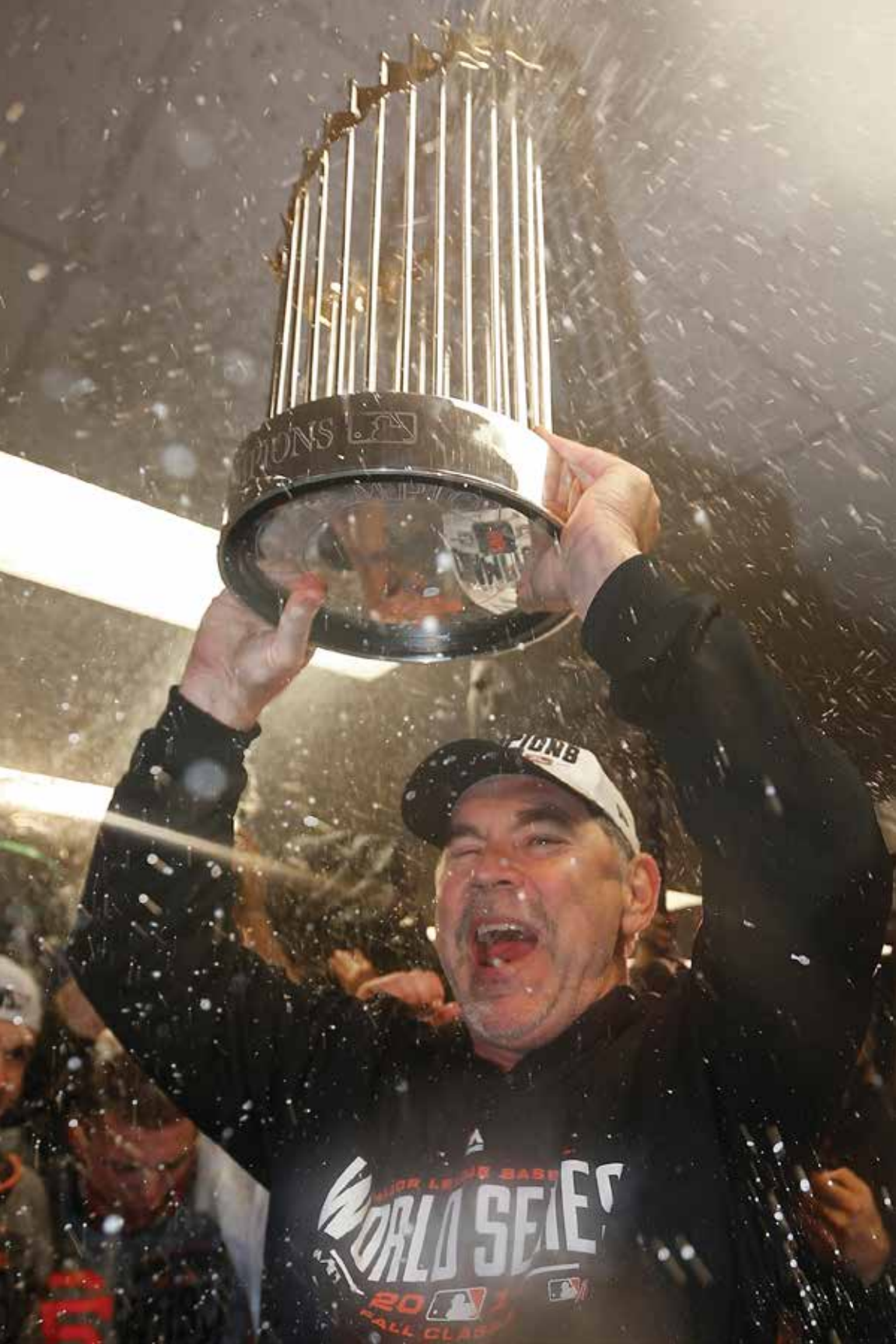

PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

A fourth generation San Franciscan, Larry Baer has gained a national reputation as one of professional sports' leading visionaries. Baer joined the team in 1992 as the executive vice president after he and Peter Magowan led the effort to assemble a new ownership group and negotiate the sale that kept the Giants in San Francisco. A limited partner of the ownership group, Baer was named chief operating officer in May 1996, team president in October 2008 and CEO on January 1, 2012. In his first year as president and CEO, the Giants won their second World Series Championship in three years. In 2014, the Giants won their third World Series title in five years.

As president and CEO, Baer serves as the club's "control" person on all Giants, Major League Baseball and industry issues. Baer is responsible for the overall day-to-day functioning of the organization. Under his direction the Giants developed and constructed AT&T Park -- the first privately-financed Major League ballpark. Since opening in 2000, AT&T Park has been widely praised as one of the "best ballparks ever built." The club has received unprecedented fan support -- becoming one of only four teams to exceed three million in attendance eight consecutive years (2000-2007).

Currently, the Giants enjoy the longest active home sellout streak in Major League Baseball of 327 games. With the support of more than 30,000 full season ticket holders, the Giants sold out the 2011, 2012, 2013 and 2014 seasons and welcomed more than 3.3 million fans each year. The Giants have been the standard bearer in all of baseball for sponsorship revenue, and the ballpark continues to be one of the most popular venues in the country for special events. In 2008, AT&T Park was named *Sports Business Journal's* Sports Facility of the Year, and in 2011 the Giants received *Sports Business Journal's* Professional Sports Organization of the Year award.

Baer also serves as a key strategist and negotiator of the club's major business and baseball transactions. This includes the Barry Bonds signing in November 1992, the naming rights agreement with AT&T (then Pacific Bell) in 1996 and other strategic business partnerships. He led the effort to host the 2007 All-Star Game in San Francisco and was the driving force behind the Giants partnership with Comcast to create a regional sports network for the Bay Area.

Baer worked closely with the Giants Baseball department on strategic signings that keep several key players in Giants uniforms for years to come, including Buster Posey, Matt Cain, Madison Bumgarner and Hunter Pence.

Baer also serves as President & CEO of Giants Development Services, which is currently developing Mission Rock -- a new, mixed use urban neighborhood located on a 25-acre site across McCovey Cove from AT&T Park. Once completed, Mission Rock will include more than eight acres of parks and open space, an Anchor Steam Brewery, 650-1,500 residential units, 1.3 - 1.7 million square feet of office space, a parking structure to serve ballpark and Mission Rock patrons, and up to 250,000 square feet of retail, restaurants, and public amenities. The project is currently in the entitlement phase with groundbreaking projected for 2016.

After earning Phi Beta Kappa honors at the University of California in 1980, Baer joined the Giants as the club's marketing director. In 1983, he left the Giants to attend Harvard Business School, followed by a four-year tenure at Westinghouse Broadcasting in San Francisco and New York. He finally returned to the Giants in December 1992 from CBS, Inc. in New York, where he had served as a special assistant to the network's chairman, Laurence Tisch.

Baer has been the recipient of a number of prestigious awards throughout his career with the Giants. This includes the San Francisco Distinguished Leadership Award for civic leadership (1996), "Sports Torch of Learning Award" by the Scopus Society of the American Friends of The Hebrew University (1995), and the Anti-Defamation League's Torch of Liberty Award (2001). In 2010, Baer was the named the "Person of the Year" by San Francisco Boys and Girls Club, and in 2012 he was honored as the Harvard Business School's "Alumnus of the Year." In 2014, Baer was honored by the University of California Berkeley with its "Excellence in Achievement" award and received the Civic Leadership Award from the American Jewish Committee.

Baer chairs Major League Baseball's Long-Term Strategic Planning Committee and serves on MLB's Business and Media Board and MLB's Legislative Affairs Committee.

Baer is a member of the Board of Directors of KQED, Inc., the San Francisco Committee on Jobs, the Bay Area Council, Comcast Sports Net Bay Area and is a member of the Boys and Girls Clubs of America Pacific Region Board of Trustees.

Baer and his wife, Pam, co-chair the San Francisco General Foundation Campaign Committee in support of the new hospital, which will open toward the end of 2015.

Larry and Pam Baer reside in San Francisco with their four children.

Brian R. Sabean

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER

Brian Sabean, who is currently the longest-tenured General Manager in Major League Baseball, was named San Francisco's Senior Vice President and General Manager on Sept. 30, 1996. During his 18 years as GM, he has seen the Giants capture seven post-season berths (including four World Series appearances and three Championships), with the club having earned more than half of its 11 overall playoff appearances since moving West.

Over the last five seasons, under Sabean's watch, the Giants have won three World Series titles, becoming the first team to win three titles in a five-year span since the New York Yankees won four from 1996-2000.

Since Sabean assumed the GM reins following the 1996 season, the Giants have won three World Championships (2010, 2012, 2014), four National League pennants (2002, 2010, 2012, 2014), five NL West Division flags (1997, 2000, 2003, 2010 and 2012), two Wild Card entries (2002, 2014) and forced a Wild Card tie-breaker game with Chicago in 1998, while posting a 1,556-1,358-1 (.534) mark during that 18-year span. This winning percentage is sixth overall in MLB, the third best in the National League and best in the NL West Division during Sabean's tenure. In addition, under Sabean, the Giants are one of only three teams in the Major Leagues that have been to the World Series four-or-more times since 1997 (also: Cardinals, four times and Yankees, six times) and are third in the National League with seven post-season appearances in that span.

In his 23rd year with the organization, and 30th season as a baseball front office executive, the 58-year-old Sabean was honored as 2010 Major League Baseball Executive of the Year by the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA. He was tabbed with the same honor by both *The Sporting News* and *Baseball America* in 2003. In 2012, he was named *Baseball America's* Executive of the Year as he stewarded the Giants to their second World Series Championship in his tenure as General Manager.

Recently under Sabean's watch, the Giants' organization has received prestigious awards, being named the Topps Organization of the Year in both 2009 and 2011 and the *Baseball America* Organization of the Year in 2010. These awards are given to Major League teams that show outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor league teams.

In his first year as the Giants' GM, the Concord, NH native finished second in The Sporting News' 1997 Executive of the Year balloting. He seized national headlines for his bold player moves that season, engineering some of baseball's most successful blockbuster trades, which catapulted San Francisco to its first divisional championship in eight years.

During his tenure as GM, Sabean has acquired some of the game's best players via trades. They have included Giants' All-Stars Jeff Kent, Jason Schmidt, Marco Scutaro and Robb Nen, as well as standout performers Ellis Burks, Joe Carter, Andres Galarraga, Kenny Lofton, Jose Mesa and J.T. Snow. The Giants' GM has been known to bring reinforcements during the July 31 trading deadline, acquiring the likes of Carlos Beltran, Javier Lopez, Jake Peavy, Hunter Pence, Freddy Sanchez and Randy Winn.

The team architect also brought future Hall of Famers Omar Vizquel to San Francisco in 2005 and Randy Johnson in 2008, while adding Giants' All-Star Benito Santiago in 2001, two-time Gold Glove catcher Bengie Molina, four-time All-Star Tim Hudson in 2013 and five-time National League All-Star (and eventual 2010 World Series MVP) Edgar Renteria in 2009.

Before his promotion to GM in 1996, Sabean served one season as the club's Senior Vice President, Player Personnel in 1995 and enjoyed a three-year stint as Assistant to the General Manager and Vice President of Scouting/Player Personnel. Prior to joining the Giants, Sabean played a vital role in developing the Yankees' farm system into one of baseball's finest. During his eight-year tenure with the Yankees, he held several positions of increasing responsibility, including Director of Scouting from 1986-90 and Vice President of Player Development/Scouting from 1990-92.

Sabeen, who graduated from Concord (NH) High School in 1974 and Eckerd College (St. Petersburg, FL) in 1978, served as an assistant baseball coach at St. Leo (FL) College in 1979 and the University of Tampa from 1980-82. He was then promoted to head coach at Tampa in 1983, holding that post for two years, compiling a 61-36 record and making the school's first-ever appearance in an NCAA regional tournament in 1984.

Sabeen and his wife, Amanda, have two sons, Aidan and Declan. They are also the proud dad and stepmom to Colin, Sean, Brendan and Darren.

Dick Tidrow

VICE PRESIDENT AND ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER, PLAYER PERSONNEL

A former American League Rookie Pitcher of the Year and 13-year Major League veteran, Dick Tidrow embarks on his 22nd year overall with the club. Tidrow has had an integral role in helping the organization win three World Series titles over the last five seasons.

An invaluable aide to Brian Sabean, Tidrow came to the organization prior to the 1994 campaign, serving as the club's Major League scout for the American League. He was promoted to Special Assistant to the General

Manager in 1996, and was elevated to Director of Player Personnel prior to the 1997 season. His current responsibilities include providing Major League player recommendations for trade and free agent signings, overseeing the Giants' minor league system and assisting in supervising the First-Year Player Draft.

His judgment for talent, whether acquired or developed through the farm system, can be seen throughout the roster of the Major League club, as he had a major hand in the teams drafting and development of Tim Lincecum, Matt Cain, Sergio Romo and Madison Bumgarner. Of the players on the 2014 World Series 25-man roster, 13 were either selected by San Francisco in the June draft or signed their first professional contract with the Giants.

In addition to the Giants capturing seven post-season berths (including four World Series appearances and three Championships) during Tidrow's tenure, San Francisco's farm system owns the highest winning percentage in baseball over the past eight seasons with a .554 organizational mark, largely due to Tidrow's tutelage of the club's pitching prospects.

Prior to joining the Giants organization, Tidrow served as a special assignment scout with the New York Yankees from 1985 through 1993. The former right-handed pitcher, nicknamed "Dirt," enjoyed parts of 13 years in the Majors from 1972-84. He was honored as The Sporting News A.L. Rookie Pitcher of the Year as a starter with the Cleveland Indians in 1972, while also capturing pennant and World Series rings as a reliever with the Yankees in 1976 and '77, respectively. He later pitched for the Cubs, White Sox and Mets. His lifetime numbers show a 100-94 record with 55 saves and a 3.68 ERA.

The San Francisco native graduated from Mt. Eden High School in 1965 and Chabot Junior College in 1967, both located in Hayward. Dick and his wife, Mari Jo, have three children— Andy, Matt and Richelle—and make their home in Lee's Summit, MO.

Sabean's Top Trades

During his tenure as the Giants general manager, Brian Sabean has made 91 trades. Those transactions have brought 103 players to San Francisco, including 2003 NL Cy Young runner-up Jason Schmidt, 2000 NL MVP Jeff Kent, 100-game winner Kirk Rueter, Giants all-time saves leader Robb Nen, six-time Gold Glover J.T. VICE PRESIDENT AND ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Bobby Evans begins his 22nd season in the Giants baseball operations department. As a valued member of the Giants' braintrust, Evans has had an integral role in helping the organization win three World Series titles in the past five seasons (2010, 2012, 2014) and has helped the organization be named the Topps Organization of the Year in both 2009 and 2011 and the Baseball America Organization of the Year in 2010.

In his current role, Evans assists Senior Vice President and General Manager Brian Sabean in all Major League and amateur contract negotiations, player acquisitions via trade or free agency and all areas of Major League operations. He is also responsible for overseeing waiver and rule compliance and assisting Dick Tidrow in overseeing the organization's minor league system.

Recently, Evans has assisted Brian Sabean in contract negotiations for record setting deals with Matt Cain and Buster Posey. He has also helped the GM work out extensions with Madison Bumgarner and Hunter Pence; keeping the core of the club in a Giants' uniform. In addition, he oversees the signing of the organization's top picks in the annual First-Year Player Draft.

In 2012, Evans received the Bowie Kuhn Award, which is presented annually at the Baseball Winter Meetings (since 1984) to an individual, team or organization who demonstrates support of the chapel program in professional baseball.

Evans is a 1991 graduate of the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill, where he was the recipient of the John Motley Morehead Scholarship Award. He first joined San Francisco in 1994 as Administrative Assistant, Minor Leagues. Prior to joining the Giants, Evans served as an administrator in the Commissioner's Office in New York. During his three-year tenure there, he worked in baseball operations and assisted with compliance to the PBA. While in college, Evans interned with the Boston Red Sox in the player development and scouting departments during the summer of 1989.

Evans and his wife, Gwen, reside in San Francisco and have two sons, Jonathan and Jackson and a daughter, Anjali.



John Barr

VICE PRESIDENT & ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER, SCOUTING & INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS

John Barr will begin his 31st season as a baseball executive and his eighth season with the Giants, overseeing amateur and international scouting in 2014.

Under Barr's guidance, the Giants have drafted players such as 2010 Rookie of the Year and 2012 National League MVP Buster Posey, Brandon Crawford, Brandon Belt, Joe Panik and Andrew Susac all of whom have contributed to the Giants' three World Series titles over the last five seasons. In fact, seven of the 13 position players on San Francisco's 2014 World Series roster were all selected by Barr in the June draft.

The Audubon, NJ, native entered the front office ranks in 1984 with the New York Mets as Administrative Assistant to Minor Leagues and Scouting where he remained until becoming the East Coast Supervisor for the Minnesota Twins in 1988. As Scouting Director for the Baltimore Orioles (1989-90), Barr was responsible for selecting first rounders Ben McDonald ('89) and Mike Mussina ('90). He served as Assistant General Manager for the San Diego Padres (1991-93) before returning to the New York Mets (1994-97) as Scouting Director, where they added players such as AJ Burnett, Paul Wilson, Jay Payton, and Terrence Long to their system. Barr then spent ten years (1998- 2007) with the Los Angeles Dodgers as East Coast Supervisor where he was instrumental in the selection of All-Star catcher Russell Martin, starting pitcher Edwin Jackson and reliever Jonathan Broxton.

Barr was inducted into the Mid Atlantic Scouts Hall of Fame in November of 2008 and then inducted into the Professional Scouting Hall of Fame during the summer of 2009.

The Rider University graduate resides in Haddonfield, NJ, with his wife Marianne, daughters Kate, Eileen, and Mary, and son, Blake.



Felipe Alou

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Felipe Alou, a man whose name is synonymous with the Giants, returns for his ninth season as a special assistant to the general manager after serving as the club's field manager from 2003-06. He works closely with Brian Sabean on special assignments, ranging from Major League scouting and player acquisition to minor league instruction. He provides evaluations and recommendations at both levels.

The Dominican icon continues a long and storied career with the franchise, beginning with his playing days as a member of the original San Francisco Giants club in 1958. He concluded his four-year tenure at the helm of the Giants ranking seventh on the wins list for San Francisco skippers with a 342-304 record.

The 2015 campaign will mark Alou's 60th season in professional baseball. Following a distinguished 17-year playing career that ended in 1974, he was appointed a minor league manager in 1976 and remained in uniform each year through the 2006 campaign.

In 13 seasons as a Major League manager, the 1994 National League Manager of the Year posted a 1,033-1,021-1 ledger and became just the 53rd skipper since 1900 to register 1,000 wins. The Haina, Dominican Republic native is the first manager of Latin descent to win 1,000 games in the big leagues, and is only the third foreign-born skipper to reach the milestone (current Giants skipper Bruce Bochy, France, 1,530-1,530; and Harry Wright, England, 1,000-825).

Alou became the first Dominican-born manager in Major League history when he assumed control of the Montreal Expos on May 22, 1992. He was the fourth Latin American head man born in the Caribbean Islands, following Mike Gonzalez (Cuba), Preston Gomez (Cuba) and Cookie Rojas (Cuba).

Prior to the 2015 season, Alou was elected into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame, acknowledging his work with the Expos.

Primarily an outfielder during his playing days, the second Dominican-born player to reach the Majors (following Ozzie Virgil with the 1956 New York Giants) was a three-time All-Star during a 17-year career with the Giants (1958-63), Milwaukee and Atlanta Braves (1964-69), Oakland Athletics (1970-71), New York Yankees (1971-73), Montreal Expos (1973) and Milwaukee Brewers (1974).

Alou, and his wife Lucie, make their home in Boynton Beach, FL with their two children, Valerie and Felipe, Jr. He is also the father of daughters Maria, Christia, Cheri and Jennifer, along with sons Jose, Moises, Felipe Jose and Luis.



Jeremy Shelley

VICE PRESIDENT, PRO SCOUTING AND PLAYER EVALUATION

Jeremy Shelley begins his 22nd season in San Francisco's baseball operations department, currently serving as the club's Vice President of Pro Scouting and Player Evaluation, a position he was promoted to in January of 2013. In his current role, Shelley oversees pro scouting staff at the major league and minor league levels, including advance scouting. Additionally, he assists General Manager Brian Sabean and Assistant General Manager Bobby Evans with day-to-day operations, including player acquisitions, arbitration preparation and contract research. He also provides support in statistical analysis, amateur scouting and international operations.

Shelley has had an integral role in helping the organization be named the Topps Organization of the Year in both 2009 and 2011 and the *Baseball America* Organization of the Year in 2010.

The Concord, CA native began his career for the Giants as a baseball operations intern in 1994. He was hired full-time as administrative assistant, baseball operations in 1996. He earned a BS in finance from Santa Clara University in 1995.

Shelley and his wife, Suzanne, live in San Mateo with their daughters, Maria and Leah.



Yeshayah Goldfarb

SENIOR DIRECTOR, MINOR LEAGUE OPERATIONS AND QUANTITATIVE ANALYSIS

Yeshayah Goldfarb enters his 15th season in the Giants baseball operations department. He helps run the minor league operations on a day-to-day basis, including spring training camp, roster formation, player evaluation, budget management and affiliate team liaison. Additionally he provides statistical analysis on major league, minor league, and amateur players for purposes of roster construction, player acquisition and development. He is also responsible for seeking out and incorporating new technologies and data into baseball operations information systems.

Goldfarb graduated Cum Laude from the University of California, San Diego. A former pitcher and team captain, he played four seasons with the Tritons and was elected most inspirational Player by his teammates and also presented with the John Roth Memorial Award (Charlie Hustle) by the coaching staff in 2000.

The Berkeley, CA native began his career with the Giants as a scouting intern and video assistant in 2001 and was hired full time after the season as Assistant, Baseball Operations. Entering the 2015 season Goldfarb was promoted from Director to Senior Director, Minor League Operations and Quantitative Analysis.

Goldfarb and his wife, Miranda, have a daughter, Eliana, and a son, Ezra, and reside in Oakland, CA.



Tony Siegle

SENIOR ADVISOR, BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Longtime front office executive Tony Siegle is in his third stint with the Giants after rejoining the club in 2007 as a senior advisor in the baseball operations department. He assists Brian Sabean, Bobby Evans and baseball operations in waiver and rules compliance, contract negotiations, arbitration and trade discussions.

Siegle, who has worked in Major League Baseball for the last five decades, was previously with San Francisco during a five-year run from 1990-94 and again for a brief stay during the 2001 season. Originally tabbed as San Francisco's director of minor league operations in August, 1990, he was elevated to the role of vice president, baseball administration and operations in December, 1992.

Prior to rejoining the Giants, Siegle spent five seasons (2002-06) as the assistant general manager of the Washington Nationals franchise, first under G.M. Omar Minaya and then Jim Bowden. Appointed to the position in February, 2002, when the club was still the Montreal Expos, he helped oversee a myriad of personnel moves while navigating the unique circumstances of a franchise in transition.

A former officer in the U.S. Navy, Siegle began his Major League Baseball career in 1965 as the scoreboard operator at the Astrodome in Houston, and spent the 1969 season as the Phillies' director of stadium operations. He moved to the baseball operations side with Milwaukee in 1970 and has since enjoyed a distinguished career in a variety of front office posts with the Brewers (1970-79), Astros (1979-82), Phillies (1982-88 and 2001), Padres (1989), Angels (1990), Giants (1990-94, 2001 and 2007-present), Rockies (1995-2000) and Expos/Nationals (2002-06). During his tenure, the University of Miami (FL) graduate has worked closely with or for 23 general managers and 22 managers - numbers believed to be unrivaled in baseball annals.

Tony and his wife, Cynthia, reside in Scottsdale, Arizona and have four children (Andrew, Amy Beth, Zachary and Gregory) and nine grandchildren.



Shane Turner

DIRECTOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Shane Turner begins his 20th season with the Giants, his second as the Director of Player Development. He is chiefly responsible for the assignment, development and evaluation of players throughout the Giants farm system.

From 2008-2013, Turner served as the Giants Coordinator of Minor League Instruction. In this role, Turner traveled to each of the Giants' minor league affiliates to work closely with SF's young players.

In his 19 years with the Giants, Turner has managed or coached at every level within the Giants' minor league system. He owns an overall record of 620-666 (.482) in 11 seasons as a minor league skipper, having posted a winning record in each of his initial four campaigns. The highlight of his managerial career came in 1998, when he led Class A Advanced San Jose to a league-best 83-57 record and the California League Championship, the first ever in San Jose's affiliation with San Francisco. For his efforts at San Jose, he earned honors as best Major League managerial prospect for Cal League by *Baseball America*.

Turner played professionally for 11 years as an infielder in the minor league systems of Chicago-AL, Baltimore, San Francisco, Seattle, Philadelphia and New York-AL. He saw action on the Major League level with the Phillies in 1988, Orioles in 1991 and Mariners in 1992, finishing with a lifetime .236 batting average in 56 games. He singled in his Major League debut off former Giants pitcher Scott Garrelts.

Turner was originally selected by the Yankees in the sixth round of the 1985 June draft. He attended Cal State-Fullerton, where he finished ninth in the nation with 108 hits in 1985. Turner now resides in Sinking Spring, PA.



Steve Decker

COORDINATOR OF INSTRUCTION AND MINOR LEAGUE HITTING

Former Giants catcher embarks on his fourth season as Coordinator of Instruction and Minor League Hitting after spending two years managing at triple-A Fresno. His 2015 campaign will be his 21st season within the Giants' organization as either a manager, coach or player. Decker returned to the San Francisco organization after retiring as a player following his 2000 campaign.

Along with managing the Fresno Grizzlies, Decker was at the helm of Class A Advanced San Jose in 2008 and double-A Connecticut in 2009. He earned

Northwest League Manager of the Year honors in 2006 and 2007 as the skipper for the Salem-Keizer Volcanoes, where he made his managerial debut in 2005. He spent his initial four years in the coaching ranks under Fred Stanley from 2001-02 at Salem-Keizer and 2003-04 at triple-A Fresno.

Decker appeared in 263 games over his Major League career, seeing action over seven big league seasons with the Giants (1990-92, 1996), Florida Marlins (1993, '95), Colorado Rockies (1996) and Anaheim Angels (1999). Was originally a 21st round selection by the Giants in the June 1988 draft out of Lewis & Clark State College.



Paul Turco

SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING

Paul Turco enters his 28th year in professional baseball, his 19th with the Giants. During his tenure with the club, he has been a Florida area scout, east coast cross checker and Major League scout. His current role has him report directly to General Manager Brian Sabean on player personnel acquisitions.

Turco was previously a scout with the New York Yankees, working with the club from 1987-95. Some notable signings include Brad Ausmus and Carl Everett. Prior to joining the Yankees, he was the head baseball coach at Worcester (MA) State College from 1981-83, leading the team to their first ever appearance in the NCAA Regionals. He took over the Worcester State program after serving as a police officer with the Worcester Police Department from 1973-80, earning a promotion to the Detective Bureau in 1977.

A New England native, Turco was a pitcher in his playing days at Quinsigamond Community College (Worcester, MA), finishing with a perfect 15-0 record.

He and his wife, Joyce, have two sons who are both professional scouts. Paul Jr. is a Major League scout with the Giants, while Anthony is a pro scout with the Boston Red Sox.



Lee Elder

SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING

Lee Elder enters his 16th year within the San Francisco Giants organization and his second as the Senior Advisor, Scouting. From 2000-2005, Elder worked as an amateur scout, pro scout and an advance scout and in 2002 he signed three-time All-Star Matt Cain. He became a Major League scout from 2005-2010 and assumed the dual role of Major League Scout/Special Assignment Scout in 2011 until being promoted to his current position this past offseason.

Prior to joining the Giants' organization, Elder worked as an amateur and pro scout for the New York Yankees for 10 years from 1990-2000, where he earned three World Series Championship rings (1996, 1998, 1999). Prior to getting into baseball, he worked in the business world, specializing in sales, finance and computers and formed his own advertising company, which led him to meet George Steinbrenner, who eventually brought him into baseball with the Yankees as an amateur scout under current Giants General Manager Brian Sabean in 1990.

Born and raised in Biloxi, Mississippi, Elder graduated from Biloxi High School, Mississippi Gulf Coast JC and the University of Southern Mississippi. He played baseball and basketball in High School and Jr. College before being drafted into the US Army and eventually serving in the Vietnam War. After returning from the service he enrolled in the University of Southern Mississippi and earned a BS degree in marketing in 1976. He was named Biloxian of the Year in 2004 by the State of Mississippi Legislature for outstanding accomplishments outside of the state and was inducted into the Biloxi Sports Hall of Fame in November of 2013.

He and his wife, Debra have been married for 36 years and they have one son named Blake, who is a corporate accountant in Atlanta, GA. They currently reside in Scottsdale, AZ.



Ed Creech

SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING

Ed Creech, a widely respected figure throughout the game, is in his seventh year in San Francisco's organization before the Giants he served as Pittsburgh's Director of Scouting. Having spent over 37 years in professional baseball, he works closely with John Barr in both domestic and international amateur scouting.

The 63-year-old Creech has also been a scouting director with the Los Angeles Dodgers (1999-2001), St. Louis Cardinals (1998) and Montreal Expos (1994-97). During his tenure as a scouting director, he has ushered 54 of his draft picks to the Majors, including the likes of Javier Vazquez, Milton Bradley, Michael Barrett, Brian Schneider, J.D. Drew, Jack Wilson, Shane Victorino, Tom Gorzelanny and Paul Maholm.

The Columbia, SC native played six seasons in the Expos organization after being the club's second round selection in the 1973 draft. Following his playing career, he became a coach and manager for six years in the Montreal chain (1982-85, 1990-91). After serving as an area scout for the team from 1985-91, he was promoted to the Expos scouting supervisor from 1991-93.

The Mercer University graduate resides in Moultrie, GA with his wife, Mary Ann, his daughter, Kacey, and sons, Matthew and Nathaniel.



John Flannery

SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING

John Flannery begins his first year with the San Francisco Giants and 2015 is his 35th year in professional baseball. He will report to John Barr and his primary duties will be in the Amateur Scouting Department.

Prior to joining San Francisco, he began his scouting career in 1989 with two stints with the Atlanta Braves as a part-time scout, area scout, Midwest and National crosschecker. John also spent two years with the Kansas City Royals as the Midwest crosschecker.

In 2008, Flannery was inducted into the Texas Scouts Association Hall of Fame.

The Lakewood(CA) High School graduate began his professional career as a player with the California Angels in 1975. He played seven seasons of minor league baseball which included a brief major league call up with the Chicago White Sox in 1977.

John and his wife Debbie reside in Austin, TX and have three grown daughters, Kristin, Holly and Jamie.



Matt Nerland

SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING

Matt Nerland, who begins his 27th season with the Giants, serves as a Senior Advisor in Scouting and reports directly to General Manager Brian Sabean. In his current role, Nerland is responsible for evaluating talent at both the major league and minor league levels and provides input regarding player acquisitions and roster moves.

During his long tenure with San Francisco, Nerland also served as scouting director and was instrumental in the First-Year player drafts from 1998-2006. During that span, 44 players have matriculated to the major leagues. The San Francisco State graduate began his career as an intern in the baseball operations department in 1989 prior to working in a variety of capacities that ranged from front office responsibilities to amateur and professional scouting.



Doug Mapson

SENIOR ADVISOR, SCOUTING

Doug Mapson, who enters his 35th year in professional baseball, reports to John Barr and assists in coordinating the Giants' amateur scouting staff in the field. During his storied career, he signed future Hall of Famer Greg Maddux.

In 2013, Mapson was named West Coast Scout of the Year, which is presented annually at the Baseball Winter Meetings by the Scout of the Year program. In addition, in 2014 he was honored with the George Genovese Lifetime Achievement in Scouting Award, present each year by the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation.

The longtime scout, who is entering his 23rd season with the Giants, has served as San Francisco's national cross-checker for the past nine seasons after serving as a special assignment scout and western cross-checker for the first 10 years with the organization.

Prior to joining San Francisco, he was with the Chicago Cubs for 11 years as an area scout and a west coast supervisor. He started his professional career as a part time scout for the Philadelphia Phillies after being the head coach at Palmdale (CA) High School for 10 years.

The Carmel (CA) High School graduate played baseball at both Monterey Peninsula College and U.S. International University in San Diego. Mapson and his wife, Patricia, live in Chandler, AZ. He has three sons, Jeff, Jay and Dusty and three stepchildren, Vicki, Guy and Diane.



Pablo Peguero

DIRECTOR, DOMINICAN REPUBLIC OPERATIONS

Pablo Peguero begins his 12th year with the Giants, coordinating the club's scouting and player development operations in the Dominican Republic.

A Dominican native, Peguero has an extensive background in baseball in his island country. Prior to joining the Giants organization, he worked in the Dominican for the Los Angeles Dodgers as a scout from 1984-86, staff coordinator from 1987-89, scout and development coordinator from 1990-94. He has been the GM for different Dominican Winter League Clubs, working for Campo Las Palmas (Dodgers facility in D.R.) from 1995-2003 and now is currently the GM for the Gigantes del Cibao. Notable players he signed for the Dodgers include Tony Abreu, Adrian Beltre, Raul Mondesi, Felix Rodriguez, Angel Pena and Wilton Guerrero. He was also the general manager of the Dominican Olympic Team in the 1999 Pan Am Games in Winnipeg, Canada.

The former catcher played nine seasons (1972-1980) in the minors with the Los Angeles Dodgers, including the last four years at triple-A.

He and his wife, Xiomara, have a son, Felix, and a daughter, Patxi, and live in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. His son was a former minor league player and currently is the Assistant Director for Dominican Republic Operations with the Giants.



Felix Peguero

ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, DOMINICAN REPUBLIC OPERATIONS

Felix Peguero begins his 10th year in the Giants organization, his second as the Assistant Director of Dominican Republic Operations. Peguero assists Pablo Peguero in the operations and scouting development in the Dominican Republic and he oversees the scouting department. He joined the Giants organization in 2006 as a player coach and then was elevated to an area scout in 2007.

The 30-year-old Santo Domingo, D.R. native was a former catcher in the Arizona Diamondbacks system from 2004-05.

He and his wife, Fabiola, reside in Santo Domingo, D.R.



John Cox

COORDINATOR, PACIFIC RIM SCOUTING

John Cox begins his 10th season with the Giants, serving as the coordinator of Pacific Rim scouting. He is responsible for the club's scouting efforts in Australia, Japan, Korea and Taiwan.

Cox previously worked in the scouting department of the New York Yankees from 1994-2006, having been a Western region supervisor, pro scout and Pacific Rim supervisor. During his time with the Yankees, he was involved in the signings of such notable players as Hideki Matsui, Chin-Ming Wang and Jose Contreras. He has also worked in the front office or scouting departments of the Chicago Cubs (1973-85), Cincinnati Reds (1986-88) and Baltimore Orioles (1989-2006), having served in a number of roles.

A former infielder, Cox played in the minors with the California Angels, Cubs and Oakland Athletics. He currently resides in Yucaipa, CA.



Jack Hiatt

SENIOR CONSULTANT, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Jack Hiatt, a former Giants player, is in his eighth season with the Giants in an advisory role after retiring from his longtime position as the club's Director of Player Development. He works closely with Brian Sabeau on minor league evaluations and recommendations.

Hiatt also spent two seasons as the Roving Catching Instructor/Assistant Player Development Director and one campaign (1988) as the manager of the Giants' rookie league club in Pocatello, ID.

A catcher and first baseman during his playing days, Hiatt played for the Angels, Giants, Expos, Cubs and Astros during a career that included 483 games from 1964-72.

Prior to joining the Giants' player development staff, Hiatt worked as a coach and manager in the Cubs, Angels and Astros organizations, including a stint as a Major League coach with Chicago in 1981.

Hiatt and his wife, Sherlyn, reside in Roseburg, OR.



Fred Stanley

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Fred Stanley, a former big league infielder with 48 years of professional baseball experience, works as a special assistant, player personnel within the Giants' organization. He was previously the director of player development from 2008-2013, responsible for the assignment, development and evaluation of players throughout the Giants farm system.

Entering his 15th season in San Francisco's organization, Stanley served as the Giants coordinator of minor league instruction from 2006-08. He has held many different front office positions, including serving as the Milwaukee Brewers' assistant general manager. He has also worked as a big league coach, minor league manager and instructor, including a five season-stint as a manager in the Giants chain. During that time, he was named the Northwest League's Manager of the Year in 2000 and 2001.

Stanley spent nine seasons in the Milwaukee organization before matriculating to the Giants, including his final three years as the Brewers' assistant general manager. He also served as the Brew Crew's director of player development from 1992-96, with his charges earning the prestigious Topps Organization of the Year Award in 1992. Prior to his stint in the front office, he spent the 1991 season as the Brewers infield coach.

Before going to Milwaukee, he was the coordinator of minor league instruction with the Seattle Mariners from 1989-90, the director of baseball operations with the Houston Astros from 1986-88 and director of instruction with the Oakland Athletics from 1983-85.

A defensive specialist, Stanley played 14 seasons in the Majors with Seattle (1969), Milwaukee (1970), Cleveland (1972), San Diego (1972), New York Yankees (1972-80) and Oakland (1981-82).

The Farnhamville, IA native currently lives in Argyle, TX with his wife Rebecca. He has a daughter, Tracie, and a son, Brian.



Joe Amalfitano

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Joe Amalfitano, who enters his 61st year in professional baseball and 24th in the Giants organization, serves as a roving instructor and a special assignment scout as directed by Brian Sabean. The former big league infielder is in his sixth different tour of duty with the Giants, returning to the organization in 2005.

Originally signed by the New York Giants as a bonus baby in 1954, he played for the New York club in 1954-55 and with San Francisco from 1960-61 and 1963. Amalfitano also served as a big league coach for the Giants from 1972-75, before returning as a special assistant, player development from 1999-2001.

Prior to rejoining the orange and black during his current stint, he spent the previous three years as a senior advisor to baseball operations for the Los Angeles Dodgers from 2002-04. Amalfitano ended his Major League coaching career with the Dodgers, manning the third base coaching box from 1983-98 under manager Tommy Lasorda. His other big league coaching assignments included: the Chicago Cubs (1967-71 and 1978-81), San Diego Padres (1976-77) and Cincinnati Reds (1982).

The San Pedro, CA native also managed parts of three seasons with the Cubs from 1979-81, compiling a 66-116 ledger. He was Chicago's interim manager at the end of the 1979 season, taking over for Herman Franks and finishing with a 2-5 mark. He also managed the last half of the 1980 season in Chicago after taking over for Preston Gomez and posted a 38-65 record as the skipper for the entire strike-shortened 1981 season.

Having appeared in two World Series — one as a player for the Giants in 1954 and one as a coach for the Dodgers in 1988 — he posted a .244 batting average during his 10-year big league career with the Giants (1954-55, '60-61 and '63), Astros (1962) and Cubs (1964-67).

A graduate of the University of Southern California, he and his wife, Kay, live in Sedona, AZ.



Jim Davenport

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Jim Davenport, who was a member of the original 1958 San Francisco Giants, enters his 51st campaign with the organization, having played, coached and managed at both the Major and minor league levels. He serves as a roving instructor and a special assignment scout as directed by Brian Sabean.

All-Star third baseman skippered triple-A Fresno in 1998 during the Grizzlies' inaugural campaign, piloting the squad to the Pacific Coast League Southern Division championship. He also served as the first base coach for San Francisco in 1996 after managing then triple-A Phoenix during the second half of the 1995 campaign.

The Siluria, AL native re-joined the Giants organization in 1993 and served as a coach for single-A San Jose until 1995. After serving as San Francisco's manager in 1985, he served as third base coach for Philadelphia in 1988 and Cleveland in 1989 before joining Detroit as an advanced scout from 1991-92. Davenport was also the Giants' third base coach from 1976-82 and the club's advance scout in 1983-84.

Following a 13-year big league career all with the Giants, he remained with the organization and managed Phoenix from 1971-73 before serving as a coach for the Padres from 1974-75.

Davenport, 77, posted a .258 lifetime batting average in 1,501 Major League contests. He earned All-Star status and a Gold Glove in 1962 and was voted by the fans as the third baseman on the Giants' 25th Anniversary Dream Team in 1982.

Davenport and his wife, Betty, reside in San Carlos, and have five children, Randy, Cathy, Ken, Don and Gary, who is the Manager for Short Season Salem-Keizer.

Mario Alioto, a member of the Giants front office since 1983, is responsible for all revenue and marketing areas of the organization. This includes all ticket sales functions, sponsorship and media sales, promotions, special events, ballpark entertainment, advertising and the Giants Dugout Store retail operation. He also oversees the relationships with the team's TV and radio partners (KNBR, Comcast SportsNet Bay Area, NBC Bay Area and KTRB 860 ESPN

Deportes).

Since AT&T Park opened in 2000, Alioto has been responsible for overseeing a record breaking sales strategy that has consistently placed the Giants as one of the top sponsorship generating teams in all of Major League Baseball. Over the past three seasons, Alioto has led the effort that attracted more than 3.3 million fans through the turnstiles, with the club's all-time attendance record of 3,387,303 being reached in 2011.

Alioto served as Vice President, Sales & Marketing during the final years at Candlestick Park. He oversaw a promotional lineup in 1999 that included the first ever bobblehead promotion, which has since become one of the most popular premium items in professional sports. Alioto also played an integral role in developing the Charter Seat program and Winner's Circle sponsorship program as the Giants prepared to build AT&T Park.

Alioto currently serves as Vice Chairman of the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, and is a board member of the San Francisco Giants Community Fund, the Bay Area Sports Hall of Fame, and is a member of the Board of Regents at St. Mary's College. The St. Mary's graduate lived out every youngster's dream by starting with the organization as a batboy in 1973 and later served as Visiting Clubhouse Manager prior to moving to the front office in 1983.

Alioto and his wife Kelly live in the East Bay with their four children.



Jack F. Bair

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL COUNSEL

Jack Bair has served as a trusted counselor and key strategist to the San Francisco Giants baseball team since January of 1993. As he enters his twenty-third season with the Giants, Bair has broad experience assisting and advising every department within the organization. As Senior Vice President & General Counsel, he is responsible for all of the team's legal matters and for managing the team's many and complex relations with the City & County of San Francisco. Bair also serves as President of Giants Development Services, the wholly-owned subsidiary of the San Francisco Giants responsible for real estate matters, including the planned Mission Rock Project just south of AT&T Park. Bair is also leading the current effort to expand the club's Latin American Headquarters in the Dominican Republic.

Bair played a critical role in the Giants successful effort to develop a new ballpark in downtown San Francisco. Bair coordinated the effort to select the site for the new ballpark and contributed significantly to the ballpark's architectural design. Bair was the Giants liaison to the successful 1996 ballpark campaign for the Giants. He wrote and produced the award-winning campaign video and served as the principal spokesperson for the campaign, addressing hundreds of neighborhood, business and political organizations throughout the City. Bair also negotiated the business transaction with the City and coordinated the successful effort to gain all of the local, regional, state and federal governmental approvals necessary for the project to meet its timetable for Opening Day in April of 2000.

In addition to the ballpark architectural style itself, Bair's creative suggestions led to several of AT&T Park's unique features, such as the public promenade behind the Right Field fence, the perched arcade seating area in Right Field and the Ferry Terminal at Seals Plaza. His father's old-time glove served as the model for the world's largest baseball glove that sits above the Left Field bleachers. Bair also planned and developed China Basin Park and its historical elements at McCovey Point. Bair is also credited with launching the Giants Community Fund field renovation program and suggesting one of the more clever baseball advertising programs in the 1990's, placing signage for the "GAP" clothing retailer on outfield fences in what in baseball parlance is

referred to as “the Gap.”

Prior to joining the Giants, Bair worked as a Deputy City Attorney for the City & County of San Francisco. Bair was the attorney assigned to direct the legal effort to save the Giants in 1992 from being sold and relocated to Florida. Before working at the City Attorney’s Office, Bair practiced law at the San Francisco law firm of Farella, Braun & Martel. The San Francisco Business Times & Silicon Valley Business Times honored Bair for his accomplishments in the legal community by awarding him its Lifetime Achievement Award in 2011. Bair was also named by the Daily Journal as one of the “25 Leading General Counsel in California” in June, 2011.

Bair serves as an officer of the Giants Community Fund and serves on the Board of Directors of the Bayview/Hunters Point YMCA. Bair co-founded the San Francisco Neighborhood Theater Foundation with a colleague at the Giants and continues to serve as an officer and member of the Board of Directors. Bair co-produces the Theater Foundation’s annual Mostly British Film Festival at the Vogue Theatre in San Francisco. Bair also serves as an Adjunct Professor at the University of San Francisco in the Sports & Fitness Management Program. Bair played and coached amateur baseball in San Francisco for several years.

Bair is a graduate of the University of California, Davis and Yale Law School.



Jorge Costa

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, BALLPARK OPERATIONS

Jorge Costa enters his 27th year with the Giants, supervising ballpark operations, security, maintenance and construction projects at AT&T Park. Costa oversees all operations staff and event personnel, which includes First Aid, security, groundskeepers, parking, janitorial and facility maintenance. He also serves as the team’s liaison to local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies.

Under Costa’s direction, the Giants became the first professional sports team to create a Traffic Safety Day in 1990 and were pioneers in the implementation of a responsible alcohol management program. He is the recipient of a Lifetime Achievement Award for alcohol management and traffic safety programs from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

Costa was instrumental in earning AT&T Park LEED Certification, the nationally accepted benchmark for design, construction and operation of high performance green buildings. As a result the Giants in 2014 earned their seventh consecutive MLB Green Glove Award for Recycling Excellence as well other Greening awards and best practices recognition from industry experts.

Costa was in Beijing, China for the 2008 Olympics serving as an elite venue chief for operations and security. In addition, he has participated in jewel event operations for Major League Baseball, World Cup Soccer in 1994, the 2006, 2009, and 2013 World Baseball Classic and the first international regular season baseball game held in Monterrey, Mexico in 1996. At the 2007 Pan-American Games in Rio de Janeiro, he served as the operations and security consultant for the US Olympic Committee. Prior to his tenure with the Giants, the Saint Mary’s College graduate served as Commissioner Peter Ueberroth’s West Coast liaison for stadium operations and security, and was chief of operations at the Oakland Coliseum.



Alfonso Felder

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, ADMINISTRATION

Alfonso Felder, who enters his 20th year in the Giants front office, oversees Ballpark Operations, Guest Services, Giants Enterprises, and Human Resources departments. Felder also oversees the Giants Spring Training operations in Scottsdale, Arizona.

Felder was the Giants’ point person for the 2007 All-Star Game at AT&T Park and coordinated the club’s hosting of the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006 and 2013. He has also managed many of the recent capital improvements at AT&T Park as well as the renovation of Scottsdale Stadium and the Giants’ minor league training facilities in Arizona. He was a key player in the planning and development of AT&T Park and continues to manage the Giants’ relationship with the transit and parking operators that serve the ballpark.

Felder’s first job was as a Giants usher at Candlestick Park while growing up in the City. He attended U.C. Berkeley and graduated from Harvard University. Felder resides in San Francisco with his wife, Tara, and sons, Leo and Max.



Leilani Gayles

CHIEF PEOPLE OFFICER

Leilani Gayles is the Chief People Officer for the SF Giants. She is responsible for setting the strategic direction for the San Francisco Giants People agenda and leads the organization in the areas of talent management, staffing, employee relations, compensation and performance management.

Gayles has worked in the human resources field in various environments, ranging from hyper growth start-ups to large technology companies, with a focus on developing high performance teams and winning cultures. She also handles the club's trademark and real estate matters, while managing all legal aspects of the relationships with the Giants' sponsors, broadcasters, landlords, subtenants and major service providers. VICE PRESIDENT, BALLPARK OPERATIONS

Gene oversees the daily operations of AT&T Park and is responsible for maintaining a clean, safe and functional facility. Telucci also manages the budget for Ballpark Operations. A San Francisco native, Telucci began his career more than 30 years ago as a ticket taker at Candlestick Park.



Joyce Thomas

VICE PRESIDENT, HUMAN RESOURCES

Joyce Thomas oversees human resource activities concentrating on all employee benefit programs for the organization. She serves on many benefit boards including the MLB Board of Trustees for the league wide medical program. Thomas, a native of Connecticut, has over 30 years experience working in the human resources field.



Jeff Tucker

VICE PRESIDENT, TICKET SALES

Jeff Tucker develops the business strategy and sales process for: premium sales, group sales/special events, and season ticket sales. He leads the Executive Sales Team; which oversees these areas as well as the Giants Call Center and Ticket Sales Development units.



Willie Mays

ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT

Regarded by many as the best all-around player in baseball history, Willie Mays returned to San Francisco in 1986 and now enters his 29th season in the Giants' front office. In 1993, in one of his first public statements after assuming ownership of the team, former Giants President and Managing General Partner Peter Magowan announced that the franchise was signing Mays to a lifetime contract.

Magowan also announced in 1997 that the front entrance of the club's new ballpark would feature a world-class statue of Mays and the official address of the park would be 24 Willie Mays Plaza. The 83-year-old Mays serves as a Giant emissary. He visits the Giants' minor league teams, as well as Spring Training camp and attends nearly every single Giants home game during the season. The Westfield, AL native also makes appearances on behalf of the club at a variety of civic and charitable events throughout the Bay Area for the Giants Community Fund. He has also made generous contributions to needy children throughout the country through his own Say Hey Foundation charity.

During his 22-year Major League playing career, Mays was named Most Valuable Player twice, 11 years apart, first as a New York Giant and then as a San Francisco Giant. He holds the all-time record for putouts by an outfielder, with a career total of 7,095. He compiled 3,283 hits, won 12 Gold Gloves and appeared in 24 All-Star games. He was third on the all-time home run list with 660 until 2003 when his godson, Barry Bonds, passed him. His career batting average was .302 and for eight consecutive years, he drove in more than 100 runs a season. The "Say Hey Kid" was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1979, the first year of his eligibility (the ninth player to make it on his first try). Mays' uniform number, 24, has been retired by the Giants, as he remains the franchise leader in games played (2,857), at-bats (10,477), runs (2,011), hits (3,187), doubles (504), home runs (646), total bases (5,907) and extra base hits (1,289). He was named team captain of the Giants prior to the 1961 season by manager Alvin Dark.

More recently, Mays has received numerous honors as one of the premier athletes of the past 100 years. *The Sporting News* ranked him second only to Babe Ruth among the 100 greatest baseball players of the 20th century. ESPN listed him as eighth in their ranking of the top 50 athletes of the century. In 2003, former Governor Gray Davis appointed Willie Mays to the State Board of Directors of the California African American Museum.

He is the spokesperson for The Institute on Aging in San Francisco as well as the President and CEO of the Say Hey Foundation, supporting underprivileged youth. He is also a member of the Concordia Club and has recently re-signed with The Topps Company, Inc., an association that began in 1952, that publishes baseball cards. Mays has received honorary degrees from Dartmouth, Miles College, Ohio State University, San Francisco State and Yale University.

Mays makes his home in Atherton.



Willie McCovey

SENIOR ADVISOR

Willie McCovey, whose Hall of Fame playing career with the San Francisco Giants spanned four decades, enters his 15th season as senior advisor to the team.

McCovey, who had hit more home runs (521) than any other left-handed hitter in National League history before Barry Bonds passed him in 2001, began his first formal association with the Giants' current ownership group in 2000. He had previously made special public appearances on an ad hoc basis for the present and previous administrations over the past several years, but had not held a formal front office position with the team since 1986.

In honor of the Hall of Fame great, the portion of San Francisco Bay behind right field at AT&T Park has been named "McCovey Cove." In 2003, the Giants unveiled a statue of McCovey at China Basin Park, which is located across from AT&T Park on the southern shoreline of McCovey Cove. He was honored during the Home Run Derby during the 2007 All-Star Game festivities.

In his current position, McCovey offers his expertise to Giants players when possible, appearing at Spring Training and during the regular season. He also makes occasional speaking appearances, and performs other valuable functions for the team.

One of the most respected and feared hitters in baseball during his 22-year career in the Majors, McCovey was a six-time All-Star, ranks second to Lou Gehrig in career grand slams (18) and hit the most homers (231) ever at Candlestick Park. "Stretch" also established a Major League record for most seasons played (22) as a first baseman. In addition, he became the fifth player in MLB history to earn back-to-back home run and RBI titles, hitting 36 homers and driving in 105 runs in 1968 and then capturing NL Most Valuable Player honors with 45 home runs and 126 RBI in 1969.

McCovey, 77, has made an on-field appearance at the close of every season—with the exception of a few recent years due to his knee ailments—to present the Willie Mac Award. The only Giants award ever named after a former player, the Willie Mac Award was established in 1980 and is given to the Giants player who best exemplifies the spirit and leadership consistently shown by McCovey throughout his career.



Orlando Cepeda

COMMUNITY AMBASSADOR

Orlando Cepeda, who was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1999, is recognized nationally for his humanitarian efforts as an ambassador for baseball and the San Francisco Giants. He begins his 20th season as a community representative for the team and is a member of the Giants Community Fund Advisory Board.

In his current role, the "Baby Bull" visits hospitals, senior centers and inner-city schools in the Bay Area and throughout the United States, speaking to "at-risk" children about the dangers of drugs and alcohol. The 77-year-old Ponce, P.R. native also serves as the honorary spokesman for the Crohn's & Colitis Foundation of America and the Curry Senior Center.

A lifetime .297 hitter with 379 home runs and 1,364 RBI during his 17-year playing career with the Giants, Cardinals, Braves, A's, Red Sox and Royals, Cepeda hit a home run against the Dodgers in his very first Major League game April 15, 1958. He went on to win 1958 Rookie of the Year honors, the 1966 Comeback Player of the Year award, the 1967 NL Most Valuable Player trophy and 1973 Designated Hitter of the Year laurels. He appeared in three World Series, was a six-time All-Star and hit over .300 nine times in his career.

On July 25, 1999, Cepeda was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame during ceremonies in Cooperstown, NY. He became only the second Puerto Rico native to enter the Hall, joining the late Roberto Clemente. Two weeks earlier on July 11, 1999, Cepeda had his uniform No. 30 retired by the Giants during ceremonies at Candlestick Park. As one of the 10 players in the Giants' 123-year history to have their jersey number retired, he joins Willie Mays, Willie McCovey, Juan Marichal and Gaylord Perry as the only five San Francisco players to receive such an honor.

In 1993, the Baby Bull was also inducted into the Puerto Rico Sports Hall of Fame, while in 1999, he was elected to the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame for his great years with the St. Louis Cardinals which followed his tenure with the Giants. In 2004, he was one of four men to receive the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association's Achievement Awards, the MLBPA's highest alumni honor. He was joined by Jim Bunning, Al Kaline and the late Roger Maris.

Orlando and his wife, Miriam, reside in Fairfield. They have five sons--Orlando, Jr., Hector, Carl, Malcolm and Ali Manuel.



Lon Simmons

COMMUNITY AMBASSADOR

Hall of Fame broadcaster and local legend Lon Simmons rejoined the Giants in 2006, serving in a capacity as a community ambassador. In his current duties, Simmons visits San Francisco during selected homestands as well as during the off season.

One of the original voices of the San Francisco Giants, the 2004 Ford Frick Award winner originally teamed with fellow Hall of Famer Russ Hodges to form arguably the finest broadcast team in sports history in 1958 to kick off the first of three different stints in the Giants broadcast booth (1958-73, '76-78 and '96-2002) that spanned 23 seasons.

The man with the trademark "Tell It Goodbye" home run call retired after the 2002 season and was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, NY in the summer of 2004.



Will Clark

COMMUNITY AMBASSADOR

Longtime Giants icon Will Clark joined the Giants front office in January 2009 as a community ambassador. In his role, the six-time All-Star first baseman represents the organization at various in-season and off-season community events in San Francisco. He also attends the Giants Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, Arizona and visits one of the Giants' minor league teams each year.

Clark, who brings the experience of a 15-year Major League playing career to the Giants, previously worked as an advisor to the Arizona Diamondbacks' coaching staff in spring training from 2004-2008.

Drafted by the Giants in the first round (second overall pick) of the 1985 June draft, Clark spent his first eight big league seasons in a San Francisco uniform, compiling a .299 batting average with 176 home runs and 709 RBI in 1,160 games.

One of the best clutch hitters of his time, Clark hit over .300 on 10 occasions. In 1988, he became the first Giants player to drive in 90 or more runs in consecutive seasons since Bobby Murcer in 1975-76. He had one of his finest seasons in 1989, when he batted .333 with 111 RBI, and finished second in the NL Most Valuable Player voting to Giants teammate Kevin Mitchell. He was however named MVP of the '89 NLCS, after batting .650 with a pair of homers and eight RBI, helping San Francisco defeat Chicago four-games-to-one.

One of the premier first basemen in the National League during his time with San Francisco, Clark was also an outstanding defensive player, winning a Rawlings Gold Glove in 1991.

The New Orleans, LA native owned a .303 lifetime average with 284 home runs and 1,205 RBI over 1,976 career games for the Giants (1986-1993), Rangers (1994-98), Orioles (1999-2000) and Cardinals (2000).

Clark, who was a two-time All American at Mississippi State University, was the winner of the Golden Spikes Award as the country's top collegiate player in 1985, hitting .420 with 25 home runs and 77 RBI in 65 games. He was inducted into the College Baseball Hall of Fame in 2006 and was inducted into the Mississippi Sports Hall of Fame in 2008.

He resides in Prairieville, LA with his wife, Lisa, and their son, Trey, and daughter, Ella.



Dave Dravecky

COMMUNITY AMBASSADOR

Former San Francisco Giant pitcher Dave Dravecky currently serves as a community ambassador for the team. In his role, Dave represents the organization at a number of community and sponsor events in San Francisco and the Bay Area. He also attends Giants Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, Arizona, and enjoys representing the organization all over Northern California at various speaking engagements and alumni appearances.

Dave was an All-Star with the San Diego Padres in 1983, and was traded to the Giants in 1987. Winner of the 1989 Willie Mac Award, Dave's story is both touching and inspiring. After discovering a cancerous tumor in his pitching arm in October of 1988, Dave battled back and returned to the majors in August of 1989. After winning his first start, his humerus bone snapped just five days later while throwing a pitch in the 6th inning. The doctors discovered another mass in his left arm, and Dravecky was forced to retire from baseball. After two more surgeries in the next two years, Dave's left arm and shoulder were amputated.

Dave is currently a Christian motivational speaker, author, and proud grandfather. Dave and his wife Jan recently moved back to California to be closer to their family and the two-time World Series Champion San Francisco Giants.



Jeffrey Leonard

COMMUNITY AMBASSADOR

Jeffrey Leonard joined the San Francisco Giants front office as a Community Ambassador prior to the 2014 season. In his role, the two-time All-Star outfielder represents the organization at various in-season and offseason community events in San Francisco. He also attends the Giants Spring Training Camp in Scottsdale, Arizona to attend several organizational events.

Leonard, a 14-year Major League veteran played for the Giants from 1981-88, compiling a .275 batting average with 139 doubles, 24 triples, 99 home runs and 435 RBI in 789 games. His .275 average as a Giant ranks ninth in the SF-era record books and his 115 stolen bases rank seventh.

Nicknamed "HacMan" after the popular video game PacMan, Leonard was known for his "one flap down" routine, running around the bases after hitting a home run with one arm hanging motionless at his side. He had one of his finest seasons in 1987, when he batted .280 with 19 home runs and was named to the National League All Star team. He was named MVP of the '87 NLCS, after batting .417 with four homers and five RBI, despite San Francisco losing the series to St. Louis four-games-to-three.

The Philadelphia, PA native owned a .266 lifetime average with 144 home runs, 614 runs scored and 723 RBI over 1,415 career games for the Dodgers (1977), Astros (1978-81), Giants (1981-1988), Brewers (1988) and Mariners (1989-90).

Leonard, who currently lives in Roseville, CA, is heavily involved in raising funds for breast cancer research. He has his own organization, "One Flap Down Foundation," centered around promoting awareness and finding a cure for breast cancer.

MANAGERIAL/COACHING CAREER

- > Two-time National League Manager of the Year was named the 38th manager in Giants franchise history, and 16th in San Francisco annals, Oct. 27, 2006.
- > His 1,618 victories are the highest total by an active manager and he ranks 18th on the all-time list.
- > Has compiled a 1,618-1,604 (.502) career ledger in 20 seasons as a ML skipper.
- > Leads active managers in consecutive years managed (20).
- > Is the winningest foreign-born manager in ML history, having moved past former Giants skipper Felipe Alou in 2008.
- > Has guided the Giants to three World Championships in the last five seasons (2010, 2012, 2014).
- > Is one of 10 managers to win at least three World Series titles...the other nine are all in the Hall of Fame.
- > Became just the fifth manager to lead a team to three titles in a five year span, joining Connie Mack, Joe McCarthy, Casey Stengel and Joe Torre.
- > Is the second manager in Giants franchise history to win three World Series Championships, joining John McGraw (1905, 1921, 1922).
- > His four World Series appearances as a manager (1998, 2010, 2012, 2014) are the most among all active managers in Major League Baseball.
- > Only Hall of Famer Walter Alston (1959, 1963, 1965-66, 1974 with Dodgers) has more World Series appearances as a manager of a NL West club...Tommy Lasorda (1977-78, 1981, 1988 with Dodgers) and Sparky Anderson (1970, 1972, 1975-76 with Reds) also have four.
- > The Giants have never lost a postseason series in Bochy's tenure...he has now won 10 straight postseason rounds since 2010, the second-longest streak ever by a manager, trailing only Joe Torre's 11 straight with the Yankees from 1998-2001.
- > Guided the 2010 Giants to first-ever World Series title in San Francisco history and first World Championship since 1954.
- > Became the sixth manager in history to manage at least

- two different NL franchises to World Series appearance.
- > Is the fourth skipper to win a World Series Championship at the helm of the Giants, joining John McGraw (1905, 21-22), Bill Terry (1933), and Leo Durocher (1954).
- > Is the first foreign-born manager to reach the World Series (1998) and first European-born manager to win a World Series (2010).

- Is the sixth manager in Giants franchise annals who was primarily a catcher during their career, joining John Clapp (1883), Buck Ewing (1900), Herman Franks (1965-68), Charlie Fox (1970-74) and Wes Westrum (1974-75).
- Was named NL Manager of Year by BBWAA in 1996 and was honored as league's top skipper by *The Sporting News* in both 1996 and 1998.
- Has been part of the coaching staff for NL All-Stars seven times (1997, 1999, 2001, 2007, 2010, 2011, 2013)...has managed three times (1999, 2011, 2013)...1999 squad lost 4-1 to A.L....2011 team defeated A.L. 5-1...2013 club was shut out by A.L. 3-0.

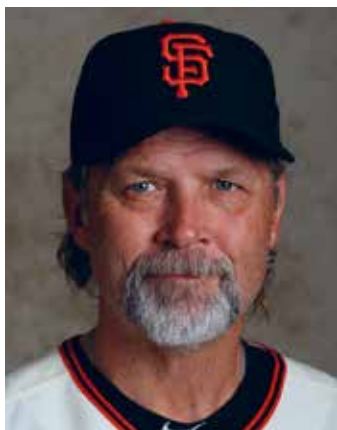

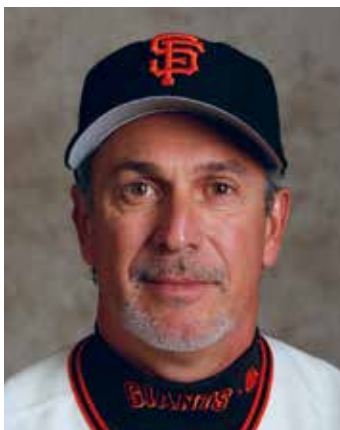

- > Allowed one home run all season in 55.1 innings pitched... in fact, was one of just eight big league pitchers to allow one home run or fewer with a minimum of 50.0 innings pitched.
- > Held left-handed batters to a .231 average against, while right-handed hitters hit .228 of him.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- > 13-year Major League veteran has spent the past six seasons in a Giants uniform (2009-2014)...has also played for the Royals (2002-06), Rockies (2006-07) and Reds (2008).
- > Entering the **2015** season, his 674.1 innings as a reliever are the fourth-most among active pitchers in the Majors behind LaTroy Hawkins (910.1), Joe Nathan (754.1) and Chad Qualls (708.2).
- > Missed a total of 64 games during the **2013** season due to a pair of DL stints (strained right oblique - missed 14 games; strained left groin - missed 50 games).
- > Felt a twinge two pitches into his return from the DL during a brief appearance against the Dodgers on Sept. 12 and after meeting with a specialist it was decided that he needed to have sports hernia surgery which he underwent in Philadelphia on Sept. 26.
- > Pitched for team USA in the World Baseball Classic and appeared in three games (3.1p, 0er).

- > Missed 14 games in late April/early May of **2012** with a sprained right knee that he hurt when his son, Walker, a four year old at the time, who stood at 4-feet-6, 60-pounds, leaped off the sofa and ran into his arms.
- > Missed the final 19 games of the **2011** season after cutting his right hand on Sept. 8 (off day) while trying to separate frozen hamburger patties...sustained a deep gash in his right palm and underwent surgery to fix nerve damage.
- > Suffered a strained left oblique on July 23, **2010** while warming up in the bullpen in Arizona...was placed on the disabled list and missed 23 games.
- > Received one 10th place vote in the NL MVP balloting in **2009** and was named the winner for Setup Man of the Year, presented by This Year in Baseball Awards.
- > Tied Minnesota's Matt Guerrier for the Major League lead with 33 holds, which were also the second most in SF single-season history behind Mike Jackson, who posted 34 in 1993.
- > Posted a career-best 28.0-inning scoreless streak from May 8 to July 24, marking the fifth longest streak by any pitcher in SF-era history, behind Gaylord Perry (40.0ip, '67, '39.0ip, '70), Juan Marichal (30.0ip, '66) and Tim Lincecum (29.0ip, '09).
- > Was traded by the Royals on July 31, **2006** to Colorado for first baseman Ryan Shealy .
- > Made a total of 58 relief appearances for the Royals (49) and triple-A Omaha (nine) throughout the **2005** season... those nine appearances for Omaha came during two stints while rehabbing his strained left groin...was on KC's disabled list twice with a groin injury, from April 16-June 3 and from June 19-July 6.

- > Began the **2003** season in KC's starting rotation, but was converted to a reliever in July, partly due to reoccurrence of blister on his left middle finger and for the second-straight season spent time on 15-day DL with that injury.

- Lives in Spokane with his wife Larisa and three sons.
- **In 2013, released a book entitled *To Stir a Movement: Life, Justice and Major League Baseball* about his Christian faith and his hope for starting a movement to help the needy and marginalized.**
- Is writing a second book called "No Man," the start of a verse that Affeldt has tattooed on his pitching arm and reads in full, "No man shall live for himself."
- **Writes a blog:** <http://jeremyaffeldt.wordpress.com/>
- **His Father was a bombardier in the Air Force, flew B-52s.** Was stationed in Guam so Affeldt spent his second, third and fourth grades there. Father would leave home suddenly on a mission and return later without ever saying where he had gone or what he had been sent to do.
- After father retired from the Air Force, he became a 911 operator.
- His mother is a counselor at a women's clinic in Spokane.
- **Spent grades 5-6-7-8 in Merced, Calif.** He and his family visited SF and went to see the Giants at Candlestick. But the **player he most admired was A's pitcher Dave Stewart.**
- Attended Northwest Christian High School in Spokane. There were 35 students in his graduating class. Not a great high school for attracting scouts.
- **Met his future wife Larisa when they were high school freshmen.** They began dating at the end of their junior year, when they were 16, and have been together ever since.
- Affeldt says he always thought it was important to surround himself with people who believed in him as much as he believed in himself. So he turned down a full scholarship at a small school in Texas because the coach wasn't sure Affeldt was good enough to make it to the major leagues.
- **He also had a full ride to Gonzaga, but he was drafted by the Royals in the third round out of high school.**
- Rookie ball was a big adjustment. He was accustomed to striking everyone out just on natural ability. He had to learn how to pitch.
- He and Larissa married Nov. 20, 1999, when they both were 20 years old. They waited nine years to have children until they were more settled.
- His lowest point was 2000 with Single A Wilmington. He lost 15 games (and won 5). Also had 17 wild pitches that season. He doubted himself. Wondered if this what he was meant to do. Though always religious, he decided to put his career in God's hands. "If this is what you want me to do," he prayed, "you're going to have to carry me." He worked hard but let go of some things. He says it was the turning point.
- The following year, 2001, in Double A Wichita, he made the Texas League All-Star team and post-season All-Star Team. Named to Arizona Fall League Top Prospect Team.
- In 2002, he made the Royals opening-day roster when he was 22 years old and was never sent back down to the minors except for rehab.
- **In 2003, he started the Jeremy Affeldt Foundation** (under the umbrella of the Serving Christian Community Foundation). **In 2006, created "Generation Alive," a youth ministry.** In the off season, he speaks to high schools in Spokane. He talks about leadership, vision, dreams and choices.
- When he and Larisa were in SF for Fanfest in January 2009, they went to dinner with David Batstone, an ethics professor at USF and founder/director of "Not For Sale," a SF-based group that fights human trafficking. A friend of Affeldt's from Kansas City had told Jeremy and Larisa about the organization during the off-season. When they discovered Not For Sale was based in SF, Affeldt emailed Batstone. Batstone was surprised that a pro player would take the initiative to reach out to him. He thought it was a joke at first. "Our hearts just connected with the work they were doing," Larisa says. "And when we found out the director was based in SF, we thought, "This was just meant to be. This is a connection we're meant to make." "
- **Jeremy is well-known in the clubhouse for his great sense of humor.** Larissa's take on the subject: "He thinks he's hilarious."
- **He has a deep-seated fear of sharks.** When he was 8 years old, a lifeguard rushed into the ocean in Guam to save him from a shark. Three months later, he was caught in an undertow and had to be saved again. And on his honeymoon in Bora Bora, his wife finally was able to cajole him into the water – only to watch him take two steps into the ocean and come face to face with a reef shark.
- **The scar above Affeldt's lip is somewhat water-related.** In ninth grade in Spokane, he was fishing with his grandfather and had run back to the car to retrieve something. On his way back he tripped on the dock and fell onto a nail. It tore his upper lip almost off his face. A top Air Force surgeon happened to be at the Spokane hospital and sewed him up after three shots of Novacain. Affeldt had just started a new school in Spokane – "perfect time to do damage to your face," he says.

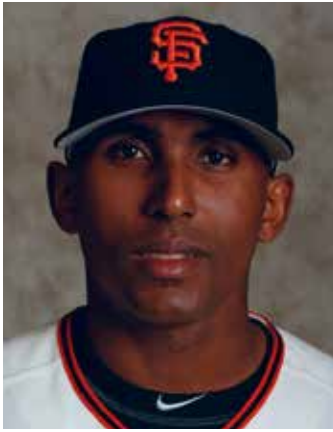

Arias' Giants Gems

- Grew up Santo Domingo.
- **He has seven brothers and sisters in his immediate family** but his father, Felipe, had 14 other children with different women. Joaquin is the youngest of his father's 21 children. He knows all of his siblings and they sometimes get together. Father died in 2010. He was a technician at a TV station. Joaquin's mother was a maid at different homes.
- The family was very poor. The parents and eight children shared two bedrooms and one bathroom. Five boys, three girls. The oldest brother has a supermarket. **Another brother, Alberto, who is one year older than Joaquin, pitched for Houston and Colorado and now is looking at playing for an independent league.** Joaquin helps support his other siblings.
- Asked why only he and Alberto played baseball: When we were kids we watched a lot of TV and saw lots of games and started playing. We played on a bad field with lots of rocks. But we loved baseball so we played there.
- Says his mother bought him his first glove. He says it was a small glove, not very good, but it got the job done. He was 10 years old.
- Had a good coach who encouraged him a lot when he was young.
- Says he was always the best player on every team in both hitting and fielding. Leadoff hitter and shortstop.
- **Watched the Atlanta Braves when he was growing up because they were on TV.** The Braves were his favorite team and Chipper Jones his favorite player.
- Signed with Yankees in July 2001 for \$300,000 at the age of 16 1/2. Was sent to the Yankees' baseball academy in the Dominican for a few years. **In 2004, Baseball America's Prospect Handbook rated him the organization's fourth-best prospect, ahead of Robinson Cano.**
- About his substantial signing bonus: "I didn't think about the money only about helping my mother," he says. As soon as Joaquin signed, he made sure she never worked again. He built her a new home on the same site. Now the neighborhood is a little more dangerous so he'll help her move somewhere else in Santo Domingo, where Arias also still lives — five minutes from his mother.
- Also helped buy six other houses for brothers and sisters. "It's one of my favorite things to do, to help my family," he said.
- **Met wife, Yinet, when they were eight years old.** She came to watch the baseball games when they were kids. Joaquin had a baby with her before eighteen and then at eighteen got married. They now have four children. Joaquin says he wants six or seven. "I like my family. I like kids."
- **Best known perhaps for making the 27th and final out of Matt Cain's perfect game on June 13, 2012, against Houston.** From Chris Haft of MLB.com: "Stationed at third base, Arias cemented history by handling pinch-hitter Jason Castro's grounder and throwing across the diamond. Arias had to back up slightly to field the ball, increasing the difficulty of the throw."

Belt's Giants Gems

- Born April 20, 1988, in Nacogdoches, Texas, in a house his father built.
- Parents are Darrell and Janice (pronounced Ja-neece). He has one younger brother, Cameron. Father is a geometry teacher at Brandon's high school, Hudson High in Lufkin. His mother is a hairdresser.
- At age 8, broke a neighbors mailbox with his head in a bike crash and had to pay for a new mailbox.
- As a senior at Hudson High, Belt earned district MVP, All-State and All-America honors. **Standout pitcher – thought he'd make the major leagues in that position.**
- Had a verbal agreement with Cubs coming out of high school to be drafted in high rounds and paid high-round money. But Cubs didn't come through and Red Sox drafted him the 11th round. Disappointed, Belt went to college instead. "Everything I went through happened for a reason," he says. "I'm so happy I went to college. I matured so much as a baseball player and as a person and I made so many friends."
- Played one year for San Jacinto College in Houston before transferring to University of Texas. (Same two colleges Roger Clemens attended.) Majored in education. **Helped propel Texas to the College World Series in 2009**, where the Longhorns lost in championship game to LSU.

Blanco's Giants Gems

- **Grew up in Venezuela with two brothers – a twin and one seven years younger.** His twin, Gregory, played in the Angels and Pirates minor leagues as a catcher but left after a few years to become a physical education teacher. Younger brother, Gregsman, works as a jobs recruiter for the government. Yes, **the three brothers are Gregor, Gregory and Gregsman.** Why? "I still don't know. My mom said she just liked the names. She even named our house The Gregs and put up a sign."
 - Gregor's mother died of brain cancer at the age of 47.
 - His father sold insurance and now owns a taxi company.
 - **Gregor married his childhood sweetheart in 2010.** They have a son named Gregor Alejandro, and Gregor has another son from a previous relationship named Grenyer. (His brother Gregory's son is named Greyver.)
 - **"I never wanted to do anything but play baseball."** Signed with the Braves at the age of 16 and made major-league debut eight years later, in 2008. He stayed in the majors most of that season and parts of the next two. Traded to Kansas City in the summer of 2010. Between the Braves and the Royals that year, he hit 283 – his best season ever.
 - Then it all fell apart. He didn't spend a single day in the major leagues in 2011. Kansas City started him in Triple A then traded him to the Washington Nationals, who also put him in Triple A. Developed bone spurs in his wrist halfway through the season and had to stop playing. "It was the worst year of my career."
 - But before he went on the DL, former Giants catcher Brian Johnson, a major-league scout for the Giants, saw him play in Triple-A and sent the front office a report that showed a low batting average (from the bone spurs) but a high on-base percentage.
- The Nationals released him Nov. 2. "For two weeks I didn't have a team. I didn't know what was going to happen," Gregor says. The Giants, short on outfielders, signed him to a minor-league contract Nov. 17 while he was playing winter ball in Venezuela. **He became MVP of the league playing for Tiburones de la Guaira.** Giants hitting coach Hensley Meulens, who was coaching in the league, also put in a good word with the Giants. The Marlins were also offering a minor-league contract. "Between Bam-Bam and Pablo Sandoval, they convinced me I should sign with the Giants."
 - Impressing everyone with his bat and speed, Blanco surprised everyone by making the 2012 Opening Day roster.
 - **Blanco made a spectacular catch to preserve Matt Cain's perfect game in 2012.** In the dugout, Cain came up to him and said, "What are you doing playing there? How'd you make that?" Gregor said, "I'm there for you, man. I did it for you."
 - When Cain was honored during a pre-game ceremony later on, he presented Blanco with a photo of the celebration and note thanking him. Gregor told him, "That's my job to catch the ball. And I hope it's not the last time we do something special like that. I hope we can do it again."
 - **In 2012, Gregor's father flew from Venezuela to meet Gregor in Atlanta for the series against the Braves. It was the first time Hernan had seen his son play in the major leagues.** "And I hit a home run in that series, so he was really proud and happy."

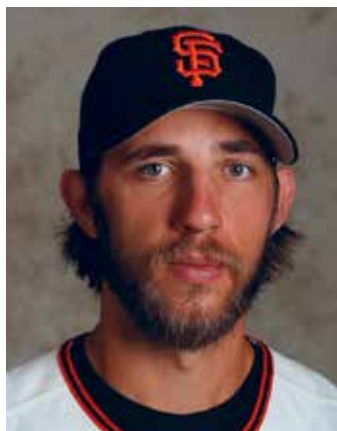

Brown's Giants Gems

- Raised in Diamond Bar, CA., in eastern Los Angeles County. Second of four children (three boys and a girl). Parents divorced when he was two, at which time his mother and the kids moved into her parents' mobile home in an unincorporated area of town.
- For five years, all four kids slept in the same room. Gary and his older brother, Dusty, shared the bottom bunk, sister Torrie in top bunk and younger brother, Gabriel, in a crib.
- Early on, Gary's mother, Julie Brown, worked two part-time jobs -- at Lucky supermarket and at the bar at a bowling alley -- while attending DeVry University. When Gary was in second or third grade, she got a full-time job driving a delivery truck for Droweat bread. She left the house at 1 a.m. and returned around 2:30 p.m. in the afternoon. The kids had to get themselves up and ready for school. **"Gary was always the one to wake up everybody and get them out of the house," Julie says. In elementary school, her kids won perfect attendance awards, and Gary was elected student body president.** Because she was a single mother, the children qualified for free lunches. When Gary was in middle school, Julie switched to a desk job at an electrical wholesaler, where she still works.
- When Gary was in seventh grade, his mother had saved enough to buy her and the kids a mobile home in the same park as her parents, which she still owns.
- "A lot of people hear I'm a Caucasian male from Diamond Bar and assume we were well-off. My mom and grandpa put in a lot of hard work to raise us. I don't like people taking away from what they did. I've been doing my own laundry and making my own meals since I was a little kid. I was a little embarrassed to invite friends over if I didn't know them well. We didn't have a room where we could hang out. We didn't have cable. I always liked to go to other people's houses. My mom always provided for us but some weeks we'd open the fridge and there'd be nothing -- 'OK cereal again or spaghetti and red sauce.' She did a great job of hiding what the real situation was.
- **When he was older, his mother would drive him 2 ½ hours to practice in San Diego and turn around and come back.**
- Gary's father, Troy, is a union plumber and coached Gary in baseball from age 8 until he went to high school.
- Gary attributes his self-confidence to his father's belief in him. He told his high school coach he could bare-hand grounders at third base. The coach told him not to do it, but Gary said he knew he could and he did.
- **"Dad taught me to be an aggressive player.** I was always small. Going into senior year in high school, I was 5-9, 150 pounds. But he always made me believe that I really could do the outrageous things I said I could do on field."
- Says high school coach Rich Gonzales, "He wasn't much to look at when I first saw him -- maybe 5-5, 120 -- a scrawny kid. But he played like he was 6-5 and 220."
- Had straight A's but repeated eighth grade so he would be 18 instead of 17 when he graduated from high school. (He has a September birthday.) His father thought he'd have a better shot at getting an athletic scholarship, which was crucial because the family couldn't afford to pay for college.
- **His mother says he had so much energy that he played soccer, football and baseball -- sometimes two soccer games and two baseball games in one day.** Was fast even as a toddler -- Dad nicknamed him Scooter for how fast he crawled.
- **A setback in his life that he says led to something good: He was devastated when he tore his ACL in his first game of football as a high school freshman, which resulted in also missing most of the baseball season.** "But being out so long helped me realize how much I loved the game." He turned to his faith during that time and, on his own, got baptized. "It was kind like the time I felt that I was becoming a man."
- Co-captain with his best friend as a high school senior. Spent fifth period mowing, raking and lining the field for practice.
- As a senior, he surprised his teammates by trying out and landing a big part -- Cornelius Hackl -- in the school play, Thornton Wilder's "The Matchmaker." It's not something athletes at Diamond Bar High did. Most of the team, including the coach, attended the play. "That's Gary," says his baseball co-captain, Richie Jimenez, who plays baseball at UNLV. "He doesn't care what anybody else thinks. He's always doing the unexpected."
- **"I've always been a little bit of a goof-off.** I was taking a drama class in high school and the drama teacher encouraged me to try out for the play. I was playing soccer at the time but thought I'd try. Then I got the part. Never thought I'd actually do the play because never thought I'd memorize my lines. I like that I had a broad range of friends."
- **He graduated from high school with a 3.8 GPA and was one of five athletes honored at graduation for their academics and community service.**
- Has a reputation not only as a talented player but the hardest worker.
- **Good sense of humor:** There's a video of Gary doing deadpan interviews of his Cal-State Fullerton teammates, coach and even a cartoon elephant on a banner in the outfield. He's asking them about a 7-hole fungo golf tournament the coach had devised to loosen up the team before postseason competition.
- **Has a superstition about always having Chapstick in his back right pocket.**
- **Never liked wearing batting gloves.** Still doesn't wear them. "When I was young, I begged for gloves. Thought I was coolest kid in school. But the first time used them, I threw the bat. I couldn't feel the bat. So never used them again."

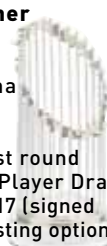

- > Among NL leaders, he finished tied for third in complete games, fourth in wins, fourth in innings pitched, fourth in strikeouts and 14th in ERA.
- > The Giants went 20-13 in his outings (13-5 on the road and 7-8 at home).
- > His 18 wins were the most by a SF pitcher since Shawn Estes had 19 in 1997.
- > Became one of three left-handed pitchers in Giants history to record 15 or more wins in multiple seasons before turning age 26...joined Rube Marquard (1911-1913, 3) and Cy Seymour (1897-1898, 2).
- > Was one of just five left-handed pitchers in Giants franchise history to record 200-or-more strikeouts in a season,

joining Cy Seymour (239, 1898), Rube Marquard (237, 1911), Ray Sadecki (206, 1968) and Jonathan Sanchez (205, 2010)...his 219 strikeouts were the third-most by a Giants lefty behind Seymour and Marquard.

- > Had six double-digit strikeout games, the second most in the NL behind Clayton Kershaw (7).
- > Was one of the best pitchers on the road, going 11-4 with a 2.22 ERA (31er, 125.2ip) in 18 starts (3 CGs)...his 11 road victories matched Kershaw and Adam Wainwright for the most in the Majors while his road ERA ranked as the fourth-lowest in the NL.
- > Was selected to his second consecutive All-Star team as he finished fourth on the player ballot, behind Johnny Cueto, Adam Wainwright and Clayton Kershaw...however, was not eligible to pitch because he started the Sunday prior to the break...he didn't pitch in the All-Star Game in 2013 either, as Bochy held him back for long relief.
- > Averaged the second-most run support in the NL (behind COL's Jorge De La Rosa, 6.20), averaging 5.76 runs per game, the most he ever received in his career.

- ▶ Led the league with nine pickoffs and allowed just 7-of-17 runners to steal off him (41.2%), the fifth-lowest stolen base pct. in the NL.
- ▶ Was named the NL's Pitcher of the Month twice: May (5-0, 2.08 ERA, 48 Ks, 5 BBs) and August (4-1, 1.57 ERA, 56 Ks, 3 BBs).
- ▶ Was named the "Willie Mac" award winner, an annual honor bestowed upon the most inspirational player on the team, as voted upon by Giants players, coaches, training staff and the fans.
- ▶ Was named by Bruce Bochy as the Opening Day starter on Feb. 25...at 24 years and 242 days old on March 31, Bumgarner became the third-youngest Giants opening day starter since the Giants moved to San Francisco in 1958.
- ▶ He also became the third youngest left-hander to start a season opener in Giants franchise history (since 1883)...only Ledell "Cannonball" Titcomb (21 years and 242 days of age on April 20, 1888 at Washington) and Mark Davis (23 years and 167 days of age on April 3, 1984 vs. Chicago-NL) were younger than Bumgarner (courtesy of Bill Arnold).
- ▶ Became the sixth youngest Giants pitcher to record 50 wins (all with the Giants) in franchise history with his victory on April 5 at Los Angeles (6.1 ip, 2er)...Rube Marquard (22 years, 260 days), Mike McCormick (22, 303), Christy Mathewson (22, 331), Doc Crandall (23, 363) and Hal Schumacher (24, 156) were younger (Elias).
- ▶ Hit his third career home run and his first career grand slam in his second at-bat off Colorado's Jorge De La Rosa on April 11, 2014 at AT&T Park...became just the second Giants pitcher to hit a grand slam since the team moved to San Francisco in 1958 and the first since Shawn Estes did so on May 24, 2000 vs. Montreal (off Mike Johnson)...Bumgarner also added a sacrifice fly in his first at-bat to finish with five RBI, matching Estes, Dave Koslo, Hal Schumacher and Jack Scott for the most RBI in a game by a Giants pitcher since 1914.
- ▶ Finished May with a 5-0 record, a 2.08 ERA, and 48 strikeouts in 39.0 innings to win NL Pitcher of the Month, his first monthly award of his career...only three other pitchers in the Giants' modern history won at least five games in a month without a loss, and with as many strikeouts: Jason Schmidt (5-0 with 54 strikeouts) in May 2004, Ray Sadecki (6-0 with 48 strikeouts) in September 1967, and Juan Marichal (6-0 with 60 strikeouts) in September 1963.
- ▶ Became the second pitcher in Major League history to hit two grand slams in a season, clubbing his second in the Giants' 8-4 win over the D-Backs on July 13...his batterymate, Buster Posey also hit a grand slam in the game...according to Elias, Bumgarner and Posey were the first pitcher-catcher ever to hit a grand slam for the same team in the same game...it marked the third time that the Giants hit two grand slams in a game since moving to San Francisco...the last instance was Sept. 19, 1998 vs. Los Angeles-NL (the hitters were Bill Mueller and Jeff Kent)...it also happened on April 26, 1970 vs. Montreal (Willie McCovey and Dick Deitz)...it was just the second time in the Giants' 132-year history they hit grand slams in consecutive innings of the same game: Mueller and Kent did it against the Dodgers in 1998.
- ▶ Among the players who hit fewer than two grand-slam homers in their entire career are Prince Fielder (288 total home runs) and Derek Jeter (260)...among those who never hit two in one season: Miguel Cabrera, Lance Berkman, Carlton Fisk, Tony Perez, and Al Kaline.
- ▶ Became the first San Francisco Giants starting pitcher to win consecutive team games (started the last game of the first half and first game of the second half)...the last Giants pitcher to accomplish this was Johnny Antonelli for the New York Giants, Sept. 25-29, 1956.
- ▶ Threw his second career shutout on Aug. 3 at New York-NL, allowing just two hits with 10 strikeouts on just 94 pitches...threw nearly 80 percent (79.8) of his pitches for strikes, the second-highest percentage he's had in a game in his career.
- ▶ Struck out 25 batters in a two-start span from Aug. 21-26, the third-most strikeouts in Giants history in consecutive games (since 1900)...only John Montefusco (27 strikeouts from Aug. 27-31, 1975) and Jason Schmidt (26 from May 31-June 6, 2006) had more.
- ▶ Pitched a one-hitter and matched his career-high of 13 strikeouts in his start Aug. 26 vs. Colorado...retired his first 21 batters before Justin Morneau doubled down the right-field line to start the 8th, ending his perfect game bid through 7.0 innings, the longest such bid of his career.
- ▶ Became the fourth LH pitcher in the last 50 years to throw a shutout with 0/1 hits allowed while recording 13-plus strikeouts and no walks...others: Sandy Koufax (Sept. 9, 1965 vs. CHC), Randy Johnson (May 18, 2004 at ATL) and Clayton Kershaw (June 18, 2014 vs. COL).
- ▶ Was named NL Pitcher of the Month for August after striking out a league-high 56 batters while going 4-1 with three complete games in six starts...also paced the Senior Circuit with a 1.57 ERA and ranked first in innings pitched...became the second pitcher in the modern era to have at least 55 strikeouts and three walks or fewer in a calendar month (other: Curt Schilling, 2002).
- ▶ Matched up with Detroit's LHP David Price on Sept. 6 and earned the victory despite allowing three runs on 10 hits in SF's 5-4 win...entered the game with 199 strikeouts and did not record a strikeout for the first time in 145 career starts...also didn't issue a walk...according to Elias, no

pitcher had failed to strike out a batter in a start of at least five innings after entering that game with a season total of strikeouts as high as Bumgarner's since Vic Willis of the 1902 Boston Braves (214 strikeouts) on September 27, 1902.

- Including the postseason, he made 39 total starts in 2014, the most by any Giants pitcher since Ron Bryant made 39 starts in 1973.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Was named by manager Bruce Bochy to the **2013** National League All-Star team, his first All-Star selection as a Major Leaguer, although he did not appear in the game... became the first Giants left-handed pitcher to make the ASG since Shawn Estes in 1997.
- Ended the '13 season with a 19-consecutive start stretch of allowing three earned runs or fewer, the longest such streak by a Giants pitcher since Tim Lincecum went 19 straight from Aug. 16, 2007-June 11, 2008...the last Giants starter to do this in a single season was Ed Whitson - 19 straight starts from June 7-Sept. 25, 1980 (courtesy of Stats, Inc.).
- On June 14, 2013 at Atlanta he lost a no-hit bid in the 6th inning on a single by Chris Johnson that fell among three teammates...was perfect through 14 hitters until he walked B.J. Upton in the 5th...overall, blanked the Braves on two hits and 10 strikeouts in 7.0-scoreless innings.
- In **2012**, he became the first Giants pitcher to have a 16+ win season at age 23-or-younger since Hal Schumacher won 23 games for the New York Giants in 1934 at the age of 23.
- On April 12, Bumgarner (22 years, 225 days old) and Jamie Moyer (49 years, 146 days old) faced one another in what was the third-largest age difference in a starting pitching matchup all-time.
- Took a no-hitter into the sixth inning on April 12 at Colorado, however allowed a one-out triple to Tyler Colvin...his 5.1 innings without allowing a hit was the longest of his career.
- Batted in the eighth spot in the order on May 16 vs. St. Louis against LHP Jaime Garcia...marked just the second time in Giants franchise history that their starting pitcher batted in that spot in the order (only other time was May 20, 2010 at Arizona; Lincecum batted eighth, Torres ninth).
- On June 12 vs. Houston, struck out 12 batters (one shy of his career-high) in 7.2 innings and launched the Giants' first home run in nearly a month in a 6-3 win...led off the third inning by hitting a solo home run off of RHP Bud Norris to left field for his first career home run.
- Became just the third Giants pitcher since 1900 to hit a

home run and strike out at least a dozen batters...Juan Marichal accomplished the feat on Sept. 12, 1963 at New York-NL (HR, 13 Ks) and so did Mike Krukow on Aug. 13, 1985 vs. Houston (HR, 12 Ks).

- Took a no-hitter into the sixth inning of his start on June 28 vs. Cincinnati, but allowed a leadoff single to Ryan Hanigan to start the 6th, his only hit allowed in what was his first career complete game and his first shutout in SF's 5-0 win...extended the Giants' team scoreless streak to 36.0 innings and put the Giants in the record books as it was the team's fourth-consecutive shutout, a new franchise record.
- Hit his second career home run on Sept. 11 at Colorado, hitting a three-run shot off of Jhoulys Chacin in the 4th inning...became the first Giants pitcher to hit a home run while driving in at least three runs since Noah Lowry did so on Aug. 24, 2007.
- Signed a five-year extension through 2017 with a club/ vesting option for 2018 and a club option for 2019 on April 6...the 5-year extension covers Bumgarner through his arbitration years and his first year of free agency (2017).
- Endured his worst start of his career and one of worst in Giants history on June 21, **2011** vs. Minnesota...recorded just one out while allowing eight first inning runs...faced 10 batters and retired only pitcher Carl Pavano, becoming the first player in baseball's modern era to allow as many as nine hits while recording fewer than two outs.
- Became the first Giants starting pitcher since 1900 to allow eight-or-more runs without getting out of the first inning.
- Issued two walks-or-fewer in 19-consecutive starts from April 17-July 24...became the first Giants pitcher to accomplish that feat since Juan Marichal went 21-straight starts between July 17, 1970-April 20, 1971, allowing two walks-or-fewer...Marichal is the only other SF Giant to do this in a single season as went 23-straight starts between April 10-July 18, 1968 (STATS, Inc.).
- Recorded back-to-back double-digit strikeout games Aug. 31 (11 Ks vs. CHC) and Sept. 5 (13 Ks at SD), becoming the first Giants left-hander in the modern era (1900 to date) with consecutive starts of more than 10 Ks.
- Earned his first Major League victory July 6, **2010** in Milwaukee after tossing 8.0-scoreless innings and allowing only three hits in SF's 6-1 win...according to Elias, only two other Giants rookies pitched a game like that: Noah Lowry in 2004 when he tossed 9.0-shutout frames against the Reds on Aug. 3 and Matt Cain, who accomplished it twice in 2006, tossing 9.0-scoreless innings at Oakland on May 21 and blanking Colorado for 8.0 innings on Sept. 14.
- At 20 years, 339 days, became the second-youngest

Giants pitcher in the last 25 years to win his first Major League game and first since Matt Cain in 2005...Cain was just one day younger than Bumgarner at 20 years, 338 days when he won his first big league contest on Sept. 4 at Arizona.

- > Made his Major League debut for the Giants in **2009** with a Sept. call-up, posting a 1.80 ERA (2er, 10.0ip) in four games (one start).
- > Made his Major League debut Sept. 8 vs. San Diego, taking the place of RHP Tim Lincecum, who was scratched from his scheduled start due to back spasms.
- > At 20 years and 38 days old became the fourth-youngest Giants pitcher to make his Major League debut...only Mike McCormick (17 years and 342 days), Nestor Chavez (19 years and 65 days) and Ron Bryant (19 years and 321 days) were younger (Sports Features Group)...in fact, became franchise's youngest pitcher to start a game in his Major League debut since the Giants moved west in 1958...Mike McCormick started for San Francisco as a 19-year-old, however made his ML debut two years earlier as member of the New York Giants.
- > Was summoned from double-A, where he was originally scheduled to start an Eastern League playoff opener on Sept. 9...learned that he was that night's starting pitcher roughly three hours prior to game time, and retired his first four batters faced before giving up a home run to Chase Headley in the 2nd inning...gave up another solo shot to Kevin Kouzmanoff in 4th frame...marked the first time in 2009 (minor leagues included) that he had surrendered a pair of HRs in a single contest...left with a 3-2 lead that was quickly erased as Will Venable hit a solo HR to center against Brandon Medders...the Giants ended up losing the contest, 4-3.
- > Prior to joining the big league club combined to go 12-1 with a 1.85 ERA (27er, 131.1ip) and .211 avg. against (100-for-475) in 25 games (24 starts) with Class-A Advanced San Jose and double-A Connecticut...began the year at Class-A Advanced San Jose, going 3-1 with a 1.48 ERA (4er, 24.1ip) and 23 strikeouts in five starts...was transferred to double-A Connecticut May 7 and helped Defenders win first division title as Giants' affiliate after going 9-1 with a 1.93 ERA (23er, 107.0ip) in 20 games (19 starts).
- > Was named to the Eastern League All-Star team, but did not appear in the game.
- > Posted perhaps the best season of any Giants farmhand in **2008**, winning the South Atlantic League triple crown, going 15-3 with a 1.46 ERA and 164 strikeouts for SAL Champion Augusta GreenJackets.
- > Named 2008 Minor League Baseball's Most Spectacular Pitcher for finishing the season with the lowest ERA...

was also named to SAL in-season and postseason All-Star teams, along with earning SAL Pitcher of Week honors on five different occasions...was named MiLB's best starting pitcher for all of Class A leagues.

- > Reeled off 38.0-consecutive scoreless innings July 28-Aug. 27, 2008 (span of six starts), marking the longest scoreless stretch by a hurler in all of minor league baseball.
- > Named San Francisco's 2008 Pitcher of the Year, joining Pablo Sandoval (Player of Year) as the first two recipients to earn the inaugural award.

POSTSEASON CAREER

- > Has already won three World Series titles before the age of 26 years old and has been one of the most dominating postseason pitchers in baseball history in his three post-season stints.
- > Has gone 7-3 with a 2.14 ERA, two complete games (two shutouts) and 77 strikeouts in 88.1 innings.
- > Had one of the greatest postseason's of all time in **2014**, going 4-1 with a 1.03 ERA and one save in seven games (six starts)...he had two wins, a 5.0-inning save and an 0.43 ERA in the World Series...he won the wild-card game at Pittsburgh, and won the LCS and World Series MVP honors, clinching the World Series with 5.0-scoreless innings of relief in Game 7.
- > Became the seventh player (fourth pitcher) ever to be named the LCS MVP and the World Series MVP in the same season, joining Willie Stargell (1979 Pirates), Darrell Porter (1982 Cardinals), Orel Hershiser (1988 Dodgers), Liván Hernández (1997 Marlins), Cole Hamels (2008 Phillies) and David Freese (2011, Cardinals).
- > Is the 26th pitcher (28th time) to win the World Series MVP Award, the first in Giants franchise history and the first pitcher overall since Philadelphia's Cole Hamels in 2008...Bumgarner joins former teammate Edgar Rentería (2010) and teammate Pablo Sandoval (2012) as the only World Series MVP winners in Giants history.
- > Became the first pitcher with two wins, a shutout and a save in a World Series since the save rule became official in 1969.
- > Is the first pitcher with a 5.0-inning save in postseason history.
- > He's also the first pitcher with two wins, a sub-0.50 ERA in at least 20.0 innings in a single World Series since Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax for the 1965 Dodgers.
- > Logged 52.2 innings in the 2014 postseason, the most of any pitcher in a single postseason, surpassing Curt Schilling's 48.1 innings.
- > If Bumgarner were never to pitch in the World Series again, his 0.25 ERA would be the best of anyone with at

least 20.0 innings pitched.

- Tossed a complete-game shutout in Game 5 of the 2014 World Series, permitting just four hits with no walks and eight strikeouts...the performance was just the 16th shutout in World Series history in which no walks were allowed, and the first since Kansas City's Bret Saberhagen in Game 7 of the 1985 World Series...in Giants history, Christy Mathewson accomplished the feat in Games 1 and 5 of the 1905 Fall Classic, while Rube Benton did so in Game 3 of the 1917 World Series.
- In 52.2 innings in the 2014 postseason, he permitted just six earned runs (1.03 ERA) on 28 hits with six walks and 45 strikeouts...among pitchers with at least 30.0 innings pitched in a single postseason, his ERA of 1.03 ranks third behind Burt Hooton of the Dodgers (0.82 over 33.0 IP in 1981) and Atlanta's John Smoltz (0.95 over 38.0 IP in 1996).
- Pitched at least 7.0 innings in each of his six starts, becoming the second pitcher in history to do so, joining Arizona's Curt Schilling (six starts in 2001).
- Is the ninth player in Major League history to throw multiple shutouts in the same postseason...the only younger pitcher with multiple shutouts in one postseason was Josh Beckett at age 23 with the Marlins in 2003.
- Did not allow a run in his first 21.0 innings pitched in the World Series (dates back to 2010), the second-longest consecutive scoreless innings streak to start a World Series career in Major League history, behind Christy Mathewson's 28.0-inning run from 1905 to 1911... Bumgarner's streak was snapped in Game 1 of the WS at Kansas City after allowing a solo home run to Salvador Perez in the 7th inning.
- Seven other pitchers had a streak of 21 consecutive scoreless innings in the World Series at any point in their careers: Whitey Ford (major-league record 33 straight scoreless innings, 1960-1962), Babe Ruth (29, 1916-1918), Mathewson (28, 1905-1911), Lew Burdette (24, 1957), Sandy Koufax (22, 1965-1966), George Earnshaw (22, 1930), and Carl Mays (21, 1918-1921).
- Bumgarner's road scoreless streak in the postseason also ended at a record 32.2 innings.
- Has made five career postseason starts of 7.0-or-more innings pitched with no runs allowed, the most such starts in Giants franchise history.
- In the Wild Card game at Pittsburgh, he became the third pitcher to notch a shutout with at least 10 strikeouts in a winner-take-all postseason game, joining Sandy Koufax (for the Dodgers against the Twins in the 1965 World Series) and Justin Verlander (for the Tigers against the A's in the 2012 ALDS).
- Tossed consecutive World Series Games of at least 7.0-scoreless innings with at least six strikeouts in the 2012 postseason...the only pitchers in MLB history to accomplish that were Christy Mathewson of the Giants in Games 1 and 3 of the 1905 World Series; Bill Hallahan of the Cardinals in Game 3 in 1930 and Game 2 in 1931; Don Larsen of the Yankees in Game 5 in 1956 and Game 3 in 1958; and Sandy Koufax of the Dodgers in Games 5 and 7 in 1965.
- Had one of the most memorable postseasons of any 21-year-old in 2010, going 2-0 with a 2.18 ERA (5er, 20.2ip) in four games (three starts).
- Earned his first career postseason victory in Game 4 of the LDS vs. Atlanta on Oct. 11, a contest that SF won 3-2 to advance to the LCS...tossed 6.0 innings and yielded two runs on six hits...became the youngest Giants pitcher in franchise history to win a postseason game at 21 years and 71 days old.
- Was the first rookie starting pitcher to win a clinching game on the road in the postseason since Dave Righetti (Yankees at A's, Game 3 of ALCS) and Fernando Valenzuela (Dodgers at Expos, Game 5 of NLCS) pitched their teams to World Series in 1981.
- In Game 4 of World Series on Oct. 31, 2010, Bumgarner joined teammate Buster Posey as the first all-rookie starting battery in a World Series game since Spec Shea and Yogi Berra started for the Yankees in Game 1 of the 1947 World Series (*Elias*).
- At 21 years, 91 days old, was the fifth-youngest pitcher to start a World Series game.
- Became the fourth-youngest starter to win a World Series game as the Giants took a 3-1 series lead over the Rangers on Oct. 31, 2010 with a 4-0 shutout victory...logged 8.0 innings and didn't allow an earned run becoming the youngest to ever accomplish that feat... Bumgarner's dominance gave the Giants their fourth shut-out of the postseason, tying 1998 Yankees and 1905 New York Giants for the most in a single postseason in Major League history.
- Only three starting pitchers younger than Bumgarner (21 years, 91 days old) have ever won a game in World Series history – Bullet Joe Bush (20 years, 316 days) for 1913 Athletics, Jim Palmer (20 years, 356 days) for 1966 Orioles and Fernando Valenzuela (20 years, 356 days) for 1981 Dodgers.

Bumgarner's Giants Gems

- **From Hudson, NC, a town of 2800 people 90 minutes northwest of Charlotte.** "You wave at everybody you see, pretty much," he says.
- 10th pick in 2007 draft out of South Caldwell High School.
- **Madison followed the 2007 MLB draft in the main administration office of his high school along with his coaches, entire baseball team and some classmates.** He had just finished baseball practice. Picked 10th overall. That night, he and his family celebrated at a Mexican restaurant, where people congratulated him all night and took pictures. "I didn't have a whole lot of time to eat," he says. "I'll remember that day for a long time."
- With his \$2 million signing bonus, paid off his mother's house and bought himself and then-fiancé, Ali, new trucks. (He replaced his 1999 Dodge truck that had 150,000 miles on it.)
- **Married high school sweetheart Ali Saunders on Valentine's Day 2010. The story of giving her a five-day-old bull calf as a wedding present has been exaggerated. He says Ali wanted a calf and he bought her one.**
- While Madison played in the minor leagues, Ali studied stenography at Caldwell Community College in N.C.
- **His father's family goes back 100 years in Caldwell County.** One area is called "Bumtown" for all the Bumgarner's living on both sides of Deal Mill Road. It's four miles southeast of Hudson and 10 miles northwest of Hickory. Madison's father Kevin Bumgarner has lived most of his life along Deal Mill Road. "Typical of many BumTownians," the local Hickory Daily Record reports, "Kevin lives about 100 yards across the road from his mother Mary's house, which is where he grew up. Likewise, Madison bought a 38-acre farm about three miles down the road, and pursues his off-season passion of raising and riding horses."
- Ali grew up near Hudson, off Pine Mountain Road, about two miles from Bumtown.
- **Called Maddy by most family and hometown friends. Called MadBum by teammates.**
- His mother, Debbie, underwent major surgery just to be able to conceive him, after having an earlier family of three children. After 5½ hours of surgery to reverse a tubal ligation, she says doctors gave her a 38 percent chance of being able to have additional babies. "Mr. Madison was quite a miracle," she says. Her other children were 18, 16 and 14 when Madison was born.
- His first word was "ball." A baby picture at 15 months, shows him with a baseball in his left hand.
- Since he was 11 years old, he has been a member of the non-denominational Christian Fellowship Chapel in Granite Falls. He prays before each inning he pitches. "I don't do it to help me through the inning but rather to be a witness to God and maybe help someone who looks up to us (players)." He was saved at the age of 15, along with his brother, at

the end of a five-day church revival. "I know I would not be where I am right now if not for God." He says, "I try to live a good Christian lifestyle. I don't drink and party and cuss or any of that stuff, and I just try to be a good example."

- **Fishes and hunts deer and bear.** Only kills what he eats. Says he can cook venison – on the grill – but had to leave the bear meat to people who know what they're doing. Say bear meat can be really greasy if you don't cook it right. Has killed one bear. Mounted the head on his wall.

- **At age 17, he began competing with Ali's father and brother in team-roping.** In 2010, reliever Jeremy Affeldt invited Bumgarner and his wife Ali, to stay at his Alamo house during a homestand; Affeldt wanted company while his wife stayed in Spokane, Wash., after the birth of their second child. "He practiced roping cows by roping my lawn furniture," Affeldt said. "He's good at it. I'd come home and he'd be spinning this rope," Affeldt said. "He's lassoing all my furniture. Then he wants to make me walk this weird, funky walk while he's trying to lasso my foot."

- Parents divorced when he was 12. He lived afterward with his mother, who works in the accounting office for Pepsi. His father is a college baseball umpire and night-shift employee of food wholesaler MDI.

- He has two half-brothers from his mother's previous marriage. All still live in Hudson. Both brothers work in the bubble-wrap plant in Hudson.

- His half-sister Dena Byrd died in 2010 at age 36. "We grew up in the same house. She was a good girl. I loved her to death."

- When he went to rookie camp in Arizona for a month in 2007, he had a very difficult time. He missed his family so much that quitting baseball "certainly crossed my mind." Bobby Evans, the director of player personnel – and also from North Carolina – helped him through his rough patch. By the time Madison returned to Arizona for spring training, he was fine. "It seemed like I had been doing this all my life."

- Bumgarner loved playing in Augusta for the Giants' Low-A club because he could go home on off days and his parents, grandparents, siblings, fiancé (now wife) and her family could attend most of his games there. In San Jose for Single A, Ali stayed with him for two of the four weeks he was there; he didn't live with a host family like most players but instead stayed at the Pruneyard Inn.

- **His teammates in Double A Norwich, where he spent the 2009 summer, nicknamed him "The Future."**

- Very competitive. During a game in Norwich, when Boston's top draft pick Lars Anderson was taking too much time getting ready in the batter's box, Bumgarner threw the pitch up and high, dropping Anderson to his knees.

2014 SEASON

- > 29-year-old had an injury plagued season, landing on the disabled list three separate times, with his last DL stint ending his season following the All-Star break...overall, went just 2-7 with a 4.18 ERA (42er, 90.1ip) in 15 games/starts.
- > His DL stints included a cut on his right index finger, a strained right hamstring and right elbow inflammation, which he ended up having season-ending surgery on to remove bone chips from his right elbow.
- > Was scratched from his scheduled start on April 29 vs. San Diego after cutting the tip of his right index finger after making a sandwich in the Giants' clubhouse kitchen...after the ham and cheese sandwich was fully assembled, he grabbed, dropped and tried to catch a knife he hoped to use to cut it...the cut did not require stitches, but kept him from taking the mound because it occurred at a spot where he released pitches from.
- > Was placed on the 15-day disabled list from May 5 (retroactive to April 24) to May 10 with the cut on his finger...missed 15 games (total of two starts)...was scheduled to start May 5 at Pittsburgh, but the cut had not healed sufficiently and was placed on the DL.
- > Was reinstated off the DL on May 10 and started that day at Los Angeles-NL.
- > Strained his right hamstring on May 21 at Colorado and was removed after 3.0-scoreless innings...suffered the injury on his last pitch of the 3rd inning after striking out Charlie Blackmon with his 36th pitch...felt a twinge in his hamstring and was escorted to the trainers' room...underwent an MRI and was diagnosed with a Grade 1

- strain (mild strain).
- > Was skipped from his scheduled start on May 26 vs. Chicago-NL due to the hamstring injury...threw a bullpen session May 24 and it was cut short after he threw just 15 pitches.
- > Had hoped to start against the Cardinals on May 31, but still felt a bit of discomfort and the club did not want to take any chances so was placed on the 15-day disabled list May 31-June 6 with a strained right hamstring.
- > Landed on the 15-day disabled list for the third time on July 21 with right elbow inflammation related to bone chips floating in his elbow...the fragments were first discovered in 2010, but he had been able to pitch with them without discomfort.
- > Received opinions from three different surgeons about his elbow, including Dr. James Andrews, Giants orthopedist Dr. Ken Akizuki and Mets orthopedist Dr. David Altchek...it was recommended that he have surgery to remove the bone chips from his pitching elbow.
- > Underwent season-ending surgery on Aug. 11...Cain expects to begin throwing in December and he should be ready for spring training.
- > Had arthroscopic surgery on his right ankle on Sept. 27 to remove a bone spur...the surgery was performed by Dr. Ken Akizuki and Dr. Larry Oloff in San Francisco...his recovery time is two months.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- > Was placed on the disabled list for the first time in his career on Aug. 23, 2013 with a right forearm contusion (Aug. 23-Sept. 7)...in his nine years in a Giants uniform

he had never missed a start due to injury and had been skipped in the rotation just once.

- Matched his career-high by allowing nine runs (all of which came in the 4th inning) in his second start of the season on April 7, 2013 vs. St. Louis...the Cardinals sent 13 batters to the plate in the inning, collecting eight hits, two walks and a HBP.
- Cain became the first Giants pitcher to give up at least nine runs in an inning since Ernie Shore gave up 10 runs, three earned, in his Major League debut with the New York Giants in 1912...Cain was the first Giants starting pitcher to give up nine runs in an inning since Jack Cronin in 1902.
- Left his start on August 22 vs. Pittsburgh in the 4th inning after getting hit on his right forearm by a line drive off the bat of Gaby Sanchez that went for a 1-4-3 putout...ended up with a contusion on his right forearm and X-rays were negative, however was placed on the 15-day disabled list for the first time in his career the very next day...had made 261 starts before his first DL stint.
- Missed a total of two starts and was reinstated off the DL on Sept. 7.
- Tossed the 22nd perfect game in Major League Baseball history on June 13, **2012** vs. Houston...it was the first perfect game in the 130th-season history of the Giants franchise.
- His perfect game marked the 14th no-hitter in Giants franchise history and the sixth in SF-era history (since 1958).
- Was one of three pitchers to have a perfect game in 2012, joining Philip Humber of the Chicago White Sox on April 21 at Seattle and Felix Hernandez of the Mariners on Aug. 15 vs. Tampa Bay...marked the first time in Major League history that three perfect games have been recorded in the same season.
- Fanned 14 batters and threw 125 (86 strikes) pitches in his perfect game, a 10-0 victory against the visiting Houston Astros...the 14 strikeouts were a career-high for Cain and tied the record for the most strikeouts in a perfect game, set by Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax in 1965...it was the highest strikeout total in a no-hitter since Hall of Famer Nolan Ryan fanned 16 Blue Jays on May 1, 1991.
- Was selected to his third career NL All-Star team via the player ballot, receiving 234 votes (the second-most by an NL starting pitcher behind NYM's R.A. Dickey, 342).
- Was named the starting pitcher for the Mid-Summer Classic by manager Tony LaRussa...became the seventh pitcher in Giants history to start an All-Star Game (eighth time), joining joining Carl Hubbell (1934), Juan Marichal (1965, 1967), Vida Blue (1978), Rick Reuschel (1989), Jason Schmidt (2003) and Tim Lincecum (2009).
- Signed a five-year extension with a club/vesting player option for the 2018 season on April 2.
- Was named to his second career All-Star team in **2011**... was named to his second career All-Star team by manager Bruce Bochy...did not pitch in the contest as he was ineligible to play due to making a start on July 10, the final game before the All-Star break.
- Led the National League and was tied for third in the Majors with 26 quality starts...only Detroit's Justin Verlander and Los Angeles' (AL) Jered Weaver had more (each with 28).
- Missed nearly two weeks in Spring Training with right elbow inflammation...had a MRI exam after feeling soreness stemming from his outing on Feb. 27 at Arizona in which he threw 2.0-scoreless innings.
- Was named to his first career All-Star team in **2009**, along with Tim Lincecum, marking just the third time in SF-era history that SF had a pair of starting pitchers on the All-Star roster...did not pitch in ASG July 14 at St. Louis' Busch Stadium and was actually replaced on the roster by Pittsburgh's Zach Duke, after suffering a right elbow contusion in his start prior to breaking on July 11 vs. San Diego...had to leave that July 11 start in the second inning after being hit by a line drive off the bat of pitcher Tim Stauffer with two out in the second inning...that mishap prevented him from pitching in his first-ever All-Star Game.
- Was one of seven pitchers in SF-era history (eighth occurrence) to win 12 of his first 14 decisions, joining Gaylord Perry (1966), Juan Marichal (1966, 1968), Rick Reuschel (1989), John Burkett (1993), Shawn Estes (1997) and Jason Schmidt (2004)...only Perry, Marichal (twice) and Burkett advanced to 13-2.
- Was awarded annual "Willie Mac Award" prior to the game on Sept. 25.
- Hammered his first two career HRs in **2007** to become the first SF pitcher to have two in a season since Brad Hennessey in 2005...clubbed his first clout Aug. 8 off Washington's Tim Lincecum, before launching a solo shot off Chicago's Carlos Zambrano on Aug. 23.
- In his first full season in the big leagues in **2006**, led all NL rookies with 13 wins, while pacing freshmen with 179 strikeouts and ranking eighth in ERA (4.15).
- Was the seventh Giant to lead NL rookies in victories during SF-era, joining Frank Linzy (1965), Elias Sosa (1973, tied with MON's Steve Rogers), John D'Acquisto (1974), John Montefusco (1975), Bill Laskey (1982) and John Burkett (1990).
- His 13 wins were tied for third on SF rookie list, equalling Laskey (1982) and Ryan Jensen (2002)...Montefusco set mark with 15 wins in 1975, while Burkett is second with 14 in 1990.
- Posted the second-highest single season strikeout total by a SF rookie with 179...only Mathewson (221 in 1901) and Montefusco (215 in 1975) struck out more batters during their rookie campaign in franchise history...joined Monefusco (1975) and D'Acquisto (167 in 1974) as only SF hurlers to lead NL rookies in strikeouts.
- Earned his second consecutive USA Today Organizational Player of the Year honors for excellent work at triple-A Fresno in **2005**, before bursting onto ML scene as SF made a late season run for the NL West flag.
- Had his contract purchased from Fresno Aug. 26, making big league debut Aug. 29...fashioned a 2-1 record with a 2.33 ERA(12er, 46.1ip) in seven starts.
- Posted incredible numbers as second-youngest player in the Majors over final months, behind only SEAs Felix Hernandez (19 years old)...overall, was the sixth youngest player to make his debut in big leagues during season.
- At 20 years and 332 days old when he took the mound on Aug. 29 vs. Colorado, became the youngest Giants pitcher in his first big league start since Mark Grant April 27, 1984 at Cincinnati (20 years, 185 days).

- > Earned his first big league victory on Sept. 4 at Arizona, allowing one run over 7.0 innings to post a 3-2 victory... at 20 years and 319 days Sept. 4, became the fourth-youngest SF Giant to win a game and youngest since Mark Grant was 20.318 in 1984.
- > **2004** USA Today Organizational Player of Year combined for 13-5 record with a 2.67 ERA (47er, 158.2ip) in 28 starts during dominating campaign with Class A Advanced San Jose and double-A Norwich.
- > Was selected to participate in Futures Game as part of All-Star festivities in Houston.

POSTSEASON CAREER

- > Started five games throughout the **2012** postseason, going 2-2 with a 3.60 ERA (12er, 30.0ip).
- > Started Game 1 of the Division Series vs. Cincinnati just a few months after pitching a perfect game...became the fifth pitcher to appear in a postseason game after throwing a perfect game earlier that season...the first three were Sandy Koufax in 1965, David Wells in 1998 and David Cone in 1999...the fourth, Roy Halladay, followed up his 2010 perfecto by no-hitting the Reds in Game 1 of the DS.
- > Earned the loss in Game 1 of the DS after allowing three runs on five hits in 5.0 innings...his scoreless inning streak to begin his postseason career ended at 23.1 innings, the second-longest in Giants franchise history and the fifth-longest in Major League history.
- > Earned the win in Game 5 of SF's clinching series win against the Reds.
- > Was the winning pitcher in Game 7 of the LCS vs. St. Louis...became the second pitcher to record a win in two winner-take-all games in one postseason, joining Chris Carpenter, who did it in **2011** for St. Louis.
- > Was brilliant in the 2010 postseason, tossing 21.1 innings without allowing an earned run, which was the sixth-longest streak in Major League history, and second-longest in Giants history, trailing Christy Mathewson...overall, went 2-0 with a 0.00 ERA (0er, 21.1ip) in first three career postseason contests.
- > Threw commanding 7.0-shutout innings in the Giants' Game 3 win over the Phillies in LCS on Oct. 19...became the first pitcher to not allow an earned run in either of

his first two postseason starts since Steve Avery accomplished it in 1991.

- > Pitched 7.0-shutout innings in the Giants' 9-0 Game 2 victory in the World Series vs. Texas on Oct. 28...marked the third postseason start of Cain's career in which he didn't allow an earned run...only three other pitchers began their postseason careers with three-straight games (all starts), in which they were not charged with an earned run: Christy Mathewson tossed three-straight shutouts for the Giants in the 1905 World Series; Waite Hoyt accomplished feat for Yankees in the 1921 World Series, allowing two unearned runs; and the Mets' Jon Matlack did not give up an earned run in his first three postseason starts in 1973 (three unearned runs).
- > Joined Christy Mathewson as only Giants pitchers with three starts in the same postseason in which they allowed no earned runs.

- > Married (Chelsea Williams, November 2009)...daughters: Hartley Mae, Dec. 12, 2010 and Everly Bre, Oct. 29, 2013.
- > Graduated from Houston (Germantown, TN) High School in 2002.
- > Was named Tennessee's Gatorade High School Player of the Year after dominating senior year in which he posted a 7-3 record with a 1.02 ERA in 13 games.
- > Received a key to the city from Mayor Ed Lee in a special pre-game ceremony on June 26, 2012, following his perfect game...Lee also declared June 13 "Matt Cain Day".
- > Prior to his start on June 18 at Los Angeles-AL (his next start following his perfect game), Japanese sporting goods maker Mizuno gave him one of the most unique gifts he has ever received for a baseball achievement – a samurai sword...a traditional Japanese honor, the sword was given to Cain for making history while wearing a Mizuno glove.

Cain's Giants Gems

- Was always ahead of his peers, at least in baseball. At the age of 5 in T-ball, while the other kids are chasing butterflies and tossing clods of dirt at each other, Matt **pulled off THREE unassisted triple plays during the seven-game season.** He had already been playing ball with his brother's friends, who were three years older.
- Moved from Alabama to Memphis at age 10. Family lived on a 50-acre plot of land about 30 miles from the city. Had two horses. Lots of wildlife: wild turkeys, deer, rabbits, foxes. At one time, they raised goats but gave it up because the coyotes kept eating the babies.
- **Likes hunting and fishing, skeet shooting and anything outdoors.**
- Grandfather on his mother's side was a big influence.
- **His baseball idol growing up was Frank Thomas.**
- Began getting attention from college scouts in his junior year. The pro scouts discovered him his senior year when they had come to watch a different pitcher, who was hurt and couldn't play. Suddenly there were scouts two or three times a week at the Cain household asking everything they could about Matt's family and friends, making sure they were making a wise investment.
- Began his pro career at the age of 17. Very homesick. A catcher took him under his wing – Brian Munhall – who roomed with Matt and taught him how to keep a checkbook, shop for groceries, etc.
- **He was struck by the fast pace of San Francisco when he first came to the Giants.** Why are people driving so fast? Why are people going from one appointment to the next to the next? "Always so much to do in one day," he says.
- Yet in 2008 he bought a hilltop home in Noe Valley with a floor-to-ceiling view of the city. (He already had bought a small home across the street from his high school in Tennessee.)
- From a 2009 story in the Chronicle: "He grew up on a 25-acre farm riding horses, driving pickups and dove hunting with his bird dog and says he's the least likely guy to fall in love with the city. As a kid growing up in Alabama and Tennessee, he never lived in a town with more than 3,000 people. **He liked baseball, but never followed it on TV - preferring instead to spend his days outdoors mountain biking with his older brother or "seeing what kind of trouble we could get into," like rolling down the hills in the horse's feed barrels.**
- He met his future wife, Chelsea Williams, at a steakhouse in Arizona during spring training, where Williams, a sociology student at Arizona State, was waitressing. Cain needed the whole evening to work up the nerve to say hello.
- The two were married in fall 2009 and had their first child, daughter Hartley Mae, in December 2010 and then their second daughter, Everly Bre, in October 2013.
- His mother taught for 20 years; now she and her brother own and run a tuxedo rental store.
- His dad has worked for a window and door wholesaler since he was 20 in sales and management. Mom and Dad grew up in Memphis. But they moved from South Carolina, to Alabama to Tennessee for Tom's job.
- **Loves to go duck and deer hunting from November to January.**
- **Also is a great golfer.** Always wins the long-ball contest.
- From Lane McCarter, high school pitching coach who nicknamed Matt "Big Daddy Cain." He says Germantown is a big baseball area, but McCarter hadn't heard anything about Matt before he arrived in high school. He was more a position player than a pitcher, though he wanted to pitch. As soon as McCarter saw him throw, he began using him on the mound, as well in the infield. Though a great athlete, Matt never played football or basketball. Focused from early on baseball. Father watched every game from a lawn chair he set up behind the backstop.
- **During Matt's senior year, 15 to 25 scouts came to every game he pitched.** One month, McCarter got so many calls from scouts, his cell phone bill was \$1600 – a huge chunk of money on a schoolteacher's salary.
- **Pitched a perfect game June 13, 2012, the 22nd in ML history.** His parents watched from Tennessee: "Well, you jump up when you realize he really did it, and you're watching it on TV, and it's far away and you wish you were there," Dolores Cain told the SF Chronicle. "But you jump up and down, and then you realize you're crying. Both of us were just crying and hugging each other, because he did it. And that was always his dream. It's a little boy's dream."
- He delivered the Top 10 list on Letterman the following week. Top 10 Things I Want to Achieve Now that I've Pitched a Perfect Game: 10. Throw a perfect game with my other arm. 9. Convert the mound into an organic vegetable garden. 8. Discover a cure for groin pulls. 7. Open my dream salon. 6. Catch a line drive with my mouth. 5. Fix the economy, just kidding, that's impossible. 4. Pitch an inning without my pants. 3. Appear on Jay Leno's "Ten at Ten." 2. Throw a hole in one. 1. Win the contest to replace Regis Philbin.

Casilla's Giants Gems

- **From Palenque in the Dominican Republic, the same town as former teammate Juan Uribe**, who is a year older and made it to the pros three years before Santiago. Santiago remembers once going to Uribe's house as a child and asking him for baseball socks (which Uribe gave him).
- **Santiago's first gloves were homemade: thick cardboard into which he cut three holes for his ring, middle and index fingers.** He received his first real glove in a community giveaway by late Giants shortstop Jose Uribe (Juan's uncle). He whittled bats from wood.
- **Santiago is the seventh of 12 children to subsistence farmers.**
 - His brother Jose – nine years younger than Santiago – was a relief pitcher in the Giants farm system. The Giants signed him in 2006 when Santiago was with the A's. "Jose had a dream," Santiago told CSN Bay Area. "He said, 'I see you and me playing together in San Francisco.' I said, 'Really?' When they wanted to sign me, I knew this was the place. Jose already told me so."
 - The Giants signed Santiago in 2009 as a minor league free agent coming off a poor season with the A's.
 - **In 2014, Jose was invited to Major League spring camp, so the brothers were in baseball together for the first time.** (Jose was sent down after a few weeks.) "The dream is to be in the big leagues together," Jose has said.
 - Santiago is called Willie back home in the Dominican.
- Santiago signed with the A's in 2000 as an amateur free agent. By 2004, he had not progressed beyond Single A. Then in 2004 he flew threw Single A, Double A, Triple A and ended the season by pitching four games with Oakland. Santiago says he had a dream that 2004 would be a magical year. "I saw two people who looked like angels and they said, 'You're going to the big leagues this year.' "He arrived in Oakland "and I saw Barry Zito, someone I'd seen on TV, and I thought, 'Oh my god.' "
- **He pitched under the name Jairo Garcia from 2000 to 2005.** He was told that American scouts like to sign young players from the Dominican, so he took a name and birth certificate from a friend who was three years younger. "That broke my heart (to use someone else's name)," he says. "I didn't want to play baseball like that. I feel bad because it was cheating." He constantly worried about being found out, either by baseball or by immigration.
 - He came clean in 2006, revealing his real name and age (which is currently 34). Immigration is still an issue, however. He missed the first few weeks of spring training waiting for a visa.
 - Signed a minor-league contract with the Giants before the 2010 season and joined the team May 21 when Brandon Medders went on the DL.
 - He attributes his current success to adding a curve ball playing under general manager Moises Alou for Escogido in the Dominican league. The team won the Caribbean Series.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- > In **2012**, he became just the third player drafted by the Giants to start at shortstop on Opening Day since Royce Clayton in 1995 (other player was Brian Bocock in 2008).
- > Finished second among NL shortstops in All-Star fan voting in 2012, receiving 3,666,897 votes...was just 306,024 votes behind St. Louis' Rafael Furcal (3,972,921).
- > Was ejected for the first time in his career on July 23, 2012 vs. San Diego...was thrown out by first base umpire Jordan Baker in the eighth inning after he hit an apparent double in the sixth inning but was ruled out by Baker, who said he missed the bag.

Crawford's Giants Gems

- Lived in Menlo Park until the age of 7, then moved to Pleasanton.
- **Grew up a Giants fan because his father was a Giants fan and season-ticket holder at Candlestick** (seats on the third-base side). His father took a 9-month-old Brandon to the 1987 playoffs and said his son wasn't bothered at all by the loud noise.
- **There is a now-famous photo that a Chronicle photographer caught of a four-year-old Brandon utterly forlorn at what was thought to be the final series in 1992 before the Giants moved to Tampa.**
- Brandon remembers as a fan getting to walk on the field at the 'Stick for the second-to-last game ever played there. **Remembers being at the playoff game against the Mets in 2000 when JT Snow hit a home run. And went to one game of the 2002 WS.**
- His family bought a commemorative brick outside AT&T Park when it opened. The brick is still there behind the Willie Mays statue: "Mike Lynn Brandon Amy Caitlin and Jenna Crawford."
- Watched Game 2 of the 2010 WS at AT&T and the rest on TV.
- **His favorite player was Royce Clayton because he played shortstop.** Also liked Will Clark, Barry Bonds and Kirt Manwaring. But favorite player was Alex Rodriguez.
- Began playing baseball "as soon as I could walk." His father coached him through Little League.
- Father Michael works in the contracts department for Northrop Grumman, a global security company, in San Jose.
- His mother Lynn is a fifth-grade teacher at Vintage Hills Elementary in Pleasanton.
- Crawford starred at Foothill High in Pleasanton, where he batted .357 over a three-year varsity career. He also played quarterback and safety on the Foothill High football team
- He has three younger sisters, Amy, Kaitlin and Jenna, who also are athletes. Amy earned All-East Bay Athletic League honors three times in softball for Foothill High and pitched at UCLA (she graduated in 2011); Kaitlin is a standout athlete (softball, rowing and cheerleading) attending San Jose State; Jenna plays softball at Foothill High.
- Brandon majored in physiological science during his three years at UCLA.
- **Was MVP of UCLA baseball team 2006 and 2007.**
- **Crawford faced Lincecum in college and struck out three times in Lincecum's 18-K two-hit, 5-0 complete-game victory on March 31, 2006.**
- Broke his hand summer 2010 and missed eight weeks of the season with Double A Richmond.
- Hit a grand-slam in his big-league debut in May 2011 in Milwaukee.
- **Married to Jalyne Dantzcher, a former gymnast at UCLA.** Jalyne's sister Jamie was on the U.S. Olympic gymnastics team that won the bronze medal in Sydney in 2000. Jalyne also has a twin sister, Janelle, who also competed in gymnastics. For the 2012 season, Jamie and Janelle shared a three-bedroom rental house in Walnut Creek with Jalyne and Brandon. Janelle was teaching first grade in Pleasanton and Jamie was coaching gymnastics.
- Jalyne told the Chronicle in 2012: "We tease him about throwing in a trick, like a 'Popa,' " referring to a 360-degree straddle jump named after a Romanian gymnast. "When he's turning a double play and jumping over a guy sliding into second, he could include it."
- The Crawfords have a daughter, Braylyn, born December 18, 2012, and second daughter Jaydyn, born March 8, 2014.
- More sports-in-the-family: Brandon's sister Amy – a former softball player at UCLA – is dating another former Bruin, Garrit Cole, the Pirates first-round pick in the 2011 draft, now a starter in the Majors.

Duffy's Giants Gems

- Grew up in Lakewood in the Long Beach area, living in the same house since he was a year old. Dad Tom is a contractor. Mom Cathy is a travel agent. One sister, Erin, two years younger than Matt, attends UCLA.

- **In 2002, Duffy attended San Francisco's Game 6 against the Angels at Edison Field (now Angel Stadium), a 30-minute drive from Lakewood.**

- **Began taking baseball seriously when he turned 13.** His dad said, "One day someone is going to tell you you're not good enough." Matt decided he would prevent that from happening by committing himself fully and outworking everyone else. He started making daily lists of what he wanted to accomplish during his waking hours to improve as a player. And he **gave up the one passion he had beside baseball — skiing.** Fearing an injury that would affect baseball, he has not skied since his freshman year of high school.

- **He practiced with his dad after school every day at a field a block and a half from their house.**

Matt, an Angels fan, had read somewhere that Angels infielder Brandon Wood took 200 grounders a day from his dad when he was a kid. So that's what Matt and his father did. Duffy says he was never the star, even though he felt he was better than a lot of kids who got the attention. "I had a little chip on my shoulder," he says.

- At the end of high school, he had not yet committed to a college program. **USC and Cal State-Bakersfield had offered partial scholarships.** Then on a bit of a fluke he was invited by a local coach to play on his team in the Tournament of Stars in North Carolina, which is a weeklong tryout of sorts for Team USA. "I figured they just needed an extra guy," Matt says. "The first guy I see when I walk off the plane in North Carolina is Bryce Harper and all these other guys I had read about in Baseball America." Suddenly he found himself hitting third on his team and performing well enough to catch the attention of coaches from Long Beach State, who offered him a scholarship. "I grew up watching Long Beach State and I had go across the country to get them to notice me," Matt says.

- His second big break came during the summer of 2011 between his sophomore and junior years at Long Beach. He desperately wanted to play in the Cape Cod summer league, but no team recruited him. He knew every team needed "temp" players to fill in for guys still competing in the College World Series. "Just get me there," Matt told his Long Beach coach, "and I'll take care of the rest." His coach got him a temp position. Lucky for Duffy, the guy he was filling for went all the way to the College WS championship game, giving Matt time to show what he had. By the time the other guy was ready to show up, Matt was leading the Cape Cod league

in hitting. He not only was offered a contract for the rest of the summer, he was the starting shortstop in the All-Star Game. "It was the best summer of my life," he says.

- But before his junior season in college, he had surgery for a digestive disorder, lost weight, struggled to regain his strength and saw his draft stock plummet. He was selected 568th over all, but he vowed that none of the players taken before him would outwork him.

- When he struggled at the plate during his first spring training in 2013 (the Giants had drafted him the previous June in the 18th round), Matt called Benny Craig, who had been his hitting coach in the Cape Cod League. He urged him to **read *The Mental Keys to Hitting* by sports psychologist Harvey Dorfman.** Matt says the advice in the book changed everything. It taught him to be both relaxed and aggressive at the plate. Duffy says he has read the book, in his estimation, eight times. "I carry it with me," he says. It has notes in the margins and passages highlighted.

- He also has spent countless hours and dollars working with Rob Nelson, a speed coach, to make his base path sprints look natural. "Before, he was not running quietly," said Duffy's father, Tom. "His mechanics were a mess."

- **Promoted to the Majors directly from Double A-Richmond 20 minutes after the trade deadline on July 31, 2014.** When he and teammate Jarrett Parker were told not to get on the team bus to Altoona, PA., earlier that day, they both figured they were involved in a trade. They waited most of the day, speculating on where they would end up. Twenty minutes after the deadline, assistant GM Bobby Evans called. Duffy asked, "So am I driving myself to Altoona or am I traded?" Evans said, "Call your parents. You're going to the big leagues." Duffy cried on the phone with his dad.

- When he struggled during his first weeks with the Giants, he re-read the first three or four chapters of *The Mental Keys to Hitting*. "I was a little wide-eyed the first three weeks and needed to relax," he says. He went 6-for-15 as a pinch hitter.

- **At 23 years old, he was the youngest player on the Giants roster for the 2014 World Series.**

- His late grandmother (on his father's side) was an assistant to Pierre Salinger when he was campaign manager for Robert Kennedy. She was at the Ambassador Hotel in LA when RFK was assassinated.

- **Nickname "Duffman," like the Simpsons mascot for Duff Beer.** On the knobs of his bats, he has customized decals of Duffman holding a bat. Once thought about dressing as Duffman for Halloween but decided it was too much work.

2014 SEASON

- > Veteran right-hander completed his 16th big league season, his first with the Giants, by going 9-13 with a 3.57 ERA in 31 starts.
- > Went 7-2 with a 1.81 ERA and .223 opponents batting average against in his first 13 starts, with the Giants going 11-2 in those outings...however, then went 2-11 with a 5.13 ERA and .308 average against in his last 18 starts, with San Francisco going just 6-12.
- > Suffered his first losing season (record-wise) of his career in 18 professional seasons and his 13 losses were the most of his career.
- > His opponents' batting average against of .270 was the third-highest of his career (.273 in 2006 and .295 in 2009) and ranked as the ninth-highest among NL pitchers... allowed 9.46 hits per 9.0 innings, the sixth-highest mark in the NL.
- > Allowed the fourth-fewest walks per 9.0 innings in the NL (1.62)...his 34 walks allowed were the fewest of his career in a full season.
- > Averaged just 3.61 runs per game, the lowest total of his career, the lowest among Giants starters and the 12th-lowest in the NL.
- > Faced 373 right-handed batters and walked just 10 (one every 37.3 PA).
- > Induced 335 groundballs, the second-most in the NL behind Cincinnati's Mike Leake (349).
- > Allowed opponents to steal 15 of 18 bases off him (83.3%), tied with San Diego's Eric Stults for the third-highest stolen base pct. among NL pitchers (Roberto Hernandez, 88.5%, Mike Leake, 85.7%).
- > Set the Giants franchise record (since 1900) for most innings to start a season without a walk at 30.0 innings... had faced 115 batters before the Indians' Carlos Santana drew a two-out walk in the 1st inning on April 25.
- > Placed his name alongside Hall of Famer Grover Cleveland Alexander and the Yankees' Tiny Bonham as the only pitchers in the last 101 years to start a season with at least four walk-less starts of 7.0 innings or more.
- > Fashioned a 1.81 ERA through his first 13 starts of the

season...that was the lowest ERA for a Giants pitcher in his first 13 starts with the team and with those 13 starts all coming in his first season with the team since 1912.

- Was named to his fourth career All-Star team as a replacement for LHP Madison Bumgarner, who wasn't eligible to pitch because he threw the Sunday before the break...marked his first All-Star nod since 2010 with the Braves (was also an All-Star in 2000 and 2004 with Oakland).
- Had the highest ERA (8.72) in the month of September among any pitcher with at least 20.0 innings pitched...overall, went 0-4 with an 8.72 ERA (21er, 21.2ip) in five Sept. starts.
- Went just 2-for-53 (.038) at the plate, the lowest batting average of his career while in a National League uniform...his two hits were his fewest in a season (min. 10 ABs)...had hit .100 or higher in each of his previous seven seasons...was hitless in his last 40 at-bats, the second-most consecutive hitless at-bats in the NL behind the Pirates' Edinson Volquez (42).
- Underwent ankle surgery Jan. 2 to remove bone spurs from his right ankle...recovery time is eight weeks. The surgery was performed by Dr. Bob Anderson in Charlotte, North Carolina.
- Hudson started experiencing increased discomfort as he was ramping up his offseason workouts.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- Missed the last two-plus months of the **2013** season after the Mets' Eric Young Jr., who was trying to beat a throw to first base, accidentally stepped on Hudson's leg above the ankle, resulting in a fracture that ended his season.
- Underwent surgery July 26, 2013 to repair a fractured fibula and torn deltoid ligament in his right angle...the procedure was performed by Dr. Marvin Royster in Atlanta, GA.
- On April 30th, 2013, earned his 200th career win to become the 110th pitcher in MLB history to reach 200 wins.
- Spent most of the **2012** Spring Training and the first month of the season recovering from surgery to repair a herniated disc in his back (Nov. 28, 2011).

- Named the 2010 National League Comeback Player of the Year...underwent "Tommy John" surgery on Aug. 8, 2008 and made just seven starts in 2009.
- Was the recipient of the 2010 Hutch Award for his outstanding community service.
- Was named the National League Pitcher of the Month for August, 2010...over six starts, he went 4-0 with a 1.71 ERA.
- Made just seven starts in the **2009** season as he was still recovering from "Tommy John" surgery.
- Hit his first career home run on Sept. 12, 2009 at St. Louis off Kyle Lohse.
- On November 11, 2009, agreed to terms on a three-year contract extension through 2012, with a club option for 2013 with Atlanta.
- Went on the DL July 27, **2008** to the end of the season and had successful "Tommy John" surgery performed on his right elbow by Dr. James Andrews in Pensacola, FL on Aug. 8.
- Made his first career regular season relief appearance July 13, 2008 at San Diego (1.0 ip) after making 300 career starts.
- Was forced to leave his start on June 9, **2007** vs. Chicago-NL after taking a Jacque Jones liner off his left shin; X-rays were negative...took a line drive off his left wrist (off the bat of Josh Bard) to lead off the inning...finished the inning, and X-rays were taken after he came out of the game (negative).
- Had a successful first season with the Braves in **2005**, despite missing 28 team games with a strained left oblique muscle...went 14-9 with a 3.52 ERA and managed to work 192.0 innings in his 29 starts.
- Was placed on the disabled list on June 16, 2005, retroactive to June 14, with a strained left oblique muscle.
- His strikeout of Tom Glavine in the 6th inning was the 1,000th of his career on Sept. 7, 2005 vs. New York-NL.
- On March 1, 2005, he signed a four-year contract extension through 2009 with a club option for 2010.
- Came to Atlanta via trade from Oakland on Dec. 16, **2004**.
- Was named to his second AL All-Star in 2004 team but did not pitch, as he was on the DL (strained left oblique).
- Was 7-3 with a 2.98 ERA (36 ER in 108.2 IP) over his first 15 starts of the 2004 season when he was placed on the 15-day disabled list retroactive to June 23 with a left oblique strain...was reinstated from the DL on Aug. 7 and went 5-3 with a 4.28 ERA (38 ER in 80.0 IP) in 12 starts following his return.
- Led the As in wins, ERA, innings and strikeouts and tied for the lead in shutouts in **2003**.
- Made his first Opening Day start in **2001**, becoming the ninth different pitcher in nine years to start an opener for the As.

- ▶ Took a no-hitter into the 7th inning on April 4 against Detroit before Tony Clark doubled with one out.
- ▶ Lasted just 2.1 innings on April 20 at Cleveland as he was removed after being hit in the chest by a Roberto Alomar line drive in the 3rd inning; suffered a right chest contusion but did not miss a turn.

- ▶ Graduated from Glenwood HS in Phenix City, AL, in **1993**.
- ▶ Attended Auburn University and majored in health promotion.
- ▶ Named Southeastern Conference Player of the Year as a senior in **1997**...named to the All-SEC team as an outfielder and a pitcher, as he hit .396 with 18 HRs and 95 RBI while posting a 15-2 record, a 2.97 ERA and 165 strikeouts...earned first team All-America honors from *Baseball America* as a utility player...tied for the NCAA lead in wins, ranked third in strikeouts and was ninth in RBI.
- ▶ Was the **2004** recipient of the Jim "Catfish" Hunter Award, given annually to the A's player who best exemplifies the courageous, competitive and inspirational spirit demonstrated by the A's late Hall of Fame pitcher.
- ▶ In February **2010**, was inducted into the Auburn Baseball Wall of Fame, along with Bo Jackson, Frank Thomas and Gregg Olson.
- ▶ 16-year veteran won his first World Series ring in 2014 with the Giants after having never advanced past the Divisional Round prior to the **2014** season...Hudson's teams had appeared in six Division Series, and his teams had never advanced in any of them...that was tied with Ellis Burks and Ramon Hernandez for the most appearances in an LDS without a series win in MLB history.
- ▶ Is 1-4 with a 3.69 ERA in 14 games/13 starts in his post-season career.
- ▶ His lone postseason win came with the A's in **2001** in Game 2 of the Division Series at New York-AL on Oct. 11 (8.0ip, 6h, 0r)...since then, has gone 0-3 with a 4.22 ERA over his last 12 games/11 postseason starts.
- ▶ On Oct. 14, **2014** vs. St. Louis, he made his first career start in the National League Championship Series after tossing more than 3,000 innings in the regular season...according to Stats, Inc., only two other pitchers had amassed more regular season innings before making their first start in the LCS - Chuck Finley (3,197.1) and Juan Marichal (3,071.2).

Hudson's Giants Gems

- Grew up in rural Salem, Alabama, a blue-collar town of hard-hats and truckers. It was so rural that cable television didn't arrive until Hudson was well into high school.** The four basic channels rarely showed baseball. So as a kid Hudson wasn't so much a baseball fan as simply a kid who liked to play. He didn't collect baseball cards. He never had a poster of a ballplayer on his walls. He never emulated favorite players on the mound or at the plate. He traveled to Phenix City, a suburb of Columbus, Georgia, to play Little League. "I remember kids talking about big leaguers and I didn't know who the hell they were talking about," Hudson says. "I learned pretty quickly. But I remember once thinking, 'Who is this Don Mattingly guy?' Everybody wanted Number 23 and I had no idea why."
- Even if he could have gotten Major League games on television, Hudson figures he wouldn't have watched much.** "I was an outside kid," he says. He hunted and fished, and he played pickup baseball with seven or eight other kids in a pasture near his house. "Second base was a big cow turd," he says.
- No one in the family had gone to college. Father Ronnie worked at a cardboard factory in addition to construction jobs. Sue Hudson worked intermittently as a grocery cashier. Hudson's brothers — 10 and 12 years older than Tim — went from high school into jobs, marriages and kids. But the family felt Tim would be different. They could see it right from the start. He was small, but he did things on a baseball field other kids couldn't. "I think they realized pretty early that this was an opportunity. This was my ticket," Hudson says. "They were always so dedicated to making sure that if this was what I wanted to do that I was always at the practices, always had the equipment I needed, was never late for games."
- Transferred to Auburn after two years at community college.** In a history class he met Kim Bruner, another transfer student. She was also from the country — rural Indiana. "Tim wasn't a very good student, and he said to me one day, 'You're really smart, can you help me?'" Kim says, laughing.
- "We are like an opposites-attract story," Kim says. "I'm type A --an organizer, a thinker, a warrior. I worry about things I think may happen at some point. Tim really doesn't think past the end of his nose. He lives in the moment. He doesn't fret and worry. As frustrating as it can be at times, we complement each other. I see him in what I don't see in myself."
- As Tim was drafted and went off to the pros, Kim attended law school.** She practices law in Auburn three days a week while running the family foundation.
- Philanthropy is a huge part of their lives. It can be traced to a night in Redding, California, in 1999. Tim, a rookie at the time, was part of an A's caravan that traveled through Northern California during the winter of 1999, visiting schools and other community groups. Kim, on winter break from law school, joined him. The caravan stopped for dinner one night at an Applebee's in Redding. At a nearby table sat a dozen or so children and their parents. The children were clearly sick. Soon the newlywed couple was sitting with the kids, who were part of the Greater Bay Area chapter of Make-A-Wish. The Hudsons soon became involved in supporting and fundraising for the group.
- When Hudson was traded to Atlanta, the couple not only joined the Georgia-Alabama Make-A-Wish chapter, Kim served on the Board of Directors and chaired the group's annual Walk for Wishes. They also supported other organizations that touched the lives of children: the Aflac Cancer Center of the Children's Healthcare of Atlanta, Anna's Angel Fund, CURE Childhood Cancer, the Georgia Transplant Foundation and more.
- In 2009, they started the Hudson Family Foundation. Its mission is to fill the gaps other organizations aren't designed to cover — picking up costs not paid by health insurance, paying when a sick child's parents have to miss work, finding housing for families who have been evicted.**
- In 2000, his second full season in the big leagues, Tim persuaded his parents to retire. They were only in their 50s but had health issues. Kim and Tim had bought a house in Auburn, near their alma mater, and when they moved to Tampa in 2002, they gave the house to Tim's parents. Kim and Tim moved back to Auburn a few years later and bought a new house about a mile from Tim's parents.
- Tim's brothers manage his hunting plantation in Hurtsboro, Alabama, about 30 miles from their hometown of Salem. "I've got to pay somebody to keep it up, so it might as well be people I love and trust," Tim says.
- Back in the Bay Area, they have reconnected with the Greater Bay Area Make-A-Wish chapter with friends they had during Tim's tenure with the A's.** He's looking forward to introducing his two older daughters to the doctor in San Ramon who delivered them.
- The Hudsons rented a home in San Francisco to give their children the experience of city life. "Our kids have always lived in the suburbs," Kim says.** "I want them experience something different. I think their eyes will be open to some things.
- Three children: two girls — Kennedy (July 2001) and Tess (May 2004)— and a boy, Kade (April 2005).

Kontos' Giants Gems

- Grew up in the Chicago area, lettering in baseball, basketball and golf in high school. He **was Gatorade Player of the Year for Illinois in 2003.**
- Majored in economics at Northwestern University before being drafted by the Yankees. George's younger brother Chris also played baseball at Northwestern and graduated in 2012.
- **Little-known fact about Kontos: He has all ten seasons of "Friends" on DVDs and can quote nearly every line.** His favorite episode is when Joey speaks French.
- **Kontos is Greek on both sides of his family.** His mother's family and father's family are both from a 2000-year-old town outside Sparta called Geraki. George's father Nicholas grew up in a house that was 200 years old. His parents immigrated to the States when they were children, so George is first-generation American.
- Quintessential immigrant's story: George's grandfather was a farmer who produced olives and olive oil. Gave that up for a better life for his children in the States. He arrived in the States during the 1960s with \$250 in his pocket. Because his English was limited, he had few job prospects so he worked as a custodian at Northwestern from 3 to 11 p.m. His wife, George's grandmother, worked in a factory. One salary went for living expenses, the other into savings, which they eventually used to buy an apartment building that the family owns to this day.
- Their son, Nicholas (George's father) dropped out of college to start his own business distributing restaurant supplies because so many Greek families owned restaurants. He operated the business for 30 years, and like his father used his savings to buy real estate. He and his wife, Theodora, now own and operate convenience stores and gas stations in addition to the apartment building.
- Theodora's father owned and operated a well-known fast food stand in Chicago for 30 years called MIC Duck's.
- **"Except for the Windex, 'My Big Fat Greek Wedding' is pretty accurate of our family," Nicholas says.**
- George, who is named after his paternal grandfather (the olive farmer and Northwestern custodian who died 10 days after George was born), was cared for by his grandparents -- one papou and two yia-yia's -- on the north side of Chicago because George's parents both worked. So George's first language was Greek. When his parents moved to the suburbs and placed him in a Montessori preschool, George couldn't understand any of the other children.
- **Twice a week through his childhood, George attended Greek school for an hour and a half after regular school, plus Sunday school at the Greek Orthodox Church, where he was an altar boy. He still speaks, writes and reads Greek fluently.**
- Nicholas knew nothing of baseball when he arrived in Chicago as a child but soon became a fan of the Cubs. He was an enthusiastic and knowledgeable supporter of both his sons when they played on Little League and travel-ball teams and through college and pros.
- George didn't distinguish himself until high school, when scouts began coming around his junior year. But George was also a good student, taking mostly AP classes, and accepted a scholarship to play baseball at Northwestern -- where his grandfather had been a custodian. The university is just 10 minutes from George's childhood home in Lincolnwood, Illinois, where his parents still live. (George's brother Chris also played baseball at Northwestern; he graduated in June 2012.)
- **George was drafted by the Yankees in 2006 after his junior year of college.** His climb through the farm system as a starting pitcher came to a halt in 2009 when he had Tommy John surgery. During his 10-month rehab back in Illinois, he took enough classes to earn his degree in finance from Northwestern. "That was a dream for all of us," Nicholas says.
- Traded to the Giants at the end of spring training 2012 for catcher Chris Stewart. Earned a spot on the postseason roster and now has a World Series ring.
- **He is a workout fanatic.** During the 2012 off season, in addition to lifting weights three times a week, yoga once a week and throwing, his workout included boxing twice a week and Muay Thai once a week. (Perhaps his embrace of martial arts and boxing is a reflection of his Spartan heritage; in ancient Greece Sparta was well-known for its focus on military training.)
- Muay Thai is a practice of martial arts that is known as "the art of eight weapons" because it is characterized by the combined use of fists, elbows, knees, shins and feet. Kontos says it helps open up hips and helps with flexibility.
- Boxing workout: jump rope, shadow boxing, push-ups, core work, heavy bag with 16-ounce gloves -- similar motion to throwing a baseball. Helps endurance.
- He works out in the off-season with outfielder Curtis Granderson, who attended University of Chicago at Illinois, and pitcher Luke Gregerson, another Chicago-area local who attended St. Xavier University in Orland Park, Illinois.
- Not married. **Plays golf and does a little bow-hunting in the off-season when he's not in the gym.**

Law's Giants Gems

- Grew up and still makes his home in Pittsburgh, PA.
- **Father is former right-handed pitcher Joe Law, who spent nine seasons in the A's farm system and four days on the Major League roster.** From Andrew Baggarly, CSNBayArea: "On July 5, 1988, the Oakland Athletics had a doubleheader in Cleveland and called up a right-handed pitcher named Joe Law. He spent four days on the A's roster, all told. Once he even got the signal to start warming up. He sat back down. He never unbuttoned his satin jacket again – then, or ever."
 - Mom, Tracey, is a registered nurse who runs a elder-care home on the upstairs floor of the family's large, 100-year-old house.
 - Has one sibling, an autistic brother, Dustin, who is four years younger than Derek. "He knows when I leave it's for baseball, but he doesn't get what baseball is," Derek says. "He really looks up to me, but he can't really go to my games. He has his routines. He's in his own little world."
 - Tracey, with her elder-care clients and Dustin, couldn't attend many of Derek's games. She has seen him in one professional game: When he was with Single A Augusta and the team played in Hagerstown, MD, which was close enough to drive.
 - Derek spent every day with his dad. "We're like brothers more than father and son. We fight like brothers. We talk like brothers. We were together every day until I left for college." Joe took Derek to the batting cages, to the field, wherever they could play baseball. He built a mound for Derek on the side of the house, where Derek began pitching at 7 years old.
 - Derek's delivery is similar to former pitching great Luis Tiant: He completely turns his back to the hitter.
- Joe was Derek's pitching coach at every level through high school (Seton LaSalle Catholic High School in Pittsburgh.) Derek was good enough to be drafted at the end of high school in 2009 (by the Texas Rangers in the 28th round), but he chose to go to Miami Dade College in Florida, which has a highly respected baseball program.
 - After two years at Miami Dade, Derek signed with the Giants when they drafted him in the ninth round in 2011.
 - Joe says his son's growing success in baseball takes the sting out of falling short in his own career: "At the time I was bitter about it," he told Baggarly. "But as time goes by, you realize not too many people get the call to the big leagues. Not too many people get to put the big league uniform on. And I got that. With Derek so close [to making the Majors], that helps with the sting. But that was so long ago, and I'm happy with it. If it didn't happen that way, I wouldn't have gotten to spend as much time with Derek as I did."
 - **Had Tommy John surgery June 2014 and is expected to be ready to pitch in June 2015.**
 - **In high school, he was voted Most Athletic and Best Dancer.** "Only my good friends know I can dance," he says.
 - He and his fiancé Chelsea Gielarowski have been together since high school. She works in public relations for a health care company in Pittsburgh.
 - Derek **loves baseball history with a particular interest in the Negro Leagues.** He has been collecting baseball figurines since he was a kid. His most prized: Josh Gibson and Satchel Paige.

- Tossed his first career no-hitter on July 13, **2013** at San Diego...was the 15th in franchise history and marked the seventh no-hitter in San Francisco-era history...was the first no-hitter by a Giants pitcher on the road since RHP John Montefusco's no-no on Sept. 29, 1976 at Atlanta.
- Became the fifth multiple Cy Young Award winner at the time of his first no-hitter (also: Johan Santana, Bret Saberhagen, Tom Seaver and Bob Gibson).
- Needed 148 pitches for his first no-hitter, one shy of the most in any no-no in the last quarter century...Edwin Jackson threw 149 pitches in his no-hitter at Tampa Bay on June 25, 2010.
- Was the losing pitcher in Homer Bailey's June 2nd no-hitter...the only pitcher who was the loser in a no-no and then threw the next one in baseball was Mal Eason in 1906 with Brooklyn (*Elias*).
- Was named NL Player of the Week for July 8-14, 2013 after tossing his first career no-hitter...marked the second time in his career that he won MLB's weekly award.
- In **2012**, his 5.18 ERA was the highest among all qualifying pitchers in the National League and the fourth-highest in the Majors.
- Led the NL in losses, runs allowed, earned runs, wild pitches (17) and ranked second in walks during the 2012 season.
- Was named to his fourth-straight NL All-Star team in **2011** becoming the first Giants pitcher to be elected that many consecutive times since Juan Marichal appeared in eight-straight from 1962-69.
- Finished fifth overall in the National League with a 2.74 ERA in 2011.
- Reached the 200-strikeout plateau for fourth-consecutive season, joining Amos Rusie (1890-93) of the New York Giants and Juan Marichal (1963-66) of the SF Giants as the only pitchers in franchise history with 200+ strikeouts in four-straight seasons.
- Struck out 10 batters on April 18, 2011 at Colorado for his 28th career double-digit strikeout game, tying Christy Mathewson for most in Giants franchise history (since 1900).
- Recorded his 1,000th career strikeout of his ML career on June 6, 2011 vs. Washington after striking out Jerry Hairston to end the top of the second inning.
- Became the eighth pitcher in the modern era (since 1900) with 1,000 strikeouts in his first five seasons...the seven pitchers who have reached this milestone are: Tom Seaver (1,155), Bert Blyleven (1,094), Dwight Gooden (1,067), Kerry Wood (1,065), Grover Cleveland Alexander (1,036), Hideo Nomo (1,031) and Mark Langston (1,018).
- Was named to his third-straight All-Star team in 2010.
- In **2010**, he led the National League with 231 strikeouts for the third year in a row, joining Randy Johnson (1999-2002) and Warren Spahn (1949-52) as the only NL pitchers since World War II to pace the league in strikeouts for

three consecutive seasons...Lincecum also joined Christy Mathewson (1903-05) as the only pitchers in Giants franchise history to lead the league in strikeouts for three-straight years.

- Became the second-fastest player in SF-era history to win his 50th career game, doing so in his 109th career contest on July 15, 2010 vs. New York-NL (Juan Marichal earned his 50th career win in his 97th game).
- Made slight change to his delivery in his start on July 30 vs. Los Angeles, raising his arms over his head from windup, something he once did in college...he needed 62 pitches to get through first 3.0 innings, but was more efficient remainder of way, ending with 7.0 innings and limiting Dodgers to just two runs in SF's 6-5 victory.
- Named **2009** NL Cy Young Award winner for the second-consecutive year after finishing the season with a 15-7 record, 2.48 ERA (62er, 225.1ip), four complete games, 261 strikeouts, 68 walks and yielding a .206 avg. against (168-for-814) in 32 starts for San Francisco.
- Won the third-closest Cy Young race since current election format was created in 1970...edged St. Louis' Chris Carpenter and Adam Wainwright, receiving 11 of 32 first-place votes, 12 second-place votes and nine third-place votes to finish with 100 points.
- Lincecum's 15 wins in 2009 were the fewest for any starting pitcher to win a Cy Young in a season not shortened by work stoppage.
- Became the first player to win the award twice in his first two full seasons in the big leagues.
- Also named NL Pitcher of the Year by The Sporting News.
- Led the NL in strikeouts for the second-consecutive season, joining Christy Mathewson as the only Giants in franchise history to pace the league in Ks in consecutive years.
- Was named the Opening Day starter by manager Bruce Bochy, becoming just one of five pitchers originally drafted by San Francisco to start an opener for the Giants (others were Terry Mulholland, John Burkett, Bob Knepper and Jim Barr).
- Was named NL Pitcher of the Month for June after going 4-1 with a 1.48 ERA (8er, 48.2ip), three complete games and 48 strikeouts in his six June assignments...was his first-ever Pitcher of Month Award...also for his efforts

during month was named MLBs Clutch Performer.

- > Had career-best 29.0-inning scoreless streak from June 23-July 9, marking the fourth-longest streak in SF-era history...only longer streaks were by Gaylord Perry (40.0 innings in 1967 and 39.0 innings in 1970) and Juan Marichal (30.0 innings in 1966).
- > Was named to his second-straight NL All-Star team, along with teammate Matt Cain...was named starting pitcher for the NL team by manager Charlie Manuel, becoming the seventh Giant to start a Midsummer Classic...threw 35 pitches over 2.0 innings, in his first career All-Star outing July 14 at St. Louis' Busch Stadium.
- > Became just the third Giants pitcher since 1958 to strike out 15-or-more batters in a single contest when he did so July 27, 2009 vs. Pittsburgh in what was his sixth career complete game...joined Jason Schmidt (16 Ks – June 6, 2006) and Gaylord Perry (15 Ks – July 22, 1966) as the only Giants to accomplish feat...also became the first Giants pitcher with 15-or-more strikeouts in a game in which he didn't allow an earned run since NL got idea to keep track of earned runs back in 1912 (*Elias*).
- > Was named NL Co-Player of the Week with Florida's Josh Willingham for week of July 27-Aug. 2 after going 2-0 and allowing just two unearned runs in 17.0 innings.
- > Missed a start for the first time as a Giant on Sept. 8, 2009 with lower-back spasms that forced him to miss game against Padres...he first reported pain in his back when the Giants landed in San Francisco when team flew home from Milwaukee on Sept. 6...Giants' top pitching prospect, Madison Bumgarner started in his place.
- > Became the first Giants Cy Young winner since 1967, and just the second ever, joining Mike McCormick, after posting a spectacular 18-5 record with a 2.62 ERA (66er, 227.0ip) and ML-leading 265 strikeouts in 34 games (33 starts) for San Francisco in his first full big league season in **2008**.
- > Of 32 ballots submitted by two writers in each league city, Lincecum was listed first on 23 ballots, second on seven and third on one to total 137 points, based on a 5-3-1 tabulation system...joined Dwight Gooden (Mets, 1985), Bret Saberhagen (Royals, 1985) and Fernando Valenzuela (Dodgers, 1981) as the only pitchers to win a Cy Young
- > Was 24 years old when he won award, becoming the youngest Cy Young winner, in either league, since Roger Clemens was 24 in 1986...also became the 13th pitcher to win the honor with team having a sub .500 record.
- > Established a SF-era single season strikeout record, surpassing Jason Schmidt's 2004 total of 251...became just the ninth Giant since 1900 to record at least 200 Ks in a single season (22nd occurrence) and became the only Giant to lead the Majors in the modern era in strikeouts, first to pace NL since Bill Voiselle recorded 161 Ks in 1944...his 265 punchouts were the most in the Majors since Randy Johnson had 290 and Johan Santana collected 265 in 2004.
- > Since 1900, only three other pitchers had as many strikeouts in their sophomore season as Lincecum: Vida Blue (301 in 1971 As), Frank Tanana (269 for 1975 Angels) and Dwight Gooden (268 for 1985 Mets) (*Elias*).
- > Was named NL Pitcher of the Year by The Sporting News and was named Players Choice for Most Outstanding NL pitcher, announced by MLB Players Association...was

also selected as Starter of the Year in MLB.com's annual This Year in Baseball Awards presented by State Farm, which was voted on by fans.

- > Was selected to his first NL All-Star Game, becoming the 13th starting pitcher in SF annals to be selected, however, did not appear in Mid-Summer Classic at Yankee Stadium after suffering from flu-like symptoms.
- > Emerged as one of stalwarts of Giants' staff in **2007**, going 7-5 with a 4.00 ERA, 150 strikeouts and .226 avg. against (122-for-539) over 24 starts in his first season at the Major League level.
- > Ranked among NL rookie leaders in strikeouts (first), wins (tied for fourth), ERA (fourth), avg. against (second), innings (third) and starts (third).
- > His 150 strikeouts were the fourth-highest single-season total by a rookie in SF history (seventh in franchise annals).

- > Tied the all-time record for most strikeouts in a World Series clinching game with 10 on Nov. 1, 2010 at Texas... became the first pitcher to record that many Ks in such a game since Bob Gibson fanned 10 batters in Game 7 of the 1967 World Series against Boston.

Lincecum's Giants Gems

- **During 2013 off-season, he rented a warehouse where he practiced pitching.** "We threw down some turf, threw down a mound, a couple nets and some of my friends, who'll let me throw anything at them."
- Also in 2013, he sold his downtown Seattle condo and bought a house in the Madison Valley neighborhood of Seattle, with a yard that's better for his two dogs than a high-rise patio.
- Father, Chris retired after working at Boeing; had been there since he was 21. Parents divorced. Lincecum says his mom is working a lot out of Japan. Has an older brother.
- Tim was 4-11, 85 pounds as a high school freshman.
- What he learned his first season: "This game is completely humbling." He talked about a game in which he walked off the field after a strikeout pumping his fist "like a frickin' idiot." Then he gave up big runs the next inning. He says Mark Sweeney took him aside. "I knew I had done something wrong. There's got to be a certain way of going about your work."
- **He recites lyrics to hundreds of songs from memory.**
- He looks so unlike a professional athlete that early in his career in SF, a teller at his neighborhood San Francisco bank noticed the Giants logo on the check Lincecum was depositing and asked if he worked at the ballpark. Lincecum said he did. "Oh, that must be fun," she said. Lincecum agreed that it was.
- Also early in his career, he **bought former teammate Dave Roberts' 2006 CLS55 Mercedes Benz in large part because the initials CLS corresponded to Chris (his father), Leo (his grandfather) and Sean (his brother), and 55, of course,** is Lincecum's jersey number.

From dad Chris Lincecum:

- **Says he began teaching Tim his mechanics at the age of four** — "built it from scratch," as he puts it.
- Started him on a curveball at 8 years old. Same with his older brother.
- **Used the same mechanics himself as a young player, and made it to semi-pros.** "I never got hurt. Never a sore arm or sore back."
- Tim's older brother played at five different levels of World Series, according to Chris. But he broke his arm twice playing football, ending his baseball hopes.
- **Tim very athletic: can do back flips like Ozzie Smith, walk on his hands.** Father always tells the story of how as a junior at Liberty High School of Issaquah, Lincecum tried out for the golf team. He had played 27 holes during his entire life. He needed to shoot 40 or under for nine holes to make the team. He shot a 39.
- He was the point guard on basketball team, quarterback and cornerback on football team his freshman and sophomore years.
- Chris describes his relationship with his sons: "I was right in their hip pockets." He always coached Tim's baseball teams (and also his other son's teams). "I wasn't going to let anybody mess with him."
- Chris says he and his wife split when Tim was beginning high school, so he raised both boys essentially on his own.
- **Chris says he "hangs on every pitch" of every one of Tim's game. He watches every Giants game and charts Tim's pitches.** "Helps to keep my sanity," he says. "I know everything he's thinking out there."

Lopez's Giants Gems

- **Father a career FBI agent, beginning in his native Puerto Rico**, then transferring to Washington, D.C., when Javier was 3 years old.
- Mother was a popular Spanish teacher at Javier's high school and is now an ESL teacher.
- Javier **grew up outside of D.C., in Fairfax, VA.**
- Javier **has a degree in psychology from the University of Virginia. He finished his degree three years after he left school to play baseball.** He had promised his fiancée's father that he would get the degree before he married fellow U.Va. student Renee Richards.
- **He was drawn to psychology in trying to figure out how to stay consistent in baseball.** He had always been very analytical and figured every problem he had in sports was about mechanics. Then he realized so much of baseball was mental. "Your body follows what your mind tells you," he says. "Our thoughts really do control our emotions in a rather significant way." He didn't find much specific help in his coursework but stuck with psychology to earn his degree. He continued to develop psychological skills and seek advice to help him with his transition into the pros. "Failures come a little more frequently in pro ball," he says, "and you're playing so many more games. So it's more difficult to keep the kind of balanced life you had in college."
- **Javier's wife, Renee, not only attended the same college but also attended the same high school in Fairfax, VA, as Javier (she was class president).** She played soccer at both schools.
- **Like Javier, she majored in psychology. She earned a doctorate in psychology from the University of Tennessee.**
- They married in 2001 but didn't live together full time until she finished her coursework at Tennessee and internship in College Station, TX, in 2007. Meanwhile, Javier was bouncing among 12 different teams (four Major League teams including the Giants, and eight minor-league teams) in 13 years. "We coordinated our schedules to meet up in different cities," Javier says. They settled in Golden CO, in 2007. (Javier played in the Rockies organization from 2003 to 2005.)
- Javier and Renee have two children, Kylan (born March 19, 2010) and Christian (October 26, 2012). López was in the 2012 World Series when

Christian was born, so he had to fly back home for the birth between Games 2 and 3.

- Renee eventually wants to work as a counselor on a college campus, where she could work with both the general population and athletes. She wrote her dissertation on depression in athletes.
- Javier says Renee "helped get my mental game right" and continues to do so.
- A self-described introvert, Javier also keeps a journal where he can unload negative thoughts. "I write down anything going on in my life that I don't want to put on anyone else," he says. "It's a release for me."
- **When he was struggling to catch on in the major leagues, he made the difficult switch from an over-the-top style to a sidearm delivery in order become more effective against left-handed hitters.**
- "Middle relief is not a career for the weak of heart," Renee says. "There's no stability in terms of where you're going to be from season to season. You're called into the game in pretty tough situations where you're probably facing somebody is one of the stronger batters. It's usually not a very pretty situation you're being called on to clean up. Maybe you're in there for only one batter. And nobody knows who you are. You might not even be mentioned in the game story the next day. It's not an easy life."
- Javier on making sure he's always ready as a middle reliever: "Every reliever has routines. You do the same thing every day. You make sure you're physically and mentally prepared. Make sure your mind is cleared. I look at video of opposing batters. Look at what I've done with them in the past."
- After the Giants clinched the division, Sabean and Bochy pointed to Lopez as a key acquisition during the 2010 season. "That was the guy, right there," Bochy said. "They all were huge for us, but when (lefthander Dan) Runzler went down and we didn't have that guy who we could fit in the late innings, Brian went out and got him and he was enormous. Of all of them, I have to say that was the one." Said Sabean, "It's hardest when you get guys who switch leagues," Sabean said, "but when we lost Runzler and (Jeremy) Affeldt, we had to get a lefthander we could count on or the rest of this doesn't happen. It just doesn't."

Machi's Giants Gems

- Grew up in El Tigre, Venezuela. Born in 1982, the third of five children. Father was a carpenter/construction worker and also worked in maintenance at a university. Machi says his father injured his back a few years ago and had to stop working. Machi supports him.

- **Though his area of Venezuela is known for producing track athletes, Machi wasn't a runner. He says he competed in the 100-yard dash at age 13 during a community field day against other towns.** He says he won. It was the first and only time he raced.

- He was a skinny kid who played shortstop. He attracted notice from baseball scouts when he was 15 and playing in a national tournament. He went to a baseball academy at 16 and the Phillies signed him two years later (2000).

- He went to rookie ball at age 20 in 2002. He spent the next decade in the minors.

- He was 29 years old in 2011 when the Giants signed him to a minor league contract. But he would have been the 14th pitcher for Triple A Fresno. He asked to play in the Mexican league (from March to July) so he'd get more playing time. The Giants agreed to loan him.

- He says during his time playing for Diablos Rojas in Mexico, he thought he might be at the end of the road in baseball. If he hadn't made it by then, was it realistic to think he'd ever make it?

- With encouragement from Bobby Evans, he played in Fresno in 2012. Then finally, at the

age of 30, he made his Major League debut on September 3, 2012. He had played in 387 minor-league games. He pitched a perfect inning against the Diamondbacks.

- In early May 2014, despite being a relief pitcher, he led all Major League pitchers with a 5-0 record. But what he really wanted was a save. He was a closer in Venezuela and wanted to record a save in the Major Leagues. He got it on May 11 in Los Angeles when he came in in the 10th inning following Romo's blown save.

- He had already recorded another Major League first (for him) on May 5. With two runners on and one out in the 13th inning against Pittsburgh, Machi was asked to lay down a sacrifice bunt. He had not bunted since he was 14 years old. He pushed it down the third-base line. When he saw the pitcher take his time fielding it, he busted up the line to first. The pitcher seemed taken aback. The first baseman couldn't handle the errant throw. Machi was safe, and Pence scored the winning run.

- Teammate **Javier Lopez says Machi's splitter is one of the best he's ever seen.**

- His **nickname is baquiro, which means wild boar.**

- When he's done with baseball, he thinks he'll open a baseball academy for children.

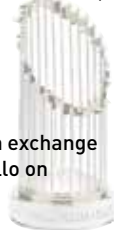

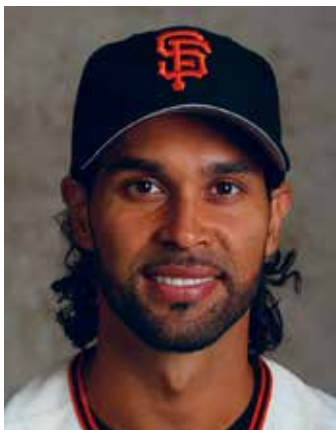

- > With just six games remaining in the regular season it was announced that he'd have season-ending surgery on Sept. 25 in Los Angeles to repair a bulging disk in his back...Dr. Robert Watkins, a renowned spinal surgeon, performed the procedure, a discectomy to shave the herniated portion of the disc that was pinching a nerve and causing pain.
- > Also missed three games with a sprained AC joint in his left shoulder after jamming it on May 17 while coming up short on a diving attempt.
- > Was placed on the 15-day DL June 25 (retro to June 15) with a lower back strain...was diagnosed with a bulging disc and a narrowing of the nerve canal in his lower back...was expected to return to the lineup July 1, but suffered a setback while running and consulted with Dr. Robert Watkins in Los Angeles to determine a course of treatment.
- > Had the ninth-highest avg. in the NL in the month of April, hitting .337 (32-for-95).
- > Received his second career ejection on April 21 at Colorado (ejected by HP umpire Tumpane) for arguing a

third called strike.

- > Hit a pair of leadoff homers: April 29 vs. San Diego and May 2 at Atlanta.

- three-run shot off Craig Lefferts on May 15, 1989.
- > It had been 83 years since the last Giants' walk-off inside-the-park homer, hit by future Hall-of-Famer Bill Terry against the Cubs at the Polo Grounds on Aug. 24, 1931 in the New York Giants' 2-1 win.
 - > Prior to hitting the inside the park HR; had hurt his left hamstring in the 8th inning diving for a fly ball, but stayed in the game...he sat out the next 11 games before being placed on the 15-day disabled list on June 7, 2013 (retroactive to May 28) with a strained left hamstring.
 - > Suffered a setback in his first rehabilitation game on June 20, 2013...hit a ground ball to 2nd base in the 9th inning and pulled up lame three-quarters up the line...he started to jump up and down and couldn't make it any longer...never reached 1st base and was carted off the field.
 - > After having a second opinion it was determined that he needed surgery...underwent successful surgery on his left hamstring tendon (inside back of knee) on June 25, 2013 in Los Angeles by Dr. Neal El-Attrache at the Kerlan Jobe clinic.
 - > Missed a total of 82 games from May 26-Aug. 30, 2013...was reinstated from the 60-day DL on Aug. 30 and went 30-for-93 (.323) in 25 games following his return.
 - > His 15 3Bs in **2012** not only led all of Major League Baseball, but also set a San Francisco-era record (since 1958) for a single season, surpassing Steve Finley (12 in 2006) and Willie Mays (12 in 1960).
 - > Posted the longest home hitting streak in franchise history (since 1900), hitting safely in 28 consecutive home games from April 14-June 4, 2012...it was the longest home hitting streak for any ML player since 2010, when Josh Hamilton hit safely in 29-straight home games at Rangers Ballpark.
 - > Hit safely in 20-straight games from April 14-May 6, 2012, tied for eighth-longest hit streak in SF-era history.

 - > On May 19, 2010 at Washington he hit an inside-the-park home run (4th inning against Livan Hernandez) and started a triple play to become the first player to accomplish each of those feats in same game since Phillies shortstop Ted Kazinski did so against the Giants at the Polo Grounds on Sept. 25, 1955...Pagan caught Cristian Guzman's sinking line drive, threw to catcher Henry Blanco who threw to shortstop Jose Reyes to double off Hernandez at second base...Reyes then threw to Ike Davis to catch Nyjer Morgan at first base and complete triple play.
 - > On August 1, 2010, Carlos Beltran, Jesus Feliciano and Pagan, all natives of Puerto Rico, appeared in the outfield at the same time...according to the Baseball Hall of Fame, it marked only the seventh time an All Puerto Rican outfield played together in same game (previous time was June 6, 1981 when Cubs had Carlos Lezcano, Jerry Morales and Hector Cruz).
 - > Hit over .300 for the first time in his career in **2009**, finishing campaign with a .306 avg. (105-for-343) in 88 games.
 - > Underwent surgery at Hospital for Special Surgery March 11, 2009 to remove a bone spur from his right elbow.
 - > His contract was selected on May 16, 2009 from Buffalo (AAA) of the International League.
 - > Left game May 31, 2009 vs. Florida with right groin discomfort...placed on 15-day disabled list June 1 with strain of his right groin...activated from disabled list July 10.
 - > Missed most of the **2008** season with a torn left labrum... appeared in just 31 games...injured his left shoulder while diving into stands for foul ball on May 7 at Los Angeles-NL.
 - > On July 29, 2008 had his torn left labrum repaired by Mets Medical Director Dr. David Altchek at Hospital for Special Surgery.
 - > Was placed on the 15-day disabled list on August 8, **2007**, with colitis and missed remainder of the year.

Pagan's Giants Gems

- Grew up in the drug- and gang-ridden projects on the north coast of Puerto Rico in a district of San Juan called Rio Piedras. Angel's parents – government workers -- were strict, and Angel's brother and sister – older by nine and six years, respectively -- kept Angel close, never allowing him to play outside by himself. The Pagans believed completely in the protective powers of two interconnected forces: family and baseball. "I feel I was born on a baseball field," Angel says.

- **Pagan's first baseball coach/manager when he was six years old was his mother, Gloria Figueroa.** Pagan's father played amateur baseball as did Angel's brother, but Figueroa, an accomplished softball player who played in a men's league fast-pitch league, was the key figure in Angel's early baseball life. "She used to play with the men. That's how she got so good. She played with the best teams in Puerto Rico. She has baseball in her blood," Pagan says. "She still watches all my games and gives me feedback. Sometimes if I'm struggling, she'll just tell me, 'That's OK. Baseball is an up-and-down roller coaster. Be patient. Believe that you'll do it.' She's always supporting me."

- When Pagan was thirteen, he **frequented a batting cage near a building where the great Puerto Rican welterweight boxing champion Felix "Tito" Trinidad trained.** Through the gym's open door, Pagan studied the brutal regimen that allowed Trinidad to outlast any opponent. Pagan **decided that training like a boxer would make him a better baseball player.** Among other exercises, he ran sprints on the beach for an hour at a time, building his endurance. "That's the kind of stamina you need to play 162 games. To me it's very important to not get tired when everybody else gets tired. You want to have something left when everyone else is dragging." He soon joined the gym and worked the speed bag to build shoulder strength. "You hit so many baseballs – over 500 at-bats – your shoulders need to be in shape," he says. He even got into the ring. "I got my butt whupped a little bit," he says, laughing. "I was never going to be a boxer. I didn't want that. I always knew baseball was my sport, but I loved boxing and how boxers train. It's very intense. For me, that's what it's about, the intensity of the work. When you train for boxing, you push yourself to the limit."

- He is **still a big boxing fan, naming Manny Pacquiao as his favorite fighter.** He was a fan of the HBO reality series "24/7" when it profiled Pacquiao and other fighters.

- For Pagan, baseball is more than a way to support his wife and children. It's a way to honor his

devoted and protective family, including his father, who died of complications from diabetes in 2005 -- a year before his son made his major-league debut with the New York Mets. "He was a great person," Pagan says. "He taught me how to be a gentleman. I know he'd be proud. Most of my friends from growing up are either dead or in jail. Without my family and without baseball, I don't know where I'd be."

- Daughter Briana had surgery on both eyes at the age of 2 in 2010 when Pagan was with the Mets. She has strabism, the inability to focus both eyes simultaneously.

- Pagan takes seriously his position as a role model, particularly in Puerto Rico. At his rigorous workouts at a public track in Dorado, young people show up to work out with him – young boxers, basketball players, runners, baseball players. Their trainer is Felix Molina, cousin of the catching Molina brothers. "I like to show how I work. There's no time to lollygag. If I give the wrong example, that's what they're going to learn. That's not the type of legacy I want to leave."

- **Pagan is the unofficial translator for his Spanish-speaking teammates.** Learning to speak English was always important to Angel. After being drafted by the Mets in the fourth round in 1999, he could have gone to Miami Dade College for a year, where he would have been surrounded by other Latinos and could continue in his home language. Instead he chose Indian River Community College in Fort Pierce, Fla., where he hung out with English speakers and honed his English skills.

- Pagan was the Mets' nominee in 2010 for Major League Baseball's humanitarian award, named after Roberto Clemente, one of Pagan's idols.

- An only-in-baseball factoid: **Pagan is the first player in Major League history to hit his first two career home runs on his birthday.** It happened with the Cubs on July 2, 2006 -- his 25th birthday -- against the Chicago White Sox.

- In Washington, D.C., on May 19, 2010, Pagan hit the first inside-the-park home run in Nationals Park history (which had been open for just three years). An inning later, playing center field for the Mets, he started a triple play with a shoestring catch. The runners on first and second, unaware he had caught the ball, ran. Pagan threw home. The catcher threw to second to double off one runner. The ball was relayed to first to complete the triple play. Pagan was the first player in 55 years to take part in a triple play and an inside-the-park HR in the same game.

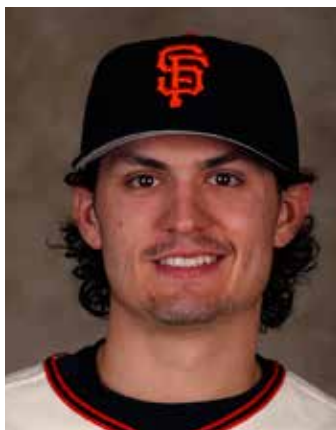

- > 13-year Major League veteran was acquired by San Francisco from Boston in July, giving the Giants a much needed starter with Matt Cain out for the season...went just 1-9 with a 4.72 ERA (65er, 124.0ip) in 20 starts with the Red Sox, while going 6-4 with a 2.17 ERA in 12 starts for SF.
- > His 2.17 ERA after joining the Giants was the lowest post-All-Star break ERA by a Giants pitcher since Scott Garrelt in 1989 (1.69).
- > Beginning July 27 (his first start with the Giants), his 2.17 ERA ranked as the eighth-lowest in the NL.
- > Allowed two earned runs or fewer in each of his last nine outings, posting a 1.35 ERA (9er, 60.0ip), the lowest ERA in the Majors beginning Aug. 13...went 6-1 during this span while holding opponents to a .218 clip.
- > Combined for 32 starts, just two shy of matching his career-high for season (34 in 2007 with San Diego).

- > Tossed 7.2-scoreless innings with eight strikeouts on Aug. 30 vs. Milwaukee...his only hit allowed came with one out in the 8th inning, a single to Mark Reynolds...it marked the deepest he had gone into a game in his career without surrendering a hit (previous: 6.1 innings on Aug. 2, 2014 at New York-NL)...also registered his 2,000th career strikeout, fanning Aramis Ramirez in the 2nd inning.

- > Among NL leaders in runs (second), triples (tied for second), hits (third), total bases (fourth, 289) and multi-hit games (fourth).
- > Became the third Giants player in the last 10 seasons with 100+ runs scored (also: Barry Bonds, 129 in 2004, Aubrey Huff, 100 in 2010).
- > Became the first Giant to have over 700 plate appearances in a season since Brett Butler in 1990 (732)...in fact, became just the fifth Giant in SF-era history with over 700 plate appearances in a season, joining Willie Mays (706 - 1962), Bobby Bonds (3 times - 1969 - 720, 1970 - 745, 1973 - 738), Tito Fuentes (1973 - 731), and Chili Davis (1982 - 701).
- > Was one of four players to appear in all 162 games, joining KC's Alcides Escobar, ATL's Freddie Freeman and TB's Evan Longoria.
- > Was the most durable player on SF's roster, starting all but one of the Giants' 162 games...played all but 23 defensive innings.
- > Had his 331 consecutive games starts streak end on the second-to-last-day of the season (Sept. 27) to rest (ATL's Freddie Freeman now owns the longest games started

streak at 168)...Pence's streak began Sept. 25, 2012 and had been the longest active streak in the bigs.

- > Has still appeared in 383 consecutive games, the third-longest streak in franchise history, behind Bill Terry (468, 1930-1933) and George Burns (459, 1915-1917)...his consecutive games streak started on Aug. 1, 2012 (his first game in a Giants uniform).
- > Only one other player in the last 45 years has started 300+ consecutive games in right field...Jeff Francoeur started 370 in a row for the Braves from 2005 to 2008.
- > Since he joined SF, the only two Giants other than Pence to start in right field were Francisco Peguero on Sept. 23, 2012 against San Diego and Juan Perez on Sept. 27, 2014 versus San Diego.
- > Not only did Pence play in every game, but he was also one of the most versatile Giants when it came to where he hit in the lineup...his versatility allowed him to fill and produce from the first, second, third and fifth spots in the lineup.
- > Batted .351 (40-for-114) with RISP (3rd-highest in NL) and paced the Majors with a .404 clip (19-for-47) with RISP and two outs.
- > Really struggled over his final 15 games, going 4-for-54 (.074) with two RBI and ended the season with one hit in his last 28 ABs.
- > Hit just .165 (15-for-91) in Sept., the fourth-lowest clip among qualifying NL players.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- > Won the **2013** “Willie Mac” Award, given to the team’s most inspirational player, as voted by players, coaches, trainers, fans and Willie McCovey.
- > In 2013, he became the seventh Giant to hit at least 20 HRs and steal 20 bases in a season and the first since Barry Bonds in 1998 (the others: Bobby Bonds, Willie Mays, Jeffrey Leonard, Glenallen Hill and Orlando Cepeda).
- > Joined Los Angeles’ (AL) Mike Trout as the only players in the Majors to hit 20-plus home runs, steal 20-plus bases and record 90-plus RBI in 2013.
- > In fact, the only players in SF-era history to accomplish the feat of 20 HRs, 20 steals and 90 RBI are Willie Mays, Orlando Cepeda, Bobby Bonds, Barry Bonds and now Pence.

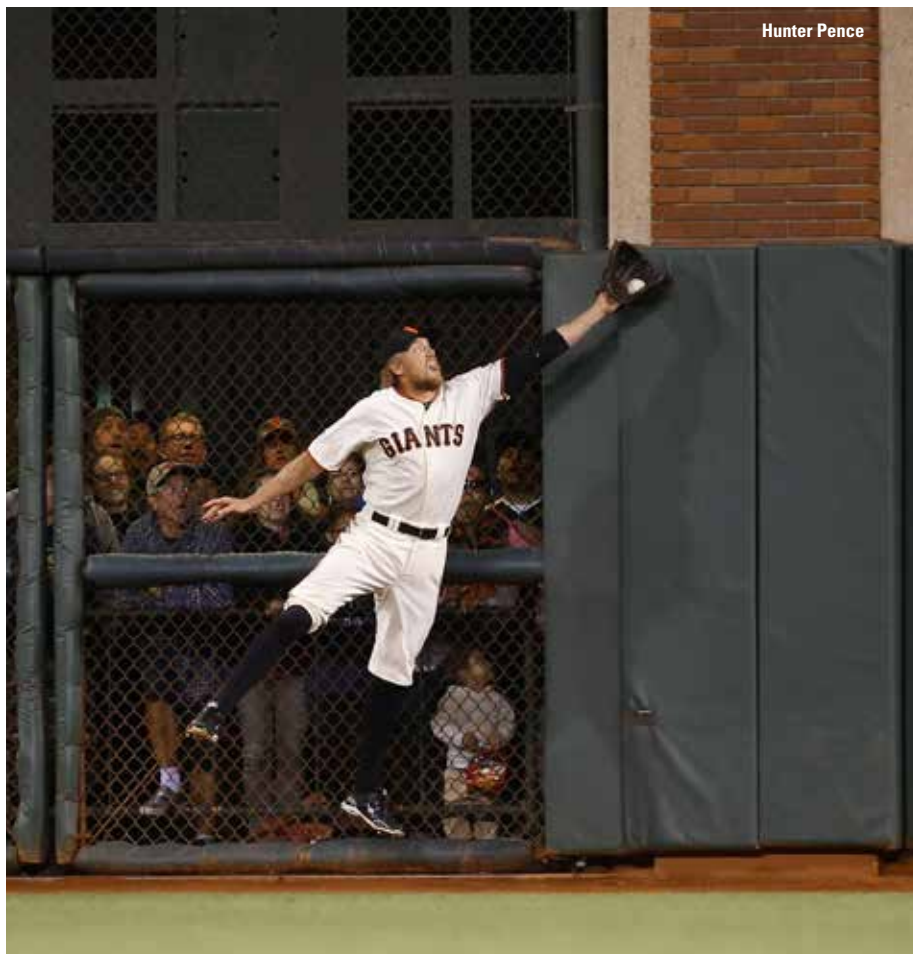

Pence's Giants Gems

- Hunter has an older sister Stacy, who is in the financial industry in New York; an older brother Howie, who is in the oil business and also manages Hunter's baseball academy in a suburb of Houston. He was a top pitching prospect before injuring his arm and leaving baseball after a few years in the minor leagues. Also has two half-sisters.
- Hunter moved around a lot as a child, mostly in Texas with a stop in Colorado before landing in Arlington for high school.
- His father, Howard, was in the cattle business in Texas, mostly in advertising and sales. Had a printing business. He was in the oil business when the industry crashed in the 80s. He became a self-employed entrepreneur.
- His mother Gail, now divorced from Hunter's father, was a stay-at-home mom most of his childhood. Spent two years commuting to JFK to work as a passenger service manager for American. Was at JFK on 9-11 and quit soon after.
- **Hunter competed in power tumbling from ages 5 to 10 – becoming the Texas state power-tumbling champion at the age of 9** -- following his sister Stacy into the sport. She competed in the World Championships in Portugal when she was 18. (The family was so involved in the sport that mom Gail became an international judge.) Says Hunter: "I built a lot of flexibility and strength in flipping and jumping. I'm glad I did it. When you're in a kid, it helps you learn to control your body. Baseball is body control."
- He would occasionally do handsprings on his way out to play shortstop; there was a photo in the newspaper of Hunter completely upside-down in mid-flip with the headline "Handspring Hunter." The story said he wore number 8 because it looks the same right-side up and upside down. During pep rallies, cheerleaders got him to do back handsprings. Mom Gail says he can still do a standing handspring.
- **Always a fierce competitor and pushes himself hard.** Hunter was a small skinny kid who didn't have a growth spurt until his junior year of high school. No matter. "In football, he didn't care how big the other guy was, he'd hit him," Hunter's father Howard said. Howard made him quit so he wouldn't ruin his body.
- Hunter would try to keep up with his brother Howie, who is almost four years older "We competed constantly," Hunter says. "I loved to compete, so we competed constantly. We'd compete in everything – basketball, wiffle ball, whatever. We'd compete to see who could eat their cereal faster in the morning."
- "He has another gear that the rest of us don't have," Howie says. "He can take more pain than the rest of us. If you line up 20 people and make them hold a plank for as long as they can, he'd be shaking and sweating and holding the plank until everyone else collapsed."
- **His unconventional throwing motion began when he was about 12 and had a sore shoulder.**
- He decided between his junior and senior years that he loved baseball and wanted to play as long as he could, he set about figuring out how to make himself the best player he could. He completely transformed his diet and training. He began lifting weights.
- "I would read magazines and books, talk to people at the weight room, continually take in information. I gave up soda and didn't drink any for like seven years. I had a goal to be as fast as I could and drinking soda didn't make you any faster; it was like a random belief. I drank water instead. I learned to eat cleaner foods. Nothing fried. A lot of times it was just about eating enough calories to fuel my body. I used to try to eat lots of fruits and veggies, what I call live foods." Then he **followed the Paleo diet (fish, grass-fed pasture raised meats, vegetables, fruit, fungi, roots and nuts; no grains, legumes, dairy products, processed oils, salt and refined sugar.)**
- Stopped Paleo in 2013 when his body fat percentage dropped too low.
- He works just as hard on his mind as on his body. "Baseball is such a game of the mind," he says. "If you can get a strong mind, it helps you in many ways." So he **reads books on psychology, philosophy and spirituality.** "It started as a way to get better at baseball and it still kind of is. But it's also about being a better person." Some of his favorites: "The Book of the Five Rings," a book on the martial arts written in 1645 by swordsman Miyamoto Musashi; The Dialogues of Plato; and the Bible. "Focusing your mind is a skill you have to practice.. You want to actually focus instead of being on autopilot. You're widening the mind and also emptying it so you focus on what you want to focus on."
- Played ball at Texarkana Junior College then moved on to the University of Texas-Arlington after Don Werner, a minor-league coach whose son played with Hunter convinced the coach at UTA to give Pence a shot. In his sophomore year, he hit .400 toward the end of the season, did the same in a summer league and was told, for the first time, that he might just have a future in baseball. In 2004, the Astros didn't have a first-round pick, but they selected Pence in the next round, taking other teams by surprise.
- **Big fan of video games** -- says it helps him in baseball.

Perez's Giants Gems

- **He came to the U.S. from Dominican Republic at age 14.** Spoke little English, so he struggled in his Bronx high school and returned to the Dominican to play at a baseball academy in Santiago. He then moved to a similar academy in Florida, where he learned English. He returned to his high school in the Bronx, DeWitt Clinton. Scouts watched his games but didn't sign him.
- With few options, he accepted an invitation from a neighbor in his apartment building. The man owned La Caribe Baseball League, which has played at Crotona Park in New York since the 1950s. Manny Ramirez is an alum. "More than 90 percent of the players on the messy field are, like Perez, from the Dominican Republic, and many of them are long past their prime. Fans buy beer from a corner store and it's not uncommon for the drinks to end up in the dugout," Alex Pavlovic wrote for Bay Area News Group in March 2013. Perez played as often as he could, worked on his swing at local batting cages and earned money in his father's plumbing business. "But my dad eventually told me to just focus on baseball," Perez told Pavlovic. "He said, 'I'll help you out because I know you love to play more than anything.' He told me to take it easy and just play."
- **He found a spot on the Western Oklahoma State College team, where he roomed with fellow Bronx kid Danny Almonte,** who gained infamy at the 2001 Little League World Series when he was found to be two years older than the rest of his 12-year-old competition.
- **He set NJCAA Division II records for homers and RBIs and was named player of the year.** Perez had a .530 on-base percentage and 62 extra-base hits in 64 games. Some scouts called him "Mystery Guy" because he seemed to have come out of nowhere.
- Giants drafted him in the 13th round in 2008.
- He hit .302 in 2012 at Double-A Richmond with 11 homers, 26 doubles and 18 stolen bases. "For his size, he's probably the strongest player pound-for-pound in the system," minor league hitting coordinator Steve Decker told Pavlovic in spring 2013. "He's a strong kid and strong people tend to search for power, but I don't think he understands how fast he is and how productive he can be if he focuses on line drives and walks. He can wreak havoc that way."
- Made his Major League debut June 9, 2013, to fill in for an injured Angel Pagan. Three batters into his debut game at Chase Field, he made a spectacular, wall-crashing catch that garnered a standing ovation from his teammates in the dugout.

two runs over 7.0 innings in a loss.

Petit's Giants Gems

- **Born in Maracaibo, a baseball hotbed that produced the only Hall of Famer from Venezuela, shortstop Luis Aparicio.** He began playing baseball at age 3. He grew up admiring Wilson Alvarez, a left-handed pitcher who threw a no-hitter for the White Sox in 1991 when Petit was eight years old.
- At 10 years old, he played second base for Maracaibo in the 1994 Little League World Series to earn Venezuela its first championship title. One of his teammates: Giants Triple A catcher Guillermo Quiroz.
- He has two brothers who played baseball as teenagers but not beyond. One co-owns with Yusmeiro an auto parts store in Venezuela, the other is a bartender in Miami. He has a younger sister who is a student. His mother was a fourth-grade teacher then a school director. His father is an agricultural surveyor.
- When Petit told his parents at the end of high school in 2001 that he wanted to pursue baseball instead of an education, his father gave him a deadline: He had a year to get signed or he would go to college. Petit worked morning, noon and night — on the field, in the gym, on the running track. The Mets signed him for \$20,000 eight months later.
- Though primarily a reliever in the US, Petit has always been exclusively a starter in the competitive Venezuela Winter League.
- After pitching parts of four seasons in the Majors, Petit couldn't crack a Major League roster in 2010 and 2011. After spending the 2010 season with the Mariners' Triple A team, Seattle cut him before the start of the 2012 season. For a month, Petit waited in Miami for the phone to ring. The only offer came from the Mexican league. So at the age of 27, Petit moved into a \$115-a-month pension hotel in Oaxaca. "There are challenges put in front of you by God to see how mentally strong you are and how you're going to react," Petit says. He says everything about the season was tough, but he says the worst part was off the field: The local people stared at him wherever he went because he was so much taller than they were.
- **He played against current Giant teammate Jean Machi in the 2011 Mexican league.**
- Then, as an illustration of how quickly fortunes can change in baseball, Petit went from wondering in 2011 if his career might be ending to being honored just months later as the MVP of the Venezuelan Winter League postseason. As it happens, Giants hitting coach Hensley Meulens was his manager. He recommended his star pitcher to the Giants, who signed him to a minor-league contract for 2012.
- In 2013, he was back in Triple A until being called up July 23. He was designated for assignment five days later, cleared waivers and promptly sent back to Fresno. (It was the second time in 2013 he had been designated for assignment.) He was recalled to the big leagues in late August to fill in for an injured Matt Cain.
- On September 6 at AT&T Park, making just his third Major League start of the year, he came within one strike of pitching a perfect game. With two outs in the ninth inning, on a 3-2 count, Eric Chavez hit a single. Petit got the next out for not only his first one-hitter but his first career complete game and shutout.
- Petit says he has watched the replay of the game twice: Once the night of the game, and the second time in December with his brother and parents in Venezuela. His brother had a recording. "They've watched it more than ten times," Petit said.

- > His production at home suffered from the spacious dimensions and cool nights at AT&T Park, where he sported a .764 OPS, compared to his .941 figure on the road...hit .274 at AT&T Park, however batted .381 (32-for-84) over his final 21 home games.
- > Hit .347 with a .899 OPS as a first baseman (30 starts) compared to a .305 clip and .849 OPS as a catcher (109 starts).

- > Started 141 games for the Giants, 109 at catcher, 30 at first base and two as the designated hitter.
- > Threw out 17-of-76 (22.4%) of attempted basestealers and finished seventh in the NL with a 3.39 catcher's ERA.
- > Had some back issues that led to fatigue in his legs earlier in the season and hit just .259 with seven HRs and 25 RBI in April-May.
- > However, had the highest batting avg. in the Majors after the All-Star break, hitting .354 (85-for-240) with 12 HRs, 43 RBI in 62 games.
- > Ranked third among all big league players with a .393 clip in Sept. (LAD's Carl Crawford, .448; CLE's Michael Brantley, .416).
- > Was in and out of the Giants lineup the last week of the season to rest his ailing back.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS

- > Signed a nine-year contract (eight-year extension) through 2021 with an option for 2022 on March 29, 2013...marked the longest contract in Giants history.

- > Was selected to his second-consecutive All-Star Game in 2013, via the player ballot.
- > Became the 48th catcher to catch multiple no-hitters when he caught Tim Lincecum's no-hitter on July 13, 2013 at San Diego.
- > Suffered a small fracture on the tip of his right finger and missed four games from Sept. 4-7, 2013...was struck on his bare hand Sept. 3 when a pitch from Madison Bumgarner bounced off the plate...impact of pitch ripped half his fingernail.
- > Was named the National League's Most Valuable player in **2012** after batting .336 (178-for-530) with 78 runs scored, 39 doubles, 24 home runs and 103 RBI while posting a .408 on-base pct., .549 slugging pct. and a .957 OPS.
- > Was listed first on 27 ballots, second on four and third on one of the 32 ballots submitted by two writers representing each league city to score 422 points, based on a tabulation system rewarding 14 points for first place, nine for second, eight for third and on down to one for 10th.
- > Became the fifth catcher to win the MVP award, joining Johnny Bench (1970, 1972), Roy Campanella (1951, 1953, 1955), Ernie Lombardi (1938) and Gabby Hartnett (1935).
- > At 25 years old, was the youngest player to win an MVP award since Ryan Sandberg in 1984.
- > Became the first player since Frank Robinson to win a league MVP award, batting title and World Series in the same season...Robinson accomplished the feat with the Orioles in 1966...five players registered that hat trick prior to Robinson: Dick Groat (1960 Pirates), Mickey Mantle (1956 Yankees), Willie Mays (1954 Giants), Stan Musial (1946 Cardinals) and Joe DiMaggio (1939 Yankees) (Elias).
- > Posey, Yogi Berra (1951 Yankees) and Roy Campanella (1955 Dodgers) are the only catchers to win a World Series and MVP award in the same season (Elias).
- > It was the 13th time a Giants player has been honored and the first since Barry Bonds in 2004.
- > Joined Willie Mays and Willie McCovey as the only Giants to win Rookie of the Year and an MVP award in franchise history.
- > Is one of only three catchers to win Rookie of the Year, MVP and a World Series in their careers, joining Johnny Bench and Thurman Munson...Posey, Willie Mays and Willie McCovey are the only Giants to accomplish that trio of feats.

- > Won the title after a recent rule change making the final sentence of Rule 10.22(a) inapplicable to Melky Cabrera, who finished one plate appearance shy of qualifying due to his suspension (the stricken sentence would have allowed Cabrera, because of the size of his lead over his nearest competitor, to win the title though finishing with fewer than the requisite 502 plate appearances).
- > His 103 RBI were the most driven in by a Giant since Jeff Kent had 108 RBI in 2002.
- > His 82 RBI as a catcher were the second-most in the NL (Miguel Montero, 88) and the second-most in SF-era history (Bengie Molina, 91 in 2008).
- > The only players in Giants franchise history (since 1900) to drive in 100+ runs in a season with their primary position being catcher was Walker Cooper in 1947 (122 RBI) and Dick Dietz in 1970 (107).
- > Joined Dick Dietz (22 HRs in 1970) and Tom Haller (26 in 1966) as the only Giants players with 20+ home runs "as a catcher" only since 1958.
- > Was named an All-Star for the first time in his career, being named the starting catcher for the NL squad...registered 7,621,370 votes, setting the highest total by an NL player in ML history.

- the night before in a collision at home plate with Florida's Scott Cousins, who crashed into Posey as he was trying to block the winning run in the 12th inning...Posey was receiving the throw from right fielder Nate Schierholtz on Emilio Bonifacio's sacrifice fly to medium right field when he had dropped the throw right before Cousins went shoulder-first into him and his left cleat appeared to stick in the infield dirt while the rest of his body was hurled sideways...Giants trainers Dave Groeschner and Mark Gruesbeck helped carry him off the field...the manner in which Cousins hit Posey sparked conversation about rule changes for months.
- Underwent three MRI's – first on his ankle, second on his lower leg and the third on his knee...the results showed torn ligaments in his ankle, a fractured fibula in his lower left leg and nothing on his knee.
 - Underwent successful surgery on May 29, 2011 to repair torn ligaments in his left ankle...had two screws inserted in his leg in a 90-minute procedure that was performed at a medical facility in Burlingame by team orthopedist Ken Akizuki and Giants podiatry specialist Larry Oloff, along with Michael Dillingham, a former 49ers physician who has extensive experience with traumatic injuries.
 - Had successful surgery on July 22, 2011 to remove screws from his left ankle.
 - Made his first career Opening Day roster and became the youngest Giants starting catcher at 24 years and four days old since Tom Haller was 23 years and 292 days old when he started for SF in 1961.
 - Named National League winner of Jackie Robinson Rookie of Year Award in **2010**, becoming sixth player to earn honor in Giants franchise history.
 - Won the Rookie of the Year Award with 129 points, receiving 20 first-place votes, nine second-place votes and two third-place votes.
 - Became the sixth Giant and first in 35 years to win the award, which was established in 1947...joined Willie Mays (1951), Orlando Cepeda (1958), Willie McCovey (1959), Gary Matthews (1973) and John Montefusco (1975).
 - Became the sixth NL catcher to be honored Rookie of Year, joining Johnny Bench (1968), Earl Williams (1971), Benito Santiago (1987), Mike Piazza (1993) and Geovanny Soto (2008).
 - Became the first Rookie of the Year winner to also become World Series champion in same season since Boston's Dustin Pedroia in 2007...the last NL player to do it was Florida's Dontrelle Willis in 2003.
 - With Posey winning ROY, it snapped a 35-year drought for the Giants organization, which had been the longest span without a rookie award for a National League team.
 - Posey joined Texas' Neftali Feliz (AL Rookie of Year) as the third pair of players named ROY in their respective leagues after appearing in that year's World Series...previous pairs were Willie Mays and Gil McDougald in 1951 (Giants and Yankees) and Dave Righetti and Fernando Valenzuela in 1981 (Yankees and Dodgers).
 - Was also named to Topps' ML Rookie All-Star team.
 - Solidified his status as the Giants' most heralded position playing prospect since Matt Williams in 1987 after batting .305 (124x406) with 23 doubles, 18 home runs and 67 RBI in 108 games for San Francisco in 2010.
 - His .305 batting avg. was third-highest for any player who started at least 50 games at catcher in his rookie season, behind Mike Piazza's .318 clip with LA-NL in 1993 and Ronny Paulino's .310 mark with PIT in 2006 (Elias).
 - His 67 RBI were fifth-most by Giants rookie since 1958 and most since Chili Davis had 76 in 1982...his 18 home runs were tied for the fifth-most by a Giants rookie since '58 and most since Davis had 25 in '82.
 - Missed the first two months in the big leagues as he was playing for triple-A Fresno, and wasn't the number one catcher until July 1, 2010.

became just the 21st Major League catcher to post a hit streak of 20+ and only the second to accomplish the feat as a rookie, joining Benito Santiago (34-straight games in 1987).

- > Was named NL Player of the Month, NL Rookie of the Month and was named winner of "Major League Baseball's Clutch Performer of the Month", all for July 2010...finished with a NL-leading 43 hits and ranked third with a .417 avg., tied for third with 24 RBI, fourth with a .466 on-base pct. and fifth in the league with a .699 slugging mark.
- > Became the first Giants player with at least 40-or-more hits in a single month since Randy Winn had 46 in August of 2008...his 43 hits in July were the most in one calendar month by a Giants rookie, surpassing Jim Ray Hart, who had 42 in July 1964...his seven HRs were also most in one calendar month by a Giants rookie since Jack Clark hit seven in 1977.
- > Began the year at triple-A Fresno to catch more innings and get consistent at-bats...with injuries to Mark DeRosa and Edgar Renteria, a window of opportunity opened for Posey to get at-bats at the Major-League level and he was called up to the big leagues on May 29.
- > Played the majority of his games at first base (23 starts at first in 26 games), pushing Aubrey Huff to outfield, however, the trade of Bengie Molina to Texas on July 1 cleared an everyday catching job...at time of trade, Molina was hitting just .257 with a .312 on-base pct. and had been battling a sore left elbow.
- > Hit his first big league homer off Reds pitcher Aaron Harang at Great American Ball Park on June 9, 2010.
- > Hit his first career grand slam and posted his first multi-homer contest on July 7, 2010 at Milwaukee...hit a two-run home run off Chris Narveson in the first inning, capping frame that included three home runs by Giants (also Andres Torres and Aubrey Huff)...Posey's grand slam came in SF's seven-run 4th inning and came against LHP

Chris Capuano...became the first Giants rookie to have at least four hits, two homers and six RBI in a game since Willard Marshall on May 15, 1942 vs. Cincinnati (4-for-5, two HRs, six RBI).

- > One of San Francisco's prized young players, Posey made quick strides in just his two minor league seasons, finishing the year with San Francisco in **2009**.
- > Had his contract purchased from triple-A Fresno on Sept. 2, 2009 and appeared in seven games for the Giants, going 2-for-17 (.118)...made four starts, all at catcher and caught 40.0 innings overall.
- > Upon hearing of his call-up to the Majors, caught an early flight at dawn out of Las Vegas with teammate Dan Runzler and landed in Philadelphia at 3 p.m. local time on Sept. 2, 2009...his call-up was somewhat of a surprise, however, with catcher Bengie Molina missing time with a strained upper right quad, the Giants had no choice but to add Posey to the big league roster as an insurance option.
- > After hitting a combined .325 with 18 HRs and 80 RBI in his first full season between Class A Advanced San Jose and triple-A Fresno, Posey finally got his first Major League at-bat on Sept. 11, 2009 in a 10-3 loss to the Dodgers in Los Angeles, when he entered the game as a late defensive insertion and struck out in his lone plate appearance against Hiroki Kuroda.
- > Collected his first Major League hit in his third career at-bat on Sept. 19, 2009 at Los Angeles-NL, with a bloop single to right field off Jeff Weaver.
- > Caught Randy Johnson Sept. 25, 2009 vs. Chicago-NL, which was largest age difference between a pitcher and catcher since Jesse Orosco and Rob Bowen threw together Sept. 27, 2003 (23 years and 309 days)...the age difference between Posey and Johnson was 23 years and 198 days (Sports Features Group).
- > Prior to his promotion to the big league club, split year between Class A Advanced San Jose and triple-A Fresno...began year at SJ, hitting .326 (95-for-291) with

23 doubles, 13 home runs and 58 RBI in 80 contests, helping the Giants win the first half title in the California League North Division with a 42-28 (.600) record... the Giants later went on to win the California League Championship.

- After earning California League mid-season All-Star honors, Posey skipped double-A and made the jump to triple-A, being promoted July 14, 2009.
- Was scheduled to be promoted earlier, however was hit in the head with a pitch by Stockton's Craig Italinoo on June 26, 2009 and missed five games.
- Following the **2008** season, played for the Waikiki Beach Boys, where he was named to the HWB postseason All-Star team...helped Beach Boys win their first Hawaii Winter League Baseball championship, batting .338 (25-for-74) with 15 RBI.

POSTSEASON CAREER

- Has already won three titles in his first five big league seasons with the Giants (2010, 2012, 2014).
- Became the first player to win the Rookie of the Year Award, MVP and three World Series titles prior to his 28th birthday (*Elias*).
- His 48 postseason games are the most in Giants franchise history.
- His 21 postseason RBI are tied with Barry Bonds for the highest total in franchise history.
- Went 17-for-69 (.246) in 17 postseason games in **2014**...all 17 of his hits were singles.

Posey's Giants Gems

- Oldest of four – two brothers and a sister. One brother is a junior at FSU playing first base, third base and occasionally pitching (as of autumn 2009). Sister plays softball at Gulfcoast CC in Panama City. Youngest brother is a sophomore on the high school varsity baseball team.
- Mike Martin, his coach at FSU, says he never saw Buster lose control of his emotions. During a fracas after a game against rival U of Miami, Buster was the one with his palms down trying to get everyone to calm down.
- Another example of his even temper and discipline: In his last bat as a Seminole, in the College World Series, he came up to bat in the ninth inning with two outs, bases loaded and FSU down by 3 runs to U of Miami. Posey didn't chase a single pitch, his coach says. He drew a walk rather than try to be the big hero. (The next batter hit a tough grounder and the game was over.)
- **The FSU fans sang a song when Buster came to bat: Hail to the Buster – he singles, he doubles, he triples, he homers – Hail to the Buster.**
- He's considered a born leader – which is why Martin switched him from shortstop – where he was an All-American – to catcher. When he took over as catcher, everything for the team changed. "Best leader I've ever had," Martin says. "Treated everyone with respect but if someone needed to be dealt with, Buster dealt with them. We would have never gone to the World Series without him."
- Very competitive and takes the game seriously. After one tough loss, as the team was on the bus back to Tallahassee, a couple of freshmen were joking and laughing. Buster stood up and faced them. "I don't know about any of you, but I'm not real happy right now and I don't want to hear any laughing."
- Martin suspected he would be a good catcher because Buster is smart and very tough and knows pitching. "I thought when he put the gear on for the first time, he'd walk like a duck," Martin says. He didn't. "After three pitches, I said, you got to be kidding me. He looked as if he had been catching all his life – the way he could frame a pitch, the way his mitt looked like a pillow, the fact he didn't snatch at the ball. He looked very polished."
- Still, Martin used him seven or eight times as a closer. **He pitched in the College World Series after eight innings of catching.**
- Posey led the NCAA in 2008 in average (.467), slugging percentage (.864) and on-base percentage (.567) while still learning to master catching.
- **Played all nine positions during one game vs. Savannah State.** Also hit a grand slam in the second inning. He used four different gloves.
- **Great student: ranked fourth in his high school graduating class of 302 students.** "I'm not as smart as the other kids," Buster told his mother at the time. "I just work hard."
- **Almost straight A's in college.** A finance major, he was named to the President's List in spring 2007 for his 4.0 GPA, and made the Dean's List in the fall of 2005 and 2007. Had briefly considered becoming a pediatrician if baseball didn't work out. Loves working with kids.
- **Posey's full name is Gerald Dempsey Posey III. His father, known as Demp, was nicknamed Buster as a kid and passed it on to his son.**
- Dad a vice president for ACC, a wholesale food distributor. Mother is a teacher at an alternative school for kids in trouble. They met while students at Berry College in Rome, GA. Both were athletes. Traci played softball and tennis, Demp played basketball and baseball.
- Father grew up on a farm. His father – Buster's grandfather – grew peanuts and soybeans and raised animals.
- Buster **grew up on a 50-acre plot of land in Georgia with a front yard so big it became a makeshift ball field.** Demp erected a backstop and occasionally used the yard for Little League practice when no other fields were available. Buster was out there all the time. His grandparents live two miles away, his other set of grandparents live just 30 minutes away.
- Buster married his high school sweetheart, Kristen, in January 2009 in their hometown of Leesburg, Georgia. "I think everybody in Leesburg was there," FSU coach Mark Martin says. About 500 people. His mother's brother, a minister, performed the ceremony. The recessional song? "Take Me Out to the Ballgame."
- He and Kristen have known each other most of their lives. Grew up in the same church, Leesburg United Methodist, and went to the same schools. Their mothers worked at the same middle school – Buster's mother as a sixth-grade science teacher and Kristin's mother as a counselor. Buster and Kristin didn't start dating until she was a senior and he was a junior, and they went to Kristin's senior prom together. She went away to Auburn then transferred to Valdosta State, which was closer to Tallahassee, where Buster was. She graduated in 2008 with a degree in organizational communications.
- When he switched to catching, Kristen remembers, he would watch TV in a catcher's crouch to get his legs accustomed to the position.
- Kristen gave birth to twins, Lee and Addison (a boy and a girl), August 14, 2011.
- MVP and hitting champion in 2012. During a trip to New York to collect his MVP award, he **visited with Yogi Berra at the Yogi Berra Museum & Learning Center in Little Falls, N.J.**, with his wife, father and mother.
- **Loves to golf, hunt and fish.**

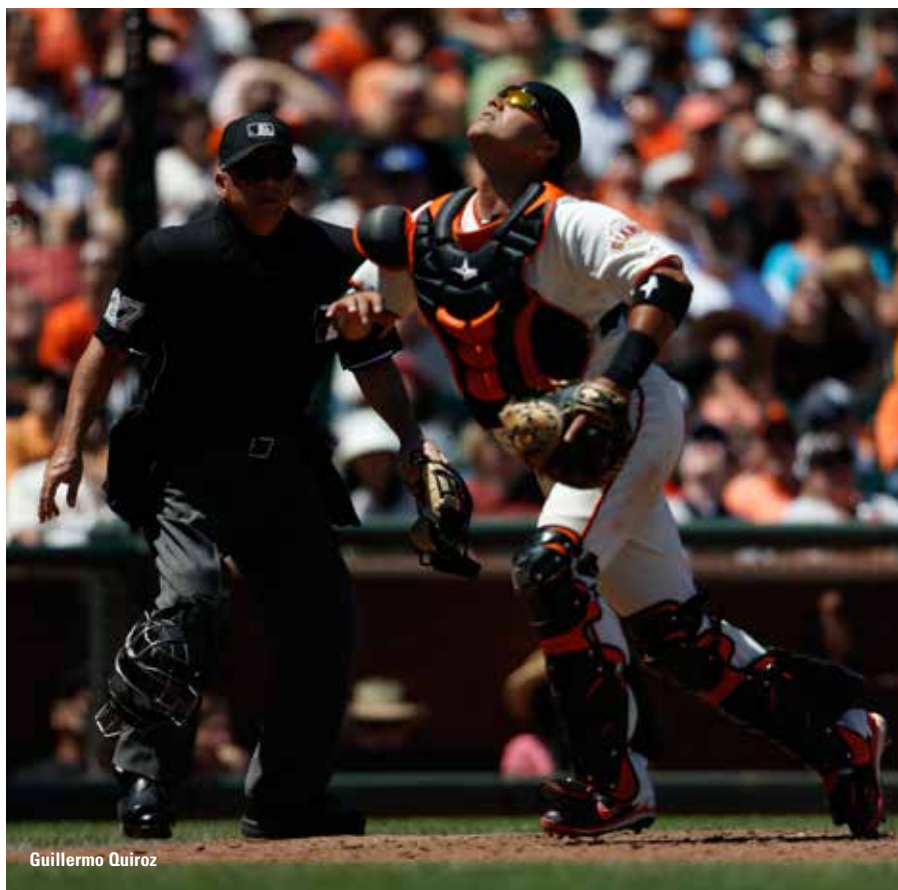

Romo's Giants Gems

- Sergio's father, Francisco – or Frank – was born to a Mexican farm laborer who immigrated to the U.S. when Frank was a baby and followed the crops. (Frank's father loved baseball and almost signed with the Mexico City Diablos but he had to work the farms.) Frank worked the fields, too, when he was growing up. The family would drive to Stockton and Salinas to pick lettuce, tomatoes, grapes. One year Frank attended five different schools. Once in 1969 when the family was living in the Bay Area, Frank's summer school class went to Candlestick to a game and he saw Willie Mays, Bobby Bonds, Chris Speier, and Tito Fuentes. Fell in love with the Giants. He joined the Navy and got married to Leticia. Spent four years active duty and two years in the reserves. Now he's a generator mechanic for CalEnergy.
- Frank played semi-pro ball (first base) in Mexicali, Mexico, not far from the family's home in Brawley. Brawley is a rural town with fields of sugar beets, alfalfa, melons. As soon as he was out of diapers, Sergio accompanied his father to games, running around the bases, playing catch. **Frank says Sergio grew up with a glove on his hand.** Bought him his first glove when he was 2, which Sergio still has. He kept it with him through high school and college.
- **Sergio began pitching when he was 8.**
- When Sergio was 15 and a sophomore in high school, he rode BMX bikes. He had saved up \$400 from his paper route to buy the bike. One day during the baseball season – during which he pitched a no-hitter and a one-hitter – he came out of a flip on his bike and landed on his head. He had a bad concussion and broke his collar bone. He was airlifted to a trauma center, where doctors at first thought he was paralyzed. For five days he was in and out of consciousness. He recovered but couldn't play the rest of the season.
- **After high school, he received no offers from four-year schools. His size at the time – 5 feet 7 – scared coaches off.**
- His father was worried enough about Sergio's maturity and focus that he urged him to join the Navy after high school. Sergio took the entrance test and had the enlistment papers in front of him, but he couldn't sign. He convinced his father to let him try a year at community college.
- Sergio had a complicated college experience: He first went to Orange Coast Community College in Costa Mesa, but the team was loaded with pitchers and Sergio quickly realized he wouldn't get playing time. Carranza helped him transfer to Arizona Western junior college in Yuma. Pitched well. Then he transferred to the University of Northern Alabama in Florence. He put up great numbers but his horsing around and showboating led to a prickly relationship with his coach. The coach ended up yanking him from a game in the middle of an inning so he couldn't get the school record for strikeouts ("You don't deserve it," the coach told him), then declined to renew Sergio's scholarship.
- Then he **went to Mesa State in Grand Junction, CO, and went 14-1. Broke six school records.**
- His breakout minor-league season in '07 (6-2, 9 saves, 1.36 ERA, more than 100 Ks) began with an extended spring training because he missed curfew (during regular spring training) going to a cousin's wedding when he was told he couldn't go.
- Has worked to control his impulsivity. He missed much of his sophomore year in college with a broken hand (from getting into a fight with a guy breaking into his car). He missed games in Single-A Augusta in '06 when he broke his hand again punching a wall in anger.
- He recognizes his shortcomings, evidenced by the elaborate tattoo on his right bicep of monster faces that captures different sides of his personality. The largest image is his inner demon, the one that fuels his intensity on and off the field. "I'm told I'm like a different person when I pitch," he says. Another image is a melting face; it represents the fear that he might let his life melt away and that it's up to him alone to make sure he makes something of himself. Other images represent the joker inside him, his fear of failure, his innermost secrets and his stupid mistakes.
- Below the elaborate tattoo is a newer one: large praying hands with his son's name, Rilen, on them: He says they represent his son praying for him to walk the straight and narrow, to be a good father.
- Rilen was born in 2006; Ryder was born in 2011.
- Pedro Carranza, Sergio's high school coach, says Sergio was motivated more by baseball than academics. He says Sergio's biggest challenges were his focus and tendency to talk before thinking. Carranza remembers kicking him out of practice at least twice for making inappropriate comments. "It hurt him to go home because he loved being on the field and playing ball," Carranza says.
- But he says Sergio worked harder than just about anyone on the team. He wanted Carranza to work with him on Sunday, and Carranza had to tell him it was against the rules. But, Carranza said, if you hire me as your private "tutor," he could do it. He had Sergio pay him a quarter for each Sunday workout.
- Even as an adult, Carranza says, Sergio can be playful and vocal to the point of rubbing some people the wrong way. So when Sergio called him in June 2008 and said, "Coach, you're never going to believe this," Carranza thought, "Oh, what did you do? Did you go off on a coach?" Of course, he was phoning to say he had been called up. Carranza flew to Cleveland to watch Sergio's first ML start. He struck out two batters in an inning of work.

Sanchez's Giants Gems

- Growing up in Venezuela, Hector always knew he wanted to be a professional baseball player, so he left school after ninth grade to attend a baseball academy for two years. At age 15, he switched from shortstop to catcher.
- Signed by the Giants the next year, in 2007, at the age of 16. His \$70,000 signing bonus went into expanding the tiny family home.
- Hector's father works in construction and home repair with Hector's uncle. His mother cooks and cleans for the priests at the local church. She also works sometimes in a medical lab. Hector says the family was very poor and his parents struggled to pay for shoes, clothes and books for their three children. Hector is the middle child.
- The Giants sent 16-year-old Hector to the Dominican League, but he soon flew home because his beloved grandfather was dying. "You've got to work hard. You've got to be big," his grandfather said. They were his last words to Hector.
- **On his right wrist Hector has a tattoo of an "A" flanked by blue angel wings in honor of his grandfather, Armando.**
- Hector helped his older brother open a graphic design business in Venezuela.
- His younger sister is still in high school. Hector has sent home \$1000 a month to help his parents and sister.
- In 2011, Hector rose from Single A to the majors, skipping Double A entirely. Then, surprising many people, he made the 2012 Opening Day roster as Posey's backup and a switch-hitting bat off the bench.
- Three words he would use to describe himself: Outgoing, fun-loving, humble.
- **On his left arm is a tattoo that says: "Learn like you will live forever. Live like you will die tomorrow."** He has the same two sentences on his right arm in Spanish. He had seen the English version on then-teammate Manny Burriss's arm, and when he asked Manny to translate, he loved it. He asked if Manny would mind if he got the same thing. So he got both in Fresno during the summer of 2011.
- He also has a cross with rosaries in honor of his deceased grandmother. And on his left leg, he has seven stars representing various members of his family. He has a rose on the back of his throwing hand with Esmeralda, his mother's name. inscribed above it. On the back of his left hand is a triangle with an eye in the middle – "the sign of the Illuminati," he said – to remind him to keep his past, present and future all within sight. The letters on his left knuckles spell out LOVE. On his right, HOPE. "Hope," Sanchez told CSN. "That is the first word I learned in English. When I came here, I knew to say, 'How are you?' and 'Hello.' But that is the first word I learned here."

Scutaro's Giants Gems

- Father Donato was from Italy, and mother Nelida from Spain. Both immigrated to Venezuela with their families as teenagers because of poor economic conditions after World War II. Donato was a popular barber in their town of San Felipe, Venezuela. It was a skill he learned as a boy in Italy. Nelida was a stay-at-home mother.
- Nelida died of brain cancer on Marco's 18th birthday. She was 49. Donato died in 2001 of a heart attack. Marco says a prayer before every game, asking God to help him do well in honor of his parents.
- Marco is the youngest of four children: Mary, Kathy and Piero. All four understand Italian from listening to their father.
- **Marco was always athletic. On his way home from school one day, he saw a Judo competition going on so he decided to participate, despite having never done Judo. He won a medal.**
- He **played a lot of soccer but eventually focused on baseball** – a decision that did not sit well with Donato, who didn't think baseball was a "man's sport." Donato had grown up with soccer. He eventually came around and supported his son..
- As a teenager, Marco signed for \$3,000 as a non-drafted free agent with the Cleveland Indians and played at their Venezuelan baseball academy
- He spent seven years in the minors with three different organizations, starting at age 19. He spent 4 ½ of those seven years in Triple A.
- When he was finally called up with the Mets, he ran into the Mets' manager Bobby Valentine eating breakfast at the team hotel in Cincinnati. Scutaro introduced himself. "Hi, how you doing?" Valentine said, continuing to eat. "So, kid, do you live around here, or are you going to school in Cincinnati?" Scutaro said: "I'm Scutaro. I'm your new player."
- Since then over the course of his career, despite good numbers, Scutaro has twice been let go on waivers and has been traded four times, including the trade from Colorado to San Francisco July 2012. The Giants were shoring up the infield after Pablo Sandoval strained his hamstring. The Giants are Scutaro's sixth Major League team.
- He always seems to exceed expectations. In 2004, at age 28, he was claimed off waivers by the A's. He was a longshot to make the roster out of spring training but an injury to starting second baseman Mark Ellis opened the door and Scutaro earned the starting spot.
- During the A's 2007 postseason, he stepped in to play shortstop when starter Bobby Crosby went down. Scutaro came through with enough big hits to ignite a "Marco . . . Scutaro!" chant in the Coliseum
- **He's a big star in Venezuela as one of the top players for Leones del Caracas, a popular winter-league team in a country that loves baseball.** He also helped lead Venezuela to the Caribbean Series title in 2006.
- He and his wife, Marines, have three children – two daughters, Maria and Valerie, and a son, Marco Jr.
- **Scutaro was one of four minor-league players featured in the documentary film "A Player to Be Named Later,"** which followed the Triple-A Indianapolis Indians through the 2001 season.

Strickland's Giants Gems

- Grew up (and parents still live) in Zebulon, Georgia, (population 1181 in 2000 census). It is the county seat of Pike County, about an hour south of Atlanta. There is one stop light, a courthouse (built in 1895) and a Dairy Queen.
- Hunter is the fourth of seven children (five boys, two girls) who shared one bathroom. **Dad Ken was a left-handed pitcher who, like Hunter, threw 99 mph. He reached Triple A with the Detroit Tigers.** Has a house-framing company, Strickland Construction. Mom, Maggie, worked as a secretary at the high school and now works as a nanny.
- The kids spent most of their time outdoors playing sports, hunting, swimming, fishing. "They hunted anything that breathed that wasn't human," jokes Hunter's wife, Shelley.
- Married Shelley in 2011. They have known each other since kindergarten and began dating in eighth grade. She is a nurse.
- Always wanted to be a pro baseball player. The brothers nailed a plywood square to a tree in the backyard and threw against it until they'd worn a hole in it, then nailed another board. They'd practice rundowns with two brothers tossing the ball and a third running.
- The boys played on the top baseball traveling teams, with high expectations from their old-school strict father. Once, after his father had berated 12-year-old Hunter for not playing well, he woke his son the next morning at sunrise. He took Hunter to the baseball field and apologized. "I know you're going to make varsity in ninth grade and I know you're going to play professional ball," he said.
- **In high school, Hunter was the star pitcher on the baseball team, star quarterback on the football team, homecoming king and vice president of his senior class.** (In total, three Strickland boys were homecoming kings and another was in the homecoming court.)
- All the boys worked with their dad. "We always knew (through seven lean years in the minor leagues) Hunter had a fall-back job. He could build a house any day of the week — even though he has said he will never build another house again," Shelley says.
- Drafted out of high school in 2007 by the Red Sox in the 18th round. When he got the call from his agent that the Sox were interested, he was up on a roof framing a house with his dad. After the most exciting news of his life, he simply worked the rest of the day. Several years later, after he was traded to the Pirates, he was up on a roof again with his dad when he got the good news that the Pirates had added him to their 40-man roster.
- To save money when he was in low-A for the Pirates in West Virginia, he and two teammates slept most of the season in the clubhouse: one on a couch, two on blow-up mattresses that they deflated every morning and pushed to the side. They hit golf balls on the field at night.
- Rotator cuff surgery with Pirates 2011, then shortly after being claimed off waivers by the Giants in 2013, he had Tommy John surgery. Was throwing in low 90's before rotator cuff and his speed jumped a little after. It jumped a little more after Tommy John. "It was tough at the time but I wouldn't trade it," Hunter says of the injuries. "I feel like that's made me who I am as a person." He now throws up to 100 mph.
- He, his brother Rhett (two years older) and several friends from the minor leagues are taping a hunting/baseball show they hope to sell to a TV station. Their company is called Spread Crushers. Several episodes focus on hosting a hunt for people with disabilities. Hunter and Rhett took out a man in wheelchair suffering from ALS and helped him shoot two deer.
- Hunter and Shelley have bought a home in Phoenix.
- **On July 4, 2014, Hunter memorably entered double-A Richmond's game in front of a capacity crowd wearing an American flag vest...**he promptly retired the side in order to preserve the Richmond win and earn the save.
- Keeps a picture of his surgically repaired elbow taped above his locker, and had written in sharpie on the photo "**Pain is weakness leaving the body**".
- Is an avid fisherman and outdoorsman.

Susac's Giants Gems

- **Grew up in Roseville, CA, near Sacramento**, the grandson of immigrants from the former Yugoslavia. Grandfather Yanko Susac escaped into Austria then to America, where he met Jana, whose family found its way to Stockton. Yanko built up an electrical business; Jana worked as a seamstress. They emphasized hard work. "Everything was school, school, school," says Andrew's father, Nick. "He thought athletic games were a waste of time."
- But Yanko and Jana's sons, Nick and John, fell in love with baseball, and they passed it on to their own children. They coached Nick's three sons from the time the boys could walk.
- Andrew is the oldest of the sons. He has two brothers: Matt, 2 years younger, and Daniel, 11 years younger. Matt plays baseball as a senior at the University of Nevada-Reno, and Daniel, 13, is one of three players from Woodcreek Little League to win all three NorCal championships. (Andrew's 2004 Junior all-stars from Woodcreek reached the Western Regionals bracket of the Little League World Series.)
- **Andrew could speak a little Croatian as a kid.** His father would call pitches from the dugout in Croatian. He'd say in Croatian, "Your cousin Rachel just showed up." Nick explains: "His cousin Rachel is fast, so that meant a fastball. If I said 'Grandma just showed up,' well, Grandma is slow and crooked, so that meant a curveball. It drove the opposing players crazy."
- Nick says Andrew is very friendly on the outside but "Jake Peavy on the inside." Andrew "is as competitive as anyone you'll ever meet. He'll fight you for a nickel whether it's in Tiddlywinks or wiffle ball."
- Says Andrew is also compassionate. Nick tells the story of a mentally handicapped kid sitting the stands a few days in a row watching Andrew's team practice at Jesuit High School in Carmichael, CA. One day, Andrew went into the stands and sat for a while and talked with kid. Then he came back and gave him a ball. Some weeks later, Nick met a local baseball legend named Doc Smith. When Smith found out Andrew was Nick's son, his face lit up. It turned out the mentally handicapped boy was Smith's son. "Your kid will walk on water forever in my book," Smith told Nick, "because the world doesn't care about my son."
- At Jesuit High School, in addition to baseball, Andrew played three years of varsity football (tight end and linebacker).
- Very hyperactive and distracted kid. One of his coaches once said, "Andrew put the A in ADD." Schoolwork could be difficult at times. "He had to work twice as hard to get the grades," Nick said. He drank Pepsi to calm his hyperactivity.
- He likes catching in part because there was so much to do and to think about.
- Uncle John devised a "Rambo" workout for Andrew to improve his "pop time," the time to catch the pitch and throw to second. He wore weights on his ankles for 50 simulated throws, then 50 times without the weights and back and forth until he had his pop time in high school was 1.76 seconds — almost unheard of for his age. Uncle John also filled an aluminum bat with sand and had Andrew and his brother Matt hit a boxer's punching bag to develop strength in forearms and wrists. Also jumped rope. Then when their father came home from work, the boys might do a complementary workout with him.
- The summer before he entered Oregon State, he watched video of the previous season's games for four hours a day. Watched each video twice — once to watch his own pitchers, once to watch opposing hitters. Took detailed notes that he kept in a binder.
- Giants' second-round pick in 2011 draft.
- Called up to Major Leagues July 26, 2014, after backup catcher Hector Sanchez suffered a concussion.
- Nickname: Suze.
- Father Nick is a contract and home builder. Mother Shawwna is a patient advocate at Mercy Hospital in Roseville, CA.
- **Andrew, and both his brothers have always worn Number 10 because when their father was a kid he met Larry Bowa, a Major League infielder who was also a Sacramento native. Bowa wore Number 10.**

- > Allowed a career-high 69 extra base hits, tied for the fourth-most among NL pitchers...beginning Aug. 1, allowed 10 home runs (in 11 starts)...that was tied for the fourth-most home runs allowed in the Majors in that span.
- > Went 0-4 with a 5.53 ERA (17er, 27.2ip) in five Sept. starts...however, the Giants gave him a total of just three runs of support.

- > Went 4-6 with a 5.73 ERA (66er, 103.2ip) in 19 starts in 2013.

- > Underwent surgery on his fractured right hand on May 21, 2013 at Stanford Hospital...the surgery was performed by Dr. Tim McAdams...had five pins inserted in the finger to stabilize the area.
- > Began a minor league rehab assignment July 23, 2013 in Arizona and after making four rehab starts (one with rookie-level Arizona, one with single-A San Jose, two at double-A Richmond), he was reinstated off the 60-day disabled list on Aug. 9, 2013 after missing a total of 69 big league games.
- > Posted a 14-9 record with a 3.37 ERA (71er, 189.2ip) and 158 strikeouts in 31 starts with the Giants in 2012.

- > Made his first start for the Giants on April 28, 2011 at Pittsburgh, the team that Vogelsong played for from 2001-06...marked his first start in the big leagues since Sept. 29, 2004 at Philadelphia...proceeded to toss 5.2 innings, allowing two runs on four hits to help SF earn a 5-2 victory...tied his career-high with eight Ks.
- > Went 2,412 days between wins as a starter...prior to Vogelsong, the last pitcher to go as long as that between wins as a starter was Brian Tallett (2,412 days, Sept. 16, 2002-April 24, 2009).
- > Took a perfect game into the 6th inning in his start on May 8, 2011 at Colorado...lost his no-hitter after giving up a clean leadoff single to Chris Iannetta, his only hit allowed through 6.1 innings of work...his 5.0 innings without

allowing a hit was his longest he had taken a no-hitter in his career.

- > Was credited with his first career Major League complete game on May 14, 2011 at Chicago-NL, tossing 6.0-shutout innings in a 6.0-inning rain-shortened game.
- > Had nine-consecutive starts of allowing two runs-or-fewer from May 8-June 22, 2011...that streak tied Jason Schmidt (2006) and Bill Swift (1992) for the second-longest in SF-era history for a single season...Juan Marichal holds record with 10-straight games of allowing two runs-or-fewer in 1966.
- > For the first time in his career was selected to the All-Star team by manager Bruce Bochy...according to Elias, the only other player to make an All-Star team in his first season after returning from a four-plus season absence was Mickey Harris of the Red Sox in 1946...Vogelsong did not appear in the Mid-Summer Classic.

- > Was named the Willie Mac Award winner prior to the game on Sept. 9, 2011 vs. Los Angeles...annual honor is bestowed upon most inspirational player on team, as voted upon by Giants players, coaches, training staff and fans.
- > In **2010**, he signed a minor league deal with Philadelphia and was released on July 16, then signed a minor league deal with the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim July 27.
- > From 2007-09 he played in the Japanese League, playing for the Orix Buffaloes in **2009** and the Hanshin Tigers from **2007-08**.

- > The Giants have won all seven of his career postseason starts.

Vogelsong's Giants Gems

- Born in Charlotte NC. Moved at 4 years old to Littlestown, PA, then to Coatesville at age 8. Coatesville is a steel town on the Brandywine River with a population 10,000 about an hour from Philadelphia. Family lived in the countryside on more than an acre of land.
- Father, Harold, has worked for the same shoe company for 49 years. Now the manager of men's products for Clark's and Bostonian shoes, he began as a shoe salesman out of high school. Ryan's mother, Vickie, is a homemaker. (They left Coatesville and moved to North Grafton, Massachusetts, when Ryan was a freshman in college.)
- Ryan has one sibling, his brother, Chad, who is four years older. He lives in Hollywood and works in marketing for JVC Mobile.
- Ryan always a jock – played whatever sport was in season. But **dreamed of playing major-league baseball from five years old.** "He never had a Plan B," his father says. Revered Cal Ripken Jr. Played shortstop and pitched always wore Ripken's # 8.
- Ryan graduated in 1995 from Octorara Area High School (1000 students) in Atglen, PA, where he played baseball, basketball and soccer.
- **Went to Kutztown University in Kutztown, PA, in rural Berks County.** Grew another inch or two his sophomore year and put on weight and blossomed as a player. Played in wooden bat league one summer, and by his junior year the pro scouts took notice.
- Vogelsong was **drafted by the Giants in the 5th round in 1998.** Made his major league debut with the Giants on September 2, 2000. (His parents treasure the CD of that game with the play by play by Jon Miller.) Traded to the Pirates on July 30, 2001, and sent to Pirates' Triple A club in Nashville. "I was a huge Cal Ripken Jr. fan. I had these dreams and aspirations of following in his footsteps and playing with one team my whole career. It was a sad day when I had to leave. I wanted to be a Giant."
- Within a week of arriving in Nashville, he met his future wife, Nicole, who grew up in Pittsburgh and moved to Nashville to pursue a singing career. "People say that the only good thing that came out of the Giants trade was me," Nicole jokes.
- After getting married, Ryan and Nicole bought a house in Downingtown, PA, just 10 minutes from his childhood home in Coatesville (even though his parents had moved years earlier to North Grafton, Massachusetts, when his father's company moved its headquarters.) Ryan's four closest friends from high school and college still live in and around Coatesville and Downingtown. (Downingtown's claim to fame: It was the setting for the 1958 movie, *The Blob*.) One childhood friend, Steve Fitch, went on to pitch in the minor leagues for the Cleveland Indians and is now a high school teacher in Coatesville. He is Ryan's workout partner in the off-season.
- **A few starts into his first season with the Pirates, Ryan required Tommy John surgery.** It kept him on the sidelines through the 2003 season. Struggled in his first full year in the majors, 2004, as a starting pitcher. In and out of the bullpen in 2005 and 2006 with lackluster numbers.
- **Moved to Japan in 2007 to play for the Hanshin Tigers.** Played there 2007, 2008 and 2009. He'd watch MLB games every day before he went to the ballpark (they were broadcast in the middle of the day).
- At the end of 2009, with Nicole pregnant with their

first child, Ryan decided to give the major leagues one last try. "I just sat down one day and kind of said to myself, 'I can make a great living for myself over here and secure my future,'" Vogelsong said. "But I didn't grow up wanting to be a professional player in Japan. I wanted to be a Major League Baseball player, and I felt like I wanted to try and make it back."

- During the 2009-2010 off-season, Vogelsong signed a minor-league contract with Philadelphia. "We were overwhelmed with joy," Nicole says. "We both grew up around there. That was his childhood team. We could live at home."
- But he struggled for Triple A Lehigh Valley and halfway through the season the Phillies cut him.
- For 6 days, no other team called. He turned 33 that week. "I was panicked two days into it," he says. "Who wants a 33-year-old right-handed pitcher who hasn't really done much over the years? The thoughts started creeping in: Is this it?"
- At the end of that week in July, the Angels signed Vogelsong to a minor league contract. He pitched well for their Salt Lake City Triple A team, but he wasn't signed for 2011.
- Ryan played winter ball in Venezuela to showcase himself. He knew it was the only way he might get a contract. It was a tough decision because he wouldn't see Nicole and their toddler from late October to December 23. And during that time, Nicole's father was dying of cancer, so she was going back and forth to Pittsburgh. Both Nicole and Ryan were very close to her father.
- Vogelsong pitched great in Venezuela, attracting attention from the Dodgers and Giants. Vogelsong wanted to be a Giant. "I'm loyal to the team that gave me my chance, that drafted me," Vogelsong told Scott Ostler. "I just love this organization. I have great memories from when I was here the first time. I knew Rags was here, and Gardy and Sabes and Bobby Evans and Tidrow. The way they treated players and the way the organization was, I just wanted to try to get back here."
- Nicole's father's battle with cancer had a profound effect on Ryan. "When he came back from Venezuela, my father was at his worst," Nicole says. "When he saw my dad, he said, 'I can't believe how strong your dad is. How can I complain about anything?'"
- The Giants signed him to a minor-league contract on December 29, 2010. Nicole's father died Jan. 21. Ryan spoke at the funeral and left for spring training the follow week.
- Ryan pitched well in spring and in Triple A in Fresno. He was promoted to San Francisco on April 17, 2011, to replace the injured Barry Zito.
- He got his first Giants win on April 28 in Pittsburgh against the Pirates, with 25 friends and family from Pennsylvania in attendance. It was his first major-league victory since September 14, 2005. "It was definitely one of the best days of my life, right up there with my first big league outing and getting married and my son being born."
- **Won the Willie Mac Award in 2011 and Giants Breakout Player of the Year by MLB.com.**
- **Vogelsong has been a part owner of Marucci Bat Company since 2004.** It's based in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. He says when baseball is over, he'll likely go to work full time for the company.

30th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

Tuesday, July 11, 1961 at Candlestick Park (San Francisco, CA)

In just its second year of existence, Candlestick Park—the majors' first all-concrete stadium—played host to the first of two Major League Baseball All-Star Games played in 1961. Long before the days of the Home Run Derby and All-Star Gala, the game itself provided plenty of excitement, with a quartet of Hall of Famers leading the National League to a come-from-behind, 5-4 victory in 10 innings. Trailing the American League 4-3 entering the bottom of the 10th frame, the senior circuit received a single from **Hank Aaron**, a run-scoring double by **Willie Mays**, a walk by **Orlando Cepeda** and the game-winning single from **Roberto**

Clemente—all off fellow Cooperstown resident **Hoyt Wilhelm**.

However, those last at-bat heroics were almost not needed, as they became necessitated by one of the more bizarre and memorable moments in All-Star Game history. With the National Leaguers clinging to a 3-2, ninth-inning lead and a runner on third, a gust of wind knocked Giants' pitcher **Stu Miller** from his set position on the mound, resulting in a balk that allowed the tying run to score.

A capacity crowd of 44,115 filled the 'Stick for a contest that featured four San Francisco Giants (**Mays**, **Cepeda**, **Miller** and **Mike McCormick**) and a combined 18 players who would later be enshrined in the Hall of Fame.

55th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

Tuesday, July 10, 1984 at Candlestick Park (San Francisco, CA)

After a 33-year absence, the Major League Baseball All-Star Game returned to the Bay Area with the 1984 Midsummer Classic at Candlestick Park. Proving well worth the wait, 57,756 fans were treated to fourteen future Hall of Famers and another who will be enshrined in Cooperstown (**Rickey Henderson**).

Pitching dominated this contest, with the National League batterymates for the fourth and fifth innings stealing the headlines in a 3-1 senior circuit victory. On the 50th anniversary of the Giants' **Carl Hubbell** striking out five consecutive batters, the duo of **Fernando Valenzuela**

and **Dwight Gooden** did "King Carl" one better. **Valenzuela** fanned all three American League hitters he faced in the fourth inning; then, the youngest player in All-Star Game history—a 19-year-old **Gooden**—whiffed all three batters in the fifth. **Gary Carter**, who caught both frames, also broke a 1-1 tie with a solo homer in the second en route to MVP honors.

Oakland's **Bill Caudill**, making his only All-Star appearance, also posted a perfect inning via strikeout, doing so in his lone frame (seventh). Fittingly, in a game that featured a combined 21 strikeouts, the tight contest ended when **Goose Gossage** fanned **Henderson** with a runner on base in the ninth.

78th Major League Baseball All-Star Game

Tuesday, July 10, 2007 at AT&T Park (San Francisco, CA)

The first All-Star Game at AT&T Park lived up to its billing, with the best of baseball turning in a thrilling contest in front of 43,965 fans. Most importantly, the game was San Francisco in all of its essence — beginning with an emotional pre-game tribute to Hall of Famer Willie Mays, the greatest Giant of them all.

True to Mays' greatness, the Midsummer Classic featured a little bit of everything — including the first inside-the-park home run in All-Star Game history, hit by Ichiro Suzuki en route to Most Valuable Player honors. In the end, the American League captured a 5-4 victory after withstanding the National League's furious two-out, ninth-inning rally.

Flexing its muscle and speed, the junior circuit jumped out to a 5-2 lead on the strength of three home runs. The most memorable — and uniquely San Francisco — was Ichiro's two-run shot in the fifth that put the AL ahead 2-1. With a runner on first and one out, the Seattle star drove the first pitch he saw deep to right field — where it hit off the asymmetrical wall and caromed towards the 421-foot sign in right-center. By the time right fielder Ken Griffey, Jr. could relay the ball to the infield, Ichiro had scampered around the bases and set All-Star



Game history.

Following Carl Crawford's solo home run in the sixth and Victor Martinez' two-run clout in the eighth, the AL gave a three-run lead to closer J.J. Putz in the ninth. After the first two National League hitters were retired, Dmitri Young singled and Alfonso Soriano hammered a two-run homer of his own to bring the senior circuit within 5-4. Three walks followed to load the bases — including two off new pitcher Francisco Rodriguez — but Rodriguez got Aaron Rowand to fly out and end the game.

Retired Uniform Numbers

In the storied 132-year history of Giants baseball, 11 former players or managers have enjoyed careers worthy of their jersey numbers being retired by the club. Only the New York Yankees (17) have retired more numbers. The 11 Giant greats are honored at AT&T Park with their names and retired uniform numbers displayed atop the Giants dugout and along the left field suite level facade.

Christy Mathewson and John McGraw, who both predated the use of numbers on jerseys, are recognized along with fellow New York Giants Bill Terry (#3), Mel Ott (#4), Carl Hubbell (#11) and Monte Irvin (#20). Willie Mays (#24), who played for the club on both coasts, joins former San Francisco stars Juan Marichal (#27), Orlando Cepeda (#30), Gaylord Perry (#36) and Willie McCovey (#44) in this select group.

The Giants also honor Jackie Robinson, whose uniform number (42) was retired throughout Major League Baseball in 1997 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of his arrival in the big leagues.

In 2004, the Giants commemorated two of baseball's greatest broadcasters with disks honoring Russ Hodges and Lon Simmons.

The Giants recognize the following individuals, who have been honored by the National Baseball Hall of Fame for their contributions to the game: Lindsey Nelson (Ford C. Frick Award, 1988), Leonard Koppett (J.G. Taylor Spink Award, 1992), Bob Stevens (J.G. Taylor Spink Award, 1998), Nick Peters (J.G. Giants Wall of Fame

On September 23, 2008, the San Francisco Giants unveiled the team's Wall of Fame, which serves as a living tribute to the organization's greatest players. It recognizes retired players whose records stand highest among their teammates on the basis of longevity and achievements. Those honored have played a minimum of nine seasons for the San Francisco Giants, or five seasons with at least one All-Star selection as a Giant.

46 Giants legends have qualified for this distinction. Bronze plaques honoring these players and their baseball contributions line the wall of AT&T Park along King Street for all baseball fans to enjoy. As present and future generations of Giants players meet the criteria, plaques celebrating their careers will join the Wall of Fame upon their retirement.

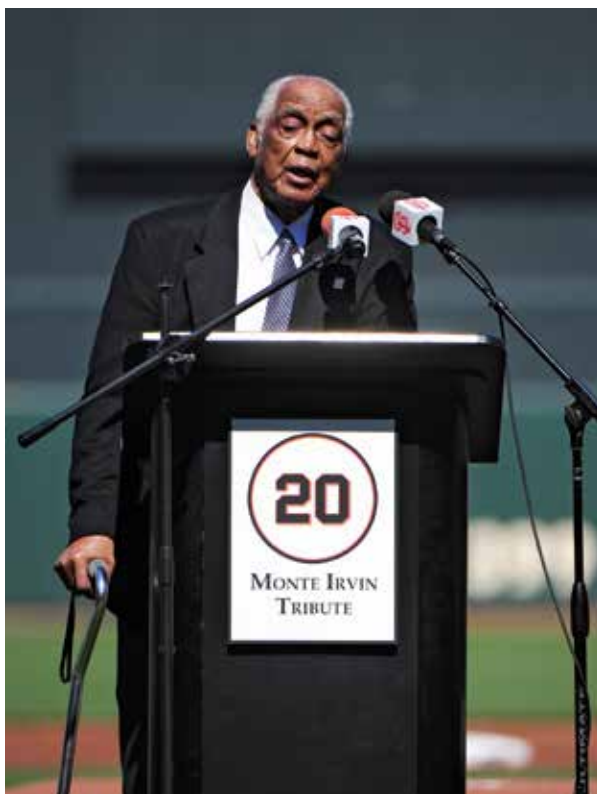

The Giants' 25 postseason appearances (since 1900) are the fifth-most all-time behind the New York Yankees (51), Brooklyn/Los Angeles Dodgers (28), St. Louis Cardinals (27) and Philadelphia/Oakland Athletics (26).

The Giants' eight championships are tied with the Boston Red Sox for the fourth-most in Major League history. Only the Yankees (27), Cardinals (11) and Athletics (9) have more.

The Giants are one of four major American professional sports franchise in this century (2000-present) with three titles during a five-year span. The others are the New England Patriots (2001, 2003, 2004), Los Angeles Lakers (2000, 2001, 2002) and San Antonio Spurs (2003, 2005, 2007).

Bumgarner threw a four-hitter while striking out 10 batters and Crawford hit a grand slam in the 4th inning off Edinson Volquez, sending the Giants from a winner-take-all wild-card game to a National League Division Series matchup with the Washington Nationals.

With the bases loaded in the 4th inning and nobody out in a scoreless game, Crawford turned on Volquez's hanging breaking ball and sent it to right field, landing a few rows deep and giving the Giants a 4-0 lead while silencing a PNC

Park crowd of 40,629. Crawford became the first shortstop to hit a grand slam in postseason history and he joined Chuck Hiller (1962 World Series), Will Clark (1989 National League Championship Series) and Buster Posey (2012 NLDS) as the only Giants to hit a grand slam in postseason play.

Bumgarner, meanwhile, dominated one of the NL's best lineups, walking one and allowing just four singles on 109 pitches, 79 for strikes. Moments after finishing his shutout, Bumgarner found himself surrounded by teammates in the middle of the diamond celebrating a playoff victory.

National League Division Series

1997 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. FLORIDA MARLINS

(Marlins win series, 3 games to 0)

San Francisco won its first National League West title since 1989 to become only the fourth team during the 20th century to win its division after finishing in last place the previous season.

The Giants outdueled the Dodgers in a classic pennant race for the N.L. West flag. Perhaps the crowning moment of San Francisco's magical ride came Sept. 18 when catcher **Brian Johnson** led off the 12th inning with a game-winning clout off Los Angeles' Mark Guthrie to put the Giants in a first place tie with nine games remaining.

New General Manager **Brian Sabean** revamped the Giants roster, bringing in 15 players who were not in the organization at the end of the 1996 campaign. He shocked the baseball world by acquiring All-Star pitchers **Wilson Alvarez** and **Roberto Hernandez** and 18-year Major League veteran

pitcher **Danny Darwin** from the Chicago White Sox in exchange for six minor leaguers at the July 31 trading deadline.

The renewed Giants made their first post season appearance in eight years when they faced National League wild card entry Florida Marlins in the Division Series. Despite losing all three games of the series, San Francisco gave Florida its toughest test en route to its first World Championship.

Both Games #1 and #2 came down to the last at-bat, with Florida taking advantage of being the home club and posting 2-1 and 7-6 victories, respectively.

Despite two solo home runs by Giants' second baseman **Jeff Kent** in Game #3, the Marlins finished off the sweep on the strength of Devon White's sixth inning grand slam off Alvarez.

2000 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. NEW YORK METS

(Mets win series, 3 games to 1)

San Francisco won its second National League West title in four years as the club posted a Major League-best 97-65 mark, only to see its October run stopped short by the Wild Card New York Mets, a club that would eventually win the NL flag.

The Giants enjoyed a truly magical regular season, its first in its new jewel of a home, AT&T Park. Finished in front of 81 straight sellouts that accounted for a franchise-record 3,244,320 fans, San Francisco rattled off a 55-26 ledger, matching the Mets for the best home mark in the majors.

Dusty Baker won his third NL Manager of the Year award after guiding his troops to a Major League-best 51-26 record after the All-Star Break, resulting in an 11-game cushion, the Giants' largest winning margin since 1913.

San Francisco produced its most prolific offensive attack in 70 years, led by National League Most Valuable Player **Jeff Kent**. Teammate **Barry Bonds**,

who finished second in the MVP voting, clubbed 49 clouts.

The Giants jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the NLDS with a 5-1 victory in front of a raucous Game #1 crowd at AT&T Park. **Livan Hernandez** held New York to one run over 7.2 innings while **Ellis Burks** clubbed a three-run, third-inning homer off the left field foul pole.

J.T. Snow's dramatic three-run, pinch homer in the bottom of the ninth tied Game #2 4-4, but the Mets would rally to win 5-4 in 10 innings and even the series at a game apiece.

Unfortunately for San Francisco, its offense went south when the club went east, as the Giants could manage only two runs in 22 innings at Shea Stadium. New York's Benny Agbayani gave the Mets a 3-2 victory in Game #3 with a 13th inning solo home run, and Bobby Jones hurled a one-hit shut-out for a 4-0 win in the Game #4 clincher.

2002 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ATLANTA BRAVES

(Giants win series, 3 games to 2)

Following a 3-0 loss at Florida on August 18th, a stagnant San Francisco club stood at 66-56, four games behind Los Angeles in the NL Wild Card chase. From then on, the Giants would play like champions, going 29-10 down the stretch to capture the league's fourth playoff spot by three and a half contests over the Dodgers.

Despite a 95-win campaign that tied for the fourth-most victories in San Francisco history, the Giants entered the NLDS as heavy underdogs to the Atlanta Braves, who captured their 11th-consecutive division crown by an astounding 19.0-game margin.

Undaunted by their opponents and buoyed by the right arm of starter **Russ Ortiz**, the Giants stormed into Turner Field and won the series opener by an 8-5 count as **Rich Aurilia**, **Benito Santiago** and **J.T. Snow** all collected two RBI apiece.

Yet, the hope of Game #1 quickly turned into despair, as Atlanta backed the stout pitching of **Kevin Millwood** and **Greg Maddux**, respectively,

with 17 combined runs in a pair of routs to take a 2-1 series lead.

Facing the prospect of a long winter, San Francisco turned to past playoff hero **Livan Hernandez** to work his magic once again in Game #4 at AT&T Park. The big right-hander responded by hurling 8.1-strong innings, while Aurilia finished 3-for-4 with a homer and four RBI as the Giants won 8-3 to force a return trip to Atlanta.

In the decisive Game #5, **Barry Bonds** exorcised his demons of post season past, singling and scoring the Giants' first run in the second and clubbing an opposite-field, solo homer in the fourth that gave SF a 2-0 lead. Ortiz became the first Giants pitcher to win two games in the same post season series since Carl Hubbell went 2-0 in the 1933 World Series, yet San Francisco's 3-1 victory was in doubt until the end. With two men on and none out in the ninth, closer **Robb Nen** struck out **Gary Sheffield** then induced **Chipper Jones** to ground into a series-ending double play.

2003 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. FLORIDA MARLINS

(Marlins win series, 3 games to 1)

For the first time since 1936-37, the Giants earned consecutive appearances in post season play, as the club won its third National League West title in seven years and became only the second team in franchise history to go wire-to-wire with an overall finish of 100-61.

A flurry of offseason moves brought new faces to San Francisco as the team introduced first year manager **Felipe Alou** and four new starters to the lineup. The revamped club breezed by their opposition, ending their campaign 15.5 games ahead of the Dodgers for the Giants' largest advantage in 91 years.

General Manager **Brian Sabean** garnered Executive of the Year accolades for constructing the team with the third best record in baseball and **Barry Bonds** earned his unprecedented 6th National League Most Valuable Player Award.

Headed into Game #1 of the NLDS rested and primed for success, pitching ace **Jason Schmidt** thrived in the intense atmosphere at AT&T Park,

tossing a complete-game three-hitter as the Giants blanked the visiting Marlins 2-0.

A sudden turn of events plagued the Giants in Game #2, as San Francisco saw their 4-1 lead quickly vanish as Gold Glovers made costly miscues and the Marlins escaped AT&T Park with a 9-5 win.

Knotted up at 1-1, both teams headed to South Florida, but the Giants' run of bad luck seemed to follow. After taking a 3-2 advantage in the 11th inning of Game #3, SF let the Marlins slip back into the contest after a dropped fly ball by **Jose Cruz, Jr.** allowed the tying run on base. With 2 out, the bases loaded and a 1-2 count on **Ivan Rodriguez**, **Tim Worrell's** next pitch was drilled into right field for a game-winning, 2-run single.

In Game #4, San Francisco's furious comeback in the 9th fell short as **J.T. Snow** was thrown out at the plate on **Jeffrey Hammonds'** 2-out single to left, giving the Marlins a 7-6 victory and ending the Giants' hopes for another playoff run.

2010 -- SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ATLANTA BRAVES

(Giants win series, 3 games to 1)

After clinching the 2010 NL West Crown in the final game of the regular season, the Giants entered the NL Division Series at home vs. the Atlanta Braves. In order to get there, Giants' General Manager **Brian Sabean** had built a pitching staff that led the Majors in ERA with a 3.36 figure, while also revamping his offense throughout the season by acquiring difference making outfielders **Pat Burrell** and **Cody Ross** as well as bringing up eventual 2010 NL Rookie of the Year **Buster Posey** from the minor leagues in late May.

San Francisco made a push for the 2010 NL West Title on August 27. Entering that day, SF was 6.0 games back of the San Diego Padres, however the Giants were red hot in the season's final month, posting an 18-8 record, which was the second best winning percentage in baseball.

The Giants would win the NLDS over the Braves 3-games-to-1 behind their stalwart pitching as all four games in the series were decided by a one-run margin, which marked the first time

in postseason history in which every game was decided by one run. The pitching staff posted a 1.66 ERA as **Tim Lincecum** was dominant in his postseason debut, tossing a two-hit, 14-strikeout shutout during the Giants' 1-0 win in Game #1.

San Francisco lost Game #2 as the Braves' Rick Ankiel hit a splash hit home run in the top of the 11th frame to help Atlanta pull ahead 5-4.

The next two games were won in dramatic fashion as SF rallied past the Braves 3-2 in Game #3, thanks in part to three fielding errors by Atlanta second baseman Brooks Conrad.

Madison Bumgarner came up aces in Game #4 as he held Atlanta to two runs in 6.0 innings in his postseason debut. However, it was **Cody Ross** who played hero in the clinching game as he homered in the sixth inning to break up Derek Lowe's no-hit bid, while also driving in the go-ahead run in the seventh inning as SF won 3-2 and clinched their first Division series since 2002.

2012 -- SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. CINCINNATI REDS

(Giants win series, 3 games to 2)

The 2012 edition of the Giants won the division title despite crushing injuries and unexpected slumps. All-Star closer **Brian Wilson** was lost for the year after a second Tommy John surgery, **Freddy Sanchez** never returned after battling back and shoulder issues, **Melky Cabrera**, acquired in the offseason, was lost in mid-August after testing positive for testosterone and two-time Cy Young award winner **Tim Lincecum** was having the worst season of his career.

Meanwhile, the Dodgers, with an influx of cash, shook the baseball world with a nine player trade with the Red Sox, centered around slugger Adrian Gonzalez going back to the West Coast.

However, All-Star catcher and 2012 MVP **Buster Posey**, along with mid-season acquisitions **Marco Scutaro** and **Hunter Pence**, ignited the Giants and after trailing the Dodgers by 7.5 games as late as May 28, they slowly chipped away and ended up winning the West by a whopping 8.0 games, their second division title in the last three seasons.

Their first round opponent in the playoffs, the Cincinnati Reds, led by Joey Votto and Brandon

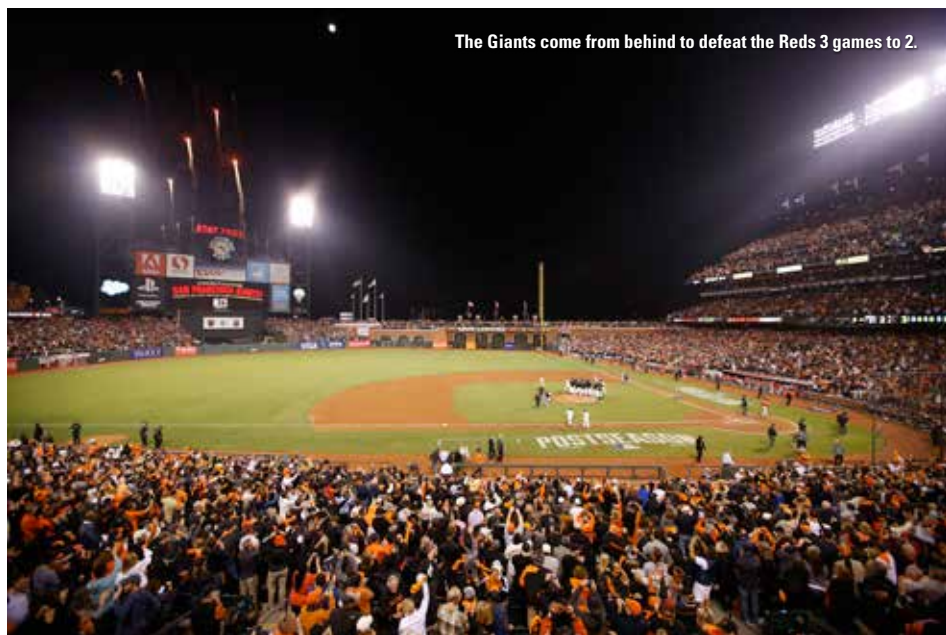
Phillips, stormed into San Francisco and took the first two games from the Giants, winning by scores of 5-2 and 9-0. Facing the daunting task of being down 2-0 in the best-of-five division series, the Giants now had to win three consecutive games on the road, something that had never been accomplished in baseball postseason history.

With all the local and national media counting the Giants out, **Hunter Pence** stood up and fired up his teammates with a football-like huddle and rallying speech in the dugout prior to Game #3, a game in which SF won 2-1, avoiding a sweep.

In Game #4, **Angel Pagan** hit the first leadoff home run in Giants postseason history, and **Gregor Blanco** and **Pablo Sandoval** connected later for an 8-3 victory that evened the series at 2-2.

Not just any comeback would get SF back to playing for a pennant. It would take one of Giant proportions and **Buster Posey** helped make it happen as he hit the third grand slam in Giants' postseason history and San Francisco pulled off an unprecedented revival, moving to the LCS with a 6-4 victory over the Reds in the deciding Game #5.

2014 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS VS. WASHINGTON NATIONALS

(Giants win series, 3 game to 1)

San Francisco defeated the heavily favored Washington Nationals, three-games-to-one in the National League Division Series.

Jake Peavy pitched no-hit ball for 4.0 innings and didn't allow a run in his 5.2-inning outing in Game #1. **Hunter Strickland** bailed Peavy out of a bases-loaded jam in the sixth by striking out Ian Desmond. Bryce Harper and Asdrubal Cabrera each hit solo homers off Strickland in the seventh as the Nationals cut a 3-0 deficit to 3-2. Sergio Romo worked out of a jam in the eighth and Santiago Casilla retired all three hitters in the ninth for the save.

What became the longest-ever postseason game in terms of time (6:23) and tied for the longest in terms of innings had seemed headed for a conclusion in the ninth in Game #2. Washington's Jordan Zimmermann had a 1-0 lead, was working on a three-hitter and had retired 20 consecutive batters before walking **Joe Panik** with two outs in the final frame. Manager Matt Williams then brought in Drew Storen to face **Buster Posey**, who hit a first-pitch single, and then **Pablo Sandoval** tied the game by slicing a double into the left-field corner to bring home Panik. The Nats' relay was just in time to cut down Posey at the plate. The game soon spun into extra innings. Yusmeiro Petit threw 6.0-shutout innings, during which he allowed one hit and struck out seven. Leading

off the 18th, **Brandon Belt** drove a Tanner Roark pitch over the right-field wall to put the Giants in front. Hunter Strickland preserved the edge in the bottom of the inning to pick up the save.

The Giants' 10-game postseason winning streak ended with an error in Game #3. **Madison Bumgarner** and Doug Fister were locked in a scoreless matchup in the seventh before the San Francisco ace inaccurately —threw to 3rd after fielding Wilson Ramos' sacrifice bunt. Two runs scored on the errant throw.

A bases-loaded walk to **Gregor Blanco** and an RBI groundout by **Joe Panik** gave the Giants a 2-0 lead in the second inning of Game #4. **Hunter Pence** made one of the Giants' top defensive plays of the postseason in the sixth when he banged into the right-field wall as he tracked down Jayson Werth's drive. However, Bryce Harper homered off **Hunter Strickland** in the following inning to tie the game at 2-2. The Giants regained the lead for good in the bottom of the inning on Aaron Barrett's wild pitch on which Panik came home. With two outs and the bases empty in the ninth, **Santiago Casilla** walked Harper before getting Wilson Ramos on a grounder to Panik at second. The Giants soon would spray Champagne and prepare to meet the Cardinals in the NLCS.

1971 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. PITTSBURGH PIRATES

(Pirates win series, 3 games to 1)

After winning its first National League West crown, San Francisco entered the National League Championship Series as the favorite against Eastern Division titlists Pittsburgh. The Giants had posted nine wins in 12 contests vs. the Pirates during the regular season.

However, the Giants ran into the hot hitting of Pirates' first baseman **Bob Robertson**, who clubbed four home runs to lead Pittsburgh to a three games-to-one series victory.

Since staff ace **Juan Marichal** pitched San Francisco to the NL West flag in its season finale at San Diego, future Hall of Famer **Gaylord Perry** got the call in Game #1. The right-hander scattered four runs (three earned) and nine hits over his complete game effort as **Willie McCovey** and **Tito Fuentes** each delivered two-run home runs

in the fourth inning to power SF to a 5-4 victory.

Then Robertson took over. He clubbed a NLCS record three home runs in Game #2 to lead the Pirates to a 9-4 triumph. The first baseman finished 4-for-4 with four runs scored and five RBI as Pittsburgh's victory ended a six-game losing streak at Candlestick Park.

Marichal pitched a four-hitter when the play-offs shifted to Three Rivers Stadium for Game #3, but home runs by Robertson and **Richie Hebner** gave the Pirates a 2-1 victory behind **Bob Johnson** and **Dave Giusti**.

The Bucs advanced to the World Series when they tattooed Perry for seven runs and 10 hits over 5.2 innings in the fourth and final game of the series.

1987 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(Cardinals win series, 4 games to 3)

The Giants became only the fourth team in Major League history since 1900 to finish first within two years of a 100-loss disaster. SF rattled off a 90-72 mark to win the 1987 National League West crown after going 62-100 in 1985.

San Francisco battled back from a five-game deficit on Aug. 7 and went 37-17 the rest of the way to capture its first NL West title in 16 years.

Jeffrey Leonard, whose "one-flap-down" home run trot was the story of the series, became the first player on a losing team to capture the NLCS MVP honor when he hit .417 with four home runs and five RBI despite the Giants falling to the Cardinals in seven games.

San Francisco split the first two games of the series in St. Louis, with Dave Dravecky—who was acquired from the San Diego Padres in a seven-

player deal on July 4—shutting out the Cardinals on two hits in Game #2.

When the series moved to Candlestick Park, the Giants took a 4-0, fifth inning advantage in Game #3 but the Cardinals roared back to post a 6-5 victory and take a 2-1 lead in the series.

Leonard responded by crushing a two-run clout in the fifth inning of the fourth game to push San Francisco to a series-evening 4-2 triumph. His four homers in four games tied the Championship Series record for a league playoff of any duration.

The Giants took a three games-to-two series advantage back to St. Louis after posting a 6-3 victory in the fifth contest. However, San Francisco didn't score a run in either of the last two games.

1989 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. CHICAGO CUBS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 1)

Will Clark carried the Giants to their first NL pennant in 27 years when San Francisco defeated the Chicago Cubs in five games.

Clark provided offensive bookends in the series, starting with six RBI in the opener and ending with a two-out, bases-loaded, series-winning two-run single in the eighth inning of Game #5. “Will the Thrill” established new NLCS standards for average (.650), hits (13), runs (eight), total bases (24) and slugging percentage (1.200).

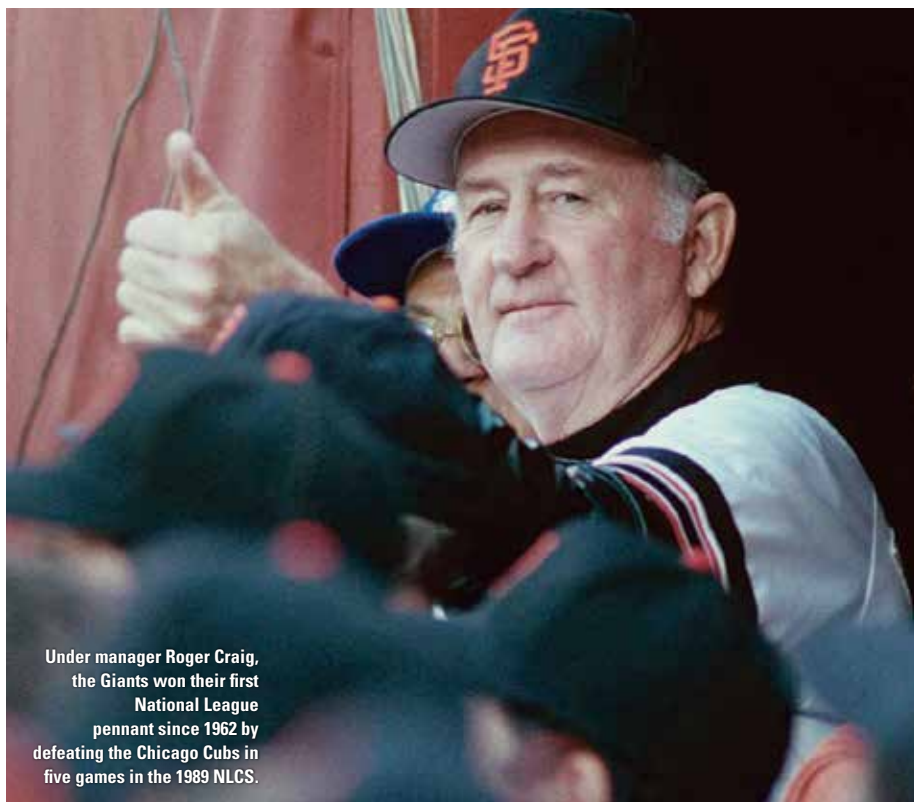
Included in those opening-game six RBI for Clark was his fourth-inning grand slam off Cubs’ starter **Greg Maddux**, which gave San Francisco an 8-3 lead. The Giants’ first baseman finished the contest 4-for-4 with four runs scored, a double and two home runs.

The Cubs claimed victory in Game #2, so the series headed to San Francisco tied a game apiece. However, **Robby Thompson** clubbed a two-run, seventh-inning homer off **Les Lancaster** to give the Giants a 5-4 victory in the third game.

In one of the most intense at-bats in Giants’ post season history in Game #4, **Matt Williams** locked up with lefty **Steve Wilson** in a 12-pitch plate appearance that resulted in a two-run blast which propelled San Francisco to a 6-4 victory.

As broadcaster Hank Greenwald said, “27 years of waiting have come to an end” when the Giants posted a 3-2 come-from-behind victory in Game #5. Clark once again delivered the game-winner, a two-run single up the spine of the infield off **Mitch “Wild Thing” Williams**.

2002 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 1)

Following a furious late-season run to capture the Wild Card berth and a stirring five-game NLDS victory over Atlanta, the Giants provided the only truly fitting encore—they won the club's first NL pennant in 13 years by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals in a scintillating and highly competitive five-contest NLCS.

San Francisco began its run to the Fall Classic by winning each of the first two contests in St. Louis. The Giants pounded Cardinals ace **Matt Morris** early and often en route to a 9-6 victory in Game #1, while **Jason Schmidt** turned in a dominating Game #2 performance. The right-hander struck out eight and carried a shutout into the eighth inning, while **Rich Aurilia's** two-homer, three-RBI effort spurred a 4-1 triumph.

Despite **Barry Bonds'** dramatic three-run, fifth-inning homer into McCovey Cove that briefly tied Game #3 at AT&T Park, a solo clout by St. Louis' **Eli Marrero** and stingy pitching by the Cardinal bullpen gave the visitors a 5-4 win and renewed hope.

St. Louis jumped out to a 2-0, first-inning lead in Game #4 and appeared on its way to evening the series until a pair of Giants veterans turned the

tide. In the sixth, **J.T. Snow** delivered a two-out, two-run double that knotted the contest. Following a two-out intentional walk to Bonds in the eighth, **Benito Santiago** cemented his series MVP honors by clubbing a full-count offering from **Rick White** into the left field bleachers for a 4-2 lead. **Robb Nen** struck out the final two hitters in the ninth to strand the tying run at third and close out a 4-3 SF victory.

Giants' lefty **Kirk Rueter** and Morris engaged in a classic October pitchers' duel in a Game #5 that was scoreless until St. Louis broke through with a run in the seventh. **Bonds** tied the contest 1-1 with an eighth-inning sacrifice fly, thus setting the stage for one of the most dramatic moments in San Francisco history.

Morris retired the first two Giants hitters in the bottom of the ninth inning, but was chased by consecutive singles from **David Bell** and **Shawon Dunston**. St. Louis turned to reliever **Steve Kline**, and **Kenny Lofton** greeted the southpaw by lining his first pitch into right-center field for a single that scored a sliding Bell as the jubilant NL champion Giants poured onto the field.

2010 -- SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA PHILLIES

(Giants win series, 4 games to 2)

The Giants again relied upon the strength of their pitching in the League Championship Series as they went on to win the best-of-seven LCS from the Phillies to clinch their 18th National League Pennant and fourth while in San Francisco.

Tim Lincecum outdueled Roy Halladay in Game #1 as **Cody Ross** hit a pair of solo home runs off of the eventual 2010 NL Cy Young award winner to help the Giants defeat the Phillies 4-3 in the opener.

Game #2 did not go as scripted for San Francisco as the Phillies' Roy Oswalt allowed just one run in 8.0 innings and Jimmy Rollins drove in four runs as the Phillies won 6-1. **Cody Ross** was the lone bright spot for Giants' offense as he connected for his third home run of the series, which tied the game at one apiece in the fifth inning.

San Francisco grabbed a 2-1 edge in Game #3 with a 3-0 shutout behind **Matt Cain**, who stymied the Phillies in 7.0 innings, allowing just two hits. The Giants scored in the fourth as once again it was **Ross** who delivered a run-scoring single, which helped cement his status as the NLCS MVP.

Juan Uribe delivered a walk-off sacrifice fly off Roy Oswalt with one out in the ninth inning as SF took Game #4 by a 6-5 count. **Buster Posey** also contributed offensively going 4-for-4 and becoming the first rookie in the San Francisco era

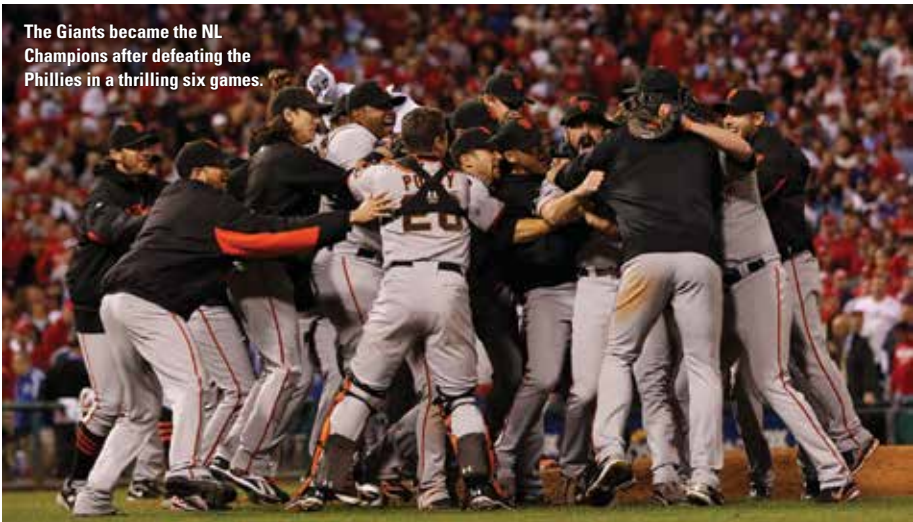
and second in club history to record four hits in a postseason game.

The Giants entered Game #5 just one win away from clinching their 18th NL Pennant and had their ace on the mound with Lincecum. However, the Phillies countered with Roy Halladay, who was pitching with an injured right groin. The injury did not deter him as the Phillies won 4-2, which sent the series back to Philadelphia.

Early during Game #6 it appeared as if the series would go to 7 games, as Giants' starter **Jonathan Sanchez** worked just 2.0 innings, allowing a pair of runs. However, the bullpen was stellar, combining for 7.0-scoreless innings to keep the Giants in the game. **Juan Uribe** hit an opposite-field home run that barely cleared the right-field wall in the eighth inning, sending the Giants' dugout into a frenzy. **Brian Wilson** was called upon after **Tim Lincecum**, pitching in relief for the first time in his career, allowed consecutive one-out singles in the eighth. Wilson got Carlos Ruiz to lineout into a double-play to escape the frame. The Giants' closer then made things interesting in the ninth, issuing walks to Jimmy Rollins and Chase Utley, before striking out Ryan Howard looking to end the game.

2012 -- SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 3)

After a historic win over the Cincinnati Reds in the Division Series, the Giants faced the St. Louis Cardinals in the League Championship Series for the third time in postseason history. It marked the first time in LCS history that the previous two World Series winners had met.

The clubs split the first two games in San Francisco, with Carlos Beltran and David Freese each hitting two-run home runs to lift the Cardinals to a 6-4 victory in Game #1. In Game #2, **Marco Scutaro** hit a two-run single in San Francisco's four run fourth inning before leaving with a hip injury and the Giants received their first home win in the postseason, with a 7-1 victory to even the LCS at one game apiece.

The series shifted to St. Louis and the Cards took advantage of the home field as Matt Carpenter hit a two-run home run after subbing for Carlos Beltran, and the Cardinals chased **Matt Cain** before a three and a half hour rain delay in the seventh inning of a 3-1 Red Bird Game #3 win.

The Giants were routed 8-3 in Game #4. Adam Wainwright threw 7.0 innings of four-hit ball and St. Louis' offense roughed up **Tim Lincecum** and the Giants' bullpen.

Facing elimination for the fourth time in the 2012 postseason, the Giants' sent **Barry Zito** to the mound in Game #5 and the soft-tossing lefty was at his best, pitching San Francisco back into

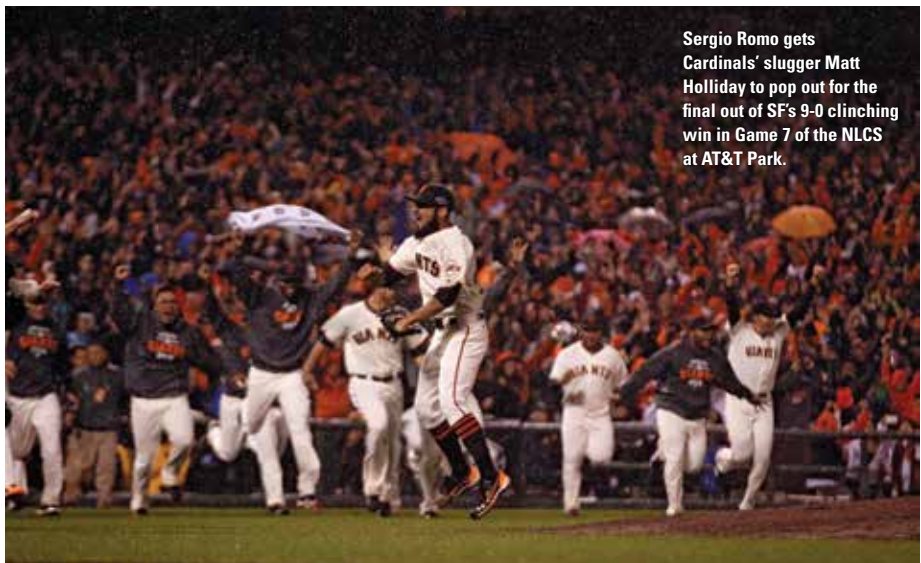
the series with a 5-0 win that narrowed SF's deficit to 3-2. Zito resembled the same guy who won the 2002 AL Cy Young Award with the A's, as he retired 11 consecutive batters in one stretch while striking out six in 7.2 innings.

Back in San Francisco for a Game #6, the Giants chased opposing starter Chris Carpenter to an early exit in their 6-1 victory that forced the series to a decisive Game #7. **Ryan Vogelsong** finished with nine strikeouts, a career-high for any game.

Hunter Pence got the Giants going with a weird double, **Matt Cain** pitched his second clincher of the postseason and the Giants closed out Game #7 of the LCS in a rainstorm, routing the Cardinals 9-0 to advance to the World Series for the 19th time in franchise history, the fifth time since moving to San Francisco and for the second time in the last three seasons.

San Francisco won its record-tying sixth elimination game of the postseason, completing a lopsided rally from a 3-1 deficit. **Marco Scutaro** recorded his sixth multi-hit game of the series and matched an LCS record with 14 hits and **Pablo Sandoval** drove in a run for his fifth straight game. After falling behind in the series 3-games-to-1, the Giants outscored the Cardinals 20-1 over the final three games behind stellar pitching performances from **Barry Zito**, **Ryan Vogelsong** and **Matt Cain**.

2014 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS VS. ST. LOUIS CARDINALS

(Giants win series, 4 game to 1)

The underdog Giants beat the Cardinals four-games-to-one in the National League Championship Series.

In Game #1, **Madison Bumgarner** (named the NLCS MVP) threw 7.2 innings, extending his road postseason scoreless streak to a major-league-record 26.2 innings. He allowed four hits, struck out seven and walked one. **Sergio Romo** and **Santiago Casilla** retired the final four St. Louis hitters in order.

Game #2 was one of the Giants' best postseason games in 2014. St. Louis led 2-0 before the Giants scored single runs in the fifth, sixth and seventh innings to go in front 3-2. Cardinals rookie Oscar Taveras hit a pinch-hit homer off **Jean Machi** in the bottom of the seventh to tie the game. In the following frame, Matt Adams homered off Hunter Strickland to make it 4-3, Cardinals. With men at first and second and two outs in the ninth, Trevor Rosenthal uncorked a wild pitch on a 3-2 delivery to **Joe Panik**. Going on the pitch, pinch-runner **Matt Duffy** motored home for a 4-4 game. The tie didn't last long though, as Kolten Wong led off the bottom of the ninth inning by hitting an 0-1 pitch from **Sergio Romo** into the right field seats, giving the Cardinals a 5-4 win.

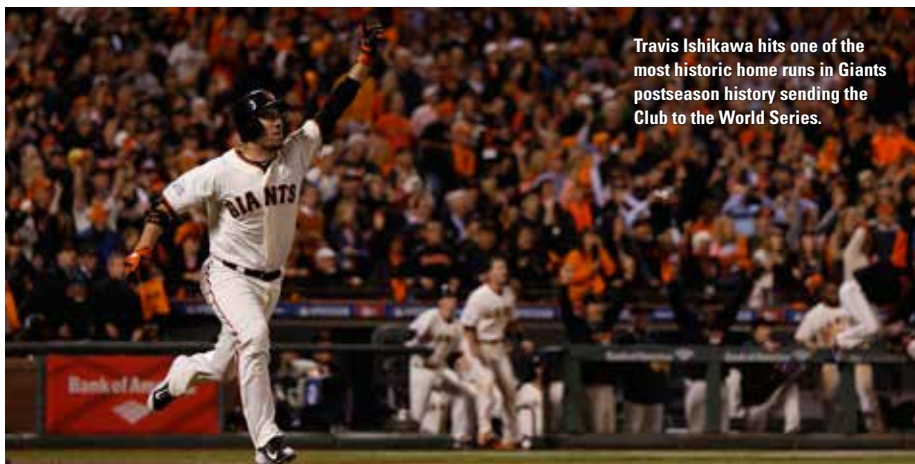
The Giants won Game #3, 5-4 in 10 innings. **Tim Hudson** had a 4-0 lead before the Cardinals would whittle the margin to 4-3 and tie the game on Hudson's final pitch. **Brandon Crawford** opened the bottom of the 10th inning by drawing a walk from lefty Randy Choate. **Juan Perez** then lined a single to left before **Gregor Blanco** followed by dropping down a bunt between the

mound and the third-base line. Choate grabbed it and made an errant throw to first base allowing Crawford to score the winning run.

After St. Louis built a 4-1 lead in the third off **Ryan Vogelsong** in Game #4, the Giants answered with two in the bottom of the inning, getting two-out RBI singles from **Buster Posey** and **Hunter Pence**. **Yusmeiro Petit** blanked the Cardinals over the next three innings to pick up the win.

Game #5 was perhaps one of the most memorable postseason games in Giants history. **Joe Panik** put SF up 2-1 in the third inning after hitting a two-run homer off Adam Wainwright. However, Matt Adams and Tony Cruz hit solo HRs off **Madison Bumgarner** in the fourth, giving the Cards a 3-2 lead. Bumgarner did not allow a baserunner after Cruz's homer, setting down the final 13 men he faced. Wainwright had retired 10 straight through the seventh, but Pat Neshek replaced him to begin the eighth. Pinch-hitter Michael Morse greeted Neshek with a drive over the wall in left to tie the game and send the AT&T Park crowd into a frenzy. The Cardinals sent Michael Wacha to the mound in the 9th. **Pablo Sandoval** opened the inning with a single, and **Joaquin Arias** pinch-ran for him. With one out, Wacha lost all contact with the strike zone, throwing four consecutive balls to **Brandon Belt** and falling behind **Travis Ishikawa** 2-0. Ishikawa proceeded to etch his name next to Bobby Thomson's for hitting a home run that propelled the Giants to the World Series.

World Series

1905 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 1)

The Fall Classic returned after a year's hiatus and Hall of Famer **Christy Mathewson** made it his showcase, leading the Giants to their first World Championship with three shutout victories.

The 25-year-old right-hander, who had 32 victories in 1905 to register his third straight 30-win season, shut down the Philadelphia Athletics in New York's five-game victory. In the space of six days, he pitched three shutouts and permitted just 14 hits overall.

Mathewson even played a part in the Giants' offense during a 3-0 Game #1 victory in Philadelphia. He ignited a two-run rally in the fifth inning to break open a scoreless contest, then went on to shut out the Athletics on four hits.

New York skipper **John McGraw**, who boycotted the 1904 World Series vs. the Boston Red Sox, didn't have to rely solely on Mathewson to

get him the title. He also had **Red Ames** and **Joe McGinnity**, who won 22 and 21 games during the regular season, respectively, in his rotation.

Those two hurlers worked in Game #2, but McGinnity was ticketed with the defeat after surrendering three unearned runs in a 3-0 defeat.

Mathewson was staked to a 2-0, 1st inning lead in Game #3 and responded by blanking Philadelphia on four hits. First baseman **Dan McGann** was the Giants' big gun in the 9-0 romp, collecting two singles and a double while driving in four runs.

McGinnity rebounded from his Game #2 defeat to shut out **Eddie Plank** and Philadelphia in a classic 1-0 pitchers' duel in Game #4.

But it was Mathewson who got to finish off the job he started when he blanked the Athletics 2-0 in the fifth and deciding game.

1911 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS

(Athletics win series, 4 games to 2)

The "running" Giants, who established a league record with 347 stolen bases, persevered through the rebuilding of the Polo Grounds and posted 99 victories to capture the National League pennant. New York had to play its home games through early June at the park of the American League's New York Highlanders (later the Yankees) after the Polo Grounds burned to the ground in April.

However, New York's offense was limited to only four stolen bases in its six-game World Series defeat to the Philadelphia Athletics.

1905 Series hero **Christy Mathewson** still anchored **John McGraw's** pitching staff, going 26-13 during the regular season. The Hall of Famer got New York off to a great start vs. Philadelphia in

Game #1 of the Fall Classic, tossing a six-hitter in the 2-1 triumph.

The Athletics rebounded to take Games #2 and #3 with **Frank "Home Run" Baker** clubbing dramatic home runs in both outings.

Then the rains came. The World Series was put on hold for six days due to Mother Nature.

When the Fall Classic resumed exactly a week after Game #3 had been played, Mathewson was outdueled by **Chief Bender** in a 4-2 decision that gave the Athletics a three-games-to-one advantage.

The Giants escaped the inevitable in Game #5 by scoring a 4-3 triumph in 10 innings before getting clobbered 13-2 in the series' sixth and final game.

1912 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. BOSTON RED SOX

(Red Sox win series, 4 games to 3 - 1 tie)

The Giants, bolstered by lefty **Rube Marquard's** modern Major League record 19-game winning streak, lived a storybook 1912 campaign. That's until the 10th inning of the final game of the World Series, when usually-reliable center fielder **Fred Snodgrass** dropped a fly ball that opened the door for a two-run Boston rally that gave the Red Sox the title.

New York, which featured two 20-game winners in Marquard (26) and **Christy Mathewson** (23), posted 103 victories during the regular season and coasted to the pennant with a ten-game cushion.

Newcomer **Jeff Tesreau**, who won 17 games for the Giants, got the nod in Game #1 but suffered a 4-3 defeat to the Red Sox.

Despite a see-saw contest that saw four lead changes, Game #2 was a wash as it was called due to darkness, thus making the 1912 World Series an eight-game affair.

The Giants evened the score in Game #3, posting a 2-1 victory behind Marquard before the Red Sox got the better of Tesreau again in the fourth contest, this time by a 3-1 count.

Trailing two-games-to-one, the Giants posted 5-2 and 11-4 wins, respectively, in Games #6 and #7.

The Series came down to the 10th inning of the eighth and final game, as the Giants and Red Sox were deadlocked at 1-1 after nine innings. New York took a 2-1 lead in the top half of the 10th before the wheels fell off in the bottom half. Boston pinch hitter **Clyde Engle** opened the frame with a routine fly ball that Snodgrass was camped under and then dropped.

Boston eventually won the game 3-2 on a sacrifice fly in the 10th and ruined New York's magical season.

1913 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. PHILADELPHIA ATHLETICS

(Athletics win series, 4 games to 1)

New York won its third straight National League flag, but couldn't get over the hump in the World Series for the third consecutive year, falling four-games-to-one to the Philadelphia Athletics.

After winning the pennant with a twelve-game cushion, the Giants were beset by injuries during the Fall Classic. First baseman **Fred Merkle** was limited to 13 at-bats due to a bad leg. Center fielder **Fred Snodgrass** played in only two games and made three trips to the plate after suffering from a severe charley horse. **Chief Meyers**, the Giants' catcher, was shelved for the Series after suffering a fractured finger in practice preceding Game #2.

The Athletics jumped out to a 1-0 series advantage after shelling **Rube Marquard** for five runs and eight hits in five innings for a 6-4 victory in the opener.

Once again, **Christy Mathewson** provided New York with a fine post season performance when he tossed a 3-0, 10-inning shutout in Game #2. He even drove in the game-winning run with his single in the 10th.

That was last highlight for the Giants as the Athletics rolled to the World Championship by posting victories in each of the last three contests.

Mathewson, pitching in what would be his final World Series, wound up with a 5-5 lifetime mark in the Fall Classic—he was 4-0 at one point—after splitting two decisions in 1913.

Skipper **John McGraw** was determined to restore his club to World Series glory. However, it would be another four years until the Giants would take the field again in the championship series.

1917 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. CHICAGO WHITE SOX

(White Sox win series, 4 games to 2)

The Giants' run of bad luck continued in their fourth straight World Series defeat as they fell to the Chicago White Sox in six games.

In the sixth and deciding game, New York was in a scoreless deadlock with Chicago heading into the fourth inning. That's when the Giants' penchant for mistakes at inopportune times reared its ugly head once again. This time, Chicago second baseman **Eddie Collins** led off the frame with a grounder to New York third baseman **Heinie Zimmerman**, who made a two-base throwing error on the play. **Joe Jackson's** ensuing fly ball was dropped by right fielder **Dave Robertson**, positioning White Sox at the corners.

Chicago center fielder **Happy Felsch** then grounded back to the pitcher, **Rube Benton**, who saw Collins break from third and threw to Zimmerman in an attempt to get Collins hung

up. Zimmerman ran Collins toward the plate, but the runner bounded past catcher **Bill Rariden** to make it a Zimmerman-Collins race to the plate. The White Sox second baseman won the footrace and distracted the Giants' defense enough to allow the baserunners to advance to second and third. Both Chicago runners would score on an ensuing base hit. That's all the White Sox would need to salt away the World Championship as they went on to win Game #6 by a 4-2 count.

Famed Olympian and footballer **Jim Thorpe** was on the 1917 Giants' club, but made only one "appearance" during the World Series in Game #5. He was slated to start in right field, but never took the field. The right-handed hitting Thorpe was removed for a left-handed pinch hitter after the White Sox lifted lefty hurler **Reb Russell** in favor of right-hander **Eddie Cicotte**.

1921 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(Giants win series, 5 games to 3)

The Giants snapped a four-World Series losing streak when they outdueled the rival Yankees in a thrilling eight-game series. With both clubs playing their home contests at the Polo Grounds, it was the first Fall Classic to be played in its entirety at one stadium.

The National League champions were headlined by third baseman **Frankie Frisch**, right fielder **Ross Youngs**, first baseman **George Kelly** and left fielder **Irish Meusel**, while **Babe Ruth** and his 59 home runs was the sparkplug for the Yankees.

The American Leaguers jumped out to a two games-to-none lead after posting consecutive 3-0 victories. The Giants battled back from a 2-0, 2nd

inning deficit in Game #3 to post a 13-5 victory. **John McGraw's** club knotted the Fall Classic at two games apiece when it logged a 4-2 triumph in the fourth game, despite Ruth's first World Series home run.

Ruth, hobbled by knee and arm ailments, spirited the Yankees to a 3-1 victory in Game #5 when he started the go-ahead rally with a bunt base hit.

However, the Bambino couldn't continue and the Giants took advantage of the situation to run off three straight victories and give the franchise its first World Championship since 1905. **Art Nehf** got the National Leaguers over the top with his four-hit, 1-0 victory in Game #8.

(Giants win series, 4 games to 0 - 1 tie)

The Giants, playing the second of four consecutive World Series, earned their berth by taking the National League pennant with a seven-game cushion.

John McGraw's club brought home its second straight title after defeating its fellow Polo Grounds tenants, the Yankees, in a four-victory sweep that actually took five games to complete due to a tie.

Third baseman **Heinie Groh**, who was acquired from Cincinnati the previous winter, led the Giants to a 3-2 triumph in the opener after logging a 3-for-3 showing. The National League entrant had been shut out by **Joe Bush** through seven innings, before it stormed back from a two-run deficit on **Irish Meusel's** two-run single and **Ross Youngs' sacrifice fly**.

Meusel got back in the act quickly in Game #2, drilling a three-run home run off **Bob Shawkey**

in the first inning. However, the Yankees battled back to tie the contest at 3-3 and it was inexplicably called because of "darkness" after the 10th inning by umpire **George Hildebrand**, despite at least a half-hour of daylight remaining.

Jack Scott, who went 8-2 in just 17 games for the Giants, tossed a four-hitter at the Yankees in Game #3 and led the National Leaguers to a 3-0 victory.

The Giants managed to post 4-3 and 5-3 victories in the fourth and fifth games, respectively, to advance to their second straight title. It also helped that the Giants' pitchers shut down **Babe Ruth** over the final three outings, holding him 0-for-9.

The 1922 World Championship would prove to be the third and final one in the illustrious career of the Giants' winningest skipper, John McGraw.

1923 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(Yankees win series, 4 games to 2)

It was an all-New York World Series for the third straight year, but there were a few changes. First, the Yankees moved into their own ballpark, Yankee Stadium. Second and most importantly, the American League entrant ended the Giants' two-year reign as World Champions.

The man who proved to be a thorn in the side of the Yankees was a Giants' outfielder who would later become synonymous with the club from the Bronx—**Casey Stengel**.

The 34-year-old outfielder christened World Series play in Yankee Stadium when he lined a ninth inning **Joe Bush** offering into left-center field that got between the outfielders for an inside-the-park home run, breaking a 4-4 draw and giving the Giants a 5-4 triumph in Game #1.

The Yankees, who had not defeated the Giants in their last nine World Series meetings (eight

defeats, one tie), finally broke through in Game #2 when **Babe Ruth** clubbed two home runs in the 4-2 victory.

When the Series returned to Yankee Stadium for Game #3, Stengel shared the stage with pitcher **Art Nehf**. The outfielder broke open a scoreless duel with a home run into the right field stands. Nehf finished off the American Leaguers after allowing five singles and a double in the 1-0 win.

That was all she wrote for the Giants as the Yankees rattled off three consecutive victories to win their first World Championship. The American Leaguers coasted to 8-4 and 8-1 victories in Games #4 and #5, respectively.

In the sixth and final contest, Ruth got the Yanks off to a great start with his first inning, upper deck blast. But the A.L. entrant would need a five-run eighth inning to post the 6-4 decider.

1924 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. WASHINGTON SENATORS

(Senators win series, 4 games to 3)

The Giants made their fourth straight appearance in the Fall Classic, but they faced someone other than the Yankees for the first time during that span when they squared off with the Washington Senators.

New York was the National League representative in the World Series for the eighth time in 14 years, but it had to scramble to win the flag by one-and-a-half games over Brooklyn.

With the World Series tied at three games apiece, horrified legacies of Merkle, Snodgrass and Zimmerman returned to longtime Giants' fans. Despite making three errors in the final contest, New York was done in twice by the infield at Washington's Griffith Stadium.

New York took a 3-1 advantage into the eighth inning of that final contest. With two outs and the bases-loaded, Senators' second baseman/manager

Bucky Harris hit a grounder that skipped over the head of 18-year-old third baseman **Freddie Lindstrom**. Two runs scored on the bad-hop single to tie the game.

The contest remained deadlocked until the bottom of the 12th inning, when Giants' catcher **Hank Gowdy** tripped over his mask and dropped a **Muddy Ruel** pop. The Washington catcher responded with a double down the third base line. One batter later with runners on first and second, center fielder **Earl McNeely** grounded to third. But once again, the ball skipped over Lindstrom's head and Ruel came around to score the winning tally.

This would prove to be the final World Series appearance for Giants manager **John McGraw**. Although he owned a 3-6 lifetime mark in the Fall Classic, only one other manager appeared in more series—Casey Stengel with 10 trips.

1933 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. WASHINGTON SENATORS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 1)

New York, in its first full season under new manager **Bill Terry**, won the National League pennant on the strong pitching of **Carl Hubbell** and **Hal Schumacher**.

The Giants entered the World Series as the underdog to the high-powered offense of the Washington Senators. However, the New Yorkers tacked up a 1.53 ERA (8er, 47.0ip) en route to their four games-to-one series victory.

Hubbell and Schumacher, who had combined for 17 shutouts during the regular season, were selected to start the first two contests vs. the Senators.

Hubbell, the second winningest pitcher in Giants history, struck out 10 and didn't allow an earned run in the 4-2 victory. Outfielder **Mel Ott** accounted for three of New York's four runs, with his two-run home run and RBI single. Schumacher followed Hubbell's lead and allowed only a solo home run in the Giants' 6-1 Game #2 victory.

The good pitching turned on the Giants in Game #3 as Washington's **Earl Whitehill** tossed a five-hit shutout to give the Senators a 4-0 triumph.

Hubbell, who led the National League with 23 wins, carried a 1-1 game into the 10th inning in Game #4 when the Giants edged ahead on third baseman **Travis Jackson's** bunt single, a sacrifice and shortstop **Blondy Ryan's** single. King Carl escaped a one-out, bases-loaded jam in the bottom half of the inning with a double play to preserve New York's 2-1 victory.

Schumacher helped himself offensively in the decisive Game #5 with his two-run single in the second inning. Then 43-year-old reliever **Dolph Luque** took over a 3-3 game and worked the final four-and-one-third innings to get the Giants in position to win. Ott took care of the offense when he drilled a solo blast into the center field stands at Griffith Stadium in the top of the 10th inning to give New York a 4-3 victory.

1936 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(Yankees win series, 4 games to 2)

The Giants locked horns with their cross-town rivals, the Yankees, in the Fall Classic for the fifth time after winning the National League flag by a five-game margin.

The Yankees, who were without **Babe Ruth** but had **Joe DiMaggio**, captured the Series in six games to start a run that saw them win 16 of the next 27 World Championships.

The National Leaguers rode the arm of Hall of Famer **Carl Hubbell** to their 11th World Series. The 33-year-old left-hander won his last 16 decisions of the regular season to finish with a 26-6 ledger that included a 2.31 ERA.

King Carl was on the mound for the Giants in Game #1 and got the National Leaguers a 6-1 victory after allowing just seven hits, including a third inning home run by **George Selkirk**. Trailing 1-0 in the fifth inning, shortstop **Dick**

Bartell launched a solo blast of his own before the Giants added another run in the sixth and four more in the eighth.

The National Leaguers' victory in Game #1 snapped a 12-game winning streak owned by the Yankees in World Series action.

The Yankees went on to win each of the next three games, outscoring the Giants by a cumulative 25-7 count.

Staving off elimination, the Giants scored a 5-4, 10-inning victory in Game #5. Manager **Bill Terry**, playing in the next-to-last game of his playing career, drove in the game-winner with a sacrifice fly.

The American Leaguers finished off the Polo Grounds tenants in Game #6 as they pounded out 17 hits en route to their series-clinching 13-5 victory.

(Yankees win series, 4 games to 1)

The two New York teams squared off once again in the Fall Classic, but the Yankees' offensive firepower proved to be too much for the Giants as the American League entrants took home the title in a five-game series.

The Giants, who boasted two 20-game winners in **Carl Hubbell** and rookie **Cliff Melton**, only had one big bat to combat the Yankee arsenal. **Mel Ott** clubbed 31 home runs and drove in 95 runs.

However, that was no match for the Yankees' lineup that had five different 100-RBI men in **Lou Gehrig**, **Joe DiMaggio**, **Tony Lazzeri**, **Bill Dickey** and **George Selkirk**.

Hubbell was once again the Giants' Game #1 starter and was coasting along with a 1-0 lead into the bottom of the sixth. Then the Yankees

produced one of their vaunted big-run innings, posting a six-run frame. The American Leaguers went on to post the 8-1 victory.

It was much of the same in Games #2 and #3 as the Yankees posted 8-1 and 5-1 triumphs, respectively.

The Giants turned the tables in Game #4 as they plated six runs in the second inning, with the big blows coming from center fielder **Hank Leiber**. He opened the frame with a single and scored before capping off the rally with a two-run single. The National Leaguers had Hubbell on the hill and he shut down the Yankees on six hits for the 7-3 victory.

The Yankees captured their second straight title with a 4-2 win in the fifth contest.

1951 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(Yankees win series, 4 games to 2)

The 1951 World Series was overshadowed by an event that took place the day before it began — “The Shot Heard ‘Round the World.”

Bobby Thomson’s three-run, ninth-inning homer off the Dodgers’ **Ralph Branca** in the National League-deciding playoff game put an exclamation on one of the greatest stretch drives in the history of baseball.

Manager **Leo Durocher’s** club trailed Brooklyn by 13-and-a-half games on Aug. 11. Then the Giants rattled off 16-straight victories and won 37 of their last 44 regular-season games to force a best-of-three playoff series with the Dodgers for the National League pennant.

The momentum seemed to carry over to the next day for the opener of the World Series as **Monte Irvin** stole home in the first inning to register the first swipe of home since the Yankees’

Bob Meusel did it in 1928. The Giants’ left fielder finished the contest 4-for-5 and spearheaded a 5-1 victory.

Irvin would once again lead the National League’s offense in Game #2, but his three hits weren’t enough to overcome the Yankees in a 3-1 defeat.

Shortstop **Eddie Stanky** inspired a five-run, fifth-inning rally in Game #3 when he kicked the ball out of **Phil Rizzuto’s** glove on a failed stolen base attempt and scrambled to third. The Giants would move on to a 6-2 triumph at the Polo Grounds.

Despite holding a two-games-to-one series lead, the Giants couldn’t finish off the Yankees as the American League’s ran off three straight victories to claim the title.

1954 — NEW YORK GIANTS vs. CLEVELAND INDIANS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 0)

Willie Mays got the National League champion Giants off to a great start in the 1954 World Series when he made perhaps the greatest defensive play in baseball history.

With New York and Cleveland tied 2-2 in the eighth inning of Game #1 at the Polo Grounds and two Indian runners on base, the Hall of Fame center fielder made an over-the-shoulder catch of a 460-foot smash off the bat of the Indians’ **Vic Wertz**.

The Giants went on to win 5-2 when pinch-hitter **Dusty Rhodes** hit a three-run, 10th-inning home run off Indians’ starter **Bob Lemon**. Ironically, the game-winning clout went only 260 feet.

The Giants would go on to sweep the Indians in four games to register their last World Championship in an upset over the highly-touted American League champs.

Rhodes, who hit .341 in part-time duty and as a pinch-hitter deluxe during the regular season, also delivered the game-winning hits in both Games #2 and #3. However, his services weren’t needed in the fourth and final contest as New York jumped out to a 7-0 advantage and coasted to the 7-4 championship-clinching victory.

New York was the surprise National League champion. After finishing fifth in 1953, the Giants were led by Mays, who won the N.L. batting title with a .345 mark that included 41 home runs and 110 RBI. The center fielder had returned to the Giants after missing the 1953 campaign due to military service.

Johnny Antonelli, another newcomer who was acquired from Milwaukee in exchange for **Bobby Thomson** in the off-season, won 21 games to help New York to the N.L. flag.

1962 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. NEW YORK YANKEES

(Yankees win series, 4 games to 3)

A matter of inches was the difference between the Giants bringing a World Championship to San Francisco for the first time or losing to the New York Yankees in the Fall Classic for the fifth time.

With the Giants trailing 1-0 with two outs and runners on second and third in the bottom of the ninth inning of Game #7, San Francisco's clean-up hitter **Willie McCovey** stepped in to face **Ralph Terry**. The Giants' Hall of Famer lined a one-ball, one-strike pitch toward right field, but Yankees' second baseman **Bobby Richardson** moved slightly to his left and threw up his glove to register the final out and the Yankees' 20th World Series crown.

San Francisco captured the National League flag by posting a late-season rally to catch Los Angeles and force a three-game playoff, which the Giants won 2-1.

The Giants carried a 2-2 tie into the seventh inning of Game #1 at Candlestick Park until **Clete**

Boyer drilled a solo home run to spur the Yankees onto a 6-2 triumph.

Jack Sanford fired a three-hit shutout to even the Series at one-game apiece in San Francisco's 2-0 Game #2 victory. In a see-saw World Series, the Yankees would log a 3-2 Game #3 win before Giants' second baseman **Chuck Hiller** drilled a grand slam in the seventh inning of the fourth game to propel San Francisco to a 7-3 victory. It was the first bases-loaded clout by a National League player in World Series history.

Despite Sanford's 10-strikeout effort in seven-and-a-third innings, the Yankees posted a 5-3 win in Game #5.

As the Series moved back to San Francisco, there was a five-day delay due to a travel day and three rainouts. Once play resumed, **Billy Pierce** pitched a three-hitter and **Orlando Cepeda** posted three hits and two RBI to force a seventh game with a 5-2 Game #6 win.

1989 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. OAKLAND ATHLETICS

(Athletics win series, 4 games to 0)

The Bay Bridge Series, which pitted the Giants against their local rival, the Oakland Athletics, will always be remembered more for the Loma Prieta earthquake than the four-game brooming by the American Leaguers.

That might be a good thing for the Giants, as they were outclassed in almost every phase of the game by the Athletics—as was evidenced by the 32-14 cumulative run total.

A's Game #1 starter **Dave Stewart** set the tone for this Fall Classic when he hurled a five-hit shutout at the Giants. He was backed by solo home runs from **Dave Parker** and **Walt Weiss** off San Francisco starter **Scott Garrelts**.

In much the same fashion, Oakland rolled to a 5-1 victory in Game #2 behind the pitching of **Mike Moore**.

Then it happened. Something that would make

this four-game Series sweep stand out in history. At 5:04 p.m. on Oct. 17, an earthquake with a 7.1-Richter scale reading rocked the Bay Area and the 60,000 fans at Candlestick Park. With reports of damage throughout the Bay Area, the ballpark was evacuated and the game was cancelled.

Finally, 10 days later, the Athletics picked up where they had left off, as they drilled five home runs on their way to a 13-7 rout in the rescheduled Game #3. The five-homer effort, two by **Dave Henderson** along with single clouts from **Jose Canseco**, **Carney Lansford** and **Tony Phillips**, tied a Series record set by the 1928 Yankees.

The A's never trailed in the series as **Rickey Henderson** opened Game #4 with a home run off Giants' starter **Don Robinson**. The Giants would close it to 8-6 in the seventh, but that was as close they would get in the 9-6 finale.

2002 — SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. ANAHEIM ANGELS

(Angels win series, 4 games to 3)

In the first World Series between two Wild Card teams, the Giants and Anaheim Angels lived up to the moniker, combining to set numerous offensive records in a memorable seven-game Fall Classic.

Anaheim emerged from the fireworks with it's first World Championship in franchise history, while San Francisco was saddled with heartbreak after seeing a title slip away just five outs from the pinnacle.

The clubs split the first two contests in Anaheim, with **Barry Bonds** grabbing the spotlight in his first appearance on the World Series stage. San Francisco's left fielder clubbed a solo homer in his first at-bat to spark a 4-3 Giants win in Game #1, then connected for a mammoth ninth-inning shot in Game #2. Not to be outdone, the Angels' **Tim Salmon** homered twice as Anaheim won an 11-10 slugfest to even the series.

When the scene shifted north, the Giants seemed to take control with a convincing 10-4 win in Game #3. As they had all season, the Giants battled back in Game #4, rallying from a 3-0 deficit to earn a 4-3 victory on **David Bell's**

two-out, RBI-single in the eighth inning.

Game #5 belonged to San Francisco, as the home club delighted the 42,713 fans at AT&T Park with a 16-4 rout. **Jeff Kent** tied Giants World Series records with four runs, two homers and four RBI, **Rich Aurilia** drove in three runs to establish a franchise playoff mark with 17 RBI overall, and **J.T. Snow** had two of his series-high 11 hits.

The Giants were eight outs from their first World Series title since 1954, as **Shawon Dunston's** two-run homer, Bonds' record eighth post season clout (fourth of Series), and Kent's RBI-single propelled SF to a 5-0 lead in Game #6. But the ultimate prize was wrested away as **Scott Spezio's** three-run, seventh-inning homer and series MVP **Troy Glaus'** two-run, eighth-inning double highlighted Anaheim's rally to a 6-5 victory.

San Francisco scored first in Game #7, but ultimately could not overcome the pitching of **John Lackey** and the bat of **Garret Anderson**, who delivered the deciding three-run, third-inning double in Anaheim's 4-1 triumph.

2010 -- SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. TEXAS RANGERS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 1)

It was a different story for the San Francisco Giants during the World Series as the club was bolstered by their offense and pitching to win their 6th World Championship and 1st since they moved from New York to San Francisco in 1958 to capture the 106th Fall Classic, 4 games to 1 over the Texas Rangers. It marked the club's 1st World Series win since 1954, ending the Majors' 3rd-longest drought without a Championship at that time, behind the Cubs (102 years) and Indians (62 years) as the top 2 teams at the time.

The Giants' bats were on fire as they battered Cliff Lee and the Rangers' bullpen with an 11-7 victory in the opening game of the 2010 World Series. What was originally penned as a pitchers' duel between Lee and **Tim Lincecum** turned out to be an offensive outburst by both teams. **Freddy Sanchez** finished with 4 of the Giants' 14 hits as **Aubrey Huff** went 3-for-4 with an RBI and Juan Uribe capped a 6-run fifth inning with a 3-run home run, which set off the fog horn and blasts from water cannons out in right field. San Francisco took a commanding two game lead after **Matt Cain** held the Rangers' bats at bay in a 9-0 shutout in Game #2. Cain tossed 7.2-scoreless frames to extend his postseason scoreless innings total to 21.1 frames, while **Edgar Renteria** led the offense as he homered and drove in three runs.

The only mishap for the Giants was during Game #3 as they fell to the Rangers 2-4 at Texas. However, the team resorted back to their pitching heavy strategy in Game #4 as rookie **Madison Bumgarner** took to the mound and fired off 8.0-shutout innings as the Giants shut out the Rangers 4-0 on Halloween night. **Aubrey Huff** (2-run home run) and Buster Posey (solo home run) supplied the club with enough offense as the team was one game away from winning their 1st Championship in over 54 years.

Tim Lincecum and World Series MVP **Edgar Renteria** helped deliver the title in Game #5 as Lincecum outdueled Cliff Lee in a game that was scoreless until Renteria hit a 3-run home run with 2 outs in the seventh inning. Lincecum defeated Lee for the 2nd time in a week, allowing just 3 hits over 8.0 innings while recording 10 strikeouts. The game was scoreless until **Cody Ross** and **Juan Uribe** both singled to open the seventh inning before **Aubrey Huff** layed down the 1st sacrifice bunt of his career to move the runners. Renteria stepped to the plate and sent a 2-0 pitch over the left-center field wall silencing a sold out crowd of 52,045. **Brian Wilson** was summoned for the ninth and retired Josh Hamilton on a called 3rd strike, getting Vladimir Guerrero on a grounder to shortstop and then struck out Nelson Cruz to cap the best season in San Francisco Giants history.

2012 -- SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS vs. DETROIT TIGERS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 0)

Playing in the World Series for the 19th time in franchise history and the fifth time since moving to San Francisco in 1958, the Giants were set to face the Detroit Tigers, the first time these two storied franchises had ever met in a postseason series.

Pablo Sandoval and **Barry Zito** both shined for the Giants in Game #1 as Sandoval hit three home runs, and joined Reggie Jackson, Babe Ruth and Albert Pujols as the only players to accomplish that in the Fall Classic, and Zito outdueled Justin Verlander, the reigning Cy Young winner, as the Giants won 8-3. Sandoval homered in his first three at-bats, hitting a solo shot in the first inning, a two-run blast in the third that set off the fog horns and capped it with yet another solo shot to center that sent the festive AT&T Park crowd into a frenzy.

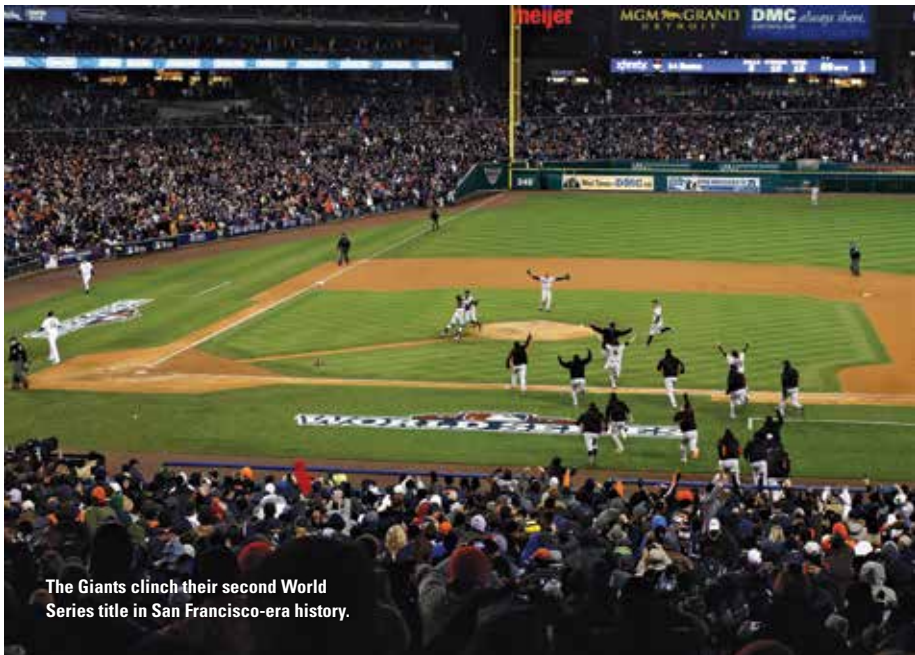
In Game #2, **Madison Bumgarner** tossed 7.0-scoreless innings, then the Giants took advantage of a bunt that stayed fair to scratch out the go-ahead run in a 2-0 win for a 2-0 advantage in

the Series.

The Giants took a commanding 3-0 lead in the Fall Classic with a 2-0 win on a chilly night in Detroit in Game #3. SF won their franchise-record sixth straight postseason game as **Ryan Vogelsong** blanked the Tigers for 5.2 innings and **Gregor Blanco** hit an RBI triple and **Brandon Crawford** drove him home with a single in the second inning. The Giants became the eighth team to post consecutive World Series shutouts and the first to accomplish the feat since the 1966 Baltimore Orioles.

Nearly knocked out in the playoffs time and time again, the Giants completed a four game sweep of the Tigers to win their second title in three seasons. **Marco Scutaro's** go-ahead single with two outs in the 10th inning lifted the Giants to a 4-3, 10-inning victory. **Sergio Romo** got Triple Crown winner Miguel Cabrera to look at strike three for the final out and the Giants finished the month of October with seven straight wins and their seventh World Series championship.

2014 – SAN FRANCISCO GIANTS VS. KANSAS CITY ROYALS

(Giants win series, 4 games to 3)

Backed by the eventual World Series MVP **Madison Bumgarner**, the Giants beat the Kansas City Royals in 7 games to capture their third championship in five years.

Kansas City hadn't lost in this postseason before the Series, but the Giants ended that streak at eight games with a 7-1 win in Game #1. SF scored three times in the first inning off James Shields; **Pablo Sandoval** hit an RBI double and **Hunter Pence** crushed a two-run homer to right-center. Madison Bumgarner carried a shutout into the seventh before Salvador Perez homered, ending Bumgarner's World Series scoreless-innings streak at 21 and his road postseason scoreless-innings streak at 32.2. His three-hit, seven-inning performance gave the Giants the jump in the Series.

Gregor Blanco opened Game #2 by jumping on a 3-2 pitch from Jordano Ventura and jolting it over the wall in right. That lead was short-lived as the Royals scored single runs in the first and second innings off **Jake Peavy**. The game was 2-2 in the sixth when the Royals put a five-spot on the board and finished it off with a 7-2 win.

Tim Hudson, made his first World Series appearance in Game #3 and retired 12 in a row in one stretch — but took the loss. The Royals scratched out a run in the first and added two in the sixth, the final run scoring on Eric Hosmer's single off **Javier Lopez**. **Michael Morse's** pinch-hit RBI double keyed the Giants' two-run sixth, but that would be the extent of SF's offense. Kansas City relievers Kelvin Herrera, Brandon Finnegan, Wade Davis and Greg Holland combined for four hitless innings.

Ineffective pitching by **Ryan Vogelsong** and bad defense by the Giants allowed the Royals to

score four two-out runs in the third to grab a 4-1 edge in Game #4. However, another three shutout innings from **Yusmeiro Petit**, enabled the Giants to mount their comeback. The Giants scored one in the third and two in the fifth to tie the game. Joe Panik's two-run double highlighted a four-run seventh, and helped the Giants secure an 11-4 win.

The Giants' final home game of the postseason was highlighted by **Madison Bumgarner**, who threw another four-hit shutout to become the Giants' first pitcher since 1962 to throw a complete game (Billy Pierce) and shutout (Jack Sanford) in the World Series.

In Game #6, the Royals scored seven runs in the second inning to put the game away early. Jordano Ventura held the Giants to three hits in seven innings, setting up Game 7.

Pablo Sandoval went 3-for-3 and scored twice, **Michael Morse** drove in two runs and **Jeremy Affeldt** earned the win with 2.1 innings of shutout relief. However, it was **Madison Bumgarner** who stole the show for the Giants and helped the team win its eighth championship. On just two days' rest, he entered the game in the fifth inning. After allowing a single to Omar Infante, the first batter he faced, Bumgarner retired the next 14 hitters. With two outs in the ninth, Alex Gordon lifted a single into left-center that **Gregor Blanco** misplayed. Gordon wound up at third, 90 feet from tying the game. On a 2-2 pitch, Bumgarner got Salvador Perez on a foul pop clutched by **Pablo Sandoval**, who then collapsed in joy. Bumgarner, who had been the NLCS MVP, was the only choice for Series MVP. He went 2-0 with a save and gave up all of one run and nine hits in 21 innings.

The financing plan included \$172 million from naming rights, other sponsorships, pouring rights, concession rights and the selling of charter seats; a \$170 million bank loan; and \$15 million in tax increment financing from the City's Redevelopment Agency.

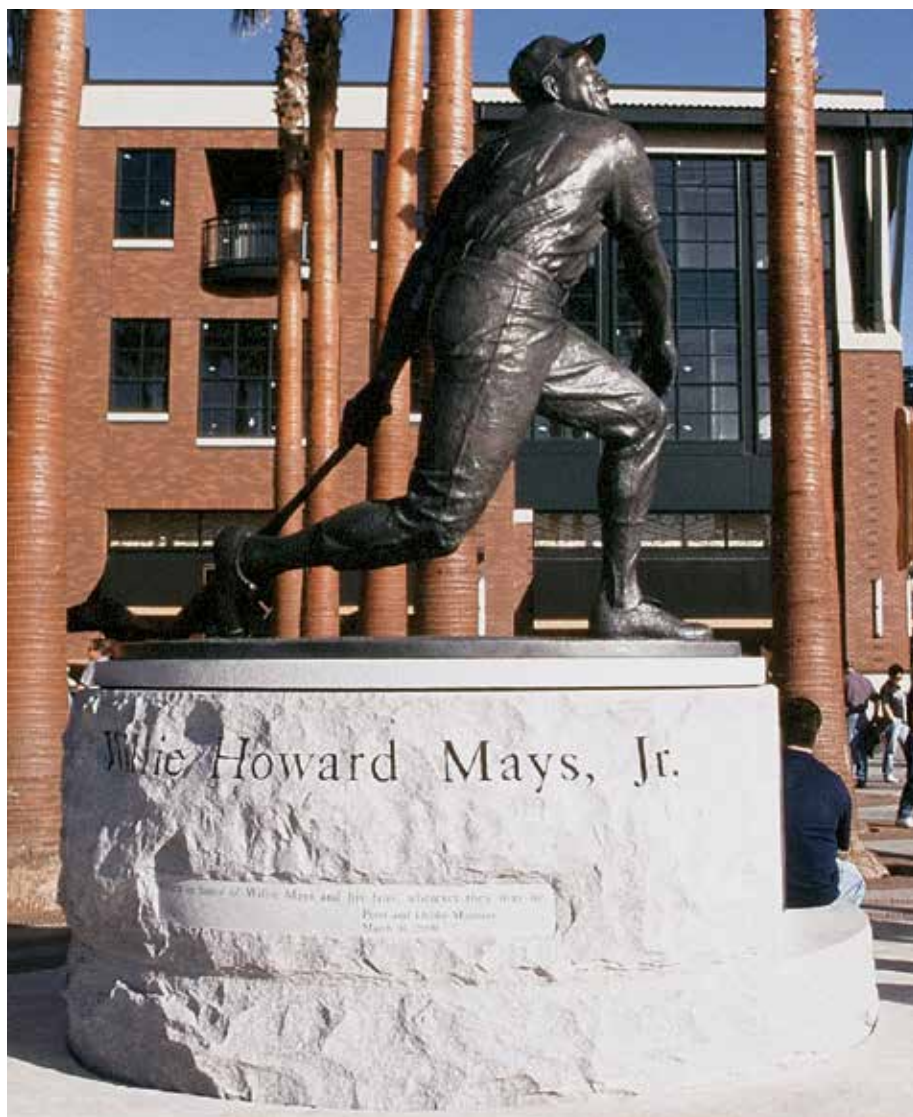
Green Glove: In 2014, the Giants were recognized by Major League Baseball for having the highest recycling rate among the other 29 Clubs and were awarded the MLB Green Glove Award.

Giants Statue Dedications

Since the opening of AT&T Park in the 2000 season, the San Francisco Giants have dedicated four statues of their greatest players donning a Giants uniform. Sculptures of Hall of Famers Willie Mays, Willie McCovey, Juan Marichal and Orlando Cepeda have been created by well-known American sculptor William Behrends and have been placed outside of AT&T Park for everyone to enjoy.

Behrends' portrait sculptures have been widely praised for their likeness, quality of detail and sensitive evocation of character. Unlike many other sculptors, Mr. Behrends was personally involved in every phase of the creation of the four bronze sculptures, including research, molding and bronzing.

Behrends divides his time between home and studio in Tyron, North Carolina, bronze foundries in Colorado and New York and a marble studio in Pietrasanta, Italy. He studied architecture at North Carolina State University and fine arts and sculpture at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, including anatomy training at the medical school. He has subsequently studied and worked in Italy, principally with Swietlan Kraczyna and Enzo Pasquini. He is the twice recipient of the Richard Portrait Prize by the National Sculpture Society and is a fellow board member of the National Sculpture Society.

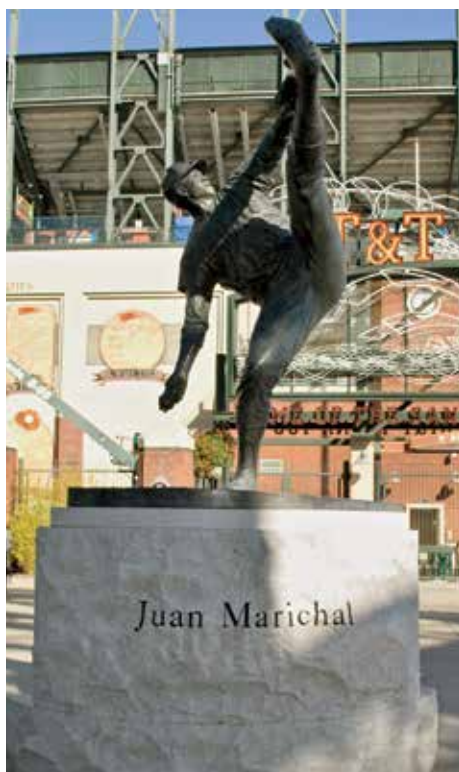


March 31, 2000 – The Giants unveiled a nine-foot bronze sculpture of Hall of Fame outfielder **Willie Mays**, located at the corner of Third and King Streets. The statue depicts Mays in the graceful conclusion of his powerful swing. The sculpture was developed over a 12-month period.

May 4, 2003 – A nine-foot tall bronze statue of Giants Hall of Fame first baseman **Willie McCovey** was unveiled. The statue is prominently featured at the northeast portion of AT&T Park, which was officially designated as McCovey Point by the San Francisco Port Commission. The statue of Willie McCovey pays tribute to a man who exemplifies the spirit and leadership shown by many of those who have worn the Giants uniform.

May 21, 2005 – Former Giants great and Hall of Fame pitcher **Juan Marichal** had his statue dedicated in 2005. The nine-foot bronze statue is located at AT&T Park's Lefty O'Doul Plaza and features Marichal's famous high-leg kick.

AT&T Park Attendance Highlights

- The Giants enter the 2014 campaign with a sellout streak of 327 regular season dates, plus 23 dates in the post-season, for a total of 350. The Giants sellout streak is the longest consecutive regular season home sellout streak in the National League history and is currently the longest active one in the Majors. The old National League sellout streak record was 257 regular season games, plus 16 in the postseason, for a total of 273, by Philadelphia from 2009 to August, 2012. The Boston Red Sox hold the Major League record of 820-straight sellouts (794 regular season, 26 post-season) from 2003 through Opening Day 2013.
- 774 of the 1,215 (63.7%) regular season dates at AT&T Park have been sellouts.
- 1,198 of the 1,215 (98.6%) dates have attracted at least 30,000 fans.
- In 15 years at AT&T Park, the Giants have averaged 39,585 per date, which is 94.4% of capacity.
- Of all teams that have moved into a new ballpark in the last 40 years, the Giants are the only team whose attendance has been higher every single year in their current park, than it ever was in their former park.
- Largest regular season crowd at AT&T Park was 43,503 vs. the Yankees on June 24, 2007. The biggest post-season crowd was 44,046 on October 8, 2010 for a National League Division Series game against Atlanta.
- The smallest crowd was 23,934 on May 11, 2009 vs. Washington. The only games that drew less than 30,000 at AT&T Park were in 2009 (12 dates) and in 2010 (5 dates).
- Highest season attendance at AT&T Park is 3,387,303 (41,819 per date) in 2011.
- Highest season attendance at AT&T Park is 3,387,303 (41,819 per date) in 2011.
- Lowest AT&T Park attendance is 2,862,111 (35,335 per date) in 2009. That AT&T Park low is 255,757 higher than the best season attendance at Candlestick Park, which was 2,606,354 in 1993.
- Attendance has topped 3 million in 13 of the 15 years at AT&T Park, including eight straight years from 2000 through 2007. The only teams with an equal or longer streak of 3 million seasons are the Dodgers (1996-2010), Yankees (2000-2014), Angels (2003-2014), Cardinals (2004-2014), Rockies (1993-2001) and Cubs (2004-2011).
- The Giants have topped 3 million in 13 seasons. The only teams to draw 3 million more often than the Giants are the Dodgers (28 times), the Cardinals (18), and the Yankees (16).
- In their first year at AT&T Park, the Giants drew 3,244,167 (40,051 per date – all sellouts). This was up 1,165,768 (56.1%) from what they drew at Candlestick Park in 1999. The increase in total attendance was the fifth best gain in Major League history.
- In 15 years (2000-2014) at AT&T Park, the Giants have drawn 48,096,276, an average of 3,206,418 per season, and 39,585 per date. In that same period, only the Yankees (55,379,921), Dodgers (51,845,177), and Cardinals (49,262,248) have outdrawn the Giants.
- In 40 years at Candlestick, the Giants drew 54,134,580, an average of 1,353,365 per season, and 17,961 per date.
- The Giants have outdrawn the A's in 30 of the 47 years these teams have shared the Bay Area, including every year starting in 1993.

Gary Davenport - Roving Infield Instructor

Tom Trebelhorn- Minor League Coach

Returns for his seventh year with Giants organization in 2015 his second year in his current role...spent the 2013 season as a coach for the ARL Giants...guided the Volcanoes to their fifth championship in 2009 with a league-best 49-27 record...prior to that he was with the Orioles organization for 12 years (1996-2007), including seven seasons as a coach with the big league team...served as a bench coach in 2007, and a 3rd base coach his previous six campaigns...from 1996-2000, he worked in various roles in the front office, including Director of Organizational Instruction, Director of Minor League Instruction and Director of Player Development...prior to joining Orioles, he spent 14 years as a manager, four years as a coach and five years as a minor league player...managed the Brewers from 1986-91 (422-397) and Cubs in 1994 (49-64)...is second to Phil Garner on Brewers' all-time managerial lists in games (819) and wins...in 1987, he was named Manager of the Year by Baseball America and Sports Illustrated...served as coach for American League All-Star team in 1988...managed the Cubs in 1994 after spending two seasons as the club's bench coach and offensive coordinator...served as the Brewers' 1st base coach in 1984 and 3rd base coach in 1986, managing Milwaukee's triple-A Vancouver farm team to Pacific Coast League title in 1985...began his managerial career in Oakland organization, with two years at the rookie-level Boise and year at single-A Modesto, before moving to Cleveland organization...served as a coach at double-A Portland in 1978 before managing class-A Batavia in 1979...was affiliated with Pittsburgh's triple-A clubs for four years, serving as coach at Portland in 1980-81, was manager there in 1982 and manager at Hawaii in 1983...played five years of pro baseball as a catcher and infielder...began in 1970 with class-A Bend after being drafted by triple-A Hawaii...taught school in the off-season in Portland for many years...resides in Scottsdale, AZ

Jon Miller

Jon Miller, honored by the National Baseball Hall of Fame as the 2010 Ford C. Frick award winner for baseball broadcasting excellence, the “Voice of the Giants”, enters his 19th season in the broadcast booth on KNBR Radio and NBC Bay Area. Miller was thrilled to broadcast his 16th World Series in 2014 as the Giants won it all for the third time in five years. Miller was named as one of seven inductees into the National Radio Hall of Fame in 2014 in recognition of Miller’s contribution to the development of the radio medium throughout its history in the United States. The year 2014 also marked the 40th anniversary of Miller’s first Major League baseball broadcast. An award-winning broadcast veteran of more than 40 years, Miller worked 21 seasons as the play-by-play commentator on the ESPN Sunday Night Baseball game of the week. Miller, noted for his eloquent game description, golden voice and marvelous sense of humor, spent 14 years with the Baltimore Orioles before coming to San Francisco. Prior to joining Baltimore in 1983, the talented broadcaster spent two seasons with the Texas Rangers (1978-79) and three seasons with the Boston Red Sox (1980-82). After a four-year stint at NBC-TV from 1986-89, where he announced an occasional NBC Game of the Week with either Tony Kubek or Joe Garagiola, Miller matriculated to ESPN. During his tenure at ESPN, he was nominated twice for a national Emmy Award in 1995 and 1996, and broadcast 13 consecutive World Series on ESPN Radio. He was also nominated six times for an “ACE” award, emblematic of cable television excellence, and won the award in 1991 and 1996 for his play-by-play work. Miller was named National Sportscaster of the Year by the Association Sportscasters Association in 1998 and was inducted into the Hall of Fame of the National Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association of America the same year. In 2013, Miller received a Northern California Area Emmy Award in the category of Sporting Event/Game-Live. The Bay Area native has also broadcast hockey, basketball and soccer in his distinguished career. Jon and his wife, Janine, currently reside in Moss Beach. They are parents to three daughters, Michelle, Holly and Emilie, and a son, Alexander.



Duane Kuiper

Duane Kuiper, a nine-time Emmy award-winning broadcaster, begins his 31st season as a Major League announcer. He embarks on his 22nd consecutive year in the Comcast SportsNet Bay Area, NBC Bay Area and KNBR Radio broadcast booths in 2015. Kuiper was one of 10 finalists for the 2014 Ford C. Frick award for baseball broadcasting excellence. Kuiper emerged as one of the top three fan selections in online voting. The former 11-year big league infielder has received nine local Emmy awards for his distinguished broadcasting career: On-Camera talent (5); Sports Live Broadcast (2); and Sporting Event/Game-Live (2). He provided commentary for the Giants from 1987-92 and served a one-year stint with the expansion Colorado Rockies in 1993. The former infielder spent the last four years of his career with the Giants, following seven campaigns with the Cleveland Indians. In 2004 he was voted by Cleveland fans as one of the 100 greatest players in Tribe history. After retiring in 1985, Kuiper provided commentary on Giants radio and TV broadcasts through the end of that season, and had his own radio show on KNBR from 1982-85. Kuiper’s scorecards from Barry Bonds’ historic 756th home run game, Randy Johnson’s 300th career victory and Matt Cain’s perfect game in 2012 are displayed at the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. The Wisconsin native serves as a board member of the Giants Community Fund. A graduate of Southern Illinois University in Carbondale, IL, Kuiper and his wife, Michelle, reside in Danville. They are parents to two children, Cole and Dannon.

KNBR-680 AM, the 50,000-watt Sports Leader, begins its 37th campaign with the orange and black. Giants fans can tune into 162 games during the baseball season.





Mike Krukow

Mike Krukow enters his 25th season in the television booth, and his 21st full season on the radio side. An eight-time Emmy award winner, Krukow is the broadcast team's color analyst on Comcast SportsNet Bay Area and NBC Bay Area telecasts, and on KNBR Radio broadcasts. The former big league pitcher has received eight local Emmy awards: On-Camera talent (5); Sports Live Broadcast (2); and Sporting Event/Game-Live (1). Krukow's playing career in the Major Leagues spanned 14 years and three teams: the Chicago Cubs (1976-81), Philadelphia Phillies (1982) and San Francisco Giants (1983-89), where his enthusiasm both on and off the field made him a fan favorite. "Kruk", named as the starting right-handed pitcher to the 1980's Giants All-Decade Team in a vote by Bay Area media in 1999, is noted for his deep knowledge of the game and tremendous sense of humor. A 20-game winner for the Giants in 1986, Krukow retired after the 1989 season with a 124-117 career record and a 3.90 ERA. In 2008, Kruk was honored as a member of the inaugural class of Giants alumni with a plaque in the Giants Wall of Fame which lines the wall outside of AT&T Park. Krukow's scorecard from Tim Lincecum's no hitter in 2014 is displayed at the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown. Krukow resides in Reno, NV with his wife, Jennifer. The couple has five children, Jarek, Baker, Tessa, Chase and Weston, one grandson, Coen, and one granddaughter, Reagan.



Dave Flemming

Dave Flemming begins his 12th year of broadcasting for the Giants. The 38-year-old will join Jon Miller and Duane Kuiper on the team's KNBR radio broadcasts and is involved in select games on television. In addition to his work with the Giants, he serves as a lead play-by-play voice for ESPN television, working college football and basketball, as well as MLB playoffs and NBA games for ESPN Radio. Flemming has previously called Major League Baseball on FOX, and for six years was the play-by-play voice of Stanford football and basketball. In 2008, *Sports Business Journal* named Flemming "the best of the new generation of baseball announcers". In 2013 Flemming won a Northern California Area Emmy Award in the category of Sporting Event/Game-Live. Flemming's prior baseball experience includes three seasons as the play-by-play announcer for the Pawtucket Red Sox, Boston's triple-A affiliate. Before moving to Pawtucket, Flemming broadcast play-by-play for the Visalia Oaks in 2000, and served a dual role as the team's assistant general manager. The Alexandria, VA native received a Bachelor's and Master's degrees from Stanford, and a Master's degree in Broadcast Journalism from Syracuse University. Flemming and his wife, Jessica, reside in San Francisco with their twin daughters, Katie and Carter, and son, David Henry.

Comcast SportsNet Bay Area

Comcast SportsNet Bay Area, part of NBC Sports Regional Networks, has been the club's cable television rights holder since 1990. G-Mag

G-Mag, a 30-minute monthly magazine show, provides Giants fans an inside look at the Orange and Black with exclusive interviews with players, coaches and members of the front office personnel. The show also presents feature stories, insider reports, and the best game highlights of the month.

SportsNet Central

SportsNet Central, a live 30-minute local sports news show, provides Northern California sports fans with nightly in-depth, comprehensive news coverage on the hometown teams, breaking local and national news, up-to-the-minute scores, the best local video highlights and daily insider reports on the Bay Area's teams.

Yahoo SportsTalk Live

Yahoo SportsTalk Live, an hour-long roundtable discussion show, features opinionated commentary, in-depth analysis and lively debate on the day's trending sports and entertainment stories in the Bay Area.



Greg Papa, *Giants Pre and Postgame Live* host, is a 28-year veteran of Bay Area sports broadcasting and three-time California Sportscaster of the Year. Papa is the current radio play-by-play announcer for the Oakland Raiders, and has been the play-by-play voice for the San Francisco Giants, Oakland A's and Golden State Warriors. A graduate of Syracuse University, Papa was also a member of the Indiana Pacers' television and radio broadcasting team (1984-86), and the lead announcer on the San Antonio Spurs telecasts (1997-2000).



Amy Gutierrez, a Bay Area native, is entering her 20th year in the broadcasting industry and is embarking upon her eighth season as the CSN Bay Area in-game reporter. She also serves as a contributing reporter for *Giants Pregame Live*, *Giants Postgame Live* and *SportsNet Central*. In 2013, Gutierrez was the recipient of two Northern California Area Emmy Awards: On-Camera Talent-Sports and Sporting Event/Game-Live. A graduate of UC Davis, Gutierrez has covered multiple teams and sports in the San Francisco Bay Area, including the Oakland A's, San Jose Sharks, Oakland Raiders, San Francisco 49ers, and the Pac-12 and West Coast Conference football and basketball.



Jim Kozimor Jim Kozimor, host of *Yahoo SportsTalk Live*, is a veteran sports broadcaster with more than 20 years of experience. Kozimor was the play-by-play announcer for NBC Sports' coverage of badminton and shooting sports during the 2008 Beijing Summer Olympics and 2012 London Summer Olympics. The Chicago native was a long-time television/radio broadcaster for the Sacramento Kings and Sacramento Monarchs. Prior to his tenure in Sacramento, he was a broadcaster with the Houston Rockets, Houston Comets, Philadelphia 76ers, and a sideline reporter and fill-in play-by-play announcer with the Golden State Warriors.

Erwin Higueros, a 27-year veteran of Bay Area sports broadcasting, begins his 17th full season, his 18th overall in the Giants' Spanish language radio booth. In addition to his broadcast responsibilities, Higueros is a member of the Giants front office, working in both the media relations and Hispanic marketing departments. A multi-talented announcer, Higueros hosts G-Cast En Español in season which features exclusive interviews with Giants uniformed personnel in Spanish; he also hosts a 30-minute radio show on ESPN Deportes every Friday during the baseball season; and four 30-minute television shows on Telemundo. Higueros began his broadcasting career with the Oakland A's (1988-97), and was the play-by-play announcer for games that were televised on Telemundo-Channel 48 from 1995-97. A versatile broadcaster, Higueros was the Spanish play-by-play voice for a number of Bay Area professional sports teams including the San Francisco 49ers in 2000 and 2012-2013 seasons, the San Jose Sharks in 1995, and the Oakland Raiders in 1995-96 and 2002-06. He has handled the radio play-by-play duties on Spanish radio for the Fresno State Bulldogs football team the past six seasons (2009-14). Higueros broadcast the League Division Series for FOX Sports International in 2004-06. In 2013, Higueros was the recipient of the Community Service Award from the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum. Born in Guatemala, he moved to the United States when he was 12 years old. A graduate of Fremont High School in Oakland, he attended Cal State Hayward and the Columbia School of Broadcasting. Higueros resides in Tracy with his wife, Maria. The couple has two grown children, Claudia and Erwin, Jr., and two grandchildren, Alison and Erwin, III.



Tito Fuentes

Tito Fuentes returns to the Giants' Spanish language broadcast booth for his 12th straight season. Fuentes previously served as a member of the Spanish language broadcast team from 1981-92, and in 1996-2004 he broadcast for FOX Sports International which is aired in Latin America. An active participant in the Giants' marketing efforts, he is a regular participant in the Giants Fantasy Camps. A former Major League second baseman who played for the Giants from 1965-74, Fuentes saw big league action with San Diego, Detroit and Oakland. The Havana, Cuba native was initially signed as an 18-year-old amateur before the start of the 1962 season and was the last baseball player signed directly out of Cuba before the United States embargo against Cuba. A .268 hitter over his 13-year career, he was voted the starting second baseman on the Dream Team for the Giants 25th Anniversary team by San Francisco fans in 1982. In 1997, "23" was inducted into the Cuban Baseball Hall of Fame. He and his wife, Maritza, reside in Reno, Nevada.

2014 Community Relations Highlights

The San Francisco Giants are dedicated to enriching **OUR COMMUNITY** through innovation and excellence on and off the field.

In a collaborative effort, the Giants Community Fund, the club's 501(c)(3) non-profit, and the team's Community Relations Department, work to identify, develop, support and raise awareness for people, issues and programs that are important to our fans and communities throughout the Bay Area and Northern and Central California.

Giants fans are likely to recognize the work of the Giants Community Fund or the Giants Community Relations Department through a public awareness campaign, educational activity, fundraiser or grant giving program of either entity. These activities and programs focus on the following areas:

Each season, the Giants hold more than 350 community outreach and awareness programs and events, either at AT&T Park or throughout the community, which define the work we do in the aforementioned focus areas. Programs include: Girls Day; Jefferson Awards Students In Action; Team Not For Sale; Salute to the Military; Until There's A Cure; Strike Out Cancer; Strike Out Violence; Family Safety; Giant Race benefitting Project Open Hand and BAWSI; ALS Awareness; Junior Giants Glove Drive; Junior Giants Stretch Drive; Education Day; Donate Life; Challenger Clinic; AAA High School Championship; Anti-Bullying Awareness; GiantSweep; Peanut/Nut Allergy Awareness; Step Up to the Plate for Homelessness; and many others.

The Giants Community Fund's flagship program, Junior Giants, serves more than 22,000 boys and girls in 87 underserved communities throughout northern and central California and southern Oregon. It is a free and non-competitive baseball program that has served as a model for MLB youth initiatives. Using baseball as the hook, Junior Giants provides opportunities for children to learn the meaning of leadership, teamwork, confidence and integrity, as well as the importance of education, health and bullying prevention. During the 2014 season, the Giants, in partnership with Bon Appétit Management Company, opened up The Garden at AT&T Park, which has served as a unique gathering place for our fans and has offered an innovative and healthy food experience within the ballpark. Located behind the centerfield wall, this one-of-a kind space offers our fans a bounty of fruit, vegetables, greens and flowers grown sustainably in a unique space at the ballpark. The Garden will also serve as an outdoor classroom for children in the local community to gather to learn about sustainability, urban farming and healthy eating. Through hands-on activities, such as cooking classes, children will see first-hand where food comes from, how it grows and how to prepare a healthy meal.

In 2015, the Giants embarked on our third World Championship Trophy Tour presented by Bank of America. The three-month trophy tour began in January and made over 40 stops visiting Giants fans in Junior Giants communities throughout northern and central California and Oregon. It also made stops in Nevada, Arizona and New York. Over 35,000 Giants fans had the opportunity to take their photos with all three trophies throughout the tour.

The Giants continue to respond to and fulfill many special needs and requests in the community providing experiences to fans confronting illness, experiencing life's milestones and other special circumstances.

Giants employees, from the players to the front office staff are expected to give back to the community and our fans. Players and uniformed personnel do this through developing their own community programs or supporting existing programs in the form of visits and appearances, financial contributions and relaying important messages through videos, press conferences and media interviews. Our front office staff support many of the organization's community initiatives and actively volunteer their time throughout the year.

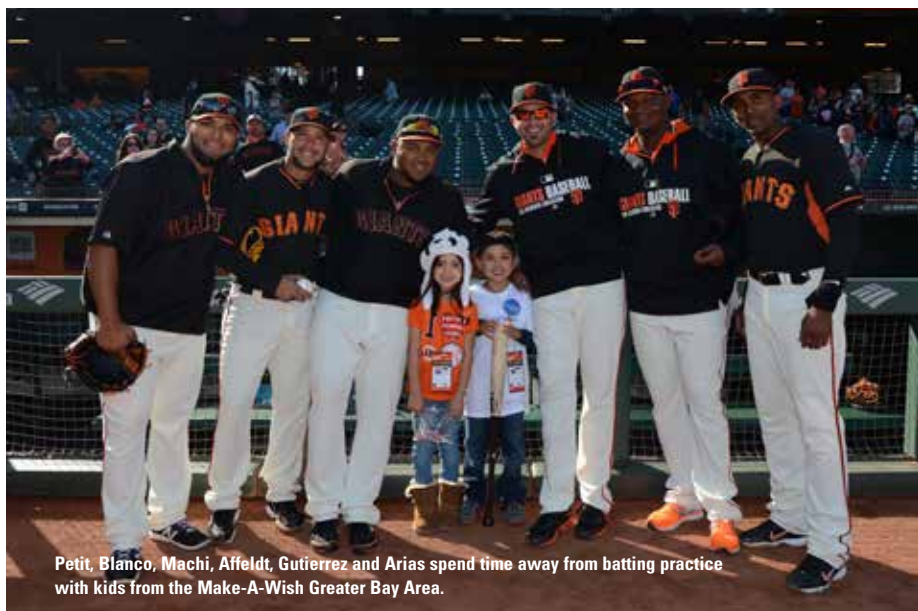

THE GIANTS MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE: Located on the second level at AT&T Park behind the press box, the Giants' media relations department can be reached via the media elevator or adjacent stairs from the Field Club (service) level walkway.

ENTRY TO AT&T PARK: Credentialed media must enter the ballpark through the Media Entrance near O'Doul Gate (next to the Giants Dugout Store) off Third Street, or at the Command Center at 2nd and King Streets.

CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued only to legitimate media. Season credentials will be issued only to those news agencies that cover the Giants on a daily basis. All requests for regular season media and photo credentials must be submitted on Major League Baseball's online credential site: <https://credentials.mlb.com>. Media that do not receive full-season Giants credentials may obtain single credentials. Media will need to apply on the website 48 hours in advance of each game requested. Daily media credentials are subject to availability. All daily media credentials can be picked up at the Giants Administrative Building reception desk, (adjacent to the Giants Dugout Store) located off Third Street through the glass doors at 24 Willie Mays Plaza. Credentials must be visibly worn at all times.

BOB STEVENS PRESS BOX: The Bob Stevens Press Box is located on the Lower Box level of AT&T Park, directly above Sections 113-117 of the lower bowl seating in the ballpark. The entrance to the press box, situated one level above street level, can be accessed via the media elevator or adjacent stairwell from the Field Club (service) level walkway. The press box is a working area for the news media and no cheering or other distracting noise is permitted at any time. Anyone violating this policy will be asked to leave the premises. Persons without credentials will not be admitted.

HODGES-SIMMONS BROADCAST CENTER: All broadcast booths for live game coverage are located at the Hodges-Simmons Broadcast Center on the Club Level of AT&T Park (one level above the Press Box). From the Field (service) level walkway, take the media elevator or adjacent stairwell to the Club Level to access the broadcast booths. Persons without credentials will not be admitted.

CLUBHOUSES: Both clubhouses are located on the Field Club (service) level of AT&T Park. The Giants' clubhouse is on the third base side, while the visitor's clubhouse is on the first base side. Only credentialed media with clubhouse access will be admitted. TV and still photographers are not allowed in the clubhouse prior to the game, while only TV cameras are permitted in the clubhouse during post-game (no still photographers). Training and weight rooms, as well as the club dining areas, are closed to everyone except players and club officials. The Giants clubhouse is open beginning three-and-a-half hours prior to game time, and will re-open 10 minutes following the conclusion of the game. Media may NOT return to the home or visitors clubhouse once the Clubs have taken batting practice. Please do not lounge in the manager's office or clubhouse during the pre-game period. If you have specific interview requests for a player or coach, we encourage you to contact a member of the Giants' media relations staff, who will try to accommodate your needs.

FIELD ACCESS: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed onto the field prior to the game. Due to AT&T Park having the smallest foul territory behind home plate in Major League Baseball, we kindly ask all video and still photographers to stay on the warning track when shooting. All media must clear the field 45 minutes prior to game time. Access to the field is available on the Field Club (service) level only by one of three tunnels: the Giants' dugout, the visitors' dugout, or the media tunnel directly behind home plate.

NICK PETERS MEDIA INTERVIEW ROOM: The Nick Peters Media Interview Room is located adjacent to the Giants clubhouse on the Field Club (service) level of the ballpark. The room will be used for media conferences and other special interviews.

POST-GAME PROCEDURES: Manager Bruce Bochy will be available to the media immediately after the game in the Nick Peters Media Interview Room. Please ask any questions of the manager related to the game during this post-game session. Post-game interviews with the manager and players are conducted by media with deadlines and should be limited to game comments. Please do not lounge in the manager's office or clubhouse, or attempt to conduct feature-length interviews after a game.

SOCIAL MEDIA: In accordance with Major League Baseball guidelines, media are not permitted to use cellular phones, laptops, texting devices or similar portable equipment for Tweeting or transmitting via other social media networks in group settings in clubhouses, dugouts or manager's office at any time. Digital photography, without the permission of the club media relations director, is prohibited in the clubhouse at all times.

MEDIA DRESS GUIDELINES: MLB and the BBWAA agreed to a set of dress guidelines for members of the media. The guidelines, which emphasize professionalism, will be in effect for the 2015 season. The guidelines will be posted in all media areas.

DARKROOMS, STILL PHOTO LOCATIONS: The photo darkrooms and the Giants' team photographers' office are located on the Field Club (service) level of the ballpark between both clubhouses. In addition, an auxiliary photographers' work room for photo transmissions via telephone lines is available in the area adjacent to the umpires room on the service level. Limited photo locations are available at various field level areas, as well as in the TV basket situated on the third base side of the Club Level. All still photo locations are reserved by contacting Giants photography department. The Giants' media relations department requests that all season credentialed photographers use discretion in using their season pass, and ask that you only utilize your credential on a legitimate assignment.

TV PHOTO LOCATIONS: Due to limited photo space, no TV cameras are guaranteed locations on the field level. All still photographers will have priority in these locations. However, TV cameras are welcome if space permits.

LIVE SHOTS: Due to our downtown location, we do not have any ENG truck parking. If your organization plans to transmit ANY live shots from inside AT&T Park, please contact MediaOne Services, which serves as the official broadcast services provider for the Giants and AT&T Park. Please direct your inquiry to Michael Ciabattari via e-mail at michael@m1sf.com or via telephone at (415) 939-1572.

SAM SKINNER MEDIA LOUNGE: The Sam Skinner Media Lounge is located directly behind the broadcast booths on Club Level. Those media members located in the press box that wish to dine can access the Sam Skinner Media Lounge by taking one flight of stairs up one level. The lounge is open for pre-game meal service beginning two hours prior to game time to accredited media members. Meal service concludes one hour after first pitch. There will be a nominal charge for meals.

LIVE GAME-IN-PROGRESS BROADCASTS: Please be advised that no radio entity is allowed to file live in-game reports from AT&T Park when the Giants host a game in which MLB's national radio rightsholder, ESPN Radio, is broadcasting. The ESPN Radio window of exclusivity begins 15 minutes prior to first pitch and concludes 15 minutes after the game or when ESPN Radio completes its broadcast, whichever comes first. Live broadcasts by non-rights holders during a game are permitted for the purpose of non play-by-play reporting of scores and game highlights, under the following guidelines: Reports must be confined to between-innings only, limited to 60 seconds in length, and limited to six per game. Radio and TV stringers must notify the Giants media relations department of their plans for such reports. A violation of the above Major League Baseball guidelines may result in the revocation of media credentials.

TELEPHONES: Media wishing to order temporary telephone lines must contact Lena Boswell, Giants telecommunications administrator at (415) 972-1711 or via e-mail at lboswell@sfgiants.com.

FREELANCE WRITERS AND PHOTOGRAPHERS: Freelance writers and photographers may not request their own credentials. The sports editor or managing editor of a publication employing the freelancer must provide a written credential request on official company letterhead for specific games at least 48 hours in advance of that game.

WEBSITES: Due to the growth of on-line services and our limited number of press box seats, the Giants will only issue daily credentials to those website personnel affiliated with a major news gathering organization.

MEDIA INFORMATION SITE: All Giants' game day information (lineups, game notes, stats, releases, etc.) audio/video interviews (English and Spanish) and press box information will be available on the Giants' press box information site. Please see a media relations staffer for website and login information.

NO AUTOGRAPHS: Media are not allowed to ask for autographs of uniformed personnel at AT&T Park. Anyone violating this policy will be asked to leave the premises and will have their credential revoked.

Información a los Medios

Oficina de Relaciones Públicas de los Gigantes: Está localizada en el segundo piso en AT&T Park detrás del Palco de Prensa. Usted puede llegar al Departamento de Relaciones Públicas de los Gigantes para los Medios de Comunicación por el elevador o las escaleras que están ubicados cerca del túnel de servicio en el nivel Field Club.

Acceso a AT&T Park: Todos los miembros de prensa con acreditación autorizada deben entrar a AT&T Park por la puerta designada para Medios que está ubicada cerca a la taquilla Lefty O'Doul (a un lado de la tienda Giants Dugout) en la calle Third o en el centro de comando entre las calles 2nd y King.

Acreditación: Las Credenciales de Temporada le serán otorgadas solamente a medios informativos o agencias de noticias que reportan sobre el equipo a diario. Todos los medios informativos o agencias de noticias que deseen obtener acreditación tienen que someter su solicitud usando el sitio cibernético de Major League Baseball usando la siguiente dirección: <https://credentials.mlb.com>. Los Medios que no reciban acreditación de temporada pueden obtener una credencial para juegos individuales, sujetos a disponibilidad siempre y cuando sean pedidas con 48 horas de anticipación. Todas las credenciales se pueden obtener en la recepción del edificio administrativo de los Gigantes, (a un lado de la tienda Giants Dugout), que está en la calle Third en 24 Willie Mays Plaza. Las credenciales tienen que ser visibles todo el tiempo.

Palco de Prensa Bob Stevens: El Palco de Prensa Bob Stevens está localizado en el nivel Lower Box en AT&T Park, directamente arriba de las secciones 113 a 117. Se puede llegar al Palco de Prensa Bob Stevens por el ascensor o las escaleras que están por el túnel de servicio en el nivel Field Club. El Palco de Prensa es un área de trabajo para los periodistas y no se permiten las porras, vítores, aplausos o cualquier otro ruido que distraiga o impida a los periodistas ejercer su trabajo. Los individuos que no respeten esta regla serán expulsados de inmediato del palco. De hecho, las personas sin credenciales no serán admitidas al palco.

Centro de Transmisión Hodges-Simmons: Todas las cabinas de radio y televisión para transmisiones en vivo están localizadas en el Centro de Transmisión Hodges-Simmons en el nivel Club Level en AT&T Park (un piso arriba del Palco de Prensa). Se puede llegar al Centro de Transmisión Hodges-Simmons por el ascensor o las escaleras que están por el túnel de servicio en el nivel Field Club. Las personas sin credenciales no serán admitidas a esta área del estadio.

Acceso a los Vestidores: Ambos vestidores están localizados en el nivel Field Club de AT&T Park. El vestidor de los Gigantes se encuentra en el lado de la tercera base y el del equipo visitante está en el lado de la primera base. El acceso a los vestidores será permitido sólo a periodistas con la acreditación apropiada. Cámaras de televisión y fotógrafos no son permitidos en el clubhouse antes de los partidos. Se les permite acceso a los vestidores a cámaras de televisión después de los partidos, pero nunca a fotógrafos. El cuarto médico y de entrenamiento así como el comedor de los jugadores son áreas que están cerradas para todos, excepto a los jugadores y empleados del club. El vestidor de los Gigantes estará abierto tres horas y media antes de cada partido y reabrirá 10 minutos después del juego. Los periodistas no pueden regresar al vestidor de los Gigantes o al del equipo visitante una vez que los equipos hayan salido a tomar práctica de bateo. Si no está autorizado para hacerlo, por favor no se quede en la oficina del manager o en el vestidor. Si desea hacer una entrevista específica con un pelotero o instructor le pedimos que se ponga en contacto con miembros de Relaciones para los Medios de los Gigantes, quienes harán todo lo posible para facilitar su necesidad.

Acceso al Campo/Terreno de Juego: El acceso al terreno de juego será permitido sólo a periodistas con la acreditación oficial antes de los partidos. Debido a que AT&T Park tiene la área más pequeña detrás del home en las Grandes Ligas, se le pide a las cámaras de televisión y fotógrafos que permanezcan en la pista de advertencia o zona de seguridad cuando estén filmando. Todos los miembros de los medios necesitan desalojar el campo 45 minutos antes del comienzo del partido. Se puede llegar al campo por el nivel Field Club solamente por uno de tres túneles: por el dugout de los Gigantes o el del equipo visitante y por el túnel que está directamente detrás del home.

Sala de Entrevistas Nick Peters: La Sala de Entrevistas Nick Peters está localizada en el nivel Field Club del estadio, entre home y el vestidor de los Gigantes. Esta Sala de Entrevistas será usada para Conferencias de Prensa y otras entrevistas especiales.

Procedimiento después del Partido: El piloto Bruce Bochy estará disponible inmediatamente después de cada partido en la Sala de Entrevistas Nick Peters. Esta es su oportunidad de hacer preguntas con respecto al juego de ese día o noche. Las entrevistas con el manager y los peloteros deben de ser llevadas a cabo por reporteros que tienen que respetar un plazo de tiempo para ejecutar sus funciones. Por favor no se quede en la oficina del manager o el vestidor y no trate de hacer entrevistas largas después del juego.

Medios Sociales: Conforme a las reglas de Major League Baseball, no se le permite el uso de teléfonos móviles, laptop, equipos para escribir texto o usar aparatos similares para enviar tweets o transmitir a otros medios sociales mientras esté el vestidor, clubhouse o en la oficina del manager. Las fotos digitales sin el permiso de un miembro de Relaciones para los Medios están completamente prohibidas en el Clubhouse o vestidor.

Código de Vestimenta: MLB y BBWAA se han puesto de acuerdo en un Código de Vestimenta para todos los miembros de prensa. La directriz, la cual enfatiza el profesionalismo, fue puesta en vigor desde la temporada 2015. Las reglas al respecto están delineadas y a la vista de todos en las áreas para los miembros de prensa.

Cuarto Oscuro, lugar para los Fotógrafos: El cuarto oscuro y la oficina del fotógrafo del equipo de los Gigantes está localizada en el Field Club en el nivel de servicio entre los vestidores de los equipos. Además, hay otro cuarto auxiliar de trabajo para enviar fotografías vía teléfono que se encuentra a un lado del cuarto de los árbitros en el nivel de servicio. Hay espacio para un número limitado de áreas para fotógrafos en el terreno de juego, así como en la caseta de televisión que se encuentra en el lado de la tercera base en el Club Level. Todas las ubicaciones para fotógrafos están reservadas y si desea una de estas áreas comuníquese con el Departamento de Fotografía de los Gigantes. El Departamento de Relaciones para Medios de los Gigantes le pide a todos los fotógrafos con acreditación de temporada que respeten las reglas propias de su profesión cuando hagan uso de las mismas y se les pide que sólo la usen cuando estén ejerciendo el trabajo para un medio debidamente acreditado.

Lugar para TV/Fotos: Debido al espacio limitado, las cámaras de televisión no tienen garantizado un espacio en el campo. Todos los fotógrafos tendrán prioridad.

Tomas en Vivo: Debido a que el estadio se encuentra en el centro de la ciudad, no tenemos estacionamiento para los camiones con satélite. Si su organización tiene planes de hacer una transmisión en directo adentro de AT&T Park, por favor comuníquese con MediaOne Services, proveedor oficial para transmisiones en vivo de los Gigantes en AT&T Park. Diríjase a Michael Clabattari por email a michael@m1sf.com o por teléfono al (415) 939-1572.

Comedor de Prensa Sam Skinner: El comedor Sam Skinner está localizado directamente detrás de las cabinas de narración en el Club Level. Los periodistas que se encuentren en el Palco de Prensa y deseen ingerir alimentos pueden dirigirse al Comedor Sam Skinner por las escaleras al tercer piso. El comedor estará abierto dos horas antes de cada partido. El comedor cierra una hora después del primer lanzamiento. Hay un cobro mínimo especificado por la comida.

Transmisiones en Vivo: Se advierte que ninguna radio está permitida a hacer reportajes en vivo durante los juegos en AT&T Park cuando los Gigantes sean anfitriones y el partido sea transmitido nacionalmente por la cadena ESPN. La ventana de exclusividad para la cadena ESPN comienza 15 minutos antes del primer lanzamiento y concluye 15 minutos después que termine el juego o cuando ESPN concluya su transmisión. Reportes en vivo de estaciones de radio sin derechos de exclusividad están permitidos sólo para informar del marcador o jugadas relevantes y no para describir la acción bajo las siguientes reglas: los reportajes deben hacerse sólo entre innings, limitados a 60 segundos y seis por juego. Los reporteros de radio y televisión tienen que informarle de antemano al Departamento de Relaciones para Medios sobre sus planes para dichos reportes. La violación a esta regla de MLB puede resultar en la suspensión de la respectiva credencial.
