### Timeline for the Honorees in the Quilters Hall of Fame

- 1850 Industrial Revolution begins in America. Began in England in 1760.
- 1859 Marie Daugherty Webster born in Indiana (d. 1956).
- 1861–1865 Civil War in America.
  - 1866 Carrie Hackett Hall born in Wisconsin (d. 1955).
  - 1868 William Rush Dunton Jr. born in Pennsylvania (d. 1966).
  - 1873 Carrie Hall makes her first quilt, *LeMoyne Star*, at age seven. It wins first prize at the county fair in 1881.
  - 1875 Anne Champe Orr born in Tennessee (d. 1946).
  - 1876 Centennial International Exposition held in Philadelphia.
  - 1881 Florence Cowdin Peto born in New York (d. 1970).
  - 1882 Grace McCance Snyder born in Missouri (d. 1982).
  - 1884 Ruth Ebright Finley born in Ohio (d. 1955).
  - 1886 Rose Good Kretsinger born in Kansas (d. 1963).
  - 1889 Ladies Art Co. first publishes listing of quilt patterns.

- 1900 Averil Colby born in Yorkshire, England (d. 1983).
- 1904 Amy Harrison Emms born in County Durham, England (d. 1998).
- 1907 Ruth Finley becomes reporter and later, editor of women's page, *Akron Beacon Journal*.
- 1910 Bertha Stenge listed as an artist in United States Census.

Mary Vida Schafer born in Austria-Hungary, moves to United States in 1915 (d. 2006).

1911 Marie Webster's quilts featured in "The New Patchwork Quilt" in Ladies' Home Journal (January l), and "The New Patchwork Cushions" (August).

Other articles are published in 1912, 1915, 1918, and 1927. Her quilts are exhibited at Marshall Field and Company, Chicago.

1913 Anne Orr becomes art editor and writes monthly columns for *Southern Women's Magazine*.

Virginia Avery born in Greenwood, Indiana.

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- 1914–1918 Great War in Europe. United States declares war in 1917.
  - 1915 Marie Webster's *Quilts: Their Story and How to Make Them* published.
  - 1916 Dr. William Rush Dunton Jr. exhibits quilts at the Sheppard & Enoch Pratt Hospital, Maryland, including Marie Webster quilts. He begins documenting historic quilts of Maryland. Ruby McKim's needlework designs first published in the Kansas City Star. Her Bedtime Quilt, made up of twenty "Quaddie Quilties," becomes popular.
  - 1917 Anne Orr opens the Anne Orr Studio.Mary Pemble Barton born in Iowa (d. 2003).
  - 1920 Nineteenth amendment grants women the right to vote.

Shiela Betterton born near Newcastle upon Tyne, England (d. 2008).

1921 Anne Orr becomes needlework editor for *Good Housekeeping*.

Marie Webster and friends found Practical Patchwork Company (closed in 1942). Webster lectures in the 1920s and 1930s and also serves as judge for quilt contests.

- 1923 Cuesta Ray Benberry born in Ohio (d. 2007).Betty June Miller Ramsey born in Tennessee.
- 1924 Joyce Richardson Gross born in California.Carter Greene Houck born in Washington, D.C.
- 1925 Sally Jeter Garoutte born in Indiana (d. 1989).Ruby McKim's McKim Studios becomes the business

for promoting her patterns. Later it promotes her Kimport Dolls.

1926 Lenice Bacon makes her first quilt for her daughter and later one for her son. She begins giving lectures on "Quilts and Quilt Lore."

Rose Kretsinger makes her first quilt, which wins a blue ribbon at a fair.

Bonnie Hale Leman born in Missouri (d. 2010).

Florence Peto becomes assistant editor for *McClure's* magazine and gives her first lecture about quilts for a local women's club.

- 1927 Helen Longfield Kelley born in New Jersey (d. 2008).
- 1928 Jean Ray Laury born in Iowa.

1929 Stock market crash leads to the Great Depression of 1930s.

Ruth E. Finley's *Old Patchwork Quilts and the Women Who Made Them* published. Reprinted, with introduction by Barbara Brackman, in 1992.

Bertha Stenge makes her first quilt and enters Nancy Page Quilt Contest sponsored by a Chicago paper.

Marie Webster judges Ruby McKim's Flower Garden Quilt contest in Marion, Indiana.

- 1930 Dr. William Rush Dunton Jr. and Edna Dunton's article "Quilts and Quilting" is published in *Occupational Therapy and Rehabilitation*.
- 1931 Ruth Finley's *The Lady of Godey's: Sarah Josepha Hale* published.

Rose Kretsinger's quilts in one-woman exhibit, Kansas City Art Institute, in early 1930s.

Ruby McKim's *One Hundred and One Patchwork Patterns* published. Revised edition 1962.

- 1932 Anne Orr's *Quilts and Quilting, Book 100* published. She judges first national quilt contest, Eastern States Exposition, held in Massachusetts.
- 1933 Chicago World's Fair, Sears Century of Progress Quilt Contest—remains the world's largest quilt contest. Anne Orr chosen as a final round contest judge for Sears contest.

Bertha Stenge enters her *Chicago Fair* quilt in Sears contest, winning Award of Merit.

- 1934 Ruth Finley's quilt design *Roosevelt Rose* is featured in *Good Housekeeping*.
- 1935 Carrie A. Hall and Rose G. Kretsinger's *The Romance* of the Patchwork Quilt in America published.
- 1936 Jonathan Holstein born in New York. Georgia Bonesteel born in Iowa.
- 1937 Yvonne Bechis Porcella born in California.
- 1938 Carrie Hall donates her block collection, a quilt, and scrapbooks to the Thayer Art Museum at the University of Kansas, Lawrence.

Florence Peto's article "Quilts and Coverlets from New York and Long Island" appears in *The Magazine Antiques* 33 (April) and "Old Quilts Tell a Story" appears in *American Home* magazine (July).

1939 Florence Peto's *Historic Quilts* published.

Anne Orr is a judge for the New York World's Fair.

Rose Kretsinger's quilts displayed at the Muehback Hotel by Kansas City (Missouri) Art Institute.

1940 Marguerite Ickis becomes assistant editor of *Recreation* magazine.

Bertha Stenge's *Victory* quilt wins grand prize in the New York World's Fair Contest and her quilts are featured in *Ladies' Home Journal*.

- 1941–1945 United States becomes involved in World War II.
  - 1941 Jinny Kahle Beyer born in Colorado.

Jeffrey Gutcheon born in New York City.

Carrie Hall begins doll-making business.

Bertha Stenge has one-woman exhibit at Art Gallery, University of California, Berkeley.

1942 Karey Patterson Bresenhan born in Texas.Florence Peto's quilts featured in *Woman's* Day (June).

Bertha Stenge wins \$1,000 Grand Prize at *Woman's Day* National Needlework Exhibition.

1943 Nancy Crow born in Ohio.

Patsy Kulp Orlofsky born in Illinois.

Gail van der Hoof born in California (d. 2004).

Donna Miller Wilder born in California.

Bertha Stenge has one-woman exhibit at Art Institute of Chicago. Article about exhibit in *Newsweek* entitled "Quilts As Art."

1944 Dr. William Rush Dunton Jr. curates *Baltimore Album Quilts* exhibit for the Baltimore Museum of Art (February 18–March 26).

Anne Orr Studio publishes *Anne Orr Quilts, Book 50* and *Quilting with Anne Orr*.

Bertha Stenge's quilts featured in *Ladies' Home Journal* and *Woman's Day*. Patterns are made available.

1945 Dr. William Rush Dunton Jr. curates *Survey of Quiltmaking* exhibit for the Baltimore Museum of Art.

Barbara Brackman born in New York City.

1946 Dr. William Rush Dunton Jr.'s *Old Quilts*, selfpublished. He curates *Early Quilt Patterns* for the Baltimore Museum of Art.

Grace Snyder's *Semi-Circle Saw* and *Return of the Swallows* patterns appear in the *Kansas City Star* newspaper.

1947 Shelburne Museum, Burlington, Vermont, founded by Electra Havemeyer Webb.Florence Peto assists in acquiring quilts for the

Shelburne Museum's permanent collection. Merikay Waldvogel born in Illinois.

- 1948 Newark Museum, New Jersey, holds a quilt exhibit, *Quilts and Counterpanes in the Newark Museum.*
- 1949 Mary Barton begins collecting quilts and textiles.Marguerite Ickis's *The Standard Book of Quilt Making and Collecting* published.

Michael James born in Massachusetts.

Rose Kretsinger's patterns for two quilts published in *Farm Journal*.

Florence Peto's *American Quilts and Coverlets* published. She assists in acquiring quilts for the Newark Museum and curates an exhibit of her quilts for the New York Historical Society.

1950 Carter Houck writes and illustrates sewing columns for *Fort Worth Star Telegram* until 1952.

Bertha Stenge's *American Holidays* quilt appears in Stearns and Foster's 1950 edition of *Mountain Mist Blue Book of Quilt Patterns*.

- 1951 Cuesta Benberry's interest in quilts and their patterns begins. In the 1950s, she actively participates in several "round robins"—popular means of exchanging quilt patterns, long before photocopying was available.
- 1953 Florence Peto's quilts appear in *McCall's Needlework* Book (Summer and Winter issues) and her article
  "Quilts: Then and Now" appears in *McCall's* Needlework and Crafts.

Bertha Stenge's *The Quilting Party* quilt featured in Peto's article.

1954 Bertha Stenge's thirty-three quilts exhibited at Women's International Exhibition in New York City.

> Florence Peto judges the National Grange Quilt Making Contest in Vermont.

1955 Florence Peto exhibits her quilts at Henry Ford Museum.

> Bertha Stenge featured in the *Chicago Daily News* article "An Artist with a Needle: Meet Bertha Stenge, Chicago's Quilting Queen."

1956 Averil Colby, as a member of the National Federation of Women's Institutes, serves as chairman of the



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Handicrafts Committee and arranges classes and exhibits and serves as a judge.

Jean Ray Laury made *Tom's Quilt*, which has been published and exhibited often. Its modern design inspires quilters and is an influence in needlework magazines.

1957 Exhibit, *Pieced Work and Appliqué Quilts*, Shelburne Museum, Vermont.

Florence Peto curates exhibit at Suffolk County Museum in New York.

Bertha Stenge donates *Chicago Fair* quilt to Chicago Historical Society and her vintage fabrics to the Art Institute of Chicago.

1958 Averil Colby's book *Patchwork* published. Reprinted 11 times.

Jean Ray Laury enters *Tom's Quilt* in the Eastern States Exposition Quilt Contest at Storrowton in Springfield, Massachusetts.

- 1960 Jean Ray Laury's first article appears in *House* Beautiful, and she has one-woman exhibits for American Crayon Company and the American Museum of Contemporary Crafts.
- 1963 Shiela Betterton becomes steward and later textile adviser, until 1993, at the American Museum in Britain, and also documents English quilts.

Karey Bresenhan's family quilting bee to make her wedding quilt, *Touching Stars*, sparks her interest in studying quilts.

Marguerite Ickis assists Dorothy Brightbill in writing *Quilting as a Hobby*.

Jean Ray Laury exhibits her quilts at DeYoung Art Museum, San Francisco.

Grace Snyder's *No Time on my Hands* (as told to Nellie S. Yost) published. Reprinted in 1986.

1964 Averil Colby's Samplers published.

1965 Newark (New Jersey) Museum of Art holds exhibit *Optical Quilts.* 

Averil Colby's Patchwork Quilts published.

1966 The Art Institute of Chicago holds exhibit *American Quilts.* 

Jean Ray Laury's Applique Stitchery published.

1968 Mary Barton begins designing and making her *Heritage Quilt*.

Bonnie Leman founds Heirloom Plastics, selling quilt pattern templates.

1969 Bonnie Leman founds and edits *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*.

Mary Barton authors and presents skit, "Aunt Mary's Quilting Party."

Cuesta Benberry becomes a major contributor to the new magazine *Nimble Needle Treasures*, edited by Patricia Almy (until 1975).

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof begin their quilt collection.

1970 Joyce Gross and Sally Garoutte found the Mill Valley Quilt Authority.

Jean Ray Laury's Quilts and Coverlets published.

1971 Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof curate the exhibit *Abstract Design in American Quilts* at the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York City.

Baltimore Museum of Art holds exhibit *The Great American Cover-up: Counterpanes of the 18th and 19th Centuries.* 

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof's Whitney Museum exhibit travels to the Everson Museum of Art, Syracuse, New York; Walker Art Center, Minneapolis, Minnesota; and Los Angeles County Museum of Art. Exhibit then goes overseas: Musée des Arts Decoratifs, Paris; Musée des Arts Decoratifs, Lausanne; Stedelijk Museum, Amsterdam; Palais des Beaux Arts, Brussels.

Jonathan Holstein's *Abstract Design in American Quilts*, exhibit catalog for the Whitney exhibit, published.

Shiela Betterton's *American Textiles and Needlework* published. Reprinted 1977.

Michael James receives B.F.A. and begins making quilts.

Rose Kretsinger's twelve quilts are donated to Spencer Museum of Art, University of Kansas.

Bonnie Leman's *How to Make a Quilt: 25 Easy Lessons for Beginners* published.

Bertha Stenge's quilts offered for sale by her daughters; others obtained by museums.

1972 Mary Barton donates a number of quilts to Living History Farms, Iowa. Averil Colby's Quilting published.

Amy Emms demonstrates Durham quilting at Beamish, the North of England Open Air Museum.

Joyce Gross, with Mill Valley Quilt Authority, curates the first *A Patch in Time* show.

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof team up with Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service for two exhibits: *American Pieced Quilts I and II*. First venue: Renwick Gallery of the National Collection of Fine Arts, Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C., October 14, 1972– January 9, 1973. Exhibits then travel across United States during 1973 and 1974.

Jonathan Holstein's *Introduction in American Pieced Quilts* catalog of exhibit circulated by Smithsonian Traveling Exhibition Service.

Bonnie Leman's Quick and Easy Quilting published.

Yvonne Porcella holds a gallery exhibit of weavings and wearable art.

1973 Lenice Bacon's American Patchwork Quilts published.

Sally Garoutte authors "The Elusive English Quilts," *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*.

Joyce Gross leads the first guided quilt tour to Hawaii and to U.S. museums.

Jeffrey Gutcheon, with Barbara Stockwell, illustrates *Perfect Patchwork* by Beth Gutcheon. Jeffrey, with Beth, opens quilt shop Gutcheon Patchworks, Inc.

Jonathan Holstein's The Pieced Quilt: An American Design Tradition published.

1974 Southern Quilt Symposium, coordinated by Bets Ramsey, is first regional quilt convention, Hunter Museum of Art, Chattanooga, Tennessee.

Karey Bresenhan opens quilt shop, Great Expectations, Houston, Texas.

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof curate exhibit for James Corcoran Gallery, Los Angeles.

Carter Houck becomes editor (until 1994) of *Lady's Circle Patchwork Quilts*.

Patsy and Myron Orlofsky's *Quilts in America* published. Reprinted in 1992.

Sally Garoutte makes *Friends and Relations* quilt, which appears on the cover of *Textile Chemistry and Colorist*, 1978.

1975 Karey Bresenhan organizes precursor of the Quilt Festival, called the Quilt Fair, Houston, Texas.

Averil Colby's Pincushions published.

Cuesta Benberry begins writing articles for *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*.

Joyce Gross hosts "The Quilt Lady" radio program on KGO, San Francisco.

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof curate an exhibit for Shiseido Company, Tokyo, and American Cultural Center in Kyoto, also City Art Gallery, Bristol, and Whitworth Art Gallery, Manchester, England.

Carter Houck and Myron Miller's *American Quilts and How to Make Them* published.

Carter Houck's *Warm as Wool, Cool as Cotton: Natural Fibers and How to Work With Them* published.

Michael James's quilts shown in *Bed and Board: Quilts and Woodwork*, the first large exhibit of nontraditional quilts, in Lincoln, Massachusetts.

Jean Ray Laury holds first quilt retreat, Shaver Lake, California.

Jean Wells opens the Stitchin' Post quilt shop and launches the first Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show.

1976 United States celebrates its bicentennial.

The Finger Lakes Bicentennial Quilt Exhibit is held in Ithaca, New York. Jean Ray Laury, Bonnie Leman, and Myron and Patsy Orlofsky participate in the program.

Mary Barton's *Heritage Quilt* receives honorable mention at the National Bicentennial Quilt Exposition and Contest in Michigan.

Shiela Betterton's *The American Quilt Tradition* published. She curates an exhibit with Commonwealth Institute in London in conjunction with America's bicentennial.

Jinny Beyer wins first prize in the *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine* Bicentennial Quilt Contest.

Georgia Bonesteel begins her PBS television series *Lap Quilting*.

Jeffrey Gutcheon and Beth Gutcheon's *The Quilt Design Workbook* published.

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof curate exhibit at Kyoto Museum of Modern Art, Japan.

1977 Lincoln Quilt Symposium is held in Lincoln, Nebraska. Michael James and Jean Ray Laury are on the program.

> Joyce Gross founds, edits, and publishes *Quilters' Journal* with husband, Ed Gross (until 1987).

Cuesta Benberry writes quilt history articles for *Quilters' Journal* (until 1985).

Sally Garoutte becomes textile editor of *Quilters' Journal* (until 1982).

Michael James holds one-man show for Bridgewater (Massachusetts) State College.

Jean Ray Laury's *The Creative Woman's Getting-It-All-Together at Home Handbook* published. Reprinted in 1985. She receives the Silver Star Award at the International Quilt Festival.

Patsy Orlofsky establishes the Textile Conservation Workshop in South Salem, New York.

Yvonne Porcella's Five Ethnic Patterns self-published.

Donna Wilder listed in Outstanding Young Women of America.

1978 The Continental Quilting Congress, Arlington, Virginia, is founded by Hazel Carter. Jinny Beyer, Joyce Gross, Michael James, and Jean Ray Laury are on the program.

Virginia Avery's The Big Book of Appliqué published.

Shiela Betterton's *Quilts and Coverlets from the American Museum in Britain* published.

Jinny Beyer's quilt *Ray of Light* wins the Great Quilt Contest sponsored by *Good Housekeeping* and U.S. Historical Society.

Georgia Bonesteel's *Lap Quilting Your Legacy Quilt* self-published.

Amy Emms teaches Durham quilting at Shipley Art Gallery, Gateshead.

Carter Houck's *White Work: Techniques and 188 Designs* published.

Michael James's *The Quiltmaker's Handbook: A Guide to Design and Construction* published. Reprinted in 1993. He receives National Endowment for Arts grant.

Helen Kelley becomes president of the Minnesota Quilters and in 1998 is named Minnesota Quilter of the Year. Yvonne Porcella's *Plus Five Ethnic Patterns* self-published.

Mary Schafer's quilts exhibited in a series at the Robert E. Whaley house in Flint, Michigan.

1979 The Quilters Hall of Fame established at the Continental Quilting Congress, Virginia. Those honored were Lenice Ingram Bacon, William Rush Dunton Jr., Ruth Finley, Jonathan Holstein, Marguerite Ickis, and Gail van der Hoof.

Karey Bresenhan founds Quilt Market, a wholesale show in Houston.

Nancy Crow, Harriet Anderson, Virginia Randles, and Francoise Barnes found Quilt National in Ohio.

Cuesta Benberry begins writing articles for *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*.

Jinny Beyer's Patchwork Patterns published.

Barbara Brackman's *Encyclopedia of Pieced Quilt Patterns* self-published.

Nancy Crow receives a National Endowment for the Arts grant.

Averil Colby named first honorary member of the Quilters' Guild of the British Isles.

Joyce Gross presents one of her *Patch in Time* quilt shows, which includes Bertha Stenge quilts.

Jonathan Holstein and Gail van der Hoof curate an Amish exhibit that travels to ten museums in the United States.

Michael James is a juror for first Quilt National, Ohio.

Marie Webster's quilts donated to Indianapolis Museum of Art by her daughter-in-law, Jeanette Thurber.

Donna Wilder founds the Fairfield Fashion Show.

1980 The Quilters Hall of Fame inducts Averil Colby, Anne Orr, Florence Peto, Grace Snyder, and Bertha Stenge at the Continental Quilting Congress.

> Sally Garoutte, Joyce Gross, and friends found the American Quilt Study Group in California. Giving papers that year are Cuesta Benberry, Barbara Brackman, Sally Garoutte, and Joyce Gross.

> Shiela Betterton curates British Council Exhibition in St. Louis, Missouri.

Jinny Beyer's *The Quilter's Album of Blocks and Borders* published.

Bonnie Leman founds Moon Over the Mountain Publishing Company.

Bonnie Leman's *Log Cabin Quilts* (with Judy Martin) published.

Yvonne Porcella's Pieced Clothing published.

Donna Wilder founds the Fairfield Block Contest.

Bets Ramsey writes a weekly column, "The Quilter," for the *Chattanooga Times*. Each column features a quilt pattern (until 1998).

1981 Jinny Beyer founds seminar in Hilton Head, South Carolina.

> Karey Bresenhan produces the first Regional Quilt Market in San Francisco.

Joyce Gross organizes Point Bonita Quilt Retreat, California.

Sally Garoutte edits Uncoverings until 1987.

Jeffrey Gutcheon begins writing column "Not for Shopkeepers Only" for *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*, until 1992.

Carter Houck's Nova Scotia Patchwork Patterns and The Patchwork Pattern Book Reworked and Adapted for American Quilters from the Japanese Edition published.

Michael James's *The Second Quiltmaker's Handbook: Creative Approaches to Contemporary Quilt Design* published. Reprinted in 1993.

Bonnie Leman's *Taking the Math Out of Making Patchwork Quilts* with Judy Martin published.

Yvonne Porcella's *Pieced Clothing Variations* published.

Jean Wells's Patchwork Apparel published.

1982 The Quilters Hall of Fame inducts Jean Ray Laury and Bonnie Leman at the Continental Quilting Congress.

Virginia Avery's Quilts to Wear published.

Jinny Beyer's *The Art and Technique of Creating Medallion Style Quilts* published. She begins working with VIP to introduce a line of fabric for quilters.

Georgia Bonesteel's *Lap Quilting with Georgia Bonesteel* published.

Jeffrey Gutcheon's Diamond Patchwork published.

Bonnie Leman founds, publishes, and edits *Quiltmaker* magazine.

Merikay Waldvogel curates antique quilt exhibit at Knoxville World's Fair.

1983 The Quilters Hall of Fame inducts Cuesta Benberry at the Continental Quilting Congress.

Mary Barton's Study Center at Heirloom to Heirloom Quilters Conference, Ames, Iowa, is forerunner of other study centers.

Amy Emms demonstrates Durham quilting at Crafts Council Exhibit in London.

Joyce Gross presents a Study Room at the West Coast Quilters Conference, Portland, Oregon.

Jeffrey Gutcheon prints a line of fabrics called the American Classic Line.

Michael James's ten-year retrospective, "Michael James: Quiltmaker," Worcester (Massachusetts) Craft Center.

Helen Kelley begins "Loose Threads" column for *Quilter's Newsletter Magazine*.

Jean Ray Laury's *Keeping It all Together: The Not Just* for Quiltmakers Coping Book published.
