1	<b>Merkel triumphs as German Liberals fall:</b> The German elections was a victory for Angela Merkel who scored just over 41% of the vote, a fall in support for the Social Democrats (SDP) securing 26% of the vote, a defeat for the FDP party with less than 5% of the vote and a debacle for the Alternative for Germany (AfD) with 4.7% of the votes. Merkel was still a few votes short of an absolute majority leaving her needing a coalition partner to govern. <i>Links: <u>Reuters, EurActiv, EU</u> Observer, New Europe</i>
2	<b>Merkel's potential coalition partners drag their feet:</b> The Social Democrats are holding an internal meeting on Friday evening (27 September) to decide whether to put the potential grand coalition to a vote of all their 472,000 members. According to the German constitution, the only clear deadline is 22 October, when the new Bundestag is set to have its inaugural meeting. <i>Links:</i> <u>EU</u> <u>Observer, EurActiv</u>
3	<b>Merkel vows to stay the course on Europe</b> : In her first comments on Germany's policy toward the European Union since winning a triumphant re-election on Sunday, Chancellor Angela Merkel has pledged to stay on the course of fiscal stabilisation and boosting competitiveness in the eurozone. <i>Links: <u>European Voice, EU Observer</u></i>
4	<b>German elections - Impact for 2014:</b> Beyond the political consequences in Germany, the federal elections of 22 September will impact the look of the European Parliament in 2014. Everything will depend however on what kind of coalition will be formed in Germany. If the CDU and SDP manage to form a "grand coalition" the question arises as to whether they will reach a compromise on one potential candidate for European Commission president. <i>Links: Europolitics, EurActiv, New Europe, New Europe</i>

**"ACT. REACT. IMPACT" - European Parliament launches information campaign on 2014 elections**: Under the slogan "ACT. REACT. **Flemish MEP row reveals tensions in Greens/EFA group:** The Flemish Green party has accused the separatist N-VA MEP Mark Demesmaeker, of deviating too much from the political line of the Greens/EFA group in the European Parliament. **Italian PM warns over UK exit from the EU:** Italian Prime Minister Enrico Letta said a U.K. exit from the European Union would threaten the future of the trading bloc and hailed Angela Merkel's election victory in Germany. *Link: <u>Bloomberg, New Europe</u>* 

**The Green Primary is easy:** The European Green Party will organise an open Europe-wide Online Primary to select the two leading candidates for the 2014 European Elections. ## **GERMAN ELECTIONS**

**Victorious Merkel has strong mandate in European Council:** The German elections result has also strengthened Merkel's position in the European Council. Of the major member states, Germany is the only one whose leader enjoys not only personal popularity at home but also a strong democratic mandate to continue with current policies abroad. *Link: European Voice* 

**Don't expect leap in German EU policy:** Analysts say it would be wrong to expect a bold leap forward in the German leader's eurozone strategy, even if Angela Merkel's CDU/CSU does end up, as expected, in a coalition with the staunchly pro-European Social Democrats (SPD), giving her a dominant majority in parliament. The big question is how she will behave on banking union. *Link:* <u>EurActiv</u>

**Rehn: Merkel victory maintains momentum for banking union:** EU Economic Commissioner Olli Rehn has signaled that Angela Merkel's return to the Chancellery with an enhanced share of the vote means that Europe will continue on the same economic course and that plans for a banking union remain in place. *Link: <u>New Europe</u>* 

**EPP President congratulates Angela Merkel and CDU on their strong victory:** The President of the European People's Party, Wilfried Martens, congratulated German Chancellor Angela Merkel on the strong victory by the CDU. He also commented: "On behalf of the entire EPP political family, I also look forward to working with Angela Merkel and our CDU and CSU member parties as we approach the crucial European elections in May 2014." **Disappointing results for German Greens in September 22 Parliament elections:** The German Greens won a very disappointing 8.4% of the vote during the national elections. *"We did not manage to transform the societal majorities into political majorities,"* said German Greens Co-Chair Claudia Roth. *Link: <u>Greens</u>* 





**German Left Party now third biggest political group in Bundestag:** GUE/NGL President Gabi Zimmer has described the results of the German elections, which saw Die Linke emerge as the third biggest political group in the Bundestag, as encouraging for the Left in Europe. She however expressed her regret that Merkel's re-election won't result in any shift away from the austerity doctrine at the European level. *Link:* <u>GUE/NGL</u>
