Superintendent's Message

The Socorro Independent School District is 100 percent committed to providing all students with a world-class education in a safe and supportive learning environment. SISD Board of Trustees and I stand united with Team SISD to educate and treat our students as if they are our own children.

The 2013-14 school year proved to be a productive and successful year for the Socorro Independent School District. Specifically, the 2013-14 Texas Academic Performance Report highlights Team SISD's improvements in its graduation rate, end-of-course passing rates, and State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness scores, which surpassed the state's average in all subjects in grades three through eight.

Team SISD continues to make great strides in all district strategic directions. Initiatives and progress made in the five priorities expressed by our community include but are not limited to:

Direction 1: Safe and Supportive Learning Environment

Our district invested in a new multi-million dollar district camera surveillance system that enables us to monitor our campuses 24/7 in conjunction with new campus camera surveillance systems and new digital check-in systems that complete a background check on all campus visitors.

Direction 2: College and Career Readiness

SISD launched Operation College Bound to ensure our students' dreams of graduating from college become a reality. Operation College Bound provides principals and teachers with college bound activities to establish a college going culture at every campus and promote a "Yes I Can!" attitude among our students. Operation College Bound also lists all the success measures, college and career readiness programs, and college bound initiatives that must be implemented consistently and efficiently to ensure globally competitive graduates. Additionally, SISD prioritized funds to enable all sophomores to take the PSAT and all juniors to take the SAT at no cost to them and at their own campuses.

Direction 3: Highly Effective Faculty and Staff

SISD ensured all our new teachers hit the ground learning by initiating a

first-ever, week-long New Teacher Induction Academy. Our new teachers were provided with valuable professional development, tools, and ideas to promote their success as Team SISD educators. SISD also launched Becoming a Friend for the Future (BFF), which is a new initiative that provides new teachers with mentors who guide and support them on a one-to-one basis. SISD was nationally recognized as a District of Distinction by District Administration magazine for leadership development efforts.

Direction 4: Home, School, Community Partnerships

Effective partnerships with our parents have been established as evidenced by our Watch D.O.G.S. programs, in which they volunteer their time to assist in supervising safety measures at our elementary schools. Additionally, we continue to value the contributions of our business partners and community volunteers. Our strong partnerships with UTEP and EPCC have been instrumental in our new scholarship program initiative for teachers interested in teaching dual-credit courses and the opening of the upcoming Socorro Early College High School.

Direction 5: Accountability For All

Campus Climate Surveys as well as numerous quantitative/qualitative data measures were used to evaluate campus/district leaders' effectiveness in meeting our students' and employees' needs.

Our district's success is a direct result of the outstanding individual commitments from our students, teachers, parents/ community, bus drivers, board members, support staff, teacher assistants, campus/district leaders, office workers, police officers, custodians, business partners, cafeteria workers, and union representatives who ALL make Team SISD work! 

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Safety above all else

Wherever students are learning – in the classroom, a gym, a science lab, an art studio, or on the practice field – it is Team SISD's number one priority to ensure their safety and provide a secure learning environment. Every effort is made to ensure all members of Team SISD maintain the highest standards in support of schools' safety, security, climate, and emergency preparedness.

Team SISD's existing protocols have been revamped and strengthened over the last several years with a determination to make SISD campuses safer than ever.

The District Safety Committee unites employees, administrators, parents, and local law enforcement from throughout the community to work together as a team to prepare for possible scenarios by updating emergency plans and participating in interactive trainings. At the campus level, principals replicate these efforts and involve their local communities in school safety efforts.

Other safety improvements include the implementation of a standardized districtwide emergency operations procedure, reorganizing the SISD security force to better assist all campuses, and conducting safety audits to ensure proper safety protocols at campuses. In addition, all SISD campuses are monitored 24/7 from the district's new state of the art security surveillance system. Campus visitors are also digitally checked in with Hall Pass Identification Systems, which were installed during the 2013-14 school year.

Student safety is not limited to the campuses, which is why Team SISD implemented a pilot program in 2013-14 to test a bus camera safety system. Ten district school buses were armed with a camera to provide data on the frequency of bus stop-arm violations. The pilot proved successful in identifying violators and ultimately in curbing drivers from ignoring bus stop-arms, keeping SISD streets safer for students and adults alike. The SISD Board of Trustees approved the camera system to be implemented districtwide by the 2015-16 school year.

Other initiatives to keep Team SISD safe are the new "Your Voice Counts" boxes, the successful Olweus Bullying Prevention Program (OBPP), and the online reporting system known as K-12 Anonymous Alerts. The "Your Voice Counts" boxes are available at every campus and provide students an avenue to privately communicate with teachers, counselors, and administrators. They can report concerns, ask for help, or address any issue. The nationally renowned OBPP, which is in its fourth year of districtwide implementation in Team SISD, continues to raise awareness and prevent bullying. K-12 Anonymous Alerts allows students to report bullying incidents or any other safety concerns via the district website, cell phones, or other mobile devices. Administrators receive these reports via email or cell phone in order to take immediate action.

Team SISD is committed to provide each and every student nothing less than the best educational opportunities to ensure that they graduate from high school prepared for a successful future. Every Team SISD educator is held to a high standard of responsibility to analyze data, utilize available resources, and work hand-in-hand with parents, colleagues, and administration at the campus as well as district level, all in an effort to ensure 100% student academic growth.

Based on 2013-14 state assessments, Team SISD students continue to improve and score above their peers in the region and the state. SISD excelled in outperforming the state average in 17 out of the 17 indicators used to evaluate student academic success in grades three through eight. Team SISD outscored the state by 59 percentage points and is 40 percentage points above Region 19. In addition, 69 percent of SISD schools earned Distinction Designations with two schools earning Distinction Designations in every category possible.

The district's End of Course results increased by two percentage points in Algebra I and three percentage points in Biology. Overall, SISD high school students performed at par with area districts and the state. With the End of Course assessments in effect only since 2012, SISD secondary students are on course to continue improving and excelling.



2013-14 SISD graduates and scholarships

Team SISD celebrated 2,959 graduates in the Class of 2014, which earned approximately \$36.8 million in scholarships, grants, and military funds. Among those graduates, 50 completed the district's International Baccalaureate program; 156 earned not only a high school diploma from Mission Early College High School, but also an associate's degree from EPCC; and 85 graduated under the renowned Health Professions Academy, where students earn real-world experience in the healthcare field. In addition, 6,373 students earned certifications and licensures, which tripled from the previous year, through the district's Career and Technical Education program enabling them to get a head start in the workforce after graduation.



Paving the way to success now and in the future

Graduation is a journey that begins long before a student's senior year. It starts with a solid foundation in Pre-K and kindergarten, continues with close guidance and support through elementary and middle school, and flourishes with ample opportunities in high school with advanced academics, fine arts, athletics, and specialized instruction. Team SISD has reinforced that path to graduation and an awareness of a successful future for all students by cultivating a culture of college and career readiness. The efforts have culminated in a bold, innovative initiative called Operation College Bound.



One of the first building blocks of Operation College Bound was strengthening partnerships to promote excitement, awareness, and a "Yes I Can!" attitude about attending post-secondary institutions. Team SISD and El Paso Community College launched a first-of-its-kind partnership in the city with a flag-raising ceremony officially marking Campestre Elementary as a College Bound School. The elementary school and community college are working together to build elementary and college connections through tours, presentations, workshops, and outreach programs; embedding college awareness curriculum in the classroom; and involving parents to encourage and promote the importance of a college education. An introduction to the lucrative Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) field has taken off with robotics camps in Team SISD. Numerous schools offer the camps to give students hands-on experience in STEM. The students have fun building a robot, which they test in a friendly competition, while gaining the fundamentals of engineering, collaboration, and project-based learning.




Another stepping stone to Operation College Bound was the launch of Team SISD's A Pathway to Success campaign to assist eighth-graders and their parents in understanding the new House Bill 5 graduation requirements that will impact them as ninth-graders. A Pathway to Success is a support system to help students and their parents learn about endorsement options and required foundation courses,

understand changes to STAAR EOC tests, and design an overall plan for high school graduation. Team SISD made every effort to ensure the Class of 2018 was prepared to meet the requirements of HB5 and will continue to guide and support all students through A Pathway to Success! Every SISD high school offers an advanced academics academy with a focused area of study such as law and public administration, health science, STEM, and international affairs that provide students with opportunities to gain global knowledge and skills to succeed at the next level.



Actively engaged students

A productive and successful future for all graduates requires a well-rounded education that hones in on leadership, creativity, responsibility, time management, adaptability, and goal setting. The fine arts, athletics, and other co-curricular programs in Team SISD give students an opportunity to develop these skills outside of the classroom as well.

In the 2013-14 school year, SISD athletes earned 13 district, 9 bi-district, and 6 area and regional titles as well as one state championship in sports including football, volleyball, soccer, basketball, baseball, and track. Once again, an SISD student won the UTEP Flo Hyman Award for her contributions in academics, athletics, and leadership within the El Paso community. Numerous Team SISD student-athletes were also named to all-district academic teams. More than 45 SISD students were awarded scholarships, earned by excelling in athletics and academics, which enabled them to continue their education and compete at colleges and universities across the country.

Year after year, SISD students experience great success in the fine arts as well. They consistently earn top spots in competitions such as El Paso's Chalk the Block Event; El Paso Community College Annual Art Contest; All-Region Band, Choir, and Orchestra Selections; All-State Band, Choir, and Orchestra Selections; State One Act Play; Regional and National Winter Guard; and Dance Team Contests. In 2013, Eastlake High School advanced to state in the UIL Marching Band Contest. In addition, two SISD students were named to the 2013-14 All-State Orchestra.

The heart of Team SISD its people

Safety and security, teaching and learning, and the overall success of the district depend on the heart of the organization - the people who make up Team SISD. From the dedicated Board of Trustees to the outstanding teachers in the classroom, every member of Team SISD has a critical role and the district is strongly committed to maintaining highly qualified and effective faculty and staff.

The 2013-14 school year saw the first cohort of assistant principals complete the SUPES Aspire Academy in order to prepare for a successful future as a principal in Team SISD. The academy, the first of its kind in the region, is aligned to the district's strategic plan and designed to provide current, relevant, and research-based curricula to increase the capacity of the highest levels of leadership in the district. Of the 25 members of the inaugural group, nine have already been promoted to principal positions.


In order to support teachers with the latest technology, all 2,500 Team SISD teachers, librarians, and State Compensatory Education Intervention coaches were provided with a Surface RT tablet. The tablets level the playing field for all teachers giving them access to create lesson plans from wherever they are, look up their students' attendance, hook up to the white boards in their classroom, and communicate with colleagues and parents. It also allows them to use newer, more effective computer applications.

Ongoing professional development initiatives are aligned with Team SISD's curriculum and instruction priorities to emphasize the development of college readiness indicators that prepare SISD students for college and careers. To increase students' dual credit opportunities and invest in Team SISD teachers, an inaugural Dual Credit Scholarship program was launched to assist faculty in qualifying to teach dual credit courses. Forty-six teachers received scholarships for graduate-level courses in the first year of the program.

In addition, board trustees participate in regular workshops to further understand processes and policies to continue efficiently leading the district. One board member participated and graduated from the 2014 TASB Leadership Class and another board member is currently participating in the 2015 class. The program provides extensive training on every facet of effective board governance. Upon completion of the leadership training, the board trustees gain Master Trustee status.

SISD educators are 100 percent highly qualified

Team SISD once again earned a 100 percent highly qualified status for its more than 2,500 teachers and instructional aides in the fall of 2014.

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Listening to our community

The support system within Team SISD, which includes parents, families, partners, and volunteers, is the lifeline of the district. Their helping hands and hearts make a world of a difference for our students. Team SISD depends on and works to strengthen these home, school, and community partnerships to assist in the overall success of its schools and students.

An important way to strengthen relationships is by listening to all members of Team SISD. Feedback from stakeholders is always welcomed and encouraged on a daily basis in a variety of ways. Team SISD members can email the superintendent, comment or post news on the district's Facebook and Twitter pages, or write comments or concerns on feedback cards, which are regularly distributed at community meetings and other Team SISD public events.

In addition, Team SISD stakeholders can always find out the latest about the district via its weekly employee and community e-newsletters (sign-up to receive it at www.sisd.net/enews) and through the district website (www.sisd.net). Stakeholders can even share their favorite SISD photos in the annual Smile Team SISD: Superintendent's Photo Contest, which runs from September to May each school year.

Formal community input is also sought on a regular basis from our entire school community utilizing School Climate Surveys. SISD students, parents, and employees are encouraged to provide the district with an honest review of topics such as safety, communication, instruction, and school environment. SISD's first comprehensive districtwide climate survey, initiated in 2013, drove the development of the district's strategic plan with input from all stakeholders. The 2014 School Climate Survey offered employees an opportunity to voice their opinions on campus functions and operations. Both surveys have provided valuable feedback on the district's strengths as well as areas in need of improvement and have aided campuses to refine their individual Campus Improvement Plans.





Engaging through innovative programs

Every fall, Team SISD opens its doors to partners, volunteers, military families, and all parents from every school for its annual Team SISD Open House Community Meetings. The meetings, held at each high school in all SISD feeder areas, welcome thousands of parents for an evening of learning, collaboration, and entertainment. It's an opportunity each year for parents to hear firsthand from Team SISD's superintendent, meet principals, collaborate with educators, and network with other parents with the primary purpose of helping students to grow and succeed.

In the spring, Team SISD reaches out to its stakeholders via a multimedia forum, which is broadcast live on the district website and public access television, called "Achieving Success as a Team – LIVE!" It allows SISD's superintendent to update the public on the progress of district initiatives and to receive input in real time via e-mails, social media, and phone calls from community members. This innovative program is the first of its kind in the area and demonstrates Team SISD's commitment to open, two-way communication.

Unity with families and community

The SISD Partners in Education Program includes more than 250 active and dedicated businesses, organizations, and military units who continually support students and teachers with monetary donations and hours of service. During the 2013-14 school year, the SISD Volunteer Program had 8,730 registered volunteers. They logged in 142,185 hours, which is the equivalent of \$3.3 million in service. In addition, Team SISD worked closely with 14 military units and a full-time military liaison to ensure strong connections among Fort Bliss, SISD schools, and our military families.

The James Butler Spring Games is a major event in which all of Team SISD members come together to enjoy. More than 650 special education athletes participate in the games at the Student Activities Complex. They are cheered on by parents, students, and more than 100 volunteers from non-profits, businesses, military, and other community organizations who help with the event. The Watch D.O.G.S. program is another successful initiative that involves our students' fathers or father figures to help keep SISD schools safe. More than 13 SISD campuses offer the program.

Working efficiently and transparently

As everyone in Team SISD works side-by-side to ensure that all students are safe and receive the quality education they deserve, it is with the mindset that every role is critical to reaching 100 percent student success. Accountability for ALL is practiced across the board and each member of Team SISD recognizes the importance of executing their job with complete transparency, responsibility, and efficiency.

In 2013-14, Team SISD's Corrective Action Plan Committee was formed to ensure that every past, present, and future student was and is served fairly, equally, and fully to earn their high school diploma. The CAP committee met throughout the year to ensure all district and campus policies are aligned to state and federal regulations. The CAP reached out to students who may have left SISD schools and never completed their high school education via the website, e-newsletters, letters, and phone calls. Dozens of students were reached, and many of them were assisted to return to SISD to earn their diploma or GED. In a recent review of CAP activities, TEA officials applauded the district for establishing a model program.

In addition, two new positions were created – Internal Auditor in Academic Services and Academic Compliance Officer – to ensure the district remains transparent, compliant, and efficient in all practices and procedures. The SISD Fraud, Waste & Abuse Hotline was relaunched in 2013-14 and remains open for anyone to report illegal or fraudulent acts, waste of funds, abuse or theft of district property or funds, and academic fraud. The district takes all reports and complaints seriously and thoroughly investigates each one to ensure that all Team SISD members are acting in good faith and doing what's best for children every day. 
Managing taxpayers' investment in student success

Team SISD's commitment to excellence for students and all stakeholders is evident in its numerous recognitions and accomplishments in operational management, especially in finances and facilities. SISD's Financial Services Department operates efficiently and effectively to maintain a balanced budget with transparency, accountability, and responsibility. In doing so, it has garnered recognition year after year:

- 2014 Texas Comptroller Platinum Leadership Circle Award with 21 out of 22 maximum points;
- Superior Achievement rating in the 2014 Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas (FIRST) for the third year in a row with a perfect score of 70 points;
- 2014 Texas Association of School Business Officials (TASBO) Award of Merit showing a continued commitment to follow professional standards in the acquisition of goods and services for four consecutive years.

In bond ratings, SISD yielded a Aa2 underlying rating and stable outlook from Moody's Investors Service in June 2014, which cited the district's solid financial operations. The Fitch Ratings assigned the district an AA- underlying rating based on a strong financial profile, significant state support, promising growth prospects, and maintaining solid reserves.

Team SISD maintained the same tax rate of \$1.27 from the previous year. The Maintenance and Operations rate of 97 cents has remained below the state's allowable \$1.04 (without voter approval) rate as part of the SISD Board of Trustees' commitment to operating the district with fiscal responsibility and without burdening taxpayers.



Building for the future

Team SISD has consistently been a good steward of taxpayers' money using funds responsibly to support student instruction and provide the best educational facilities in the region. As Bond 2011 projects are near 100 percent completion, Team SISD has remained true to its motto of "Promises Made, Promises Kept" delivering new construction and facilities improvements on time and within budget.

The hard work and efficient management of bond projects by the SISD facilities and planning staff resulted in \$37 million in savings, which will allow for additional work to be completed without burdening taxpayers. These savings will allow the district to upgrade air conditioning systems to refrigerated air at middle schools that previously relied on swamp coolers. The allocation of remaining savings will be vetted through an open, transparent process.

New schools were built in Socorro ISD as a result of Bond 2011. The James P. Butler Elementary School and SSG. Manuel R. Puentes Middle School combination campus opened its doors at the beginning of the 2013-14 school year. Mission Ridge Elementary School was ready to open for the 2014-15 school year. The newest school, Purple Heart Elementary School, will be open to students in the El Dorado feeder area in the 2015-16 school year. Additionally, the conversion of the El Dorado 9th Grade Academy to Pebble Hills High School will be completed in time to open the campus for the 2015-16 school year.

Since the voter-approved Bond 2011 began, the Bond Accountability Committee has ensured and promoted communication and accountability surrounding all elements of bond projects. The committee meets quarterly to discuss progress of Bond 2011. It is an independent citizens committee that reports to the SISD Board of Trustees and the general public.
