Note from the Chairman

uildford's Link with Mukono, Uganda has been established for 12 years. Cllr Sallie Thornberry, could never have envisaged that her idea and drive would launch such a dynamic organisation. Our two communities have grown together from the idea that Guildford should have a twin town in the developing world so both could learn from each other. Barriers have been broken down, relationships have developed into friendships and we have achieved diverse objectives. This is because we respond to the enthusiasms of our supporters, ranging from education to sport to the environment.

Seven schools are now Linked with some flourishing, as they share curriculum projects and Guildford schools raise money for infrastructure like classrooms and boreholes. Many teachers from Mukono and Guildford have benefitted from the life-changing experience of visiting each other's schools and many children in Guildford now know more about the lives of children in Uganda, understanding the difficulties they face, from collecting water to learning in a class of 100.

Eight students have been sponsored through university and are now able to contribute more positively to Uganda's future. 500 chil-

dren play football every week and two bands benefit from 50 brass instruments donated by Guildford. Enactus students from Surrey University are developing a project with one of our Link schools.

But it is the future that is so exciting! We have a brilliant committee in Mukono who are equal partners and guide us to the projects that would really benefit their community. As more people in Guildford get involved and offer their skills, more projects can be considered. Workshops are valued highly. A retired science teacher from Guildford gives yearly workshops to primary teachers and is always invited to teach a secondary school class. Have you a skill or experience that would benefit a group in Mukono? You would be welcomed and given an experience of a lifetime.

We have worked with schools and individuals in Guildford but projects could also be supported by organisations or groups of like-minded people to support a project directly. Perhaps you could consider raising money knowing exactly where it is going and who it is benefitting. We are hoping to sponsor talented orphan children through school, as too often these children drop out because they can't afford the uniform and books. Sponsors could have real feedback as they change the future of a child.

The Mukono Health Centre provides basic health care but Dr Klonde has a vision of improving the facilities so that patients can be treated in Mukono rather than traveling to the nearest hospital 25 miles away. When we first visited the dental department, patients sat on a wooden bench and teeth were extracted with pliers. York dental surgery in West Byfleet and Health

Care Direct in Boreham Wood, Herts have generously donated modern dental equipment so the range of treatments are much improved.



So far three teachers have undergone farming training at Kasenge Riverford Organic Farm. We loaned them the money for a water source at the school so that they were able to start planting seeds as soon as the rainy season began.


Four ENACTUS students have been lucky enough to go to Uganda on two separate trips and have

Music

Although traditional music and dancing is a very important part of Ugandan culture, Western music is also encouraged and enjoyed, and in Mukono there are two brass bands, Keenotes and FDF, run by William Bulega and Davis Niwamanya. Both have benefitted from the 50 instruments supplied by Guildford in the past five years, mostly sourced from the 'retired' stock of Surrey Arts. In 2015 Guildford supplied four trombones, four tenor horns one baritone horn and a bugle. These bands have trained hundreds of young aspiring musicians to perform publicly in Mukono and Guildford visitors again enjoyed wonderful performances.





Green Peace

Green Peace is the idea of Robert, a teacher at Lutengo United Secondary School. In the past, Bulika village had enough wood for their

own needs but recently people from Kampala have been taking wood for sale in the city. Our funding of £250 has paid for tools and

seedlings and now a small rural community is growing trees for

fuel and fruit. Young people tend the seedlings which will be planted out in a 'wood lot'. We hope that we will be able to support other communities in a similar way.

Teddies

Teddies for Tragedy - a Guildfordbased organisation - donated over 100 teddies as well as nearly 100 sets of newborn baby clothes to take to Mukono Health Centre where there are 15 deliveries per day, double the number in RSCH. The teddies were particularly appreciated by disadvantaged children at Mbalala PS and at the deaf school, where children's

A view from Mukono

At our meeting in February, it was overwhelming to learn how much has been spent on projects in Mukono over the last 10 years, a total of £125,000. However, our Link is a Community Based Organisation that emphasises friendship rather than how much money has been put in.

Our Link Schools in Guildford have effected positive changes in the lives of children in Uganda.

The library acts as a source of knowledge and we all know that knowledge is power.

The link changes lives through education and the students who have been sponsored are a gift to the community.

The teachers who have attended the workshops have realised a great change in their teaching. They have acquired new strategies and better approaches to teaching. The good results in the national exams testify this. The teachers who have attended the primary science courses tell me that they have tried so much to use "Pete's approaches" and I realise how the training is impactful. I strongly believe it was worth investing in these teachers.

The school farms have enabled us to give the children lunches. When children are not fed, education is the last priority. That is why there is absenteeism and poor performance.

Children have found joy in the sports. Most of them have discovered and improved on their talent. They have also learnt to interact and work with one another.

At the health centre, the Link has provided dental and other medical equipment. With the teddies and clothes, the mothers realised that there is someone out there who cares and this changes their lives.

We know the limitations of government in service delivery. So Guildford comes in to bring 'a smile' on people's faces through acts


Safari dinner



Uganda has an extraordinary variety of natural habitats, from deserts to swamps and tropical rain

forests. It is one of the top holiday destinations for birders. This year we visited The Queen Elizabeth National Park. Along with elephants, hippos and lions we recorded 24 species of eagle and other birds of prey and 150 different species altogether. On the boat trip up the Kazinga Channel, we saw the huge Saddlebilled Stork, the Goliath Heron and the very rare Shoebill

Stork. Kingfishers and bee-eaters dart around the shoreline over the hippos and crocodiles. Tony Edie.



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
