2011 Awardees Include Founding Members Anna Forbes, Jim Littrell and Bob Schoenberg



Anna Forbes, a Sociology graduate of Indiana University, was hired as the first staff member of ActionAIDS in 1986. Anna was a member of ACT UP Philadelphia and had previously

worked for the Philadelphia AIDS Task Force - making her a natural fit for a rapidly growing service organization.

She is a co-founder of ActionAIDS, and the first service coordinator - and worked tirelessly to provide for the basic needs of people neglected by a misinformed public. Anna was also

Jim Littrell was among the first in Philadelphia to recognize the urgency of the emerging HIV epidemic. Jim was already a well-respected activist - as founder of Voyage House

(the precursor of the Attic) and the first Executive Director of the Philadelphia Lesbian and Gay Task Force.

Jim started work in 1982 as a volunteer and Vice-President of the Philadelphia AIDS Task Force, managing the John Locke Fund, and overseeing the Task Force's social services initiatives. How-

Bob Schoenberg was a founder and served as the first Board President of ActionAIDS. Today Bob is the Director of the Penn LGBT Center and a highly respected university

administrator. He was the center's first employee and its only director. In September 2011, he began his 30th year in that role.

Homelessness + AIDS = Death

Homelessness itself is hard to envision if you have a home and have never been without one. One can only imagine as one drifts off into a comfortable sleep. Snuggled cozily under my warm comforter that makes me feel safe. Being able to leisurely stroll to my bathroom each morning and reach into my medicine cabinet and pop the four HIV medications that keep me healthy and, most importantly, alive. Is this something I take for granted? Not at all. Well not anymore anyway. I am a longtime AIDS activist that works mostly on access to AIDS treatment, both local and global. Everyone should have access to life-saving AIDS medication and treatment. If you are fortunate enough to have a place to live.

Living with AIDS on the streets is dangerous and has meant certain death for at least 10 people living with AIDS. Living with untreated HIV translates into debilitating painful infections that most people without compromised immune systems never heard of. These opportunistic infections can take a devastating toll on your body, mind, and spirit. It is exacerbated if you are homeless.

AIDS is still a disease that is met with

fear, hostility, and is highly stigmatized, unlike other illnesses that elicit sympathy and compassion. Medication stabilizes the progression of HIV & AIDS. Treatment is now HIV prevention and is lauded by the National Institutes of Health. It is finally hope for the end of the epidemic. Provided you have a home to store and take medications.

The unsanitary shelter system is a breeding ground for contagion. Shelter staff confiscate HIV medications. That leaves the person open to ridicule and makes the streets a better alternative. Studies have proven housing people with HIV/AIDS is cost effective as opposed to shelters. Cold, tired, sick and hungry people who are homeless are often taken advantage of by predators. Both men and women are offered food, warmth, and a place to sleep if they exchange sex for it. They have little power in safe sex negotiations, if any. Philadelphia has an HIV infection rate four times higher than the national average.

The majority of the funding to house homeless people living with HIV/AIDS comes from the federal government, HOPWA (Housing Opportunities for People With AIDS) and is woefully inadequate even though it is a good program. Unlike other large major urban cities with bur-

geoning HIV infections, Philadelphia contributes nearly nothing to house people with AIDS. Because of these two factors Philadelphia maintains a two-year waiting list for housing. People die waiting.

Honestly no one knows how many homeless people are living with HIV until they are found dead on the street. The last needs assessments conducted for homeless people with AIDS in Philadelphia happened in 1996. Due to activist pressure another is due to begin. Please remember those that died and will continue to die without human dignity on the streets until Philadelphia funds programs to house homeless people with AIDS.

New ActionAIDS Housing Program for People with HIV/AIDS

ActionAIDS has been working with other groups around the city to find a solution to the Philadelphia housing crisis.

World AIDS Day (Dec. 1st) 2011, ActionAIDS and the Office of Housing and Community Development (OHCD) of Philadelphia announced the city's first "Housing First" program for people living with HIV. ActionAIDS will receive a three-year grant for the program, and is partnering with Pathways to Housing, an organization that has had success with the Housing First model in New York City.

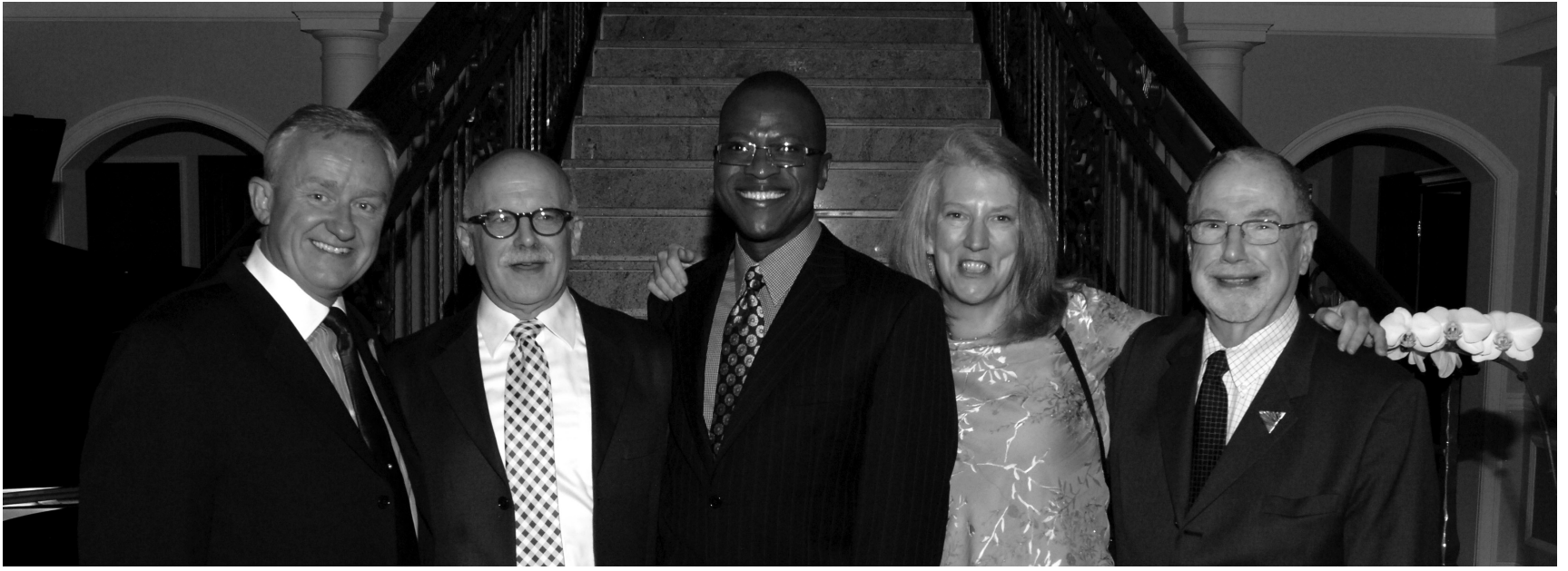
Housing First will provide homes for 20 homeless individuals. Once in housing, staff focus on risk-reduction and empowering the residents to live healthier lives. Housing First ensures that residents have access to medical care and case management, mental health services and addiction treatment. This intervention gets people off the streets, into homes, and promotes self-sufficiency.

The Philadelphia program builds on the successes in Boston and New York City. Significant data shows that the Housing First program can substantially reduce the homeless population.

ActionAIDS is proud to partner with OHCD and Pathways to Housing to implement Housing First. Housing is a positive investment, and for people with HIV, a home is both prevention and treatment.

the Director of Community Relations for ActionAIDS, and moved to work at the AIDS Activities Coordinating Office (AACO) in 1990.

At the Philadelphia Department of Public Health, Anna continued to work to give a voice to those living with the disease. She established the People Living with HIV/AIDS (PLWHA) Advisory Committee, and played a vital role in expanding prevention services in Philadelphia schools and prisons. Anna worked with the Health Commissioner, served on the state's HIV Planning Council, and jump-started the city's participation in condom distribution and syringe exchange.

Following her time in the city health department, Anna served on the Board of

Trustees for Prevention Point Philadelphia, was a member of the Harm Reduction Coalition, supported the Women Helping Women Peer Support Grants Program, and worked with the Ryan White CARE Act Planning Council.

More recently, Anna Forbes has worked with the Global Campaign for Microbicides (GCM), first as the Global North Programs Coordinator, and later as the Deputy Director. She directed operations around the globe, and has been an advocate for disadvantaged groups: sex workers, women, and men who have sex with men. Anna was a consistent voice for these people, giving over 100 presentations at workshops, meetings, and conferences on the GCM agenda.

Anna has been widely published in peer-reviewed journals, reports, and popular press. As well as contributing

to four books, she is the author of The AIDS Awareness Library - a series of eight children's books, educating young people about HIV/AIDS.

In recognition of her distinguished service, Anna has received many awards including: Human Rights Honors Award from the Philadelphia Commission on Human Relations (1990), Best AIDS Activist - Readers Choice Awards from the Philadelphia City Paper (1991), William J. Way Special Spirit Award for exemplary AIDS activism from the Philadelphia Gay News (1992), Favorite Straight Person of the Year Award from the AIDS Fund (2005), and a citations from the PA House of Representatives and Philadelphia City Council (2005), among others.

Throughout her career, Anna Forbes has been a stalwart supporter of women's health and people living with HIV/AIDS.

his doctoral dissertation in the fall of 1982. He was only the second person specifically hired for such responsibilities on a college or university campus. Over the years, his position increased in scope and time commitment.

By 1989, he was the full-time director of a program serving university students, faculty, and staff. A few years later, the program became a center and moved from Houston Hall to 3537 Locust Walk. During 2000-2002, Bob helped raise funds to provide a new home for the LGBT Center and oversaw the renovation of the Carriage House, its location since June 2002.

Bob has taught courses at Penn, as

well as Bryn Mawr College and Rutgers University. He has consulted at several other colleges and universities and presented at many national professional conferences. He edited the collection *Homosexuality and Social Work* (Haworth Press) and, with his counterparts at Penn State and UCLA, authored *Our Place on Campus: Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender Services and Programs in Higher Education*, published by Greenwood Press in June 2002. He has also authored several journal articles.

Bob was a member of the Board of Directors and President of the Eromin Center, a counseling service for sexual and gender minority individuals. He served on the first Mayor's Commis-

sion on Sexual Minorities, appointed by Wilson Goode.

Currently, Bob serves on the Board of Directors of the Council for Relationships, the Board of Directors of Nehirim (a national organization serving LGBT Jews), the Board of Directors of The Sapphire Fund, the Advisory Board of the Delaware Valley Legacy Fund, and the Community Advisory Board of the Penn Center for AIDS Research.

Over the last twenty-five years, Bob has received numerous honors - from being named Social Worker of the Year by the Philadelphia Chapter of the National Association of Social Workers in 1988 to receiving the 2008 Community Service Award from Dignity Philadelphia.

ever, Jim believed that more focus was needed, and, standing on the corner of 20th and Chestnut with Anna Forbes, they envisioned an AIDS service organization that would provide effective services to every person infected with HIV in the region. Anna said, "That was ActionAIDS' moment of conception."

Jim co-founded ActionAIDS and directed the organization during some of the earliest and toughest years for people diagnosed with AIDS. In 1986, there were no approved medications to treat HIV. After diagnosis, life expectancy was low,

death almost inevitable; stigma, consequent social rejection and economic marginalization high - legal protections scarce. Families often rejected those diagnosed, and mainstream health care and social service systems were derelict or worse in response.

Nascent HIV service organizations lobbied hard, but struggled for funding - with a mere \$30,000 allocated in 1986 to "observe" AIDS in Philadelphia. Jim laid the foundation for what would become the largest HIV/AIDS service organization in Pennsylvania. "There was solidarity," Jim said, "knowing this 'thing' was coming at us - we could do

something and do it well. ActionAIDS was founded very specifically because we wanted every person living with HIV/AIDS to get quality care and contact and reliable support from at least one other human being, because everybody should have an advocate and a friend."

After leaving ActionAIDS, Jim helped incorporate and find stable funding for We the People, Philadelphia's first PLWA advocacy organization. Later, Jim became the Executive Director of The Philadelphia AIDS Consortium (TPAC) in 1990, tasked with bringing Philadelphia's diverse communities together to create a comprehensive region-wide plan to address the HIV epidemic - a task he describes as the "hardest job" of his life, but which produced a comprehensive regional plan across two states and 10 counties.

After five years heading TPAC, Jim returned to the practice of Episcopal ministry and currently serves as the Rector and Chaplain of St. Mary's at the University of Pennsylvania. He and his partner of 32 years, Louis Skypala, live in East Mt. Airy.

Jim Littrell has been a priest for 40 years, and is still a passionate advocate for homeless people, children, racial and economic justice, prisoners, and peace.

Taking Action to Normalize HIV Testing & Confront Stigma

Last July the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania passed legislation that allows physicians to offer opt-out HIV testing, as long as the patient is informed that they will be tested for HIV. The new law requires post-test counseling, providing a valuable opportunity for education and prevention messaging.

If done correctly, this approach has the potential to be highly effective in terms of early detection, education and treatment. Incorporating HIV testing into routine and emergency room care is a common sense approach to identifying people who are HIV positive and unaware of their diagnosis.

Routine HIV testing can help to destigmatize HIV. Routine testing communicates the reality that everyone is susceptible to HIV, and normalizes HIV

testing. Routine testing eliminates the need to explain why you believe you may need to have an HIV test! We don't ask people why they need their blood pressure, cholesterol, or blood sugar checked! Why should we ask them why they want an HIV test?

Framing primary medical care as an HIV prevention intervention was part of ActionAIDS' thinking when we applied for a HRSA health center planning grant last year. ActionAIDS staff and our consultants at Fairmount Ventures have been working



to complete a health center planning process.

We have completed preliminary data analysis and have identified West and Southwest Philadelphia as target areas for additional data collection. The survey is currently available on line at:

The Positive Impact of ActionAIDS on the Philadelphia Economy

In addition to the critical HIV/AIDS support, testing, prevention and counseling services that ActionAIDS provides, ActionAIDS has a very positive economic impact on the Philadelphia area. ActionAIDS employs over 85 permanent employees on a full-time basis. Most of those employees live in the City of Philadelphia. We provide our services through four Philadelphia offices located in Center City, West Philadelphia and North Philadelphia, including a 22 person residential facility.

ActionAIDS has been successful in leveraging its governmental funding by also attracting non-governmental funding through fundraising, private foundation grants and pharmacy income. In Fiscal Year 2011 we raised \$1.3 million in non-governmental funding. In Fiscal Year 2012 we expect to raise \$1.5 million in

non-governmental funding. ActionAIDS is an efficient steward of the money it raises. According to our latest audit report for Fiscal Year 2011, over eighty five cents of every dollar raised goes directly to providing program services to our clients.

Finally, ActionAIDS benefits from the active participation of over 400 volunteers. In Fiscal Year 2011 these volunteers provided in-kind contributions of over \$175,000 in donated services.

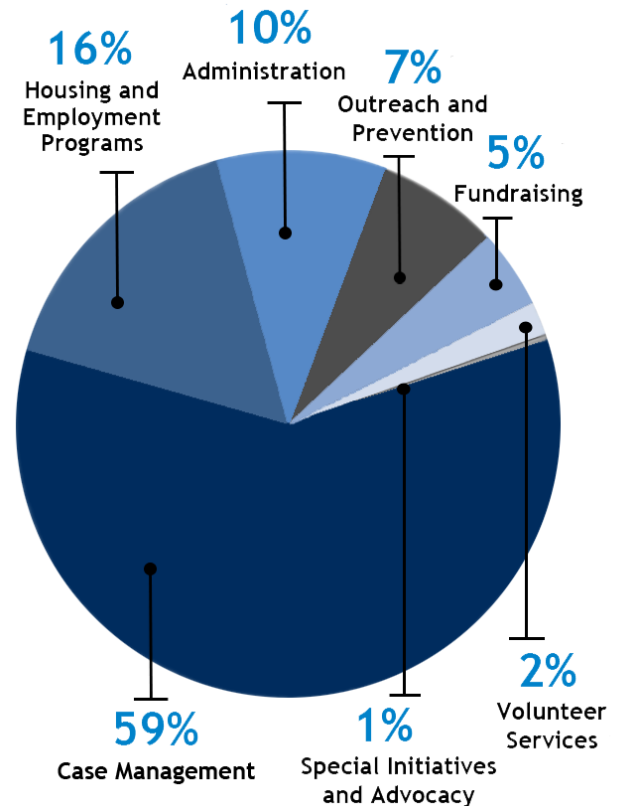
