<u>The Pro Football Archives</u> –Tod Maher's site has tons of information on professional football's past (scores, rosters, standings...). His compilation of game scores was instrumental in putting together FootballGeography.com's pro football locations index.

<u>Pro-Football-Reference.com</u> – The folks at PFR have put together the best professional football reference site in the business. PFR has complete standings, yearly statistics, and scores for every NFL game ever played; and box scores going back to 1940. Their Play Index is the most powerful suite of football research tools available.

<u>Ghosts of the Gridiron</u> – John Fenton's website explores Philadelphia's early professional football history. Fenton's website is one of the best sources of early professional football history; with tons of game scores, rosters, and newspaper clippings.

<u>Roy Sye's Personal website</u> – Roy Sye is a well-respected professional football researcher who specializes in the game's early history. His website features games scores you can't find anywhere else.

<u>Pro Football Researchers Association</u> – The PFRA digitizes all of the articles published in *The Coffin Corner*. These articles provide a lot of hard-to-find information on pro football's history. Some of the best researchers of pro football history have contributed to this publication.

<u>Lucky Show List</u> – Paul S. Luchter's website is a sort of sports grab bag of hard-to-find facts and history. His research on early professional football in New York City was especially helpful in compiling my own research.

<u>DaytonTriangles.com</u> – A website dedicated to the Dayton Triangles; an NFL franchise from 1920-29.

<u>RockIslandIndependents.com</u> – A website dedicated to the Rock Island Independents; an NFL franchise from 1920-25.
