Academic Achievement Chair Position Description

<u>Purpose</u>

The academic achievement chair develops high standards of chapter scholarship. Through the chapter's academic achievement program, she sets standards of scholastic excellence, develops programs and incentives to help chapter members fulfill their academic potential, and provides recognition for those who reach academic goals. Although no member can make another person do anything, the academic achievement chair must have leadership skills along with perception and initiative to create an atmosphere that is favorable for encouraging members to achieve academic excellence.

Duties and Responsibilities

- Serves as chair of the academic achievement committee and as a member of the programs council.
- Implements the chapter's academic achievement policy and program with the help of the academic achievement committee.
- Develops programs and activities for the chapter that will help each member achieve academic success.
- Appoints academic achievement committee members.
- Works with the new member orientation chair to help new members develop high scholarship.
- Gives special attention to members who are on academic probation, helping them improve their academic ranking and be released from probation.
- Ensures that the chapter's merit system reflects the importance of academic achievement.
- Keeps and reviews academic records of members for national honors and awards (e.g., Honor Key; All A's; etc.).
- Keeps records of members' goals, progress and general academic achievement.
- Promotes the Alpha Xi Delta Foundation scholarships and the Foundation's honors and awards.
- Provides for chapter academic achievement awards and recognition.
- Maintains communication with the chapter's advisors, the Area Facilitator, and the Academic Territory Director.
- Files requested reports on time with Area Facilitator or Fraternity Headquarters.
- Completes the academic section of the Annual Progress Report.



Below is an example of a good Academic Achievement program submitted in last year's APR submissions

- I. Academic Achievement Policy
 - a. Alpha Xi Delta National GPA requirement for membership
 - i. 2.5 college GPA
 - ii. 2.75 high school GPA
 - b. Kappa Chapter GPA to hold office
 - i. 3.0 cumulative or 3.0 semester, whichever is higher for Executive Committee and Academic Achievement Chairs.
 - ii. 2.75 cumulative or 2.75 semester, whichever is higher for officers.
- II. Academic Expectations
 - a. Study Hours
 - i. Required Study Hours
 - 1. 2.75-2.99 4 hours per week
 - 2. 2.5-2.74 5 hours per week
 - 3. Below 2.5 6 hours per week
 - 4. New members without a University GPA 3 hours per week
 - ii. How Study Hours Work
 - 1. Sisters will volunteer to proctor study hours (One merit point will be awarded for every 2 hours).
 - 2. Women on academic probation are required to attend at least 2 sessions a week, fulfilling their required study hours.
 - 3. Sessions will be held Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday and will last for 2 hours. For special circumstances, times and locations will be worked out on individual basis.
 - b. Consequences if less than 75% of semester study hours are completed.
 - i. Meeting with Academic Achievement Chairs to discuss study habits and personal academic goals.
 - ii. Sisters that have not completed at least 75% of the semesters study hours for the semester will not be eligible to attend semiformal/formal/Barn Dance.

- III. Awards and Incentives
 - a. For every semester, Sisters will be recognized for:
 - i. Most Improved GPA (private)
 - ii. Highest GPA (overall)
 - iii. Highest GPA per class
 - iv. Sisters will receive a gift card for their achievement and will receive appropriate merit points.
 - b. Skippy Jar
 - c. Study Tip of the Week
 - i. AACs will give one study tip at every chapter meeting. Tips can include scholarships information, add-and-drop deadlines, and study tips.
 - d. Have a balloon countdown for finals. At chapter, give every member a balloon for each final. Have sisters hang balloons outside their door and pop each balloon as they finish their exams.
- IV. Academic Probation
 - a. Academic probation is automatic if a member fails to maintain a 2.5 Cumulative GPA.
 - b. Fraternity Headquarters:
 - i. Probation of initiated or new members for academic reasons shall be for one term.
 - ii. If the member has not achieved a 2.5 Cumulative GPA at the end of the probation term, but has achieved a 2.5 GPA for the term, the probation will be extended one term at a time for up to one academic year (excluding summers) provided the member achieves at least a 2.5 GPA for each term of probation.
 - iii. When a member's Cumulative GPA is at or above 2.5, she is to be removed from probation.
 - iv. If her Cumulative GPA is not at least 2.5 by the end of the initial probation term plus all allowable extensions, her memberships is to be suspended.
 - c. While on academic probation, the member will be under the supervisions of the AACs, and will sign a contract outlining the terms of the probation.
 - d. Academic Probation Terms
 - i. Automatic Probation Terms:
 - Loss of office position if semester GPA is lower than 2.75 at midterms (3.0 for Executive Council and AAC)
 - 2. Loss of badge/Quill
 - 3. Loss of vote
 - 4. If Sister has an established Cumulative GPA, limited to 3 social events for the semester on probation.
 - 5. Allowed to attend formal/semi-formal/Barn Dance if 100% of study hours are completed.
 - ii. Chapter Probation Terms:
 - 1. Academic Counseling

- a. Twice a month
- b. Provide AAC with current grades on exams, quizzes, papers, etc.
- c. Turn in midterm grades at midterm meeting.
- 2. Study Hours increased when necessary, to be determined by AAC.
- e. Academic Watch
 - i. This will occur if a Sister's Cumulative GPA is between a 2.5 and a 2.75
 - 1. Will meet with AAC at the start of the semester and at midterms to discuss grades, goals, and study habits.
- V. New Member Academic Achievement Program
 - a. New members have 3 study hours per week to complete, if without a Cumulative GPA.
 - b. New members who are upperclassmen and have below a 3.0 GPA will also be required to complete study hours.
 - c. Attend one of the first new member meetings to discuss and explain the Academic Achievement Plan.
- VI. Scholarships and Financial Aid
 - a. Alpha Xi Delta Fraternity Scholarship opportunities
 - i. Scholarships are all applied for with one application (either collegiate member or alumnae application). Applications for the following academic year must be postmarked by March 15. The application is available online at www.alphaxidelta.org.
 - b. University of Illinois related scholarships and Financial Aid
 - i. Sisters will be made aware of scholarship opportunities if they are applicable.

 - i. Study files
 - 1. Maintain a document that lists the classes other Sisters have taken in the past to be used for a mentoring program.
 - ii. Professor/Class Ratings
 - 1. Maintain a document which has girls' ratings on their past professors and classes by overall experience and workload.

 - ii. Leadership workshops
 - iii. Writers' Workshop

Academic Criteria

Alpha Xi Delta Fraternity outlines criteria in the *Constitution and Bylaws,* Thirty-First Edition, 2009, regarding academic standing that all chapters and members across the country must follow. Below is abridged information regarding these criteria:

Individual Member Academic Criteria

Eligibility for Membership

A collegiate woman is eligible for membership provided she:

- 1. Is a regularly registered student
- 2. She has earned:
 - a. A minimum high school cumulative grade point average of 2.75 (on a 4.0 scale) if she does not have any collegiate record; or
 - b. A minimum collegiate cumulative grade point average of 2.5 (on a 4.0 scale) if she has a collegiate record.

However, if she has a documented learning disability and does not meet Alpha Xi Delta's minimum grade requirements, exceptions to those requirements may be granted by the Area Facilitator or National Council's designee.

Active Collegiate Status

Initiated members can remain active collegiates if:

- 1. They are regularly registered in the college or university where they were initiated
- 2. When transferring, request affiliation, after clearance from their initiating chapter
- 3. Chapter bylaws permit active membership post four academic years at the time of the member's initiation
- 4. They return to campus as an undergraduate where they were initiated after an absence of two or more consecutive terms (excluding summer terms) by providing written notification at the beginning of the term
- 5. They are graduate students who were initiated as graduate students
- They are graduate students continuing in the college or university where they were initiated who request continuing membership and are granted that by a minimum 7/8ths ballot vote of the college chapter members present and voting
- 7. They are married and still regularly enrolled and fulfill all financial obligations

Voluntary Inactive Collegiate Status

A member may be granted voluntary inactive status for up to one year if they are:

- 1. Participating in a program sponsored by the college or university which would preclude chapter involvement (e.g. internships, student teaching, studying abroad, nursing clinical)
- 2. Academic load

Member Probation

Automatic Probations: Academic

Failure to reach and maintain at least a 2.5 cumulative grade point average on a 4.0 scale or its equivalent.

 If a chapter member has a documented learning disability and does not meet Alpha Xi Delta's minimum grade requirements, exceptions for those grade requirements may be granted by National Council or its designee.

Probation Terms

- 1. Probation of initiated or new members for academic reasons shall be for one term.
- 2. If the member has not achieved a 2.5 cumulative Grade Point Average at the end of the probation term but has achieved a 2.5 Grade Point Average *for the term*, the probation will be extended one term at a time for up to one academic year (excluding summers) provided the member achieves at least a 2.5 Grade Point Average for each term of probation.
- 3. When a member's cumulative Grade Point Average is at or above 2.5, she is to be removed from probation.
- 4. If her cumulative Grade Point Average is not at least 2.5 by the end of the initial probation term plus all allowable extensions, her membership is to be suspended.

Status of a Collegiate Member on Probation

- 1. She shall be under the supervision of the party imposing probation. She shall be given a written statement of the reasons for the probation and the stipulations for release from probation.
- 2. Her new member pin or badge shall be surrendered.
- 3. She may not be slated for, elected to, appointed to, or installed in an office.
- 4. If already in office, she will relinquish her office for the remainer of that election year.
- 5. She shall not have voice, make a motion or vote.
- 6. She shall be ineligible to receive any Fraternity, chapter or association award.

Chapter Academic Criteria

General Chapter Requirements: Academic Achievement

Chapter scholarship shall be considered satisfactory when it meets the all women's average (or if the all women's average is not published, the all undergraduate average), the Panhellenic average or a 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, whichever is the lowest.

Failure to meet this standard will result in the chapter being placed on *Not in Good Standing* status.

- Obtained a cumulative grade point average of at least a 3.5 on a 4.0 scale (or equivalent) for 3½ years of academic work in college
- Contributed to the advancement of her chapter
- Participated in campus activities

Collegiate members must apply for this award. Applications can be found in The Blue Room under Chapter Officers, under Awards and Recognition.

Scholarship Dangle Program

Awarded to collegiate members who achieve a 4.0 term grade point average (or its equivalent) each academic term.

Pearl Dangle Program

Awarded to collegiate members who achieve a 3.99-3.5 term grade point average (or its equivalent) each academic term.

Additional information regarding the scholarship and pearl dangle program will be provided in the February/March Academic Achievement Chair e-newsletter.

The National Fraternity, in conjunction with the Academic Team, also provides academic recognition for chapters once a year during its award process. Academic award opportunities include:

Programming/Incentives Idea Brainstorm

A very thorough list of program/incentive ideas can be found in the Academic Achievement Manual.

Here are some:

Outline & Notes Files – each chapter saves outlines, notes etc. that the women created so other women can use them as guides.

Sample Resume Files – sample resumes can easily be found online.

Academic Achievement Policy – highlighted someplace visible (GIN System, Chapter Bulletin Board)

Academic Outings – create some optional outings to the library, free seminars, etc. for merit points.

Chapter Roster with Major – make sure your chapter roster includes each member's area of study

ALPHA XI Section of Library – create a designated "Alpha Xi Table" at a common study area on campus

New Member Academic Information – in each of the new member's notebooks, create an Academic Section with information on counselors, library information, tutorial assistance, Alpha Xi Academic Policy, etc. Also have information for on campus grief counselors, therapists, etc. Balloons on Doors – give out balloons during finals/mid-terms to be placed on each member's door representing the number of exams. Once an exam is completed, they get to pop the balloon!

Professor Dinner – allow women to invite their favorite professor over for a formal dinner. Creates a great positive Greek image!

SNAPS at Meeting – recognize women who consistently shine academically, recognize women who make a significant improvement. Hand out a reward each semester: manicure, pedicure, gift certificate, massage, etc.

Scholarship Information – post all available scholarships in a common area (chapter room) so it is available to all.


