NOTES:

1. This division was a pre-war first line Territorial Army division, with its headquarters based in Manchester. The division arrived in France on the 12th April 1940 and came under the command of III Corps on 29th April 1940. At this time, Major General William George HOLMES, D.S.O.*, commanded the division. It transferred to I Corps on 19th May 1940 as the division moved into the front line on the River Escaut. The 127th Infantry Brigade was detached to join 'Mac Force', leaving the division with two brigades. The division was evacuated from Dunkirk on the 31st May 1940. The division was re-equipped in the United Kingdom, initially under Northern Command. On the 4th July 1940, it came under the command of X Corps and then on the 9th September 1940, IV Corps. For nearly twelve months from the 5th November 1940 to 22nd October 1941, the division was under the command of XI Corps. On the 23rd October 1941, the division transferred to Northern Command and on the 1st November 1941 was reorganised and redesignated as the 42nd Armoured Division. The division remained in existence for just short of two years as an armoured formation before being disbanded on the 17th October 1943.
2. A first line Territorial Army brigade, Brigadier (Temporary) George, William SUTTON, C.B.E., D.S.O., T.D. (a Territorial Army officer) commanded this brigade during the campaign in France. When the division reorganised on the 1st November 1943, this brigade was converted to the 10th Armoured Brigade. The 1st/5th Bn. The Lancashire Fusiliers was converted to become the 108th Regiment, Royal Armoured Corps; the 1st/6th Bn. The Lancashire Fusiliers became the 109th Regiment, Royal Armoured Corps; and the 9th Bn. The Lancashire Fusiliers became the 143rd Regiment, Royal Armoured Corps.
3. This battalion joined the brigade on 4th May 1940 when the division was in France. It transferred from 4th Infantry Brigade, 2nd Division, replacing the 1st/8th Bn. The Lancashire Fusiliers. That battalion had transferred to 4th Infantry Brigade as part of a policy to integrate Regular Army units in Territorial Army formations. The 1st Bn. The Border Regiment left the brigade on the 1st December 1940, transferring to the 31st Infantry Brigade. Later, it became an Airlanding Battalion in the 1st Airlanding Brigade. It was replaced on the same date by the newly formed: 9th Bn. The Lancashire Fusiliers
4. Another first line Territorial Army formation, Brigadier (Temporary) George DARWELL, M.C., Reserve of Officers, commanded this brigade until the 13th January 1940, when a Regular Army officer, Brigadier E. G. MILES assumed command. He remained in command until the 20th September 1940.
5. This Regular Army infantry battalion joined the brigade on the 10th November 1939 transferring from Holywood in the Northern Ireland District. It replaced the 4th Bn. The Border Regiment that had transferred to the 25th Infantry Brigade.
6. A first line Territorial Army brigade, this formation was part of the division on mobilization in September 1939. At the outbreak of the Second World War, Brigadier V. T. R. FORD commanded the brigade. On the 24th November 1939, Brigadier K. J. MARTIN assumed command, but an Indian Army officer, Brigadier J. G. SMYTH, V.C., took command on the 5th February 1940 as the division prepared for deployment to France. He remained in command throughout the campaign. When the division moved up the River Escaut, this brigade was detached to join 'Mac Force' in order to defend the Arras area.
7. This Regular Army battalion joined the brigade on 20th May 1940 from Fort George, near Inverness, replacing the 8th (Ardwick) Bn. The Manchester Regiment, which was posted overseas to Malta, arriving there on the 20th May 1940 to come under the command of the Malta Infantry Brigade.

8. This regiment did not go to France with the division, but left in April 1940, for potential deployment to Norway as part of the Norwegian Expeditionary Force. This left the division with just two field regiments whilst serving in France. The regiment later joined the 46th Infantry Division.
9. This unit joined the division on 14th May 1940 from 54th Infantry Division. It replaced the: 202nd (East Lancashire) Field Company, Royal Engineers which transferred to 52nd Division.
10. This Territorial Army battalion was attached to the division from GHQ Troops in its role as a machine gun battalion.
11. A mobile bath unit came under command of this division in France. Each unit had a numeric designation, but it is not known which specific unit served with this division.

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
