Television Coverage

ABC will broadcast the game to a national audience. Brad Nessler (play-by-play), Todd Blackledge (color) and Holly Rowe (sideline) will call the game. In addition, the game will be airing in Spanish on ESPN Deportes.

Radio Coverage

In its 14th season as a division of IMG College, the Michigan Sports Network represents one of the largest and most-listened to college sports network in the Midwest. Anchored by WWJ-AM (950) in Detroit, the Michigan IMG Radio Network is comprised of 34 affiliate stations in Michigan and Ohio during football season. In addition, U-M football can also be heard on American Armed Forces Radio and is also available on Sirius (channel 84) and XM (channel 84). Jim Brandstatter (playby-play) and Dan Dierdorf (color) bring the action to you from the booth, with Doug Karsch providing sideline reports and analysis. Jon Jansen hosts the pre-game tailgate show with Karsch and provides halftime and postgame analysis on the network.

Wolverines and Buckeyes

This will be the 112th meeting between Michigan and Ohio State. The Wolverines have an 58-47-6 advantage in the all-time series. U-M has compiled a 31-21-4 record against OSU in Ann Arbor and has a 23-19-3 mark at Michigan Stadium.

Michigan in the National Polls

The Wolverines are ranked in the national polls for the ninth straight week. U-M is listed 12th in this week's Associated Press and Amway Coaches national polls. Michigan entered the season unranked but following a 31-0 shutout of No. 22 BYU, the team checked into the national polls at No. 22 for the Maryland game. The Wolverines have posted a 2-1 mark against teams listed in the top 25 this season.

'The Game

- Selected as the greatest rivalry in all of sport by ESPN.com in 1999, Michigan and Ohio State will meet for the 98th straight year on the gridiron
- The two programs have played every year since 1918, a streak that ranks 8th in Division I-A for the longest uninterrupted series
- The overall series dates back to 1897, when the Wolverines claimed a 34-0 victory over the Buckeyes in Ann Arbor

Michigan vs. Ohio State

- This will be the 112th meeting between Michigan and Ohio State
- The Buckeyes are the most common opponent for the Wolverines, trailed closely by Michigan State (108 games)
- The Wolverines hold a 58-47-6 advantage in the all-time series but the Buckeyes have won 10 of the last 11 match-ups
- This will be the first game for head coach Jim Harbaugh against Ohio State

U-M vs. OSU at Michigan Stadium

- This will be the 46th meeting between the two archrivals at Michigan Stadium and the 57th all-time meeting in Ann Arbor
- The Wolverines have compiled a 23-19-3 record against the Buckeyes at Michigan Stadium and are 31-21-4 in Ann Arbor
- U-M has claimed victories in eight of the past 13 games at the Big House dating back to 1989
- Michigan defeated Ohio State by a 35-21 score in the 100th renewal of college football's greatest rivalry on Nov. 22, 2003

Televised for the 49th Consecutive Year

- The annual game will be televised for the 49th consecutive year and 60th overall time
- Since 1967 every game in the series has been televised, including 30 national television appearances
- This is the 29th consecutive year that ABC has televised the Michigan-Ohio State game, with all but the 1995 game being a national television broadcast; the 2005 game was a split national broadcast on ABC and ESPN
- The first game ever televised between the two programs was a 21-0 win by the Wolverines in Ann Arbor during the 1947 national championship season

Michigan in November

- The Wolverines will look to collect their 311th all-time victory during the 11th month of the year against Ohio State
- U-M has compiled an impressive 310-132-20 all-time record in November
- The Wolverines have a 3-0 mark in the 11th

month of the year under head coach Jim Harbaugh

• U-M has won 34 of its last 58 contests in November

Michigan When Ranked vs. Ohio State

- U-M has been ranked in the AP poll for 56 match-ups with Ohio State
- Michigan is 29-23-4 all-time against Ohio State when listed in the top 25 of the polls
- The Wolverines have compiled a 21-19-4 record against the Buckeyes when both teams enter the game ranked in the AP poll

NFL Coaching Pedigree

- Michigan has 85 years of NFL experience among the 10 coaches on staff
- The staff has logged 36 years of NFL coaching experience and 49 years of playing experience
- Eight of Michigan's 10 assistants have coached in the NFL: Jim Harbaugh, Tim Drevno, Jedd Fisch, Jay Harbaugh, Greg Jackson, Greg Mattison, Tyrone Wheatley and Mike Zordich
- Four of the Wolverines coaches played in the NFL, with each of those individuals logging more than 10 years in the league: Harbaugh (15 years), Greg Jackson (12 years), Tyrone Wheatley (10 years) and Mike Zordich (12 years)
- Those four coaches totaled 49 years of playing experience at the NFL level
- This does not include the seven years of NFL experience logged by strength and conditioning coach Kevin Tolbert and the 21 years of coaching experience gained by defensive analyst Dave Adolph

The Team, The Team, The Team

• U-M has won the time of possession battle in nine of 11 contests this season and has nearly a 7-minute advantage on the opposition (33:19 to 26:41); the team lost the TOP battle against

Michigan State (30:11-29:49) and Minnesota (31:05-28:55)

- Michigan has outscored the opposition, 274-126, over its last eight games; did not allow a point in 44 straight defensive possessions before MSU's second quarter TD
- The Wolverines have outscored the opposition, 243-126, in Big Ten play
- The Wolverines have turned the ball over six times in the past six conference games; lost a fumble on the final play of the MSU game, committed two turnovers (one fumble, one interception) at Minnesota and Penn State and threw an interception at Indiana
- Michigan scored on offense, defense and special teams against Northwestern; it was the first time since the Indiana game in 2003 that U-M accomplished the feat

Offense:

- The offense has relied on its running and passing game this season, with the ground game gaining 161.4 yards per contest and the air attack averaging 227.7 yards per game
- Michigan has rushed 420 times for 1,775 yards and 25 touchdowns
- Nine different Wolverines have scored rushing touchdowns this season, led by tailback De'Veon Smith (6), quarterback Jake Rudock (4), fullback Sione Houma (4) and tailback Drake Johnson (3); three others have two rushing scores
- In the passing game, Michigan has completed 213-of-337 attempts (63.2 pct.) for 2,505 yards and 17 touchdowns
- Michigan's offensive line has allowed 16 sacks in 11 games; the front did not yield a sack at Utah or against UNLV and Rutgers
- Against Penn State's top-tier front seven that averages 9.3 TFL per game, U-M allowed just four
- The offense has converted 43-46 red zone chances (93%) this season; scored 32 touchdowns and 11 field goals
- The Wolverines are converting 44 percent of their third-down chances (68-of-156) and have moved the chains on 5-of-13 fourth-down opportunities
- Jake Butt leads a tight end corps that includes fellow veterans A.J. Williams, Khalid Hill and Michael Jocz. The tight end corps has collected 62 passes for 797 yards and three touchdowns. Butt is the team's second-leading receiver with 43 receptions for 566 yards and three TDs followed by A.J. Williams (12 for 129 yards), Ian Bunting (4 for 55 yards) and Khalid Hill (3 for 47 yards)
- Michigan has lined up with the same five starters along the offensive line in each of the 11 games. This group boasts 131 combined starts, with each of the five players having at least 20 starts in their careers: Graham Glasgow (35), Kyle Kalis (28), Mason Cole (23), Ben Braden (23) and Erik Magnuson (22)
- Despite starting just two games in 2014, De'Veon Smith rushed for a team-high 519 yards on 108 carries (4.8 avg.) and scored six rushing TDs; he leads the team with 145 carries for 621 yards (4.4 avg.) and six TDs this season
- Senior fullbacks Joe Kerridge and Sione Houma are leading the way for a corps of running backs. The duo has combined for 45 carries totaling 202 yards and five touchdowns. In the passing game, Kerridge has grabbed five receptions for 33 yards and Houma has eight catches for 77 yards

Jake Butt

- 2015 Mackey Award semifinalist; award given annually to the nation's top tight end
- Sixth tight end in school history to reach 1,000 career yards; team's second-leading receiver with 84 receptions for 1,012 yards and seven touchdowns
- Has a career high with 43 receptions totaling 566 yards and three touchdowns this season
- Caught at least one pass in 14 straight games and in 22 of his last 25 games
- Has four or more catches in four straight games
 Made five catches for 66 yards and one TD at
- Penn State; snared a 26-yard TD reception in the first quarter

- Joined former U-M All-American Bubba Paris as the only Wolverines to start a game at tackle as a true freshman

Defense:

- Michigan is ranked in the top six nationally in six defensive categories, including second in total defense, pass efficiency and third down defense; fourth in rushing and passing defense
- The Wolverines lead the Big Ten in five defensive categories and are listed in the top five of nine categories
- Five of the 11 opponents have failed to score in the second half: UNLV, BYU, Maryland, Northwestern and Rutgers
- The U-M defense is allowing just 100.2 yards per contest rushing and 162.9 yards passing
- The Wolverines have yielded 164 points on the season (14.9 avg.); the opposition has scored 82 points in the first half, 75 in the second half and seven points in overtime
- Michigan has been stout on third down, allowing just 36 conversions in 155 attempts (23%)
- The defense has 29 sacks and 79 TFLs this year
- U-M posted a season-high 10 stops behind the line of scrimmage in road games at Utah and Penn State, posted nine against UNLV and added eight in Big Ten games at Maryland and against Northwestern
- Michigan has 14 different players with 20 or more stops this season and 19 total players with double-digit tackles
- The Wolverines have forced 10 turnovers on the season (eight interceptions and two fumbles); picked up a season-high three picks at Maryland

- U-M is just the fifth team ever to have multiple 28-point shutouts over AP ranked teams in a single season: 1945 Army, 1948 Michigan, 1956 Georgia Tech, 1966 Notre Dame and this year's teams are the only to accomplish the feat

- Michigan is the first team since 2011 to hold two major conference/independent opponents under 110 total yards in a game



A Legendary Rivalry in College Football

In a series that dates back to 1897, Michigan and Ohio State have met on the gridiron 111 times, ranking it tied for 14th among Division I-A most played rivalries. The Buckeyes and Wolverines have played every year since 1918, a 98-year streak which is tied for 8th in NCAA Division I-A for longest uninterrupted series.

Since the game was moved to the final Saturday of the Big Ten season in 1935, the game has had the potential for major impact in the Big Ten standings 44 times. This includes 22 contests where the two schools decided the Big Ten champion between themselves. Every season from 1972-81, the Michigan-Ohio State game determined which team would take a New Year's trip to Pasadena.

While Michigan holds a 58-47-6 edge over Ohio State in the series, with Ohio State leading the series, 47-46-4, since 1918. This includes a 21-25-1 Michigan record at Ohio Stadium, where the Wolverines played and won the dedication game in 1922, and a 23-19-3 Michigan lead at Michigan Stadium, where the Buckeyes were invited for the dedication game in 1927.

Since 1927, the teams have been so evenly matched that neither one has compiled anything longer than a sevengame winning streak in the matchup. In fact, in the last 30 meetings between

the Buckeyes and the Wolverines, the team that entered the game with a lower winning percentage has earned a record of 12-20-1 (the teams came in with equal records in 1983 and 2006). In the last 12 games where exactly one team has come in without a loss, that team has only left with its record unblemished seven times (Ohio State in 1979, 2002, 2006, 2012 and 2013 and Michigan in 1971, 1992 and 1997). Both teams were unbeaten and ranked 1-2 in the polls for the 2006 game, a 42-39 victory for the top-ranked Buckeyes at Ohio Stadium.

Since the Ohio Stadium dedication game in 1922, 8,185,698 fans have seen the Wolverines and Buckeyes meet on the gridiron. Sixty-five of those 93 games have been sold out, including the last 46 in a row. Since 1922, more people have attended Michigan-Ohio State games than any other gridiron matchup in the

Michigan Stadium -- 1927-2015 (89 Years)

The football program is in its 89th season in the "Big House" in 2015, with a 412-126-15 all-time record at Michigan Stadium. The largest college football stadium in the country, it was completed in 1927 at a cost of \$950,000, initially seating 72,000 fans. Michigan won the first game played at Michigan Stadium, defeating Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0, on Oct. 1, 1927. The stadium was officially dedicated on Oct. 22, 1927, with a 21-0 shutout over Ohio State.

Since that inaugural season, the capacity of Michigan Stadium has been altered 10 times to its present capcity of 107,601. The Wolverines have led the nation in attendance 38 times in the past 40 years, and reestablished the NCAA single-game attendance record at 115,109 fans during the 2013 Notre Dame game.

Michigan has drawn crowds of 100,000-plus for 264 consecutive games. On football Saturdays in Ann Arbor, Michigan Stadium ranks as the fourth-largest "city" in the state of Michigan, surpassing the population of Ann Arbor itself.

Michigan Stadium was the first college-owned football facility with a video scoreboard above both end zones and was also the first stadium to use electronic scoreboards for official time when, in 1930, two were installed.

CAPACITY: 107,601 -- the largest college-owned structures of its kind designed solely for football -- closer to the playing field with no running track -- no posts or other obstructions.

COMPLETION: 1927 --- at a cost in excess of \$950,000 to seat 72,000 spectators.

Capacity raised to 84,401 by addition of temporary wooden bleachers until 1949 when permanent steel stands replaced the wooden bleachers, increasing the capacity to 97,239. Seating capacity then raised to 101,001 in 1956, 101,701 in 1973, 102,501 in 1992 and 107,501 in 1998.

FIRST GAME: October 1, 1927 – Michigan led by Captain Bennie Oosterbaan, defeated Ohio Wesleyan, 33-0. LaVerne (Kip) Taylor, Michigan end, scored first in the stadium on a 28-vard pass from halfback Louis Gilbert.

DEDICATION GAME: October 22, 1927 -- Michigan defeated Ohio State, 21-0. **REDEDICATION GAME:** September 4, 2010 -- vs. Connecticut.

ATTENDANCE: Since 1927 -- 48,091,774 fans have watched the Wolverines play 553 games (an average of 86,965/game). The stadium attendance record of 115,109 was set on Sept. 7, 2013 against Notre Dame.

FIELD: 360 x 160 feet -- Installed new FieldTurf in 2010. The original FieldTurf surface was installed in 2003, returning Michigan to an artificial surface for the first time since the 1990 season. Installed Prescription Athletic Turf in 1991, giving Michigan its first natural grass field since 1968. Field was also lowered 3-1/2 feet allowing better sightlines for those seated in the lower rows.

100,000-Plus Crowds at Michigan Stadium

The football program has played 264 consecutive home games in front of crowds in excess of 100,000. The last time Michigan did not have 100,000 in attendance in Michigan Stadium was on Oct. 25, 1975 vs. Indiana. A crowd of 93,857 was on hand for the 55-7 Michigan victory.

Since then, Michigan has set numerous NCAA attendance marks and the Wolverines have led the nation for 38 of the past 40 seasons in attendance.

Jim Harbaugh was named the 20th coach in University of Michigan football history on Tuesday, Dec. 30. He becomes the sixth former Michigan football player to be named the leader of college football's winningest program.

Harbaugh comes to Ann Arbor after an impressive four-year run in the National Football League with the San Francisco 49ers. He led the franchise to the NFC Championship Game in each of his first three seasons, winning the George Halas Trophy as NFC Champions in 2012. Harbaugh tallied a 49-22-1 overall record that included a 5-3 mark in the postseason as 49ers head coach.

Harbaugh led the Niners to a 13-3 regular season record and to the NFC Championship Game during his first season in 2011, earning the AP NFL Coach of the Year award. He followed up with an 11-4-1 regular season mark in 2012, culminating with an appearance in Super Bowl XLVII. Harbaugh's 49ers lost a back-and-forth affair, 34-31, to the Baltimore Ravens and his brother, John, in the only match-up of brothers as head coaches in NFL history. He helped guide San Francisco back to the NFC title game after a 12-4 regular season record in 2013 and posted an 8-8 mark during the 2014 season.

Prior to making the jump to the 49ers, Harbaugh established himself as a leader of young men at the college level. He turned around a Stanford program that went 1-11 prior to his arrival. The Cardinal improved each of his four seasons, culminating with a 12-1 campaign and FedEx Orange Bowl victory over Virginia Tech in 2010. Harbaugh finished his tenure at Stanford with a 29-21 overall record (.580) and 21-15 mark in Pac-10 Conference play.

After 4-8 and 5-7 records his first two seasons at the helm, Harbaugh led the Cardinal to an 8-5 record and a tie for second place in the Pac-10. The appearance in the Sun Bowl following the season was Stanford's first bowl game since the 2001 season. The program continued its ascension in 2010, posting a 12-1 overall record and 8-1 mark in the Pac-10. Stanford was selected for a BCS bowl game, and proceeded to defeat Virginia Tech, 40-12, to claim the FedEx Orange Bowl in Harbaugh's final game with the program. The

Cardinal finished the 2010 season ranked fifth in the national polls and Harbaugh was named the Woody Hayes Award as the nation's top coach by the Touchdown Club of Columbus. He accepted the 49ers head coaching position on Jan. 7, 2011.

In his first head coaching experience, Harbaugh led the University of San Diego to a 29-6 record during his three seasons directing the program (2004-06). In his first year, the Toreros posted a 7-4 record after winning their final five games of the season. The team proceeded to post 11-1 marks during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, claiming the Pioneer Football League Championship each season.

Harbaugh spent the 2002 and 2003 NFL seasons as the quarterbacks coach with the Oakland Raiders. He worked with the quarterbacks, helping quarterback Rich Gannon lead the organization to Super Bowl XXXVII after posting an 11-5 regular season record and the AFC Western Division title. Gannon won the 2002 AP NFL MVP award and was selected to the 2003 Pro Bowl.

He began preparing for a career as a coach during his professional playing days. Harbaugh spent eight years as

an NCAA-certified unpaid assistant coach for his father, Jack, at Western Kentucky (1994-2001). He worked as an offensive consultant and recruited for the Hilltoppers during that time. Harbaugh's effort helped his father's team capture the 2002 Division I-AA National Championship.

Harbaugh played for five different organizations during his 15-year NFL career (1987-2001). He completed 2,305-of-3,918 passes for 26,288 yards and 129 touchdowns in 177 games. Harbaugh made 140 career starts. He was named the AFC Offensive Player of the Year, the NFL Comeback Player of the Year and a Pro Bowl selection after leading the Indianapolis Colts to the AFC Championship Game in 1995. He was inducted into the Colts Ring of Honor in 2005.

As a collegiate player, Harbaugh was one of the most efficient passers in NCAA history. In 1985, he led the nation in pass efficiency and finished as the runner-up in 1986. His career pass efficiency rating was the NCAA's top mark for over 12 years. Harbaugh won the Chicago Tribune Big Ten Most Valuable Player award, earned first-team All-America honors and finished third in the balloting for the Heisman Trophy following the 1986 season.

He completed 387-of-620 passes for 5,449 yards and 31 touchdowns during his career, with all four statistical categories still listing among the top-12 in school history. He also added 12 rushing touchdowns during his career, including eight scores as a senior. Harbaugh became the first Michigan quarterback to ever throw for more than 300 yards in a single game (310 vs. Wisconsin) and eclipsed the 200-yard passing mark 12 times. He led the Wolverines to a 21-3-1 record as a full-time starter during his final two seasons, including a pair of victories against rivals Michigan State and Ohio State.

Harbaugh and his wife, Sarah, have two daughters, Addison and Katherine, and a son, Jack. He also has three children, Jay, James Jr., and Grace.

He is the son of Jack and Jackie Harbaugh. Jack was an assistant coach at Michigan from 1973-79. Harbaugh's brother, John, is head coach of the Baltimore Ravens and his sister, Joani, is married to Indiana University men's basketball coach Tom Crean.
