Head Coach Gary St. Clair



Gary St. Clair enters his 18th season as the head coach of the San Jose State University men's soccer program. As one of only two coaches in the 80-year history of San Jose State men's soccer to reach the 100-win plateau for coaching victories, St. Clair enters the 2007 season with a 161-148-25 record at the major college level. He is a four-time Coach of the Year honoree twice by the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF), and twice by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA) as the Far West Region's top field leader.

On October 17, 2004, St. Clair led the Spartans to the program's historic 500th win of all-time against thenconference rival San Diego State. San Jose State is one of just 30 men's soccer programs around the country, in all divisions, to reach the milestone.

The 2006 season saw a young and inexperienced Spartan squad go 7-10-1 while attempting to replace seven starters from 2005. San Jose State did produce a dramatic 2-1 victory in front of 917 spectators at area rival Stanford four games into the campaign, scoring both goals in the last 4:55 of regulation, the winner coming with just eight seconds left to play.

In 2005, St. Clair led the Spartans to one of their greatest triumphs, a come-from-behind, 3-2 upset in overtime against second-ranked University of New Mexico in front of 3,023 in Albuquerque, N.M. The Spartans were ultimately edged out by New Mexico



for the MPSF crown and automatic NCAA Tournament berth, with the Lobos' only other loss all season coming in the national championship game, 1-0 to Maryland. San Iose State finished 11-5-3 overall and second in the league with a 7-2-1 mark.

Three times, in 1998, 2000 and 2003, St. Clair led the Spartans to the NCAA Tournament. The 1998 team ended a 22-year absence by San Jose State in NCAA postseason action. The Spartans captured the 2000 and 2003 MPSF Tournament titles and reached the final in 2002. After rebuilding the program's foundation in his first three seasons, St. Clair



has since produced nine winning seasons, seven of them with double-digit victory totals.

St. Clair's most outstanding team was the 2000 installment that set a school record for wins in a season with 20, earned a number-one national ranking in the NSCAA poll for four weeks and was the only team to finish the regular season unbeaten. San Jose State, which was ranked second and 14th in the final Soccer America and NSCAA polls, respectively, that year, went 31 seasons between number-one rankings. The Spartan coach was named the MPSF Mountain Division Coach of the Year and picked up his second NSCAA/adidas Far West Coach of the Year award.

Following the 2003 season, St. Clair earned MPSF Coach of the Year recognition for the second time, as the Spartans went 12-7-2, won the MPSF Tournament and participated in the NCAA Tournament.

Booster Club, which has since raised over \$130,000 for the Spartan men's soccer program.

St. Clair coached 13 seasons locally, seven at West Valley College and six at San Jose's Leland High School, before returning to his alma mater as head coach. Nine of those teams won league and/or conference titles.

The 1976 San Jose State graduate earned his master's degree from Saint Mary's College (Calif.) in 1984. He was a two-time all-conference and three-time All-West Coast goalkeeper playing on the 1970 through 1974 Spartan teams. He still shares the school's all-time record for career shutouts with 18.

A first-round selection of the Dallas Tornado during the 1975 North American Soccer League Draft, St. Clair played for the San Jose Earthquakes in 1976 and the San Diego Jaws in 1977. He was named to the 1976 U.S. Olympic men's soccer team.

The native of Milpitas, Calif., holds a United States Soccer Federation National "A" coaching license. He and his wife, Beverly, reside in San Jose. They have two adult children. Kristen accepted her first head coaching position in charge of the women's program at NAIA California Baptist University in Riverside, Calif., on March 27, 2007, while Daniel graduated from Shoreline Cavalry College with a degree in biblical studies, and from Cal Poly in December 2005, with a degree in philosophy.


Associate Head Coach 18th Season San Jose State • 1977

Ron Smare enters his 18th season on the San Jose State University men's soccer coaching staff, and second as the associate head coach. He has worked with Gary St. Clair at San Jose State since St. Clair took over the program in 1990, serving his first 16 years as an assistant coach. For two consecutive seasons in 2001 and 2002, Smare was a nominee for the AFLAC National Assistant Coach of the Year award.

In addition to his duties at San Jose State, Smare is a U.S. history teacher at Branham High School in San Jose. He has been the head coach of the varsity girl's soccer team at Branham since 1999, earning West Valley Athletic League Coach of the Year honors in 2000 and 2001, Santa Teresa Athletic League Coach of the Year honors in 2003 and Central Coast Section Honor Coach distinction in 2005.

Smare came to San Jose State from Mission College in Santa Clara, Calif. He was the head coach there for four seasons from 1986 through 1989.

The 1977 graduate of San Jose State earned his mas-



ter's degree from Stanford University in 1981. Smare began his coaching career at San Jose's Del Mar High School, where he was the head coach for 13 seasons. He had two separate stints as an assistant coach at West Valley College, from 1979-80 and 1984-85, and was an assistant coach at Stanford from 1981-83.

Chris Behler is in his fifth season with the San Jose State men's soccer program. He began his duties as a graduate assistant in 2003.

In addition to serving as the Spartan assistant coach, Behler is currently the head coach of the Mount Hamilton Lobitos boy's U17 team, which stormed through both the regional



and national tournaments in winning all nine games by a combined score of 39-7, on its way to the US Club Soccer U17 Super Group title at the 2007 National Cup IV in Greensboro, N.C., July 21-24.

For three seasons prior to his arrival at San Jose State, Behler worked as the girl's soccer assistant coach at nearby Presentation High School under legendary Spartan Mani Hernandez. He helped Presentation to a Central Coast Section title in 2003 and a co-championship in 2002. Also in 2002, he was an assistant with the Hartnell College women's team in Salinas, Calif., helping the junior college program to a first-ever playoff appearance.

Behler has experience with the Olympic Development Program (ODP), serving as an assistant coach with the girl's U17 District II ODP team in 2002. He is on the Super Y-League ODP staff, and is a scout for the Western Division. He holds a NSCAA Premier diploma.

The multiple-sport athlete lettered in football, lacrosse and soccer at Sonoma State University from 1989-91. He was part of the team that finished second at the 1991 NCAA Division II Men's Soccer Championship. He earned a bachelor's degree majoring in business management, with a minor in marketing. Behler is a native of San Jose, and resides in Santa Clara, Calif.



The 2007 San Jose State University men's soccer team will rely on 12 returning lettermen, eight of them starters, and a stellar recruiting class, including three region and three state team players, to get the program back to the NCAA Championship for the first time since 2003.

"I'm optimistic that we will be much better," says Gary St. Clair as he approaches his 18th year in charge at his alma mater. "We have added a great deal of depth and competition at each position. All teams go through cycles because of graduation and recruiting. Last year, we were one of the most inexperienced teams that I have coached at San Jose State. I think that based upon the experience that those young players received in 2006, and the experience that they continued to get last spring, I see this team really turning a corner.

"How good will we be? It's hard to say. It depends on the continued development of the players that we have. However, one of my reasons for optimism, is we have a year of experience under our belt, which is absolutely critical. We are not going to be reliant on as many freshmen and sophomores as we have in the past. I also believe that this team is going to be far more internally competitive because of the experience, but also because of the good, young players that we have brought into the program."

FORWARDS

The forward line welcomes back the team's top scorer from 2006 in Colby Moore, as well as the 2005 MPSF Co-Newcomer of the Year in Ismael Ibarra. Moore tallied four goals in his first season of college soccer, including two game-winners, while Ibarra provided five goals, four of them game-winners, and five assists, during a very productive first season of major college soccer prior to taking last year off.


"Colby and Ismael are very much from the same mold in that they are a handful for defenders," explains St. Clair. "I think that everybody is looking for Ish to make a big contribution to this team. He simply has a knack for scoring. Colby got a lot of experience playing in this position last year."

Returners who will vie for time in what will generally look like a one-forward, 4-5-1 alignment on the field for St. Clair, are seniors Savio Carrijo and Julio Gonzalez.


Newcomers who can play up top include Olympic Development Program (ODP) regional standout Brent Young and ODP state team players Steve Dongo and Robert Jackson.

MIDFIELDERS

The strength of this team is probably going to lie in midfield again this year," remarks St. Clair. "I think that potentially, we have a very good group of central

midfielders, and I say potentially only because two of the three could be brand new."

Second-team All-MPSF pick Hiroki Akiyama is back to lead this deep and talented group, probably in a holding midfield position.

Continues St. Clair, "Hiroki does just about everything well. He reads the game and can run all day long. He is a sure bet to play for us in midfield."

Newcomer Efrain Burgos, Jr., is the favorite to see the bulk of the action as the attacking midfielder.

Says St. Clair, "Hiroki and Junior give us the ability to hold the ball in midfield, which is something we have not been able to do consistently for years."

Ricky Dorrego, another ODP regional player and top local prospect who was named the section's Player of the Year by the San Jose Mercury News as a senior at Lincoln High School, should make an immediate impact, and could start.



Providing depth behind that trio will be Jacob Morrison. Nick Cukar has the inside track on the right side, with Yousef Samy challenging him. Options on the left side include returner Edward Murillo-Jimenez, as well as newcomer Bernabe Camacho, Jr., an ODP regional player.


State team player Justin Castro, out of nearby Archbishop Mitty High School, adds more depth, as do Moore, Jackson and Young.

DEFENDERS

"The backline will be better than it was last year," says St. Clair. "The defense gave up one goal in eight matches in the spring, and while it's not the same thing as the fall, it's a good indication that we are on the right track.

Returning standouts include 2006 first-team All-MPSF selection Ed Brand, the Spartans' anchor and two-time co-captain, and his central tandem partner Sam Shore.

"I would take Ed over any other central defender in the conference," states St. Clair. "We expect a very solid year out of him. Ed is a natural-born leader back there,

and I think he has a very good central defender mate in Sam Shore. Sam is tall and imposing at six-foot-five. He reads the game very well and is a good technical player."

A couple of position changes were made in the spring to bolster the outside. Gavin Wenyon, a corner kick specialist who enters 2007 with the most starts among any current Spartan, switched from right to left back. In turn, Brian McGuire moved from the right side of midfield, to the right back spot.

Oscar Monjaras can play anywhere on the back line, while 2006 redshirt Osvaldo Alcala and newcomer Kachiside Madu should provide depth on the outside.

GOALKEEPERS

Richard Mann, a third-team All-MPSF honoree in 2006 and cocaptain for the new season, is set to begin his third campaign as the Spartan starter in goal.

"Our goalie situation is probably as good as it has been in the past three years," says St. Clair. "Richard has started for us for two years, and has grown as a player

by leaps and bounds during that

Expected to make a legitimate challenge for some playing time is junior college transfer Lewis Sweeney, who joined the team in the spring and performed well.

SCHEDULE

The Spartans will begin the regular season with their first out-of-region trip since 1995, at the Davidson adidas Classic in Davidson, N.C. The September 20 home opener with Santa Clara, one of eight home games, highlights the nonconference schedule.

"With the trip to North Carolina, we will get an early indication about just where we are with this team," concludes St. Clair. "The great thing for us is that ours is always one of the more difficult schedules on the west coast and in the nation, simply because geographically, we play in such a strong Division I soccer area.

"I think the (Mountain Pacific Sports Federation) is going to be wide open. It's going to be that way because there are going to be a lot of good teams, not because there's going to be no strong teams. New Mexico has had two or three solid recruiting years, and they are going to be extremely good. The MPSF again will be very strong."

The Mountain Pacific Sports Federation (MPSF) was established in the 1992-93 academic year to serve the competitive needs of member institutions from the Big West, Pacific-10, Mountain West, Western Athletic and West Coast Conferences and other selected universities in the western United States, and to provide championship competition for Division I intercollegiate Olympic sports in a conference setting. The MPSF was originally formed to provide enhanced competition and championship opportunities for sports without conference affiliation; to contain the costs of competition; and to ensure the survival of sports impacted by Title IX and other fiscal pressures. The Federation has served as an incubator for emerging women's sports and as a safe harbor for sports impacted by conference realignments. In 2007-08, the Federation will celebrate its 16th year of competition and is more relevant today than at any other time since its inception. As a testament to its viability, the Mountain Pacific Sports Federation continues to successfully manage the ever-changing face of college sports by fostering contraction and expansion of its intercollegiate athletics portfolio to meet the dynamic needs of its member institutions and conferences.







San Jose State University



San Jose State University, Silicon Valley's metropolitan university, is pre-eminent in broadly educating leaders and professionals for an increasingly complex and global society.

Located in the heart of the Silicon Valley, this university has aided the development of the computer industry and the resulting technological advances in our nation by providing the largest source of engineering, science and business graduates to Silicon Valley companies.

Graduating about 7,000 students annually, San Jose State University also provides the professional infrastructure for the region - from teachers, to social workers, to artists, to law enforcement officers,

to nurses. The terms, "leaders and professionals," describe not just the types of graduates who earn their degrees at San Jose State, but also the roles they assume in their communities and in their fields of endeavor.

San Jose State University's place in history is well-established. Founded in 1857, it was the first public institution of higher education on the West Coast. From its humble beginnings as a normal school to train teachers for the developing frontier, it has matured into a master's university offering 191 bachelor's and master's degrees.

The University's 30,000 students study in eight fullyaccredited colleges: Applied Sciences and the Arts, Business, Education, Engineering, Humanities and the Arts, Science, Social Sciences and Social Work. One strength of the academic program is the broad general education curriculum that brings common elements -- critical thinking, writing and communication skills, and cultural pluralism -- to diverse studies. Academic strength also is seen in the University's nationally-recognized programs. Examples include the School of Music, the School of Art and Design, the School of Journalism and Mass Communications, the School of Nursing and the School of Library and Information Science.

In each discipline, quality teaching remains a priority. Tenured faculty teach introductory as well as advanced courses with an emphasis on small classes. Learning facilities include computer-equipped classrooms, the Western world's only undergraduate nuclear science facility and North America's largest Beethoven Center. Focusing on applied research, faculty receive a growing number of contracts and grants each year. From Moss Landing Marine Research Laboratory to the NASA Ames Research Center, faculty are exploring everything from the depths of the ocean to the surface of Mars.

San Jose State University also finds strength in its diversity. For many first-generation students, it is a gateway to economic independence and social mobility. It is also an incubator of cultural and intellectual development, and an opportunity for lifelong learning. Students range in age from first-time freshmen, to college transfers, to professionals seeking additional education. Student demographics with ethnic pluralism - provide the benefits of multiple cultures and diverse student interests and activities. From residence life, to athletic teams, to social clubs, to co-op jobs student activities meet the needs of this diverse student body.

Spartan Stadium, which seats 30,456, is the home for San Jose State men's soccer, women's soccer and football.

The multi-purpose facility is the site of the school's annual commencement ceremony. Concerts, professional and collegiate soccer, band competitions and high school football games also take place at Spartan Stadium.

The stadium was the site of the FIFA Women's World Cup in 1999 and the NCAA Women's College Cup in 1999 and 2000, attracting recordsetting crowds. It has also been the site of Major League Soccer and the Women's United Soccer Association.

Most recently in 2007, Spartan Stadium played host to warm-up matches for both the U.S. men's and women's national teams against China and Japan on June 2 and July 27, respectively, attracting over 32,000 spectators for the two matches.

Administration





Don W. Kassing University President

As president of San Jose State University, Don W. Kassing heads the oldest and one of the largest universities in the 23-campus California State University system. Appointed in 2004, Kassing has moved the University forward in several key areas. Under his leadership, the campus is engaged in university-wide strategic planning, with the goal of making San Jose State University a university of choice by 2010.

Since February 2006, he has accepted the three largest private donations to the University in its 150-year history: a \$10-million gift from alumni Donald and Sally Lucas for the graduate school of business, a \$15-million gift from alumnus Charles W. Davidson for the College of Engineering, and a \$10-million gift from alumna Connie Lurie for the College of Education.

As president and in his former role as vice president for administration and finance, Kassing led the development, construction and successful opening of two major campus facilities: the award-winning Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Library, based on a first-of-its-kind and highly-successful partnership with the city of

San Jose; and Campus Village, a state-of-the-art residence complex for students, faculty and staff, the largest such project in the California State University system, and the focus of a renewed sense of community on the campus.

Before his appointment to the presidency, Kassing had served for more than a decade as vice president for administration and finance and as chief financial officer. As CFO, he was responsible for all business and financial affairs of the University.

His previous 18 years in higher education included service as vice president for university relations and administrative services at Murray State University in Kentucky, and vice president for development and public affairs at Western State College of Colorado. He also served for two years as president of the Granite City Campus of the Belleville Area College in Belleville, Ill. Before that, he worked for 11 years in private industry, including eight years in corporate finance and operations management for Brown Group, Inc., and three years with General Motors Corporation.

Active in the community and the region, Kassing serves on the following boards: San Jose Sports Authority, United Way Silicon Valley, San Jose Chamber of Commerce, Silicon Valley Leadership Group, Joint Venture: Silicon Valley, and the Silicon Valley Higher Education Roundtable. He is also a member of the United Way Community Impact Committee.

Kassing holds an M.B.A. and a B.S. in economics from St. Louis University. He is married, with three children and five grandchildren



Tom Bowen Director of Athletics

Tom Bowen was named San Jose State University's director of athletics on December 20, 2004. Under his leadership and with his vision for the department, San Jose State has established itself as a viable Division I-A intercollegiate athletics program with proven athletic, academic and financial successes to his credit.

At the core of Bowen's mission for San Jose State University Athletics is

building a "Culture of Champions" academically, athletically and in the community. To that end, the Notre Dame alum has overhauled the department's infrastructure; invested resources both in external and internal operations; initiated an enhanced website presence; and expanded marketing, promotions and advertising opportunities locally, regionally and nationally with the creation of Spartan Sports Properties.

With his fund-raising acumen, Bowen has led the Spartan Foundation - the department's fund-raising component - to unprecedented development heights, capped by a department-record \$1.5 million during the 2006-07 fund drive.

As an integral member of the University's presidential staff, he has created new short and long-term revenue streams for intercollegiate athletics and many other campus extra-curricular activities. His initiatives and leadership have created new energy department-wide and throughout the University. The University has benefitted from Athletics' increasing visibility, receiving record donations during the 2006-07 time frame.

In 2006-07, football capped its finest season in nearly two decades, posting a 9-4 overall record and capturing the New Mexico Bowl championship. Women's cross country and women's water polo, ranked sixth nationally in the final coaches' poll, turned in their best record in years. In 2005-06, San Jose State won the Western Athletic Conference women's golf championship, recorded its highest finish ever at a NCAA regional championship in women's gymnastics, and produced seven teams out of 16 with its best conference finish in years.

Bowen's vision for student-athlete success and excellence led to the creation of a Student Success Services component. Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores as measured by the NCAA have risen dramatically under his watch - a 42-point increase since his installation as director.

Bowen came to San Jose State after serving three years as the Director of Community Affairs for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League. He directed all of the team's fund-raising activities and was responsible for alumni and current player participation in the community. Also serving as the executive director of the 49ers Foundation, San Francisco was the first NFL franchise to implement an annual giving program.

His Division I experience at the college level includes athletic administration positions at the University of California and Saint Mary's College in Moraga, Calif.

Bowen's first professional leadership appointment in athletics was at De La Salle High School in Concord, Calif. From 1987 through 1995, he held the positions of assistant football coach and athletics director.

He is a Level 2 certified member of the College Athletic Business Management Association (CABMA), the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the National Society of Fund Raising Executives.

The 1983 graduate of the University of Notre Dame majored in theology/sociology and spent six years studying for the priesthood with the Holy Cross Fathers. Bowen went on to earn a master's degree in administration/education from the University of San Francisco in 1990.

An active member of the Bay Area community, he serves on the board of the San Jose Sports Authority. He is an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco School of Sports Management and at San Jose State University's Department of Kinesiology, where he teaches sports management classes. The Denver, Colo., native and his wife, Mia, are the parents of three children: sons, Andrew and Peter, and daughter, McKenna.



STUDENT SUCCESS SERVICES

Today's Spartan student-athlete has more opportunities to succeed academically than ever before. Located in the Simpkins Stadium Center, the Scott Gadway Academic Center was dedicated in January, 2003. Here, student-athletes have a place to study, work with tutors, utilize computers or seek academic advice.

The Scott Gadway Academic Center is a gift from alums Stan and Marilyn Gadway, to honor their late son, Scott, a 1991 San Jose State graduate who majored in aeronautics. He died in a 1996 skydiving accident.

The facility's spirit is echoed at its entrance:

"May all students who use this room share Scott's love and lust for life and his desire to be the very best that one could be in every pursuit."

The Student Success Services team is readily available to help studentathletes achieve their academic goals. Cindy Kato, now in her third year at San Jose State, is the director of the Spartans' Student Success Services unit. She was previously the assistant director for learning in academic counseling and student services/intercollegiate athletics at the University of Minnesota. Kato joined the Big Ten school in 1990 as its original learning specialist for intercollegiate athletics.


