Celebrating 125 Years of Community-owned Power in Alameda

The electric utility industry began around 1882 when Thomas Edison set up the first commercial power station in lower Manhattan. Just seven short years later, in 1887, the City of Alameda paid \$20,000 for the installation of 13 streetlights and a

90-kW generating station to power them. And with that, the oldest public electric utility west of the Mississippi was created—right here in Alameda!

Utilities Board to ensure that their treasured utility, renamed the Bureau of Electricity, would remain under local control and generate a return to the community.

Today, 125 years after the construction of that first

generating plant, the City of Alameda is still in the power business and still a trendsetter. Now known

For the first few years of operation, the City's new electric utility, then known as the Municipal Electric Light Plant, provided only street lighting. In 1902, it started selling electricity to homes and businesses and even opened a retail store on Park Street that sold electric appliances.

In the 1930s, Alamedans voted to establish an independent Public



as Alameda Municipal Power (AMP), we have survived a century and a quarter of utility mergers that created utility behemoths in other places.

125 Years of Fun Facts!

AMP is 125 years old! To celebrate this special milestone, we are sharing fun facts from our many years of service.

Did you know....? Although AMP was created in 1887, it did not start selling electricity to residents until 1902. Up until then, AMP was busy installing streetlights across Alameda. By 1916, over 9,000 streetlights had been installed—one every 75 feet on every block of the island. By 1921, Alameda's streetlights were so famous that the San Francisco Daily News proclaimed the town the "best lighted city in the Bay Area."
