

Assembly Bills

1. Prevailing wage for clean up. AB 26 (Bonilla): Will clarify that post-construction clean-up work is part of public works construction and therefore triggers prevailing wage requirements.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 53-22 (8/18/14) SENATE: 26-8 (8/7/14)

Project Labor Agreement. AB 155 (Alejo): Will
provide the Monterey County Water Resources Agency
with design-build authority for a water transfer project
and require a Project Labor Agreement with the
Monterey County Building and Construction Trades
Council.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 55-23 (8/28/14) SENATE: 25-10 (8/18/14)

3. Expand death benefits. AB 1035 (Perez):
Will protect the death benefit for family members left behind due to an industrial death of a firefighter or peace officer from specified job related illnesses. These families were "timed-out" from receiving the death benefit under current law if the public safety officer survived their terminal illness "too long" (more than 240 weeks), and this measure extended the statute of limitations to 420 weeks from date of injury.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 72-1 (5/1/14) SENATE: 35-0 (4/28/14)

4. Water Bond. AB 1471 (Rendon): The Legislature passed a \$7.5 billion water bond that voters approved in November. The bond will fund important projects around the state to rebuild our water infrastructure, help us cope with the drought, and meet the needs of our diverse state, while creating good jobs.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR & PASSED ON THE NOV. BALLOT.

ASSEMBLY: 77-2 (8/13/14) SENATE: 37-0 (8/13/14)

5. Notice to workers of last, best, final offer.

AB 1550 (Rendon): Would have required that, where impasse and fact-finding have been completed, public school employers provide written notice of every term of the last, best, and final offer at least 30 days before implementation.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 53-24 (5/28/14) SENATE: 24-11 (8/21/14)

Accountability on state contracting. AB 1574
(Pan): Would have prohibited state agencies from entering into personal services contracts that guarantee payment for services not provided.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 71-0 (3/17/14) SENATE: 25-11 (8/18/14)

7. Reports on state contractors. AB 1575 (Pan): Would have required state contractors with personal services contracts to provide the state agency with quarterly reports about performance and expenses, and sets criteria for contract termination.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 70-2 (4/21/14) SENATE: 30-4 (8/18/14)

8. Notice of changes to scope of representation. AB 1611 (Bonta): Will require a public school employer to provide written notice to the union of their intent to make any changes to a matter within the scope of representation.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 58-19 (5/15/14) SENATE: 23-9 (8/14/14)

 Fix workplace hazards. AB 1634 (Skinner):
 Will require employers to abate serious workplace hazards during an appeal.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 45-28 (5/28/14) SENATE: 25-10 (8/27/14)

10. Corporate subsidies disclosure. AB 1792

(Gomez): Californians are subsidizing Wal-Mart and other major corporations because workers are paid so little they qualify for public benefits. AB 1792 will require the State to prepare a report that shows which companies have the greatest number of workers receiving Medi-Cal and how much it cost taypayers.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 53-24 (8/29/14) SENATE: 26-9 (8/29/14)

11. Right to Organize for Research Assistants.

AB 1834 (Williams): Would have given collective bargaining rights to over 10,000 research assistants at the UC.

12. Film Tax Incentive. AB 1839 (Gatto): Will extend and expand the film tax credit, which is capped, allocated, and based on certified payroll showing new jobs created to keep good unions jobs in the film and TV industry here in California.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 72-0 (8/29/14) SENATE: 34-2 (8/29/14)

13. Improve apprenticeship funding. AB 1870 (Alejo): Will help ensure the availability of a skilled workforce by establishing a more equitable funding formula for apprenticeship programs based upon the number of apprentices that graduate from each program.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 55-22 (5/15/14) SENATE: 23-10 (8/19/14)

14. Protect temporary and contract workers.

AB 1897 (Hernandez): California is now the first state in the nation to enact significant new protections for temporary and contract workers. AB 1897 will make companies that use a third party to supply workers jointly liable for wages, worker safety, and provision of workers compensation.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 51-23 (5/29/14) SENATE: 22-12 (8/27/14)

15. Accountability for accreditation commission.

AB 1942 (Bonta): Will increase accountability and transparency on the accreditation commission by requiring reports to the Legislature on major policy changes and decisions that affect the accreditation status of a community college.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 76-2 (5/29/14) SENATE: 36-0 (8/13/14)

16. Prevent workplace bullying. AB 2053 (Gonzales): Will require additional training for workplace bullying.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 58-18 (5/15/14) SENATE: 25-8 (8/13/14)

17. Improve mediation and fact-finding. AB 2126 (Bonta): Would have strengthened the use of fact-finding and mediation for public sector workers and employers to avert labor disputes.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 54-22 (5/29/14) SENATE: 24-10 (8/28/14) 18. Safety equipment for firefighters. AB 2146 (Skinner): Encourages Cal-OSHA to update personal

protective standards for firefighters.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 77-0 (5/27/14) SENATE: 34-0 (8/25/14)

19. No mandatory overtime for state nurses.

AB 2155 (Ridley-Thomas): Would have prohibited nurses in state facilities from being required to work mandatory overtime.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 53-24 (5/28/14) SENATE: 25-10 (8/21/14)

20. Prevailing wage on infrastructure grants.

AB 2272 (Gray): Will clarify that infrastructure project grants from the California Advanced Services Fund are public works construction and therefore trigger prevailing wage requirements.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 56-17 (5/27/14) SENATE: 23-11 (8/26/14)

21. Protect benefits for injured public safety officers. AB 2378 (Perea): Would have abrogated the decision in County of Alameda v. WCAB (Knittel), which linked the 104 week limitation on Temporary Disability payments and the payments under the "4850 benefit," eliminating 1 year of temporary disability payments for police officers and firefighters. AB 2378 would have restored that year of eligibility.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 66-8 (5/28/14) SENATE: 33-0 (8/21/14)

22. Prevent wage theft. AB 2416 (Stone): Would have allowed workers who are victims of wage theft to file a lien against the property of employers.

FAILED PASSAGE ON THE SENATE FLOOR.

ASSEMBLY: 43-27 (5/28/14) SENATE: 13-15 (8/28/14)

23. Overtime Takeaway. AB 2448 (Jones): Would have taken away the 8-hour day by allowing employers and workers to mutually waive daily overtime after eight hours, leaving workers vulnerable to employer pressure.

LABOR OPPOSED BILL

FAILED IN ASSEMBLY LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT

Labor Supported Bills

24. Protect healthcare workers exposed to MRSA. AB 2616 (Skinner): Would have created a rebuttable presumption of workplace exposure for health care workers infected with MRSA.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 48-26 (5/28/14) SENATE: 24-9 (8/20/14)

25. Strengthen protection from retaliation.

AB 2751 (Hernandez): This follow-up bill to AB 263 made two important improvements: The law now specifically protects a worker who is able to adjust immigration status from facing discrimination when they update paperwork on the job and clarifies that the new \$10,000 penalty for all retaliation under the Labor Code goes directly to the worker.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 54-19 (5/15/14) SENATE: 27-1 (6/19/14)

Senate Bills

26. Protect workers from workplace chemicals.

SB 193 (Monning): Will improve outreach to workers when a workplace chemical is discovered to be much more harmful than previously thought.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 56-23 (8/25/14) PASSED THE SENATE IN 2013

27. Fairness for franchisees. SB 610 (Jackson): Part of the nationwide fast-food campaign, this bill would have protected franchisees from the powerful franchisors by making it harder for franchisors to cancel franchise agreements.

VETOED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 41-28 (8/14/14) SENATE: 23-9 (8/21/14)

28. Labor protections in design-build projects. SB 785 (Wolk): Will ensure that design build proj-

ects use only skilled journeymen and apprentices.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 68-5 (8/26/14) SENATE: 23-11 (8/27/14)

29. Fund high-speed rail. SB 862 (Budget Appropriation to HSR). In the 2014 budget, the Building Trades and the Labor Fed worked with the Governor and legislative leadership to secure a continuous ap-

propriation for high-speed rail out of cap-and-trade revenue.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 53-26 (6/15/14) SENATE: 22-12 (6/15/14)

30. Raise and index Minimum Wage. SB 935 (Leno): Would have increased the minimum wage, on January 1, 2015, to \$11 per hour, to \$12 per hour in 2016, and \$13 per hour in 2017. Would have also required the automatic adjustment of the minimum wage annually thereafter, to maintain employee purchasing power diminished by the rate of inflation during the previous year.

SENATE: 21-12 (5/29/14)

FAILED IN ASSEMBLY LABOR AND EMPLOYMENT

31. Protect consumers and firefighters from carcinogenic chemicals. SB 1019 (Leno): Will protect consumers and firefighters by requiring a disclosure to the consumer about whether upholstered furniture does or does not contain added flame retardant chemicals known to be carcinogenic during a fire.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 56-17 (8/27/14) SENATE: 29-6 (5/28/14)

32. Improve healthcare transparency, SB 1182 (Leno): Health care cost increases are unsustainable for our employers, our members, and our trust funds. SB 1182 will require plans to provide our trust funds with to data used to rate premiums for their group from health plans to help us negotiate better rates for our members and union employers.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 61-16 (8/29/14) SENATE: 24-11 (8/29/14)

33. Hospital violence prevention. SB 1299 (Padilla): Will require OSHA to develop standards for hospitals to develop a workplace violence prevention plan.

SIGNED BY THE GOVERNOR.

ASSEMBLY: 54-21 (8/20/14) SENATE: 23-11 (8/21/14)
