Television Coverage

Michigan has a 111-21-3 record in season openers.

Openers on the Road

This will be the 13th road opener for the Wolverines in the past 50 years and just the 23rd in the 136-year history of the program. Michigan has a 16-5-1 record when opening the season on the road.

Michigan vs. Pac-12 Conference

U-M has compiled a 44-23-1 record against Pac-12 schools; member of the conference at the time the game was played.

U-M's 2015 Opposition

Michigan's opponents combined for an 88-67 (.568) record in 2014 and eight schools played in bowl games.

109th Season of Big Ten Action

- Michigan is in its 109th season of competition in the Big Ten Conference.
- The Wolverines have compiled an impressive 485-198-18 record in conference play and have claimed a league-leading 42 championships.
- U-M also leads the conference with 402 first-team All-Big Ten selections.

U-M In 136th Season of Gridiron Action

- The Wolverine program was established in 1879 when a group of 13 men fielded the first football team in school history and played a pair of off-campus games. U-M defeated Racine 1-0 at White Stocking Park in Chicago, Ill., on May 30, 1879, for the first victory in school history. The Wolverines tied Toronto 0-0 in Detroit to finish the year 1-0-1.
- U-M enters its 132nd year of uninterrupted gridiron action, with 1882 being the only season that the program did not play any varsity games.
- The Wolverines are the sixth-oldest football program in NCAA history.

Season Openers

- The Wolverines have compiled a 111-21-3 record in season openers.
- Michigan head coaches have compiled a 14-3-1 record in their first game at the helm of the program.
- Only two other Michigan coaches began their Michigan tenures on the road. Bennie Oosterbaan defeated Michigan State in 1948 (13-7) and Gary Moeller lost to Notre Dame in 1990 (28-24).
- U-M opens the season with a true road game for the first time since 1998. At that time, the defending national champions played at Notre Dame, losing a 36-20 affair in South Bend, Ind. The only other non-season opener played away from Ann Arbor at that time, coming in the 2012 Cowboys Classic game against Alabama in Arlington, Texas.
- Head Coach Jim Harbaugh is 9-2 in season openers as a college and professional head coach. He compiled a 2-1 record at the University of San Diego and a 3-1 mark at Stanford University. Harbaugh posted a 4-0 record with the San Francisco 49ers in openers.

Michigan's Road Openers

- The Utah game will be Michigan's 13th road opener in the past 50 years and the 23rd all-time for the program.
- Michigan has opened up on the road 22 times in the past 135 years, compiling a 16-5-1 record in those games.
- This will be the Wolverines first road opener against a Pac-10/Pac-12 team since 1957. The Wolverines traveled to Los Angeles and defeated Southern California by a score of 16-6.
- This will be the Wolverines' fourth match-up with a Pac-10/Pac-12 team in its road opener; Michigan is 3-0 in those previous games, defeating USC (16-6 in 1957), Washington (14-0 in 1954) and California (41-0 in 1940).

Utah Series

- This will be the fourth meeting between the Wolverines and Utes.
- Michigan will be making its first visit to Salt Lake City and Rice-Eccels Stadium.
- Utah maintains a 2-1 advantage in the series, including victories in the past two games (2008 and 2014).
- Michigan won the inaugural match-up, a 10-7 affair at Michigan Stadium during the 2002 season.
- Michigan's last game in the Mountain Time Zone was the 2013 Buffalo Wild Wings Bowl in Tempe, Arizona.
- Michigan will be opening the season against a Pacific-12 Conference team for the first time since 2002. The Wolverines hosted Washington in a match-up of top 15 teams and claimed a last-second 31-29 victory on a field goal at the buzzer.
- Michigan has two players that hail from the state of Utah: fullback Sione Houma and defensive tackle Bryan Mone. Both are from Salt Lake City and prepped at Highland High School.

Michigan vs. Pacific-12 Schools

- The Wolverines are 44-23-1 all-time against Pacific-12 schools at the time the game was played.
- U-M has posted an impressive 34-12-1 mark against Pac-12 schools during the regular season, including a 25-6-1 home record and a 10-6 road mark.
- Michigan has posted a 9-11 mark against the Pac-12 in bowl games (19 Rose Bowl games and a Bluebonnet Bowl victory over UCLA).

The 2015 Schedule

- Michigan's 2015 opponents had a combined record of 160-60 (.727) during the 2014 season.
- U-M will play eight teams that played in bowl game during the 2014 season: Utah (Las Vegas), BYU (Miami Beach), Maryland (Foster Farms), Michigan State (Cotton), Minnesota (Citrus), Rutgers (Quick Lane), Penn State (Pinstripe), Ohio State (Sugar/College Football Playoff).
- Five of the seven teams in the Big Ten East Division played in bowl games last year.
- The Wolverines crossover opponents in the Big Ten West Division this season are Indiana and Minnesota.

2015 MICHIGAN RECORD WHEN

- The Utah game will be the first of three road night games for the Wolverines. The 2015 team will play its Big Ten opener at Maryland and will travel to Minnesota for a Halloween night game in Minneapolis.
- The Wolverines will host rivals Michigan State and Ohio State at Michigan Stadium for the first time since 1967.
- Michigan will not face a team from the Mid-American Conference for the first time 2012 and for just the second time in the past 15 seasons.
- All four non-conference opponents from the western half of the United States: Utah, Oregon State, UNLV and BYU.

The Team, The Team, The Team

- The Wolverines return 14 total starters (players who made six or more starts in 2014).
- U-M has eight returning starters on defense: LB Joe Bolden, S Jeremy Clark, DT Ryan Glasgow, DT Willie Henry, CB Jourdan Lewis, LB James Ross, FS Jarrod Wilson, DT Chris Wormley.
- Michigan returns six players on the offensive side of the ball, including four offensive linemen: OG/OT Ben Braden, OT Mason Cole, WR Amara Darboh, C/OG Graham Glasgow, RB Derrick Green and OG Kyle Kalis.
- Michigan had three players join the program as graduate students: defensive back Wayne Lyons (Stanford), punter Blake O'Neill (Weber State) and quarterback Jake Rudock (Iowa)
- Tailback Ty Isaac is eligible to compete for the Wolverines after sitting out last season after transferring from Southern California.
- U-M has players on the roster from 23 different states this season, including 50 players from the state of Michigan and 23 from the neighboring state of Ohio.
- O'Neill is the lone international player on the roster, joining the Maize and Blue from Australia via Weber State.
- The 2015 roster includes seven players whose fathers played football at the University of Michigan: Jack Dunaway (Craig Dunaway), Allen Gant (Tony Gant), Joe Hewlett (Rich Hewlett), Jon Runyan Jr. (Jon Runyan Sr.), Jack and Jared Wangler (John Wangler) and Tyrone Wheatley Jr. (Tyrone Wheatley Sr.).

Offense:

- Senior fullbacks Joe Kerridge and Sione Houma return to lead the way for a corps of running backs in 2015. The duo paved the way for Michigan's running attack that gained 1,954 yards (162.8 yards per contest).
- Derrick Green returns healthy in 2015. In just six games a year ago, Green rushed 82 times for 471 yards (5.7 avg.) and tallied three rushing touchdowns.
- Despite starting just two games in 2014, De'Veon Smith rushed for a team-high 519 yards on 108 carries (4.8 avg.). He led the Wolverines with six rushing touchdowns and posted only 17 lost yards on those 108 attempts.
- Jake Butt looks to lead a tight end corps that

includes fellow veterans A.J. Williams, Khalid Hill and Michael Jocz. The group also welcomes firstyear players Ian Bunting and Tyrone Wheatley along with Henry Poggi and Chase Winovich, converted defensive players from the spring. • The offense boasts a more seasoned line with

- The offense boasts a more seasoned line with 77 starts by five players expected to be big factors in 2015. Five offensive linemen have double-digit starts in their careers: Graham Glasgow (24), Kyle Kalis (16), Erik Magnuson (13), Mason Cole (12), Ben Braden (12).
- Seniors Jehu Chesson and Amara Darboh will give quarterbacks Shane Morris and Jake Rudock a couple of big-bodied targets. Darboh hauled in 36 receptions for 473 yards and two touchdowns a season ago, each good for second on the team behind Devin Funchess. Chesson had 14 receptions for 144 yards.

Jim Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in University of Michigan football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30. He becomes the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh comes to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC Champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only match-up of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved each of his four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game, and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, to claim the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The

Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League Championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

He began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. Harbaugh spent eight years as

an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA National Championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for over 12 years. Harbaugh won the *Chicago Tribune* Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first-team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top-12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.


