THE SERIES

- Virginia Tech and the University of Georgia will be meeting for the third time when they meet in the Chick-fil-A Bowl on Dec. 30 with the series tied 1-1.
- The series began in 1931 when the two schools met as members of the Southern Conference. That year, the Bulldogs blanked Tech at Athens, 40-0.
- The following year, Georgia split from the Southern Conference to join the newly formed Southeastern Conference. The two still met in 1932 with the Hokies leaving Athens with a 7-6 win.

PEACH/CHICK-FIL-A BOWL HISTORY

- Formerly known as the Peach Bowl, Chick-fil-A bought the naming rights to the bowl starting this year.
- Tech played twice in the Peach Bowl, posting a 1-1 record.
- Following the 1980 season, the Hokies met the University of Miami at Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium, falling 20-10 on Jan. 2, 1981.
- In 1986, Tech kicker Chris Kinzer connected on a 40-yard field goal as time expired to lift the Hokies to a 25-24 win over NC State for Tech's first bowl victory.

GEORGIA TIES

• Tech has three players on its roster from the Peach State: starting offensive guard **Sergio Render** (Newnan), rover **Dorian** Porch (Calhoun) and safety Mario Edwards (Atlanta). Render has started all 12 games at right guard and Porch is a regular on several special teams units. Edwards is redshirting.

FROM MAROON TO RED

• Georgia will have a familiar face on its sidelines in running backs coach Tony Ball. Ball is in his first year with the Bulldogs after spending the previous eight seasons (1998-2005) as the receivers coach at Virginia Tech.

THE CHECKLIST

- ✓ The two first met in 1931 in a series that is tied 1-1.
- ✓ Tech has appeared in the former Peach Bowl twice before, posting a 1-1 record.
- ✓ The two met as members of the Southern Conference in 1931 before UGA split to form the Southeastern Conference in 1932.
- ✓ Three Hokies are from the state of Georgia.
- ✓ This will be Tech's 14th straight bowl appearance, a current streak just three other schools are on.

THE GAME ON TV

- The Chick-fil-A Bowl between Georgia and Virginia Tech will be televised nationally by ESPN-HD. Ron Franklin will handle the play-by-play with Ed Cunningham serving as the color analyst and Dr. Jerry Punch providing sideline commentary.
- Virginia Tech is 34-13 all-time in games televised by ESPN, including 2-1 this

COUNTDOWN TO KICKOFF

- 10 Virginia Tech and Southern Cal are currently the only two teams in Division I-A to have won 10 or more games each of the past three seasons.
- 9 Nine players on Tech's 2006 defensive unit have scored touchdowns during their Tech careers.
- 8 Virginia Tech will be playing in its eighth different bowl game under head coach Frank Beamer.
- 7 Sean Glennon is the seventh quarterback in Tech history to pass for over 2,000 yards in a season
- 6 Tech is one of just six schools to produce two No. 1 draft picks in the NFL draft since 1980, joining Southern Cal, Ohio State, Penn State, Miami and Auburn.
- 5 The Hokies are 5-0 this season when they score a defensive or special teams
- 4 The Hokies are one of four teams who have earned bowl bids each of the last 14 seasons, joining Michigan, Florida and Florida State.
- 3 Tech will be appearing in its third bowl game in Atlanta, having played in the Peach Bowl following the 1980 season and in the New Peach Bowl game in 1986.
- 2 During Tech's last six games, the Hokie defense has scored two touchdowns and allowed two touchdowns.
- 1 Virginia Tech is ranked No. 1 in total defense at the end of the regular season for the second straight season.

COACH FRANK BEAMER

+ Frank Beamer (Virginia Tech'69), whose Tech teams have posted a 132-41 record over the past 13+ seasons and appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 20th year as the head football coach at Virginia Tech. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 156-81-2 record.

He became Tech's winningest football coach in 1997 when the Hokies defeated Arkansas State, 50-0.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 14 consecutive bowl appearances, an ACC title, an ACC Coastal Division crown, three BIG EAST Conference titles and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999 and shared it in '96.

Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into The Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

Beamer's Hokies have earned the highest national rankings in the program's history, earning a top 10 ranking in the AP poll at some point during each of the past seven years.

During one stretch, Tech was ranked in 84 consecutive AP polls.

Last year, Tech won the ACC's Coastal Division and earned a spot in the league's championship game. The Hokies won a schoolrecord tying 11 games, including the Toyota Gator Bowl, finishing the season ranked seventh in the country.

For his efforts, he was awarded the league's coach of the year award for the second time in as many years.

In 2004, Tech went a surprising 10-3 in a season highlighted by an eight-game winning streak that led to Tech's ACC championship and a trip to the Nokia Sugar Bowl.

During the 2000 season, the Hokies posted an 11-1 record that included a 41-20 win over Clemson in the Gator Bowl.

In 1999, Tech marched to an 11-0 regular-season mark before losing a hardfought 46-29 game to Florida State for the national title in the Sugar Bowl. The Hokies ended the '99 season ranked No. 2 by AP.

Another highlight came when Tech beat Texas, 28-10, in the 1995 Sugar Bowl and finished 10-2. The bowl streak started in '93 when Tech beat Indiana in the Independence Bowl to cap a 9-3 season.

Beamer returned to his alma mater in December 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams.

The 60-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

Beamer is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Tech and now a running backs coach and recruiting coordinator at Mississippi State University; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Virginia Tech.

Beamer had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

- Frank Beamer, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other coach.
- + Only three of the 119 active Division I-A head football coaches have been at their

current school longer than Beamer. Those coaches are: Joe Paterno (40 yrs., Penn State); Bobby Bowden (30 yrs., Florida State); and Fisher DeBerry (22 yrs., Air Force).

· Prior to Beamer, no other grid coach in Tech history had served more than 10 seasons as head coach.

The Opposing Coach GEORGIA COACH MARK RICHT

- + Mark Richt (Miami '82) is in his sixth season as the head football coach at the University of Georgia, where his current record is 60-17.
- · He began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate and volunteer assistant at Florida State before earning his first full-time job in 1989 as the offensive coordinator at East Carolina. He spent just one year there before moving back to Tallahassee to be the quarterbacks coach at FSU from 1990-2000. He added the title of offensive coordinator for the Seminoles in 1994, positions he held until taking the head coaching job at UGA in 2001.
- · Richt's teams have won two SEC titles in his time in Athens, winning or tying for the division title three times.

Rushing = Outcome?

- Under head coach **Frank Beamer** (239 games), the Hokies are 137-27-2 when outrushing their opponents, 18-54 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In Tech's current 13-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 117-12 when outrushing its opponents, 14-29 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.
- In its current 13-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 83-6 when rushing for 200 yards or more, including 7-0 last year and 2-0 this year.
- Since 1999, the Hokies are 72-5 when outrushing their opponent and 7-16 when being outrushed.

SCORING STREAK

- Tech has scored in a school record 147 straight football games, beginning with a 13-7 win over the University of Miami on Sept. 23, 1995. The streak began after a 16-0 loss to Cincinnati at Lane Stadium in 1995.
- The previous school record was 66 straight games, which started in 1970 and ran into the 1976 season.
- During its current streak, Tech has scored 13 or more points in all but five games UNC (1998 Gator Bowl, L, 42-3), at Pittsburgh (2001, L, 38-7), at West Virginia (2003, L, 28-7), Miami (2005, L, 27-7) and at Boston College (2006, L, 22-3).

ACADEMICS COME FIRST

- Tech players who graduated either prior to the season or did in December, have worn an orange mortar board and tassel sticker on their helmets all season.
- Four seniors Danny McGrath, Mason
 Baggett, Brandon Pace and Nick Leeson
 earned their degrees prior to the first game.
- McGrath graduated in three years, graduating in Spring '05 and is nearing completion on a Master's degree. In addition, both Baggett and Pace are working on Master's degrees.
- Five other seniors David Clowney, Brandon Frye, Brandon Gore, Nic Schmitt and Cary Wade — graduated in December to bring the toal number of graduates playing in this year's bowl game for the Hokies up to nine.

TECH IN THE POLLS

- Tech finished the '99 season rated No. 2 by AP and No. 3 by the coaches and climbed as high as No. 2 in 2000, both all-time highs.
- Tech has been ranked a total of 188 voting periods by the AP since the beginning of the 1993 season. When Frank Beamer took over in 1987, Tech had been ranked a total of 12 weeks during the first 49 years of the AP poll. Tech has been ranked in 133 of the last 150 AP polls.

What's a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy! Tech! Tech! V.P.I.! Sola-Rex Sola-Rah Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!! Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

Just Virginia Tech, Please

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its named to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.







The Storied Lunch Pail

• Taken with the Hokies wherever they go is the storied lunch pail. The Pail served as the inspiration for Tech's record-



setting 1995 defense, symbolizing Tech's blue collar approach to defensive football. Every year since, a member of the defense has been responsible for toting a new Pail to everything football-related.

- In years past, the top point getter from the previous week would be responsible for the Pail. But the past two seasons, Darryl Tapp took the Pail and wouldn't give it up, saying "Until someone outworks me, I'm not giving it up." Tapp even took the Pail with him to Seattle, where he is a rookie with the Seahawks after **Bud Foster** gave it to him.
- Coach Rod Sharpless, then the co-defensive coordinator along with Foster, brought a lunch pail back from New Jersey and they decided that it would become the symbol of the 1995 defense. Sharpless' mother-in-law found the now famous original lunch pail in Mercerville, N.J., where it had belonged to a coal miner.
- The original Pail, along with an oversized replica, sit in Tech's Hall of Legends in the Merryman Center.
- That year, the players put their season and individual goals in the Pail and turf from road victories into the Pail as well. Now, the players put the unit goals, weekly goals, the keys to success for the week and sign a mission statement before the season ... plus the turf from road wins.
- A new Pail is put into service about every two years since it goes through so much each season.
- This year's Pail is the fifth since 1995.
- Following Tech's loss to Boston College, Foster took the Pail away from the defense and sat it in his offense. Since that game, Tech's defense has shot to No. 1 in the nation in total defense, scoring defense and passing defense, allowing just 29 points in the last six contests.
- They've posted four shutouts this year, but Foster won't give the Pail back to any of the players for fear of jinxing the hot streak the Hokies have been defensively.
- Fans have started mailing and bringing by old lunch pails to Foster, who now has half a dozen Pails waiting to be used.

TECH AT NEUTRAL SITES

- Virginia Tech has a 144-119-19 record in football games played at neutral sites.
- Tech is 7-10 in neutral site games during Coach **Frank Beamer**'s 20 seasons after last year's 35-24 victory over Louisville in the Toyota Gator Bowl at Alltel Stadium.
- Besides bowl games, where the Hokies are 6-7, Tech has played four other neutral site games under Beamer a 33-20 loss to Florida State at Orlando, Fla., in 1991, a 38-16 win over Temple at RFK Stadium in Washington, D.C., during the 1995 season, a 24-13 loss to No. 1 USC in 2004 at FedEx Field in Landover, Md., to open the season and last year's ACC Championship game, a 27-22 loss to Florida State.

LOOKING AHEAD

- While there's still a game left, you can already begin to look at next year's squad. On offense, Tech will return eight starters, losing only left tackle Brandon Frye, center Danny McGrath and fullback Jesse Allen. Returning will be first-team All-ACC tailback Branden Ore, along with 2,000-yard passer Sean Glennon and four of Tech's top five receivers, along with All-ACC tackle Duane Brown.
- On defense, eight starters are scheduled to return to this year's No. 1 nationally ranked squad. The Hokies will lose only end Noland Burchette, whip linebacker Brenden Hill and rover Aaron Rouse. Three starters will return up front, along with the dynamic linebacking duo of Vince Hall and Xavier Adibi. The secondary will return three of four starters, including young cornerbacks Brandon Flowers and Victor "Macho" Harris.
 - ${\boldsymbol \cdot}$ Tech will have to replace both kickers.
- Tech will travel to LSU in its second game of the season and also face Georgia Tech, Duke, Virginia and Clemson on the road. Tech will host Florida State, Boston College, Miami, East Carolina, William & Mary, Ohio and North Carolina.

TECH INDOORS

- Tech has a 5-12 record in games played in domed stadiums.
- The Hokies are 1-2 in the Astrodome, 2-6 in the Carrier Dome, 0-1 in Bank One Ballpark and 2-3 in the Louisiana Superdome.
- Tech has lost its last four games indoors, losing to Florida State in the 2000 Sugar Bowl (Superdome), to Syracuse in 2002 (Carrier Dome), to California in 2003 in the Insight Bowl (Bank One Ballpark) and to Auburn in the 2005 Sugar Bowl (Superdome).

SCORING FIRST

• Tech has won 29 straight games when scoring first. The last time Tech scored first and lost was against West Virginia in 2002.

IN THE PEACH STATE

• Tech has a 3-3 record in games played in the state of Georgia: 1-1 at Athens against Georgia, 1-1 at Atlanta against Georgia Tech and 1-1 in the former Peach Bowl, played in Atlanta.

AGAINST GEORGIA SCHOOLS

• Virginia Tech is 3-3 against teams from the state of Georgia, splitting a pair of games with the University of Georgia and splitting four games with Georgia Tech.

TECH ON TURF

- The Georgia game will mark Virginia Tech's 51st game on artificial turf since head coach Frank Beamer took the helm in 1987.
- Tech has won 21 of its last 31 games on turf, but is just 26-24 on artificial turf under Beamer, including 1-1 this year after a loss at Boston College and a win at Wake Forest.

GEORGIA ON TURF

- The bowl game will mark Georgia's seventh game on artificial turf since head coach Mark Richt took the helm in 2001.
- Georgia is 4-2 under Richt on turf after beating Ole Miss earlier this year and is 35-21-3 all-time in 59 games on turf.

POSTSEASON RECORDS

- Georgia is 22-16-3 all-time in bowl games, 2-2 in the Chick-fil-A/Peach Bowl. The Bulldogs beat Maryland 17-16 in 1973 before falling to Syracuse 19-18 in 1989. Georgia's last two appearances in this bowl came against the University of Virginia, falling to the Cavaliers 34-27 in 1995 before beating them 35-33 in 1998.
- Georgia is 3-2 in bowl games under head coach Mark Richt following last year's 38-35 loss to West Virginia in the Sugar Bowl that was played in Atlanta.
- Virginia Tech is 7-12 in its bowl appearances following last year's 35-24, come-

from-behind victory over Louisville in the Toyota Gator Bowl. **Frank Beamer** is 6-7 in bowl games as Tech's head coach.

- This will be Tech's 20th appearance in a bowl as the Hokies have appeared in 10 different bowl games.
- Tech is 1-0 in the Music City and San Francisco Bowls, 1-1 in the Peach and Independence Bowls, 2-3 in the Gator Bowl, 1-2 in the Sugar, 0-1 in the Orange, Insight and Sun Bowls and 0-2 in the Liberty Bowl.
- Virginia Tech has played in seven different states for bowl games. Tech is 1-0 in California, 2-3 in Louisiana, 1-1 in Georgia, 1-2 in Tennessee, 2-4 in Florida and 0-1 in both Texas and Arizona.

BOWL BITS

- Virginia Tech quarterback Sean Glennon (r-So., Centreville, Va.) will be Tech's third different quarterback to start a bowl game in the last three years. Marcus Vick got the start in last year's Gator Bowl and Bryan Randall started the previous three bowls (Sugar, Insight and Diamond Walnut San Francisco).
- Ten players who started last year's Toyota Gator Bowl are on Tech's 2006 Chickfil-A Bowl roster. The four offensive players who started in last year's bowl were linemen Duane Brown (r-Jr., Richmond, Va.) and Brandon Frye (r-Sr., Myrtle Beach, S.C.), along with receivers David Clowney (Sr., Delray Beach, Fla.) and Eddie Royal (Jr., Centreville, Va.). The six defensive players who started against Louisville were linemen Chris Ellis (r-Jr., Hampton, Va.) and Carlton Powell (r-Jr., Chesapeake, Va.), linebackers Vince Hall (r-Jr., Chesapeake, Va.) and Xavier Adibi (r-Jr., Hampton, Va.), rover Aaron Rouse (r-Sr., Virginia Beach, Va.) and cornerback Roland Minor (r-Jr., Washington, D.C.).
- Hall and Royal, both juniors, and placekicker Brandon Pace (r-Sr., Virginia Beach, Va.) are slated to make their third straight bowl starts when the Hokies face
- Georgia in Atlanta.
- Tech assistant coach Billy Hite has been to more bowl games with the Hokies than any other coach in school history. The 2006 Chick-fil-A Bowl game will be Hite's 17th bowl game since joining the Tech staff in 1978 under Coach Bill Dooley.
- Current head coach **Frank Beamer** is one behind Hite



TALENT, BUT INEXPERIENCE

- Heading into preseason, three young signal callers were battling for that coveted starting position. **Sean Glennon** (r-So., Centreville, Va.) won the job, and has held on to the No. 1 spot.
- Glennon redshirted last season after playing in four games as a true freshman, completing 8-of-11 passes including one to himself for 137 yards and two scores. One of those touchdown passes was to a man now blocking for him at tackle: **Duane Brown** (r-Jr., Richmond, Va.), who was playing tight end.
- For the year, he's completed 157-of-276 passes for 2,097 yards and 11 touchdowns, including a 339-yard game against Georgia Tech in which he attempted a school-record tying 53 passes. Against Wake Forest, he threw for 252 yards and had scoring passes of 49 and 53 yards in the big road victory.
- Glennon brings strength and a smartness to the position. In fall preseason testing, he led the quarterbacks with a 360-pound bench press and a 300-pound power clean, while posting a 34.5-inch vertical jump.
- Ike Whitaker (r-Fr., Germantown, Md.) is perhaps the most athletic of the three, but had a lot ground to make up after missing half of spring ball due to a suspension.
- On the year, he is 10-of-16 passing for 119 yards and a touchdown. He also has 42 rushing yards.
- Cory Holt (r-So., Lexington, N.C.) led the quarterbacks with a 500-pound squat in preseason testing and posted the fastest 10-yard shuttle of the three.

THE STALLIONS

- Branden Ore (r-So., Chesapeake, Va.) leads an inexperienced group of Stallions.
- + Last year, he went over the 100-yard mark three times and has four more this season, including back-to-back 200-yard games (207 vs. USM and 203 vs. Clemson). He is the first Tech back ever to post two 200-yards games not only in a season, but in a career.
- He rushed for 111 yards and three scores against UNC, earning ACC Offensive Back of the Week honors. He also earned that honor after the Clemson game.
- This year, he's rushed for 1,095 yards, has scored 15 total TDs, has broken 86 tackles and leads the ACC in all-purpose yards (118.0 ypg) and is second in rushing (99.5 ypg).
- He is the 10th back in school history to surpass the 1,000-yard rushing plateau and earned first-team All-ACC honors.
- Ore missed all of the spring after having shoulder surgery following the bowl game. He went home to rehab and did not take any classes. He worked at a 7-Eleven warehouse as a stockboy and credits the experience as turning his attitude around.

- Ore suffered a sprained left ankle early in the Wake Forest game and missed the Virginia game, but will be back for the bowl.
- In his absence **Kenny Lewis, Jr.** (Fr., Danville, Va.) got his first collegiate start. He is a quick back who has moved into the No. 2 spot, even though he was scheduled to redshirt.
- He spent several years in the Cincinnati Reds' organization, advancing to AA ball, before enrolling at Virginia Tech in January of 2006.
- In his first collegiate action, coming against Duke, he ran for 16 yards and a TD. He scored on a 14-yard run against Southern Miss. Subbing in for Ore, he rushed 17 times for 74 yards in the Wake Forest game and 79 yards against Virginia. For the year, he has 210 yards rushing and two scores.

THE BRUISERS

- Last year, one of the bigger concerns came at fullback. This year, the position is in good hands with two veterans.
- Starter Jesse Allen (r-Sr., Monson, Mass.) is wrapping up his final year. Allen is a former walk-on who has earned a scholarship for his hard work and dedication to the program. A demon in the weight room, Allen benched 410, squatted 575 and power cleaned 336 in preseason testing.
- He has four catches for 47 yards on the season.
- The coaches also have confidence in Carlton Weatherford (r-Jr., Danville, Va.), who has battled back from a total blow out of his knee two years ago. He, too, is a strong player (420 bench, 336 push jerk).
- Weatherford had a big game in his first collegiate action, catching three passes for 19 yards and had a 4-yard touchdown catch against Northeastern. For the year, he has four catches for 25 yards and also had a 24-yard kickoff return against Wake Forest.

USING THE TIGHT ENDS

- The losses of Jeff King (NFL), John Kinzer (career-ending injury) and Jordan Trott (graduation) from last year's team guaranteed that whoever got the start in the opener would be seeing their first collegiate action.
- That honor went to **Greg Boone** (r-Fr., Chesapeake, Va.), the former quarterback, who showed steady improvement throughout camp. At 6-3, he has the ideal size, but checked in at 281 at the beginning of camp. He's shed some of the weight, and is a load to tackle.
- * Boone came to Tech as a quarterback, but made the move to tight end following spring ball. Boone, very mobile and athletic for a guy his size, even lined up to return kickoffs in the Spring Game.
- He caught a 41-yard touchdown pass at North Carolina. He sprained an ankle in the Kent State game and missed the Wake Forest and Virginia games. He is expected back at full strength for the bowl game.
- Sam Wheeler (r-Fr., Blacksburg, Va.) is a local product who went to Hargrave before enrolling at Tech and redshirting in 2005. At 6-3, 253 pounds, he's not the biggest of the tight ends, but is athletic and catches the ball well.
- He caught a 17-yard score against Duke and had a 41-yard reception against No. 10 Clemson. He has 12 catches for 146 yards this year, and has started five games, including the last two in place of the injured Boone.
- Wheeler has several long catches on the year and is becoming a reliable receiver.
- Pushing them is **Ed Wang** (r-Fr., Ashburn, Va.), who has great size at 6-5, 268. The former Virginia state player of the year still needs to get stronger, but has a big upside.
- Wang comes from athletic parents, who were both members of the Chinese Olympic term.
- As a group, the tight ends have caught 16 passes for 204 yards and two scores.

A LONG ROAD BACK

- The road back from a devastating knee injury during the fall of 2002 has been arduous to say the least for tailback George Bell (r-So., Fayetteville, N.C.). One of the nation's premier high school running backs, Bell tore the MCL, ACL, and PCL in his left knee three games into his junior season. This wasn't just a tear. These were knee ligaments that were shredded. Still, Bell was a big name on the national recruiting boards.
- Even though he played in just three games during his senior year in high school, he was one of the most highly recruited backs in the country, picking Virginia Tech over Michigan, North Carolina, NC State and others. He enrolled at Tech in January of 2004, went through spring practice before redshirting. He saw limited action last year and was the No. 2 back early this season.
- ACL reconstruction surgery, such as the one Bell had, uses a graft to replace the ligament

- in the knee. The most common grafts used in surgeries such as this are called autografts. This technique uses part of your own body, such as the tendon of the kneecap (patellar tendon) or one of the hamstring tendons to reconstruct the ACL
- In Bell's case, the ACL was repaired using allograft tissue, which is donor material. For Bell, an ACL from a cadaver was implanted in Bell's left knee along with a dissolvable screw.
- This year has been no picnic either as his "good" knee his right knee began acting up. Following the North Carolina game on Sept. 9, he was advised by coaches to give up football due to the chronic pain in both knees. He took a month off from football before returning to practice in October.
- Bell didn't return to action until the Wake Forest game, rushing for 28 yards on 10 carries. Against Virginia, he scored the first touchdown in Techs 17-0 win.







PICK ONE OUT OF THE HAT

- The Hokies play five receivers who have seen significant action over the years. With one senior and four juniors, this is the deepest position, depth-wise, on the Tech roster.
- Each brings a different element as their strength and any one of the five can step up at any time and have a standout game.
- The last time they were tested in the 40-yard dash, each of the five ran 4.46 or faster.

ROYAL FLUSH

- Eddie Royal (Jr., Herndon, Va.) has returned to the level of excellence he played at his freshman year. After recording 470 yards and averaging 28.8 yards per kickoff return and 11.0 yards per punt return as a freshman, his productivity dropped to 315 yards last year, averaging 20.9 yards per kickoff return and 8.2 yards per punt return.
- *Royal is the youngest of a talented group of seven children. His brother, Chris, was a defensive back at Marshall and was among the nation's leaders in interceptions two years ago with six. His sister, Christina, was the Regimental Commanding Officer (RCO) for the Virginia Tech Corps of Cadets, graduating last spring. The Air Force cadet was a cadet colonel, the highest rank a cadet can have. In the history of the VTCC, Christina was the fourth female to achieve this rank and position, and the first African American female to do so.
- Royal, at 5-10, 181 pounds, bench pressed 390 pounds in the preseason to break his own Tech receiver record. He also ran a 4.22 40-yard dash in winter testing and is considered "the strongest player, pound-forpound, in the upper body on the team" by strength and conditioning coach Mike Gentry.
- On the year, he has 27 catches for 452 yards and three touchdowns, including 102 yards against Georgia Tech, a punt return score vs. Duke and 49-yard scores at Wake Forest and against Virginia.

THE MAN CHILD

- Josh Morgan (Jr., Washington, D.C.) is called "the man child" by his fellow receivers for his strength and athleticism. He ran a 4.46 40-yard dash in winter workouts. He also led all receivers in preseason testing with a 326-pound power clean, a 300-pound push jerk and a 37.5-inch vertical jump.
- He had a Tech bowl record 126 yards including an 80-yarder and two scores vs. Auburn in the 2005 Sugar Bowl. On the season, he has 31 catches for 434 yards and four TDs, including a 53-yarder at WFU.

THE SPEEDSTER

• David Clowney (Sr., Delray Beach, Fla.) has 18 career starts and set a new career-high with 120 yards receiving against Duke.

- Clowney has spent time on Tech's track team as a sprinter, earning All-ACC honors in the 200-meter with a time of 21.52 at the league's indoor championships. The time is the second fastest in school history.
- He leads the team with 33 receptions for 416 yards, including a 60-yarder on the first play against Duke. He missed the Cincinnati game after undergoing an emergency appendectomy on Sept. 21, but returned for Georgia Tech nine days later.

THE OLD MAN

- He may only be a junior like three of the other receivers, but 23-year-old Josh Hyman (Chesapeake, Va.) is constantly kidded by his younger receiving mates for being the old man of the group.
- * After graduating Deep Creek High in 2002, Hyman went to Fork Union Military Academy for a semester, before enrolling at Tech in the Spring of 2003. He then redshirted in 2003 before making his debut as a 21-year-old freshman in 2004.

- After a productive freshman campaign (27 rec., 491 yards, 5 TDs), Hyman caught just 13 passes last year for 197 yards and no scores. He's already surpassed that output with 16 catches this year for 111 yards.
- He ran a 4.35 40-yard dash in winter testing and posted a 410-pound squat in preseason max outs.

THE TALL ONE

- Justin Harper (Jr., Catawba, N.C.) showed flashes of what coaches have seen in practice during last year's bowl game against Louisville. He caught two passes for 62 yards, including a big 33-yard touchdown in the comeback victory.
- He got his first career start against Georgia Tech and responded with a career-high 109 yards receiving on four catches. He got his second start at Boston College.
- Harper is a 6-4 player with 4.35 speed. He had a 47-yard touchdown catch against Cincy and is averaging 15.9 yards per catch. He has 20 catches for 318 yards this year.

THE BIG MEN UP FRONT

- There were several positions on offense that are big question marks for the Hokies, but perhaps the biggest is up front on the line. Three full-time starters, all of whom were in NFL training camps, and a fourth part-time starter are all gone, leaving new line coach Curt Newsome with quite a task.
- At this time last year, **Duane Brown** (r-Jr., Richmond, Va.) was still adjusting to his move from the No. 2 man at tight end to right tackle in the second week of preseason, a spot he hadn't played since his freshman year of high school. He ended up starting all 13 games and is now considered one of the best tackles in the league.
- This year, he has played 678 snaps with 22 knockdowns, grading out at 87 percent. At 6-5, 290 pounds, Brown has the size and athleticism to be a dominating and stable force on a young and inexperienced line.
- He's also a force on special teams as he's recorded four tackles on the year and blocked a field goal at Miami.
- Nick Marshman (r-So., Harrisonburg, Va.) has moved around on the line and is Brown's backup. He got his first career start at UNC and got the start against Kent State.
- Marshman is one of biggest players on the team at 6-5, 351 pounds and has been a standout in the weight room. He squatted 710 pounds in preseason testing, the second-best ever at Tech by any football player.
- At right guard, true freshman **Sergio Render** (Newnan, Ga.) was given the task of replacing All-ACC guard Jason Murphy.
- He played his best game of his career against Wake Forest, grading out at 90 percent with a team-high six knockdowns, earning ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week honors.
- He leads the team with 37 knockdowns and was named a first-team Freshman All-American by Rivals.com and Scout.com.
- Danny McGrath (r-Sr., Herndon, Va.) has started 18 games at center for his career. An intelligent player who handles the

- line's calls, McGrath graduated in three years from Virginia Tech and is close to earning his Master's degree.
- In the opener, he graded out at 90 percent, coming on 40 snaps and led the team with four knockdowns. On the season, he has played 679 offensive snaps, grading out at 84 percent with 34 knockdowns.
- Backing him up is Mason Baggett (Sr., Richmond, Va.), a walk-on who has earned the respect of his coaches and teammates with his hard work and dedication both on the field and in the weight room. He can also play guard.
- At left guard, senior **Brandon Gore** (Warrenton, Va.) moved into the starting spot with the injury to **Ryan Shuman** (r-So., Fork Union, Va.). Gore had been subbing in to give Render and Shuman breaks, but started the final four games of the regular season. On the year, he's played 352 offensive snaps.
- The loss of Shuman was a big one to a line that didn't have a lot of depth. Shuman had started the first eight games, playing 399 offensive snaps with nine knockdowns. He graded out at 95 percent in the win against Southern Miss. Shuman is expected back from the knee injury he suffered in the Clemson game for the bowl game.
- Brandon Holland (Fr., Roanoke, Va.) and Matt Welsh (r-So., Clifton, Va.) have gotten more reps at both guard spots and back up at both spots.
- Brandon Frye (r-Sr., Myrtle Beach, S.C.) is a tough player who hyperextended his right elbow in the opener and sat out the UNC game, although he could have played if needed. He sprained his ankle in the Miami game and missed the Kent State game, but returned to start against Wake Forest.
- Frye was unexpectedly thrust into the starting lineup for the Gator Bowl last year when Jimmy Martin, who had started 45 straight games, was hurt in one of the final pre-bowl practices. Frye responded, limiting All-American Elvis Dumervil (Lombardi and Nagurski Awards winner) to just two tackles.

REPRESENTIN' THE 757

- Bryan Stinespring, Jim Cavanaugh and Curt Newsome have made livings out of signing the best players to come out of the Hampton Roads area, also called the "757" for its area code.
- On defense alone, nine starters or key contributors come from the area, while three on offense and Tech's kicker call the 757 home.

HOME-GROWN TALENT

- Ten of the 11 starters on defense call Virginia home. The only scheduled starter not from Virginia is cornerback **Brandon Flowers**, who hails from Florida.
- Seven of the 11 scheduled starters on offense for the bowl game are from the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- In addition, both kickers punter Nic Schmitt (Salem) and kicker Brandon Pace (Virginia Beach) — as well as snappers Nick Leeson (Abingdon) and Scott King (Radford), are from the Commonwealth.
- Frye is a strong player who benched 485 pounds in preseason testing, the third-best mark in Tech football history. He also squatted 575 pounds and push jerked 360 pounds. He has played 551 offensive snaps this season.

YOUNG AND EAGER

- Tech's cornerback positions is manned by a group of youngsters eager to step in and carry on the tradition of defensive backfield excellence. In the past eight NFL Drafts, 11 Tech secondary players have been chosen, including Pro Bowler DeAngelo Hall of the Falcons.
- A pair of sophomore starters, along with a junior and two freshmen backing them up, make them the youngest cornerback group in the ACC.

FLOWERS POWER

- Brandon Flowers (r-So., Delray Beach, Fla.) took over at boundary corner for unanimous 2005 All-American Jimmy Williams and hasn't missed a beat.
- He got his first career start against Marshall last year, but made a big impression in the Gator Bowl. Coming in for an ejected Williams, Flowers posted two tackles, an interception and a pass break up in the win.
- This year, he has turned into one of the best corners in the league, posting three interceptions (including two against Miami), a forced fumble, 18 break-ups and 48 tackles (7.5 TFL, 3.5 sacks) on the year. He leads the league in passes defended with 21, earning All-American honors from the Associated Press.
- Flowers had the odd distinction of having a touchdown already as a redshirt freshman, before the first snap of the 2005 season. That's because Flowers returned an interception 38 yards for a score against Western Michigan, but broke his leg later that game. He sat out the rest of the season and was granted a medical redshirt.

MACHO MAN

- Perhaps no player since Kevin Jones generated as much buzz as an incoming freshman as Victor "Macho" Harris did last year. The Highland Springs, Va., native spent time mostly on special teams last year, blocking a punt against North Carolina, but has been counted on heavily this year as the No. 1 man at field corner.
- The sophomore was ranked the No. 1 player in the state by *The Roanoke Times* and rivals.com ranked him the No. 28 player in the nation, the No. 3 "athlete" in the nation and the No. 1 player in the state coming out of high school two years ago.
- The PARADE All-American scored a total of 70 touchdowns his final two seasons and chose Tech over Michigan, Virginia, Miami and USC.
- The story of his tumultuous December of 2004 is widely known. First, he suffered third-degree burns, on the day Tech head coach Frank Beamer and assistant Jim Cavanaugh were coming to his house for a recruiting

- visit, Dec. 15. Harris' mother, Maritza, was preparing a meal for the coaches, and a grease fire broke out in the kitchen while she was at the store. Harris put out the fire by throwing a quilt on the pan, but suffered burns in the process. He has small scars on his face, and skin grafts on his right forearm.
- Then, 10 days after Beamer's visit, five days after he committed to the Hokies, his mother fainted at home on Christmas Day and passed away at the hospital.
- He has a tattoo on his left forearm of an image of his mother and the words: "My angel. My reason. My mother." He also has a new tattoo on his neck that reads "Mama's Boy." Maritza Harris was 43.
- Against Cincinnati on Sept. 23, the day after what would have been his late mother's 45th birthday, he intercepted two passes, returning one 72 yards for a touchdown, earning him ACC Defensive Back of the Week honors. He has four picks on the year.
- He suffered a separated shoulder intercepting a pass in the Kent State game but returned to start against Wake Forest.

A MINOR INJURY, A MAJOR RETURN

- The Hokies were without the services of Roland Minor (r-Jr., Washington, D.C.) for the first four games as he healed from injuries sustained in a July car crash. He suffered a sprained right knee and right wrist and had surgery on the wrist Aug. 4, having several pins inserted and the wrist put in a cast. He returned for the Georgia Tech game.
- He has worked his way back in, breaking up a pass and recovering a fumble this year.
 He has continued to see more action as he has gotten back into the flow of the game. It's not a new spot for him as he started 12 games last year, intercepting three passes.

STEPPING IN

- With the injuries, true freshmen Stephan Virgil (Rocky Mount, N.C.) and former quarterback Kam Chancellor (Norfolk, Va.) have seen the field sooner than expected.
- Chancellor has been a pleasant surprise. He came into camp as a quarterback prospect, but made the move to cornerback just a few practices into his career. At 6-4, he brings good size to a position he's never played.
- Against North Carolina, he recorded his first collegiate interception.
- Chancellor earned a regular spot on special teams as he blocked several punts in the preseason. He has been moved to the No. 2 man at boundary corner behind Flowers with the return of Minor.
- Virgil enrolled at Tech in January and went through spring practice. He and Chancellor served as the top backup at corner until Minor returned from his injury.

SHIRTLESS

- Last season, Harris was the only true freshman to play for the Hokies. Already this season, seven true freshmen have seen action.
- Jason Adjepong (Carteret, N.J.), Nekos Brown (Brandywine, Md.), Kam Chancellor (Norfolk, Va.), Brandon Holland (Roanoke, Va.), Kenny Lewis, Jr. (Danville, Va.), Sergio Render (Newnan, Ga.) and Stephan Virgil (Rocky Mount, N.C.) have all seen action.
- * Render has started all 12 games, playing 688 total snaps (633 on offense). Chancellor has been in for 245 plays and intercepted a pass, while Adjepong played 66 snaps before injuring his shoulder and having season-ending surgery. Virgil has played 56 total snaps while Brown has been in for 230 total snaps. Lewis has rushed for two scores and 210 yards while Holland has played in three games.

• The Hokies scored seven touchdowns last season via returns (5 INT, 1 fumble, 1 blocked FG). Since the start of the 1999 season, Tech has 57 return touchdowns, one behind Miami.

A Tradition of Non-Offensive Scoring

Tech led the nation in 2003 by scoring 11 touchdowns via non-offensive means, just ahead of NC State and Miami's 10. Virginia Tech was second in 2004 with six touchdowns and tied for the national lead last year with seven non-offensive touchdowns.







THE NUMBERS GAME

- **3,163** ... career all-purpose yards for junior Eddie Royal average out to 14.4 yards gained each time he touches the football.
- **135** ... interceptions by Virginia Tech since the start of the 2000 season lead Division I-A.
- **128.2** ... average passing yards allowed by the Virginia Tech defense rank the Hokies first nationally in total defense.
- 95 ... wins by the Hokies over the past 10 seasons tie them with Michigan for the fourth most among Division I-A teams during that span, behind only Ohio State (97), Texas (96) and Boise State (96).
- 70 ... Tech players have scored touchdowns on defense or special teams during Frank Beamer's 20 seasons as head coach.
- **39** ... touchbacks on kickoffs by Tech kickers lead the ACC by a wide margin over second-place FSU and Virginia (21 each).
- **29 ...** combined points allowed by the Hokies during their current six-game winning streak.
- 18-19... the Hokies have scored on every trip but one inside the red zone during their current sixgame winning streak.
- 14 ... consecutive wins for the Hokies in games that they have blocked a kick.
- **12** ... Tech players have contributed sacks this season.
- 7 ... Tech players have caught passes of 40 yards or longer this season.
- 5 ... total rushing touchdowns allowed by Tech this season ... and also the total passing touchdowns allowed by the Hokies.
- 4 ... points senior kicker Brandon Pace needs to pass Carter Warley (307) for third place in career scoring at Tech.
- 1 ... Tech leads the nation in total defense, scoring defense and pass defense.

THE CAPTAIN'S SPOT

- The free safety spot is considered the captain of Tech's defense and two players have the coaches excited about the future of the position.
- D.J. Parker (Jr., Hampton, Va.) played cornerback two years ago, but made the move to free safety and started six games last season and all 12 this year.
- In preseason testing, he benched 340 pounds and power cleaned 304 pounds, both among the best for the defensive backs.
- Last year, he returned a blocked field goal 78 yards for a TD against Georgia Tech.
- He picked off a pass in the opener this year to stop a potential scoring drive and had three tackles against North Carolina. On the year, he has 40 tackles, two interceptions and six pass break ups.
- Cam Martin (r-Fr., Martinsville, Va.) was scheduled to be the top backup, but missed the opener after undergoing a second surgery to repair a hernia. He returned to play in the North Carolina game, seeing his first collegiate action.

ROVER DUTIES

- + Aaron Rouse (r-Sr., Virginia Beach, Va.) passed up the NFL Draft to return to Tech and lead a young defense. At 6-4, 227 pounds, Rouse is known as one of the hardest hitters in the league and is considered one of the top safeties in the nation.
- Rouse made his presence known at NC State last year in his first start, intercepting two passes, breaking up two passes, forcing a fumble and recording eight tackles to earn ACC Defensive Back of the Week honors. He also had two interceptions and eight tackles at Virginia in addition to 13 tackles against fifth-ranked Miami.
- He totaled 77 tackles, including 4.5 for loss, last year and led the team with four interceptions.
- He had six stops and a PBU against Northeastern while recording six tackles, including one for a loss, and an interception at North Carolina. He has 51 stops this year.
- Cary Wade (r-Sr., Fairfax, Va.) has started two games this year. He's a reliable player who has seen extensive action over his career and has the complete confidence of the coaches when he's in the game.
- Wade blocked a punt against Northeastern, setting up a Tech touchdown. He recorded five tackles and forced and recovered a fumble at North Carolina. He had six tackles against Boston College and has 36 this year.

WHIP IT GOOD

- Brenden Hill (r-Sr., Hampton, Va.) won the battle at the whip backer position after a solid preseason camp.
- He's had big shoes to fill as he replaced James Anderson, who was as steady and reliable as they come. Anderson was drafted by the Carolina Panthers.
- Hill is at his fourth position, seeing previous action at wide receiver, safety, cornerback and now whip linebacker. He brings good size at 6-2 and is athletic enough to be good in coverage and against the run.
- Against North Carolina, he had three tackles, but sealed the victory with a 69-yard interception return for a touchdown, both firsts for his career. He has 49 tackles, including 6.5 for loss and 2.5 sacks, six pass break ups and two interceptions this year.

- Corey Gordon (r-Jr., Gainesville, Fla.) has fought off several injuries in his career, but is now helping out on special teams. He led all whips with a 350-pound bench press in preseason testing, along with a 495-pound squat and a 290-pound power clean.
- Brothers **Chad** (Sr.) and **Cody Grimm** (r-Fr.) are a pair of walk-ons who play special teams. The Fairfax, Va., natives are the sons of NFL Pro Bowler Russ Grimm, who is in his sixth season as the Steelers' offensive line coach and is also the assistant head coach.

MONSTERS OF THE MAROON

- How good has Tech's defense been this season? Consider the following:
- During Tech's last six games, the defense has scored two touchdowns, while allowing its six opponents (including No. 10 Clemson, No. 14 Wake Forest and Miami) a combined total of two TDs.
- On the season, Tech's D has produced four touchdowns, two via fumble return and two via interception return.
 - They've posted four shutouts.
- They've allowed just 29 points in the last six games, a mark not achieved at Tech since the 1938 season.
- After allowing only six points and 551 yards over the last three games, the Hokies lead the nation in total defense (221.1), passing defense (128.2) and scoring defense (9.3).
- Tech leads the ACC in six defensive categories.
- Tech has held 31 of its last 37 opponents to under 300 yards of total
- Over the last seven games, the Hokies have allowed only 85.2 yards per game rushing.
- The Hokies lead the nation in total defense (221.1) and are bidding to become the first team since Oklahoma in 1986-1987, and sixth all-time, to lead the NCAA in total defense in back-to-back seasons.
- Linebacker Vince Hall leads the ACC in tackles with 115 for an average of 9.6 per game. Cornerback Brandon Flowers is the ACC leader in passes broken up (18) and total passes defended (21), while linebacker Xavier Adibi is tied for the league lead in fumbles caused.









BOOK (DEFENSIVE) ENDS

- A mix of old and new faces have continued the dominant Hokie pass rush that has always been a staple piece of defensive coordinator **Bud Foster**'s defenses.
- Redshirt junior **Chris Ellis** (Hampton, Va.) is a physical specimen at 6-5, 260 pounds and took over for Darryl Tapp, who is now with the Seahawks.
- Last year against Georgia Tech, he picked off a Reggie Ball pass and raced 29 yards for his first collegiate touchdown. He had 41 tackles, including 9.5 for loss, last year.
- He missed the 2006 Georgia Tech game due to a violation of team policy, but has since returned. He has 35 tackles on the year, including 7.5 for loss and 3.5 sacks.
- Getting the start against Georgia Tech at the "stud" end was **Orion Martin** (r-So., Martinsville, Va.). Martin walked onto the squad last year after spending a semester at Norfolk State and one semester at Hargrave Military Academy.
- He made quite an impression in the 2005 spring game, posting a game-high seven tackles, including 3.5 for a loss and two sacks.
 He was given the Paul Torgersen Award as the top newcomer and earned a scholarship shortly after.

- So far this year, he has 27 tackles, including 1.5 for loss and a sack, as well as 12 quarterback hurries.
- Redshirt senior Noland Burchette (Richmond, Va.), who is the starter at the "end" position, has turned into one of the team's most consistent performers. Last year, he had 25 tackles, including 4.0 tackles for loss and three sacks, a forced fumble and fumble recovery.
- He had six tackles, including one for a loss, in the win at UNC, and has 43 stops this year, including 6.5 for loss and 2.5 sacks. He plucked a fumble out of the air against Kent State and returned it 15 yards for a touchdown.
- Burchette's now-famous "Game 7" speech, given after the loss at Boston College, has been widely credited by the team for turning the season around.
- Nekos Brown (Fr., Brandywine, Md.) made the move from linebacker to defensive end after the North Carolina game and has seen a lot of time on special teams and at end.

CP AND FRIENDS

• The defensive tackle spot is anchored by redshirt junior **Carlton Powell** (Chesapeake, Va.). Powell was a spot starter last year, splitting time with Tim Sandidge. But he's healthy and has been the main cog in a line that

- needs to put pressure on the quarterback to help out a young secondary.
- Powell had five stops, including two for loss, at UNC. He has 37 tackles, including 6.5 for loss and 2.5 sacks, on the season.
- He is backed up by **Kory Robertson** (r-Jr., Martinsville, Va.). Robertson, who the coaches are looking for consistency from, played in 11 games last year, mostly on special teams. At 6-2, 339 pounds, he could be a productive run stopper for Tech.
- He blocked a field goal against Northeastern to preserve the shutout.
- After an excellent preseason, **Barry Booker** (r-Jr., Amherst, Va.) emerged as the top guy at the tackle position. He has shown flashes of being a contributor and has stepped up his play this year.
- Booker (6-4, 280) had three tackles, including one for loss, and a PBU at UNC. Against Cincinnati, he recorded a career-high 10 tackles, including 2.5 for loss, and has 49 tackles on the year.
- Cordarrow Thompson (r-Fr., Stafford, Va.) struggled with his weight a year ago while redshirting, but is now at 6-2, 334 pounds and has contributed this year, earning the No. 2 spot at tackle. He has 14 tackles, including two sacks, on the season.

CALL 9-11

- The linebacking duo of No. 9 Vince Hall and No. 11 Xavier Adibi team up to give Tech a pair of outstanding athletes manning the middle.
- Hall (r-Jr., Chesapeake, Va.) has started the last 37 games at the mike position and was named a first-team All-ACC linebacker this year. The only game he hasn't started in his career was his first game, against No. 1 USC in the 2004 season opener.
- Last year, he led the team with 112 tackles and earned ACC Defensive Lineman of the Week honors two times.
- Hall has a team- and ACC-leading 115 stops on the year, including a career-high 15 against Kent State.
- Adibi (r-Jr., Hampton, Va.) started all 13 games last year at the backer position and has started 25 games in a row.
- He led the Hokies with eight tackles at UNC and had an interception, which he returned 40 yards to set up Tech's first score.

- He is second on the team with 78 tackles, including four for loss, and has three picks this year and six for his career. He returned a fumble 35 yards at Wake Forest for a score.
- In each of the last three conference games, he's made a game-changing play: interception that led to the winning touchdown late vs. Miami, the fumble return for a score at Wake Forest and a forced fumble to set up Tech's first touchdown against Virginia.

GETTIN' THEIR KICKS

- Brandon Pace (r-Sr., Virginia Beach, Va.) handles the place-kicking duties. The former walk-on he earned a scholarship last preseason gets quick height on the ball. Last year, he was 19-for-22 on FGs with a long of 45 yards and was also 51-for-52 on PATs.
- He is 34-for-36 on PATs this year and is 17-for-18 on field goals, including two 42-yarders. He missed a 47-yarder against Virginia, ending his school-record streak at 22 straight makes going back to last year.

- For his career, he's also at 85.1 percent (57-of-67), which is currently second all-time in NCAA history with a minimum of 55 attempts. He is behind John Lee of UCLA, who made 85.9 percent (79-of-92) of his kicks from 1982-1985.
- With his last PAT in the Gator Bowl, he set the single-season school scoring record for a kicker (108) and earned first-team All-ACC honors in 2004. Pace is a three-time Lou Groza semifinalist, making the cut again this year.
- Nic Schmitt (r-Sr., Salem, Va.) is a lefty who can boom the ball and also is a demon in the weight room. He has earned Super Iron Hokie honors in the weight room and holds the position record in the squat (605), hang clean (331), push jerk (360) and power clean (360). His power clean mark is the 10th-best in program history.
- Last year, he was named one of 10 semifinalists for the Ray Guy Award and earned ACC Specialist of the Week honors for his work against UNC.
- He is averaging 41.8 yards on 57 punts this year with a long of 58 yards and 15 downed inside the 20.
- His career average of 42.4 yards on 110 punts currently stands as the career school record, ahead of George Roberts' 41.8-yard average set in 1976-77.
- At 6-2, 276 pounds, Schmitt isn't your prototypical punter. He also is an outstanding bowler who frequents the New River Valley Superbowl and even formed a team in a league with several players. Schmitt consistently bowls games over 200 and had a 298 game in 2004.
- For the 12th consecutive year, Tech's punter is a left-footer. Starting with John Thomas (1995), through Jimmy Kibble (1996-1999), Robert Peaslee (2000) and Vinnie Burns (2001-2004), Schmitt is carrying on the strong tradition established by the southpaws before him, even earning *Playboy* All-America honors this preseason.
- Jared Develli (Jr. Sterling, Va.) is handling the kickoff duties once again. He's had 35 touchbacks on 57 kickoffs this year. The former walk-on earned a scholarship last preseason.
- Brent Bowden (r-Fr., Centreville, Va.), the brother of former Florida State punter Chris Hall, serves as Schmitt's backup.

Now in its 42nd season as an arena of collegiate football competition, Lane Stadium/Worsham Field has gone through numerous changes, renovations and additions. But through it all, it has always been regarded as one of the finest places to watch — and toughest places for opponents to play — a college football game.

In the summer of 2003, \$1.9 million was raised to fund the ongoing planning of the west side expansion. That money allowed for the ground breaking of the west side project, which will is now completed. This project marks the third of a three-phase project at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.


Ground was broken in November, 2004 and crews began building around the current press box, laying the above and below ground

settings, as well as removing the two light towers on that side of the stadium.

Following the completion of the 2004 season, the old press box was removed completely and the structure was filled in to match the new structure.

The new press area on the west side highlights the media's needs, along with a dining area and improved overall facilities.

In addition, the fencing that surrounds the stadium has been removed and the area on the west side exterior of the newly renovated stadium has been landscaped with walkways and a weekday parking lot for ticket patrons, Hall of Fame and Hokie Club visitors.
