In a Presidents' workshop in Florence on the occasion of the Calendar Conference at the end of October several subjects will be discussed. There is no doubt that our sport is well received by the media and the public, on the condition that we achieve an attractive presentation with high quality in all areas. To reach this demanding target our structure has to develop a more professional base in the near future, including more working capacity by respecting our financial resources. Without this step we risk not to keep our strong position in the market and in the view of public opinion.

Any loss in this direction will not allow us to organise such successful Championships in the future as we had in Munich. The consequences will be an influence on the financial background of our federation. The important assistance and support

to our Member Federations will be put in question which is an unacceptable situation. Therefore I ask you all for your support in this matter.

100th EAA Council meeting in Interlaken (SUI)

Review of a successful year and outlook for the future

A review of the end of the athletics' season and the outlook for the future were the basic themes for the 100th meeting of the EAA Council. In Interlaken (SUI) in the heart of the Bernese Alps the Council took some decisive steps.

In a general retrospective and mainly related to the two highlights, the European Indoor and Outdoor Championships, the Council expressed its satisfaction with this year's events. «It was a succesful year of European athletics with a high standard and high quality. It gave an excellent reputation and a great image to athletics on our continent», EAA President Hansjörg Wirz summarised the conclusion of • the Council's discussions. «We made an outstanding effort and engagement», Wirz said. «Now we have to maintain this standard according to the future require-

The Council analysed the situation and agreed to implement a procedure in which the following matters are touched:

- · The centralisation of the staff in one
- · To increase the working capacity in different fields and to adapt the responsibilities to the future
- To secure the non profit status and solve the related questions re. tax and
- Adapting the communication system to modern requirements
- Handling marketing and event man-

Jubilee Council Meeting - celebration on a summit and on a lake

Following in James Bond's footsteps

A cable car ride to the top of one of the famous summits in the Swiss Alps and a rainy boat trip on the Lake of Brienz was the special program to celebrate the 100th meeting of the EAA Council in Interlaken (SUI).

As usual James Bond was a bit faster. As he was on the Schilthorn, which was called «Piz Gloria» in the 007 movie «On Her Majesty's Secret Service», as when Bond completed the filming work in Switzerland by April 1969 the European Athletic Association had not yet been founded. It was one year later that the EAA became an independent continental organisation, and it was on 8 November 1970 when the EAA Council met for the first time in Paris.

At 3000m, on top of the Schilthorn, EAA President Hansjörg Wirz gave a speech of thanks to all those engaged in the large work of the past months. «We are now in the mountains. And there, we know, that when climbing to the summit, we often only have the opportunity to go up because there is no way back. It looks

similar for our association. We have to look forward and we have to go the way of the future», Wirz said.

A very good panoramic view over the Swiss Alps and a good glass of wine (not like Bond, who, in the same place drank «Martini, shaken not stirred») was an exciting combination. And the very experienced travellers took note that a cable car ride into a cloud has no effects, the opposite to a flight in the same conditions.

On Sunday the Hotel Giessbach surrounded by water falls was, despite the bad weather, again a very special place to go. And the guests from all over Europe learned that it is not just the Swiss railway but also the Swiss boats which keep a strict eye on timely departures...

First Council meeting in Paris

The 1st meeting of the EAA Council was held on Sunday, 8 November 1970, in Paris and was led by President Adriaan Paulen. It started at 9.20 am and ended at 0.20 pm (!). The sixteen members of the Council elected L. Khomenkov as Vice President, granted the 3rd European Indoor Championships 1972 to Grenoble (FRA), elected the Jury of Appeal for several events and set the entry standards for the European Indoor Championships 1971.

Beside that the Council decided to appoint an European Competition Rules Advisory Panel and discussed the Congress wish to appoint an ad-hoc Commission for Juniors. The Council decided not to follow this request but to ask the Federations if they want changes in the rules for the Junior Championships and whether they are in favour of official European Junior Records. It is interesting to read that everybody is aware of the impossibility to end to a standardization in all European countries».

The 100 Council meetings were held in 31 countries and 58 different cities. Once the EAA Council had an official meeting outside of Europe, on 17 July 1976 in Montreal (CAN). Budapest, Rome and Helsinki are the leaders hosting the EAA Council.

Munich winners and record holders

For the 10th time the European Athletic Association will award the best female and male athlete of the outgoing season with the Waterford Crystal European Athlete of the Year Trophy. The internet poll on www.european-athletics.org is open for everybody until 15 December and some prizes can be won.

Two times 15 athletes are proposed as candidates for the «Waterford Crystal European Athlete of the Year Trophy 2002». Among them 25 European Champions, three World and seven new European record holders. Although based on objective criteria there may be subjective feelings. The vote is fully open, and other names can be added in the voting form.

This year the procedure of counting the votes has been slightly changed. The opinions will first be counted by country and then the country results added to the final results. So, the so called «national buyers», known for instance from figure skating judges, will have less influence on the final ranking.

Candidates Men

Steve Backley (GBR): Won his 4th consecutive European title in the javelin with 88.54, 3rd best world performer of the year.

Dwain Chambers (GBR): Won the 100 m European title (9.96). Later equalled the European record (9.87). On four occasions, ran under 10.00 seconds.

Stéphane Diagana (FRA): Won the 400 m hurdles European title with 47.58, 3rd best world and leading European mark of the year.

Jonathan Edwards (GBR): World leader in the triple jump (17.86), European silver medalist and winner of the World Cup.

Róbert Fazekas (HUN): This years world leader (71.70/4th best world performer of all-time), European champion (68.83) and the World Cup winner (71.25) in the discus.

Francisco Javier Fernández (ESP):

Set a Championship record of 1:18:37 to win the European title in 20km Walk. Earlier, smashed the world best with a time of 1:17:22.

Colin Jackson (GBR): Won his 4th consecutive European title in 110 hurdles with 13.11, leading European mark of the year. Earlier in the season, won the European indoor 60 m hurdles title (7.40).

Konstantinos Kenteris (GRE): Ran a personal best of 19.85 to win the European 200 title. 2nd best European performer of all-time, equal world best mark of the year.

Wilson Kipketer (DEN): The European 800 m champion (1:47.25). World year leader with 1:42.32.

Robert Korzeniowski (POL): Set a world record of 3:36:39 in 50km Walk to retain his European title.

Sergey Makarov (RUS): World leader in the javelin with 92.61, 3rd best world performer of all-time. Silver medallist in the European Championships (88.05) and World Cup winner.

Christian Olsson (SWE): The European champion in the triple jump, indoors (17.54) and out (17.53). Set a European indoor record (17.80). No. 3 on the world and European outdoor year list with 17.64.

Roman Sebrle (CZE): Won the European decathlon title (8800 pts). Lost once in four decathlons, scoring 8800, 8701 and 8800, top-three totals of the year. Earlier in the season, won the European indoor heptathlon title.

Ingo Schultz (GER): European 400 m winner in 400 with 45.14. European year leader (44.86).

Simon Vroemen (NED): Set a European record of 8:06.91 in 3000 steeple. Narrowly lost the European title (8:24.45 – 8:24.34).

Glory Alozie (ESP): European 100 m hurdles title winner with 12.73. European year leader (12.60).

Süreyya Ayhan (TUR): In her late season debut, won the European 1500 title with 3:58.79. Later ran 3:57.75, leading world mark of the year. Undefeated in five races, including the World Cup.

Kajsa Bergqvist (SWE): Year leader (2.05/equal-3rd best outdoor performer of all-time) and the European high jump champion (1.98).


Jolanda Ceplak (SLO): The European 800 m title winner, indoors (1:55.82/ world indoor record) and out (1:57.65). World year leader with 1:55.19.

Svetlana Feofanova (RUS): Won the European title in the pole vault, indoors (4.75/indoor world record) and out (4.60). Set outdoor European records of 4.76 and 4.78, 2nd best mark of alltime

Muriel Hurtis (FRA): Won the European title in 200, indoors (22.52) and out (22.43). No.2 on the European year list in 100 (10.96) and 200

Olimpiada Ivanova (RUS): Set a Championship best of 1:26:42, the leading world mark of the year in 20km Walk, to win the European title.

Irina Korzhanenko (RUS): European champion in the shot put with a worldleading 20.64 and World Cup winner.



Tatyana Kotova (RUS): Won the European Cup in the long jump with 7.42, 5th best performer of all-time, the world's longest jump for eight years. Also won the European title (6.85) and the World Cup (6.85).

Olga Kuzenkova (RUS): Year leader (73.07) and the European champion (72.94) in the hammer throw.

Mirela Manjani (GRE): Set a Championship record of 67.47, world best mark of the year in the javelin, to win the European title.

Yuliya Pechyonkina (RUS): Won European and World Cup 400 hurdles (53.38/53.74). Earlier ran 53.10, leading world mark of the year, 4th best European performer of all-time.

Paula Radcliffe (GBR): Won the Commonwealth Games title in 5000(14:31.42/5th best performer of all-time) and the European title in 10000 (30:01.09/2nd best mark of alltime), both leading world marks of the year. In her debut early in the year, she won the London marathon in 2:18:56, the 2nd best mark of all-time.

Gabriela Szabo (ROM): Set a European record of 8:21.42 in 3000, 5th best world performer of all-time. Silver medallist in the European Championships in 1500 (3:58.81). Later improved her year best to 3:58.78. Also ran 14:34.29 in 5000, 3rd best world mark of the year.

Alesya Turova (BLR): In her first-ever 3000 steeple race, set a world record of 9:21.72. Later improved her record to 9:16.51.

More TV hours than at the last five championships

The 18th European Championships had more TV coverage than the previous five editions of this event. This is the result of a first provisional overview on the TV figures. During the six competition days in Munich 1083 hours of TV transmission were produced; 992 hours on terrestrial networks and 91 hours on satellite channels.

Record TV coverage for the SPAR European Cup

The SPAR European Cup in Annecy had a record TV coverage of more than 82 hours. It was broadcast in 9 European countries on terrestrial networks, reaching over 55 million cumulative viewers, as well as on the pan-European network, Eurosport. Eurosport is broadcast in 54 countries throughout Europe and reaches a potential viewing audience of 250 million.

Europe - convincing (again) not just from an organisational point of view

European cross country has new strength

A look at the cross country calendar proves it: Cross Country takes place mainly in Europe. World Championships were held in Belfast, Vilamoura, Ostende, Dublin - and at the end of March 2003 in Lausanne. On the IAAF Cross Country Circuit, besides Chiba in Japan and Nairobi in Kenya all the races are located in Europe.

In international races it is mostly runners from Africa who are winning, Kenyans, Ethiopians, Moroccans ... and other nations from Africa are approaching the top level. But the results also show another development, the Europeans are coming back stronger. The successes of Paula Radcliffe (GBR), Sergey Lebid (UKR) and Paulo Guerra (POR) are proving that the sport's home continent has a new strength.

One reason for this may be the introduction of continental cross country events. Those attending the last SPAR European Cross Country Champsionships in Thun with 360 athletes and 27 nations witnessed a certain resurgence. About 10'000 spectators around the course on an army ground created an exciting atmosphere. Transponder chips for the timing and ranking, Touch Screens for the media with online data service and a 70m2 giant video screen with live coverage of the races were some of the newer

elements which brought the quality of this event to a high level.

«Looking at the strong concurrence in the market by other sports we cannot leave it to chance that this sport remains interesting for general sports fans», EAA General Secretary Till Lufft said. Some months later at the European Indoor Championships in Vienna as well as at the Outdoors in Munich the development continued yet further. Athletics becomes very popular once more, with a more modern approach.

Like at the SPAR European Cross Country Championships in Velenje (SLO) the organisers in Medulin in Croatia will show at the 9th championships the newly acquired power of countries from the former Yugoslavia. But the organisation is just one side, self confidence and the high level progression are others.

Strong fields in Thun proved the value of this event, which quickly became a very important meeting of the top European runners. Even if athletes like Paula Radcliffe or John Brown are not taking part and for some athletes the regeneration after a marathon takes priority, the value is still inherent.

We need just to ask if the date in early December is the right one. Especially after a long and hard season which includes some road running highlights in September and October. Maybe a move into early March within the preparation period for the world championships would be the right step?



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Goodbye with another medal win

At the European Championships she had a big wish: Sabine Braun wanted to win a medal one more time. And the woman who has been on the heptathlon circuit for about 20 years fullfilled her dream: the two time World Champion won the silver medal in Munich.

She became secondwith 6434 points behind the young Swedish athlete, Carolina Klüft, who won with a new junior-World Record of 6542 points. It was a medal with a special meaning for the 37 year old Sabine Braun because the grand dame of the heptathlon retired after Munich. Definitely. Heptathlon number 66 in the Olympic Stadium was the last one in her life. And the enthusiastic crowed celebrated the 37 year old athlete.

«Is your decision definitely to retire and never start a heptathlon again?»

Sabine Braun: «Yes it is. I decided to finish in Munich after the European Championships because I am 37 years old and I have to care for my future now. First of all I will start with a job at the Olympiastützpunkt in Wattenscheid at 2004. But I don't think that I will fall down a big hole and not train anymore. I have a lot of friends they have nothing to do with the sport and we have a lot of other things we can talk about.»

«What did it mean for you to win silver in your last event?»

Sabine Braun: «It was my big goal to win a medal at my last event. Especially in front of such a wonderful crowd. And I did it. This was one of the greatest moments in my life.«

«What do you take with you from this time you spent with the sport and lived for the heptathlon?»

Sabine Braun: «I have achieved everything, except Gold at the Olympics. I was World Champion and European Champion, I even scored 6985 points, almost the 7000 mark. I earned good money even though I couldn't travel three times around the world, and had a good time during the years with my sport.«

«How did your personality change during the 20 years in the sport?»

Sabine Braun: «I almost became another person during this time. I developed from a 19 year old girl to a woman of 37 years. And nearly everything in front of the eyes of the general public. This was not easy, but whenever I had problems I could process them with the help of the sport and my success. And I never gave up that was important for me.»

«You were said that you were a person who was difficult to promote and it was difficult for you to find a sponsor?»

Sabine Braun: «At the beginning I tried to correct this image, but I noticed that I produced the opposite effect. Ssometimes it didn't matter to me anymore, what people thought about me. I did things my own way.«

«Could you imagine working as a coach?»

Sabine Braun: «I want to be involved in the sport in some way, but I don't think that I am the right person to become a coach. I am too impatient for that job. But we are not able to bake our talents. I prefer to care for talent search and talent support.»

«What do you think about the situation in the German heptathlon after you retire?»

Sabine Braun: «We have a lot of good young athletes, but nobody was able to struggle through to the top. Maybe it will be better, when I am not around anymore. Maybe Karin Ertl could follow in my footsteps. I hope the girls will get a push in the coming years.»

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
