Overview - 2013-2014 Legislative Sessions

A Republican legislative supermajority and Republican Governor did not trample on the rights of the Democratic minority; lawmakers mainly got along with each other (many of the always inevitable disputes actually arose between members of the same political party); leaders generally acted as adults and treated rank-and-file members from both parties the same way - with respect.

Some of the more contentious policy issues of the sessions, including the proposed Leucadia coal gasification plant in Rockport, a mass transit referendum for central Indiana counties, energy efficiency programs and the “Ag-gag” trespassing bill all saw Democrats and Republicans aligned on each side of the issues - and were moved toward some semblance of “compromise” on the part of members (if not the actual backers or detractors of individual measures) by Senate President Pro Term David Long and Speaker Brian Bosma. When partisanship reared its head Republican leaders avoided exacerbating the partisanship by not treating it with any favoritism (at least until the final night) or by bending in the other direction to placate Democrats.

However, the Indiana Energy Association (the lobbying arm of the large electric and gas utilities) easily convinced most legislators to vote against their constituents’ pocketbook and environmental interests to pass Senate Bill 560, which allows for across-the-board automatic rate adjustment mechanisms (or trackers). This bill makes it much easier for utilities to implement their business plans, which by and large consist of forcing Hoosiers to continue to rely on aging coal-fired power plants and large infrastructure investments to maintain the status quo while customer-owned solar panels and other cost-effective and environmentally benign options, such as wind power, continue to take a back seat. It also short-circuits the regulatory process by shortening the timeframe for complex decision-making by the state’s regulators.

Senate Bill 340 shuts down the two-year-old Energizing Indiana program, under which energy auditors visit homes and businesses and recommend ways to reduce energy consumption. The program is funded by a fee on electricity bills. While the Governor allowed the bill to become law without his signature, he has promised to propose legislation in 2015 to create a new state energy efficiency program.

Know Your Legislators’ Environmental Voting Records!

The Sierra Club Hoosier Chapter provides this document to help you learn more about your state legislators (you have one Representative and one Senator) and their environmental voting records. This scorecard includes votes from the 2013 and 2014 legislative sessions.

To Use the Scorecard:

- **Bill Number** – refers to the Senate Bill (SB) or House Bill (HB) that was scored. A description of each bill is provided below. More information about any bill can be found on the Indiana Legislature’s website at www.in.gov/legislative. The Sierra Club selects a broad range of environmental issues to include on the scorecard to best reflect a legislator’s environmental record.
- **Pro-Environment Position** – For each vote scored, the pro-environment position on bills included in this scorecard. If a legislator was excused from a vote on a bill, the corresponding information is represented by **E** (the bill was not included in scoring). If a legislator did not vote on a bill the corresponding information is represented by **NV** (the bill was included in scoring). An exception to this rule is the House Speaker (see footnotes in House section).
- **Name, District and Party** – Legislators are listed in alphabetical order. Also indicated are their district number and their political party affiliation.
- **Your Legislator’s Score** – A 100% score indicates the strongest environmental support. A 0% score indicates weakest support for environmental protection.

2013 Legislation Descriptions

Bill Number	Pro-Environmental Position	Bill Description
HB 1011	Yes	Public mass transportation A bill that would have allowed voters in Central Indiana to decide in referendums whether to expand mass transit was changed by the Senate to a summer study committee. The Senate approved it 39-11 and the House eventually concurred with that stripped-down version, 59-35; it was signed by Governor Pence.
SB 373	No	Criminal trespass and application fraud ("Ag Gag") The bill was aimed at blocking groups that surreptitiously take videos in farms or businesses to expose such issues as animal abuse and unsafe working conditions. It went through repeated changes that first watered the bill down and lastly expanded it greatly to include any action — such as texting — as well as photos and videos that were taken to harm a business, with no defense if the information was true or had been turned over to police or a regulatory agency. It passed the Senate 29-21 but Speaker Bosma withdrew the bill before it could be voted upon in the House. It died when the Senate decided not to try to pass a different version.
SB 510/494	Yes	Substitute natural gas The bill will help to prevent the Leucadia tax on natural gas bills. It requires a more stringent regulatory review of the project if a contract between the state and the \$2.8 billion plant's developers is effectively voided in the courts, where it is under dispute (note that this proposal was contained in SB 510 until the final days of the session). The bill was signed by Governor Mike Pence after the Senate approved it 43-7 and the House on a vote of 70-28.
SB 560	No	Utility transmission This legislation removes consumer protections from Indiana State law. It allows the utilities to make excessive profits for something they are already supposed to be doing - providing reliable electric and gas service by maintaining their transmission and distribution equipment. It also allows utilities to virtually automatically increase your rates up to 50% of the rate hike they are asking for if the IURC has not issued an order after 300 days.

2014 Legislation Descriptions

Bill Number	Pro-Environmental Position	Bill Description
HB 1143	No	Environmental Rules and Standards This bill would have made it illegal for Indiana's Executive Branch to adopt public health policies more restrictive than those of the U.S. EPA. After House passage the bill was heard in Senate Environmental Affairs committee but no vote was taken, killing the bill for the legislative session.
SB 176	Yes	Central Indiana Transit SB 176 allows six counties to have voter referendums on whether to fund mass transit projects, primarily through income taxes. The bill excludes light rail projects and sets up a non-profit that would have the goal of raising up to 10 percent of the transit system's operating costs from the business community. Signed by Governor Pence.
SB 186	No	State Policy On Agriculture and Farmers' Rights Bill declares it is state policy to conserve, protect, and encourage the development and improvement of agriculture, agricultural businesses, and agricultural land for the production of food, fuel, fiber, and other agricultural products. It declares state code shall be construed to protect the rights of farmers to choose among all generally accepted farming and livestock production practices, including the use of changing technology.

SB 271	Yes	Water Related Study Committee Responsibilities Urges interim study of a number water resources issues including the effect of water resource availability on economic development decisions, coordination of state government activities relating to water resources, and key elements that a state water plan should contain; and to study the potential creation of a water institute and a water management authority.
SB 340	No	Demand Side Management Programs Senate Bill 340 shuts down the two-year-old Energizing Indiana program, under which energy auditors visit homes and businesses and recommend ways to reduce energy consumption. The program is funded by a fee on electricity bills.
SJR 9	No	Right to Hunt, Fish, and Harvest Wildlife Senate Joint Resolution 9 would amend the Indiana Constitution to guarantee the right to hunt, fish and harvest wildlife. It passed both chambers, but will have to do so again in 2015 or 2016 before it can go to voters for a statewide vote in 2016.
