Princeton enters the 2009 baseball season looking to build off of what Princeton head coach Scott Bradley described as the best fall and winter conditioning program of any of his teams in his 12 years at Princeton.

Princeton has finished with an 11-9 Ivy League record in each of the past three seasons, but is without an Ivy League title since the 2006 season, the freshman year of the Class of 2009. The Tigers return a talented core of players that is led by its four-player senior class. The four players—Derek Beckman, Dan DeGeorge, Brad Gemberling and Adrian Turnham—were freshmen back in 2006, and their hunger to regain the Ivy League title and return to the NCAA tournament has driven them and the team during the offseason.

"The four seniors have been key contributors since they were freshmen," says Bradley. "They have an excellent work ethic, are demanding of their teammates, and have developed into excellent leaders for our program."

In addition to the four seniors, throw in a pair of talented juniors in David Hale and Jack Murphy, and Princeton has a solid group of six players that is talented, tested and experienced.

"David and Jack are both top pro prospects," says Bradley. "They have had a great two years for us and have developed into key contributors. They deserve a lot of the attention they are getting from professional teams."

Princeton will also return a pair of juniors who missed last season. Greg Van Horn had an excellent campaign as a freshman and his return to the lineup will help strength both the Tiger infield as well as its batting order. Another key returning player will be Brian Berkowitz, who appeared in just four games last season. Berkowitz gives the Tigers an added left-handed bat, which will give Princeton more balance since last year's lineup was predominantly right-handed.

The Princeton lineup will also fluctuate throughout the season as the Tigers have 12-13 players who will see significant playing time as opposed to a set lineup.

"The last few years we have pretty much played the same eight players on a day-in, day-out basis," says Bradley. "One of the nice things about this team is the depth and experience we have. We are strong in the field, at the plate and on the mound. We have a lot of flexibility in the lineup."

In addition, the Tigers will be better equipped to play according to situations.

"We have a better left-bat/right-bat balance and can match against hitters better," says Bradley. "We also will have the ability to pinch run and make late defensive changes, something that has limited us in the past few years."

DAVID HALE



THE PITCHING STAFF

Despite losing two starting pitchers from last year's team to graduation, the Tigers pitching staff enters 2009 with a chance to be one of the most dominant in the league. The staff is led by three established starters in Gemberling, Hale and sophomore Dan Barnes.

All three will have a chance to play professional baseball one day and can throw their fastball in the 90s consistently. Gemberling had the lowest ERA among Princeton starters last season with a 3.60 ERA in 45 innings of work. He was 2-1 and struck out 45 batters and has a career mark of 7-3. Gemberling has been a key contributor since joining the Tigers in 2006, making mostly relief appearances as a freshman

before starting as a sophomore and junior. *Baseball America* ranked him as a pre-season all-league, the league's pre-season Pitcher of the Year, and listed him as the league's fourth-ranked prospect.

Hale, who was simply dominant at times during his sophomore year on the mound, Hale is ranked as the Ivy League's top prospect by *Baseball America* and is expected to be drafted in the first three rounds in June. Hale works in the mid-90s and is beginning to command his secondary pitches better as he focuses on pitching. Last year Hale played in the outfield between starts, batting at .339, but this year he will serve as the team's designated hitter when not playing so that he can focus on pitching and not have to worry about running and throwing in the outfield.

Barnes jumped onto the scene last season as a starter early in the season before shifting to the bullpen. He was 2-4 with a 4.58 ERA in 37.1 innings of work and added two saves. He will return to the starting rotation this spring.

In addition to their experience in Princeton, all three have faced some of the nation's elite playing over the summer. Gemberling and Hale each pitched in the Cape Cod League, while Barnes had a great summer in the Coastal Plains League.

"We will look to those three to set the tone for our pitchers," says Bradley. "They are all very experienced and have great stuff."

Princeton's weekend rotation to likely be filled out by one of two lefties,

either junior Langford Stuber or sophomore David Palms. Both players had good seasons for Princeton last year.

Stuber was 2-3 with a 5.23 ERA, although eight of his 18 earned runs came in his first start. Removing that outing from his season stats lowers his ERA to 3.00. Stuber served as Princeton's mid-week starter late in the season and often face potent lineups against the likes of Rutgers, Seton Hall and St. John's.

Palms came on to the scene as a freshman and was effective immediately. He had the lowest ERA of any pitcher on the team at 3.23 as he made a team-high 14 appearances. He was 2-2 and was one of only two Tiger pitchers to average more than one strikeout per inning. He also adds versatility to the Tiger staff as it wouldn't be surprising to see him in relief on the Saturday of a league weekend and starting a game the following day.

Sophomore Matt Grabowski will likely be at the back of the Princeton bullpen as the team's closer. Coming off a great fall that saw his velocity and effectiveness rise, he has the chance to become Princeton's first pure closer since Brian Kappel graduated in 2005.

The Tiger pitching staff will be bolstered by sophomore Tim Feess, who will likely see his role increased in 2009. Feess is crafty, knows how to pitch and will be used in many different situations. He made nine appearances last season.

Junior Ross Staine and sophomore Chad Ohlendorf did not pitch last year as each fought injuries. Both are healthy as 2009 begins and will compete for innings early in the season. Sophomore Matt Welsh suffered a broken collarbone in the offseason and will not be available until later in the season. He is likely to get some innings late in the year.

A pair of two-way players, junior Jon Broschious and sophomore Matt Connor, will also see time on the mound. Broschious made several appearances as a freshman before playing predominantly in the field last year, while Connor has not yet pitched at Princeton. The Tigers added flexibility in the field will provide both the chance to pitch during the season.

The staff will be joined by a pair of freshmen in Ryan Makis and Stephen Elmore. Both will compete for innings in their freshman years.

INFIELD

The Princeton infield will feature four players who are very experienced at their positions, bolstered by a platoon at third of some very capable back-ups.

Turnham starts things off at first base. A good defensive player and a solid fielder, Turnham has lived in the middle of the Tiger batting order for the past few years and has delivered on the field. Last year he batted .306 while playing in all but one games. Also as a junior, he saw his power numbers rise, plus he was one of only three Tiger batters to draw more walks than strikeouts.

DeGeorge will move to his natural position of second base this season after spending time as shortstop for most the first three years of his collegiate career. He is the only current Tiger senior who has been an everyday player since his first game in the Orange and Black. A .273 hitter last year, DeGeorge tied a Princeton record for runs scored in a season with 47.

DeGeorge's move to second base is made possibly by the return of Van Horn at shortstop. The junior had as a good a freshman year as any on record, batting .323 with 11 doubles, four home runs, eight stolen bases and a team-high 30 runs scored. Van Horn hit leadoff that season but is likely to hit in a power spot this season.

Murphy will complete the list of mainstays in the Tiger infield. Murphy started all 42 games behind the plate for Princeton and caught all but three innings last season. A preseason All-Ivy and the league's second-ranked prospect by *Baseball America*, Murphy was also listed as the league's most-feared hitter in a coaches poll on CollegeBaseballInsider.com. He batted .391 a season ago and led the team with eight homers and 40 RBIs.

Although clearly capable of catching everyday, Murphy will be able to get the occasional day off as freshman Sam Mulroy will slot in and catch. A good all-around athlete, it will be important for Mulroy to get college experience behind the plate for next season. Additionally, it will give Murphy, a very capable first and third baseman, to have the chance to play in the field on occasion and give a rest to others at those positions.

The Tigers will likely use a platoon at third base between sophomore Matt Connor and freshman Andrew Whitener. Connor saw time in the infield last season and strengthened as the season progressed, while Whitener comes to the Tigers as all-league shortstop and third baseman from Washington, D.C. Whitener offers the Tigers an added left-handed bat in the lineup.

Additionally, junior Noel Gonzales-Luna, who played in 19 games last season, will add depth up the middle, while sophomore Kyle O'Donovan gives the Tigers a third catcher.

"Our infield flexibility really is nice," says Bradley. "We can really move the guys around and adjust our lineup according to the situation. Seven guys will be able to contribute at the five positions on a fairly regular basis."

OUTFIELD

Princeton will rotate four outfielders through the three outfield positions for much of the 2009 season. The 'Killer B's'—Beckman, Berkowitz, Broschious and freshman Tom Boggiano—have a chance to be one of the best defensive outfielders in recent Princeton baseball history.

"Our defense in the outfield will be really strong," says Bradley. "We have some good arms and athleticism out there and you won't see too many balls falling in for hits."

Beckman emerged as an everyday outfielder last season and also settled in as the team's leadoff hitter. Batting .266, he led the team in stolen bases and bunted for several base hits throughout the season when the Tigers needed base runners.

Berkowitz will return after missing most the 2008 season. The junior had a great freshman season, batting just under .300 while providing some pop from the left side of the plate. He can also play at first base.

Broschious is the other returning member of the Princeton outfield, primarily playing in right field last year. Broschious broke out as a power hitter, with 17 of his 31 hits going for extra bases. He hit seven home runs and drove in 27 runs.

Boggiano will complete the group. The freshman is described by Bradley as the team's top defensive outfielder. He can run and throw exceptionally well and will have plenty of opportunities in the outfield.

HEAD COACH OF BASEBALL
12TH SEASON • No. CAROLINA '82**

Scott Bradley is in his 12th year as the head coach of the Princeton baseball team. He enters the 2009 season with a career record of 245-239-1 and a .509 winning percentage. He is 137-83 in Ivy competition and has registered at least 10 Ivy wins in every season at Princeton. Bradley has led Princeton to five Ivy League titles and five NCAA tournament appearances in that span.

The 2008 Tigers won 20 games for the eighth time under Bradley and the first time in four seasons. Princeton also finished above .500 in league play for the third year in a row.

Bradley crossed the 200-win mark during the 2006 season to become the fourth Princeton baseball coach to register 200 wins as Princeton made its most recent NCAA Appearance.

Bradley's Tigers of 2004 won an Ivy League championship and were the last Princeton team to win an NCAA tournament game. He has led Princeton to two of its three NCAA tournament wins, against The Citadel in 2001 and Virginia in 2004.

In 2002 Bradley earned the 100th win of his career. His current record of 225-217-1 ranks him first among Princeton baseball coaches for total wins in their first 10 seasons.

Bradley, who spent nine seasons as a left-handed-hitting catcher in the major leagues for the New York Yankees, Chicago White Sox, Seattle Mariners and Cincinnati Reds, came to Princeton after a year as an assistant coach at Rutgers University. He is a 1982 graduate of the University of North Carolina and an Essex Fells, N.J., native.

Bradley was the second pick of the Yankees (NFL Hall of Famer John Elway was their first pick) in the 1981 draft. He broke into the major leagues wearing Yankee pinstripes in 1984 and stayed in the majors until retiring in 1992. Bradley played 604 games in the big leagues, hitting .257 with 18 home runs and 184 RBIs in 1,648 at-bats. He also played outfield, third base and was a designated hitter. Bradley caught Randy Johnson's first no-hitter while the two were teammates in Seattle in 1990. Bradley served as a minor league player/coach in the Atlanta Braves and Colorado Rockies organizations after his playing days.

Bradley played college baseball at North Carolina, graduating in 1982. He was named to the ACC's 50th Anniversary Team in 2004.

Bradley's older brother, Bob, is currently the head coach of U.S. Men's National Soccer Team. He also spent time coaching in Major League Soccer as well as at Princeton, serving for 12 years as the head coach of the men's soccer team while leading the Tigers to a pair of Ivy League titles and the 1993 College Cup. His younger brother Jeff is an editor and staff writer for ESPN The Magazine.

Bradley and his wife, Mary, live in Pennington with their sons Kevin, Kyle and Scott.

Lloyd Brewer is in his 10th season as a member of the Tiger coaching staff and his 10th year in the same dugout as head coach Scott Bradley. The two were college teammates at the University of North Carolina.

As a player in college, Brewer was a member of the Tar Heel team that competed in the 1978 College World Series. As a senior, Brewer was named first-team All-ACC.

Brewer spent several years out of baseball following college before returning to the bench at Lafayette College as an assistant coach from 1995 to 1998. In 1999 he was promoted to the head coaching position at Lafayette on an interim basis.

Brewer received a B.A. in history from North Carolina in 1980 and a M.A. in sports management from East Stroudsburg in 1996. Brewer and his wife Pam, an associate dean of students at Lafayette, have a son Jason, who graduated from Penn State, and a daughter, Amy, who is a senior at Delaware and plays field hockey.

Jeremy Meccage is in his sixth season as an assistant coach with the Princeton baseball team. Meccage was a four-year starting pitcher for the University of Iowa. As a Hawkeye, he led the team in innings pitched in 1995, 1997 and 1998. Additionally, he led the squad in wins in 1997 and 1998 and ERA in 1998. Twice he led the team in strikeouts.

Meccage was drafted twice by the Los Angeles Dodgers, first as a senior in high school and later following his junior season in college. He signed with the Detroit Tigers during the 2000 season and played professionally for the European B-Champion Brasschaat Braves. Meccage's brother Justin was selected by the New York Yankees in the 2003 draft.

After having his career cut short by arm troubles, Meccage received his MBA from Iowa's Tippie School of Management and currently owns and operates Zag Sports, Inc., an international sports experience designer.

Meccage and his wife Melissa, an assistant coach for Princeton's field hockey team, have a son Bryce.





Charlie Thompson **ATHLETIC TRAINER**

Charlie Thompson is in his 10th year as Princeton's head athletic trainer. He serves as the primary athletic trainer for the football and baseball teams and the men's crews.

Thompson came to Princeton from Maine, where he served as head athletic trainer from 1997-99. Before that Thompson was an assistant athletic trainer at Penn State, where he worked with the football team for six years. He was with the Nittany Lions in 1994, when Penn State went 12-0 and won the Rose Bowl while finishing second nationally.

Thompson has also served as head athletic trainer at Rhode Island and Pittsburgh and was at Princeton previously from 1982-85.

Thompson is a member of the National Athletic Trainers' Association and the Athletic Training Society of New Jersey. He is the president of the Eastern Athletic Trainers' Association.

Thompson and his wife Sandy, an office manager for a dental group, have a son Colin, who graduated from NYU, and a daughter, Ashley, who attended Emerson College.



Clifton Perry **EQUIPMENT MANAGER**

Clifton Perry is his fifth year as the head equipment manager at Princeton. Perry either works directly with or oversees the needs of all 38 varsity teams at Princeton.





Baseball is Princeton's oldest sport. It first came into prominence in 1858 when some freshmen from Brooklyn organized the Baseball Club of the Class of 1862 of Nassau Hall, which played intraclub matches every day except Sunday.

Later, members of other classes joined in, and on October 22, 1860, Princeton met its first outside opponent, playing an Orange, N.J., team to a 42-42 tie in a long nine-inning game that was called on account of darkness. Four years later, on November 22, 1864, Princeton played its first intercollegiate game, defeating Williams 27-16. Four years after that, while on a tour of New England, the Princeton team helped initiate Big Three athletic competition falling to Harvard 17-16 and Yale 30-23.

Three Princetonians made notable contributions to the game in the early years. William S. Gummere 1870 was the first baseball player to use the hook-slide, stealing second successfully by throwing himself feet first under the second baseman's tag, in an exhibition game with the Philadelphia Athletics in the spring of 1870.

Joseph McElroy Mann 1876 was the first college pitcher to control the curve ball and use it successfully in a game. He saw Candy Cummings, a professional pitcher with the Hartford, Connecticut Club, give an exhibition of curve-throwing in the fall of 1874, and that winter he developed his own curve ball by constant practice in the corridors of Nassau Hall. His highly effective use of this novel delivery, on May 29, 1875, in New Haven, Conn., enabled him to pitch the first no-hit game in the history of baseball, amateur or professional. Only two Yale batters got as far as first base, on errors, and Princeton won 3-0.

William S. Schenck 1880 was the first catcher to use a primitive kind of chest protector: copies of *The Princetonian* stuffed beneath his shirt. After the 1880 Harvard game, a Boston sporting goods manufacturer learned of this and within a year had developed a rudimentary form of the present pad.

In 1897, Bill Clarke, then catcher for the Baltimore Orioles, came to Princeton to work with the team. He returned again for short periods in the 1900s, then became Princeton's first full-time baseball coach when he retired from professional baseball.

The 1897 team won the Big Three championship, and so did the Clarke-helped teams of 1899, 1900, and 1901. A notable player of this era was catcher Frederick Kafer 1900, whose classmates later gave a cup in his honor, awarded annually to the outstanding varsity player.

Princeton continued to win the Big Three championship with regularity, failing to take it only twice from 1903 through 1912. Among Clarke's best teams were the 1923 team, which won 21 out of 25 games, including 19 in a row, and the 1924 team, which won 19 out of 23. Leading players of this period were shortstop Moe Berg '23, pitchers Charlie Townsend '24 and Charlie Caldwell '25, and third-baseman Jimmie Boohecker '25. In 1924 Caldwell and Townsend shut out Yale, Caldwell 1-0 in New Haven, Townsend 7-0 in the Commencement game at Princeton. Throughout the Commencement game, the last of his career, Townsend coolly preserved a slowly developing no-hitter as well as a shutout.

Berg later played professional baseball for fifteen years, mostly as catcher. He was considered the most scholarly player in the big leagues, and his storytelling made him a great favorite in the bullpen. His talent for picking up new languages greatly impressed his teammates on a barnstorming trip to Japan in the 1930s. During the crossing, Berg spent a good deal of time in the ship's engine-room practicing Japanese with a Japanese fireman, and when the team arrived in Tokyo, Babe Ruth and the others were grateful for Berg's ability to read signs and to talk with cab drivers and hotel clerks. In World War II, he served as a spy for the Office of Strategic Services and obtained valuable information about Germany's progress in the race with the United States to develop an atomic bomb.

After Clarke's retirement in 1944, there was a seven-year period be-

fore the beginning of Eddie Donovan's era in 1952. Charlie Caldwell '25 coached in 1945 and 1946, Matt Davidson in 1947 and 1948, and Emerson Dickman in 1949, 1950, and 1951. The 1951 team, which had the best record overall (20-6) since the 1923-1924 season, also won the NCAA District 2 championship and advanced to College World Series. In 1951, Dave Sisler '53 had an ERA of 0.99; he later pitched in the major leagues.

Eddie Donovan was coach from 1952 through 1975. His 1953 team was Eastern Intercollegiate as well as Big Three champion. Outstanding in later years were the 1960 and 1965 teams, both Big Three champions, and the 1971 team, which finished with a 22-7-1 record. In 1971 Donovan was voted District 2 Coach of the year.

Good pitching continued to be Princeton's chief asset. Four pitchers threw no-hitters: Harry Brightman '52 against Fordham in 1952, Dave Douglas '60 against Manhattan in 1960, Anton Schoolwerth '63 against C.C.N.Y. in 1961, and Graham Marcott '67 against Villanova in 1966.

Donovan was blessed with several outstanding hitters: Joe Golden '53 batted .361 and Arnold Holtberg '70 (an All-American catcher) .356 their senior years. Bob Schiffner '71 had a three-year batting average of .332, at the time, the best in Princeton history.

After Donovan retired in 1975, there was a seven-year stretch before the beginning of Tom O'Connell's 15-year tenure at Princeton. O'Connell, second in wins at Princeton only to Clarke, led Princeton to three league championships, two Eastern Intercollegiate titles and one Ivy League championship after Army and Navy left the league in 1993. O'Connell's first league championship came in 1985 when Princeton set a single-season win record with a 29-12 overall record and a 16-3 EIBL record. The team defeated Harvard in the EIBL title game, then faced Miami and Florida in the NCAA tournament.

It was during that 1985 season that Dan Arendas '86 set a Princeton single-season record by batting .440 with 66 hits. Arendas ranks second in career batting average at .364 behind MacCoy, a career .380 hitter.

Princeton again won the Eastern championship in 1991 with a 24-22 overall record and a 14-4 league record. O'Connell's team faced Clemson and Towson State in the NCAA Regionals in Maine.

Princeton's current head coach Scott Bradley, replaced O'Connell when he retired in 1997 and has led Princeton to five Ivy League championships in his 10 years as coach. Bradley's first title came in his third season, 2000, when Princeton was 24-20 overall and 13-7 in the league. Princeton swept Dartmouth in the Ivy League Championship series and advanced to the NCAA Regionals to play Houston and Texas Tech. Pitching the game against Houston for Princeton was Chris Young '02, a baseball and basketball star at Princeton. Young was the 1999 Ivy League Rookie of the Year in both baseball and basketball and won the Ivy League's Lowest ERA Award in both years he pitched at Princeton. Young was drafted after his second year at Princeton and now pitches for the San Diego Padres.

Bradley's boys repeated as Ivy champs in 2001 and this time won an NCAA tournament game for the first time as pitcher David Boehle '03 earned the win over The Citadel. Princeton returned to the NCAA tournament with league titles in 2003 and 2004. The 2003 team featured second-round draft-pick Thomas Pauly '04, while the 2004 squad, which earned an NCAA tournament win against Virginia featured five players that were drafted in that year's draft, including B.J. Szymanski '05, Princeton's highest drafted player and Ross Ohlendorf '05, a pitcher with the New York Yankees. Two other members of that group, Will Venable '05 and Tim Lahay '04 are likely too make their Major League debuts this season.

Princeton's last league title and NCAA appearance came in the 2006 season. In the NCAA Regionals at Arkansas, pitcher Christian Staehely had a no-hitter going through seven innings before an Arkansas rally in the eighth spoiled the bid.

Princeton's main campus covers 600 acres, and its more than 135 buildings exemplify a wealth of architectural styles, ranging from colonial buildings to collegiate Gothic dormitories to modern structures by eminent architects.

Coeducational since 1969, (women comprise about 45% of an average freshman class), Princeton enrolls ap-

proximately 6,400 students (4,600 undergraduates and 1,800 graduate students). Coming from all 50 states and from more than 70 foreign countries, Princeton students are an unusually talented and diverse group that represents many economic, ethnic, social, cultural and religious backgrounds.

Students are apt to choose Princeton for the strength of its academic program, its relatively small size combined with the resources of a major research university and the personal attention its undergraduates enjoy. Men and women who seek a quality education in the liberal arts, architecture, engineering or public and international affairs will discover that Princeton has much to offer.

Princeton offers an abundance of extraordinary resources, including a library system that holds almost five million books and almost 35,000 current journals and periodicals — nearly all on accessible open-stack shelving; an art museum that exhibits works from its own and other outstanding collections, complementing courses in art and archaeology; a natural history museum; a computing center and clusters of microcomputers throughout the campus; and outstanding recreational and athletic facilities.

Living up to its motto "In the Nation's Service and in the Service of All Nations," Princeton University has educated thousands of individuals who have dedicated their lives to public service, including two U.S. Presi-

dents (Woodrow Wilson and James Madison); hundreds of U.S. and state legislators (the House of Representatives, for example, has housed a Princeton alumnus every year since it first met in 1789); and 44 governors, including 11 New Jersey governors. Each year more than 2,500 members of the student body, faculty and staff volunteer in community service projects throughout the region. Reflect-

ing this public service spirit, the University as an institution supports many service initiatives.

Beyond the University's historic campus is the town of Princeton, a community of 30,000 people. The Historical Society of Princeton, located in the colonial Bainbridge House, two blocks from the University's main gate, offers information on the town's early years. Princeton conscientiously preserves many of its historically and architecturally important buildings, making the town an unofficial museum of American architecture from colonial times to the present.

Within this historic setting, institutions and individuals, including many writers, artists, scientists and business executives, create an intellectual and cultural climate of unusual diversity. In addition to the University, Princeton is the home of the Institute for Advanced Study (where Albert Einstein spent his last 22 years), Princeton Theological Seminary, Westminster Choir College of Rider University and Educational Testing Service. Cultural activities approach the variety ordinarily found in large cities; the town supports a resident repertory theater, several orchestras, a ballet troupe, several choral groups and an opera festival.

Although the Princeton community is small and semirural, it is far from isolated. Both New York City and Philadelphia are about 50 miles away and readily accessible by either bus or train.

Princeton also frequently plays host to traveling art shows, dance and musical groups and solo performers by virtue of its convenient location along the Boston/Washington, D.C., corridor.



UNIVERSITY CHAPEL



NASSAU HALL

Princeton offers 38 varsity sports and nearly 40 club teams, and more than 2,300 students (nearly 50% of the undergraduate enrollment) participated in intercollegiate competition (varsity and club combined) during the 2004-05 school year. Nearly 600 teams played intramural sports. To accommodate these programs, Princeton has a strong commitment to its facilities. They include:

PRINCETON STADIUM **WEAVER TRACK AND FIELD STADIUM**

The 27,800-seat Princeton Stadium and the adjacent Weaver Track and Field Stadium took the place of Palmer Stadium, which was torn down following the 1996 season.

Princeton Stadium made its debut in 1998, and the Princeton football team has averaged nearly 18,000 fans in the first six seasons at the stadium. The stadium concourses are always open, and the facility has served as a meeting and banquet area.

The state-of-the-art track facility features wide lanes and an excellent radius on the turns. The track's north straightaway has starting chutes at both ends so that sprints and hurdles can be run in either direction. The stadium, which has seating for 2,000, frames Freylinghuysen Field, home of Princeton's sprint football team.

CALDWELL FIELD HOUSE

The Caldwell Field House has also been the site of a significant overhaul. The venerable home to locker rooms and athletic training rooms has been expanded with a new area especially for the University's women's teams.

A plaza serves as the roof of the complex. Most of the 16,000 square-foot building is below the plaza, but a ground-level skylight provides natural illumination for the primary co-ed portion of the facility. The project also included an expanded athletic training area and renovated locker rooms in DeNunzio Pool.

JADWIN GYMNASIUM

Jadwin Gymnasium, with a capacity of 6,854, is the state's second-largest on-campus basketball arena. Its main floor also serves as a top indoor track and field facility, with a brand-new track laid down in 2004, as well as a practice facility.

The sublevels of Jadwin hold one of the largest fencing rooms in the world, two weight rooms and six tennis courts. A brand-new squash facility houses 11 international-size court and spectator seating.

DILLON GYMNASIUM

The Stephens Fitness Center in Dillon Gymnasium provides a centralized facility where men and women can pursue personal health objectives with trained supervision. (Dillon has facilities for aerobics, basketball, conditioning and weight training, dance, martial arts, swimming, squash, volleyball and wrestling.)

SHEA ROWING CENTER

The University recently expanded and renovated its landmark boat-house and crew facilities, now known as the Shea Rowing Center. The crew programs use the University-owned Lake Carnegie and its Olympic racing course.



ATHLETIC TRAINING ROOM

Princeton student-athletes receive the best in preventative and rehabilitative care from the athletic training staff. The training room is spacious, encompassing nearly 3,000 square feet in the east wing of Caldwell Field House. Princeton has nine certified athletic trainers who work closely with its 38 varsity sports.

Recent modifications permit the maximum efficiency of space and movement. The room is divided into four zones: hydrotherapy, treatment, first aid and taping and rehabilitation.

OTHER FACILITIES

Other facilities include Baker Rink, named after Tiger hockey and football legend Hobey Baker '14, and is one of the oldest hockey venues in the country; Lourie-Love Field, a lighted facility for soccer; 1895 Field, a softball field; Clarke Field, home of the baseball team; the Lenz Tennis Center and DeNunzio Pool.



CLARKE FIELD

Clarke Field, the home of Princeton baseball for more than 40 years, is named for Bill Clarke, a former Major League catcher for the Baltimore Orioles who became Princeton's first head coach upon his retirement in 1909. Clarke coached on-and-off through 1944, compiling a record of 564-322-10 in 36 seasons.

The field took the place of University Field, which stood where the E-Quad stands today. The first game played at Clarke Field came early in the 1965 season when the Tigers faced Army and won 3-2. Since that game, Princeton has played to a 391-248-5 (.611) record at Clarke Field and has had only six seasons below .500 at home in that span.

The field is a sunken diamond with hills along both the first and third base lines. Permanent seats are built into the first-base line berm and bleachers are located atop the third-base line berm. Behind the plate, there is an indoor press box with a new public address sound system.


In the outfield, the fences were moved in to make the field a little more fair for hitters. Even with fences moved in however, Clarke Field is still one of the biggest in the Ivy League. Along the outfield fence are signs commemorating Princeton's Gehrig Division titles, Ivy League titles and NCAA tournament appearances. Princeton's Clarke Field scoreboard site is



In the winter of 2006, in Princeton's continuing effort to keep the field in top condition, a brand new infield was installed and the outfield fences were re-positioned. In the infield, the old grass and dirt was pulled up, tilled, and laser graded, then new sod and infield dirt was put down.

just over the wall in left-center field.

Last season, a pair of outdoor batting cages were built just outside the left-field line. The cages have field turf on the bottom and have provided the team with more areas to work while outside.



THE JADWIN PIT

The Princeton baseball and softball teams have been using the pit in Jadwin Gym for many years as an indoor training facility, but thanks to a major renovation during the fall of 2004, the teams now have a top-notch indoor training location.

To begin the project, the ground was leveled and state-of-the-art field turf was installed over the whole surface. The turf features a baseball diamond complete with bases, home plate and batters boxes, which will allow the team to simulate hitting and fielding situations while indoors.

The pit also contains pitching mounds and batting cages to allow players from different positions to work on their skills at the same time.



WEIGHT ROOM

The Princeton weight room is located in Princeton Stadium, centrally located near Clarke Field, Jadwin Gym, and the baseball locker room in Caldwell Field House. The weight room features the most modern equipment in a pristine setting, designed for maximum efficiency. Among the amenities are free weights, weight machines, dumbbells and aerobic equipment.

The Princeton baseball team's representation throughout professional baseball grew once again in 2008 as three members of Princeton's graduating Class of 2008 signed professional contracts following graduation. By the end of the summer, Princeton had three of its players competing at the Major League level.

San Diego Padre starting pitcher Chris Young, an All-Star in 2007, went 7-6 with a 3.96 ERA in 18 starts as he battled through injuries over the course of the season. He has a 42-28 career record and a 3.72 ERA in 117 starts and has struck out 588 batters. Young also hit his first home run last season.

He was joined in the Padre clubhouse late in the season by outfielder Will Venable, who spent most of the season at AAA Portland before a September call-up to the big club. In 28 games with the Padres, Venable batted .264 with two homers and 10 RBIs. Venable hit .292 in 120 games at Portland prior to his call-up and played this winter in Dominican Winter League.

Late in the season, the Padres hosted a series against the Pittsburgh Pirates, which featured three Princeton grads, as Ross Ohlendorf started a game for the Pittsburgh Pirates. Ohlendorf started the year with the New York Yankees as a reliever, picking up his first win in May, before being sent to AAA in the summer. He then was dealt to Pittsburgh in a trade and spent some time with the Pirates AAA team in Indianapolis before finishing the year as a starting pitcher with the Pirates. He made five starts down the stretch and finished the year with a 1-4 record and a 6.46 ERA.

Catcher-turned-pitcher Tim Lahey made news during the offseason when he was the first player chosen in the Rule 5 Draft. Lahey was chosen by Tampa and quickly sent to the Chicago Cubs. He was then released and picked up by the Phillies. He was on their opening day roster and spent a week with the club before again being released and ending up back at AAA with the Twins.

He pitched the remainder of the year with Rochester and was 5-5 with a 5.43 ERA and eight saves. He struck out 53 batters in 63 innings, pitching in a variety of roles out of the bullpen. He pitched in the Arizona Fall League this offseason.

Erik Stiller also played in the Arizona Fall League following a season in which he started at Hi A before spending the majority of the year at AA Akron for the Cleveland Indians. Stiller was 7-5 on the year with a 3.79 ERA as he struck out 82 batters in 76 innings combined over the two leagues.

B.J. Szymanski, a former second-round draft pick, split the season between AA Chattanooga

and AAA Louisville in the Cincinnati Reds' organization. He hit a combined .221 with 10 homers and 40 RBIs in 276 at-bats.

Three former Tigers began their professional careers last summer after completing their careers at Princeton. Spencer Lucian and Christian Staehely were drafted and Steven Miller signed as a free agent.

Lucian was selected by the Yankees and assigned to the Gulf Coast League team. In limited play, he batted .250 in 72 at-bats. He had six extra-base hits playing in the infield.

Staehely was chosen by Seattle and pitched in 19 games for their Short Season A team in Everett, Wash. He was 2-1 with a 4.95 ERA in 36.1 innings.

Lastly, Miller signed with Kansas City as a free agent and played at the Rookie level in Idaho Falls. He was 0-2 with a 6.14 ERA, but pitched very well late in the season, only allowing one earned run in his final eight innings of the season.

Mike Chernoff '03 works in player personnel for the Cleveland Indians.

Jon Miller '03 works in player development for the New York Mets.

Many Princeton baseball players have gone on to professional careers. Among the most prominent are Moe Berg '23, a famous catcher for the Boston Red Sox, and Dave Sisler '53, a Red Sox pitcher. Charlie Caldwell '25, the renowned Princeton football coach, had a brief stint as a pitcher for the New York Yankees. Bob Tufts '77 reached the majors as a member of both the San Francisco Giants and the Kansas City Royals, John Easton '58 played with the Philadelphia Phillies, and Chris Young '02 who has now played more than two seasons in the Majors.
