MCCAIN LEADS OVER OBAMA, CLINTON AMONG VIRGINIA VOTERS

Likely Republican presidential nominee John McCain holds a clear lead over Barack Obama among registered voters in Virginia. The general election match-up finds 44% of registered voters prefer McCain compared with 36% for Obama, the Democratic front-runner. If Hillary Clinton is the Democratic nominee, the figures are similar; 47% prefer McCain while 38% prefer Clinton. These findings are part of a new state-wide survey conducted by Virginia Commonwealth University. The Commonwealth Poll was conducted by telephone with 1,003 adults and 852 registered voters from May 12-18, 2008. The margin of error for the poll is plus or minus 3 percentage points for all respondents and 4 percentage points for registered voters.

"Many political observers have been looking at Virginia as a potentially tight general election race," said Cary Funk, Ph.D., director of the Commonwealth Poll and associate professor of the L. Douglas Wilder School of Government and Public Affairs. "Despite the recent success of Democratic candidates such as Tim Kaine in 2005 and U.S. Senator Jim Webb in 2006, the presidential race in Virginia at present is looking mostly like years gone by," Funk said.

McCain holds a strong lead in the more rural areas of the state including the northwest and western areas and a 9-point lead in the Tidewater area. In vote-rich Northern Virginia, Obama has a slight edge over McCain (41% to 36%). Obama also leads by 43% to 39% for McCain in the south central area, a region which includes Richmond. The figures for both regions are within the margin of sampling error for the difference between candidates.

McCain garners 44% to Obama's 34% among independents who are registered to vote. Registered Republicans support McCain over Obama by a wide margin; 81% for McCain to just 6% for Obama. Older voters, ages 65 and older, also show strong support for McCain. Among registered voters under age 65, nearly equal portions side with each candidate.

Registered Democrats strongly support Obama (71%) over McCain (14%) in the general election. As expected, Obama has the support of nearly all African-Americans in the state. Obama does a bit better with highly educated voters, those with some post-graduate education; among this group, 41% prefer Obama while 36% prefer McCain.

Would Clinton Fare Better? Virginia voters prefer John McCain over Hillary Clinton by 47% to 38%. There's no evidence that the Democratic Party would fare better in Virginia this fall if their party nominee is Hillary Clinton. The patterns of support across demographic groups are similar for both Obama and Clinton.

Favorability ratings. Virginians tend to hold a favorable view of both likely party nominees for president. Nearly four-in-ten (39%) Virginians have a favorable view of McCain, 24% are unfavorable and about a quarter are undecided. Opinion of McCain divides strongly along partisan lines, as expected. Independents tend to hold a favorable opinion of McCain; 35% are favorable and 24% unfavorable. There is also a divide between whites and blacks but this largely corresponds with differences in party affiliation between the two racial groups.

Virginians views of Obama tilt positive, if a little less strongly positive than for McCain. Among all adults, 36% have a favorable opinion of Obama, 28% are unfavorable, while a quarter are undecided. As expected, there is a strong partisan slant in opinions about Obama. Among independents, 34% are favorable while a nearly equal portion of 30% are unfavorable, with the remainder undecided or not holding an opinion.

Hillary Clinton is a bit better known than either Obama or McCain and a bit less liked. About a third of Virginians (34%) have a favorable opinion of Clinton while 38% are unfavorable and two in ten are undecided.

The War in Iraq. Virginians are on par with the nation when it comes to views about the war in Iraq and opinion of George W. Bush. Fully 48% say it was the wrong decision to go to war in Iraq while 39% say it was the right decision. A 53% majority of Virginians holds an unfavorable opinion of President Bush while 29% are favorable.

METHOD OF THE COMMONWEALTH POLL

The Commonwealth Poll is a public opinion survey of Virginian residents about politics and public policy issues in the state. The survey was conducted by telephone from May 12-18, 2008 with a randomly-selected sample of 1,003 adults living in Virginia. The interviewing was conducted through the facilities of Princeton Data Source (PDS), a research and polling company located in northern Virginia. They used a staff of professionally trained, paid interviewers and computer-assisted telephone interviewing software to conduct the survey.

The sample of telephone numbers was designed so that all residential telephones, including new and unlisted numbers, had a known chance of inclusion. The data are weighted to adjust for unequal probabilities of selection due to multiple adults living in the household. In addition, the data are weighted on sex, race, age, education and region of residence to reflect the demographic composition of the adult population in Virginia. Percentages reported in the text and tables are weighted, while the number of cases shown in the tables for various subgroups is the actual number of respondents.

Questions answered by the full sample of adults are subject to a sampling error of plus or minus approximately 3 percentage points at the 95 percent level of confidence. This means that in 95 out of 100 samples like the one used here, the results obtained should be no more than 3 percentage points above or below the figure that would be obtained by interviewing all Virginian residents with telephones. Where the answers of subgroups are reported, the sampling error would be higher. Because of non-response (refusals to participate, etc.), standard calculations of sampling error are apt to understate the actual extent to which survey results are at variance with the true population values. Surveys are also subject to errors from sources other than sampling. While every effort is made to identify such errors, they are often difficult or impossible to measure. Readers making use of the results are urged to be mindful of the limitations inherent in survey research.

The margin of error due to sampling at the 95% confidence level for different groups in the survey are as follows:
