NDP and Conservatives all tied up

Conservatives headed for minority

Toronto, August 23rd, 2012 – In a random sampling of public opinion taken by the Forum Poll™ among Canadians 18 years of age and older, one third would vote either for the federal NDP or the Conservatives (34% each) if an election were held today. Just fewer than one quarter would vote Liberal (22%), and few would vote either Bloc Quebecois (6%), Green (4%), or for other parties (1%). These results represent a slight increase for the Conservatives since our poll last month (31%).

The federal Conservatives had most of their support among participants 65 and older (41%), males (39%), and Canadians living outside of Quebec. The federal Liberals also had their highest levels of favour among participants 65 and over (26%), as well as among residents of the Atlantic region (29%). The federal NDP, on the other hand, had the firmest backing among Canadians under 65 years of age, females (36%), and those living outside of Alberta.

These voting intention results—if they hold on Election Day – would see the Conservatives take 140 seats for a minority in Parliament, while the NDP would capture 114. This represents a remarkable turnaround since last month, when the NDP were forecast to win a minority with 128 seats to the Conservatives 114. The Liberals are now projected to take 46 seats, down from 58 last month. The Bloc would continue to take 7 seats and the Green Party would retain leader Elizabeth May's seat. While the seat swing appears to be substantial, when leading parties are tied in the polls, very small shifts in the popular vote can lead to broad movements in seat projections.

Harper, Mulcair favourables up

Prime Minister Stephen Harper draws approval from more than a third (36%), and this is an increase since last month (from 32%). Tom Mulcair's approval is up too, from 36% to a shiny 41%. Bob Rae's approval is steady or slightly down at 32%, and this represents a steady decline since his high point just after declaring he wouldn't run for permanent leader of the Liberal Party (June - 40%).

Harper's net favourable (approve minus disapprove) is a dismal -21, while Bob Rae's is -8. Tom Mulcair's, on the other hand, is a comfortable +10.

Harper had the highest approval among participants 65 years old and over (42%), males (42%), and Albertans (55%). Mulcair was most favoured by males (44%), Canadians with annual household incomes between \$60 and \$100K, and

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Quebeckers (64%). Like Harper, Rae had high approval among older participants, and males, but had the highest regional support among Ontarians (35%).

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Methodology

The Forum Poll™ was conducted by Forum Research with the results based on an interactive voice response telephone survey of 1,720 randomly selected residents of Canada aged 18 or older. The poll was conducted on August 22nd, 2012.

Results based on the total sample are considered accurate \pm 2.36%, 19 times out of 20. Subsample results will be less accurate. Margins of error for subsample (such as age, gender) results are available at

Where appropriate, the data has been statistically weighted to ensure that the sample reflects the actual population according to the latest Census data.
