Southern California has a large number of U.S. Open Badminton Championships to its credit, far more than any other area. With the wonderful weather, more than its fair share of entertainment, the beautiful Pacific Ocean readily available, the neon fascination of Hollywood and any type of food you might want, California seems to have it all. Why wouldn't badminton players want to visit this area again and again? California also boasts large populations from nearly every nation who are aware of this fine sport.

The first time Southern California launched into the international event was 1955 when Long Beach played host. It was an exciting time for the Southern California badminton community. Most either worked at that Open, or played; and everyone watched.

The flavor of the 1955 event left the community wanting more, and Long Beach again hosted the tournament in 1961. In 1968 the venue moved a few miles to Fullerton for another Open.

Since 1937, there has been a national championship held in the United States. The national became international in 1954, when athletes from outside the United States were invited to compete. Some years, just a few came from outside the country, other years there were terrific entries from touring countries. Nearly always, there has been loyal support for the tournament from Mexico and Canada.

Some questions were raised over the years that the tournament would not allow the best American players to be crowned if international players competed. For a period of years there was a combination - just a closed event, just an open event, or both - leading to a mixed array of tournament records. At one point there were no U.S. Open's for several years.

In Manhattan Beach, California, in 1979, Wes Schoppe organized an international event which was successful enough to be repeated the following year and continued into the early 1980's. Since the United States had not hosted a U.S. Open since 1976, the success of the California event led to negotiations to rename Schoppe's annual tournament the new U.S. Open. For the next five

years Manhattan Beach Badminton Club continued to host the event.

The venue changed in 1988 to Ambassador College in Pasadena, California, with Chris Kincard at the helm. The move was a decision made by the United States Badminton Association to enlarge the potential audience with more seating and more courts.

The 1990's began with a move to the Bren Center at the University of California - Irvine with event director Paisan Rangsikitpho. The purse was now enlarged and new sponsors brought in. The large facility provided plenty of space for a variety of booths and full-time medical assistance.

After stops at Loyola Marymount and the University of California - Los Angeles in 1993 and 1994, the U.S. Open traveled outside California for the first time in 1995. As part of preparations for the 1996 Summer Olympic Games in Atlanta, the 1995 Open was held at Georgia State University.

Less than two months after the successful Olympics, the U.S. Open returned not only to California, but to a brand new facility. The Orange County Badminton Club had just been dedicated earlier that summer. The OCBC was the largest, most modern and most complete badminton facility in the Western Hemisphere.

The 1996 tournament was also historic because of the sponsorship by the Hong Ta Shan Group, whose support provided a \$200,000 prize purse, the largest prize fund ever for a badminton tournament in the United States. In 1997, the Hong Ta Shan Group once again sponsored the six-star \$200,000 U.S. Open.

1998 saw the economic collapse of the Asian economy. Sponsorship difficulties caused many Grand Prix tournaments to reduce their prize purse or to cancel completely. Although the 1998 U.S. Open was reduced to a one-star IBF tournament, the competition was fierce with four of the five final events going three games.

The 2006 U.S. Open returns to OCBC for the tenth year with a \$30,000 prize purse sponsored by Yonex Corporation, the Orange County Badminton Club, and K & D Graphics. 129 players will compete for the five prestigius US Open titles.

The OCBC/Yonex Senior International is the only tournament in the United States to offer a combined age doubles format. Instead of events based on an individual's age, the ages of the doubles team members are added together to qualify them for an event (even months and days are used to calculate the sum of a team's total age).

Variety is the spice of life and with the combined age doubles system, unusual partnerships are bound to occur. For instance, a 35 year-old player can team up with a 65 year-

old partner and compete in the 100+ combined doubles event. The only individual requirement is that the player must be at least the age of 35. Men's doubles, women's doubles and mixed doubles all compete under this format in 80+, 90+, 100+, 110+, 120+ and 130+ age divisions.

Singles competition retains the regular tournament format. There's nothing you can change. Singles divisions are offered to players who are 40+, 45+, 50+, 55+, 60+ and 70+ ages.
