Of 999 (64%) of graduates whose primary plans after graduation involved full- or part-time employment, 910 responded to the question about the number of interviews they had during their job search. About 74% of graduating seniors had at least one job interview one to two months prior to graduation, see Table 2.



- Of 999 (64%) of graduates whose primary plans after graduation involved full- or part-time employment, 997 responded to the question on whether they already located employment. 298 of these 997 respondents (30%) indicated that they already located employment.
- This percentage is the same for all graduating seniors. Among all 1,822 of respondents for summer, fall and spring of 2011-2012 academic year, 551 (30%) indicated that they have located employment upon graduation. Please note that the survey was conducted one to two months prior to graduation.

Annual Salary



- Of 551 seniors who located employment onetwo months prior to graduation, 322 provided information about their annual salary.
- The reported salaries ranged from \$15,000 to \$110,000 a year with the median salary of \$45,000 and mean salary of \$45,510.
- The middle 50% of salaries ranged from \$34,000 to \$55,250.
