Terri Williams-Flournoy *Head Coach*

Terri Williams-Flournoy was named the head coach of Georgetown's women's basketball program on August 27, 2004 and begins her first campaign as the Hoya leader. As head coach Williams-Flournoy is just the sixth women's basketball head coach in the history of the program. She returns to the Hilltop after beginning her collegiate coaching career with the Hoyas between 1992–1996.

Williams-Flournoy compiled a 12-year record of success as an assistant coach at Georgetown, the University of Georgia (1996–2002) and most recently Southwest Missouri State (2002–2004). She has been a part of nine programs that have made NCAA Championship appearances including a Final Four (1999) and two regional finals appearances (1997, 2000) with Georgia, and Georgetown's "Sweet Sixteen" run in 1993. Overall Williams-Flournoy's record as an assistant coach was 251-116.

Along with her achievements on the court, Williams-Flournoy has been a leader in producing all-around student-athletes and monitoring academic achievement. At Southwest Missouri

State Williams-Flournoy organized the academic monitoring of student-athletes and helped the team achieve a team GPA of over 3.0. She was in charge of academic enrichment programs also while at Georgia and with Georgetown.

During her two seasons at Southwest Missouri State Williams-Flournoy worked with head coach Katie Abrahamson-Henderson and was a part of two straight NCAA Tournaments and two consecutive Missouri Valley Conference Tournament Championships. Last season's Southwest Missouri State team finished the year with a 28-4 record and the regular season Missouri Valley Conference Championship.

At Georgia, Williams-Flournoy was recruiting coordinator for the program during a time when Georgia made six straight NCAA tournament appearances under head coach Andy Landers. The Bulldogs won Southeastern Conference titles in 1997 and 2000, won the SEC tournament in 2001 and produced seven current WNBA players during Williams-Flournoy's tenure.

Williams-Flournoy's four-year tenure at Georgetown saw the Hoyas achieve great success in her first season (1992–1993), as Georgetown earned a BIG EAST Championship and its first ever bid to the NCAA Championship, finishing the year with a 23-7 overall mark. As a Georgetown assistant she was responsible for all aspects of recruiting and scouting along with conditioning, game planning and academic monitoring and coached current assistant coach Niki Reid.

agement Williams-Flournoy was a fouryear letterwinner in basketball for the Lady Lions. Penn State won the Atlantic 10 Conference championship in each of Williams-Flournoy's final two seasons as a player and was a participant in the NCAA Tournament in three of Williams-Flournoy's four seasons. In 1988, 1990 and 1991 Williams-Flournoy and the Lady Lions advanced to the second round of the NCAA tournament





Niki Reid Assistant Coach

Former Georgetown guard and assistant coach Niki Reid returns to the Hilltop for her second stint as an assistant coach with the women's basketball program. She served the past two years as an assistant at Fordham University. Reid's main focus will be with the Hoyas' guards and will also spend time off the court recruiting and fund raising.

Prior to the last two campaigns at Fordham, Reid finished six seasons with the Hoyas as an assistant coach, recruiting coordinator, and academic advisor. In her stint at Georgetown as defensive coordinator and guard coach, she helped the Hoyas to three WNIT appearances, while having four guards earn postseason honors in the BIG EAST. She also had eight players earn BIG EAST All-Academic honors.

As a player, Reid was tri-captain of Georgetown's 1992–93 team that advanced to the "Sweet 16" of the NCAA Tournament and finished the season with a 23-7 record. The Hoyas were 15-3

in the BIG EAST to gain a share of the regular season conference championship as well. Reid was a four-year starter at point guard and upon graduating in 1993 with a degree in Psychology, she left Georgetown as the school's leader in assists and three-point field goal percentage. She played in 111 games in her career and scored 744 points to go along with 161 steals. During her four seasons Reid was honored with the Coaches' Award as the team's Most Valuable Player in the 1991-92 season, was the recipient of the team's Best Defensive Player award for the 1990–91 campaign and was the winner of the Hustle Award in both 1989-90 and 1990-91.

In 2002, Reid began her second stint at Fordham. She first served as an assistant with the Rams during the 1995–96 season. In 2002–03, Reid's first year as the top assistant at Fordham, the Rams accomplished a long list of firsts. Among the firsts accomplished by the squad included their first back-to-back Atlantic 10 road wins and their first four-game winning streak in Atlantic 10 play. Fordham also put together two four-game winnings streaks on

the year for the first time since 1994–95, swept an Atlantic 10 opponent for the first time since 1998–99, and picked up their first-ever win at Saint Joseph's, a perennial Atlantic 10 power. Also during her time at Fordham two players, Mobolaji Akiode and Monica Mack were named the Atlantic's 10 Most Improved Player in 2003 and 2004, respectively.

Reid resides in Alexandria, Virginia with her fiancé Timothy Geckeler.

Christy Winters Scott begins her first season with the Hoyas in 2004–05. She has a keen knowledge of the Washington, D.C. area, first as a player at the University of Maryland between 1986–90 and then as an assistant coach at both George Mason University in Fairfax, Virginia and then at the University of Maryland. Winters Scott is a Reston, Virginia native and will focus on Georgetown's post players along with various off court duties.

She has spent the last two years doing broadcast work as well as spending time with her two and a half year old son, Jerome, Jr., and her one-year old daughter, Brianna. For the last eight years she has co-produced and co-hosted "The Roundball Report" on CTV in Prince Georges County, Maryland.

Winters Scott spent five seasons at the University of Maryland between 1997–2002 as an assistant coach under former head coach Chris Weller. She was an active local recruiter for the Terps and organized Maryland's scouting program along with specifically tutoring the post players. She was a four-year letterwinner at Maryland as well between 1986 and

1990 and graduated with a degree in speech communication. In 1989, she helped Maryland win its eighth Atlantic Coast Conference championship and reach its third Final Four. As a senior, Winters Scott was a first team All-Atlantic Coast Conference and Kodak All American East Region selection as she led the Terps in scoring with 533 points (17.8 ppg). She is the second all-time leading scorer at Maryland with 1,679 points, fourth in rebounding with 723 and first in career games played with 123. Winters Scott is one of only two players to score more than 700 field goals (703) at Maryland. Winters Scott also ranks in the all-time top 10 at Maryland in games started (fourth with 100), blocked shots (fifth with 91) and field goal percentage (eighth with .537).

From 1991 to 1992 Winters Scott played professionally for Pamela Sud in Pistoia, Italy and in 1993 and 1994 she played and coached professionally for City Fribourg in Switzerland. In 1994 she was the league's leading scorer, averag-

ing 37 points and 13 rebounds per game while playing for European Cup semi-finalist City Fribourg.

Before returning to her alma mater, Winters Scott spent a total of four seasons in the mid 90's as an assistant coach at George Mason working with post players and handling the recruiting efforts for the Patriots.

She and her husband Jerome along with Jerome, Jr. and Brianna Elizabeth reside in Reston, Virginia.



✓ ✓ ugie" Leigh Maurelli joined the Georgetown coaching staff in January of 2001 as strength and conditioning coach of the football program. In the fall of 2003, Maurelli assumed the title of Head Strength and Conditioning coach for all Hoya student-athletes.

Prior to his arrival on the Hilltop, Maurelli played four years of varsity football at Johns Hopkins University where he obtained a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering in 1997, and subsequently served as an assistant strength coach for three years under the tutelage of Bill Starr. In 1996, he set and still holds several university records, including a combined lift of 1,320 lbs. in the bench press, clean, and squat at 212 pounds. Augie was a 2000 Olympic Weightlifting hopeful and trial qualifier in the 94 kg class and is considering returning as a master this fall.

In 2002, Maurelli received a Master of Business Administration degree in Finance from Georgetown University's McDonough School of Business.
