# Rev. Ventura will replace Msgr. Ball

The Rev. Gennaro J. Ventura of Rochester has been appointed pastor of St. Francis de Sales Church here, effective June 25. He succeeds the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Edward K. Ball who is retiring.

Clergy appointments, made by the Most Rev. Joseph L. Hogan, Bishop of the Rochester Catholic Diocese, were released this week.

Father Ventura comes to St. Francis from Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church in Rochester where he has served as pastor since 1961. Born in Rochester, he attended St. Bernard's Seminary and was ordained into the Roman Catholic priesthood Dec. 18, 1943. He received his elementary school education at Holy Apostles School, spent two years at Aquinas Institute and the last two years

of high school in St. Andrew's Seminary. Father Ventura's first assignment was at St. Lucy's Church in Rochester. He served as assistant pastor there until 1947 when he was transferred to Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church. In 1955 he returned to St. Lucy's Church as its pastor and in 1961 moved to the Rochester, and three sisters, Mrs. pastorate of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel

Having served his entire priesthood in the inner-city parishes of Rochester, Father Ventura is recognized as a man who understands the poor and their problems. He has served on the Rochester Housing Authority for five years, two years ago as its chairman, and has been instrumental in forming neighborhood improvement groups.

He has been a board member of the Lewis St. Settlement House, and has also been the diocesan consultant on Rochester's American Committee on

Italian Immigration. Father Ventura, whose parents are deceased, has one brother, Joseph, in

## 11 autos damaged as wall falls


A 20 foot high and 60 foot long section of the four-story Geneva Refrigerating Corp. collapsed last night about 11:20 p.m., demolishing six cars and damaging five more in the American Can Co. parking lot.

Investigation is still continuing into the cause of the wall's collapse, in which no one was injured.

The 11 cars were owned by employes of the American Can Co., which is adjacent to the refrigerating company that is owned by Seneca Foods of Dundee.

The wall did cause an electrical power distributing line to malfunction, cutting off power to the Can Co., which resulted in the cancellation of the third shift at the company. Power was returned by the NYS Elec. & Gas Corp. at approximately 6:30 a.m.

Geneva Police and one company of the Geneva Fire Dept. were at the scene. The New York State Telephone Co. reports that all its area crews were out last night after a heavy lightning and thunder storm hit the area shortly after midnight.
