A Call to Action from the Executive Director

I SHARE WITH EACH OF YOU A COMMITMENT to protecting and stewarding our region's natural areas for future generations. None is more important than Forest Park, which sits like a fulcrum in a region intertwined by a system of trails, open spaces and parks. Its 5,156 acres contribute to our clean air, clean water and quality of life. The City Club of Portland, which helped establish the park over 60 years ago with the help of city visionaries, released their report in June of this year on the current state of Forest Park. It affirmed the Conservancy's message: the park is at risk. The Conservancy stands with a cadre of partners in calling for a renewed commitment from the city of Portland and its regional partners. It is no longer "okay" to simply balance the competing demands on Forest Park; we will balance it right out of existence if that is our course of action. No, we must step up and embrace the privilege and the obligation of stewardship of this jewel and the vast 30,000 acres of regional natural areas, trails and parks that extend from its wide green embrace. Every generation has had to realign itself around the promise that Forest Park represents; now it is our turn. Just as civic leaders asserted the value of setting aside the west hills six decades ago, so it is our responsibility to champion Forest Park's health and invest in its restoration so that six decades from now, when most of us will be long gone, others may appreciate Forest Park as a place of exquisite refuge and recreation.

Forest Park Conservancy's Ancient Forest Preserve

STEPHEN HATFIELD Stewardship Director, Forest Park Conservancy

owns a 38-acre private parcel several miles north of Forest Park known as the Ancient Forest Preserve. The property was acquired in 1993 thanks to the generous contributions of over 5,000 donors responding to the "Adopt an old growth tree" campaign launched by Friends of Forest Park.

On the property, 29 of the 38 acres are mature Douglas-fir forest that has never been cut, although significant portions of the parcel were impacted by a wildfire in the mid-1800s. The remaining 9

acres were logged and replanted in 1990, along with the adjacent land to the north that is now owned by Metro.

Over the past several years, The Forest Park Conservancy's field crew has worked to take care of the property, maintaining the 0.7 mile trail through the preserve and removing non-native invasive species including English holly (Ilex aquifolium) and Himalayan blackberry (Rubus discolor).

The Forest Park Conservancy hosts regular guided tours of the Ancient Forest Preserve from August through November.
A pair of bald eagles has nested on the property since 1998, and January through July represents a sensitive time for re-establishing the nest, breeding, and fledging. President's Perspective

In addition, the Conservancy signed a significant collaboration agreement between the Conservancy and Portland Parks and Recreation. This agreement establishes a collaborative mission to work toward a healthier Forest Park. We thank Commissioner Nick Fish and Parks Director Zari Santner, our colleagues at PP&R, the City Club of Portland, our supporters, and volunteers for a great year and a strong foundation for the future.

We can do this, but it will require the shared efforts of many. Fortunately, we're not alone.

The Power of Partnerships

financial services company – has helped customers secure their financial futures. The company has offices across the country but was founded in Portland, Oregon, and has deep roots in the community. The Standard has long partnered with nonprofits to strengthen the communities where its' employees and customers live, work and play.

The strong partnership with the Forest Park Conservancy, based on a unique shared history with Forest Park, is a perfect example.

Garnett "Ding" Cannon, past president of The Standard, was instrumental in helping establish Forest Park more than 60 years ago. Working with other community leaders, Mr. Cannon was a strong force behind the initial City Club report that created the necessary impetus to set aside the park. Much has changed since then, including the kinds of pressures faced by Forest Park, but one thing has remained constant: the commitment of employees at all levels of The Standard. For decades now, employees have volunteered to work in the park, combating invasive plants and supporting trail maintenance efforts. Most recently, during a Day of Caring, key officers of the company – including president and CEO Greg Ness – spent half a day building a turnpike on Wildwood trail and removing invasives.

To enhance those efforts, Mr. Ness announced a three-year comprehensive partnership with the Forest Park Conservancy in September 2009. The partnership included a donation of \$150,000 to FPC to maintain the park, raise awareness about current pressures and help grow the membership base. Additionally, The Standard committed to quarterly Days of Caring and pledged 1,500 volunteer hours – focused on 60 acres in need of stewardship – were pledged, tapping into the generous volunteer spirit of employees. To date, 83 individuals have worked more than 250 hours toward this goal.

The Standard has a unique shared history with Forest Park, a legacy of actively supporting the community and a business approach grounded in managing for the long term. As a result, there is a strong impetus to continually strengthen partnerships with stakeholder groups – such as The Forest Park Conservancy – committed to preserving this local treasure for current and future generations.




Annual Growth Comparison



The Conservancy is pleased to share with our many generous and steadfast contributors that we ended FY10 solidly in the black by being attentive, accountable stewards of your donations and grants. Our income of \$428,064 represents 16% increase over last year against expenses of \$430,062 which represent only a 5% increase.
