PHOENIX - The Suns set a new franchise record with their eighth-consecutive home loss as the Brooklyn Nets ended the first half on a 14-0 run on their way to a 116-106 win at Talking Stick Resort Arena. The Suns trailed by seven points at $52-45$ with $2: 21$ left before halftime, but the Nets scored 14 unanswered points in the final 2:09 of the second quarter to take a $66-45$ lead into the break. Brooklyn built their lead to as many as 25 points early in the fourth quarter. The Suns made a late 19-5 to cut into the Nets' lead and bring the deficit down to 10 points but it was too little, too late as the Nets dealt the Suns their eighth straight home loss and 13th overall, tying the longest single-season losing streak in franchise history. Thaddeus Young was exceptional for Brooklyn with 18 points, eight rebounds, seven steals and three blocks, just the second time an NBA player had recorded at least those numbers in a game since 1991-92. Former Net Mirza Teletovic led the Suns with a season-high 30 points, making 12 -of- 23 field goals, as Teletovic also had a season-high 11 rebounds to record his first double-double of the season.

## FEBRUARY 22, 2016



LOS ANGELES - The Suns never led as the Los Angeles Clippers dealt the Suns their largest margin of defeat of the season, winning 124-84 at Talking Stick Resort Arena. The Clippers led by 19 points after the first quarter before the Suns opened the second period on a 16-1 run to close the margin to four points. That was as close as the Suns would get, however, as the Clippers pushed their lead to 17 points at halftime, 29 points after three quarters and as many as 43 points late in the fourth quarter before arriving at the final margin of 40 points. The 40 -point differential tied for the third-largest loss in Suns franchise history and was their worst since 40 points on Nov. 28, 2012, at Detroit. J.J. Redick led the Clippers with 22 points, scoring 19 in the first half. Chris Paul ( 16 points, 14 assists) and DeAndre Jordan ( 17 points, 11 rebounds) each recorded double-doubles for Los Angeles. Archie Goodwin scored 20 points to lead the Suns as Alex Len (14), Mirza Teletovic (13) and Ronnie Price (12) each scored in double-digits as well. Phil Pressey led the Suns with 10 assists in his second game with the team.

PHOENIX - The Suns scratched and clawed to stay close to the San Antonio Spurs but could never quite get over the hump as a late Spurs run gave them a 118-111 victory at Talking Stick Resort Arena. The Spurs never trailed in the game and led by as many as 12 points but the Suns always stayed within striking distance and, with 6:22 left in the game, tied the game on a Sonny Weems' jumper, the first tie since 11-11. After Weems knotted the score, however, the Spurs went on a 7-0 run behind four points from Danny Green followed by a career-high-tying sixth three-pointer by Patty Mills to take a 107-100 lead with 4:14 remaining. The Suns only once got the margin back within one possession from that point on as the Spurs held on for a seven-point win. Alex Len led the Suns with a career-high 23 points in addition to grabbing 13 rebounds. Archie Goodwin and Mirza Teletovic each scored 14 points off the bench and Jon Leuer added 13 off the bench. Tony Parker led San Antonio with 22 points while Mills finished with 21 off the bench, making 6 -of- 9 three-pointers. LaMarcus Aldridge posted 19 points and 10 rebounds.

## TONIGHT'S OPPONENT (February 27)

- The Grizzlies have won eight straight against the Suns (last Suns win on Feb. 5, 2013) with the current eight-game winning streak over the Suns being their longest in series history (previous long was two games on six different occasions).
- The Grizzlies won all three meetings last season, sweeping the Suns for the second time in a row.
- The Grizzlies swept the series 4-0 in 2013-14, the Grizzlies' first-ever season sweep of the Suns.
- Overall, Phoenix has a 28-11 (.718) record in the Valley of the Sun against Memphis, their best home win percentage against any NBA team.
- The teams split the series 2-2 in 2012-13.
- The Suns lost the season series to the Grizzlies in 2010-11 for the first time since 2005-06, but rebounded with a season series win in 2011-12.
- The Suns have won just six of the last 21 meetings head-to-head meetings with Memphis.
- Phoenix has lost nine of its last 11 trips to Memphis. Phoenix is 20-16 on the road against the Grizzlies, including an 11-14 mark in Memphis (since 2001).
- Phoenix has won 18 of the last 34 meetings in the overall series.
- Phoenix swept the Grizzlies in the first round of the 2005 NBA Playoffs, marking the Suns' first-ever 4-0 sweep in team postseason history.

## Grizzlies 95, Suns 93

12/6/15 at FedExForum
MEMPHIS - The Suns dropped their fourth straight game by a combined total of 13 points as Jeff Green completed an alley-oop of an inbounds pass with :00.8 remaining to give the Memphis Grizzlies a $95-93$ win at FedExForum. Each team held a large lead of 10 points in the game though the Suns completed a 6-0 run to tie the game at $93-93$ with :11.9 remaining after Alex Len tipped in a missed free throw by Jon Leuer. Mike Conley's attempt at a go-ahead layup with : 02.1 to play was initially ruled a goaltending violation but a review confirmed that it was a legal block by Len, giving the Suns the ball with a chance to win. The Suns turned the ball over on their inbounds attempt, however, setting the stage for Green's heroics. It marked the second straight contest between the Suns and Grizzlies with Green providing the go-ahead points in the final five seconds as he completed a three-point play in Memphis' 102-101 win in Phoenix on Feb. 2, 2015. Eric Bledsoe led the Suns with 23 points and six assists while Leuer posted a double-double with 10 points and 11 rebounds. Marc Gasol led Memphis with 22 points.

## CHARLOTTE HORNETS (29-27)

- The Suns have won two straight, including the first meeting this season, and have won seven of the last eight games.
- The Hornets won the first meeting last season in Phoenix snapping a five-game winning streak by the Suns in the series, including both meetings in each of the previous two seasons. The five straight wins followed a four-game series losing streak by the Suns, their longest since the series began in 1988-89.
- Last season marked the return of the series between the Suns and the Charlotte Hornets, as the Hornets changed their name from the Bobcats. The record books have been reconfigured so the series between the two teams recognizes each game against professional teams in Charlotte (Hornets 1988-2002, 2014-and Bobcats 2004-14).
- The Suns were 17-12 against the first iteration of the Charlotte Hornets, 14-5 against the team as the Charlotte Bobcats and 2-1 against the second iteration.
- These two teams split the season series in 2008-09 and 2014-15, the only times it was not a sweep since 2004-05.
- Phoenix won the first four meetings all-time and 10 of the first 12 against the Hornets, and first eight overall against the team as the Bobcats.
- On Jan. 15, 1990, Tom Chambers scored a series-high 40 point for the Suns.
- The Suns have scored at least 100 points in 39 of 51 meetings all-time.

## LAST REGULAR SEASON MEETING

## Suns 111, Hornets 102 <br> 1/6/16 at Talking Stick Resort Arena

PHOENIX - The Suns snapped a nine-game losing streak by using an outstanding three-point shooting performance to beat the Charlotte Hornets 111-102 at Talking Stick Resort Arena. The Suns made a season-high 19 three-pointers, tied for the fourth-most in a game in team history, on just 33 attempts as six different players made multiple shots from long distance. The Suns led by one points at 37-36 in the third quarter before going on a 13-0 run to take a 14 -point lead with 5:06 left in the half. The Suns led by eight at halftime though Charlotte rallied to take a five-point lead late in the third quarter. Mirza Teletovic, however, made two three-pointers in the final 32 seconds of the third quarter to give the Suns a one-point lead heading into the final frame. The Suns led the entire fourth quarter and the Hornets never got within one possession after the Suns took a 90-85 lead with 11:22 to play. Teletovic led the Suns with 19 points as Devin Booker and T.J. Warren added 17 apiece off the bench. Booker also had a career-high 10 rebounds for his first career double-double. Kemba Walker led Charlotte with 25 points.

## team notes

- The Suns have lost eight straight home games, the longest home skid in franchise history (prev. seven from March 20-April 7, 2013) and have lost 13 consecutive overall, matching the longest streak in a single-season in team history. The longest overall streak of 14 games began with a loss in the season finale on April 21, 1996, then continued through the first 13 games of the 1996-97 season before ending on Nov. 26.
- The Suns are 7-5 this season against opponents playing the second of a back-to-back. The Suns play 19 such games this season, including $\mathbf{1 3}$ at home, with the next such game coming on Feb. 27 vs. Memphis.
- On Feb. 1, the Suns named EARL WATSON interim head coach as the former 13-year NBA player who was in his first season as a Suns assistant coach became the 17th head coach in franchise history.
- Nine of the Suns' 10 games in February come at home. This is just the third time in franchise history the Suns have played nine home games in the year's shortest month, also doing so in 1994-95 and 2013-14.
- The Suns rank 21st in the NBA with $\mathbf{1 0 0 . 5}$ points per game, 6th with a three-point percentage of $\mathbf{3 6 . 1}$ percent, t-9th with 9.1 three-point makes per game, 7 th with $\mathbf{1 4 . 2}$ fast break points per game, $\mathbf{t}$ - $\mathbf{1 2}$ th with $\mathbf{8 . 1 4}$ steals per game and $\mathbf{4}$ th with a pace of $\mathbf{1 0 0 . 5}$ possessions per 48 minutes.
- The Suns rank 8th forcing opponents into 15.5 turnovers per game and 12th with $\mathbf{1 6 . 8}$ points off turnovers per game.
- The Suns have 27 games with 10+ three-point makes (last vs. Houston on Feb. 19); Golden State (46), Houston (35), Charlotte (32), Portland (32), Cleveland (30), Dallas (27), L.A. Clippers (27) and Atlanta (28) are the only others with that many. The Suns are 10-17 in these games.
- The Suns rank 6th in the NBA with $\mathbf{3 8 . 5}$ points per game scored by players coming off the bench.
- The Suns rank $\mathbf{2 n d}$ in the NBA with 4.3 three-pointers per game by players off the bench with those players $\mathbf{2 n d}$ by shooting $\mathbf{3 8 . 8} \mathbf{8}$ percent from deep.
- The Suns are 13-18 this season when scoring 100+ points and 1-26 when held below the century mark.
- When shooting 50 percent or better from the field since the start of 2013-14, the Suns are 43-7 (last, loss on Feb. 8 vs. Oklahoma City; 50.7\%).
- When shooting 50 percent or better from three-point range since the start of 2013-14, the Suns are 17-1 (last, Jan. 6 vs. Charlotte; 57.6\%).
- The Suns have played 10 of $\mathbf{1 4}$ back-to-back sets this season. The Suns are 2-8 in the first game and 2-8 in the second game of back-to-backs this season with one sweep. The Suns went 10-8 in the first game and 6-12 in the second game of back-to-backs last season. The 14 games having played the previous day will be the fewest on zero days rest in team history (prev. 16 in 1982-83 and 2010-11).
- The Suns had a season-long seven straight home games from Feb. 2-21, tied for the second-longest streak in franchise history. The longest is eight straight in 2014-15, with seven-gamers also coming in 1982-83, 1992-93 and 2009-10. The Suns play five straight at home heading into the All-Star break followed by the first two games after the break.
- The Suns ended a then season-long nine-game skid against Charlotte on Jan. 6; last season the Suns ended a season-long six-game losing streak at Charlotte (Dec. 17) which started a season-long six-game winning streak.
- With 18 games in the month of December, the Suns played at least 18 games in a month for the first time since playing 18 in March 1999 , the first time in a non-shortened season since playing 18 in March 1990 and for the first time in December since playing 18 in December 1968.
- The Suns went 2-4 on a season-long six-game road trip from Nov. 29-Dec. 7. The Suns traveled from Phoenix to Toronto to Brooklyn to Detroit to Washington to Memphis to Chicago and back to Phoenix on the trip, covering 5,770 total miles, or the length of over 324,000 basketball courts.
- The Suns are scheduled to appear on national TV a total of 12 times, including two games on TNT, two games on ESPN and eight games on NBA TV. PLAYER NOTES
- MIRZA TELETOVIC has scored at least 13 points in eight straight games (his longest career double-digit scoring streak), coming off the bench in each; this marks the longest streak by a Suns reserve scoring 13+ points since Markieff Morris (10 straight) in 2013-14. Over his last eight games, which include a season-high $\mathbf{3 0}$ points vs. Brooklyn on Feb. 25, Teletovic is averaging $\mathbf{1 7 . 9}$ points on $\mathbf{4 9 . 0}$ percent shooting.
- MIRZA TELETOVIC has scored in double-digits in a career-long eight straight games after doing so in his previous long of seven from Dec. 31 -Jan. 15 earlier this season; he is averaging $\mathbf{1 4 . 0}$ points in $\mathbf{2 2}$ games since that first streak began on Dec. 31.
- TYSON CHANDLER has double-digit rebounds in nine of his 14 games since Jan. 19, averaging $\mathbf{1 1 . 3}$ rebounds over this span. In games since Jan. 19, only DeAndre Jordan, Andre Drummond, Karl-Anthony Towns, Hassan Whiteside, Julius Randle, DeMarcus Cousins are averaging more rebounds.
- PHIL PRESSEY recorded 10 assists at L.A. Clippers on Feb. 22, becoming the fifth different Suns player this season with 10+ assists in a game (BRANDON KNIGHT-4, ERIC BLEDSOE-2, ARCHIE GOODWIN-1, DEVIN BOOKER-1); the last time at least five Suns had games of 10+ assists in the same season was 1994-95 when Kevin Johnson (16), Elliot Perry (4), Danny Ainge (1), Dan Majerle (1) and Danny Manning (1) each did so.
- ALEX LEN had a career-high $\mathbf{2 3}$ points as well as 13 rebounds in 24 minutes starting against San Antonio on Feb. 21. In Len's last six starts, he has recorded three double-doubles, averaging 13.2 points and 9.3 rebounds.
- ARCHIE GOODWIN scored in double-digits in a career-long eight straight from Feb. 2-22, averaging $\mathbf{1 7 . 3}$ points over this span. Goodwin also scored in double-digits in four straight from Jan. 21-27, including 20+ in the first three of those four. Over his last $\mathbf{1 5}$ since Jan. 21, he has scored 20+ seven times and is averaging $\mathbf{1 5 . 3}$ points, 4.1 free throws on $\mathbf{5 . 0}$ attempts ( $\mathbf{8 1 . 3 \%}$ ), $\mathbf{3 . 8}$ assists and $\mathbf{3 3 . 2}$ minutes.
- Now with a game with 30+ points (Jan. 19), a game with 10+ rebounds (Jan. 6) and a game with 10+ assists (Feb. 10), DEVIN BOOKER joins LeBron James as the only players in NBA history to record a game of each before turning 20 years old. Booker, Kevin Johnson, Ron Lee and Alvan Adams are the only players in Suns history to record at least one game of each as a rookie.
- DEVIN BOOKER has averaged 14.3 points in 27 starts this season. The only rookies to hold as high a higher scoring average in games they've started are Jahlil Okafor (17.7), Karl-Anthony Towns (17.3) and Myles Turner (14.3). Among Suns rookies with 20+ starts since 1993-94, only Michael Finley ( 15.5 in 72 starts in 1995-96) and Amar'e Stoudemire (14.4 in 71 starts in 2002-03) have averaged more in the games in which they have started.
- Currently shooting $\mathbf{3 9 . 6}$ percent from three-point territory and $\mathbf{8 3 . 1}$ percent from the free throw line, DEVIN BOOKER qualifies for the NBA leaderboard in each category. In NBA history, the qualified rookies to shoot over $\mathbf{4 0 . 0}$ percent from long range and $\mathbf{8 0 . 0}$ percent from the stripe that Booker is just shy of joining are Stephen Curry, D.J. Augustin, Ben Gordon, Drazen Petrovic, Hersey Hawkins and Larry Bird (Basketball-Reference).
- DEVIN BOOKER is averaging 10.5 points per game, the highest by a Suns rookie since Amar'e Stoudemire (13.5) in 2002-03. Booker currently joins Stoudemire, Michael Finley (15.0 in 1995-96), Wesley Person (10.4 in 1994-95), Walter Davis (24.2 in 1977-78), Ron Lee (10.2 in 1976-77), Alvan Adams (19.0 in 1975-76), Mike Bantom (10.1 in 1973-74) and Gary Gregor (11.1 in 1968-69) as the only qualified rookies to average at least 10.0 points in franchise history.
- ARCHIE GOODWIN is averaging 6.5 free throw attempts per 36 minutes played; among NBA players to play at least 500 total minutes this season, he ranks t-20th in the NBA in free throw attempts per minute.
- Through 58 team games this season, MIRZA TELETOVIC has 119 three-point makes in a reserve role (most in the NBA); he is on pace to surpass the Suns record for most three-pointers in a season off the bench of 150 set by Danny Ainge in 1992-93.
- BRANDON KNIGHT is one of nine qualified NBA players averaging at least $\mathbf{1 9 . 0}$ points, $\mathbf{5 . 0}$ assists and $\mathbf{1 . 3}$ steals this season along with Oklahoma City's Russell Westbrook, Houston's James Harden, Golden State's Stephen Curry, Toronto's Kyle Lowry, Washington's John Wall, Charlotte's Kemba Walker, L.A. Clippers' Chris Paul and Cleveland's LeBron James. Goran Dragic in 2013-14 and Stephon Marbury in 2002-03 are the only Suns to exceed these averages for a season since 1997-98.
- BRANDON KNIGHT has three quarters scoring 17+ points this season; only Stephen Curry (14), Klay Thompson (7), Anthony Davis (6), Paul George (5), James Harden (5), Damian Lillard (4), LeBron James (3), Russell Westbrook (3), Kemba Walker (3) and Jimmy Butler (3) also have at least three 17+ point quarters in the NBA this season.
- JON LEUER scored in double-digits in eight consecutive games from Dec. 2-16, the longest streak of his career (prev. seven from Dec. 7-18, 2013, with Memphis). In his last $\mathbf{2 9}$ games since that streak began on Dec. 2, Leuer is averaging $\mathbf{1 0 . 2}$ points on $\mathbf{5 0 . 4}$ percent shooting, in addition to $\mathbf{5 . 9}$ rebounds.
- JON LEUER is averaging career-highs of $\mathbf{8 . 7}$ points and $\mathbf{5 . 5}$ rebounds and has already recorded six double-doubles this season; entering the season, Leuer had two double-doubles in his career. Leuer also has 35 three-point makes already this season; he had 33 in his career entering the season.
- DEVIN BOOKER scored 10+ points in 11 straight games from Jan. 17-Feb. 6, the longest streak by a Suns rookie since Michael Finley did so in 23 straight from Jan. 11-Feb. 25, 1996. Booker also scored 15+ in six straight from Jan. 27-Feb. 6, matching Finley (Dec. 1-12, 1995) for the longest by a Suns rookie since Richard Dumas in eight straight from Feb. 11-28, 1993.
- In games played in January, DEVIN BOOKER ranked 1st among all NBA rookies with 17.3 points per game, 1st with 1.8 three-point makes per game and 1st with 3.5 free throw makes per game. Among all NBA rookies and sophomores in January, only Minnesota's Andrew Wiggins (19.9) and Utah's Rodney Hood (18.6) had as high a scoring average. Averaging 17.3 points over 14 games in January, DEVIN BOOKER posted the highest scoring average by a Suns rookie in a month since Richard Dumas averaged $\mathbf{2 0 . 8}$ points over 13 games in February 1993.
- With 27 rebounds vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23 and 20 vs. San Antonio on Jan. 21, according to the Elias Sports Bureau, TYSON CHANDLER became the first player in Suns history to record back-to-back games with $\mathbf{2 0 +}$ rebounds. This was the second such streak of Chandler's career as he did so in three straight with New York from Feb. 1-4, 2013. Andre Drummond (Oct. 30-Nov. 3) is the only other NBA player to do so in two straight this season.
- TYSON CHANDLER had 14+ rebounds in three straight from Jan. 19-23, the first Sun to do so since Amar'e Stoudemire in 2006-07.
- Against Indiana on Jan. 19, DEVIN BOOKER scored a career-high 32 points, setting a Suns rookie record with six made three-pointers. Booker became the third-youngest player in NBA history to record his first 30-point game at 19 years, 81 days old and became the youngest to make at least six threepointers in a game (Basketball-Reference). Much more on Booker's career night on page 7 of the notes under "Notable Individual Performances."
- MIRZA TELETOVIC made at least three three-pointers off the bench in five straight games from Jan. 3-15, matching a five-game streak by Isaiah Thomas last season for the longest by a Suns bench player since Dan Majerle did so in seven straight from Jan. 11-24, 1995 (Basketball-Reference).
- In his first $\mathbf{2 0}$ NBA games, DEVIN BOOKER made $\mathbf{1 7}$ of his first $\mathbf{2 3}$ three-point attempts, $\mathbf{7 3 . 9}$ percent. In NBA history, this was the highest three-point percentage by any NBA player in his first $\mathbf{2 0}$ career games who averaged one-plus attempt (Basketball-Reference).
- Over his last 35 games, BRANDON KNIGHT has set then surpassed his career-high in scoring, set a career-high in assists, tied then reset his career-high in three-pointers, tied his career-high in steals, recorded his first career triple-double, his first two career 30-point/10-rebound games and four doubledoubles. Over this $\mathbf{3 5}$-game stretch, Knight is averaging $\mathbf{2 0 . 1}$ points, $\mathbf{5 . 3}$ assists, $\mathbf{3 . 6}$ rebounds, $\mathbf{2 . 0}$ three-pointers and $\mathbf{1 . 3}$ steals per game.
- BRANDON KNIGHT recorded his 1,000th career rebound on the play that gave him his first career triple-double vs. L.A. Lakers on Nov. 16. Knight, who turned 24 on Dec. 2, became the $\mathbf{2 2 n d}$ player in NBA history to record $\mathbf{4 , 0 0 0}$ career points, $\mathbf{1 , 0 0 0}$ assists and 1,000 rebounds before turning 24 . Joe Johnson is the only other player to do so who played for the Suns before his 24 th birthday. Alvan Adams was three assists shy of the mark at that age. SO YOUNG, SO GOOD
- DEVIN BOOKER scored 15 points vs. Golden State on Feb. 10 at an age of 19 years, 103 days, his 17th game with 15+ points. Booker, Kobe Bryant, LeBron James, and Kevin Durant are the only players in NBA history with at least this many games of 15+ points by this age. Each of the previous three would go on to be named All-NBA First Team multiple times. Also with one game of $\mathbf{3 0 +}$ points, Booker, Durant and James are the only players to record at least one game with $\mathbf{3 0 +}$ points by this age. - TYSON CHANDLER ranks t-21st among league leaders with 8.4 rebounds per game.
- On the NBA leaderboard for the season, DEVIN BOOKER ranks t-23rd shooting $\mathbf{3 9 . 6}$ percent and MIRZA TELETOVIC ranks $\mathbf{1 6 t h}$ shooting $\mathbf{4 0 . 7}$ percent from three-point territory.
- Among forwards and centers, only Paul George (155), Trevor Ariza (132) and Kevin Durant (126) have made as many three-pointers this season as MIRZA TELETOVIC (121).
- Among qualified NBA players to make a majority of their appearances off the bench, MIRZA TELETOVIC is $\mathbf{t}$ - $\mathbf{1}$ st with $\mathbf{2 . 2}$ three-pointers per game and 7th shooting $\mathbf{4 0 . 7}$ percent from deep, in addition to t-15th with $\mathbf{1 0 . 8}$ points per game. Teletovic is $\mathbf{1 s t}$ in the NBA with $\mathbf{1 1 9}$ total threes off the bench.
- DEVIN BOOKER ranks 2nd among rookies, shooting 39.6 from three-point range (61-of-154) (1st: Raul Neto).
- Among rookies, DEVIN BOOKER ranks 7th in scoring average, 9th in field goal percentage, 2nd in three-point percentage and 3rd in free throw percentage.
- MIRZA TELETOVIC ranks t-14th with $\mathbf{2 . 2}$ and BRANDON KNIGHT ranks $\mathbf{t - 1 8 t h}$ in the NBA with $\mathbf{2 . 1}$ three-point makes per game. Knight made a three in the first 22 games to start the season, surpassing Channing Frye (21) in 2009-10 for the most games making a three to start a season by a Suns player, before not making one in Game 23.

- TYSON CHANDLER ranks 8th among active players and 52nd in NBA history with 8,956 career rebounds. The next to pass: No. 51 Larry Bird (8,974).
- TYSON CHANDLER is 7th among active players and 51st in NBA history with 1,239 career blocks. The next to pass: No. 50 James Donaldson (1,267).
- TYSON CHANDLER has a career field goal percentage of $58.9 \%$, second-highest in NBA history among those with at least 2,000 makes trailing only Hall of Famer Artis Gilmore. Below is a look at the top five of all-time, three of which played for the Suns at some point in their careers.

## CHANDLER'S RECORD-SETTING NIGHT

- TYSON CHANDLER tied a Suns franchise record with his 27 rebounds vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23, matching Paul Silas' 27-rebound game on Jan. 18 , 1971 vs. Cincinnati in Omaha that had stood unreached as the Suns record for $\mathbf{4 5}$ years and five days. Chandler finished one shy of his career-high of 28 rebounds as this was his second-highest career rebounding game.
- TYSON CHANDLER set a new Suns franchise record with his 13 offensive rebounds vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23, surpassing the previous mark of $\mathbf{1 2}$ by Charles Barkley (Nov. 7, 1992 vs. L.A. Clippers) and Curtis Perry (Nov. 18, 1976 at Golden State). Chandler also passed the NBA season-high of 11 offensive rebounds which had happened three times, most recently by Cleveland's Tristan Thompson on Dec. 17. Chandler also set a new career-high with his 13 offensive boards, besting two 12-offensive rebound games, most recently with the Hornets at Portland on Dec. 17, 2007.
- TYSON CHANDLER also had a season-high five assists and scored 13 points to record his sixth double-double of the season vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23. Chandler joined Kevin Love, Tim Duncan, Charles Barkley (playing for Houston) and Dennis Rodman as the only players since 1985-86 to record games of at least 13 points, 27 rebounds and five assists (Basketball-Reference). Of those five performances, Chandler is the only one to also record multiple blocked shots (two).


## NOTABLE TEAM PERFORMANCES

- On Feb. 19, the Suns (35) and Rockets (56) shot a combined 91 free throw attempts, the most in an NBA game this season, surpassing the previous high of 90 in a four-overtime game between Detroit and Chicago. The Rockets' 56 attempts were their most in a game since 1971 and the most by a Suns opponent in a game since Portland shot 59 on Jan. 28, 1988.
- The Suns shot 30-of-32 (a season-high 93.8 percent) from the free throw line vs. Houston on Feb. 4. The last time the Suns missed two free throws or fewer on at least 32 attempts was on Jan. 29, 2014, when they also shot 30-of-32 in a win at Milwaukee.
- All five of the Suns' starters (Archie Goodwin, Devin Booker, P.J. Tucker, Alex Len, Tyson Chandler) scored 13+ points vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23, the first time all five Suns starters have done so since Feb. 7, 2012 (Steve Nash, Jared Dudley, Grant Hill, Channing Frye, Marcin Gortat) in a win at Milwaukee.
- The Suns shot 27 -of-29 (93.1 percent) from the free-throw line vs. Indiana on Jan. 19; this marked the highest free-throw percentage on at least 29 attempts by the Suns since shooting 30-of-32 (93.8 percent) at Milwaukee on Jan. 29, 2014.
- The Suns made a season-high 19 three-pointers on $\mathbf{3 3}$ attempts ( $\mathbf{5 7 . 6}$ percent) vs. Charlotte on Jan. 6. This tied for the fourth-most three-point makes in a game in Suns history and marked their most since making a franchise record 22 on Nov. 14, 2010 at the L.A. Lakers. Of the six games all-time that the Suns have made at least 19 three-pointers, their $\mathbf{5 7 . 6}$ percent mark from three-point range on Jan. 6 is their third-highest.
- Against Charlotte on Jan. 6, three different Suns reserves (Devin Booker, Mirza Teletovic, T.J. Warren) each made at least three three-pointers, just the second time in franchise history three bench players made at least three triples in a game (also Dec. 9, 2014 vs. Miami by Anthony Tolliver, Gerald Green, Marcus Morris). Booker, Teletovic and Warren each scored at least 17 points as well, marking the first time in Suns history that three reserves have each scored in double-digits and made at least three long balls in the same game (Basketball-Reference).
- JEFF HORNACEK reached 100 wins as an NBA head coach (all with the Suns) on Jan. 6 vs. Charlotte. Hornacek became the eighth coach in Suns history to reach the century mark in wins, joining John MacLeod, Cotton Fitzsimmons, Paul Westphal, Danny Ainge, Scott Skiles, Mike D'Antoni and Alvin Gentry. Hornacek also became the eighth person in NBA history to record at least 100 wins as a head coach and 100 Win Shares as a player, joining Bill Russell, Jerry West, Larry Bird, Dolph Schayes, Kevin McHale, Wes Unseld and Maurice Cheeks (Basketball-Reference).
- The Suns lost two straight games from Dec. 31-Jan. 2 despite shooting at least 50 percent from the field in each; the previous time the Suns lost consecutive games despite making at least half their field goals was two straight games from March 10-12, 2009.
- Against the Suns on Jan. 2, Sacramento scored 142 points, the most by a Suns opponent in a regulation game since Chicago scored 155 on Dec. 4,1990 and in any game since Washington scored 144 in an overtime game on Dec. 22, 2006, and shot $\mathbf{6 0 . 9}$ percent from the field, the first Suns opponent to exceed 60 percent shooting since Dallas did so on April 5, 2009.
- The Suns limited New Orleans to just 26 made field goals on Dec. 18, the fewest by a Suns opponent since Portland was held to 25 on Jan. $6,2012$.
- Against Minnesota on Dec. 13, the Suns had season-highs with 25 opponent turnovers and 16 steals. The Suns converted these into 43 points off turnovers; according to the Elias Sports Bureau, this is the most points off turnovers the Suns have recorded in a game since the stat was first kept in 1998. The last NBA team with at least 43 points off turnovers in a game was Milwaukee (47) at Philadelphia on April 13, 2015.
- The Suns had seven straight games been decided by five points or fewer from Nov. 29-Dec. 9. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, this was the first time in franchise history that the Suns have had seven consecutive games decided within five points. The previous time any NBA team had seven straight decided by five or less was the New Orleans Hornets in seven straight from Dec. 30, 2009-Jan. 11, 2010.
- The Suns erased a 16-point deficit to start the fourth quarter to win at Chicago on Dec. 7; it was the second-largest deficit to start the fourth quarter overcome in franchise history (18 points at Dallas on March 2, 1997). The Suns scored a season-low 10 points in the third quarter but followed that with a season-high $\mathbf{4 2}$ points in the fourth quarter. It marked the first time in franchise history that the Suns have scored $\mathbf{1 0}$ points or fewer in one quarter then scored 40 points or more in the following period (Basketball-Reference).
- The Suns scored a season-high 28 second chance points at Chicago on Dec. 7, with the most pivotal coming on Mirza Teletovic's game-winning fadeaway with :00.3 left after grabbing a rebound. It marked the Suns' most second chance points since recording 32 vs. New York on March $28,2014$.
- The Suns lost four straight games by a combined 13 points from Dec. 1-6. This is the Suns' first four-game-plus losing streak with each game decided by five points or fewer since a four-game streak from Nov. 26-Dec. 2, 1983 (Basketball-Reference).
- The Suns made 10+ threes in six straight games from Nov. 25-Dec. 4, the third-longest streak in team history and longest since doing so in a team record nine straight from March 23-April 8, 2005.
- Five Suns players (Brandon Knight, Eric Bledsoe, Jon Leuer, Devin Booker, Mirza Teletovic) each scored at least 18 points at Detroit on Dec. 2, marking the first time five Suns scored at least that many points in a game since Oct. 30, 2009, when Steve Nash, Amar'e Stoudemire, Grant Hill, Leandro Barbosa and Channing Frye each did so against Golden State (Basketball-Reference).
- The Suns' bench outscored Toronto's 51-25 in the win on Nov. 29; Mirza Teletovic (20), Jon Leuer (16) and T.J. Warren (15) combined for all 51 points as they became the first Suns trio to each score at least 15 points off the bench in the same game since Isaiah Thomas (19), Gerald Green (26) and Alex Len (17) at L.A. Clippers on Nov. 15, 2014.
- According to STATS LLC, twice this season the Suns have had eight different players make a three-pointer in a game (Nov. 4 and Nov. 22); prior to this season, this had only happened three times in team history (twice in 2014-15, once in 2007-08).
- The Suns made 15+ three-pointers in two straight games (Nov. 20-22) for just the fourth time in team history (last Dec. 8-9, 2014).
- The Suns came back from 17 points to win at Denver on Nov. 20; their largest comeback since 17 points at Charlotte on Dec. $17,2014$.
- With a 19-point win vs. the L.A. Lakers on Nov. 16, the Suns won three straight games by at least 14 points from Nov. 12-16, their first time doing so since winning four straight by at least 14 from Nov. 22-29, 2009.
- On Nov. 14, the Suns beat the Nuggets by 24 points, their largest victory since a 26-point win at Philadelphia (122-96) on Nov. 21, 2014.
- The Suns led by 32 points (60-28) at halftime on Nov. 14 against Denver, tied for their fourth-largest halftime lead in team history (largest since Feb. 17, 2009). The 28 points allowed tied for the third-fewest allowed in the first half of a game in franchise history (fewest since Jan. 12, 2002).
- The Suns' 37-point lead in the fourth quarter vs. Denver on Nov. 14 was the team's largest since a 38-point lead vs. New York on March 26, 2010.
- The Suns shot a season-best $\mathbf{5 4 . 2}$ percent from the field (45-of-83) against Sacramento on Nov. 4.
- The Suns shot a season-high 60.9 percent from the three-point line (14-of-23) against Sacramento on Nov. 4. This marked the Suns' sixth time ever shooting at least 60 percent from long range on 23+ attempts and first since March 2, 2014 against Atlanta (.625, 15-of-24).


## NOTABLE INDIVIDUAL PERFORMANCES

- MIRZA TELETOVIC scored a season-high $\mathbf{3 0}$ points and grabbed a season-high $\mathbf{1 1}$ rebounds in $\mathbf{3 0}$ minutes vs. his former team in Brooklyn on Feb. 25, his second career 30-point game and fourth career double-double. The performance also extended his double-digit scoring streak to a career-long eight games. Teletovic joined Marcus Morris, Danny Manning and Dan Majerle as the only Suns reserves with games of 30+ points and 10+ rebounds since 1983-84. Playing just 30 minutes, Teletovic joined Sacramento's DeMarcus Cousins (Jan. 9 vs. Golden State) as the only players in the NBA in 2015-16 with $30+$ points and 10+ boards while playing 30 minutes or less. The last Suns to do before Teletovic was Amar'e Stoudemire on March 3, 2010 at the L.A. Clippers (Basketball-Reference).
- PHIL PRESSEY, standing at 5-11, had three blocks in his Suns debut against San Antonio on Feb. 21; Pressey became the first NBA player shorter than 60 to record at least three blocks since Chicago's Nate Robinson had three vs. Charlotte on Jan. 28, 2013 (Basketball-Reference).
- KRIS HUMPHRIES made his Suns debut on Feb. 19 vs. Houston and posted his first double-double of the season with 18 points and 12 rebounds. Humphries became the 13th player in franchise history to record a double-double in his Suns debut joining: Gail Goodrich, George Wilson, Connie Hawkins, Alvan Adams, Gar Heard, Maurice Lucas, Charles Barkley, Tom Gugliotta, Shawn Marion, Stephon Marbury, Luis Scola and Miles Plumlee.
- DEVIN BOOKER set a career-high with 10 assists in addition to scoring 15 points and grabbing seven rebounds vs. Golden State on Feb. 10. Booker became the second-youngest player in NBA history to record his first points-assists double-double at 19 years, 103 days with only LeBron James recording his first at a younger age (18 years, 355 days). Booker became the first Suns rookie with a points-assists double-double since Steve Nash on Nov. 14, 1996, at Vancouver.
- ARCHIE GOODWIN had his first double-double with 18 points and 12 dimes vs. Toronto on Feb. 2; Goodwin (21 years, 169 days) became the secondyoungest Suns player to ever record a points-assists double-double with only Alvan Adams recording his first at a younger age ( 21 years, 132 days). Eight days after Goodwin, DEVIN BOOKER (19 years, 103 days) recorded his first while younger than Adams with $\mathbf{1 5}$ points and $\mathbf{1 0}$ assists vs. Golden State on Feb. 10.
- ALEX LEN grabbed a career-high 18 rebounds vs. Houston on Feb. 4. Along with TYSON CHANDLER's multiple games with $18+$ rebounds this season, Len and Chandler became the first Suns teammates to each have a game of 18+ rebounds in a season since 2007-08 when Amar'e Stoudemire, Shawn Marion and Shaquille O'Neal all did so.
- MARKIEFF MORRIS set season-highs in points, rebounds and assists and tied a season-high in blocks with $\mathbf{3 0}$ points, $\mathbf{1 1}$ rebounds, six assists and two blocks on Feb. 2. Morris became the first Sun to exceed those amounts in those categories since Amar'e Stoudemire in 2008-09. Morris, Stoudemire (twice), Shawn Marion, Charles Barkley (six times) and Larry Nance (twice) are the only Suns to post games with those totals since 1985-86.
- DEVIN BOOKER's 14-point performance in the season opener tied for the fourth-highest scoring output by a Suns player making his league debut in team history and tied for the second-highest by a Sun making his debut in a season opener. By shooting 6-of-7 from the field, Booker had the most field goal attempts with zero or one missed ever by a Sun in his first career game. JORDAN MCRAE made his NBA debut on Jan. 29 at New York, scoring 12 points on 4 -of- 9 shooting, tied for the ninth-highest scoring league debut by a Sun. A closer look at the best NBA debuts by Suns players:

- ARCHIE GOODWIN scored 20 of his 26 points in the fourth quarter at Philadelphia on Jan. 26, matching Brandon Knight (Nov. 25 vs. New Orleans) for the Suns season-high in a quarter which are the Suns' first 20-point quarters since Gerald Green ( 25 points, third quarter) vs. OKC on March 6, 2014.
- ARCHIE GOODWIN made his first career game-winning field goal vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23, hitting a three-pointer to take a 98 -95 lead that left just :00.1 on the clock. Prior to Goodwin's shot against the Hawks, the last Suns' go-ahead field goal that left one-tenth of a second or less on the clock was Channing Frye's 23 -foot two-pointer at the overtime buzzer to give the Suns a 110-108 overtime win at Indiana on Feb. 27, 2011.
- TYSON CHANDLER tied a Suns franchise record with 27 rebounds (Paul Silas, 1971) and set a Suns franchise record with 13 offensive rebounds vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23. Much more on Chandler's record-setting night can be found on page 6 of the notes.
- TYSON CHANDLER ( 13 points, 27 rebounds) and ALEX LEN ( 16 points, 12 rebounds) each had points-rebounds double-doubles vs. Atlanta on Jan. 23. Chandler and Len also each had season-highs of five assists becoming the first Suns teammates to have $\mathbf{1 0 +}$ points, $\mathbf{1 0 +}$ rebounds and $\mathbf{5 +}$ assists in the same game since Jason Kidd and Shawn Marion did so on Dec. 23, 2000, vs. Denver.
- The Suns' four leading scorers vs. San Antonio on Jan. 21 were the four first-round picks from the past three drafts on the roster as DEVIN BOOKER (No. 13 in 2015) had 24 points, ARCHIE GOODWIN (No. 29 in 2013) had 20, T.J. WARREN (No. 14 in 2014) had 18 and ALEX LEN (No. 5 in 2013) had 13.
- TYSON CHANDLER posted his 27th career game with 20+ rebounds, grabbing $\mathbf{2 0}$ vs. San Antonio on Jan. 21; the $\mathbf{2 0}$ rebounds tied Miles Plumlee on Dec. 23, 2013, for the most by a Suns player since Amar'e Stoudemire had 21 rebounds on Dec. 5, 2009.
- DEVIN BOOKER recorded a career-high 32 points on 9 -of- 16 shooting, including 6 -of- $\mathbf{1 1}$ from the three-point line and 8 -of- 8 from the free-throw line, setting career-highs in makes for all three shot types on Jan. 19 vs. Indiana. Scoring 32 points at an age of 19 years and 81 days, Booker is the thirdyoungest player ever to record a 30-point game; the only younger are LeBron James, who had recorded 1130 -point games by 19 years, 81 days, and Kevin Durant who did so three times by that age (Basketball-Reference). Booker's 32 points marked the most by a rookie in the NBA this season (prev. 29 by New York's Kristaps Porzingis on Nov. 17 vs. Charlotte) and the most by a Suns rookie since Amar'e Stoudemire scored 38 on Dec. 30, 2002 at Minnesota as Booker became the ninth different rookie in Suns history to record a game of $30+$ points, joining Stoudemire (1), Richard Dumas (2), Cedric Ceballos (2), Kevin Johnson (1), Walter Davis (17), Ron Lee (2), Alvan Adams (6) and Dennis Layton (1).
- With his six made three-pointers vs. Indiana on Jan. 19, DEVIN BOOKER set a new Suns rookie record surpassing the previous high of five accomplished once by Casey Jacobsen in 2002-03 and three times by Wesley Person in 1994-95. At 19 years, 81 days, Booker became the youngest player ever to make at least six three-pointers in a game; the previous youngest was New Orleans' J.R. Smith on March 26, 2005, when he made six three-pointers at an age of 19 years, 198 days (Basketball-Reference).
- Three different Suns recorded 10+ rebounds on Jan. 19 vs. Indiana (TYSON CHANDLER-14, ALEX LEN-12, P.J. TUCKER-10), the first time this season at least three Suns have done so in the same game and first time since March 19, 2015.
- DEVIN BOOKER scored 17 points ( $7-13$ FG, 3-5 3FG) and reeled in a career-high 10 rebounds vs. Charlotte on Jan. 6. In recording his first doubledouble, Booker became the youngest Suns player to ever record one (previously Amar'e Stoudemire) and also joined Bradley Beal (twice) as the only teenaged guards since at least 1985-86 to post games of at least 17 points and 10 rebounds (Basketball-Reference).
- BRYCE COTTON made his Suns debut on Dec. 30 as the Tucson native became the second Arizona-born player in Suns history (Bernard Thompson).
- TYSON CHANDLER had 10 points and 10 rebounds in just 15 minutes vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 26 ; since 1985-86, this is the fewest minutes played by a Suns player who recorded a double-double, three minutes fewer than the 18 minutes Shaquille O'Neal played when posting 10 points and 10 rebounds at Minnesota on April 11, 2009 (Basketball-Reference).
- RONNIE PRICE scored a career-high 20 points on $\mathbf{7 - o f - 1 3}$ field goals and $\mathbf{6}$-of-9 three-pointers in his $\mathbf{4 9 7}$ th career game vs. Denver on Dec. 23 . It marked Price's first career game of $\mathbf{2 0 +}$ points; the last NBA player to have his first career 20+ point game in his 497th career game or later was Will Perdue who had his first 20+ point game in his 664th career game with San Antonio on March 27, 1998.
- ERIC BLEDSOE posted at least 23 points, seven assists, three steals and two blocks in two straight games from Dec. 13-14. He became the first NBA player to record each of these amounts in consecutive games since Orlando's Tracy McGrady (two) from March 13-15, 2002 (Basketball-Reference).
- ERIC BLEDSOE had an outstanding all-around performance vs. Minnesota on Dec. 13, recording 23 points, nine assists, five rebounds, four steals and a career-high-tying four blocked shots. Bledsoe is the first Suns player since 1985-86 to record each of these totals in the same game and joins Kevin Durant, Dwyane Wade, Hakeem Olajuwon (three times), David Robinson, Michael Jordan (twice) and Charles Barkley as the only NBA players to do so since 1985-86. By having at least four each of points, rebounds, assists, steals and blocks, Bledsoe is the first Suns player to record a 5-by-4 since Shawn Marion vs. Miami on Dec. 10, 2007. Bledsoe is the first guard in the NBA to record a 5-by-4 since Miami's Dwyane Wade on Feb. 28, 2009, and, at 6-1, Bledsoe is the shortest player since 1985-86 to record a 5-by-4 with the previous shortest being the 6-3 Alvin Robertson for San Antonio on March 31, 1989 (Basketball-Reference).
- BRANDON KNIGHT matched his total three-point makes from the previous five games by making a career-high seven three-pointers vs. Minnesota on Dec. 13. He is the first Suns player to make at least seven three-pointers since Gerald Green (eight) vs. Oklahoma City on March 6, 2014.
- ERIC BLEDSOE and BRANDON KNIGHT each exceeded $\mathbf{2 0}$ points, six assists and four steals vs. Minnesota on Dec. 13; they are the first Suns teammates to each do so in the same game since Jeff Hornacek and Kevin Johnson accomplished this on Nov. 27, 1991, vs. Sacramento (Basketball-Reference).
- ERIC BLEDSOE scored 31 points vs. Portland on Dec. 11; his eight career 30-point game and his fourth against the Trail Blazers.
- ALEX LEN had a career-high $\mathbf{2 0}$ points ( $7-10 \mathrm{FG}$ ), tied a career-high with $\mathbf{1 4}$ rebounds, tied a season-high with three blocks and blocked a potential game-tying three-pointer in the final second vs. Orlando on Dec. 9 . Len became the first Suns player with at least 20 points and 14 rebounds while shooting at least 70 percent from the field since Amar'e Stoudemire did so on March 3, 2010, at the L.A. Clippers (Basketball-Reference).
- BRANDON KNIGHT tied for the team-lead with 21 points, tied a career-high with six steals and had six rebounds and five assists vs. Orlando on Dec. 9. Knight became the first Sun with at least six steals since Vince Carter on Feb. 25, 2011, at Toronto and the first Sun with at least 20/5/5/5 in those four categories since Leandro Barbosa (41 points, seven assists, seven rebounds, six steals) vs. Oklahoma City on Feb. 20, 2009 (Basketball-Reference).
- MIRZA TELETOVIC made a go-ahead, seven-foot, fadeaway jumper with :00.3 remaining to give the Suns a 103-101 win at Chicago on Dec. 7; the shot marked the first game winner with one second or less remaining by a Suns player since Eric Bledsoe hit a three-pointer with :00.7 left to give the Suns an $87-84$ win over Utah on Nov. 1, 2013. It marked the first time a Sun had done so in a road game since Channing Frye (currently a member of the Orlando Magic) hit a long two-pointer at the overtime buzzer to give the Suns a 110-108 win at Indiana on Feb. 27, 2011.
- DEVIN BOOKER scored a then career-high 18 points in his home state of Michigan at the Pistons on Dec. 2 at an age of 19 years, 33 days, becoming the youngest player to score at least that many points since Kevin Durant scored 27 points at 19 years, 33 days in his second career game on Nov. 1, 2007.
- MIRZA TELETOVIC made 6-of-7 three-point attempts off the bench at Toronto on Nov. 29. Teletovic became the first Suns player to make at least six three-pointers with at most one miss since Marcus Morris went 6-of-7 at Sacramento on Dec. 26, 2014 (Basketball-Reference).
- ERIC BLEDSOE had a double-double with 20 points, a season-high-tying 11 assists and a season-high three blocks at Toronto on Nov. 29. Bledsoe became the first Sun with at least 20, 10 and three in a game since Kevin Johnson (25, 10, 3) at Sacramento on Nov. 15, 1988 (Basketball-Reference).
- T.J. WARREN scored a career-high 28 points on 12-of-16 shooting vs. Golden State on Nov. 27, making eight straight field goal attempts at one point in the game. By scoring 28 points in his 55th career game, Warren joined Archie Goodwin (April 16, 2014) and Amar'e Stoudemire (Dec. 30, 2002) as the only Suns to score at least 28 points in one of their first 55 career games since Richard Dumas did so three times in 1992-93 (Basketball-Reference).
- BRANDON KNIGHT scored 20 of his 29 points in the first quarter vs. New Orleans on Nov. 25; it marked the first 20-point quarter by a Suns player since Gerald Green scored 25 points in the third quarter vs. Oklahoma City on March 6, 2014.
- ERIC BLEDSOE scored 20+ points in eight straight games from Nov. 6-22, a career-long streak and the longest by a Sun since Amar'e Stoudemire scored 20+ in nine straight from Jan. 28-Feb. 19, 2010.
- DEVIN BOOKER made his first career start (and first start since high school after not starting at Kentucky) at San Antonio on Nov. 23 at an age of 19 years, $\mathbf{2 4}$ days. Booker became the youngest player in franchise history to start a game (prev. Amar'e Stoudemire at 20 years, 7 days in his first start on Nov. 23, 2002). Booker is the 11th youngest player to make his first start since 1985-86, making him possibly the 11th youngest player to ever make his first start (Bill Willoughby and Darryl Dawkins both played while younger than Booker in 1975-76, though starts were not tracked). The 10 players younger than Booker to make their first NBA start (none of whom played in college): Kobe Bryant, Tracy McGrady, LeBron James, Dwight Howard, Andris Biedrins, Martell Webster, Andrew Bynum, Josh Smith, Giannis Antetokounmpo and Darius Miles (Basketball-Reference).
- DEVIN BOOKER scored a then career-high 15 points at New Orleans on Nov. 22 at an age of 19 years, $\mathbf{2 3}$ days, becoming the youngest Sun to ever score 15+ points in a game and the youngest NBA player to do so since Milwaukee's Giannis Antetokounmpo in 2013-14.
- BRANDON KNIGHT scored a career-high 38 points and grabbed a season-high 11 rebounds in a win at Denver on Nov. 20. Knight already became the first Suns player with multiple games of 37+ points in a season since Jason Richardson in 2010-11. Knight became the sixth Suns player in franchise history to have multiple games with 37+ points in the season's first 12 games and the first since 1992-93: Charles Barkley (1992-93), Tom Chambers (1990-91), Eddie Johnson (1988-89), Walter Davis (1978-79) and Charlie Scott (1972-73) (Basketball-Reference).
- BRANDON KNIGHT already had multiple 30-point/10-rebound games through 12 games this season; he is the first Suns player with multiple such games for an entire season since Channing Frye in 2010-11 and the only Suns guard with multiple such games in a season since 1985-86 (BasketballReference). In addition, Knight joined Michael Jordan (1988-89, 1989-90, 1992-93) and Kobe Bryant (2000-01, 2002-03) as the only guards with multiple 30/10 games in the first 12 games of a season since 1985-86 (Basketball-Reference).
- BRANDON KNIGHT recorded his first career triple-double with $\mathbf{3 0}$ points, a career-high $\mathbf{1 5}$ assists and $\mathbf{1 0}$ rebounds, in addition to four steals on Nov. 16 vs. the L.A. Lakers. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Knight joined select company in achieving this line becoming the fourth player to do so since steals became an official stat in 1973-74:

- Not accounting for steals, according to Elias Sports Bureau, on Nov. 16 vs. the L.A. Lakers, BRANDON KNIGHT joined Charlie Scott as the only players in Suns history to have at least $\mathbf{3 0}$ points, 15 assists and 10 rebounds in a game. On Nov. 23, 1972, Scott had 42 points, 15 assists and 10 rebounds in a 128-122 win vs. Detroit. Knight's 15 assists are a career-high and his 10th rebound, which gave him the triple-double, was the 1,000 th of his career.
- In three straight games from Nov. 8-14 ERIC BLEDSOE scored at least $\mathbf{2 5}$ points on at least $\mathbf{6 6 . 7}$ percent shooting, becoming the first NBA player to do so since LeBron James in 2013-14, the first NBA guard since Jim Jackson in 1994-95, the first NBA point guard since Mark Price in 1988-89 and the first Suns player since 1985-86 (Basketball-Reference).
- On Nov. 12 against the L.A. Clippers, BRANDON KNIGHT tied his then career-high and had his highest scoring output as a Phoenix Sun with 37 points (14-22 FG, 6-10 3FG), also tying a career-high with six made three-pointers. The performance was Knight's 10th career 30-point game and the highest output by a Sun since Gerald Green had 41 against Oklahoma City on March 6, 2014.
- On Nov. 2 at the L.A. Clippers, TYSON CHANDLER had 17 rebounds, the most by a Sun since Miles Plumlee had 20 against L.A. Lakers on Dec. $23,2013$.
- The Suns' backcourt tandem of ERIC BLEDSOE ( 33 points, 12-21 FG, six assists) and BRANDON KNIGHT ( 27 points, 10-19 FG, five assists) had a great performance at Portland on Oct. 31. The duo became the first Suns teammates to each record at least 25 points and five assists in a game since Steve Nash and Raja Bell did so on Jan. 10, 2006, at Denver. Bledsoe and Knight became the first Suns teammates to record 25 and five while each shooting over 50 percent from the field since Stephon Marbury and Penny Hardaway on Nov. 10, 2001, at the L.A. Clippers (Basketball-Reference).
- With 33 points, six assists, four steals and two blocks at Portland on Oct. 31, ERIC BLEDSOE became the first NBA player to record at least those totals in those categories since Cleveland's Kyrie Irving on Jan. 4, 2013, and the first Sun to do so since Amar'e Stoudemire on Nov. 5, 2008, at Indiana.
- DEVIN BOOKER made his NBA debut at 18 years old against Dallas on Oct. 28, joining Maciej Lampe as the only Suns to appear in a game while 18 years old. Booker scored 14 points on 6-of-7 shooting, becoming the youngest Sun to ever score in double figures and the first 18-year-old to score at least 14 points in an NBA game since Amir Johnson for Detroit in April, 2006 (Basketball-Reference).


## BOOKER IN TORONTO

- DEVIN BOOKER finished 3rd at the 2016 Foot Locker Three-Point Contest at All-Star Saturday Night in Toronto, advancing to the finals where he finished behind winner Klay Thompson and runner-up Stephen Curry. Booker advanced to the finals after defeating J.J. Redick and James Harden in a tiebreaker after all three posted a score of 20 in the opening round.
- DEVIN BOOKER was the seventh Suns player to compete in the Three-Point Contest joining Jeff Hornacek (1992), Dan Majerle (1993; 1995), Quentin Richardson (2005), Joe Johnson (2005), Steve Nash (2008) and Channing Frye (2010). Richardson in 2005 is the only Sun to take the title. Booker joined Richardson as the only two Suns to advance past the first round.
- At 19 years old, DEVIN BOOKER became the youngest participant in Three-Point Contest history and the first teenager to compete in the event that dates to 1986. Additionally he was just the fourth rookie to compete, joining Stephen Curry (2010), Kyle Korver (2004) and Dennis Scott (1991).
- DEVIN BOOKER scored 23 points in the BBVA Rising Stars Challenge at All-Star weekend, including $\mathbf{1 8}$ points in nine minutes in the first half. Booker's 23 points were the second-most by a Suns player in the history of the game trailing only Amar'e Stoudemire's 36 when he was MVP in 2004 . Booker became the 9th Suns player to play in the Rising Stars game joining Wesley Person (1995), Trevor Ruffin (1995), Michael Finley (1996), Steve Nash (1997), Shawn Marion (2001), Amar'e Stoudemire (2003; 2004-MVP), Markieff Morris (2012) and Miles Plumlee (2014).


## THE BLED SHOW-TO BE CONTINUED

- At the time of his injury on Dec. 26, ERIC BLEDSOE joined Toronto's Kyle Lowry, Houston's James Harden, Golden State's Stephen Curry, and Oklahoma City's Russell Westbrook as the only NBA players averaging at least $\mathbf{2 0 . 0}$ points, $\mathbf{5 . 0}$ assists, $\mathbf{4 . 0}$ rebounds and $\mathbf{1 . 5}$ steals per game this

Charles Barkley in his MVP season of 1992-93, Jeff Hornacek in his AllStar season of 1991-92 and Kevin Johnson in 1988-89 are the only players in Suns history to exceed these marks in a season. Since steals became an official stat in 1973-74, there have been 117 times entering 2015-16 that a player averaged each of these amounts or more for a season. In $\mathbf{1 0 3}$ of those 117 seasons ( 88.0 percent), the player who averaged these amounts was named an All-Star in that season (Basketball-Reference).

- ERIC BLEDSOE is also exceeding averages of $\mathbf{6 . 0}$ assists, $\mathbf{4 . 0}$ rebounds and $\mathbf{2 . 0}$ steals this season; the only other player in Suns history to average at least these amounts is Jason Kidd who did so in three straight seasons with the Suns from 1998-2001.
- ERIC BLEDSOE ranks in the top ten in the NBA with $\mathbf{2 . 0 3}$ steals per game; the last Suns player to average over $\mathbf{2 . 0}$ steals for a season was Shawn Marion (2.01) in 2004-05. Bledsoe has multiple steals in 23 of his $\mathbf{3 1}$ games this season; since 1985-86, the only other time a Suns player had multiple steals in at least 23 of his first 31 games of his season was Jason Kidd (23) in 1997-98 (Basketball-Reference).
- ERIC BLEDSOE scored at least 13 points in his first $\mathbf{2 5}$ games this season before scoring six on Dec. 16. Bledsoe became the first Suns player to score $13+$ points in each of his first 25 games of the season since Charles Barkley scored at least 13 in his first 63 games in 1995-96 (Basketball-Reference).
- ERIC BLEDSOE scored at least 16 points in a career-long 24 straight games from Oct. 30-Dec. 14, over twice as long as his previous long of nine straight such games. Bledsoe's streak of games with 16+ points was the longest by a Sun since Amar'e Stoudemire did so in $\mathbf{2 7}$ straight games in 2009-10.
- ERIC BLEDSOE surpassed 2,500 points as a Phoenix Sun on Nov. 29 at Toronto. He is the $\mathbf{5 1}$ st player in franchise history to pass the milestone. On Dec. 14 at Dallas, Bledsoe surpassed 4,000 points for his NBA career.


## DYNAMIC DUO

- Prior to ERIC BLEDSOE's injury on Dec. 26, him and BRANDON KNIGHT were forming one of the most effective backcourts in the NBA as the duo ranked among the top six in combined Player Efficiency Rating for a starting backcourt throughout the first two months of the season.
- ERIC BLEDSOE (20.4 points and 6.1 assists through Dec. 26) and BRANDON KNIGHT ( 19.8 points and 5.2 assists through Dec. 26) were the only teammates averaging at least 19.0 points and 5.0 assists prior to Bledsoe's injury. In fact, Knight's scoring average was just 0.2 points away from the pair being on track to achieve the fifth time in NBA history in which two teammates each exceeded 20 points and five assists per game for a season. The four previous times in NBA history two teammates averaged at least 20.0 points and 5.0 assists are: Cleveland's LeBron James and Kyrie Irving in 2014-15, Miami's James and Dwyane Wade in 2012-13, Chicago's Michael Jordan and Scottie Pippen in 1991-92, and Boston's John Havlicek and Jo Jo White in 1971-72 (Basketball-Reference).
- ERIC BLEDSOE (20) and BRANDON KNIGHT (16) each had at least 16 games with 20+ points through $\mathbf{3 2}$ games this season. The last time two Suns teammates each had this many 20+ point games at this point was Amar'e Stoudemire (25) and Shawn Marion (17) in 2004-05 (Basketball-Reference).


## TONY BUCKETS

- Before his season came to an end with a right foot fracture, among qualified NBA players to make a majority of their appearances off the bench, T.J. WARREN ranked $\mathbf{1 5}$ th with $\mathbf{1 1 . 0}$ points per game and 3rd by shooting $\mathbf{5 0 . 1}$ percent from the field.

- In 28 games after the All-Star break, averaged 11.3 points, 7.4 rebounds and 1.4 steals with 19 games of double-digit points and three double-doubles.
