

Overview of Parish Religious Education Week

Every day of the week some type of religious education activity is going on in a parish somewhere in the United States and its territories. As the hub of lifelong faith formation, the parish – both the people and the place – weaves together essential strands within the fabric of effective Catholic education. NCEA's annual Parish Religious Education Week celebration highlights the vital role of parish in fulfilling the Church's mission of evangelization and catechesis.

What is it?

A team of parish and diocesan catechetical leaders from across the country worked with NCEA staff to design an annual celebration of the diversity of parish catechetical efforts while also complementing existing celebrations of Catholic education. While taking the initial steps to launch this celebration as a single organization, NCEA plans to expand and strengthen the effort over time, including working with other organizations focused on religious education and faith formation.

Goals for the first few years of the new celebration include:

- Honoring those serving in parish religious education
- Sharing the contributions parish communities are making to sound education in the Catholic faith
- Helping build bridges between Catholic parish and school educational programs as well as other entities that provide religious instruction and ongoing faith formation.

During this week, NCEA encourages people across the country to engage in at least one activity aimed at achieving these goals. This celebration guide offers activity suggestions drawn from contributors from around the country. The guide is available free of charge for this inaugural year as a gift from NCEA during the Year of Faith.

When is it?

The development team established the week Sunday of November as the annual beginning for Parish Religious Education Week. This week was selected for two primary reasons: the proximity to the liturgical celebration of the communion of saints and the likelihood that parishes will be well into formal programing by that point in the year. The guide is written to allow flexibility to schedule a local celebration that best fits the needs of the adults, youth, and children engaged in the faith formation and religious education in the parish community. For example, the dioceses in New England celebrate all of November as Religious Education Month.

Why start now?

The idea of a national celebration of parish religious education has surfaced repeatedly among catechetical leaders for decades. Three key factors prompting the first celebration in 2013 are:

Timing: The Year of Faith, the anniversaries of Vatican II, and the publication of the Catechism of the Catholic Church all focus on intentional, lifelong catechesis of all the baptized. The parish is essential to this work. Now is an an opportune time for NCEA to highlight parishes more visibly, especially since January 2014 will mark the 40th celebration of National Catholic Schools Week.

Mission: "Catechetical pedagogy will be effective to the extent that the Christian community becomes the point of concrete reference for the faith journey of individuals. This happens when the community is proposed as a source, locus and means of catechesis. Concretely, the community becomes a visible place of faith-witness. It provides for the formation of its members. It receives them as the family of God. It constitutes itself as the living and permanent environment for faith growth" General Directory for Catechesis, no. 158.

Numbers: In the framework of lifelong catechesis, parishes carry the majority of the responsibility for formal catechetical activity. According to the 2013 Official Catholic Directory, 17,990 parishes in the United States are centers for the ongoing religious education and faith formation for 69.4 million Catholics. More than 4 million children and youth, about two-thirds of Catholic young people enrolled in catechetical programs in the United States, receive formal religious education through parish-based efforts.

How to celebrate along with NCEA?

Faith communities across the country are encouraged to celebrate the parish "as the living and permanent environment for faith growth" (General Directory for Catechesis, no. 158) when and how it best fits the local situation. A basic way anyone can join in the celebration is to praise God for giving the world the Good News of Jesus Christ and entrusting the Church with the mission of proclaiming him through who we are, what we teach, and how we exercise discipleship through participation in parishes.

This celebration guide outlines seven suggestions for activities - or a "week" of ideas - to mark the occasion through parish-based catechetical efforts or by participating in national events. The guiding theme is *Encountering Christ Every Day* ~ *Encuentro con Cristo cada día*. Additional ideas may be drawn from <u>Catechetical Sunday 2013</u> (Year of Faith: Open the Door of Faith) or the Year of Faith <u>International Conference on Catechesis</u> and Day for Catechists in Rome (The Catechist: A Witness of Faith).

Consider starting this year with an eye toward building on these efforts over time. Here is a sample preparation timeline:

September 2013 Familiarize yourself with the reason for the celebration and then **Plan** when and how the local community will celebrate parish catechesis

October 2013 Promote the parish celebration

November 2013 Celebrate, making sure to record the event (s) in photos, videos, print, or other media and sharing the experiences with the whole parish community as well as the diocese and NCEA

December 2013...... Review the celebration including gathering feedback from participants and generating ideas for future activities

May all we do to advance the Church's mission of evangelization and catechesis glorify God as we celebrate encountering Christ every day.

A Week of Ideas for Celebrating Parish Religious Education

There are as many different ways to celebrate the parish for her efforts in deepening and handing on the Catholic faith as there are parish faith communities and people in them. Use these seven ideas during Parish Religious Education Week 2013 to spark local creativity. Samples and background information for various activities are included as appendices to this guide or as hyperlinks.

- 1. **WORSHIP:** Include special intentions in the prayers of the faithful during Sunday mass and in daily masses throughout the week [Appendix A].
- 2. **INFORM:** Offer a special in-service about the goals and important concerns being addressed in parish religious education programs for parish advisory groups such as the pastoral council, faith formation committee, or Catholic school board [Appendix B].

Example: On Monday, November 4 at 2-3 pm ET and 7-8 pm ET, NCEA's Boards and Councils Department and Religious Education Department will offer a free webinar focusing on "The Role of Advisory Groups in Effective Catechetical Planning." Check NCEA's website in early October for more details and to register.

3. **PRAY:** Begin regularly scheduled faith formation/religious education sessions with a special prayer service [Appendix C].

Example: Start a family sacramental preparation session with "A Prayer for Family Commitment" from the USCCB Catechetical Sunday 2013 resources.

4. **HONOR:** Recognize local leaders of parish catechesis for their work on behalf of the faith community, especially the pastor and director or coordinator of religious education programs [Appendix D & E].

Example: On Parish Catechetical Leader Appreciation Day – Wednesday, November 6 –gift your local leaders with the <u>"Open the Door of Faith" pin and reflection journal</u> available from the National Conference for Catechetical Leadership.

- 5. **TELL:** Share the good news about what the parish has done, and is doing, to form and educate people of all ages in the Catholic faith and Christian discipleship [Appendix B & F]. Example: The Diocese of Rockville Centre produced a <u>video</u> about how families and the parish are working together to catechize children.
- 6. **STUDY:** Create and distribute a scripture study guide focused on sharing the Good News. Example: New England "Celebrate Religious Education 2012" Guide p. 11-12.
- 7. **SERVE:** Express the interrelated nature of parish catechesis by connecting various aspects of the community in serving with and for one another, such as organizing a service day or connecting parish and Catholic school learners who utilize the same space.

Example: NCEA will be conducting a social media campaign throughout the week that will include stories of how Catholic schools and parishes are working together. Join us on <u>Facebook</u> and Twitter (MCEALDahlhoff or @NCEATalk).

Appendix A: Sample Mass Intentions Highlighting Parish Catechesis

Special Terminology

Catechesis [kat-i-kee-sis] = "an education of children, young people, and adults in the faith of the Church through the teaching of Christian doctrine in an organic and systematic way to make them disciples of Jesus Christ." *Catechism of the Catholic Church,* Glossary

Catechetical Leaders [kat-i-ket-i-kuh | lee-ders] = men and women who exercise a leadership role for catechesis in a parish or Catholic school working under the guidance of the pastor and in collaboration with the local bishop. *National Directory of Catechesis*, Chapter 8

Evangelization [ih-van-juh-lahy-zay-shuh-n] = "the proclamation of Christ and his Gospel by word and the testimony of life, in fulfillment of Christ's command." *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, Glossary

Role of the Parish in Catechesis

The entire parish community is responsible for catechesis. Most people's primary experience of the Church is the parish. The parish is "the living and permanent environment for growth in the faith. The parish energizes the faithful to carry out Christ's mission by spiritual, moral, and material support for the regular and continuing catechetical development of the parishioners." National Directory of Catechesis, USCCB, no. 60



Appendix C: Prayer Reflection on the Road to Emmaus

LEADER GUIDE

Setting the sacred space for praying with adults or families: bible, lit candle, music playing softly in background, project a <u>prepared slideshow</u> with responses or print prayer guide for participants

Gathering

Leader: In our baptism each of us is called be a catechist, an "echoer" of Christ. Some have answered the call to formal parish catechetical ministry, taking on the special role of partnering with learners, families, parents and the church community to form God's People in faith and in a spirit of great joy. In thanksgiving for their loving commitment and for each one of us, we gather in the name of Jesus Christ to listen to and reflect upon the story of The Road to Emmaus.

All: In the name of the Father... [make Sign of the Cross]

Reading from Sacred Scripture Luke 24:13 - 35 The Road to Emmaus A reading from the holy gospel according to Luke...The Word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God.

Reflecting and Responding

Leader: This Gospel reading is in many ways a source of inspiration for those who form others in faith and proclaim the Good News in their daily lives. As we reflect on select verses, I ask you to join in the response thus affirming your commitment to growing in faith for yourself and others.

Leader: "Jesus himself approached them and walked with them."

All: As a child of God I, too, am on a journey -- my own faith journey. Although at times I may not recognize Christ's presence, I pray that I may be open to Christ's eternal presence and walk in His light.

Leader: "He went and stayed with them."

All: In Baptism and Confirmation I receive and am sealed with the gifts of the Holy Spirit. May God continue to find a dwelling place in my heart.

Leader: "When he was at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them." All: Strengthened by the precious Body and Blood of Christ, may I be a source of nourishment to those I serve and love.

Leader: "They recounted what happened and how they recognized him in the breaking of the bread."

All: As the hearts of the Emmaus-walkers burned within them so long ago, I, too, experience the source of warmth and light when I recognize Christ present among us. May my words and actions reflect my fidelity to the Gospel, and may I lead others to witness to Jesus.

We ask this through the power of the Blessed Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.
Amen.

While functions vary from parish to parish, "parish catechetical leaders are not simply administrators or general pastoral ministers. The need for systematic training and study should not be minimized. They are catechists first. They should continue their personal, spiritual, and professional development and participate in diocesan programs of inservice training and formation, catechetical institutes, conventions, retreats, and accredited programs."

- Recruit, form, develop continually, and evaluate catechists
- ♣ Implement diocesan and parish policies and guidelines, including safety and protection of minors
- Collaborate with pastor, other parish ministers, and advisory bodies
- Assist in liturgical planning
- ❖ Attend to own personal, spiritual, and professional development

Basic Qualifications

- ♣ Fully initiated, practicing Catholic in good standing with the Church
- Prepared for service including advanced studies in a variety of areas such as theology and catechesis
- Practical catechetical experience with adults, youth, and children
- ❖ Comprehensive knowledge of the General Directory for Catechesis and Catechism of the Catholic Church

Signs of Parish Support for the Catechetical Leader

- Clear, specific work agreement listing position responsibilities and equitable compensation
- Treated as a full member of the parish pastoral staff, including attending meetings and annual evaluation
- Allocation of adequate resources, including funding and access to consistent advisory committees


Provide opportunities to develop the competence and skills necessary for effective leadership and thorough knowledge of the faith, including time and funding for professional development

Appendix F: Tips for Sharing Good News from Parish Religious Education

- ❖ Start with what you are doing now. Present a brief summary of what is currently going on in the parish's faith formation and religious instruction programming. What works? What has been improved or expanded in the last few years? Show the numbers and, when possible, the faces of those participating in formal programs sponsored through the parish.
- ◆ Determine your audiences. Figure out what audiences you need to reach within the parish and beyond. For most parishes, those include parishioners, parents, guardians, current and prospective students, grandparents, potential volunteers, new community residents, and community leaders.
- ◆ Craft key messages. Determine messages that will resonate with each audience and what you want them to do as a result, such as pray for those involved in sacramental preparation, enroll or keep their children in the parish religious education program, sign up for an adult bible study, be trained as a catechist, or provide volunteer support. For example, parents of prospective students may want high-quality, faith-based education that also incorporates web tools for families so emphasize in your story-telling how your programs meets those desires.
- → **Develop tactics.** Determine how you will reach each audience with your messages. Tactics include newsletters, online postings, YouTube videos, radio campaigns, and yard signs. You can also use personal contact and social media. Another tool is special events, such as open houses, educational seminars or parish gatherings. You can reach into the community by organizing service projects, setting up student displays in public spaces, and arranging for student musical and drama groups to participate in festivals.
- ♣ Put it all together in a plan. For each audience, list the tactics you will use to achieve your goals and objectives. Specify who is responsible for each task, what resources are needed and when each task will be completed. Review your plan to make sure that it's doable with the people and resources available, that it will help you achieve your goals, and that it will enhance your parish's evangelizing and catechizing mission.


