As you can see from the cover picture some changes have occurred since the last reunion here in 2004. Four boxwood shrubs have replaced the pine trees which were overtaking the memorial. The plan was to put 3 shrubs on each side of the memorial but the roots from the pine trees haven't rotted away yet so that job was put on hold. It does present a better view of the memorial. Some more little touches can be added as soon as I get some free time.

All of our work trying to get a MSQ-77 radar for our Combat Skyspot Memorial at the museum on Barksdale AFB seems to been put on hold. I had found two of them on the range at Yuma, AZ but now we can't get the 8th AF Museum to accept them. They have purchased the old National Guard building and property outside the base and plan a move within the next several years. Therefore they don't want any more equipment to move. If we still have the capability to get them once the museum is moved I will work on that again.

As you probably know I was in charge of collecting donations to build the Combat Skyspot Memorial at Barksdale. Our final total for donations was \$13,786 of which I am proud to say Det. 8 Association chipped in over \$4,000. The memorial was designed by ArkLaTex Monument of Shreveport and it was installed and unveiled at a ceremony on 9 November. (see picture below) The monument and two granite benches cost us \$11,200 which leaves us with about \$2,586. This will insure that we can see that it continues to receive needed care as time passes. The official dedication is set for the week of 15-19 Sep 06 as we combine it with the CEVG Reunion in Bossier City/Shreveport.



AROUND THE FARM

I guess the big topic around here and other places in the southeast US is the drought we've had this past year. First we had a hard freeze in April where the temperature never got above 32 degrees for over two weeks. Everything had started to bloom and was growing very well. Of course the freeze ruined many things, not only for this year but some things were killed and will have to be replaced or at least dug up and disposed of when they don't come back this year. Now it looks like we're going to have a fairly warm winter and the rains are starting to add up now.

I am getting ready to start feeding the cattle very soon now. By having my farm fenced off into 4 fields now I have been able to move the cattle around and there has been enough grass for them to survive on without feed. I purchased a new Charolais bull last January and his first calves should start dropping after the middle of February. I don't have any heifers calving for the first time so that will be a little relief. We have no pregnant mares this year either. We didn't manage to get any of them bred so that will be another task starting in February.

My creek restoration project was finally completed during July and August. It looks like a picture down there now. All the work was completed except for the planting of trees which will be done this spring. They have 5,000 trees to plant on each side of the creek. The final cost of doing the job is around \$156,000. We got very lucky by getting it done during this drought we had this year and the creek had stopped running for about 2 months. With some recent rains totaling about 6 inches the creek got up to about 2-3 feet from the top of the bank and I think it would have taken a good bit more to send it over the top.



The thoroughbred business is still functioning although the money is still going out with nothing coming in yet. There was one check that did come in to Greg in November. He sold a yearling filly that brought \$1,100. Hardly worth the effort after they take out the entry fee and auctioneer bill. We still have 4 mares and two stallions. We obtained the use of another son of St. Ballado from a man in New York state after I paid the hauling bill from there to here. We have donated two breedings by each of the stallions to the thoroughbred associations of OH, IL, MO, PA and VA. They have auctions to make money for their associations by selling these free breedings and it helps us get offspring out there to the racetrack.

My filly, who is turning 3 years old, has been in training at the thoroughbred training facility at Lexington since 15 Oct 07. I now have 6 other former Air Force partners who help share the cost of training her and we are hoping to see her on a race track in the spring.



We have been to two Reunion Planners Con/Fams this past year. We got to visit Nashville in August and Shreveport in November. This helped provide a lot of the info about each area so I can set up the CEVG reunion in Shreveport this coming September and the Det 8 reunion scheduled for Nashville in September 2009.

We also had a wonderful time at the Det. 8 reunion in Richmond, KY this past September. There were approximately 60 people there and we finally got to dedicate the Det. 8 Memorial at Blue Grass Army Depot. And as always, we made the short trip to the Gault House Hotel in downtown Louisville for the Farm Bureau Convention in December.

MEMBERSHIP DUES

Please let me know if I haven't given you credit for any dues you may have paid. We have 20 folks who are getting behind on your dues for 2005-2007. I will notify you if you can't check the Det 8 Association Listing on our web site. Of course we are now going into 2008 and we only have 35 of you who are paid up thru 2008. Please try to pay your dues by March if possible. If everyone pays up thru 2008 we should be in good shape. For those who will be reading the newsletter from our web site I'll post a message letting everyone know what they owe. For those who get the newsletter via mail I'll include an addressed envelope to send your dues in. I will post this newsletter on our web page prior to mailing it out. For those who are members of the web page I will post a message letting you know it is posted for downloading and you should let me know when you have it. If you can't download it you should tell me you need it in hard copy format. For those who are not a member of the web page and I don't have an email for them, I'll have to send it hard copy. Again, I hope using the web page will decrease the cost for the newsletter.

We've had our Det 8 Yahoo web site for over five years now and the membership is up to 52 who are members of the association. We also have 54 members who are not members of the association. This is a place where you can post pictures for everyone to see. I can help post them for you if you have trouble. I have just recently updated the roster info in the files section. If you haven't joined yet and want to become a member let me know. I'll send the invitation out so you can sign up. It is free and you can keep up on everything that is happening. If you're worried about getting more Spam by signing up forget about it. This is a members only club and everyone must go through me to get an invitation to join. It is great for emergencies. When there is an illness or death in the family you can keep us all informed by posting a message.

DEATHS AND ILLNESSES

During 2007 our group has felt the loss of long time friends and former members of Det. 8. This past year we lost Harold Adams in March. He was assigned to Richmond in the 60's. We lost Maj. George Jackson who was assigned in the late 1970s. We also lost Jack Morris who was assigned to both Lynchburg, VA and Richmond, KY. During April Jim speller lost his mother. As we all reach those golden years it seems we are being attacked by various diseases and maladies. We need to also remember the Wise's and Bill Dreggors in our prayers. We need to continue to remember all our members who are having health problems.

NEW MEMBERSHIP

Our membership is still fluctuating around the 80 mark as some join and some lose interest and are dropped. Please check your dues currency and try to keep them up. We seem to lose at least one or two each year for not making contact, attending reunions or paying their dues. I can only notify you your dues are getting behind and wait for your reply to see if you still are interested in being a member. DET. 8 MEMORIAL

The remains of those two pines have never rotted yet and I will try again in 2008 to get them removed. There are now 4 boxwood shrubs in their place and the memorial is looking a lot better. It was indeed looking nice for the memorial dedication held last September.

We still have the only detachment memorial site but now there are two Combat Skyspot sites. The one on Guam has been there for quite a few years and pictures can be found on the CEVG Yahoo site. Sad to say the dish was ripped away during a typhoon and the base and two concrete and bronze plaques are what is left. The new CSS Memorial at the 8th AF Museum at Barksdale AFB was unveiled in November 2007. If you're in town just let me know you're coming and I'll see that you get on the depot to see the Det. 8 Memorial.

SKYSPOT MEMORIAL

The plan is to dedicate it at the reunion at Barksdale in Sep 08. The actual dedication ceremony will occur on 19 Sep, the final day of the reunion. I hope to see more than 200 people there for this ceremony and I know that Det 8 will be well represented as always.

The monument stands 6 feet tall and is 10 feet wide. A short history of Skyspot is engraved on it and the 19 names of those lost in SEA are engraved their also. It consists of 4 pieces of gray granite and has two granite benches in front of it. It is located between the two B-52's in the 8th AF Museum. It has a pad of small stones around it due to the museums plan to move in the future. Once it gets to it's new location we will work to get a concrete pad poured around it.

12TH REUNION HELD - SEP 12-16

Our twelfth reunion was held in Richmond, KY 12-16 Sep 07. There were close to 60 folks here to enjoy some interesting things. We welcomed several old members of Det. 8 here for their first reunion. on guide.









The McNeill Street Pumping Station, located near downtown Shreveport on the banks of Cross Bayou, is Shreveport's original waterworks and is still owned by the City. The first water plant facilities, including steam-driven pumps, were installed on the site in 1887 as part of the construction of Shreveport's first municipal water system, which was only the second such municipal system in the entire state. Portions of that original installation, along with major additions from the 1899-1921 time frame, continued to operate until 1994, although the steam pumps were finally retired in 1980.




Spectacular Displays of clothing, hats, shoes, fans, gloves, purses, photographs, etc., including many very rare items from the Victorian era.


