IIC EARNS WASC APPROVAL

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IIC has made history as the first Korean-run education institution to attain affiliation with the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC). At its meeting on February 19-20, 2004, the Accrediting Commission for Senior Colleges and Universities of WASC acted to grant Candidacy to IIC.

WASC serves as the primary institution to grant accreditation to educational institutions of higher learning in the western United States. All institutions must pass the rigorous requirements to achieve the approval of the WASC association. IIC made its official media announcement of its accreditation candidacy on May

13, 2004.

With its beginnings as the Korean Center, Inc., a social service community-based organization established in 1974, IIC was granted the authority to grant the Master of Arts degree as a center for higher learning by the Bureau for Postsecondary and Vocational Education (BPVE) for the state of California in 1996. In meeting the requirements under the 2001 Standards of Accreditation, IIC has passed through the rigorous multistage review processes administered by WASC.

WASC Executive Director, Ralph A. Wolff states in his letter of March 1, 2004, that "IIC has worked hard to achieve this important milestone and should be proud of its accomplishment." Benefits of WASC membership include: obtaining visas for international students; government funding for student financial aid; and the ability to transfer credits among member institutions.

IIC's accreditation marks a pivotal event in Korean American history. This is the first time for a Korean American operated institution of higher education to be approved by the state government and an association like WASC. Since IIC is vital for Korean Americans, especially for the Korean community in Northern

California, this achievement is an especially joyous accomplishment.

The reality is that very few schools exist at which students can major in both Korean Studies and Korean Language education. In fact, IIC is the only American institution at which students can do both. Therefore, IIC's recent acquisition of the WASC committee's approval remains significant for the development of Korean Studies and Korean language education on a global scale.

IIC Mission Statement

The mission of IIC is to provide students with educational opportunities designed to fulfill their learning needs, enrich their lives, broaden their vision, and empower them with the knowledge and skills necessary to participate in a multicultural society and function in the global community.

Education at IIC is effective because it integrates cross-cultural experiences with relevant coursework, independent research, and training in the skills necessary for success in the 21st century. IIC aims to provide students with an exposure to the rich cultural background of Korea in relation to the peoples of the Pacific Rim, and an understanding of the dynamic forces of the global marketplace and our roles as global citizens. With this understanding, IIC has two specific objectives:

To grant the Master of Arts Degree in Korean Studies to qualified candidates who have completed the necessary academic and professional preparation.

To grant Certificates in Korean Language, ESL, and Microcomputer Business Applications to qualified students who have gained the practical skills offered and to help them fulfill their potential.

IIC-KYUNG HEE UNIVERSITY INSTITUTE OF INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION SIGN PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT

On January 23, IIC and Korea's Kyung Hee University Institute of International Education (IIE) signed an agreement that established a sister relationship between the two schools. Through the agreement, the institutions made a promise to work together to-

ward the development of Korean Studies.

The sister relationship will allow exchange students and/ or professors to travel to and from both schools to maximize each program's potential.

Jung Sup Kim, Director of the

Institute of International Education, stated, "The connection with IIC will contribute to a revitalization of Korean studies."

The partners hope to stress emphasis on cultivating Korean language education in the world by taking the lead in developing language education workshops and programs.

The full-scale interchange between the two institutions began September 2004.

FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITIES

IIC offers many fellowship opportunities for students. This past year, over twenty IIC students received fellowships from the IIC Fellowship Fund to help pay their tuition costs.

A \$15,000 grant from the Koret Foundation makes this fellowship fund possible.

In addition, the Soongmoon Alumni Association of America (SAAA) and IIC signed a memorandum of understanding for working together to give scholarships to Soongmoon high school students and IIC students. In December 2004, four students will be selected as the first recipients of this scholarship.

IIC PARTNERS WITH THE UNIVERSITY OF SAN FRANCISCO, SAN FRANCISCO STATE UNIVERSITY

Cooperation with institutions, both local and in Korea, has enabled IIC to reach student populations outside of its own four walls. San Francisco State University College of Education (COE) and IIC have established a partnership through which IIC

students and those attending SFSU can enroll in coursework at either institution. SFSU students are allowed to take and transfer up to six units of coursework from IIC. IIC students will likewise be able to take up to six units of coursework from SFSU.

Students from the University of San Francisco, Center for Pacific Rim Studies, can take up to nine credits from IIC's M.A. degree program in Korean language and transfer these to USF's M.A. in Pacific Rim Studies. The agreement includes the sharing of the

University of San Francisco's East Asian Research Library, a collection of over 80,000 volumes that has been assessed as "one of the twenty most valuable research collections of its kind" in North America.

IIC PROFESSOR LEADS EFFORTS AT DEVELOPING ADVANCED PLACEMENT KOREAN

Dr. Eun-Hee Koo, Director of the Teaching Korean as a Foreign Language Program and Korean Language Program, is conducting a campaign for Korean to be accepted as one of the Advanced Placement (AP) subjects. At the 558th Hangul Day ceremony held at IIC, Dr. Koo announced her efforts and hopes that Koreans and Korean Americans will join in supporting her efforts. She

announced that it will cost 1 million dollars for the Educational Testing Service (ETS) to develop the courses and tests necessary to implement AP Korean in the high school curriculum. She has started

receiving donations. She hopes that many people will participate in this campaign to accomplish the goal soon. To find out more, contact ehkoo@iic.edu.

IIC PARTICIPATES IN 2004 ANNUAL WASC MEETING

Representatives from IIC participated in the annual meeting of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges in San Jose on April 14 and 15, 2004. President Youn-Cha Shin Chey, Director of Aca-

demic Affairs Hyekyung Sung, and Board Member Paul Kim led a workshop titled, "Learning from the Early Accreditation Process: Candidacy Review for a Small Institution." The co-presenters discussed how the WASC accreditation process can enhance institutional design and educational delivery, especially for smaller-sized beginning institutions.

Based on experiences with the steps necessary to receive

accreditation, they shared the lessons they have learned and provided suggestions for other institutions that anticipate this process. The response was positive and IIC has received many inquiries.

TKFL STUDENTS/FACULTY PARTICIPATE IN SUMMER SEMINAR

IIC Teaching Korean as a Foreign Language program representatives participated in the 21st Annual Summer Seminar for Language Teachers sponsored by The California Foreign Language Project (CFLP) at Stanford University and The California Language Teachers Association (CLTA) from July 31 to August 6, 2004 at the University of California, Santa Barbara. The theme of this year's seminar was "Meeting the No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Challenge: Improving Student Academic Performance Through Quality Language Teaching."

There were ten strands at the seminar including a Korean language strand co-sponsored by the Intercultural Institute of California, Kyung Hee University, and the Korean Education Center of the Korean Consulate General in Los Angeles. It was the first time a Korean language strand was included at the annual seminar. IIC supported the facilitators' (Eun-Hee Koo and Hyekyung Sung) honoraria and sent two TKFL students, Hyekyeong Hwang and Kwanghee Lee, to participate in the seminar.

IIC CELEBRATES 558TH HAN'GUL DAY

Dr. Koo organized a special ceremony to celebrate "Han'gul Day" at IIC, which included appearance by the Director of the Korean Consulate Education Center. Celebrating 558 years since the creation of the Korean writing system, the day in-

cluding poetry readings and short speeches about the writing system, songs celebrating han'gul, and a video about the history of han'gul. This is the second year in a row that IIC has held a public celebration for this day.

FACULTY NEWS

Dr. Eun-Hee Koo facilitated workshops for Korean language teachers at the AATK seminar and CFLP summer seminar. She presented papers at the International Association of Korean Language Education conference in Seoul and the International Circle of Korean Linguistics (ICKL) in Turkey. She also participated in an international conference sponsored by the Overseas Korean Education Foundation.

Dr. Koo held a Jiphyunjun seminar co-sponsored by IIC and Kyunghee University's Institute of International Education for Korean language teachers. She created the cyber Korean Language Education Center http://www.freechal.com/jiphyunjun in 2001.

Dr. Koo is planning a special teacher training program for Kyunghee University graduate students in January 2005. Dr. Hilary Finchum-Sung participated in the Society for Ethnomusicology conference in Miami where she presented a paper. At the Association for Asian Studies Meeting in San Diego, she chaired a panel on Korean popular music and presented a paper.

Dr. Finchum-Sung participated in two workshops for educations this past summer. She led a three-hour workshop on Korean music at Indiana University and at U.C., Berkeley, she presented at a workshop on teaching Korean culture in the classroom.

She is working on a chapter to be included in an upcoming edited volume on Korean popular music.

On July 29, 2004, Dr. Finchum-Sung and her family welcomed twins Oliver Hyunmo and Ronan Junmo to the world.


from her home in Ohio.

GRADUATE ADDRESS (EXCERPT):

THOMAS DUVERNAY, RECIPIENT OF THE MASTER'S DEGREE IN KOREAN STUDIES JUNE 4TH, 2004

I have been involved with Korea for over twenty years now, having first come here in 1984, to teach English in a Korean boy's high school. That summer, I married another teacher from the school, and we later that year moved back to the United States. In 1989, we returned to Korea, with our then two year old son. Upon our return, I taught English at the Kyŏngju campus of Dong Guk University where I am to this day.

Having a full-time job teaching, I could not consider studying for an advanced degree, especially as I lived in a Ko-

rean provincial city. When we first moved back to Korea, the internet was unknown and there was also not much available by traditional correspondence methods. My education ended up having to wait until the spring of 2002, when I found IIC. I have always had a love for Korea, its culture and history. The chance to not only get a Master's degree online, but also one in Korean Studies was very appealing to me. At that point, I dedicated myself to not only earning a degree in a subject I enjoyed, but also doing so with high marks. I am happy to report

that my quest was successful.

Without exception, the professor for each class was an expert in his or her field, and they brought not only their knowledge to each session, but also their passion for the subject. I thank each and every one of them for their time, patience, and knowledge. I would also like to thank the administration of IIC for their helpfulness and consideration. .

Having completed my Master's degree in the Professional Application of Korean Studies program, I plan to continue on

with my studies. I look forward to researching and publishing works on Korean subjects, plus teaching others about Korean history and culture.

M.A. IN KOREAN STUDIES AT IIC

IIC offers a Masters of Arts in Korean Studies. The two programs are Professional Application of Korean Studies (PAKS) and Teaching Korean as a Foreign Language (TKFL). Courses are offered both onsite and online.

The PAKS program is great for professionals who are affiliated with Korean companies and businesses and who need

to understand Korean culture, history, social science, and economy, while the TKFL program is geared toward those who wish to be professional Korean language instructors. We are able to promote intercultural understanding by helping students appreciate historic, economic, and cultural differences.

We have had twelve MA de-

gree recipients over the years. Currently, we have nineteen students in our PAKS and TKFL programs. This spring and summer alone, we have eight newly admitted students, which is a 73% increase from the previous year.

Although many of our students have excellent academic achievements, we are unable

to award scholarships to them all. With increased funding for scholarships, IIC will be able to reward and recognize them for their excellent academic achievements.

WU JUNG LIBRARY REPORT 2004

The collection of the resource materials at the Wu Jung Library is steadily growing with generous gifts. Invaluable books and volumes of Korean Archival materials were acquired through donations from Warren Smith (former U.C., Berkeley Professor), Soo San Han (Korean novelist), 215 volumes of Korean books on history and literature from Sook Ja Park and Jae-Yong

Jang (librarians at U.C., Berkeley's East Asian Library), S.K. Hong, Ho-min Sohn (professor at the University of Hawaii), and the Korean Consulate.

The Wu Jung Library collection has been organized into a computer database, which has made it easier to search for library material from outside the library. For people who have difficulty using com-

puterized catalogues, every
Friday morning the Wu Jung
Library offers a class that
teaches the concepts and
skills needed for online research. This class also gives
instructions on how to determine if the information is useful and valuable. In addition,
at the start of the semester,
we offer a session with a special focus on the research
skills needed to complete

course assignments.

We invite everyone to come and visit the growing Wu Jung Library, open Monday through Friday from 9am-5pm. The Wu Jung Library warmly welcomes donations and bequests of both Korean and English books and archival materials on subjects related to Korea and Korean-American studies.

IIC OFFERS COMPUTER TRAINING WORKSHOPS

IIC established computer training workshops in cooperation with Hayward Baptist Church in San Francisco's East Bay. A total of twenty-three students have been enrolled in this

program. The first session on Beginning Windows XP started in May 2004 with eight students. The second session on Beginning Windows XP started in August 2004 with eight students. The third session on Multimedia Windows XP started in November 2004 with seven students. In the spring of 2005, the IIC computer training department will offer computer classes for business people and will begin computer workshops at a location in South San Francisco

NEW ADVISORY BOARD MEMBERS

Kim Eun Young studied traditional Korean knot work, maedŭp, under master craftsmen and has published several books on this traditional Korean craft. She has won many awards for her work and has been designated a Human Cultural Treasure by the Korean government. She is holder of the 13th Intangible Cultural Property, Ornamental Knots, Seoul.

Dr. Yi (Ph.D. Princeton, 1983) is a Professor of Art History at the Academy of Korean Studies where she was the Director of the Korean Studies Program. She is the author of

many books including *The Historical Tastes and Wit of Korean Women.* Dr. Yi is married to the Korean Ambassador to the United States and currently resides in Washington, D.C.

IIC PRESIDENT HONORED FOR COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP

Dr. Youn-Cha Shin Chey, President of IIC, received the 2004 Community Leadership Award, which is under the sponsorship of Wells Fargo Bank ACBA (Asian Connection Bay Area).

ACBA is an Asian organization composed of 570 members within Wells Fargo Bank. In order to be selected as the 2004 Community Leadership Award recipient, leaders among non-profit organizations must be recommended by one of the ACBA members, then 12 ACBA Board Members review these candidates based on their achievements and contributions.

The award ceremony was held at the San Francisco Wells Fargo Penthouse. Dr. Chey commented, "This award is an honor not only for myself, but also for the Korean community." Wells Fargo International Product Manager, Ahn Ja Lee, recommended Dr. Chey. "I don't know Dr. Chey personally, but through the media I have known over the years that she is dedicating herself to the development of the IIC and Korean Center on behalf of the community," said Lee.

In addition to Dr. Chey, leaders of the Oakland Asian Community Mental Health Service, Oakland Asian Student Education Service, Youth Program ser-vice in Chinatown, and Indian Community Center were recognized. Winners may designate the use of the \$3,000 award from the Wells Fargo Foundation to any non-profit profit organization.

Dr. Chey often is recognized for her work in the community. On September 23, 2004, she was a guest speaker on the role of non-profit organizations in American society and the benefits of public service at the Korean American Professional Women's Association, Sillicon Valley (KAPWA).

IIC HOSTS PUBLIC LECTURE SERIES

IIC hosts a lecture series that features the top scholars and figures in the field of Korean Studies. As part of the lecture series, IIC also co-hosts events with universities and organizations throughout the Bay Area. In 2004, IIC co-hosted a lecture by Bruce Cummings with the University of San Francisco. On September 20, 2004, IIC co-hosted an appearance by Martin D. Uden, British Consul General of San Francisco at the Commonwealth Club. Uden's presentation was titled, "Korea: Past, Present, and Future."

This year, IIC kicked off its lecture series with a lecture by John Duncan, Professor of East Asian Studies and Director of the Korean Studies Center at UCLA. On September 24, 2004, John Duncan presented a paper titled, "Koguryŏ in Korean Historical

Memory" about the contribu-

tions of Koguryŏ to Korean history. Following a light reception, Duncan presented his paper to a crowd that included IIC faculty and students and members of the community.

In the spring of 2005 IIC will host lectures on one Tuesday (usually the second Tuesday) of each month. The first event will occur on Tuesday, January 18 from 6 to 8 p.m. The Wooden Fish Ensemble, led by Hyo-shin Na, will present a program of music, poetry, and dance. Hyo-shin Na, an awardwinning Korean American composer, will present a lecture on her experiences as a composer and discuss her compositions, which the ensemble will perform. A question and answer session will follow.

"DIVIDED NATION" SYMPOSIUM REFLECTS ON KOREA'S PAST, PRESENT, AND FUTURE

On Friday, December 12, 2003, IIC hosted a symposium at the Grand Hyatt San Francisco titled "Divided Nation." The event recognized the fiftieth anniversary of the signing of the armistice that brought a cease fire to the Korean peninsula. An audience composed of scholars, students, and professionals and six panelists from across the nation discussed the reasons behind and implications of the division at the thirty-eighth parallel.

Organized and moderated by Hilary Finchum-Sung (IIC Faculty), the symposium was di-

vided into morning and afternoon sessions. The day started with welcoming remarks from IIC's President Youn-Cha Shin Chey. Following the welcoming remarks, special guest Colonel Kim Young Oak (highly decorated veteran) led participants in a moment of silence in memory of those who have lost their lives in conflicts on Korean soil. The moment of silence served as an appropriate opening to a day looking for answers to the questions, "why?" and "what now?"

Panelists included Bonnie B.C. Oh (Distinguished Research

Professor of Korean Studies at Georgetown University),

Robert Scalapino (U.C., Berkeley Robson Research Professor of Government Emeritus), Howard Dratch (award-winning filmmaker), Henry Em (Professor of Korean Studies, University of Michigan), John K.C. Oh (Professor Emeritus, Catholic University of America), and Ilpyong J. Kim (Professor Emeritus, University of Connecticut).

The symposium closed with an open discussion in which participants sought solutions to current tensions on the Korean peninsula. The final de-
