PARK HISTORY

The central area of what was to become the City of Yachats was at one time a rich coastal marshland. It was home to a wide spectrum of native plants and wildlife, and served as a resting place for migrating waterfowl. As the city developed, the natural character of the area slowly diminished, overwhelmed by construction dirt dumps and dominated by non-native plants.

An old grainy photograph of the undisturbed marshland was enough to inspire a small group of locals to initiate a restoration project. With considerable help from the City and the community, the Yachats Community Park Task Force spent four years researching, planning, and securing the funds necessary to return the center of Yachats to a productive, functioning wetland.

The result is your Yachats Community Park, an evolving restoration project.

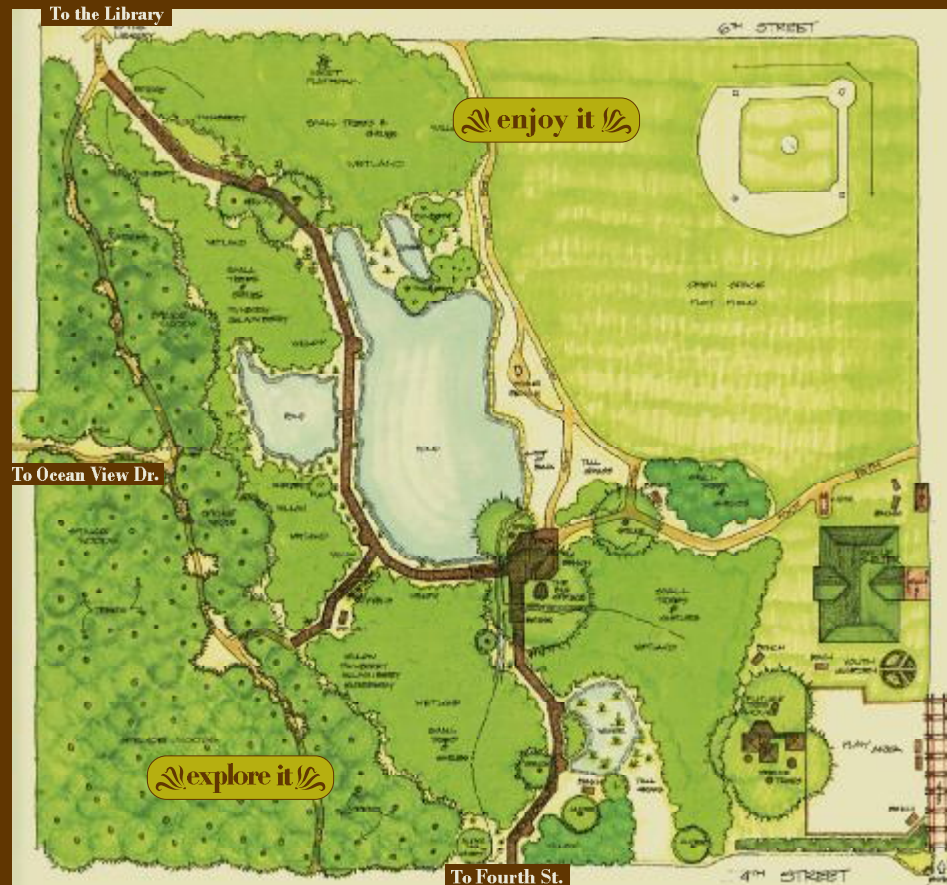
