AMENDMENT OF TITLE 2 OF MUNICIPAL CODE OF CHICAGO BY CREATION OF NEW CHAPTER 173 TO DISALLOW DISCLOSURE OF AND CONDITIONING BENEFITS AND SERVICES ON INDIVIDUAL'S CITIZENSHIP AND RESIDENCY STATUS.

A Joint Committee, comprised of the members of the Committee on Finance and the members of the Committee on Human Relations, submitted the following report:

Your Committee on Finance and Committee on Human Relations, having had under consideration a substitute ordinance authorizing the amending of the Municipal Code of the City of Chicago by creating new Chapter 2-173 regarding equal access to benefits, opportunities and services administered by the City of Chicago, having had the same under advisement, begs leave to report and recommend that Your Honorable Body *Pass* the proposed substitute ordinance transmitted herewith.

The following is said ordinance as passed:

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago is a home rule unit of government pursuant to the 1970 Illinois Constitution, Article VII, Section 6(a); and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to its home rule power, the City of Chicago may exercise any power and perform any function relating to its government and affairs, including the power to regulate for the protection of the public health, safety, morals and welfare; and

WHEREAS, To this end, the City of Chicago is dedicated to providing its residents with equal access to the services, opportunities, and protection it provides or administers; and

WHEREAS, Conditioning the provision of services, opportunities, and protection on citizenship or immigrant status or inquiring about such status in the course of said provision directly contravenes the city's commitment to ensuring equal access; and

WHEREAS, Local governments are increasingly pressured to become involved in the enforcement of federal civil immigration laws by conditioning services and opportunities on, or inquiring about, immigrant status; and

WHEREAS, The enforcement of civil immigration laws has historically been a federal government responsibility -- a power vested first in the Immigration and Naturalization Service and then in the Department of Homeland Security; and

WHEREAS, Initiatives such as the proposed Federal Clear Law Enforcement for Criminal Alien Removal Act, which would require local governments to give their local law enforcement agencies express authority to enforce immigration laws, also signal pressure to expend limited local resources on traditionally federal functions; and WHEREAS, Encouraging local governments that are not specifically equipped or trained to implement immigration and anti-terrorist measures to do so is likely to result in inconsistencies and decentralization that undermine instead of strengthen these measures; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago joins several major cities, including Los Angeles, San Francisco, Seattle, Minneapolis, and Saint Paul, among others, that have official policies prohibiting their municipal agencies from inquiring about immigration status and unilaterally enforcing immigration law provisions; and

WHEREAS, Requiring, or even promoting, local enforcement of immigration laws gives rise to an increased threat of immigrant and minority profiling and harassment; and

WHEREAS, Such an environment would cause a chilling effect on crime prevention and solving if both witnesses and victims are called upon to weigh a need to cooperate with local authorities against a fear of deportation, thereby undermining long-standing efforts to engender trust and cooperation between law enforcement officials and immigrant communities; and

WHEREAS, For the past one hundred fifty (150) years, the City of Chicago and its surrounding area has been hope and home to immigrants from throughout the globe; and

WHEREAS, The metropolitan Chicago area is home to over 1.4 million immigrants -- nearly twenty percent (20%) of the region's population -- from more than one hundred (100) countries, representing all major world regions, and consisting of approximately twenty-six percent (26%) European, twenty-three percent (23%) Asian and forty-seven percent (47%) Latin American immigrants; and

WHEREAS, With these numbers, Chicago ranks fifth (5<sup>th</sup>) nationally in the size of its immigrant population, behind the New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Miami metropolitan regions; and

WHEREAS, Chicago experienced a forty (40) year long declining population trend that foreign-born residents reversed during the 1990's when they also accounted for ninety percent (90%) of the net growth in its labor force; and

WHEREAS, Immigrants are twenty-six percent (26%) of Chicago's workforce; and

WHEREAS, The above-cited figures are but a shadow of an indication of the contributions made by Chicago's immigrants to the city's history, character and functions; and

WHEREAS, The city's policy is to ensure that all of its residents be able to access city services to which they are eligible or entitled, without regard to their immigration status under federal law; and

WHEREAS, Executive Order 89-6 has as its intended effect to "encourage equal access by all persons residing in the City of Chicago, regardless of nation of birth or current citizenship, to the full benefits, opportunities and services, including employment and the issuance of licenses, which are provided or administered by the City of Chicago"; and

WHEREAS, There is a need to herald this intent as a known and enforced law of the City of Chicago; now, therefore,

Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. The above recitals are expressly incorporated and made part hereof as though fully set forth herein.

SECTION 2. Title 2 of the City of Chicago Municipal Code is hereby amended by inserting a new Chapter 2-173 underscored as follows:

#### <u>2-173-010</u> <u>Definitions.</u>

As used in this ordinance, the following words and phrases shall mean and include:

- (a) Agency. "Agency" means every department, agency, division, commission, council, committee, board, other body, or person established by authority of an ordinance, executive order, or City Council order.
- (b) Agent. "Agent" means any person employed by or acting on behalf of an agency as defined in Section (a).
- (c) <u>Citizenship or residency status</u>. "<u>Citizenship or residency status</u>" means all matters regarding questions of citizenship of the United States or any other country, questions of authority from the Department of Homeland Security -- or federal entity charged with enforcing civil immigration laws -- to reside in or otherwise be present in the United States, and the time or manner of a person's entry into the United States. The use in this ordinance of the term "residency" shall not mean street address or location of residence in Chicago or elsewhere.

#### 2-173-020 Requesting Information Prohibited.

No agent or agency shall request information about or otherwise investigate or assist in the investigation of the citizenship or residency status of any person unless such inquiry or investigation is required by Illinois State Statute, federal regulation, or court decision. Notwithstanding this provision, the Corporation Counsel may investigate and inquire about immigration status when relevant to potential or actual litigation or an administrative proceeding in which the City is or may be a party.

#### 2-173-030 Disclosing Information Prohibited.

Except as otherwise provided under applicable federal law, no agent or agency shall disclose information regarding the citizenship or residency status of any person unless required to do so by legal process or such disclosure has been authorized in writing by the individual to whom such information pertains, or if such individual is a minor or is otherwise not legally competent, by such individual's parent or guardian.

# <u>2-173-040</u> Conditioning Benefits, Services, Or Opportunities On İmmigrant Status Prohibited.

No agent or agency shall condition the provision of City of Chicago benefits, opportunities, or services on matters related to citizenship or immigrant status unless required to do so by statute, federal regulation, or court decision. Where presentation of an Illinois driver's license or identification card is accepted as adequate evidence of identity; presentation of a photo identity document issued by the person's nation of origin, such as a driver's license, passport, or matricula consular (consulate-issued document) shall be accepted and shall not subject the person to a higher level of scrutiny or different treatment than if the person had provided an Illinois driver's license or identification card except that this sentence does not apply to the completion of the federally mandated I-9 forms.

#### 2-173-050 No Private Cause Of Action.

This chapter does not create or form the basis for liability on the part of the City, its agents, or agencies. The exclusive remedy for violation of this chapter shall be through the City's disciplinary procedures for officers and employees under regulations including but not limited to this City personnel rules, union contracts, civil service commission rules, or any other agency rules and/or regulations. A person alleging a violation of this chapter shall forward a complaint to the Office of the Inspector General ("Inspector General") who shall process it in accordance with the complaint-processing procedures established in Chapter 2-56 of this Code except that if the complaint is against any member of the City Council or any employee or staff person of any City Council committee, the Inspector General shall promptly transmit said complaint to the chairman of the City Council Committee on Committees, Rules and Ethics for processing or such successor committee having jurisdiction over said matters and if the complaint is against any member of the Chicago Police Department, the Inspector General shall transmit it to the Chicago Police Department for processing.

#### 2-173-060 Expunging File Information.

All applications, questionnaires, and interview forms used in relation to City of Chicago benefits, opportunities, or services shall be promptly reviewed by the

pertinent agencies and any questions regarding citizenship or residency status other than those required by statute, ordinance, federal regulation, or court decision, shall be deleted within 60 days of the passage of this ordinance.

#### 2-173-070 Severability.

If any provision, clause, section, part, or application of this chapter to any person or circumstance is declared invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such invalidity shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder hereof or its application to any other person or circumstance. It is hereby declared that the legislative intent of the City Council that this chapter would have been adopted had such invalid provision, clause, section, part or application not been included herein.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication.

#### Be It Ordained by the City Council of the City of Chicago:

SECTION 1. Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, is hereby amended in Section 17-4-1002 by deleting the language stricken through and by adding the language underscored as follows:

#### 17-4-0900 Floor Area Bonuses.

#### 17-4-1001 Purpose.

The floor area bonus provisions of this section are intended to provide an economic incentive for developers to provide affordable housing and public amenities that improve the quality of life of city residents, employees and visitors and are a benefit to the public.

#### 17-4-1002 Floor Area Ratio Bonus Menu.

Floor Area bonuses are subject to the standards of the following table and the specific standards of Section 17-4-1004 through Section 17-4-102<u>3</u>.

SECTION 2. Title 17 of the Municipal Code of Chicago, the Chicago Zoning Ordinance, is hereby amended by adding a new Section 17-4-1023 as follows:

17-4-1023 Chicago Public Schools Capital Improvement Program.

#### <u>17-4-1023-A</u> Purpose.

Floor area bonuses for construction of new schools are intended to promote private-sector participation in response to overcrowded and physically decaying school buildings.

#### 17-4-1023-B Eligibility Criteria.

Residential buildings and nonresidential buildings in D districts with a dash 12 or 16 suffix are eligible to receive floor area bonuses for making a financial contribution to the Public Schools Capital Improvement Program; provided the applicant first selects, qualifies and obtains the affordable housing bonus.

#### <u>17-4-1023-C</u> Guidelines.

Applicants who contribute to the Public School Capital Improvement Program must enter into an agreement with the City of Chicago and the Chicago Board of Education regarding the manner in which the funds will be paid. All agreements must be in a form approved by the Corporation Counsel.

#### 17-4-1023-D Bonus Formula.

Floor area bonuses will be based on a financial contribution that reflects the value of land within the surrounding area, based on the following formula: cost of 1 square foot of floor area = 80% x the median cost of land per buildable square foot.

SECTION 3. This ordinance takes effect after its passage and approval.

# GOVERNOR ROD BLAGOJEVICH AND ILLINOIS GENERAL ASSEMBLY URGED TO EXTEND CURRENT LIMITATION ON PROPERTY TAX VALUATIONS.

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago has worked hard to manage government well and give taxpayers their money's worth; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago has worked to keep Chicago affordable and protect property taxpayers by cutting government spending first and using property tax increases as a last resort; and

WHEREAS, Properties within the City of Chicago will be reassessed for property tax purposes in 2006; and

WHEREAS, Residential assessments in the City of Chicago increased on average by more than thirty-two percent in 2003 and residential market values have increased since then; and

WHEREAS, Property assessment notices reflecting these new assessments will be mailed to all taxpayers starting in the summer of 2006; and

WHEREAS, Mayor Richard M. Daley and members of this body urged the Illinois General Assembly and the Governor to adopt property tax relief legislation; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2112, signed into law July 12, 2004, limits the increase in the taxable value of homeowner's property to seven percent provided that the exemption may not exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2112 increased the Senior Homestead Exemption to Three Thousand Dollars, increased the income eligibility for Senior Freeze Exemption to Forty-five Thousand Dollars and increased the Home Improvement Exemption to Seventy-five Thousand Dollars; and

WHEREAS, The seven percent limitation on the increase in taxable value took effect beginning with 2003 property tax bills, was applied in 2004, and will be applied to 2005 property tax bills; and

WHEREAS, The City of Chicago supported a reduction in the assessment level for Class 3 (large apartment properties) at the Cook County Board; and

WHEREAS, The seven-percent limitation on the increase in taxable value will not apply to property tax bills for 2006 and beyond; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That we, the Mayor and members of the City Council of the City of Chicago, assembled this twenty-ninth day of March, 2006, do hereby urge the Illinois General Assembly and the Governor to extend until 2008 the seven-percent limitation on the increase in taxable value of a homeowner's property; and

Be It Further Resolved, That we urge the General Assembly to work with the City of Chicago to find an appropriate change to the law that would serve to include non-owner occupied Class 2 properties (small rental properties) in the seven-percent limitation; and

WHEREAS, On April 20, 2006, a small ceremony will mark the unveiling of a tombstone for Leonard Syler, a hero of this nation's Civil War, whose burial site was left unmarked for almost forty years; and

WHEREAS, Through the efforts of a relative who acts as the Syler family genealogist, Leonard Syler's valiant story has been recently brought to light. He was born as Leonhardt Sailer on September 21, 1834 in Hermaringen, a small town located in the Wuerttemberg district of southern Germany. At the age of sixteen, he came to the United States, disembarking in New York City and settling in Pennsylvania where he met and married Katherine Yingst. The couple lived in North Annville, Pennsylvania and by the time of the Battle of Gettysburg in 1863, they had three children, Lydia, John and Leonard, Jr.. On September 26 of that fateful year, he was conscripted for three years into military service and ironically assigned to the Pennsylvania Volunteers, 71st Regiment, Company E in the Army of the Potomac under General Ulysses S. Grant; and

WHEREAS, Leonard Syler received multiple wounds at the Battle of Cold Harbor in Hanover County, Virginia, one of the bloodiest conflicts of the war. Since his regiment had taken such severe casualties, it was withdrawn under cover of darkness and returned to Philadelphia where it was mustered out of service on July 2,1864. Of the 2200 who served in the 71<sup>st</sup> Regiment, only one hundred and fifty-three remained; and

WHEREAS, When Leonard Syler was well enough, he was reassigned to the Pennsylvania 69<sup>th</sup> Regiment as he still had not completed his three years of service. He rejoined his new regiment in time to fight in a skirmish at Reams Station, Virginia where he and others from his unit were taken prisoner by Confederate soldiers; and

WHEREAS, At the age of thirty-one, Leonard Syler returned to his family in Pennsylvania where four more children, George, Samuel, Katie and Annie, were born. In 1879, the Syler family moved to Colehour neighborhood in the Village of Hyde Park just south of what was then Chicago's southern border of 39<sup>th</sup> Street, where Leonard Syler went to work for the Iroquois Iron (that later became Iroquois Steel) Company and retired from there in 1901. He had applied for a military pension based on his Civil War service and had been denied, probably due to the confusion between his birth name and the Americanized appellation he used. When he reapplied immediately after his retirement, it was granted. He continued to reside at his Avenue M home until his death on August 11, 1916 at the age of eighty-two; and

WHEREAS, The Honorable John A. Pope, Alderman of the 10<sup>th</sup> Ward, has informed this august body of the remarkable saga of Leonard Syler; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved That we, the Mayor and members of the City of Chicago City Council, gathered here this twenty-ninth day of March, 2006 A.D., do hereby express our heartfelt gratitude for citizens such as Leonard Syler and commend those who have sought to honor him by marking his final resting place after more than four decades have passed since he was buried; and

CONGRATULATIONS EXTENDED TO RABBI HERMAN E. SCHAALMAN ON NINETIETH BIRTHDAY AND DECLARATION OF APRIL 28, 2006
AS "RABBI HERMAN E. SCHAALMAN NINETIETH BIRTHDAY TRIBUTE DAY IN CHICAGO".

WHEREAS, On Friday, April 28, 2006, his family, friends and followers are gathering to honor and pay tribute to Rabbi Herman Ezra Schaalman in celebration of his ninetieth birthday; and

WHEREAS, Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman was born in Munich, Germany, April 28, 1916. His perceptions, his respect for learning and his inspirited convictions were evident in his childhood and ultimately have given him a grasp of history beyond the reach of many; and

WHEREAS, Herman E. Schaalman graduated from Munich's Maximilian Gymnasium (High School) in 1935, and in the face of mounting turmoil, continued private studies and entered Berlin's Liberal Seminary. After only a few weeks, distracted by mayhem and increasing violence, the young student -- he would have been nineteen years old -- was somehow able to powerfully focus on his studies; as a result he was awarded a scholarship to the Hebrew Union College in Cincinnati, Ohio and was able to nurture his education and his life in completely different atmosphere. Many years later, in 1966, the Hebrew Union College, mindful of his singular accomplishments, would award him an honorary doctorate. There were to be several others; and

WHEREAS, In fulfilling the requirements for admission to seminary, Herman E. Schaalman attended the University of Cincinnati (B.A., 1935; M.A., 1937) and was ultimately ordained on May 24, 1941. The very next day, he married the former Lotte Stern, whom he had met the previous year; she, too, had fled Germany; and

WHEREAS, Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman spent the war years and after heading Temple Judah in Cedar Rapids, Iowa, where he guest-lectured at nearby Coe College and Cornell College, worked diligently for the Red Cross, served on the local War Board and hosted a radio program. He ultimately received a Distinguished Service Award from the Cedar Rapids Chamber of Commerce in recognition of his contributions; and

WHEREAS, Since his ordination, Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman has been unequalled as a spiritual leader and educator. In 1950, while he was director of the Chicago Federation of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, he accomplished what may be his proudest achievement. He established and, with many dear friends, helped to fund and continues a permanent retreat where both children and adults can be educated. The Olin-Sang-Ruby Union Institute in Oconomowoc, Wisconsin, still prospers as a haven for educating people of all ages; and

WHEREAS, In 1955, Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman came to Emanuel Congregation in Chicago's great Edgewater community, and almost immediately his presence was felt. He developed new programs, particularly in adult education, youth activities and worship. He was vital to the Reform movement, in which he so fervently believed, and to working with Chicago's civic and cultural organizations and many interfaith councils. He became a valued lecturer, sometimes single-handedly promoting interfaith activities. In 1957, his emphasis on education led him to

accept the Jewish Chautauqua Society's Resident Lectureship at Northwestern University's Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary in Evanston and at the Chicago Theological Seminary, where he has lectured continuously since. He has also taught or presented papers at DePaul University, North Park Theological Seminary, Barat College, Divine Word Seminary of Techny, Illinois and other institutions of higher learning. He is also a favored guest speaker at Jewish organizations nationwide; and

WHEREAS, The esteem Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman has earned and enjoys is international and ecumenical and without reserve. His own defining tributes have been the establishment of the Olin-Sang-Ruby Institute and having been elected president of the Central Conference of Reform Rabbis (in 1981). But we can all pick our favorites from among Rabbi Schaalman's many honors and awards. In 1991, this outstanding rabbi was presented with the Order of Merit, First Class, the highest civilian honor given by the Federal Republic of Germany; and

WHEREAS, In October, 2000, the Chicago Theological Seminary granted Rabbi Schaalman its prestigious Graham Taylor Award and recently announced the establishment of the Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman Chair in Jewish Studies in recognition of his enormous impact on theological students, pastors, rabbis and academics through many years of teaching in Jewish-Christian studies; and

WHEREAS, In May, 2002, Rabbi Schaalman was the recipient of the highest award given by the State of Illinois. In June, 2004, he received the Luminary Senior Award from the City of Chicago as he was inducted into the Chicago Senior Citizens Hall of Fame, and in September, 2004, the Chicago Park District dedicated a park in Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman's honor; and

WHEREAS, God has granted Rabbi Herman E. Schaalman a long life, great wisdom borne of perseverance and inspiration, admiration from practically everyone he meets and a loving family. Rules Suspended -- INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE URGED TO RECONSIDER PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO UNITED STATES TAX CODE CONCERNING USE AND DISCLOSURE OF PERSONAL TAXPAYER INFORMATION TO THIRD PARTIES.

A proposed resolution reading as follows:

WHEREAS, In December of 2005, the Internal Revenue Service (I.R.S.) announced plans to update the current United States Tax Code to address the privacy concerns of taxpayers who are, in increasing numbers, filing their federal taxes electronically as opposed to using the traditional paper filing system; and

WHEREAS, The I.R.S. has stated that it is specifically concerned about keeping individual tax return information out of the hands of third parties without the prior consent of the taxpayer; and

WHEREAS, In its current form, the Code does not allow for personal taxpayer information to be shared with other persons or companies unless the person or company is an "affiliated group" of the tax preparer as defined in the Code; and

WHEREAS, The I.R.S. is proposing amendments to Section 7216 of the Code

which governs the use and disclosure of information gathered by tax preparers; and

WHEREAS, Among these proposed amendments, the I.R.S. will give taxpayers the option of opting in to a service that would give tax preparers the permission to share or sell information gleaned from an individual's taxes to third parties; and

WHEREAS, Tax return information includes everything furnished to a tax preparer in order to properly prepare a customer's taxes, along with a taxpayer's notice of entitlement to a refund, and the amount of the refund; and

WHEREAS, Opting in to this service would allow companies to solicit taxpayers using financial information they cannot currently access under the Code; and

WHEREAS, Although there is a clear financial benefit that stands to be gained by tax preparers and third parties, there is conversely, no clear benefit to the taxpayer whose interests the I.R.S. is vowing to protect with the proposed amendments; and

WHEREAS, The City Council of the City of Chicago is concerned about the relationship of trust that is developed between the tax preparer and taxpayer, and how the changes to the Code leave open a great potential for abuse of this relationship; and

WHEREAS, The City Council is also concerned about the security of financial information once it is sold, in the wake of major security breaches at data brokers such as ChoicePoint of Atlanta, where computers that stored private information of consumers were hacked into and stolen; and

WHEREAS, The City Council is also concerned about protecting its most vulnerable population of taxpayers which include older taxpayers, the illiterate, and non-English speakers who a more likely to not understand fully the conditions to which they are consenting; now, therefore,

Be It Resolved, That we, the Mayor and the members of the City Council of the City of Chicago, assembled here this twenty-ninth day of March, 2006, do hereby request that the Internal Revenue Service reconsider its proposed amendments to the United States Tax Code concerning the use and disclosure of personal taxpayer information to third parties, and protect the privacy of taxpayers by removing this consent provision from its proposed amendments.
