareva are each making their guarterfinal debut here in Melbourne.
- Serena Williams is the only player among this year's final eight that reached the quarterfinals last year, before the American lost to No.3 seed Jelena Jankovic. Additionally, three of this year's quarterfinalists fell in the first round at last year's event (Marion Bartoli, Dinara Safina, Vera Zvonareva) while two others fell in qualifying (Carla Suarez Navarro, Jelena Dokic).
- Of the four teenagers who advanced to the fourth round Alize Cornet, Dominika Cibulkova, Victoria Azarenka and Alisa Kleybanova – none advanced to the quarterfinals. The youngest player remaining in the final eight is 20year-old Carla Suarez Navarro.
- Australian wildcard Jelena Dokic defeated World No.12 Caroline Wozniacki in the third round. It is the highest ranked opponent Dokic has defeated since 2003, when she defeated World No.1 Kim Clijsters in Zurich semifinals.
- After finishing the 2008 season with a 44-10 record (since Berlin in May), **Dinara Safina** has continued her stretch of consistent play and improved to 52-11 since May 2008.
- With No.1 seed **Jelena Jankovic** falling in the fourth round it is just the third time in the Open Era that the top seed has lost before the quarterfinals at the Australian Open: Ruzici lost first round in 1979 and Graf lost fourth round in 1997.
- During the Open Era (since 1969), **Serena Williams** is one of eight players to have won three or more Australian Open singles titles, joining Margaret Smith Court (4), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (4), Steffi Graf (4), Monica Seles (4), Marina Hingis (3) and Martina Navratilova (3). NOTE: Smith Court has won a total of 11 singles titles in Melbourne (seven-straight between 1960-66, pre-Open Era).

SONY ERICSSON WTA TOUR NO.1 RANKING PROJECTIONS

With World No.1 Jelena Jankovic losing in the fourth round (I. to Bartoli) it opens the door for three players to potentially capture the No.1 ranking for the week of February 2, 2009. Elena Dementieva, Dinara Safina and Serena Williams can each claim the top ranking by winning the 2009 Australian Open. Jelena Jankovic, who has held the No.1 ranking for a total of 18 weeks (1 week: 8/11/08 and 18 weeks: 10/6/08 to 1/26/09) can hold on to the No.1 raking if none of the following happens: 1) Safina does not reach the SF, 2) Dementieva does not reach the finals and 3) S.Williams does not reach the finals. Here are the circumstances that will yield a change atop the rankings:

- Elena Dementieva: The Russian could become the 19th player since the inception of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Computer Ranking System (second Russian, along with Maria Sharapova) was introduced on November 3, 1975. Here is how:
 - o Win the singles title
 - o By reaching the finals if Safina does not also reach the finals
- **Dinara Safina:** The Russian could become the 19th player since the inception of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Computer Ranking System (second Russian, along with Maria Sharapova) was introduced on November 3, 1975. Here is how:
 - o Win the singles title
 - o Reach at least SF and neither Dementieva nor S.Williams advance to the finals
- Serena Williams: The American is aiming to return to the World No.1 ranking for the third time in her career. S.Williams has held the World No.1 ranking for 61 weeks (57 weeks: 7/8/02 to 8/10/03 and 4 weeks: 9/8/08 to 10/5/08). She can re-claim the top ranking position by the following:
 - o Win the singles title
 - o By reaching the finals if Safina does not also reach the finals

DOKIC CLIMBING THE RANKINGS

Wildcard Jelena Dokic entered the 2009 Australian Open ranked No.187 in the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings (for the week of January 19, 2009). By advancing to the quarterfinals, Dokic becomes the third lowest ranked player to reach the quarterfinals at any Grand Slam (since 1983). Additionally, by reaching the quarterfinals, Jelena Dokic is projected to climb into the Top 100 (for the rankings the week of February 2, 2009) for the first time since the week of October 11, 2004 (No.44).

MORE RANKING PROJECTIONS

When the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings are release on Monday, February 2, 2009, there will be some changes to the top of the rankings. Here are the projected changes:

- No.7 seed Vera Zvonareva is closing in on an opportunity to climb into the Top 5 of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings for the first time in her career. By advancing to the quarterfinals, Zvonareva has a chance to move into the Top 5, pending Svetlana Kuznetsova's results.
- Nadia Petrova and Marion Bartoli each have a chance to return to the Top 10. Currently ranked No.11, Petrova, could return to the Top 10 for the first time since the week of October 1, 2007, if Bartoli does not reach the finals. By advancing to the finals, current World No.17, Bartoli could return to the Top 10 for the first time since the week of May 26, 2008, equaling her previous career-best ranking of No.9 (first reached on October 22, 2007).
- By reaching her second career Grand Slam quarterfinal, Spain's **Carla Suarez Navarro** is projected to vault the into the Top 30 for the first time in her career. The Spaniard's previous best ranking is No.44 (her current ranking, first reached on January 12, 2009)
- By not playing the Australian Open, **Maria Sharapova** will fall out of the Top 10 for the first time since the week of July 5, 2004, snapping a string of 238 consecutive weeks in the Top 10. The last time Sharapova ranked outside of the Top 10 was during the week of June 21, 2004 (No.15), prior to winning 2004 Wimbledon singles title. Among the current Top 10 (including the week of January 26, 2009), here is how many consecutive weeks each player has spent in the Top 10:

THE LAST DECADE'S GRAND SLAM CHAMPIONS

There is no better evidence of the depth on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour than the fact that in the last 10 years, Wimbledon has had five different champions, the US Open has had six different champions and the Australian Open and Roland Garros have each had seven different champions. Only seven times have Grand Slam singles titles been successfully defended (most recently last year at Wimbledon by Venus Williams). FOURTH ROUND QUICK HITS

- The top half of the bracket (Bartoli, Cornet, Dokic, Jankovic, Kleybanova, Petrova, Safina, Zvonareva), features eight players that will be vying for their first career Grand Slam singles final. Marion Barotli (2007 Wimbledon), Jelena Jankovic (2008 US Open) and Dinara Safina (2008 Roland Garros) have each advanced to the finals of a Grand Slam, but finished as runner-up.
- The bottom half of the bracket (Azarenka, Cibulkova, Dementieva, Kuznetsova, Medina Garrigues, Suarez Navarro, S.Williams, Zheng) includes two Grand Slam singles title winners: Svetlana Kuznetsova (1, 2004 US Open) and Serena Williams (9, 2003/2005/2007 Australian Open, 2002 Roland Garros, 2002/2003 Wimbledon, 1999/2002/2008 US Open).
- Serena Williams has advanced to the fourth round or better at a Grand Slam 29 times (in 37 attempts), the most among this year's fourth round participants. The next highest total of fourth round or better finishes is Elena Dementieva (20).
- Jelena Jankovic has now advanced to the fourth round or better at 11-straight Grand Slams, a streak that started at 2006 Wimbledon.
- Alize Cornet, who advanced to the third round by defeating No.19 seed Daniela Hantuchova, is the youngest player remaining in the draw as she celebrated her 19th birthday on January 22. Cornet is one of four teenagers that have advanced to the fourth round along with Dominika Cibulkova, Victoria Azarenka and Alisa Kleybanova.
- **Dominka Cibulkova** and **Alize Cornet** are both making their fourth round Grand Slam debuts this week in Melbourne. Cibulkova's previous best result was three third round finishes (2007/2008 Roland Garros, 2008 US Open). Cornet's previous best was also three third round finishes (2008 Roland Garros, 2007/2008 US Open).
- With her third round victory over World No.5 Ana Ivanovic, **Alisa Kleybanova** earned her first career win against a Top 10 opponent. - Australian wildcard **Jelena Dokic** defeated World No.12 Caroline Wozniacki in the third round. It is the highest ranked opponent Dokic has defeated since 2003, when she defeated World No.1 Kim Clijsters in Zurich semifinals.
- After finishing the 2008 season with a 44-10 record (since Berlin in May), **Dinara Safina** has continued her stretch of consistent play and improved to 51-11 since May 2008.
- After falling in the first round in 2008, **Vera Zvonareva** has returned to the fourth round in Melbourne for the third time in her career. She is trying to advance to the quarterfinals for the first time at the Australian Open, in an attempt to equal her best Grand Slam result: QF, 2003 Roland Garros.
- Three players that have advanced to the fourth round of this year's Australian Open, entered the tournament seeking their first main draw win here in Melbourne: **Dominika Cibulkova** (0-1 before 2009), **Carla Suarez Navarro** (making main draw debut, fell in qualifying in 2008) and **Zheng Jie** (0-4 before 2009).

TOP 10 RANKING PROJECTIONS

It is still too early in the tournament to project the Top 10 on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings (for the week of February 2, 2009) as seven players are still alive with a chance of cracking the Top 10. However, one projection is clear. By not playing the Australian Open, **Maria Sharapova** will fall out of the Top 10 for the first time since the week of July 5, 2004, snapping a string of 238 consecutive weeks in the Top 10. The last time Sharapova ranked outside of the Top 10 was during the week of June 21, 2004 (No.15), prior to winning 2004 Wimbledon singles title. Among the current Top 10 (including the week of January 26, 2009), here is how many consecutive weeks each player has spent in the Top 10:

Wildcard **Jelena Dokic** entered the 2009 Australian Open ranked No.187 in the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings (for the week of January 19, 2008. By advancing to the fourth round, Dokic becomes the ninth lowest ranked player to reach the fourth round at any Grand Slam (since 1983). Additionally, the Australian wildcard is the fourth lowest ranked player to reach the fourth round in Melbourne:

Four players have a chance of being ranked No.1 at the conclusion of Melbourne (points defending at Melbourne): Jelena Jankovic (900, reached 2008 SF), Serena Williams (500, reached 2008 QF), Dinara Safina (4, fell 2008 1r) and Elena Dementieva (280, reached 2008 4r). With the winner receiving 2000 ranking points, and the top four ranking positions being so close, here are some scenarios:

- If Jelena Jankovic wins, she will remain No.1 regardless.
- If Dinara Safina wins, she will become No.1, regardless.
- If Serena Williams wins, she will become No.1 IF... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.
- If Elena Dementieva wins, she will become No.1 IF ... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.

Additionally, with Jankovic reaching the fourth round match at the Australian Open, **Safina** would need to reach AT LEAST the semifinals, while **S.Williams** and **Dementieva** would need to reach the finals in order to have a *chance* to become the World No.1.

MORE RANKING PROJECTIONS FOR WEEK OF FEBRUARY 2, 2009

- No.7 seed Vera Zvonareva is closing in on an opportunity to climb into the Top 5 of the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings for the first time in her career. If Zvonareva advances to the quarterfinals, she would have a chance to move into the Top 5, pending Svetlana Kuznetsova's results.
- Seven players remain in the draw with a chance of climbing into the To 10 of the rankings: Nadia Petrova, Alize Cornet, Victoria Azarenka, Marion Bartoli, Dominika Cibulkova, Zheng Jie and Anabel Medina Garrigues.
- Russia's Alisa Kleybanova is projected to crack the Top 30 of the rankings for the first time in her career, improving on her current, and career-best ranking, of No.31 (first reached on January 19, 2009).
- By reaching the fourth round, Spain's **Carla Suarez Navarro** is projected to climb to the Top 40 for the first time in her career. A win in the fourth round could possibly vault the Spaniard into the Top 30.

It is still too early in the tournament to project the Top 10 on the Sony Ericsson WTA Tour Rankings (for the week of February 2, 2009) as 12 players are still alive with a chance of cracking the Top 10. However, one projection is clear. By not playing the Australian Open, **Maria Sharapova** will fall out of the Top 10 for the first time since the week of July 5, 2004, snapping a string of 238 consecutive weeks in the Top 10. The last time Sharapova ranked outside of the Top 10 was during the week of June 21, 2004 (No.15), prior to winning 2004 Wimbledon singles title. In order to have a *chance* of reaching the Top 10, Italy's **Flavia Pennetta** would need to advance to the semifinals. Pennetta entered the Australian Open with a career-best ranking of No.13. The highest ranking reached by an Italian player has been No.11, achieved by **Francesca Schiavone** (14 weeks: 1/30/06 to 2/5/06, 2/20/06 to 4/2/06, 4/10/06 to 5/28/06) and **Silvia Farina Elia** (3 week: 5/20/02 to 6/9/02)

SONY ERICSSON WTA TOUR NO.1 RANKING PROJECTIONS

Entering the Australian Open, four players have a chance of being ranked No.1 at the conclusion of Melbourne (points defending at Melbourne): Jelena Jankovic (900, reached 2008 SF), Serena Williams (500, reached 2008 QF), Dinara Safina (4, fell 2008 1r) and Elena Dementieva (280, reached 2008 4r). With the winner receiving 2000 ranking points, and the top four ranking positions being so close, here are some scenarios:

- If Jelena Jankovic wins, she will remain No.1 regardless.
- If Dinara Safina wins, she will become No.1, regardless.
- If Serena Williams wins, she will become No.1 IF... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.
- If Elena Dementieva wins, she will become No.1 IF ... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.

Additionally, with Jankovic reaching the third round match at the Australian Open, **Safina** would need to reach AT LEAST the semifinals, while **S.Williams** and **Dementieva** would need to reach the finals in order to have a *chance* to become the World No.1.

Entering the Australian Open, four players have a chance of being ranked No.1 at the conclusion of Melbourne (points defending at Melbourne): Jelena Jankovic (900, reached 2008 SF), Serena Williams (500, reached 2008 QF), Dinara Safina (4, fell 2008 1r) and Elena Dementieva (280, reached 2008 4r). With the winner receiving 2000 ranking points, and the top four ranking positions being so close, here are some scenarios:

- If Jelena Jankovic wins, she will remain No.1 regardless.
- If Dinara Safina wins, she will become No.1, regardless.
- If Serena Williams wins, she will become No.1 IF... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.
- If Elena Dementieva wins, she will become No.1 IF ... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.

Additionally, with Jankovic winning her first round match at the Australian Open, **Safina** would need to reach AT LEAST the semifinals, while **S.Williams** and **Dementieva** would need to reach the finals in order to have a *chance* to become the World No.1

Entering the Australian Open, four players have a chance of being ranked No.1 at the conclusion of Melbourne (points defending at Melbourne): Jelena Jankovic (900, reached 2008 SF), Serena Williams (500, reached 2008 QF), Dinara Safina (4, fell 2008 1r) and Elena Dementieva (280, reached 2008 4r). With the winner receiving 2000 ranking points, and the top four ranking positions being so close, here are some scenarios:

- If Jelena Jankovic wins, she will remain No.1 regardless.
- If Dinara Safina wins, she will become No.1, regardless.
- If Serena Williams wins, she will become No.1 IF... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.
- If Elena Dementieva wins, she will become No.1 IF ... she does not play Jankovic in the finals.

Additionally, with Jankovic winning her first round match at the Australian Open, **Safina** would need to reach AT LEAST the semifinals, while **S.Williams** and **Dementieva** would need to reach the finals in order to have a *chance* to become the World No.1
