<i>Summary</i>	Collection consists chiefly of papers of the Gansevoort, Lansing and Melville families and reflects the social, business and political interaction between family members and friends and associates of the families. Also included are some papers of members of the Sanford, Van Schaick and other related families. Gansevoort-Lansing papers contain correspondence, land deeds, financial documents, maps and surveys, notebooks, cookbooks, diaries, architectural drawings, photographs, and artifacts. The social, economic and political life of upstate New York over a period of more than 250 years is covered in the collection. Also, materials pertaining to military service in the American Revolution and the U.S. Civil War. Gansevoort family members represented in the collection include Peter Gansevoort (1749-1812), military leader in the American Revolution, Peter Gansevoort (1788-1876), New York political figure, Henry Sanford Gansevoort (1835-1871), Union officer in the Civil War, and Catherine Gansevoort Lansing (1839-1918), benefactress. Photographs (tintypes, daguerreotypes, cyanotypes, and black and white		

prints) show individuals, family portraits, house interiors and exteriors, historic occasions, and family holdings. Among Lansing family members represented in the collection are Barent Bleecker Lansing (1801-1876) attorney and landowner, and Abraham Lansing (1835-1899).

Note

Subjects include business and financial matters, social events, family news, and current events. Melville family papers document the family of Herman Melville (1819-1891), author of *Moby Dick* and other works. The bulk of these papers consists of correspondence among three generations of both Melville and Gansevoort family members detailing the lives and daily activities of the writers who include Herman Melville and his father, Allan Melvill (1782-1835). Some manuscripts of Melville's writings also are in the collection.

The Gansevoorts and the Lansings were two of the original Dutch families to settle in the Hudson and Mohawk Valleys of New York State. Other families who intermarried with the Gansevoorts and the Lansings were the Melvilles, Sanfords and Van Schaicks. Members of these families were prominent in politics, the military, literature, law, politics, medicine, and economics.

BIOGRAPHY

The Gansevoorts and the Lansings are two of the original Dutch families whom settled the Hudson and Mohawk valleys of upstate New York. These families as well as other Dutch and non-Dutch families represented in the GANSEVOORT-LANSING COLLECTION held prominent social, economic and political positions.

Other families whom intermarried with the Gansevoorts and/or Lansings include: Van Schaick, Melville, Sanford, Gerritse, Pruyn, Bleecker, Yates and Parker. However, it is the Van Schaicks, Melvilles, and Sanfords whom are mainly represented in the GANSEVOORT-LANSING COLLECTION.

The ancestors of the Gansevoort families originated in a town called Gansfort, situated on the borders of Germany and Holland. Harme Van Gansevoort (c.1635-1710) emigrated to America c.1660. A brewer by trade, he set up a brewery business in Albany, New York at the corner of Market and Maiden Lane, which was later replaced by Stanwix Hall in 1833. Stanwix Hall was a hotel built by the Gansevoorts and named in honor of Peter Gansevoort jr. (1749-1812), who defended Fort Stanwix during the American Revolution (1775-1783). Married to Marritje Liendart (d.1742), she had two sons and twelve daughters according to the recollections of a descendant Leonard Gansevoort jr. (1754-1834).

The brewery business was inherited by one of their son's Leonard Gansevoort (1681-17⁶²~~83~~). After his death (17¹⁷⁵²~~10~~), his wife Catherine managed the brewery. This brewery was passed down to one of their ten children Harme Gansevoort (1712-1801), who was also a successful merchant importing goods from Europe. He married Magdalena Douw (1718-1796), daughter of Petrus and Anna (Van Rensselaer) Douw , with whom he had nine children.

One of their sons Peter Gansevoort (1749-1812), remembered as Brigadier-General Peter Gansevoort jr. had a distinguished military career. In 1775, he was appointed by Congress as a Major in the 2nd New York Regiment which invaded Canada under Richard Montgomery. He was commissioned Lieutenant-Colonel on March 19, 1776 and he was placed in command of Fort George. Later that year, Gansevoort was upgraded to Colonel. In 1777, Peter Gansevoort jr. was appointed to command Fort Schuyler (Fort Stanwix) where he held off a potential seize from St. Leger heading up the British forces and Indian allies from Canada.

He married Catherine (Catrina) Van Schaick in 1778, the daughter of Wessel and Maria (Gerritse) Van Schaick. The Van Schaicks are also a prominent Dutch family which originally settled in the New Netherland. During this same year, Gansevoort was reappointed Commandant of Fort Schuyler and in 1780 he was placed in command of Fort Saratoga. The following year, Gansevoort retired from the line while he was also commissioned Brigadier-General of the militia on March 26, 1781. Following the war, Gansevoort held the following appointments: Major-General of the militia in the western district (1783), military agent of the Northern Department (1802) and Brigadier-General of the United States Army (1809).

The fifth of Peter and Catherine (Van Schaick) Gansevoort's six children, Peter Gansevoort (1788-1876), had a distinguished career like his father. Born in Albany, Peter Gansevoort was educated at the College of New Jersey, Princetin and Litchfield Law School. He was admitted to the bar c.1811. Besides a law career, Gansevoort was also the private secretary to Governor DeWitt Clinton, judge advocate general (1819-1821) on Clinton's military staff, member of the Assembly (1830-1831), Senator (1833-1836) and 1st judge of the County Court of Albany County (1843-1847).

Peter Gansevoort married Mary Sanford (1814-1841), daughter of Honorable Nathan Sanford, Chancellor of New York and Senator in Congress and his 2nd wife Mary Esther Malbone Isaacs. Mary (Sanford) Gansevoort had four children, with only two surviving infancy, Henry Sanford Gansevoort and Catherine Gansevoort. Widowed by his first wife Mary, Peter Gansevoort remarried Susan Lansing (1843-1874), daughter of Abraham Gerrit Lansing and Susanna Yates. There were no children.

Henry Sanford Gansevoort (1835-1871), the son of Peter and Mary (Sanford) Gansevoort, was born in Albany and educated at the Albany Academy; Phillips Andover Academy and Princeton University, graduating with honors in 1855. Gansevoort entered Harvard Law School (1857), worked in several law firms, finally becoming a partner with George H. Brewster in New York (1859-1860). However, Gansevoort sought a military career, so in 1861 he joined the 7th Regiment of the New York militia. Upon the outbreak of the Civil War (1861-1865), Gansevoort was ordered to Washington. After returning from Washington, he applied for commission in the regular services, which was granted to him after many disappointments as 2nd Lieutenant in Battery M - 5th Regiment of the regular artillery in the United States Army (May 14, 1861). Gansevoort joined General McClellan on the peninsular and he was with the Potomac Army throughout the Peninsular campaign after it left Yorktown. Gansevoort also participated in the 2nd battle of Bull Run and afterward at Antietam (1862).

With a leave of absence from the regular army, Colonel Gansevoort was appointed Lieutenant-Colonel of the 13th Regiment of New York volunteer calvary (1863), which was immediately sent to Washington. Colonel Gansevoort¹

services to the army earned him the title of Brigadier-General of the Volunteers (1865), Lieutenant-Colonel in the regular services and the rank of Captain of the Artillery in the regular lines (1866). At the close of the war, he was ordered to Barrancas and Pensacola, Florida (1867-1868), and Fort Independence, Massachusetts (1869). Gansevoort health had deteriorated, so he sought relief in Nassau but to no avail. Gansevoort decided to return home, dying aboard the steamer "Drew", as it travelled up the Hudson River.

Catherine (Gansevoort) Lansing (1839-1918), the daughter of Peter and Mary (Sanford) Gansevoort and the sister of Henry Sanford Gansevoort was born in Albany. She was educated at Mrs. Charles Sedgwick's School in Massachusetts and the Molinard School in Albany, New York. During the years, 1859-1860, she travelled with her parents and brother throughout Europe. Eleven years later (1871), Catherine Gansevoort was at her brother's side, when she experienced the tragic loss of his life and honored him by publishing "Memorial of Henry Sanford Gansevoort", edited by John Chipman Hoadley (1875). John Chipman Hoadley married Charlotte Melville the daughter of Allan and Maria (Gansevoort) Melville. In 1873, Catherine Gansevoort married Abraham Lansing (1835-1899). There were no children. Catherine Gansevoort activities included: vice-president for the New York State - National Mary Washington Memorial Association (1891-1896); an incorporator of the Society of Cincinnati (1894) and the organizer of the Gansevoort Chapter: Daughters of the Revolution (1895-1897). Catherine Gansevoort Lansing is also known for her many donations to charities and institutions, especially the GANSEVOORT-LANSING COLLECTION bequested in her will to the New York Public Library; Astor, Lenox and Tilden Foundation (1919).

Abraham Lansing (1835-1899) was born in Albany, the son of Christopher Yates and Caroline Mary (Thomas) Lansing. His paternal grandfather is Abraham Gerrit Lansing. Abraham Lansing was educated and graduated from the Albany Boys Academy (1851), Williams College (1855) and the University of Albany with an LL.B. (1857). His law career included appointments as City Attorney and Supreme Court Reporter (1868-1869). As stated, he married Catherine Gansevoort in 1873. In 1876, Lansing was appointed the delegate to represent the United States at the annual conference of "Association for the Reform and Codification of the Law of Nations" held in Bremen and again in London (1879). Between 1879-1899, Lansing travelled with his wife Catherine throughout Europe. She survived him at his death in 1899.

Abraham Gerrit Lansing (1756-1844) was born in Albany, the son of Gerrit Jacobse (1711-?) and Jan Wynne (Waters) (1723-1810) his second wife. He was a physician and surgeon. He married Susanna (Sanneka) Yates (1762-1840) in 1779. Sixteen children were born, three died in early childhood. The names are: Janthie (Jane) (1780 Feb.-Nov.); Abraham Yates (1782-1807); Gerrit Yates (1783-1862); Cornelius D.R. (1785-1850); John Yates (1788-1818); Antie D.R. (1790-1792); Sanders Lansing (1792-1866); Christopher Yates (1794, Dec. 11-15); Christopher Yates (1796-1872); Barent Bleecker (1798) died the same day; Anna D.R. (1799-1830); Barent Bleecker (1801-1876); Sarah Bleecker (1802-1878); Susan (Lansing) Gansevoort (1804-1874) married Peter Gansevoort; George Lansing (1806-?) and Abraham Yates (1808-1859).

It should be noted that two of Abraham Gerrit Lansing's children attained prominence. Gerrit Yates (1783-1862), accomplishments include: private secretary to Governor Morgan Lewis; judge of the Probate Court; clerk of the State Assembly; representative of the Albany Congressional district in the 22nd-24th Congress; successor to Martin Van Buren as Regent of the State University and the Chancellor of the Board of Regents until his death. Lansing married Helena (Lena), daughter of Abraham J. and Annetje (Lansing) Ten Eyck. There were four children: Charles B.; Jane Ann (Lansing) Pruyn; who married Robert H. Pruyn; Susan Yates and Abraham Gerrit.

Christopher Yates (1796-1872), accomplishments include: lawyer in Albany; private secretary to the Governor, 1822-1824. He married Caroline Mary Thomas (1805-1845), a daughter of Dr. John Thomas a surgeon in the American Revolution. There were five children: Jane Anna (died in infancy?); John Thomas Lansing (d. 1886); Abraham Lansing (1835-1899) (married Catherine Gansevoort); William Lansing and Edward Yates Lansing.

Abraham Gerrit Lansing is also the brother of John Lansing 2nd (1755-?), who attained prominence in the field of politics. His accomplishments include: member of the Assembly, 1780-1786; delegate to the Continental Congress, 1784-1788; delegate to the Federal Constitutional Convention of 1787; justice of the New York Supreme Court, 1780-1798. John Lansing mysteriously disappeared after leaving his hotel to post a letter.

The Melville family originated in Scotland. They are one of the non-Dutch families who intermarried with the Gansevoorts. The marriage of Allan Melvill (1782-1835) to Maria Gansevoort (1791-1872), the daughter of Peter and Catherine (Van Schaick) Gansevoort connected the Gansevoort-Melville families.

Allan Melvill, the son of Thomas Melvill (1751-1835) and Priscilla Scollay, was the fourth of eleven children. Melvill was an importer of silks and French goods of fine quality. His business ventures kept him constantly travelling abroad. Based in Boston, Melvill for a time opened up a whole sale dry goods business in New York City at 123 Pearl Street. Unfortunate business ventures left the Melville family in bankruptcy at the time of Melvill's death.

Maria Gansevoort added the "e" to the Melville name after her husband's death. Through Allan Melvill's marriage with Maria Gansevoort there were eight children, most notably Herman Melville (1819-1891), the author of the classic "Moby Dick". Melville was not recognized as a great American author during his lifetime. During his later life, Herman Melville moved his family (m. Elizabeth Shaw, the daughter of Judge Lemuel Shaw) to New York. He received an appointment as an out-door custom inspector on the wharf of Gansevoort Street, a position that he held for nineteen years.

Another son of Allan and Maria (Gansevoort) Melville was Gansevoort Melville (1815-1846). He was appointed Secretary of Legation at the Court of St. James in London, England in 1846. Gansevoort Melville died abroad in London; his body was returned to the states where he is interred in Albany Rural Cemetery.

Thomas Melvill (1776-1836) was the eldest son of Thomas Melvill (1751-1835) and Priscilla Scollay. He was six years older than his brother Allan Melvill (1782-1835). Thomas Melvill began his career as a merchant like Allan but his employers sent him to Paris where he became a banker. He remained there for 14 years except for two years he spent in Spain. Melvill married Francoise Raymonde Eulogie Marie des Doulouers Louise Fleury. When he returned to the United States in 1811, Melvill was appointed Commissary of Prisoners. In 1814 his wife died. Melvill married again to the daughter of Dudley Hobart of Maine. In 1832, Melvill was elected to the Massachusetts Legislature. He retired to Galena, Illinois and died there at the age of seventy-six. From his two marriages there were fourteen children.

The Sanford Family also intermarried into the Gansevoort family through Mary Sanford (1814-1841) the daughter of Hon. Nathan Sanford and his 2nd wife Mary Esther Malbone Isaacs. Mary Sanford married Peter Gansevoort (1788-1876). The Sanfords are of English descent. Nathan Sanford was a legislature and jurist, born in Bridgehampton, Long Island (1777-1838). He was educated at Yale but did not graduate. However, Sanford did study law under the elder Samuel Jones and was admitted to the bar in 1799. During his lifetime, Sanford was almost always in public office. Sanford's positions include: U.S. Commissioner of bankruptcy (1802) and from 1803-1815, he held the post of U.S. Attorney for the district of New York, member of the Assembly from 1808-1809; 1811 and the Speaker until he was forced to retire on account of illness; state senator 1812-1815 and the U.S. senator 1815-1821. Sanford became Chancellor of New York 1823-1826 and state senator again during the years 1826-1831.

Sanford married three times and was the father of several children including as stated, Mary Sanford. Sanford died in Flushing Queens, New York City; he was survived by his children and third wife Mary Buchanan.

Other noted individuals whom married into the Gansevoort-Lansing families are: Captain John D'Wolf (1779-1872). He married Mary Melvill (1778-1809). Mary Melvill is the daughter of Thomas and Priscilla (Scollay) Melvill and the sister of Allan Melvill (1782-1835).

Captain John D'Wolf was known as an explorer; he published his adventures in A Voyage in the North Pacific and a Journey Through Siberia More Than a Half Century Ago. (1861). (Note: A copy of this monograph is available in the G-L Collection see: G-L library list)

Another noted individual is: John Chipman Hoadley (1818-1886) an engineer, designer and manufacturer. He married Catherine Melville (1825-1905), the daughter of Allan and Maria (Gansevoort) Melville.

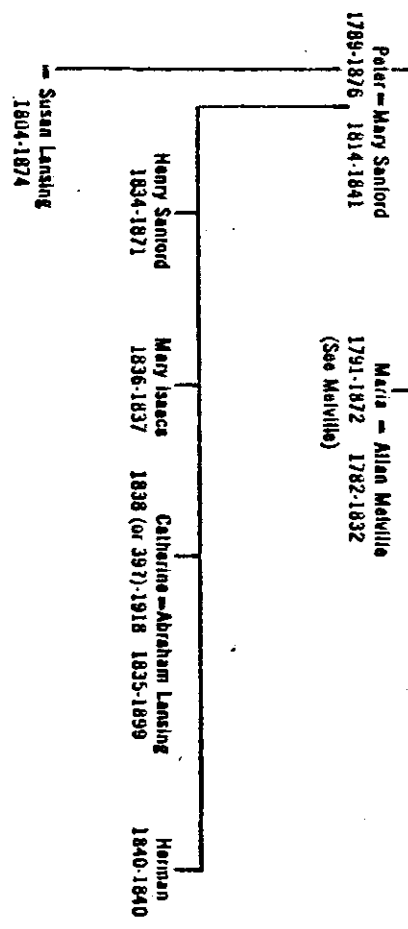
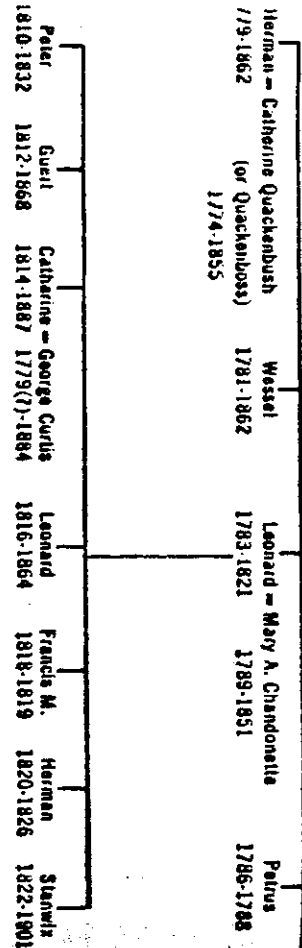

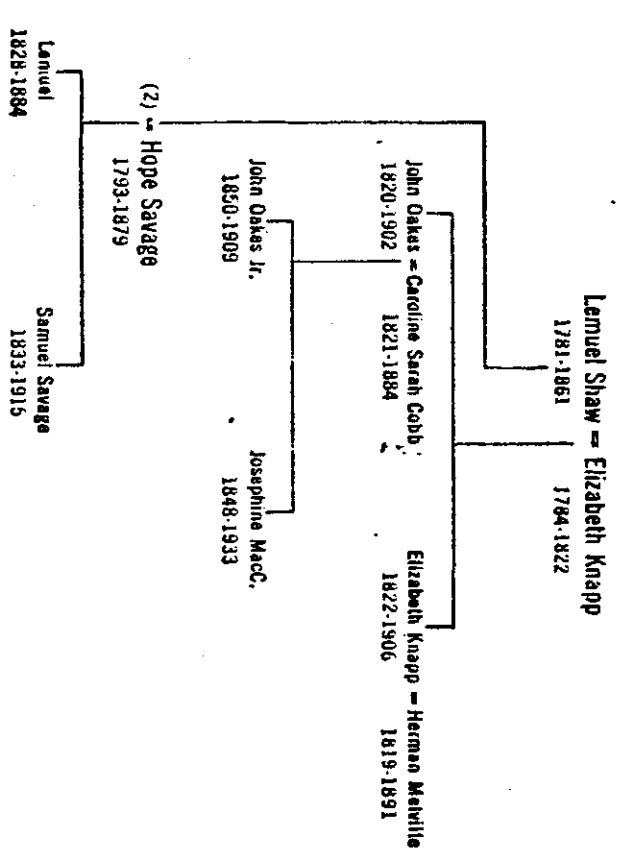

DESCRIPTION:

The Gansevoort-Lansing Collection contains the papers of the Gansevoort-Lansing families of Dutch descent, 17th-19th. . . . It reflects the social, economic and political life of the upstate New York Dutch and to a lesser extent non - Dutch families. Other families represented are: Van Schaick, Gerritse, Melville, Pruyn, Bleecker, Yates and Sanford.

The collection is arranged in family groups.

The Gansevoort family is represented by: General Peter Gansevoort jr.

(1749-1812). Gansevoort papers mainly reflect his military service during the American Revolution and his position as military agent for the Northern Department (1803-1809).

The military papers are divided into two groups. 1) Military Papers, 1763-1814. These papers concern his service during the American Revolution; this includes muster rolls, returns, rations accounts and letters from prominent individuals in the military. 9 vols. 2) The unbound military papers, 1776-1814, bulk dates 1803-1812, contain papers from Peter Gansevoort office of the United States Military Agent for the upkeep of the Northern Department, 1803-1809, which mainly concern the upkeep and supply of the frontier i.e. Niagara, Detroit, Wayne, Dearborn, Macknow, etc. Other subjects are the construction of forts and stations and the payment of annuities to the Northwestern Indians. Leonard H. Gansevoort was in charge of this office after Peter Gansevoort jr. resigned, so a few of the papers belong to him. The next section regards Peter Gansevoort jr. service as Brigadier-General, 1809, in the United States Army when he was station in Carlise, Pa. These papers are mainly concerned with the army administration including court martials. Other papers concern Gansevoort duties as a General in the New York militia.

Other related military papers: copies of military papers (incomplete transcripts); transcripts 1777-1781 both chronological and alphabetical; page proof calendars from the military papers, 1754-1818; index to the military papers (typewritten list); pension statements of soldiers who served under Peter Gansevoort jr.; Gansevoort's memorandum book 1776-1780 (1 vol.); receipt book from officers in the 1st New York Regiment, 1776 (1 vol.); letterbook 1781 (1 vol.); military account book 1810-1812 (1 vol.); and Peter Gansevoort vouchers acting as military agent, 1805-1809.

In addition, there are Gansevoort's oversize volumes: Military Agent of Northern Dept. United States. Copies of letters sent 1804-1808 (2 vols.); copies of letters received 1806-1808 (1 vol.); Day Book "A" 1802-1809 (1 vol.); general account book 1802-1809 (1 vol.); Orderly book 1793-1867 (2 vols.). Peter Gansevoort jr. personal papers are: General Correspondence 1776-1811; accounts 1788-1812;n.d.; receipts; bank books 1793-1818; day book ; check books; claim against the government for Peter Gansevoort jr. estate 1852-1858; land papers: New York State; maps and plans: New York State; Sheriff Papers, 1790-1794, concerns Gansevoort's appointment as Sheriff of Albany City and County i.e. bonds, agreements, accounts, common pleas, etc. Writings.

Peter Gansevoort (1789-1876) is the son of General Peter Gansevoort jr. and Catherine (Van Schaick). Gansevoort papers mainly concern his political career. General Correspondence, 1807-1892, bulk dates 1816-1861, are mainly incoming letters concerned with his business affairs and to a lesser extent personal. A few letters are addressed to him after his death. Corr-

espondents include his siblings and relatives i.e. Henry Sanford Gansevoort (son), Allan Melville Gansevoort, Josiah Greenleaf, Edward and Charles Sanford, Anthony Van Schaick, Henry Van Schaick and William Smart of Flushing, Long Island. Financial Documents: accounts 1806-1876, account books, bank notes and stock. Account books span dates are 1821-1876, included are: 1825-1826, memoranda of Peter Gansevoort for the account of his mother Catherine Van Schaick (1 vol.); 1831, account book of Peter Gansevoort recording transactions in real property (1 vol.); 1859-1860, pocket memo kept by Peter Gansevoort while travelling in Europe (1 vol.); 1859-1860, accounts of his courier Giovanni Leone while travelling in Europe (1 vol.); cancelled checks and checkbooks.

Architect's Plans: Herman Gansevoort's plan for improving and adding additions to his house on North Market Street; 1834; drawing of stoop attributed to Phillip Hooker 1829; Zachariah Platt's plan for improving a building drawn by Elisha Putnam 1797. Contracts and specifications.

The Autograph Collection: clippings, envelopes, etc. of family and other individuals. Diaries, 1841-1866 (24 vols.). Land Papers: New York State, by bulk; New York City and some other states. Other material: maps, surveys and insurance policies.

Court Papers cover the long career of Peter Gansevoort within the judicial system. Court cases were held in the New York Supreme Court, 1803-1865; subdivided under the New York State Supreme Court are cases held in Albany City 1835-1860; Chancery Court 1810-1846 and various other courts. The United States District. New York: Northern District covers several court systems; Albany Mayor's Court 1810-1850; Albany Common Pleas Court 1813-1847; Albany Justice Court 1813-1847; Albany Police Court 1820-1829; New York Court of Errors 1816-1850; First Judge; Albany Courts 1838-1848.

Usually, there is an annotation on the title page, identifying the owner of the volume. It should be noted that the description of the volume is brief and it does not (as yet) list who owned what volume.

The second list concerns the Melville Library. The volumes are arranged by author and each volume has a Sealts number. Consult the printed monograph by Merton Sealts for a description. The Sealts number is needed to order a volume.

There is a list for manuscript volumes, photos albums etc. This list is basically an assortment of material belonging to individuals represented in the Gansevoort-Lansing Collection. Represented are: General Peter Gansevoort jr.; PETER Gansevoort; Henry Sanford Gansevoort; Herman Gansevoort; Catherine Van Schaick Gansevoort; Harme Gansevoort; Leonard Gansevoort; Gansevoort Family - miscellaneous; Abraham Lansing; Catherine Gansevoort (Note: Catherine Gansevoort material contains photo albums. Consult the photo list for a description); Christopher Yates Lansing; John T. Lansing; Lansing & Frothingham and Nathan Sanford.

One of the earliest additions to the Gansevoort-Lansing Collection is the Gansevoort-Hoadley Family Papers. It contains the papers of John Chipman Hoadley (1818-1886), a mechanical engineer. The papers consist of Hoadley's outside interests rather than his career as an engineer, designer and manufacturer. Other individuals represented are his wife Catherine Gansevoort Melville (Herman Melville's sister) who has a letter addressed to her from Captain John D'Wolf; their children Maria Gansevoort Hoadley and Charlotte Elizabeth Hoadley. The latter letters c. 1886-1935 contains 2 letters written by her while in Russia c.1886. Hoadley also reminisces about her recollections of Herman Melville and family heirlooms belonging to the Gansevoort-Lansing families.

The PHOTOGRAPHS (c.1855-1906) serve as rich visual images of the Gansevoort-Lansing families. The typical photograph is usually a portrait or family scene. It appears many are studio poses. Besides photographs of family members, there are pictures of friends and noted individuals. Special events were recorded and this point is reflected through photographs of Henry Sanford Gansevoort in full dress uniform during the Civil War and related pictures. Many of these photographs are credited to A. Gardner the well known Civil War photographer. Another special subject was the unveiling of Peter Gansevoort jr. statue in Rome, New York (1906). There are also photographs of interior and exterior of houses, outdoor scenes, official buildings, Stanwix Hall, Coat of Arms and family pets.

The type of photographs include tintype, daguerreotype and cyanotype. The size range from postage stamp to 11"x15". The bulk being on either side of 5"x 7". The photographs are scattered in albums, some are loose. Consult the PHOTOGRAPH LIST.

The ARTIFACTS are: quill pen; metal seals; wax seals; wax seals with manuscripts. The Gansevoort-Lansing Collection contains an assortment of MAPS and SURVEYS representing New York State and New York City. New York State counties are: Albany Co.; Broome & Chenango Co.; Fulton Co.; Green Co.; Herkimer Co.; Oneida Co.; etc. New York City is represented by Queens County. The maps are a mixture of printed and manuscript maps (hand colored).

DESCRIPTION

This collection documents the family of Herman Melville, American author (1819-1891). The papers probably belonged to Herman Melville's sister, Augusta Melville, (1821-1876) who left them to the other unmarried sister, Frances Priscilla (Fanny) Melville (1827-1885). Upon her death, the papers passed into non-family hands, where they remained until they were discovered in 1983 and subsequently acquired by the Library.

The collection itself consists primarily of over 500 letters between Augusta Melville and various members of her extended family as well as friends. Family correspondents include all Melville siblings, their parents and spouses, many of their children and cousins spanning three generations on both Melville and Gansevoort sides of the family. Few letters are neither to nor from Augusta. With the exception of the four letters written to Herman Melville, which are filed together, all correspondence is arranged by author's name in the following order: Herman Melville, his immediate family, other family members in alphabetical order, friends in alphabetical order. Within each folder, the letters are chronologically arranged. Occasionally two individuals wrote on the same letter. These are indicated by "see also" references.

These letters describe in considerable detail the lives and daily activities of the writers, including travel, social doings and health matters. It is evident from the correspondence that these family members and friends represented a fairly tight knit circle who kept themselves apprised of each other's lives. Approximately 141 of these letters contain references to Herman Melville, concerning his whereabouts, well-being, writing, publishing pursuits and family. The letters by his mother, Maria Gansevoort Melville, are particular substantive.

The portion of the collection directly pertaining to Herman Melville consists of the following: a letter from Melville to his brother, Allan, [1849], February 20, concerning the birth of Herman's first child, Malcolm; an undated letter to Augusta, regarding a book Augusta was to retrieve from Allan; a postscript on a letter from his younger son, Stanwix, to Augusta, taking the blame for the delay in sending the letter and reporting on the household, 1862?, April 30; four letters to Melville, including one from Nathaniel and Sophia Hawthorne, 1851, March 27; a fragment of a manuscript of Bartleby the Scrivener in an unknown hand; thirty pages of the first draft of Typee in Melville's hand, representing most of Chapters 12-14 of the Northwestern edition, 1845 and the aforementioned family letters referring to Herman Melville (see Container List for additional detail). It should be noted that the single leaf of Typee previously acquired by the Library and also found in the Gansevoort-Lansing Collection is from Chapter 14 of the same draft.

While the bulk of the collection consists of correspondence, there are a few non-letter items. The papers of Allan Melvill, Herman's father, include two notebooks: a surveying workbook, 1790-1796 and a shipping record book containing mounted newspaper clippings noting the arrival of French imported goods, 1828-1831? The folder for Augusta Melville contains, in addition to letters: a record of the letters she wrote and received, 1849, December - 1854, February; a record of her charitable donations, 1849, January-August and a list of her wardrobe, 1849, December. The folder for Frances Melville contains also a three-page narrative autobiographical sketch. Thomas Melville's folder includes a brief journal from a sea voyage, (1860?). With the papers, the Library also received three family trunks, two of which have name plates for Maria Gansevoort Melville and Allan Melvill, parents of Herman Melville, and four metal business signs for Gansevoort Melville and Allan Melvill, Herman's brother and father.

I think of calling him Barbarossa — Adolphus — Ferdinand — Otto — Grandissimo — Hercules — Sampson — Bonaparte — Lambert. — If you can suggest anything better or more characteristic, pray, inform me of it by the next post. — There was a terrible commotion here at the hour of the event. — I had men stationed at all the church bells, 24 hours beforehand; and when the electric telegraph informed them of the fact — such a ding-donging you never heard. — All the engines came out, thinking the State-House was on fire.

Of course the news was sent on by telegraph to Washington and New Orleans. — When old Zach heard of it — he is reputed to have said — "Mark me: That boy will be President of the United States before he dies."

— In New Orleans, the excitement was prodigious. Stocks rose and brandy fell. — I have not yet heard from Europe and Pekin. But doubtless, ere this, they must have placed props against the Great-Wall. — The harbor here is empty: — all the ships, brigs, schooners and smacks having scattered in all directions with the news for foreign parts. — The crowd has not yet left the streets, gossiping of the event. — The number of calls at 49 Mt. Vernon Street is incalculable. Ten porters suffice not to receive the cards; and Canning the waiter, dropped down dead last night thro' pure exhaustion. — Who would have thought that the birth of one little man, when ten thousand of other little men, and little horses, and little guinea-pigs and little roosters, and the Lord only knows what, are being born — that the birth of are [sic] little phenomenon, should create such a panic thro' the world: — nay, even in Heaven; for last night I dreamt [sic] that his good angel has secured a seat for him above; and that the Devil roared terribly bethinking him of the lusty foe to sin born into this sinful world. —
