Dear Parents

The new St George's Academy is now six months old and we are settling into our routines. Year 11 and the Sixth Form have just finished their examinations and we now have the long wait to see the results in the summer. We all wish them well and they deserve to do well after seeing how hard they have worked. The majority of the other students have now finished their internal exams. The students will all be ready for a break after their efforts. A2 and AS results for the Sixth Form are available on Thursday August 19th and GCSE results for Year 11 on Tuesday August 24th.

The plans for the building work have been continuing against a background of uncertainty with the proposed Government cuts. It is likely that we will not know until the late summer where our project stands. In the meantime, we are continuing to plan for our start date for new buildings of February 2011. The students have been contributing to the plans and there will be a formal consultation to which parents will be invited. We all live in hope that the project will be spared and I will let parents know where we stand as soon as I can.

The new uniform is going ahead and all of the students have been measured for their new blazers. The uniform will be here in the last week of term when it will be given to the children to take home. The new uniform comes into effect from September 2010. The Academy will be keeping a small stock of items to help any family that finds the cost of uniform difficult: please just write to me if you need any help. There are also some discounted bags and coats available from Sleaford Clothing over the summer, which will again help parents.

The staff are all in place ready for next year; the decorators are booked for the annual summer painting and the new intake have all been allocated to their tutor groups ready for the start in September. It is now time for the Academy to take a well-earned break. The staff and students can have a rest. I hope families have an enjoyable time together over the summer and I look forward to meeting everybody, refreshed, on Monday 6th September 2010.

I would like to take the opportunity of thanking the parents for their support over the year. The students do so well in no small part because of the way in which staff and parents work together. It is not easy developing young people, but it is a lot easier working in partnership together.

Fairtrade

With the Sleaford Town Council supporting the resolution for Sleaford to become a Fairtrade Town, the Academy's focus had to be broadened. We were no longer solely striving to promote the work of Fairtrade with respect to the Academy but for the Town as a whole.

The first notable effort was the superb work of students as they collected, analysed and then produced a report on the understanding and the interest shown by shoppers in Sleaford. The Academy then hosted the Sleaford Fairtrade Year 6 and Year 7 Poster competition for all primary and secondary schools. It would allow students in those school years to produce a poster for display in shop windows across Sleaford during Fairtrade Fortnight. It would also encourage liaison between all of the schools. The winning poster was kindly judged by ClIr Gordon Blythe, the Mayor of Sleaford. Anna Killen of Our Lady of Good Counsel Roman Catholic Primary School in Sleaford beat 150 other entrants with her design showing the Fairtrade symbol as the world being cupped by a pair of hands representing different cultures.

In the Academy students were still learning about Fairtrade. In Geography musical Raps were attempted. Sadly none were able to be recorded but we did capture some of the lyrics.

In Mathematics we were able to run a competition where the stock prices of various commodities were tracked over a significant period of time. These commodities included coffee and cocoa which allowed discussion of the Fairtrade premium and the benefits that this gives to the producers and their communities. After Christmas we were notified that eleven of the students from the Academy had been selected as winners of the Diana Princess of Wales Certificate of Excellence. This award, which was presented to two representatives from the Academy on Friday 26th February in the ornate Chapter House of Lincoln Cathedral, is a superb honour as it shows clearly the level of work and dedication that the students have given to promote Fairtrade over the past three years. This award will stand them in good stead in the future.

The winners were Philip Ingram-Jannetta, Liam Hallacy, Michael Osborne, Callum Thursby, Rhys Mood, Annie-Mae Routledge, Zak Smith, Jordan Day, James Ward, Laura Batten and Charlotte Caves.

As Fairtrade Fortnight commenced, the Public Services Students from the Academy were asked to interview businesses across Sleaford to determine who sells Fairtrade products. We were then able to show the results in an interactive map of Sleaford to be found at <u>http://is.gd/8JzFu</u>

The Fairtrade Fortnight Wordsearch competition was won by Miss Clark – we hope she enjoyed the chocolates, drinks and wine which were all available in that winning £10 prize. We were able to 'swap' a number of great Fairtrade items in the Staffroom. Staff were encouraged to pay $\pounds 1$ for a range of Fairtrade tea, coffee, hot chocolate and biscuits – encouraging them to consider the swap to Fairtrade.

We were also notified by Randstad Education that Philip Ingram-Jannetta had won the Lincolnshire Good Citizen's Award for 2009-10. This was a great achievement, showing his commitment to Fairtrade and his willingness to promote the cause so consistently and enthusiastically.

At a Sleaford Fairtrade Group meeting, Mr Stoner had asked if it were possible for Sainsbury's and the Lincolnshire Co-Operative Society to provide 100 pineapples to coincide with the visit of Diana Manasseh, a Ghanaian pineapple producer – one of the visiting Fairtrade producers hosted by the Fairtrade Foundation. On Friday 5th March we were able to give her the opportunity to speak to 500 Year 7 & Year 8 students during their assembly and, equally importantly, bring Church Lane, Our Lady of Good Counsel and William Alvey Primary School students together with Kesteven and Sleaford High School Year 7 girls to ask her more questions. It was during this latter time that we learned so much about Fairtrade – it gave the students real enthusiasm to return to their schools and explain what they

Each school was given 20 pineapples which they could cut up and give away to allow students to taste how good a Fairtrade pineapple was. In fact, due to the generosity of Sainsbury's we were able to go to the Farmers' Market on Saturday 6th March and give away more pineapple to the shoppers of Sleaford!! Did you get some?

In terms of sales on the Friday lunchtime Fairtrade stall we have seen a slight drop over this year, compared to last year's sales. Nevertheless, we are more interested in promoting sales overall. If you can buy the Fairtrade items cheaper, then please go there and buy the product (or two). We will endeavour to broaden what we do in the Academy even further over the next year and we also look forward to the new Y7 students next year who are already committed to Fairtrade!

May I leave you with the comment made by Diana Manasseh, the Ghanaian pineapple producer. Her company produces **100,000 boxes** of Fairtrade pineapples per year. However, she only sells 30% of that total to Fairtrade. Why? **Because we do not create sufficient demand for her to sell the remainder.** Despite the higher quality criteria that they have to meet to be 'Fairtrade', they have to sell the remainder to other intermediaries who will not give them the additional Fairtrade premium which allows the local community to enjoy what we take for granted: nearby water, medical facilities and an education. There's still time to make that Big Swap!

Academy Council

As the new Chairperson of the Academy Council, I am finding it to be an interesting time to be involved within the Academy. The forthcoming years promise to bring exciting new developments to the Academy with both new buildings and improvements in the standard of technological resources available to us as students.

In the midst of such opportunity, the Academy's Senior Management Team could be forgiven if they had decided to implement their own vision for the future of the Academy. However, at no time has this been the case. The Academy Council has been involved in every major decision on the redevelopments, from the layout and furniture of the new 6th Form area to the possibilities of incorporating green initiatives into the construction of the new buildings. Combined with a dedicated group of students that form a working party consulting regularly with the architects designing the new buildings, students are always abreast of what the plans are for their new look Academy.

However, the Academy Council plays a much wider part in St George's life than solely discussing the future site plans. Last year on their own initiative students formed the "ABC" – the "Anti Bullying Committee" – on the Sleaford site which offers free and confidential counselling to students in need of advice as the result of bullying or intimidation. The service is staffed every lunch time by student volunteers and has been a success in reducing bullying around the site.

Odd as it may seem, the end of each academic year is always the busiest part of the year and for the Academy Council this is no exception as we have been heavily involved in staff interviews for new appointments for 2010 / 2011. The interviewing panel is comprised of students from Year 7 through to Year 13, allowing as many students as possible to gain the experience of a work interview experience. This unique approach to appointing new staff demonstrates the level of trust and responsibility given to students by the staff and I believe allows our Council to be a highly effective Student Voice.

Finally, as we look ahead to September I will hope to carry on with the progress made by my predecessors and hope that as the Academy begins an exciting new chapter, we will continue to be involved in as many exciting opportunities as we currently are.

Year 9


Creative and Media Diploma

Mr Parry's retirement



'Hobson's Choice' - From Billingborough to 1880s Salford – via Catford!



Thursday 18th March saw Mrs Briggs' two Year 11 English groups trooping sensibly onto the coach ready to embark on their long awaited trip to Catford, South London, to see 'Hobson's Choice' – a play by Harold Brighouse and one of their set texts.

Spirits were high and i-pods and phones were charged as we headed into the wild blue yonder that is 'The South'. We made good time and there were deep sighs of relief all round when we stopped for a 'comfort break' at the service area. Still in good time we pushed on, South of the Thames, and hit our first major traffic snarl up within 3 miles of our destination. Not too bad!

On arrival we found that we were only one of two schools in the audience and that the performance would be in the so-called *Studio*

Theatre rather than the main theatre. The Studio was 'bijoux' to say the least, seating only about 80.

Like lemmings to the cliff edge the lads made for the back row – a poor decision. All of them nearing or in excess of 6ft tall, they wedged themselves into the back seats which had limited headroom and by the interval they looked as if they were auditioning for the part of 'The Hunchback of Notre Dame.'

What of the play?

The piece follows three daughters of a bullying, hard drinking father – a bootmaker - struggling to achieve independence and find husbands in a (Victorian) Man's World. Oh – and by the way - it's a comedy!

The play may be a period piece, but the issues still strike a chord and it isn't difficult for a modern audience to relate to and sympathise with the characters: the self-improving Maggie, enthusiastically portrayed by Tegwen Tucker; the awkward and initially illiterate fiancée Will Mossop played by Sean Pol McGreevy and, though it's harder to feel sorry for Henry Horatio Hobson – the bullying father of three daughters - Anthony Wise did manage to elicit the tiniest morsel of sympathy from the audience when he finally got his comeuppance.

The costumes were authentic and the set did enough to suggest the time and place. More important though was the opportunity to experience the drama in a theatre – as intended.

By the end of the fourth act we felt we knew the characters and the plot that bit better and although very warm and numb in certain regions we made our way back to the rendezvous point certain in the knowledge that this had all been worthwhile.

Our return trip hit rush hour traffic which held us up again and there were some impressive sprints to the toilets when we eventually stopped off at the service area for our return visit!

Everyone seemed to enjoy the day immensely, including Mrs Briggs, Mrs Crawshaw and Mrs Goddard who accompanied the students.

Humanities

Natural History Museum visit 3rd March

The Geography Department's annual Gifted and Talented students' visit to the Museum took place in March. The students were given the choice of which galleries they wanted to visit and the most popular (as in most years) were the dinosaurs, creepy crawlies and mammals. The students always seem to be spellbound at the size of the blue whale and fascinated by the dinosaur skeletons.

The main thrust of our visit is to take the students to the Earth Galleries and extend their classroom based learning with some hands on (as best we can) experience of earthquakes and volcanoes. The earthquake simulator gives the students a very good idea of what it must be like to cope with an earthquake and was visited in excess of five times by some of our students! The Earth Galleries have helped to bring the natural hazards alive for our students and their interest and enthusiasm in their work was a real pleasure to witness. They applied themselves to their studies and appeared to be enjoying this style of learning.

The students were a pleasure to take on this visit and hopefully the memory of it will last long and fuel there interest in such a fascinating subject.

Gibraltar Point 18th March

The AS Level students were taken to visit the sand dune ecosystem at Gibraltar Point to study the psammosere. As part of the course and a pre-requisite for the right to call yourself a geographer you need to get your hands dirty and complete fieldwork. The students were given the opportunity to develop their skills on this visit and grasped this with both hands.

The task the students were given was to discover whether Gibraltar Point's dunes were 'typical'. To investigate this they had to measure the profile of the dunes and study some biotic (living) and abiotic (non-living) factors. It didn't take the students long to grasp how to use the equipment and the data collection was quite a speedy affair. Our thanks must go out to our 'model' Joe Hyatt who was prepared to get covered in sand to replicate the initial phase in the formation of a dune; he was a very lifelike dead animal!

The data was used by the students on their return to the classroom and the opportunity to get their hands dirty has part qualified them to be called geographers, next step is passing the course! The students were fantastic to work with; they worked very well as a team, supported each other and made the most of the experience.

The Holderness Coast

With the advent of controlled assessment and no longer coursework the Geography Department decided to use the Holderness coast for their GCSE investigative work this year. On the 29th April we left St George's and took a scenic drive over the Humber Bridge and onward to the spectacular headland of Flamborough.



The students were quite rightly impressed with the surroundings, but they quickly got down to the main reason of the visit - collecting data on coastal features. The students very quickly found the best ways to collect all the data they needed in their groups using the ranging poles, clinometers, tape measures, roundness charts, etc. We visited two other sites along the coast, one at Mappleton and the last stop was at Spurn Point. The students collected data at each site to enable them to complete their assessment back at St George's.

It was a whistle stop tour along the Holderness Coast which I hope will live long in their memory. It is a wonderful part of our country and holds some very spectacular features, such as the caves and arches shown in the photo and the fabulous spit at Spurn Point. The students worked very hard throughout a long day and hopefully have used the data well to complete their assessments.

Bosworth Battlefield / Twycross Zoo 23rd & 24th June

This visit took place over two days this year and again proved to be a highlight of our visits calendar. Ninety students from Year 8 took part in the visit to look at the famous Bosworth battlefield, taking part in a little re-enactment and looking at the weapons used at the time. The students really enjoyed this and took part enthusiastically in the drills!

The time spent at the Zoo focused on endangered species; where they are found in the world and why they are threatened. The Zoo has a very active role in conservation and the students spent a lot of their time investigating this. It has to be said that the students love visiting the Zoo (as do the teachers) and are fascinated by the variety of animals there; the elephants are always a favourite! This visit was again very successful with the students behaving very well and enjoying, for a change, some excellent weather.

Tallington Lakes

On the Easter ILID day Year 9 at the Billingborough site were treated to a great day out at Tallington Lakes. Having ordered the sunshine Mr. Walker, Miss Keegan, Mr Dixon, Mrs McDonnell, Mrs Dickinson and 38 Year 9 students set off in search of sporting adventures.

The day consisted of three activities on a rotational basis with a little time for a lunch by the lake. Rock climbing proved to be more difficult than a lot of people first thought. Miss Keegan proved herself to be a nimble climber whilst students such as Nicola Thompson did some good climbs.

Another activity was Kayaking. Once they had been given dry land lessons students quickly came to grips with their marine craft. Aside from the paddle and boat issues, Mr Dixon proved his worth by cheating and capsizing students on a regular basis. The last activity was raft building. Question: how do you make a water borne craft using four plastic barrels and a rope? We start the lessons by sitting around the island which is built in the middle of the room. Mrs Baldwin, our RE teacher, tells us the story, explaining how we became stranded. She introduces us to different scenarios that we have to deal with each week.

In the first week we were introduced to the characters that are stranded on the island. Afterwards Mrs Baldwin explained the scenario and we did an activity on what we would miss and what we would need to survive. We then shared our ideas with the whole group.





In the second week a baby was born into the community and we had to design a welcoming ceremony for the baby. We had to think about where the ceremony would be held, what would happen at the ceremony and what special words would be said to welcome the baby into the community. 

September last year marked a landmark event for St George's at Sleaford. Twenty of our Sixth Form students joined the first ever Public Services Course and have been busily engaged in the BTEC First Diploma in Public Services.

Since the course started the peace and quiet of the Academy's Sleaford site has already been shattered by the arrival of a Royal Navy Lynx helicopter, numerous activities with the Royal Navy, Royal Marine Commandos, the Army, Royal Air Force, Lincolnshire's Police, Fire and Rescue and the EMAS paramedics, not to mention the Public Services Students doing their infamous winter 'mud runs' around the campus!

And it doesn't stop there! The students have thrown themselves into all aspects of school life, helping to organise all sorts of activities and events from conker competitions to car parking – they've been doing it all. Perhaps the most



testing moment for some of the students was the Expedition to the Peak District, for others it was completing the high ropes course at RAF Coningsby,



whilst some found their HSE recognised first aid course a real challenge – but nevertheless, a worthwhile additional qualification.

Perhaps one of the biggest impacts in the Academy has been the use of students to help support Lunchtime Supervisors and activities. As usual, they threw themselves into this role and were soon helping staff and other students with a variety of activities around the school.

The majority of the course is 'hands on' – and this involves a lot of guest speakers and practical based assignments. Funnily enough the visits to Public Services agencies are always well attended! And there's more... Lincolnshire Police were so impressed by our students that they have become a regular feature and act as criminals and casualties in a variety of role play exercises. It's strange but the students actually like being arrested and bundled into police vehicles!



If you thought the Public Services course was just about the Armed Forces then think again! – we spend just as much time with the Fire and Rescue, Police and Ambulance Services as we do with the Armed Forces! We've even been involved with the staff at the local young offenders secure unit. Next year we will be involved with lots of other organisations including the RNLI, Coast Guard, HMRC and other uniformed charitable organisations – after all, they're Public Services too and more importantly they also have career opportunities!

There aren't many courses that can stretch and challenge you as much as a Public Services course. You will develop new skills and be put out of your comfort zone on a frequent basis, achieving things you never thought possible! The skills you will learn are highly sought after by employers but especially by Public Services. So it's not surprising that the courses are very popular with students!



Our course is specifically designed with input from a variety of statutory and non-statutory organisations, to give students a detailed insight into Public Services life and the variety of career opportunities available to them. A Year in the Life of a Public Services Group

The Ruskington St George's site has an active and thriving Public Services group with a present cohort of 51 students involved. This will rise in September 2010 to a total of 72. A popular options choice, it is run by Mrs Broughton and linked on occasion with the Sixth Form group, run by Mr Walker, Head of Public Services at the Academy.

This year the Year 10 and Year 11 members have had so many opportunities to experience Public Services life, working at its best. Links have been made with the local Police Force, the Army, the Royal Navy, the Royal Air Force, the Ambulance Service and the Royal Marines.

In September 2010 the students were able to see another side to the talents of the Forces when they went to see a music festival organised by Rhythm Force based at the Army Corps Of Music at Twickenham. This gave students the chance to see how talented members of the Army are and how diverse their roles can be.

During the autumn term the students visited Prince William Of Gloucester Barracks and took part in the assault course, learned to abseil the climbing wall and solved Command Tasks. All of these activities were carried out just as the Army recruits would have to do.

The Royal Marines paid us a visit and gave an interesting presentation showing the realities of the life they lead, with footage of their work in Afghanistan. They also arranged team building activities for our young people to take part in, based on their own training programme.

In December, we were hosts to the Crime Scene Forensic Day and our budding investigators were given an insight into the work of the Forensic Department. The day culminated in them being able to solve a murder based on forensic evidence at the school. The students found this to be highly entertaining and enjoyed taking DNA and fingerprints from each other. Everyone wanted to keep the Scene Of Crime Officer Suits at the end of it, such was the success of the day!

2010 started and there was no stopping the group now. Firmly into the subject they looked forward to visits from the RAF, who were happy to help us, showing how their team building skills enabled them to be a major fighting force and practising them with the students. One activity took an hour to complete - how can passing a ball across a school hall with 2 pieces of drainpipe cause so much trouble!

Presentations from the Police Force and the Fire Service about "Driving and Its Effects" provided the young people with a lot of information and food for thought about the horrific incidents that can occur when you take your place behind a steering wheel. They were hard hitting talks, but hopefully a lot was learned and if it has saved one student from driving without due care and attention in the future then it is worthwhile.

"A Day in the Life of a Police Dog Handler" was a talk given by our local Police Force and this was met with enthusiasm from all of the students, many of whom now want to pursue this as a career!

Eight Year 10 students and the Sixth Form Public Services group spent 4 days together at The Prince William Of Gloucester Barracks in June 2010, taking part in the Army "Look At Life Course". This course is totally run by the Army and is a residential trip. The potential Army Recruits for the 4 days, live and work just as the Army do in training. Rising at 5:30 am and not sleeping again until late at night or the early hours of the morning was a shock to the system! Coupled with having to make your own bed, complete with hospital corners (no duvets!) this could have been a recipe for disaster, but our brave soldiers got on with it and if it took them 10 attempts they still did it!!!

Their days were spent doing fitness tests, command tasks, orienteering, map reading, practising field signals and Drill, assault courses and even a night exercise, meeting the Enemy. One young man came back into school Friday afternoon and fell asleep at the desk! Another slept for 22 hours when he got home and yet another had the worst case of blisters ever, but still continued to take part in everything. Prior to the trip some of our young men were dreading working with the Sixth Formers, whom they barely knew, but by the end of the Course they thought some of them were legends! All in all a good time was had by everyone.

Ayoub Sinclair, a student who took part in the "Look at Life Course" had this to say:

The week was a very disciplining week. The course taught you to work as part of a team and not to give up, even if you know whatever you do you will lose. We had our first test to break us the hour we went; we had to make our beds perfectly – and even if the bed was absolutely perfect they would trash it and make you do it again and again so they'd keep trying to break you down. The things they would build you up to do were really technical, but you don't even realise it, like the food. They give you fatty food and you think, "wouldn't they give you more healthy kind of things to eat" but the fatty food was for your calories to burn out throughout your busy day and it builds up your muscular system, because all the fatty foods turn all the fat to muscle when you do your training and physical activities. So if you'd stay there for at least a year you'd come out like a body builder. Met Club

A new club that has been started by Mrs Jewell has been very active this year. Students have been trying their hands at being weather forecasters by using data from a radio linked mini weather station and comparing it with other sites around the UK. Other activities have included

- Carrying out a short ICT project using the 'mini-digit' software; students performed basic data analysis of weather data and looked at different means of presenting data to the uninformed general public.
- Performing practical investigations on deep water convection currents (to mimic the Gulf Stream) using water tanks, dye and different water temperature.
- Observing and then identifying cloud formations.
- Creating charts for the UK using information from the on-site weather station.
- Investigating convection in air through tornado and hurricane patterns and investigating the damage/danger that they can cause.
- Pressure changes were investigated using marshmallow and vacuum pumps and applied to cloud formations and rain carrying capacity.
- Global weather systems and local weather were described through individual projects where the group researched global weather patterns and then chose a region and researched the effect that the weather has on the habitat and temperature/rainfall patterns.

Astronomy Club


