# ANDERSON SPRINGS Lake County California

Anderson Springs is a 131-year old community tucked and hidden below the Mayacmas mountain ridgeline four miles from Cobb Mountain. One



hundred years ago, rustic cabins, several hotels, medicinal hot springs, towering trees, beautiful creeks, hunting and fishing, excellent weather and quiet seclusion were reasons people came to this unique corner of southern Lake County. Now Anderson Springs exists as a residential community dominated by two bedroom cabins, remodeled houses, and modern two-story dwellings. "The Springs" have become an affordable first home for many of the younger residents, a retirement haven for some, and for others, a third and fourth generation summer get-a-way. Many homes are clustered on small lots of varying configuration bordering one of four creeks, a hillside, road or draw. There are random multi-acre parcels scattered around the community.




Some families gather in the relaxing setting of Anderson Springs for several generations

Water has always been a great attraction to Anderson Springs with over 55% of the homes bordering one of four creeks that flow though the community. Domestic water is collected in a spring box four miles from the community on the side of Cobb Mountain on property owned by the United States Bureau of Land Management. Water is piped, then stored in a 150,000 gallon steel tank and distributed through the system constructed by the Anderson Springs Community Services District in 1984.




omeowners Association Recreation Center


