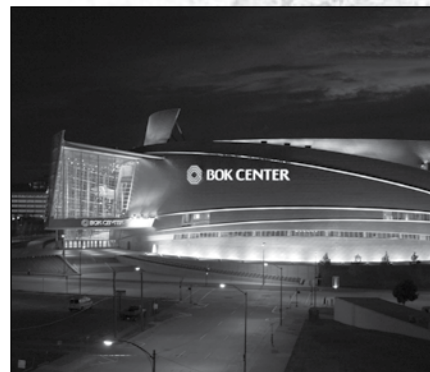

## Tulsa, Oklahoma — “Green Country”

Tulsa is nestled in the northeastern quadrant of Oklahoma, right in the heart of “Green Country.” The rolling green hills and wooded terrain of the city lies at an elevation of 700 feet above sea level and offers a temperate climate. Tulsans enjoy 227 days of sunshine a year and an average daily temperature of 61 degrees. The rainfall average is approximately 40 inches, and continually changing conditions occur in the city during all four seasons.



What began as Tulsee Town in 1836 under a sturdy oak tree, which still stands today at 18th and Cheyenne Streets, is today the second largest city in Oklahoma. Ask people to describe Tulsa, and you'll likely get many different answers. It was a city forever changed by the discovery of oil in 1901. It is home to art deco treasures and nationally renowned museums. Its African American heritage left its mark, in both the business and music worlds. And it's a city of nostalgia and special memories for countless Americans due to its location on historic Route 66.

Tulsa boasts a widely diversified business base, including aerospace, telecommunications, manufacturing, construction, high technology, healthcare, education, transportation and energy.

Tulsa has the second shortest commute time in the nation, ranks 15th in the nation for the highest rate of high school graduation and boasts a cost of living at 11.5 percent below the national average while the

county per capita income is 20.7 percent above the national average.

Tulsa, one of “America’s Most Livable Communities,” is known as the Mecca for arts in Oklahoma. Art deco masterpieces are prevalent in many of our downtown buildings and churches. Spectacular works of art dot the trails of our beautiful River Parks. From the Tulsa Ballet and Tulsa Opera, to Broadway plays and musicals at the Performing Arts Center, to the Philbrook and the largest collection of Western American art at the Gilcrease, Tulsa’s rich cultural legacy greatly enhances our citizen’s quality of life.

The BOK Center hosts the top names in entertainment, as well as major sporting events including the 2011 NCAA Basketball Second & Third Rounds.

For a great shopping experience, a visit to Cherry Street or Utica Square is a must, and for those who would rather spend the afternoon on the links, Tulsa

has several exclusive golf courses to choose from. During summer months, Rodgers and Hammerstein’s classic musical, Oklahoma!, is performed at the Discoveryland amphitheater where a barbecue dinner and roping lessons add to the evening’s entertainment. Tulsa is also home to several outstanding events too numerous to list, but those worth a mention include Mayfest, Oktoberfest and the Tulsa Pow Wow of Champions.

The Tulsa Port of Catoosa is acclaimed as one of the largest, most inland river-ports in the United States. The Tulsa International Airport offers direct service to most major U.S. cities and is another important contributor to our economic growth.

Ten higher education facilities serve the metropolitan Tulsa area. Options range from community college and vocational studies to undergraduate, graduate, and professional degree programs at both public and private universities.

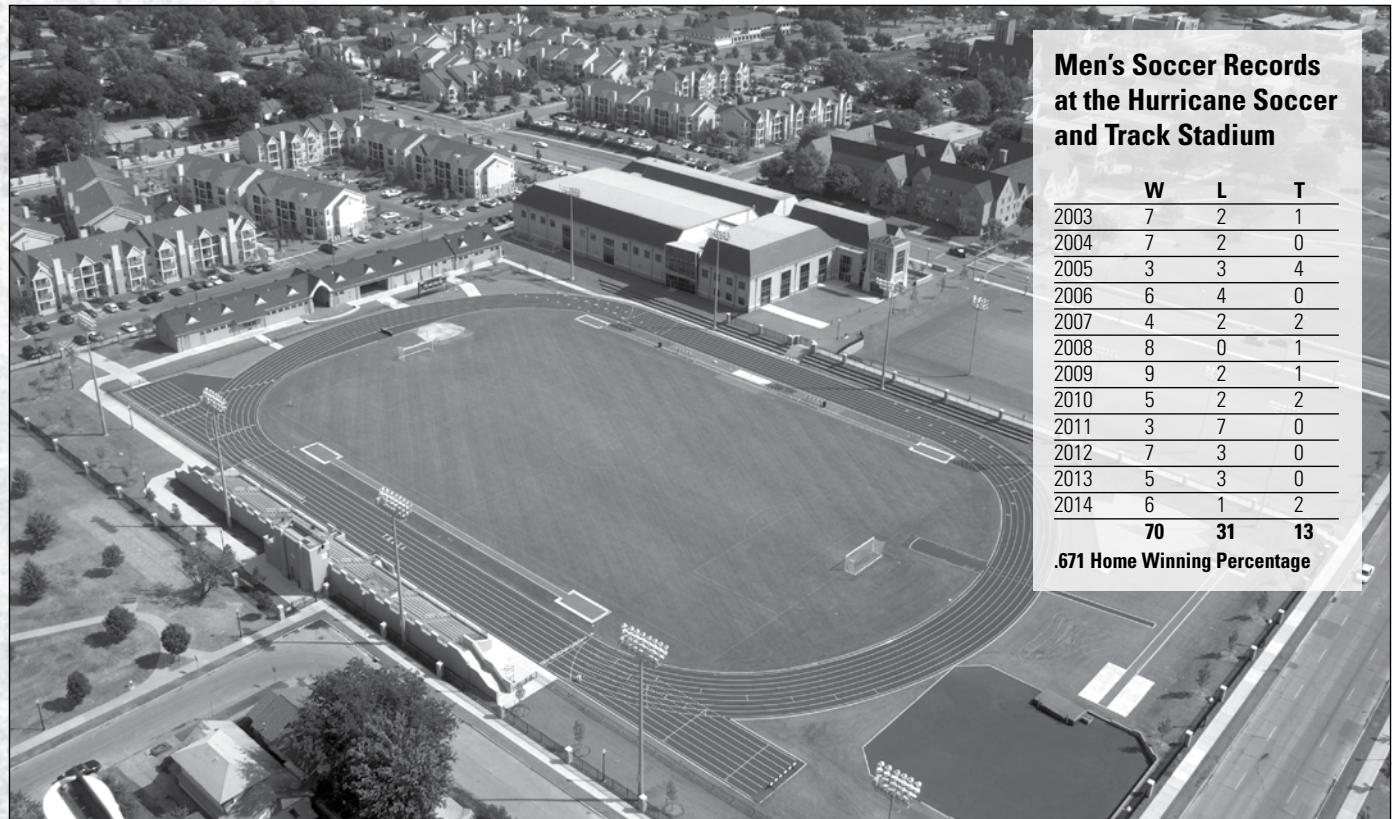

# Hurricane Soccer & Track Stadium

The Hurricane Soccer & Track Stadium is the home field for the Golden Hurricane men's and women's soccer and track & field teams. The state-of-the-art facility, which was completed in August, 2003, was the third phase of the 10-year athletic master plan for campus development. The multi-purpose \$4.5 million facility is part of the Donna J. Hardesty Sports and Recreation Complex, a 30-acre development at The University of Tulsa.

Conference USA Men's Soccer Tournaments. During the 2005 campaign, the facility was featured on national television when the Tulsa men's soccer team faced off against 11th-ranked SMU on Fox Soccer Channel, and was again on Fox Soccer in 2007. The TU-SMU contest drew a stadium record crowd of 1,753.

On the track and field side, the stadium served as the host facility for the 2005 Western Athletic Conference Track and Field Championships and the 2009 Conference USA Track and Field Championships.

Designed by St. Louis-based Hastings & Chivetta Architects, Inc., the stadium features a 75 yards X 120 yards soccer field and an eight-lane 400-meter synthetic surface running track. The fully irrigated soccer field consists of Tiffsport sod on top of an eight-inch sand base to facilitate drainage to a system of pipes below. The stadium includes locker rooms, a training room, concession stand and storage area, a press box and seating for 2,000 spectators.

The stadium provides the University's soccer and track teams with a permanent track and natural grass field on campus, and allows the track teams to incorporate the hammer throw, discus, javelin and shot put into its field events.

The Hurricane Soccer & Track Stadium has been the host site of eight NCAA Men's Soccer Tournament games, a 2004 Missouri Valley Conference Tournament first round contest, and the 2006, 2009 and 2011



Other firms working on the stadium included the St. Louis companies of McClure Engineering Associates as mechanical, electrical and plumbing engineer; and Jack Sontag, structural engineer. Tulsa-based companies include Saks & Associates providing civil engineering; Howell & Vancuren as the landscape architect; and Oakridge Builders as the general contractor.

Additionally, a soccer practice field at the Donna J. Hardesty Sports Complex is located south of the Hurricane Soccer & Track Stadium and is one of the finest soccer practice fields in the nation. The facility, which features permanent seating on both sides of the field, served as the home field for the Golden Hurricane during the 2000-02 seasons while construction of the Hurricane Soccer & Track Stadium was underway.

**Tom McIntosh**

 21ST YEAR

A name synonymous with Tulsa men's soccer, Tom McIntosh is in his 21st season as the head coach of the Golden Hurricane. He is only the fourth coach in the 34-year history of the program and is the school's all-time winningest soccer coach. McIntosh accepted the interim position in July of 1995 and was named head coach at his alma mater a year later.

McIntosh is truly the epitome of Tulsa men's soccer. Since he first walked on campus as a player in 1986, McIntosh has been a part of 290 of TU's 377 victories either as a player (1986-88), an assistant coach (1989-91) or as the head coach.

Since his first season as head coach, McIntosh has built Tulsa into a conference powerhouse, through four seasons in the Western Athletic Conference (1996-1999), six seasons in the Missouri Valley Conference (1995, 2000-04), nine seasons in Conference USA (2005-13) and now one season in the American Athletic Conference (2014-present). He has led TU to eight conference championships, including five tournament and three regular season titles. McIntosh has also put the Hurricane into the national spotlight, as Tulsa has advanced to the NCAA Tournament in eight of the last 12 seasons, including national quarterfinal appearances in 2004 and 2009, while posting an 8-8-1 NCAA Tournament mark during that same time.

McIntosh's tenure is the longest in the history of the TU men's soccer program. He has an overall record of 220-145-35 and has notched a conference mark of 88-61-20 as a member of four conferences. The Golden Hurricane went undefeated in 21-straight regular-season league games from October 2006 to October 2009, and went undefeated in 22 regular-season road contests, not including neutral site games, from October 2006 to October 2010.

Under McIntosh, the Hurricane has 13 seasons with 10-plus wins, including a school-best 16 victories in 2008, while six of his players (Kyle Brown, Chris Clements, Cristian Mata, Ashley McInnes, Austin Neil and Ryan Pore) have achieved All-America status. Tulsa student-athletes have also excelled in the classroom as 139 players have received conference academic honors, 32 have earned Academic All-District accolades and nine have received Academic All-America recognition.

Over the past 12 years, 14 players have been drafted or gone on to play professionally, including Terry Boss (2004), Ryan Pore (2004), Kyle Brown (2005), Lawson Vaughn (2005), Daniel Wasson (2005), Dominic Cervi (2008), Chris Clements (2009), Tyrel Lacey (2009), Joe

Salem (2010), Hunter Christiansen (2011), Chris Taylor (2011), Justin Chavez (2012), Akeil Barrett (2014) and Tony Rocha (2014).

In 2014, TU claimed the American Athletic Conference tournament championship and played in the NCAA Championship opening round. The Hurricane tallied 11 wins, posted seven clean sheets and faced five teams ranked in the top-25 for a 3-1-1 mark in those contests, including a 1-0 win over then #3 Virginia, who went on to claim the 2014 NCAA Championship. Three players picked up all-conference honors, five were tabbed to the all-tournament team and two were named to the all-Rookie team.

In 2013, McIntosh recorded his 200th win as the head coach at Tulsa with a 4-1 victory over Ohio State on Sept. 6, and went on to lead TU back to the C-USA title game. The Hurricane posted an 11-6-3 mark, recorded seven shutouts, faced four teams ranked in the top-20 and concluded the season ranked 24th in the nation in total goals (37). Cristian Mata was selected as a Soccer America second team All-American, while four players were named to the NSCAA All-Midwest Region team and five student-athletes picked up All-C-USA accolades.

The 2012 season was a comeback year as Tulsa nearly tripled the wins mark from the previous season with 14, won its fourth C-USA Tournament title and advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen. The Hurricane recorded eight shutouts and faced five opponents ranked among the nation's top-25. TU finished the year ranked sixth in the nation in scoring offense (2.29 gpg) and total goals (48), and seventh in total points (134). Three players were named to the NSCAA Division I All-Midwest Region teams, and Cristian Mata was named as the C-USA Freshman of the Year.

The 2011 season was plagued with youth and injuries as the Golden Hurricane recorded a 5-12 overall record. The honors, however, were still impressive as four players picked up All-C-USA accolades and three were tabbed to the C-USA All-Freshman Team, including Freshman of the Year, Tony Rocha.

In 2010, Tulsa earned a school-best No. 2 national ranking for three straight weeks, finished with double-digit wins for the 10th time in school history, and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the seventh time in school history and fourth-straight year. TU concluded the season ranked 10th in the nation in total goals (42) and 15th in scoring offense (2.0 goals per game).

The Golden Hurricane won its third-straight Conference USA regular season and tournament titles, posted a 15-5-2 overall record, advanced to the NCAA Quarterfinals for the second time in school history, and concluded the year ranked No. 7 in all five national polls in 2009. Ashley McInnes and Austin Neil were selected as third-team All-America honorees by College Soccer News and the National Soccer Coaches Association of America, respec-

tively. Tulsa recorded seven shutouts and faced six opponents ranked among the nation's top-30.

The 2008 men's soccer team posted a 16-4-3 overall record and captured C-USA regular season and tournament titles. The Golden Hurricane also advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championship, set a new school record with 16 wins and earned a then school-best No. 5 national ranking by Top Drawer Soccer. Tulsa recorded 10 shutouts and faced six opponents ranked among the nation's top-30.

The 2007 season was also a record-setting year for the Golden Hurricane, as Tulsa (15-3-2) claimed the C-USA regular season and tournament titles after tallying a 6-0-2 league mark, advanced to the second round of the NCAA Championship, captured 15 wins for the most in school history at that point and earned a then school-best No. 6 national ranking by Soccer America. TU received the NCAA Champions in Scoring award for scoring a 2.6 goals per game average, the most for any Division I program on the year, recorded eight shutouts and faced five opponents ranked among the nation's top-20.

During the 2006 season, TU advanced to the semifinals of the Conference USA Championship, and posted a 9-10 overall record and a 5-3 mark in the league. The Golden Hurricane also faced nine ranked opponents, including six ranked among the top-15, and posted five shutouts, including two against ranked opponents – #11 South Carolina (1-0) and #24 Wisconsin-Milwaukee (3-0).

McIntosh guided the Hurricane to a 7-7-7 finish in 2005, and TU reached the conference finals for the second-straight year with its appearance in the C-USA Tournament championship game. Tulsa was ranked or received votes for six weeks, including a season-best No. 14 national ranking. The Golden Hurricane knocked off third-ranked Creighton and completed the season with a 2-2-3 mark against teams that were either ranked or receiving votes. Six players received all-conference honors.

In 2004, McIntosh led Tulsa to its first back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances, the best postseason run in school history with its spot in the national quarterfinals, and concluded the season ranked No. 8 in the nation. The Hurricane posted a third-place finish in the MVC with a 5-3-1 league mark, but heated up in the MVC Tournament with a win over #17 Creighton before falling to third-ranked SMU in the title game. In the NCAA Tournament, Tulsa topped Michigan State, 3-1, in the opening round and got past #12 Penn State on penalty kicks. The Hurricane then earned a hard-fought, 2-1, double overtime victory over MVC rival SMU in the Round of 16. The Hurricane fell one game short of the College Cup with a loss to eventual champion, Indiana, in the national quarterfinal round.

Under McIntosh's tutelage, Ryan Pore became the first two-time All-America player and a finalist for

the prestigious Missouri Athletic Club Hermann Trophy. Pore led the nation in scoring in 2004 and spearheaded the Hurricane attack, which ranked 19th nationally in scoring.

McIntosh guided Tulsa to a banner season in 2003 and led the Golden Hurricane back to the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 1991. TU registered a 13-6-2 overall record and posted a 6-1-2 mark in MVC play. The Hurricane was nationally ranked for 11-straight weeks and achieved a season-best ranking of No. 10. McIntosh guided the Hurricane to a 4-3 record against ranked teams and helped sophomore Ryan Pore become the second All-America player in school history. McIntosh's attack-style offense was the fifth-ranked scoring offense in the country and led the Hurricane to its first NCAA Tournament victory against Oakland in the first round.

McIntosh led the Golden Hurricane to a 10-9 overall record in 2002, and Tulsa finished sixth among the Valley teams with a 4-5 league mark. McIntosh led Tulsa to a 2-1 overtime victory over 15th-ranked Wisconsin-Milwaukee in the season opener and then added three more victories to record the best season start in school history up to that point with a 4-0 mark. The team achieved what was then its highest national and regional ranking on Sept. 9 when TU entered the top-25 at No. 12 and was the No. 1 squad in the region for the first time in history. McIntosh then guided Tulsa to the biggest win in school history when TU shocked previously undefeated and top-ranked Stanford, 3-1, on Sept. 27.

In 2001, McIntosh guided TU to a 9-10 overall record and an MVC mark of 4-5. Tulsa defeated 2000 NCAA national runner-up Creighton and made McIntosh the school's winningest coach.

In 2000, he led Tulsa back into the MVC and guided the Golden Hurricane to a 10-7-2 mark. With 10 victories, it was the fourth-straight winning season under McIntosh.

In 1999, McIntosh picked up his 50th career win with a victory over TCU on Nov. 5, led Tulsa to a second-place finish in the WAC and coached the Hurricane to a 4-2 upset over 22nd-ranked Bowling Green.

In 1998, McIntosh became the first TU coach to guide the Hurricane to consecutive conference tournament appearances. For the first time since the 1990-91 campaigns, Tulsa recorded back-to-back 13-win seasons. TU narrowly missed its second-ever NCAA Tournament trip when the Hurricane fell in the WAC Championship game to Fresno State, 5-4, on penalty kicks. TU ended the season ranked No. 22 in the national polls.

During the 1997 campaign, Tulsa broke into the nation's top-25 and tied the schools then highest-ever ranking of No. 20. TU also qualified for the WAC Tournament and advanced to the finals where the Hurricane lost to eventual champion and nationally-ranked SMU.

McIntosh was already familiar with the Tulsa soccer program before taking over the coaching reins on an interim basis in 1995. McIntosh served as an assistant coach at TU for two seasons (1989-91). Before that, he was a three-year letterwinner and two-year starter for the Golden Hurricane. While serving as team captain in 1987 and 1988, McIntosh was named the squad's Most Inspirational Player both years.

McIntosh has served as the chairman for the Midwest Region NCAA Committee, which assists in selecting teams for the NCAA Tournament from the

Midwest Region. Previously, he was a member of the Midwest Regional Advisory Committee for three years.

Over the past 20+ years, McIntosh has been heavily involved in the youth soccer organizations in the city of Tulsa. During 1992-95 seasons, he led his 16-and-under squad to two state championships. In 1988, McIntosh coached the Bishop Kelley High School boy's team to the state quarterfinals and was selected as the District IV Coach of the Year that same season.

In the summer of 1989, McIntosh played for the Tulsa Renegades of the Southwest Outdoor Soccer League. He holds a license in the United States Soccer Federation and belongs to the National Soccer Coaches Association of America (NSCAA).

In addition, McIntosh and his brother, Mark, have operated Mac's Soccer Shack at 61st and Mingo for the past 19 years.

McIntosh earned his bachelor's degree in marketing in 1988 and a master's degree in business administration in 1991, both from TU. He attended Memorial High School in Tulsa.

McIntosh, 49, and his wife, Denise, have one son, Ian Thomas, and a daughter, Avery Elizabeth.

Justin Cook is in his ninth season at The University of Tulsa as he has been an assistant coach the past five years and before that served as a graduate assistant coach for three seasons.

Cook's responsibilities include practice and gameday preparation, video coordination, overseeing team travel and recruiting, as well as working daily with the attacking players.

During his time at Tulsa, Cook has helped the Hurricane clinch three regular season and five conference tournament championships. He has also helped Tulsa post an overall 99-49-16 record, advance to the NCAA Tournament in six of the eight seasons, including a quarterfinal appearance in 2009, and earn a school-best No. 2 national ranking in 2010. In 2009, Cook helped bring in the top recruiting class in Conference USA according to Top Drawer Soccer, while the 2012 signees were ranked ninth nationally, and five of the last six classes have been ranked among the top-30.

Cook has coached five players to seven M.A.C. Hermann Trophy Watch Lists, including Chris Clements (2008), Ashley McInnes (2009, 2010), Joe Salem (2009), Justin Chavez (2010, 2011) and Austin Neil (2010); three All-Americans in Clements (2007-NSCAA Third Team), McInnes (2009-College Soccer News Third Team) and Neil (2009-NSCAA Third Team); Dominic Cervi who played for the United States U-23 in the 2008 CONCACAF Pre-Olympic Tournament; Quinton Duncan who played for the U-20 Canadian National Team in the 2014 Milk Cup in Ireland; and Akeil Barrett and Tony Rocha who were drafted by Orlando City as the 25th overall pick and Sporting KC as the 73rd pick in the 2015 SuperDraft, respectively.

He has also been instrumental in coaching 27 All-Midwest Region players, 17 Top Drawer Soccer Team of the Week selections, 11 College Soccer News National Team of the Week honorees, seven Soccer America National Team of the Week selections, three national Players of the Week, four TDS Team of the Season players, three national All-Freshman Team selections and two TDS All-Rookie Squad honorees.

On a conference level, Cook has coached 41 all-conference performers, 30 Players of the Week honorees, 27 All-Tournament Team performers, 13 All-Freshman Team selections and two All-Rookie honorees.

Cook came to Tulsa after serving as a volunteer coach at UCF during the 2006 season, where he helped the Knights post a 3-3-2 mark in Conference USA.

A four-year letterwinner at Ohio State, Cook concluded his career ranked second among the school's career leaders in goals (33), as well as the Buckeyes career shots leader (191), season shots leader (71) and

assists (17). He picked up Soccer America All-Freshmen team honors in 2000, and earned NSCAA and NCAA Third-Team All-America accolades in 2004. Cook was a four-time all-conference selection, and is one of only two players in Big Ten history to be awarded both Big Ten Freshman of the Year (2000) and Big Ten Player of the Year (2004) accolades.

Following his senior season, Cook became the first Buckeye player ever to be invited to the Major League Soccer combine and later was drafted by the Chicago Fire before suffering a career-ending injury. Cook also played with the Central Florida Kraze of the Premier Development League and was selected as the Most Valuable Player of the 2002 PDL National Championship.

A native of Orlando, Florida, Cook received his bachelor's degree in sports and leisure studies from Ohio State in 2004, and received his master's degree in business administration from Tulsa in 2009.

He and his wife, Stefanie, reside in Tulsa. They have two daughters, Piper McKenzie Ann and Riley Elizabeth Ann.



**Ryan Pore**  
Assistant Coach  
THIRD YEAR

Former Tulsa All-American Ryan Pore is in his third season as an assistant coach with the Golden Hurricane.

During his two years at Tulsa, Pore has helped TU post a 22-12-6 overall record, claim one American Athletic Conference championship and advance to the NCAA Championship in 2014. He has also been instrumental in coaching five Top Drawer Soccer Team of the Week selections and two players, Akeil Barrett and Tony Rocha, who were drafted by Orlando City as the 25th overall pick and Sporting KC as the 73rd pick in the 2015 SuperDraft, respectively.

On a conference level, Pore has helped coach eight all-conference performers, nine Player of the Week honorees, eight all-tournament team selections, two All-Freshman Team performers and two All-Rookie honorees.

Pore returned to Tulsa after playing professionally for seven years, including time with the Portland Timbers, which competed in the USSF D-2 Pro League & USL First Division (2009-10) and was a Major League Soccer expansion team in 2011. At Portland, Pore tallied 25 goals in 52 games with the Timbers prior to the MLS expansion and played in eight games following the expansion. He also competed in 11 games and had seven goals with the Montreal Impact while on loan from Portland. Before that, Pore played for the MLS Kansas City Wizards, where he was drafted in the second round (16th overall pick) in the 2005 Major League Soccer SuperDraft, for four years. He scored three goals in 58 games with the Wizards.

During his playing career, he also spent time coaching the Blue Valley Predators (2008), Bridlemile Soccer Club (2009-10) and Tulsa Soccer Club (2012), as well as serving as a volunteer student assistant coach during the 2012 season at Tulsa.

At Tulsa, Pore (2002-04) became the program's only two-time All-American, and finished his career ranked second in points (123) and goals (51), and became the first player to record three hat tricks in a career. As a junior, Pore set TU's single-season record for goals (22) and points (55), and the single-game mark for assists with five. He was a two-time Missouri Valley Conference Player of the Year in 2003 and 2004, a two-time all-MVC first team performer (2003 and 2004), and was named to the second-team in 2002. Pore was tabbed to the all-Midwest Region first team twice, while concluding the 2003 campaign as the nation's second-leading scorer and was the top scorer in the country in 2004.

Pore has a USSF National A License. He recently earned his bachelor's degree in organizational studies.

Pore and his wife, Ashley, have one son, Luca, and a daughter, Stella.



**Daniel Cherbonnier**  
Graduate Assistant  
THIRD YEAR

Daniel Cherbonnier is in his third season at The University of Tulsa as he begins his first year as a graduate assistant after volunteering for the men's soccer program the past two years.

Prior to coming to Tulsa, Cherbonnier spent six years as an assistant coach at The University of Texas at Tyler where he assisted in all aspects of the program including coaching, recruiting, goalkeeper training, academic advising, administrative duties and camp organization.

While at UT Tyler, Cherbonnier helped the Patriots earn a 72-29-14 overall record and a 50-15-10 mark in the American Southwest Conference. During the six years, UT-Tyler won three regular season conference championships, three ASC tournament championships, and had a program-best NCAA Elite 8 appearance. On the field, Cherbonnier helped coach three All-America selections, nine all-region honorees and 38 all-conference performers. Off the field, he helped produce 52 Academic All-Conference players, while the team earned the NSCAA Team Academic Award.

Cherbonnier also had coaching stints with Bishop T.K. Gorman High School, All-Saints Episcopal School, Tulsa Soccer Club and Azzurri Soccer Club.

Cherbonnier has earned his NSCAA Advanced National Goalkeeping Diploma.

A native of College Station, Texas, Cherbonnier earned his bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in kinesiology from UT-Tyler in 2012.

## Dr. Steadman Upham

President



Steadman Upham currently serves as the 19th president of The University of Tulsa, a position he has held since 2004. Prior to coming to TU, he served as president and chief executive officer of Claremont Graduate University, a doctoral research university and a member of the Oxford-style consortium known as The Claremont Colleges in Claremont, California.

Upham received his Ph.D. degree in anthropology in 1980 from Arizona State University. In 1981, he joined New Mexico State University where he held the positions of chief archaeologist and assistant professor of archaeology. He achieved the rank of tenured professor of archaeology in 1989. Before leaving New Mexico State in 1990, he also served as the faculty affiliate, Center for Social Research (1985–1990); curator of Archaeology, University Museum (1984–1990); and associate dean of the Graduate School (1987–1990).

From 1990 to 1998, Upham worked at the University of Oregon as vice provost for research and dean of the Graduate School and professor of anthropology. At Oregon, Upham was responsible for management of the university's 21 research centers and institutes as well as The River Front Research Park. He also served as the university's chief administrator for graduate education.

Upham is a widely published archaeologist, having written or edited 10 books and more than 75 book chapters and journal articles. He has lectured extensively in the United States and Canada.

Throughout his career, Upham has been singled out for his achievements as an educator and administrator. In 2001, he received the Academy Gold Medal of Honor by the Academy of Transdisciplinary Learning and Advance Studies. He was named to the Graduate College Hall of Fame by Arizona State University and named an ASU Distinguished Alumnus in 1998. The University of Oregon presented Upham its Martin Luther King, Jr. Award and Director's Award for Service and Achievement, both in 1998. Early in his academic career, Upham's teaching skills were recognized by New Mexico State University, which presented him the Donald C. Roush Award for Excellence in Teaching in 1987, and a year later named him a Master Teacher.

Upham's extensive professional service and accomplishments include commissioner of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges; chairman of the Board of Directors of the Council of Graduate Schools; president, National Physical Science Consortium; director of The American Mutual Funds; director of the St. Francis Health System; director of the Tulsa Chamber of Commerce; director of the American Council on Education; director of the National Collegiate Athletic Association; director of the College Football Playoffs; and director and chair of the Tulsa Community Foundation.

In May 2015, Upham was elected as the American Athletic Conference's vice-chairman of the Board of

Directors for a two-year term, through the 2016-17 academic year.

During the past decade, TU has achieved a remarkable transformation. The University is ranked No. 86 among all U.S. Doctoral universities by U.S. News and World Report (2015), and the College of Law and the Graduate Business Programs are ranked among the top 100, respectively. During the past decade, TU has added more than 1 million square feet of space, including student apartments and activity centers, academic and administrative buildings and athletic facilities. The university's seven-year Embrace the Future campaign raised more than \$698 million. Thanks to the campaign, TU created: \$119 million in scholarship endowments, 1,182 new awards, \$87 million in faculty endowments and 47 new endowed positions.



## Dr. Derrick Gragg

Vice President and Director of Athletics



Dr. Derrick Gragg is in his third year as The University of Tulsa's Vice President and Director of Athletics. He was appointed to the position on March 20, 2013, and began his tenure with the Golden Hurricane 39 days later.

In his tenure, Gragg has overseen Tulsa's transition into the American Athletic Conference and in 2014-15 he administered the development and implementation of the athletic department's Strategic Plan. Gragg announced the hiring of Missouri Head Basketball Coach Frank Haith as Tulsa's new head coach in April 2014, appointed former Women's British Open Champion Emilee Klein-Gille as the school's women's golf coach and, in December 2014, chose Baylor offensive coordinator Philip Montgomery, one of the nation's brightest offensive minds, to coach the Golden Hurricane football team.

Under Gragg's leadership, Tulsa teams have won a total of 11 league championships in two years. In 2013-14, Tulsa won seven Conference USA Championships and eight teams participated in NCAA post-season competition. More than 200 student-athletes were named to the Commissioners Honor Roll and a league-best 63 recipients earned the C-USA Academic Medalist honor, awarded to student-athletes with a cumulative 3.75 GPA or better, during Gragg's first year at Tulsa. During the 2014-15 academic year, Tulsa teams won four league titles in the school's first year of membership in the American Athletic Conference and 10 teams advanced to post-season competition.

Since his arrival on campus, 11 student-athletes have earned All-America accolades and five have been selected as Capital One Academic All-Americans.

Before coming to Tulsa, Gragg spent seven years as the Director of Athletics at Eastern Michigan University, where he was responsible for an intercollegiate athletic program with 21 teams, 550 student-athletes and 80 staff members. Gragg's experience covers 20 years in progressively advanced roles at the universities of Arkansas, Michigan, Missouri and Vanderbilt.

"We are extremely pleased to announce that Dr. Derrick Gragg will be joining TU as our new director of athletics. Our search committee was presented with an impressive field of applicants for this position, and Derrick stood out as an exceptional candidate," said TU President Steadman Upham when announcing Gragg's appointment. "Derrick's history of integrity and excellence is well-suited to keep our university

and its athletic program moving forward. He will be an enthusiastic and dedicated leader for Golden Hurricane student-athletes and their coaches."

"My family and I are tremendously excited to be part of The University of Tulsa. This is a wonderful opportunity to lead a program of this caliber," Gragg said at the introductory news conference. "The university's combination of academic and athletic success dovetails perfectly with my own personal and professional core values. We are eager to become an integral part the Tulsa community and the TU family."

Under Gragg's leadership, Eastern Michigan enjoyed successful campaigns not only on the field, but also in the classroom. EMU athletic teams accumulated 22 Mid-American Conference (MAC) championships in that time. Meanwhile, Eastern Michigan's student-athlete graduation rate exceeded the general student body graduation rate by 20%. Impressively the EMU student-athletes posted the highest cumulative grade point average in history four consecutive semesters during Gragg's tenure.

Eastern Michigan also saw its athletic fundraising levels reach new heights with four of the top five funding years occurring under Gragg's tenure as athletic director. Additionally, Gragg spearheaded the construction of EMU's \$3.9 million multipurpose indoor athletic practice facility and was nationally recognized for his leadership, earning the Black Coaches & Administrators (BCA) Administrator of the Year Award in 2008-09.

Gragg spent six years at the University of Arkansas before his appointment at Eastern Michigan. He joined Arkansas in 2000 as an associate athletic director and was promoted to senior associate athletic director in 2003 and then to deputy athletic director. In his tenure at Arkansas, Gragg was involved in various areas including: athletic administration, sport program oversight, marketing, sports information, recruitment, budgeting, student-athlete support, compliance, facilities and game management, fundraising and research.

Before that, Gragg spent three years as assistant athletic director for compliance at Michigan beginning his tenure in 1997. Previously, he was the director of compliance and operations at Missouri from 1995-97. During his two years in Columbia, he was the game event manager for 10 Olympic sports programs and chairman of the Big 12 Compliance Coordinators Group during his last year as compliance coordinator at the university.

Gragg began his career in athletic administration at his alma mater, Vanderbilt, where he served from 1993 to 1995 as an academic counselor before adding the title of director of student life in his final year.

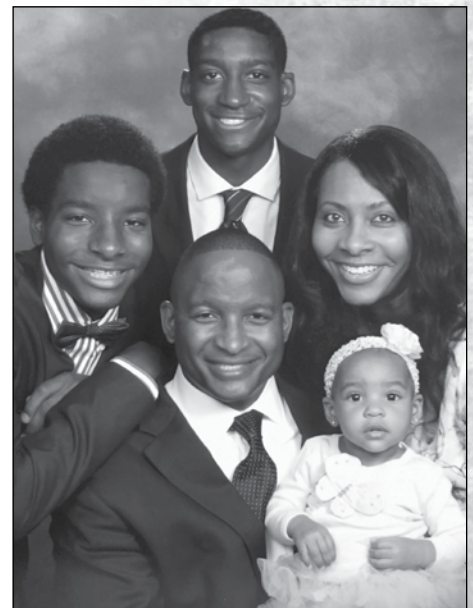
During his career, Gragg has published several articles and editorials on intercollegiate athletics as well as a nationwide study on sports-related gambling. He has been a presenter and panelist at events such as the NCAA Future Coaches Academy, Champions for Athletic Directors and Football Coaches, Emerging Administrators Academy Professional Development Conference and the NCAA Annual Convention. Gragg also authorized two Title IX studies while demonstrating continual improvement in Title IX compliance and gender equity issues.

He is a former member of the NCAA's Minority Opportunities & Interests Committee, having served as co-chair of the committee in 2004-05. Gragg also served as a member of the NCAA's Legislative Council and is currently a member of the NACDA Division I-A Athletic Directors Scholarship Ad Hoc Steering Committee. He also serves on the American Athletic Conference's Finance Committee.

A former collegiate wide receiver, Gragg lettered four years at Vanderbilt while earning his bachelor's degree in human development in 1992. He earned his master's degree in sports administration from Wayne State University in 1999. Gragg received his doctorate in higher education administration from the University of Arkansas in May of 2004 and also taught several college courses during his tenure there as an athletic administrator.

A native of Huntsville, Ala., Gragg was inducted into the Huntsville-Madison County (Ala.) Athletic Hall of Fame in 2010. He is a member of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) and the Black Coaches and Administrators (BCA).

Gragg, 45 (11-19-69), and his wife, Sanya, have four children: daughters DeSha and Saniyah; and sons Avery, a freshman at The University of Tulsa, and Phillip-Raymond.

## 2014 Season In Review

The Golden Hurricane finished last season with an 11-6-3 overall record, won the American Athletic Conference Championship and advanced to the NCAA Championship First Round. TU had four players named to The American first and second teams, two were tabbed to the All-Rookie team and five picked up all-tournament team accolades.

### Tulsa Falls to Saint Louis in NCAA First Round

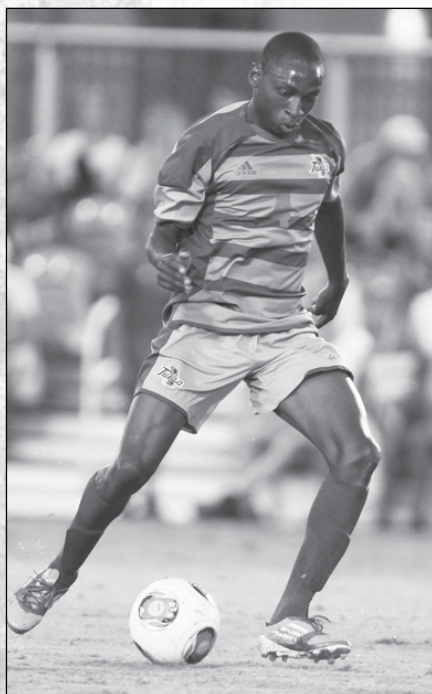
The Tulsa men's soccer team dropped a 2-0 decision to 19th-ranked Saint Louis in the NCAA Championship first round on Thursday, Nov. 20 at Hermann Stadium in St. Louis, Mo. SLU goals came in the 63rd and 88th minutes.

### Tulsa in the NAAs

Tulsa returned to the NCAA Tournament after missing it in 2013. The Hurricane has an 8-9-1 mark in the tournament, making quarterfinal appearances in 2004 and 2009.

### Tulsa Beat the National Champion

Tulsa defeated then #3-ranked Virginia, 1-0, on September 5 at the Hurricane Soccer and Track Stadium. The Cavaliers ended the season capturing the 2014 NCAA Championship as they tied UCLA, 0-0, and won the title on penalty kicks, 4-2.

### American Athletic Conference Champions

Tulsa claimed the 2014 American Athletic Conference Championship and the league's automatic bid to the NCAA Championship. The Golden Hurricane topped Cincinnati (1-0), SMU (2-0) and tied USF (0-0), but captured the tournament title on penalty kicks, 6-5.

### League Honors

Six Tulsa men's soccer players earned American Athletic Conference accolades, as announced by the league office. Bradley Bourgeois was tabbed to the first team, Akeil Barrett, Abé Matamoros and Ray Saari were second team selections, and Geoffrey Dee and Aymar Sigue picked up All-Rookie Team honors.

### Leading the Way

Akeil Barrett and Ray Saari both had a team-best six goals and 14 points. Austin Neil, who had tallied three goals and five assists on the year, and Cameron Drackett who had four goals and three assists, both had 11 points. Jake McGuire logged 1539:07 in goal, picked up 69 saves and earned six shutouts, while Brandon Hanat had 360 minutes between the posts for 13 saves and one clean sheet.

### Young and Old

Tulsa might have had the youngest and oldest player on a men's soccer roster for any Division I team in 2014. Austin Neil was born on May 15, 1990 and is 24 years old, while Aymar Sigue was born on February 12, 1997 and is just 17 years old.

### Friendly Confines

The Golden Hurricane had a 6-1-2 mark in the friendly confines of the Hurricane Soccer and Track Stadium in 2014 for a 77.7 winning percentage. Since the stadium was built in 2003, TU has amassed 70 wins at home for a 67.1 winning percentage.

### In the Record Books

Austin Neil, who played at Tulsa from 2008 to 2010, returned to TU and played his senior season in 2014 after spending two years on his Mormon Mission and receiving a medical hardship in 2013. Neil earned his way into the TU record book as he netted 36 goals, the sixth most for a Tulsa player in the history of the program. He also had 86 points to tie Huyhn Bui (1980-83) for fifth-place on the total points chart.

### Keeping Track

Tulsa played then #2 Creighton, #3 Virginia, #16 USF, #19 Saint Louis and #24 SMU for a 3-1-1 mark against ranked opponents on the season. Virginia finished the season at #1 with a 14-6-3 record, Creighton finished the season ranked #7 with a 16-3-3 mark and Saint Louis was #21 with a 14-5-2 record. USF and SMU were not ranked in the finals NSCAA poll.

## All-Americans

### 1991 • Frank Velez

Former TU standout Frank Velez was drafted professionally in 1991. The forward left Tulsa as the school's all-time leading scorer with 136 points.

He was TU's first All-America pick. He was a 2000 inductee into The University of Tulsa Athletic Hall of Fame.

### 2003 • Ryan Pore

Ryan Pore became Tulsa's second All-America selection in 2003. Pore concluded his sophomore season as the nation's second-leading scorer with 49 points on 20 goals and nine assists, and was also second nationally for goals scored. He helped Tulsa to 13 victories and to the NCAA Tournament second round.

### 2004 • Ryan Pore

Ryan Pore became the first two-time All-America player in school history with his 2004 selection. Pore led the nation in scoring with 22 goals and 11 assists for 55 points. He was a finalist for the Hermann Trophy and was named the *Soccer America* National Player of the Year. Pore helped TU to the NCAA Tournament Quarterfinals. He was a second round draft pick by the MLS' Kansas City Wizards in 2005.

### 2005 • Kyle Brown

Kyle Brown became the third player in school history to earn All-America honors with his honorable mention All-America selection by *Soccer America*. Brown led all Conference USA players in scoring and goals with 13 goals and five assists for 31 points. He is just one of two players in school history to earn all-conference first team honors during all four years of his career.

### 2007 • Chris Clements

Chris Clements became TU's fourth All-America selection in 2007 as he earned NSCAA/adidas NCAA All-America third-team accolades. Clements scored two goals and had one assist from his defender position, and assisted the Golden Hurricane to eight shutouts. He helped TU tally a 15-3-2 record, register a C-USA regular season and tournament title, and advance to the second round of the NCAA Men's Soccer Tournament.

### 2009 • Ashley McInnes

Tulsa's fifth All-America selection was Ashley McInnes in 2009, as he earned *College Soccer News* All-America third team honors. McInnes scored nine goals and had eight assists for 26 points. He helped TU register a 15-5-2 overall record, earn a third-straight C-USA regular season and tournament title, and advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Men's Soccer Tournament.

### 2009 • Austin Neil

Austin Neil became TU's sixth All-America honoree as he earned NSCAA All-America third team accolades. Neil led the Golden Hurricane with 13 goals and three assists for 29 points. He helped TU register a 15-5-2 overall record, earn a third-straight C-USA regular season and tournament title, and advance to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Men's Soccer Tournament.

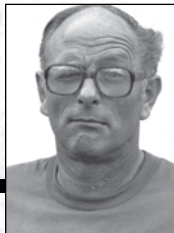

# American Athletic Conference

## #AMERICANRISING

Not entirely unlike the nation that provides its name, the American Athletic Conference was born from an ideal in which members with ambitious goals are provided with the means to succeed in their quests for excellence.

With roots that extend to three conferences, the American Athletic Conference membership in 2014-15 consists of 11 institutions: the University of Central Florida, the University of Cincinnati, East Carolina University, the University of Connecticut, the University of Houston, the University of Memphis, the University of South Florida Southern Methodist University, Temple University, Tulane University and the University of Tulsa.

The 2015-16 season sees the U.S. Naval Academy join the ranks in football only.

Under the leadership of commissioner Mike Aresco, The American, which operated as the Big East Conference from 1979 to 2013, has immediately taken a place at the forefront of Division I athletics, with schools that have played in four Bowl Championship Series games, won four NCAA men's basketball titles since 1999, and won nine NCAA women's basketball championships since 1995.

Two American Athletic Conference football teams were ranked in the top 15 of the final 2013 Associated Press poll. Five were selected for bowl games, including UCF, which won the Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and finished the season ranked No. 10 nationally. The con-

ference produced 14 players who received All-America recognition by a major outlet.

The American had four players chosen in the first round of the 2014 NFL Draft, trailing only the SEC and the ACC among FBS conferences. UCF quarterback Blake Bortles highlighted a group of 12 American Athletic Conference players chosen when he was taken No. 3 overall by the Jacksonville Jaguars.

The success of The American in Year 1 was not limited to the gridiron. UConn won NCAA titles in both men's and women's basketball. The conference had the best postseason winning percentage of any league in men's basketball, while The American produced top-10 teams in baseball, men's soccer and men's golf and sent half of its participating teams to the NCAA Softball Championship.

The American Athletic Conference holds television partnerships with ESPN and CBS Sports that will give the conference unprecedented national exposure. The football portion of the contract, which begins in the 2014 season, calls for nearly 90 percent of conference-controlled games on national broadcast or national cable platforms. The first American Athletic Conference Football Championship, which will be played in 2015, will be carried either on ABC or ESPN on Championship Saturday.

In men's basketball, the television deal calls for all conference-controlled games to be televised, with more than 63 percent slotted for national broadcast or national cable — a minimum of 107 games. The entire postseason tournament will be televised, including the championship game, which will be either on ABC or

ESPN. Sixty percent of the American's women's basketball games will be carried on either national cable, regional sports networks or ESPN3.

American Athletic Conference teams will have access to the pinnacle of college football's postseason structure. An American representative would be chosen for the College Football Playoff semifinals if it is among the top four teams following the regular season. Otherwise, the league would place its champion in either the Cotton Bowl, Fiesta Bowl or Peach Bowl if it is ranked higher than the champions of Conference USA, the Mid-American Conference, the Mountain West Conference and the Sun Belt Conference.

Additionally, The American has announced primary or secondary partnerships with 12 bowls for the next six-year cycle, ensuring multiple annual matchups against the nation's top conferences and providing desirable postseason destinations to member institutions and their fans.

The American Athletic Conference administers to its membership from a state-of-the-art office located in Providence, R.I. The location of the conference headquarters — just steps from the city's Amtrak station and 10 minutes from T.F. Green International Airport — gives the conference easy access to its member schools.

The conference headquarters is equipped with a complete video production studio, serving as the home of the American Digital Network, and small- and large-scale meeting rooms to accommodate the many coaches' and administrators' meetings held on-site each year.

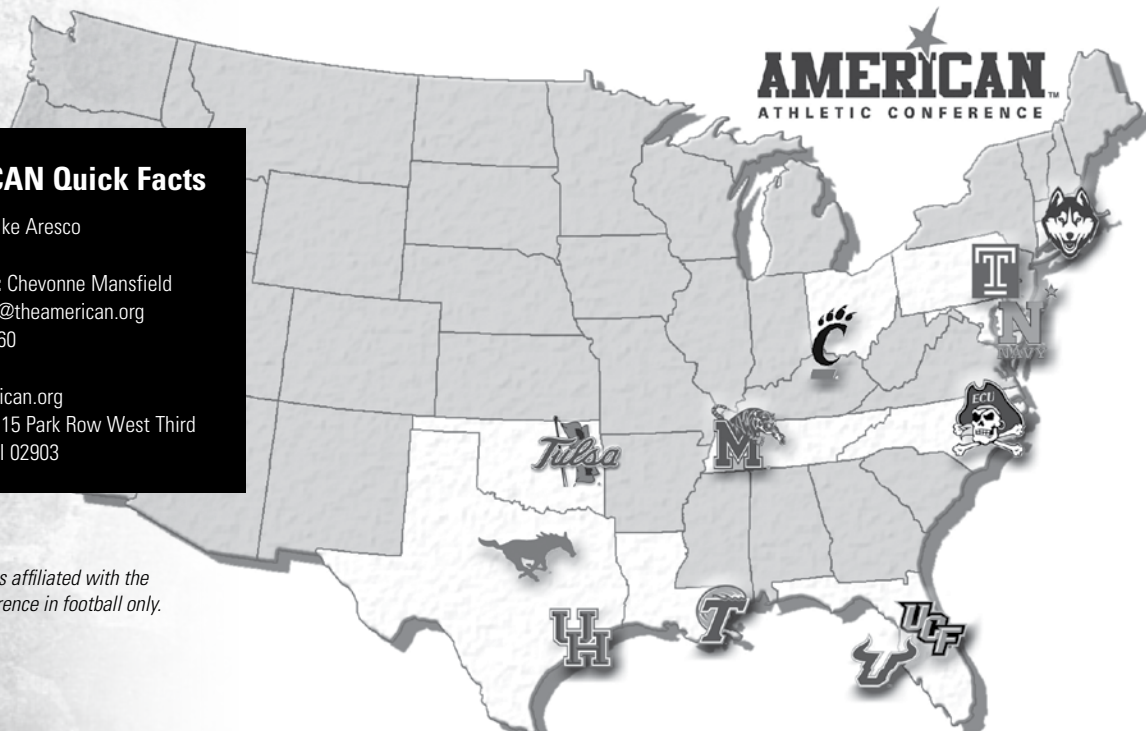
