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
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The Australian Volleyball Federation

Steve Tutton Life Member 2007

Steve Tutton has distinguished himself during a career exceeding 20 years as a leader and pioneer in taking Australian Volleyball to new levels.

As a player the Northern Aurora AVL team which he captained developed a game plan based on outstanding passing and fast attack plays which changed Australian men's volleyball as other clubs imitated the style and technique of this team. Steve played for Australia as a setter and then captained the national team playing over 120 matches. Again his leadership with this group led Australian men's volleyball to new heights and to a position where the AIS men's program was established.

Steve, after retiring as a player, took up an appointment as SASI Men's Volleyball Coach in 1990 within the national elite player development system. The SASI program at this stage was recognised nationally for its excellence setting the standard for other teams within national competition.



During this time Steve was responsible for driving a move into Beach Volleyball through the participation of SASI in an Asian 4 a side competition in the early 1990's.

When Beach Volleyball was admitted to the Olympic Games in 1996 for Atlanta Steve was selected as the National Coach.

He has been head coach for the Atlanta (1996), Sydney (2000) and Athens (2004) games with a bronze medal, gold medal and 2 x 4th places as the results.

Under Steve's direction, the Australian Beach Volleyball program has become an international benchmark for the integration of performance analysis and sports science into high performance programs.

Steve has left this position recently marking the end to 20 years of work as a coach within the high performance area and the majority of that time spent with the Beach Volleyball discipline in its formative years.

Steve has been an outstanding ambassador for the sport, highly regarded in the international beach volleyball community and has provided the leadership and direction for Australian Beach Volleyball to be in a strong position heading into Beijing 2008. Few people have influenced our sport more in the last 25 years.



The financial year ended June 2008 has been a successful year for Australian Volleyball despite a number of difficulties.

It is disappointing to report that our financial position is not as strong as the Board would have liked with the AVF being unable to sustain the net equity position reported last year. There clearly were some financial issues which only came to light after the last financial year had ended and after the Annual audit was conducted. The Board has decided to accept full responsibility for this and has set itself the target of again building a positive net equity position for the federation over the coming years.

The financial year was also affected by an unforeseen cost in running the FIVB Beach Volleyball World Tour Event at Glenelg, South Australia in March 2008. The main blowout cost for the AVF was the demand by the FIVB that we provide 1900 tonnes of new sand on the beach. Nobody in Australian volleyball anticipated that after 25 years of national use of Glenelg beach our sand would now be deemed as not meeting the specification. Nevertheless, the Board is confident that the finances of the AVF will be improved in the years ahead. I take this time to mention the sterling work of our CEO, Joan Perry, for the effort she has made to identify all issues related to our finances.

Competitions:

i) Australian Volleyball League.

During the financial year we were able to conduct a modified volleyball league for both men and women. The AVF acknowledges the work and commitment of the clubs in the AVL and in particular the financial commitment made by players and club staff to ensure the competition occurred. ii) Crocs National Beach Volleyball Tour.

As reported last year Vodafone decided not to continue as the naming rights sponsor for our National Beach Volleyball Tour. The Board conducted lengthy negotiations with the AVP (Association of Volleyball Professionals), the promoter of the Beach Volleyball Tour in the USA. As a result they became the promoter of our 2007-08 National Beach Volleyball Tour. They brought Crocs as the naming rights sponsor and the tour was successful despite the fact that we had a late start with the AVP in getting the tour up and running. At the time of writing this report we are still negotiating with AVP to be the promoters of the tour in 2009.

iii) Australian Volleyball Schools Cup.

The 2007 Australian Schools Cup was a great success with a record number of teams and players participating. This event brought approximately 5000 players, coaches, parents, friends and supporters to Melbourne for the week of the event. It has been said many times before and I say it again - the Australian Volleyball Schools Cup is the biggest secondary school sporting event held in Australia, and probably in the southern hemisphere.

iv) Australian Junior Volleyball Championships.

The 2007 championships were held in Sydney with a large number of teams from all over Australia competing. We acknowledge the work of NSW volleyball people and the AVF staff in organising this successful event.

High Performance Program.

The year was dominated by preparation for our high performance teams to qualify for the Beijing Olympics.

1. Men's and Women's Volleyball

It was disappointing that our men's team narrowly failed to qualify for the Olympic Games but we were delighted that in November 2007 they, for the first time ever, won the Asian Men's Championship. This success has cemented the Australian men's team as one of the powerhouse teams in Asia. Our women's indoor team has played a number of competitive events and is starting to show improvement as a result of our development program which relies on strong contributions from the States and local teams.

2. Beach Volleyball.

In beach volleyball our two teams of Tamsin Barnett and Natalie Cook in the women, and Andrew Schacht and Josh Slack in the men achieved some excellent results on the world beach volleyball tour and both qualified for the Beijing Olympics with a ranking in the world's top 10. Both sides achieved podium finishes during the year and in particular in July of 2007 Schacht and Slack won the bronze medal in the World Beach Volleyball Championship. Both sides were very competitive at the Olympic Games, Schacht and Slack finishing equal 9th and Barnett and Cook equal 5th. Through 2007-08 year both teams had to overcome serious injuries and they did so with great courage and commitment.

In March of this year the AVF was the promoter of a FIVB World tour event. This was the first time Australia had ever hosted a combined Men's and Women's world beach volleyball tour event. The event was only able to be held because of the very strong financial backing of the South Australian government. The work of all the AVF staff including Barry Couzner, Baz Wedmaier, the staff of the Confederation of Australian Sport and many dozens and dozens of volunteers ensured the event was extremely well run and was positively commented on by many of the over 230 international athletes who came to Adelaide to play. Many said that the venue at Glenelg was one of the best anywhere on the World Tour, particularly having the playing courts so close to all the facilities at Glenelg. At the time of writing this report it is unlikely that we will be able to have the event as planned next year due to a lack of a major commercial sponsor.

The AVF makes it very clear that we cannot afford to run this event if it means that the AVF has to cover a loss. Nevertheless, whatever happens in the future it was great for Australian volleyball to see the world's top 200 plus beach volleyball athletes playing in Australia for a week.

Integrated National Structure.

Because of the range of activities in volleyball, preparation for the Olympics, preparation for the World Tour event in Adelaide, we have not been able to progress the Integrated National Structure as much as the Board would have liked. It is still the Board's strong view that discussion with the States regarding the Integrated National Structure take place soon.

Staff.

I wish to complement Joan Perry for the sterling work she has performed for the AVF in her first year as our CEO. Joan is an indefatigable worker and has already made a major positive impact in many areas of Australian volleyball. During the year our Competitions and Events Manager Michelle Slack-Smith finished her work with us and I want to thank Michelle for her very hard work in one of the most difficult areas of volleyball activity. I also acknowledge the work that Renae Maycock contributed to events management during the year. During the year Christian Stapff joined us as our new Sport Development Manager, Susan Diver-Tuck has joined us as the new Competitions and Events Manager and a new position of IT/Communications Co-ordinatorhas been filled by Teresa Henderson.

These new staff working with our Operations Manager, Cheryl Bollard, are to be commended for their work.

In the High Performance area, Adam Sachs, as High Performance Manager and our beach program staff, Craig Marshall, Carlos Galletti, Simon Naismith, Marty Suan, Mick Nelson and Tim Rawlins have all made significant contribution ensuring that Australian beach volleyball is a major force in World beach volleyball.

In the men's and women's indoor volleyball Russell Borgeaud, Andrew Strugnell, Steve Benson, Phong Nguyen, Jenny Becker and Amanda Fielding have all worked hard to develop our national teams. They and their support staff are to be commended. All have had considerable success, which has meant that on the international level Australian volleyball is making good progress.

FIVB.

At the FIVB World Congress held in Dubai in June 2008 Dr Ruben A'Costa announced his resignation as FIVB President. Dr A'Costa had been president of FIVB since 1984. This was a most significant event as in the 61 years since the FIVB was formed it had only ever had two Presidents. Mr Wei Jizhong was elected President for the remainder of Dr A'Costa's term which will expire in 2012. Though I have been a critic of a number of governance issues about the way the FIVB was managed, I acknowledge that the FIVB during Dr A'Costa's presidency has had substantial growth. Volleyball is now one of the biggest sports in the world and Dr A'Costa leaves the sport with the opportunity to get even bigger. New President Wei has indicated that there will be a number areas in which the management of world volleyball will be further improved.

Since the Congress in 2006 I have served on the Legal Commission of FIVB and Riad Tayeh has served on the Finance Commissions of both the FIVB and the AVC. This has given both of us the opportunity to further raise Australia's profile in world volleyball.

I wish to commend the work of my fellow AVF Board members, Vice President Kevin Dobson, Finance Director Riad Tayeh, Rosemary Bisset, Edi Vukosa and Shane Hennessy, for their hard work and dedication to growing volleyball in Australia and in dealing with all the issues confronting Australian volleyball.

Our sport exists for the participants. The efforts of administrators is to provide opportunity for people to play our sport. The sport would not exist without the athletes. It should be acknowledged that in Australia we have been fortunate that over many years we have produced many international quality volleyball players who have represented themselves and Australia with distinction. To all of those athletes I give my profound thanks.



The organisation of the Federation is structured into four key business areas High Performance, Sport Development, Competitions/Events and Operations/Business Services.



If I were asked to sum up my first 12 months with the Australian Volleyball Federation I would say it has been a year of change, challenge and achievement. As with any organisation change automatically brings new challenges and for the AVF in 2007/08 that has certainly been the case.

As the newly appointed CEO in August, I hit the ground running with a primary focus on events. Much of my early days were spent finalising the negotiations to ensure that we were able to deliver a national beach tour; an integral component in the development pathway for beach volleyball players. Thanks to the partnership with the AVP and the support from Crocs and other corporate sponsors this was made possible. Whilst we had our hiccups along the way I am pleased that our Australian athletes were provided with the opportunity to play a high quality event on home soil.

Through the significant support provided by the South Australian Government and in particular the South Australian Tourism Commission, after a 10 year absence the SWATCH FIVB World Tour returned to Australia in the form of the Adelaide Open. Some might say it was our biggest challenge but also the most rewarding experience for all involved. The fact that it was an Olympic year meant that Australia was treated to some of the best beach volleyball teams in the world. In fact Adelaide was be pleased to boast 87% of the top 30 women's teams in the world and 94% of the top 30 men's teams in the world participated.

Operational changes occurred within the AVF, particularly with our people. After 5 years with the Federation Tim Shannahan resigned and moved back to New Zealand to take up a position with Canterbury Hockey. Christian Stapff was appointed as his replacement in January and has slowly settled into his role.

The AVF also made the decision to consolidate our operations in Canberra which resulted in the resignation of Michelle Slack-Smith just after the end of the year. I commend both of these individuals on the contribution they have made to the AVF in their respective areas during their time with the organisation.

The AVF maintains a strong commitment to both the Sport Development and Competition and Events portfolios for the future and sees these areas as the building blocks for volleyball in this country.

We tend to measure sport by our participation numbers, achievements and our bottom line. To that end the Federation had a mixed year. The Federation exists to work in partnership with our states to provide a development pathway for athletes who want to play volleyball. That means the participation base is as important to us as the top end and what we achieve internationally. Our numbers appear to be down slightly on last year and it is important that we address this in order to ensure that we continue to grow. I did manage to get around to some of the states to hear their perspective and gain a greater understanding of the issues confronting them. Whilst everything is not perfect I am confident that we have passionate people working in the states who will support the direction that the AVF is taking the sport.

Internationally our results in both beach and indoor far surpassed our expectations. The significant support we receive from the Australian Sports Commission and the Australian Institute of Sport is a major contributing factor to our success. The ultimate outcome on the beach or on the court is due to the strength of our High Performance Program, funded by the Australian Sports Commission and Australian Institute of Sport, led very capably by High Performance Manager Adam Sachs and delivered by a team of committed professionals at every level.

Whilst I would prefer to be delivering an annual report that produced a positive financial outcome, this is not the case. The Federation took some calculated risks in hosting the SWATCH FIVB World Tour which was a fantastic event for the athletes and the public, but placed a financial strain on the organisation. Through some very necessary and detailed planning and a commitment by the AVF Board and staff, I am confident that the Federation can turn this around in the coming years.



I take the opportunity to congratulate Operations Manager Cheryl Bollard on the way she has embraced the several changes I have instigated to the financial management and reporting systems. It has been difficult

We are at the end of a four year funding cycle with the Australian Sports Commission (ASC) and the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS) and the 2009-2013 period through to the completion of the London Olympics will be crucial for volleyball. The pathways plan that we presented to the ASC and AIS in February this year not only highlighted the achievements of the past four years, but more importantly outlined our strategies for the future and the initiatives within the High Performance Program that we plan to undertake to ensure that Australian teams continue to improve their performances in international competition. A key building block for us to succeed with this plan includes the identification and development of sufficient numbers of quality athletes. This can only be achieved by working in cooperation with our member states to deliver quality, sustainable programs that support the elite development pathway.

The AVF must constantly strive for continued improvement at all levels of the sport. To me, the future is about creating a dynamic and sustainable organisation that will enable us to reach our strategic and operational goals. I appreciate the opportunity that the Board has provided me and the faith they have placed in me to do exactly that. I have thoroughly enjoyed working with all of our key stakeholders and look forward to taking the next steps with your continued support.

Message from the Australian Sports Commission



Australia, for its small population and remoteness of location, continues to confound the world with its achievements on the international sporting stage. This position has been reached by the development of a comprehensive and effective national sport system that encourages sport and physical activity for all Australians and creates opportunities to enable those who are talented and motivated to reach their potential. This system has evolved with the strong support of the Australian Government, State/Territory and local governments, the private sector and sporting organisations at all levels.

At the national level primary responsibility for developing and directing sport lies with national sporting organisations. On behalf of the Australian Government, the Australian Sports Commission plays central leadership, co-ordination, funding and advocacy roles in the operation of the Australian sport system, largely through the national sporting organisations. Indeed the Australian Government, through the Commission, is the major investor in Australian sport.

In 2007-08 the Australian Government, through the Commission, provided the Australian Volleyball Federation with funding of more than \$2.5 million for the development of the sport and its continued enhancement at the grass-root and elite levels, including provision of Australian Institute of Sport Beach and Men's Indoor Volleyball programs. In addition, the Commission allocated \$72,000 directly to the Australian Volleyball Federation's high performance athletes under the Australian Government Sport Training Grants scheme.

The Australian Sports Commission recognises that the Australian Volleyball Federation has undergone a number of key staff changes in the last year, nonetheless the Federation continued to work to build its membership base and develop the sport in Australia. There were a number of particularly noteworthy successes for Australian volleyball in 2007-08; firstly the success achieved by the Men's Indoor team winning the Asian Championship in September 2007 (for the first time) and thereby qualifying for the World Indoor Championships (also for the first time); and secondly, Andrew Schacht and Joshua Slack winning a bronze medal in the Gstaad (Switzerland) event which also doubled as the 2007 World Championships, which was the first ever World Championship medal won by an Australian Men's Beach Volleyball team. These achievements all represent significant milestones for volleyball in Australia.

The Commission looks forward to working with the Australian Volleyball Federation in future for the betterment of Australian sport.

Thank you to the enduring efforts of the event commissions. Their continued guidance and feedback has been a constant source of direction and support. Theirs is a critical, but continuing role in making sure they address the needs of all stakeholders and provide long-term direction for AVF events.

We must look to the future for Volleyball and see its potential in the highly competitive sporting arena that is the Australian sporting landscape. Volleyball has so much to offer to all who become involved in it, from the social player to the elite, and the administrators to the referees and coaches, it is the true essences of team sport but we are struggling against each other, rather than working towards a common goal.

A special mention goes to Michelle Slack-Smith for her hard work and dedication in the role of Competition & Events Manager over the past two years. Michelle has endeavoured to produce a National Events Portfolio that meets the needs of the Volleyball community, as well as pushing the sport of Volleyball to new heights in professionalism in regards to event organisation and long-term event continuity.

High Performance Program

In 2007/08 the sights of the Australian Volleyball Federation's (AVF) High Performance Program (HPP) were firmly set on the qualification of Australia's Men's Indoor and Men's and Women's Beach Volleyball Teams for the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing.

Men's Volleyball National Program

After narrowly missing out on winning a number of close games at the 2006 World Championships, the Men's National Team continued its preparation for the Olympic qualification process by travelling and competing overseas. In July 2007, Australia's Men's Volleyball Team went to India where it won the first edition of the Commonwealth Championships conducted for many years. It was an impressive display against the best of the Commonwealth countries and signalled that the team was in good shape heading into the business end of the international season.

In September 2007, the Men's National Team travelled to Indonesia for the 2007 Asian Championships after a gruelling tour to Europe. The victim of some questionable changes to the rules of the Asian Championships, Australia's Men's Team was required to play ten games in ten days, and in stifling heat and humidity, but still managed to win the tournament. This was Australia's first ever Asian Championships win and it qualified our Men's Team for the 2007 FIVB World Cup, also for the first time ever.

In November 2007, Australia's Men's Team travelled to Japan for the World Cup without key senior player, Dan Howard, where it beat all of the other teams from the Asian Volleyball Confederation (AVC) and finished the tournament in eighth place. This result helped to catapult Australia from 22nd to 11th in the FIVB World Rankings.

In May 2008, Japan hosted the Asian and (final) World Olympic Qualification Tournament where Australia went in as one of the favourites to qualify for the 2008 Olympic Games, either by winning the tournament or by finishing as the highest-ranked team from within the AVC. Unfortunately, despite beating Argentina for the first time ever in official competition, Australia's Men's Volleyball Team was beaten comprehensively by eventual winners – Italy – and several of its Asian rivals and failed to qualify for the Beijing Olympics.



Beach Volleyball National Program

After a strong start to the 2007 Swatch FIVB World Tour, Australia's top Beach Volleyball Teams went on to record some very strong results and comprehensively secure their spots at the 2008 Olympic Games. Along the way, Australia's number one Women's team – Natalie Cook and Tamsin Barnett – recorded multiple top 5 finishes in their first World tour season playing together. Number one Men's team – Andrew Schacht and Joshua Slack – won the silver medal at the Montreal Open in Canada and then went on to claim Australia's first-ever Men's World Championships medal (i.e. Beach or indoor) by finishing third in Switzerland.

Both teams returned to Australia after the World Championships to recover from injury and prepare for the 2008 domestic season including the Crocs Tour and the Swatch FIVB 'Adelaide Open' World Tour event in March. In May 2008, Schacht/Slack and Cook/Barnett resumed the World Tour in China, and in the weeks that followed, Schacht/Slack delivered another medal finishing third in Poland.

A further highlight of 2007/08 was the silver medal won by Women's Beach Volleyball team, Alice Rohkamper and Becchara Palmer, at the Swatch FIVB U/21 World Championships. This fantastic result followed on from the team's gold medal at U/19 World Championships the previous year and signalled the continuation of a new era for Women's Beach Volleyball in Australia beyond the Beijing Olympic Games in 2008.

Women's Volleyball National Program

In 2007, the AVF delivered a revised Women's Australian Volleyball League (AVL) competition in line with a number of the recommendations to come from the independent review of Women's Volleyball in Australia undertaken by Bob Crudgington in 2006. The competition was supported by five state-based teams and provided invaluable competition exposure for those athletes identified by the AVF as members of its new camps-based Women's National Squad.

At the conclusion of the Women's AVL season, the Australian Women's Volleyball Team for the 2007 Asian Championships was selected and announced. With limited preparation, the Women's National Team finished 8th at this important event – The highest placing by an Australian Women's Team at the Asian Championships in more than ten years.

Special Thanks

2007/08 was arguably the most successful year ever for the AVF's High Performance Program but was not without its challenges (personal and professional) for our dedicated staff. Our National Program coaches work tirelessly to ensure that our athletes and teams are as well-prepared as possible for the rigors of international competition at the highest level. My thanks go to them for leaving no stone unturned in their pursuit of excellence. They can be very proud of their achievements this year.

Special thanks must also go to the ASC and AIS for without the \$2m funding that they provide (collectively) annually, the AVF would not be able to operate its HPP and deliver the results we know are possible for Australian Teams to achieve on the world stage. It should be noted also, that in 2007/08 the ASC and AIS contributed almost \$300,000 of additional funding (excluding NTID Program funding) to enhance the preparations of our Men's and Beach Volleyball National Teams for the 2008 Olympic Games.

And finally, I would like to recognise the continued contributions of the South Australian Sports Institute, Queensland Academy of Sport and Australian Olympic Committee who all provide funding and other support which ensures that the AVF continues to punch above its weight in World Volleyball now and into the future.

2007 FIVB Junior World Championships 2nd Silver Medal - Becchara PALMER & Alice ROHKAMPER During the past twelve months, the Australian Institute of Sport (AIS)/ AVF National Beach Volleyball Program strategically targeted a demanding Swatch FIVB World Tour campaign during the Olympic qualification season (January 2007 – July 2008). The focus during this campaign was two-fold: to qualify one Men's and one Women's teams' for the Beijing Olympic Games; and to achieve a medal result at our benchmark event for the year - the 2007 World Championships.

For the first time ever in July 2007, an Australian Men's team won a World Championships medal in either discipline of the sport (Beach or Indoor). Andrew Schacht and Josh Slack won a Bronze Medal (3rd place) in FIVB Beach Volleyball World Championships held in Switzerland. This result is undoubtedly the major highlight of the year.

Heading towards the end of the Olympic Qualification season Australia's Olympic teams' Cook/Barnett and Schacht/Slack were ranked in the Top 10 in Olympic rankings (30th June 2008). Furthermore, Schacht / Slack's 2nd place Silver Medal in Montreal Canada, is the second time ever an Australian Men's team has played in a final on the FIVB World Tour.

The Adelaide Australia Open provided our athletes with a great opportunity to compete in front of family and friends on Aussie sand against the world's best teams. There is little doubt the exposure to some of the world's best teams in our AIS/AVF National Centre of Excellence training environment prior to the event was a fantastic and unique experience for our National Program.

Prior to the Adelaide Australia Open athletes and coaches from USA, Germany, Russia, Norway, Denmark, Japan, France, Switzerland, Austria, Netherlands, Canada and Great Britain all trained at our National Centre of Excellence.

This provided a fantastic opportunity for our Australian teams to train with and against quality International teams, while our coaching staff exchanged ideas and liaised with other National team coaches from these nations during the Olympic season.



Another key objective of the AVF/AIS Beach Volleyball Program 2007/08 has been to continue to increase the exposure of Australian Development athletes and teams to high-quality international competition while still focusing on providing the required level of coaching and servicing to our 2008 Olympic Games teams. This was achieved by having teams participating in two key International events on the Swatch FIVB World Tour and competing at the FIVB Junior/Youth World Championships.

A distinct highlight of this program objective was the silver medal won by Becchara Palmer / Alice Rohkamper in the 2007 SWATCH-FIVB Junior World Championships for players under the age of 21 in Modena, Italy. This is only the second medal at Junior/Youth World Championships won by Australians. The first was in 2006 by Palmer/Rohkamper when they were crowned Youth World Champions.

The program also welcomed new AVF scholarship coach Martin Suan to its ranks. Made possible by the ASC National Coaching Scholarship Program and supported by AVF, the scholarship provides Marty (a past program athlete) with exposure and experience in all areas of elite coaching including technical and tactical trends of the International game.

Andrew Schacht



Andrew Schacht teamed with Joshua Slack to have the pair's best SWATCH-FIVB World Tour season in 2007. Since the Athens 2004 Olympic Games, Schacht with his partner Slack have ranked as the top Australian men's team on the SWATCH-FIVB World Tour. Paired since 2002, Schacht's partnership was highlighted by a pair of medals and three "final four" finishes in 2007. And after placing fourth in Croatia, Schacht claimed a silver medal at the 2007 Canadian stop in Montreal before finishing third at the SWATCH-FIVB World Championships in the Swiss Alps.

At the start of this, his 12th year on the FIVB tour, Schacht was ranked 20th all-time in FIVB earnings, entering the 2008 season with 62 events with three podium placements and five "final four" finishes. Schacht qualified for his second Olympic Games as he and his partner improved as a team showing that there is a way for Australian mens beach volleyball to compete and succeed at the very highest level. The 2008 season was highlighted by yet another podium finish, where Schacht and Slack won the Bronze medal in Stare Jablonki, Poland.

Tamsin Barnett



In 2004 Tamsin took her first real steps on the sand. After tearing her meniscus whilst playing the finals of the Spanish League, the hard floorboards of indoor volleyball became too much to handle. Training on the Melbourne beaches she quickly rose through the state and then National ranks. By the end of 2005 she had successfully competed as a main draw team in the Swatch FIVB World Tour, won 3 Australian National Tour events with Summer Lochowicz and won the Australian Championships with Natalie Cook.

At the end on 2005 Tamsin accepted a beach volleyball scholarship to train with the Australian Institute of Sport based in Adelaide. 3 years on, successfully partnering with Natalie Cook and under the guidance of coach Carlos 'Alemao' Galletti, Tamsin has a total of six top 5 finishes, two top 4 finishes, and one gold medal from Seoul, Korea. Tamsin was also named the 2007 Most Improved Player FIVB World Tour.

This is Tamsin's second Most Outstanding Player Award, but her first for Beach Volleyball, having won the Indoor trophy in 2002.

Paul Carroll




Paul started playing volleyball in grade 7 at Forster High School in NSW, thanks to the influence of his older twin brothers Marc and Luke. He represented his school for 6 years at the Australian Schools Cup and his state NSW at National Juniors for 5 years.

Paul made his Australian debut as a junior as part of the team for the 2004 Asian Junior Championships. He has been a member of Volleyball Team Australian Men since 2005, making his senior debut in 2006. Carroll was part of the first Australian team to win the Asian Championships and the Commonwealth Volleyball Championships in 2007. Competing at 2007 World Cup in Japan, Paul was one of the top scorers at the tournament, finishing second among all players with 183 kills.

Paul continues to balance his Australian Team commitments with his University ones, where he has attended Pepperdine University since 2005, winning numerous awards and accolades.

Justine Mowen



Justine has been a member of the Australian Women's' team since making her debut in 2005 at the World Championship Qualification Tournament in China. In 2007 she played in her second Asian Senior Championships where the team finished 8th, and qualified for the Inaugural Asian Cup in 2008. Justine was also selected into the team for the Abu Dhabi International Women's tournament in May 2008.

Having played over 40 games for the senior Australian team, Justine continues to be a stand out in her position as a middle blocker. In both the 2007 and 2008 season of the Women's Australian Volleyball League, Justine has finished top of the stats for kill blocks, and also had the most service aces in the 2007 season. Captaining the Queensland team in the Women's AVL for the past 2 years, Justine also holds a scholarship with the Queensland Academy of Sport and trains and plays for both beach and indoor volleyball.

Increasing number of athletes playing in professional European Leagues During the past twelve months, the Australian Women's Volleyball Program has been actively engaged in both the domestic national league (AVL) and international competition.

Women's AVL is the cornerstone of the Women's National Program, and is designed to provide senior women with an annual training program with the focus on delivering the highest level of volleyball competition in Australia. The league is played during the April to August period, leading into the international competition phase (September and October).

The Senior Women's team has participated in two training camps and four competition opportunities in 2008. The year kicked off with a series of friendly matches against Oregon University in Sydney and Brisbane; a good opportunity for Australian athletes to play against a similar style of volleyball.

The senior Women's team competed in the Abu Dhabi Invitational Tournament in May, and played the national teams of Netherlands, Egypt Algeria, Italy and France. A team competed in the Vietnam Volleyball Cup in September where they played the faster Asian style of volleyball. And the final competition for the year is the Asian Volleyball Cup (top 8 nations from last years Asian Seniors) in October. This tournament will see Australia playing against three 2008 Olympic teams (China, Japan and Kazakhstan).

There is little doubt the exposure to some of the best teams in the world has already strengthened the National Women's program. As we move towards the third year of the Women's AVL, and prepare the 2009 international calendar, the Senior Women's program continues to develop opportunities for female athletes both here in Australia and overseas.



With an increasing number of athletes playing professional volleyball in Europe, and the graduating class of the national junior women's program looking to join the teams in the Women's AVL, the Women's Program is looking to maintain the momentum generated in 2008.

NATIONAL JUNIOR WOMEN'S VOLLEYBALL PROGRAM

2008 sees the conclusion of the three year '90 Junior Women's Program. With 33 athletes having represented Australia at the youth and junior level, a selection camp was required to select the athletes who would compete at the Asian Junior Women's Volleyball Championships in Taipei in September. This group has competed in two Trans Tasman Series, the Arafura Games, a friendly match against Tianjin High School and six training camps.

The '92 Youth Girl's Program kicked off with the December training camp in Bendigo in which 68 athletes attended. State based training sessions were conducted in the first half of 2008 and a selection camp in July identified 24 athletes to compete at the Asian Youth Girls Volleyball Tournament in the Philippines in October, and the Trans Tasman series of matches in New Zealand in October.

The '94 Youth Girls Program will kick off in December with the training camp following the AVSC with the aim of exposing the younger athletes to international competition in 2009.

NATIONAL BEACH TALENT IDENTIFICATION

The 15 athletes identified through the National Junior Women's Program and provided with the opportunity to experience beach volleyball at the national and international level.

These athletes participated in training sessions with the AIS Women's Beach Volleyball coaches and athletes over the summer period. A selection camp was held in April to select the pairs to compete at the 2008 World Youth and World Junior Beach Volleyball Championships. This selection camp was attended by the largest group of athletes ever assembled for such a camp. The quality of beach athletes reinforced the belief that the development of beach volleyball athletes is entering a new, positive phase in the sports development in Australia.

The NTID group competed in the national beach tour events and for some of the athletes this was the first time they have competed on the sand. The group also experienced the World Tour Event in Adelaide, with some competing in the country quota and qualifying rounds and all the athletes getting a hands on experience of the tour.

The NTID program will move forward in 2009 with a greater emphasis on the athletes preparing for the 2012 Olympic Games, as well as the long term development of athletes identified for the 2016 Olympics. The program will continue to develop its training and competition program, ensuring the identified athletes maintain constant contact with the AIS coaching staff, as well as establishing a broader beach volleyball coaches network within Australia.

The 2007/08 year for Volleyball Team Australia Men (VTAM) was one of the most successful years for the program with winning the 14th Asian Men's Volleyball Championship, 2nd Commonwealth Volleyball Championship for Men and a top eight finish at the FIVB World Cup in Japan. However, these successes did not compensate for the teams' disappointment in not qualifying for its third successive Olympics in Beijing.

With the first phase of the Olympic qualification process in September, VTAM embarked on a preparation tour that covered India, Greece, Tunisia and France. The first leg of the tour saw VTAM triumph over India in a marathon five set final to take out the 2^{nd} Commonwealth Volleyball Championship. VTAM then headed over to Greece for a three-match friendly series against their World League hardened opponents and even with the addition of stalwart, Dan Howard, VTAM lost the closely contested series 3 - 0 to their Greek counterparts. In Tunisia, VTAM won a three match friendly series against Tunisia 2 - 1.

In addition to the friendly matches VTAM competed in the Sousse Men's Tournament with VTAM defeating the current European champions (Spain) for the first time since the 2000 Sydney Olympics (that qualified Australia for the quarter finals). In what was a difficult task, VTAM then took on world number eight team, France, at home in Paris, just 24 hours after arriving from Tunisia. Unfortunately, all the travel caught up with VTAM and France won the two match series in straight sets.

At the 14th Asian Men's Volleyball Championship in Indonesia, VTAM faced a daunting task of having to play 10 games in 10 days. A determined VTAM progressed through to the top 8 final round by defeating India, Kuwait and Kazakhstan in the first round, then defeated Japan, Korea and Iran in tough five set encounters before continuing its undefeated run with victories over Chinese Taipei, Indonesia and Thailand. In their last match of the championship fatigued finally caught up as the team lost to China in yet another tough five set encounter that left Japan in the box seat to take out the championship. In what could only be described as a fairytale finish Thailand defeated Japan (for the first time ever in official competition) 3 - 0, to award Australia the Championship and at the same time book themselves a berth at next years Asian Olympics qualification tournament and a ticket to the FIVB's World Cup (the first official Olympic qualification tournament).



The AIS Men's team with the inclusion of some youth athletes embarked on a European tour to gain some much needed international experience. The first leg of the tour was to Sweden where the team defeated the Swedish Junior Men's team in the three match series with the only record lost to Div 1 side, Team Valla, who boasted four AIS graduated athletes. The team then travelled to Italy to play three matches against Italian club and representative teams before heading over to Slovakia for a three match series against the Slovakian Junior Men's team and club side Presov. Of the seven matches played, the young AIS boy's lost only the one match to the Slovakian national league side.

In the final leg of the tour, the AIS travelled to France for a three match series against the France Junior Men's team. Though France (ranked 3rd in the world at the time) won the series three-nil they were at times challenged by the young Aussie boys. The AIS boys then capped off the tour with a victory over club side Montpellier before heading back to Australia.

Once again, this European tour has proven to be an invaluable tool in the development of the current group of athletes for the National Junior Program, and ultimately, the next generation of Volleyball Team Australia Men athletes. A number of these athletes have subsequently competed with the National Men's team.

The majority of the Senior Team returned to the AIS for an extensive training and selection camp before heading off on a preparation tour to Argentina, Greece, Slovakia and China, before going to Japan for the World Olympic Qualification Tournament.

With three key players yet to join the team, VTAM lost the five match series against Argentina after winning the first match 3 - 1. The team was joined by Dan Howard and captain, Ben Hardy for the next leg of the tour and VTAM took out the series against quality Hellenic and Slovakian sides 2 - 1 and 2 - 0 respectively.

In the final phase of the teams' preparation they travelled to China for a three match series. China, also a participant at the upcoming World Olympic Qualification Tournament in Japan won the first two matches of the series before VTAM won the final match in a tough five set encounter.

At the World Olympic Qualification Tournament (WOQT) in Japan VTAM lead the competition standings after a solid victory over Thailand and then an historic and clinical 3 - 0 victory over Argentina. Following a rest day, VTAM then played the top of the table clash against an experienced Italian team that dominated on the block and attack. With the heavy defeat to Italy, VTAM then lost a touch five set encounter to Korea and then lost to Japan in straight sets. In its final two matches VTAM defeated Algeria and lost to Iran to finish a disappointing 5th behind Italy (qualified), Japan (qualified) Korea and Argentina, and miss out on qualifying for its third successive Olympics.

Upon the teams' return to Australia and a review of VTAM's WOQT campaign, head coach, Russell Borgeaud and the program immediately commenced training to qualify for the London Olympics in four years time.

Australian Men's Volleyball Team – Asian Champions 2007



The Australian's Men's Volleyball Team's unbeaten run at the 14th Asian Senior Volleyball Championships was nothing short of spectacular. A record of 9-1 over the 10 days of competition resulted in the team being crowned the Number 1 team in Asia for the first time ever, since the tournament started in 1975.

Fending off the Asian zone's finest teams, Australia powered their way through a challenging draw, the preliminary rounds and remained in the Top 8 group to the very end. The defeat of top-ranked Japan by Thailand threw all sorts of chaos into the final placings, elevating Australia to first, despite their final match loss to China in five sets.

Adding to the team's success was the individual honour awarded to Dan Howard as Most Valuable Player at the tournament.

The team's performance is a great achievement to be savoured for a very long time. This historic win elevated Australia to a key starting position in the FIVB World Cup hosted by Japan in November 2007.

(Age groups are designated by the year in which the oldest players are born.) For the 2006 – 2007 period, the following teams trained and/or competed: 89 National Youth Boy's (NYB)/Junior Men's (NJM) and 91 National Youth Squad (NYS)/ National Youth Boy's (NYB) Teams. The groups are based around a rotating schedule, the centrepieces of which are the Asian Championships for Junior and Youth and the World Youth and Junior Championships should the teams qualify. These tournaments are held every two years.

SUMMARY OF SQUAD ACTIVITIES:

89 National Youth Boy's / Junior Men's Team

2007-08 proved to be a slow competitive year for the 89 National Youth Boy's / Junior Men's Team as there is traditionally is 16 months between the age groups official competitions: Asian youth and junior championships.

As the majority of the squad are AIS scholarship holders most of the development and competition opportunities were gained on AIS backed domestic competition and annual tour to Europe; however, there we still two activities scheduled for the group during this period.

The first activity was the defence of the "Murray Mansfield" Junior Trans Tasman Trophy, for a fifth successive year, over in New Zealand comprising primarily of AIS based athletes.

The five match series was contested in the 'Bay of Plenty' region and surrounding towns two hours southeast of Auckland, October 1 - 5, 2007. In another close series, the '89 Youth Boy's retained the 'Murray Mansfield' Junior Trans Tasman Trophy with a 4 - 1 series victory over their Trans Tasman counterparts.

In 2008, the team evolved to the '89 National Junior Men's Team with a 'B' team tour to Thailand to compete in Thailand's equivalent of the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships. Unfortunately, due to the lack numbers, this tour was cancelled, making the selection process for the minor spots on the Asian Junior Championship (August 2008) team quick difficult for head coach, Darren Wilson, and the selection panel.



91 National Youth Boy's Team

For the 91 National Youth Boy's Squad, the year commenced with the appointment of AVF Development Coach, Stephen Benson, to the Head Coach's position for the age group and a training camp that immediately followed the conclusion of the Australian Junior Volleyball Championships in Sydney.

This first training camp was held at the AIS in Canberra, July 14 – 19, with 44 athletes and coaches from across Australia participating in the week-long camp.

The next scheduled activity for the age group was the Junior Program's annual December Training Camp in Bendigo, Victoria following the Australian Volleyball Schools Cup event where 73 athletes and 14 coaches took part in the Junior Program's biggest camp to-date. Per usual, AIS/VTAM coaching staff was on hand to assist the running of the camp and demonstrate the current skill models being used by the AIS/Volleyball Team Australia program and its athletes. From the camp, a number of athletes were offered AIS Volleyball Scholarships.

The first opportunity for the select 12 athletes from the age group to represent their country was on a tour to Thailand where the team would participate in the Thailand Junior Volleyball Championships in Bangkok, Thailand.

Following a three day intensive training camp the young Aussie boy's played their first match against Rattanakosin in a tough five set encounter first off. The team then rebounded in their next game to defeat Makkasan 3 – 0. Unfortunately for the Youth boy's their next and final pool match was against the favourites to take out the tournament, Thai Army. In a gallant performance, the Aussie boy's lost to Thai Army in straight sets and subsequently missed out on a quarter final berth.



Dan Howard – Australian Captain – A Brilliant Career



"It has been an amazing journey and I'm going to miss the camaraderie and playing for your country – it's always very special."

Howard, who has played over 300 games for Australia, since making his debut in 1994. He first emerged as a 16-year-old playing for Esperance High School in Western Australia in 1993.

He was a part of the junior national team in 1994 and 1995 and joined the Volleyball Team Australia program at the Australian Institute of Sport the following year.

Such was his impact that he immediately became a member of the starting team. Howard won the Ted Kalkhoven Award as the Australian male volleyball player of the year in 1997 and 1998.

In the lead up to the Sydney Olympics, the ABC reported that Howard was recruited to Italian second division team Gioia de Colle in 1998-99, having played the previous season in Germany.

After two seasons with Gioia, he signed with Italian first division club Ferrara for the 2000-01 season. He was the number one blocker after the preliminary rounds of the World League in 1999 and the year before had been recognised as the best blocker at the Canada Cup.

He was regarded as one of the most exciting prospects in the international game and the Sydney Olympics loomed as a chance for Howard to establish himself among volleyball's elite and he certainly did that with his best attacker award.

Borgeaud payed tribute to Howard saying that taking the 208cm middle blocker out of the Australian line up will certainly leave a huge gap – in more ways than one.

"Dan has been an absolute ornament to the game and he has been at the forefront of our sport through two Olympic campaigns – a third would have been nice – but it wasn't to be," said Borgeaud.

Dan considers the gold medal as part of the Australian team at last year's Asian Senior Volleyball Championships and his Sydney and Athens Olympic representation as his greatest achievements in the sport.

Sport Development Program

The major areas of focus for the Sport Development Program during 2007-08 were the National Participation Program – Discover Volleyball, the Coach Education & Development Program and the Referee Education & Development Program and Volleyball Connect, a project to promote and support Volleyball for people with disabilities.

There are a number of individuals and groups who assist the Sport Development Program in achieving all of its outcomes in the past year. Thank you to everyone for your assistance. Of particular note are the Member State staff, especially Sport Development staff, the Australian Volleyball Referees Commission Executive and State Representatives.

A special mention goes to Tim Shannahan for his hard work and dedication in the role of Sport Development Manager over the past five years. Tim's work was pivotal in the creation of a Sport Development program that was used as a benchmark by other sports. He provided a solid footing from which I began as the Sport Development Manager in January 2008 and brought a fresh perspective to the program through experiences as a player, coach and referee

Many of the achievements of the program were made possible by the hard work of our University of Canberra interns. Kate Baker-Waldsax 's work in coach education has been ably continued by Jo Oyanagi, whilst Alexandra Schidor has continued the work begun by Richard Muir with Volleyball Connect. Our interns have made significant contributions and we will continue our partnership with the University of Canberra

Coach Education and Development Program

In response to a large number of requests the AVF developed and produced a series of educational resources to complement our Coaching Education programs.

The Introductory Coaching Manual and Resource guides were released in October and have been widely used throughout Australia.

Work is continuing to produce similar resources for the Level 1 and Level 2 Coaching courses, including the production of a coach education film with teaching points and cues. This is a joint project between the AVF and the Canberra Institute of Technology.



Coach of the Year 2008

Russell Borgeaud



Russell Borgeaud has been Australian Men's National Team Head Coach since 2005. As a former National Team player, Russell played 136 times for the Australian Men's National Team, Captaining 36 of those games, before retiring and starting his career as a coach. Borgeaud was then appointed as Head Coach of the Oueensland Academy of Sport where he recruited and developed a number of new athletes for the Junior National Teams.

In 2001, Borgeaud was approached to assist Jon Uriarte who had been appointed Head Coach of the Men's National Team. As Assistant Coach, he was involved with the 2002 FIVB World Championship and the Olympic Qualification Tournament in Tokyo that saw the Australian Team qualify for the 2004 Olympics in Athens.

Since Borgeaud's appointment as Head Coach in 200<u>5, the Australian Men's</u> National Team has gualified for the 2006 World Championship, for the third successive time. won the 2nd Commonwealth Championships held in Indian, won their first Asian Championship in 2007 and finished eighth at their first FIVB World Cup tournament.

Craig Marshall



Craig "Frog" Marshall was appointed AIS Beach National Men's Coach in November 2005. Craig comes with a lengthy association as a player of Indoor and Beach Volleyball in Queensland from 1989 to 2001, during which he then made the transition into coaching.

He has held positions as Assistant Coach at the Queensland Academy of Sport (QAS) and Head Coach of South Australian Sports Institute (SASI). Craig's International Coaching experience includes World tour since 1997, Coach of the Australian Men's Team 2001-2005 and Australian Men's Coach at Sydney 2000 and Athens 2004 Olympics.

As coach of Australia's number 1 men's' pairing Andrew Schacht and Joshua Slack, Craig has influenced their style of play as the "run-and-shoot" Beach Volleyball attack which provides a huge contrast to other teams on the world tour. The 2007 FIVB season was his team's most successful one yet, where they won Bronze at the World Championships and silver at Montreal. Finishing 12th on the FIVB 2007 rankings, the Aussie pair started the 2008 season with a bronze medal at Stare Jablonki,

In our first year our primary focus was to establish a new business entity to manage the facilities, create new Indoor and Beach competitions and to maximise court usage by various user groups.



1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial report is a general purpose financial report and it has been prepared in accordance with requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act (1991, A.C.T.), Australian Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board.

The financial report covers Australian Volleyball Federation Inc. as an individual entity. Australian Volleyball Federation Inc. is an association incorporated in the Australian Capital Territory under the Associations Incorporation Act 1991.

The financial report of Australian Volleyball Federation Inc as an individual entity complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (AIFRS) in their entirety.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the association in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies hav been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

Accounting Policies

(a) Going Concern

Notwithstanding the deficiency of net assets in the association, the financial report of the association has been prepared on a going concern basis. This basis has been applied as the association have negotiated a delayed payment arrangement with a major supplier, have set the new year budgets in a manner intended to recoup accumulated losses and return the association to a net surplus position, and management are closely monitoring cash flows with the committee on a monthly basis. These actions are expected to result in the association being in a position to pay its debts as and when they fall due.

(b) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and in hand and short-term deposits with an original maturity of three months or less plus bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown on the balance sheet as current liabilities within short term borrowings.

(c) **Employee Benefits**

Provision is made for the liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled, plus related on-costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits.

Contributions are made to employee superannuation funds and are charged as expenses when incurred. All employees are entitled to varying levels of benefits on retirement, disability or death. The superannuation plans or equivalent provide accumulated benefits. Contributions are made in accordance with the statutory requirements of each jurisdiction.

(d) **Property Plant and Equipment**

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair value less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Plant and Equipment

Plant and equipment are measured on the cost basis less depreciation and impariment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets. The recoverable amount is assessed on the basis of the expected net cash flows that will be received from the asset's employment and subsequent disposal. The expected net cash flows have been discounted to their present values in determining recoverable amounts.

Depreciation

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets is depreciated on a straight-line basis over their useful lives to the Association commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The depreciation rates used for each class of depreciable assets are:

Class of Fixed Asset	Depreciation Rate
Plant and equipment	15% - 33%

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains or losses are included in the income statement. When revalued assets are sold, amounts included in the revaluation reserve relating to that asset are transferred to retained earnings.

(e) Income Tax

The Association is a non-profit organisation and exempt from income tax under the provisions of section 11-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(f) Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the Association reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value-in-use, is compared to the asset's carrying value. Any excess of the asset's carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the Association estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the income statement. Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but only to the extent that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset. The reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in income.

(g) Financial Instruments

Recognition

Financial instruments are initially measured at cost on the trade date, which includes transaction costs, when the contractual rights or obligations exist. After initial recognition, financial instruments are measured as set out below:

Loans and Receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market and are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Held-To-Maturity Investments

These investments have fixed maturities, and it is the Association's intention to hold these investments to maturity. Any held-to-maturity investments held by the company are stated at amortised cost using the effective interest rate method.

Financial Liabilities

Non-derivative financial liabilities are recognised at amortised cost, comprising original debt less principal payments and amortisation.

Fair Value

Fair value is determined based on current bid prices for all quoted investments. Valuation techniques are applied to determine the fair value for all unlisted securities, including recent arm's length transactions, reference to similar instruments and option pricing models.

Impairment

The Association assesses at each balance date whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or group of financial assets is impaired. In the case of available-for-sale, a significant or prolonged decline in the fair value of a security below its cost is considered in determining whether the security is impaired. Impairment losses are recognised in the income statement.

(h) Creditors and Borrowings

Liabilities are recognised for amounts to be paid in the future for goods and services received on or before the reporting date. Trade accounts are settled in accordance with the vendor's terms.

(i) **Revenue**

Revenue from the rendering of a service is recognised upon the delivery of the service to the customers or members.

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking into account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

Fees received for future periods are shown in the financial statement as unearned income. All other fees including membership levies are accounted for as income at the time of receipt.

Grants are brought to account in the year in which the grant is properly expended. Grants received for the subsequent year are treated as unexpended grants. Grants received during the reporting period for specific purposes that are not fully expended at balance date are also treated as unexpended grants.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

(j) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(k) **Comparative Figures**

When required by Accounting Standards, comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to changes in presentation for the current financial year.

(l) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The committee members evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and within the group.

Key estimates - There are no key estimates for the current financial year.

Key judgements - Doubtful debts provision.

The committee members have determined that \$12,060 (2007: \$17,740) from the account receivables are considered to be doubtful.
