Synopsis

Jamie is 11 years old and inseparable from the father he adores, Charlie. It's September, the schools are back and after a summer away together, Charlie and Jamie settle into life on a sink estate and at a bog standard comprehensive. But it's only temporary — Charlie is leading a double life. He's got big plans and one last secret mission to complete.

Soon things take a menacing turn, Charlie's on edge all the time: Who is following them? Watching them? Listening in on phone calls? His main contact, Mr Skinner/Fisher Jamie overhears a tense conversation between him and Charlie – Charlie is scared for Jamie, dark forces are out to get them. They've got to be careful and Charlie has to know Jamie is safe. Jamie won't stay with Ernie and Lilly – he loves them – they love him but it's boring. Charlie is exciting, dangerous. Just one last job, Charlie promises and then it's off to a new life in America.

Unavoidably the mission spills into Jamie's life. His journeys to school and back are ones of counter espionage identifying who are MI5 and who are the enemy agents. Normality seems to continue – school everyday but Jamie can't (or won't) make friends so Charlie gives him a mission. There has got to be at least one cool kid in the school, Jamie has got to find that kid and make a friend. He spots Richie, quiet, clever, artistic and bullied by Dean and his gang. When Dean overhears Jamie mimicking his rude boy ways he wallops him and that's too much for Charlie. He's mad as hell that someone hurt his boy and tells Jamie he has to get tough and next time crack Dean before he knows what's happening. No matter how much he hates fighting, Jamie has to be tough for both their sakes. Next day he stands up to Dean and baffles him with words, much to his own and Richie's amusement.

When he gets home, Charlie is chuffed and tells him he has a mission for him to carry out on his BMX. Silently, to avoid the 'listeners' Charlie shows Jamie where to go and sends him off with a map and a letter to deliver. Jamie's confident - high from humiliating Dean and sets off. Once the drop is completed he meets Charlie at the Angel Hotel rendezvous. Jamie is like a miniature of his dad — as he heads for the room he hides from passers by and creates diversions to ensure he's not being followed. When they meet up Charlie tells him, that's it — job done and a £2million quid payday is around the corner. Everything will be sorted at the last meet with Mr Skinner — they leave for America tonight.

But Jamie can't leave without saying goodbye to Ernie and Lilly – he knows that they cannot know anything about Charlie's mission and bout America so the sadness of the goodbye is unbearable as Ernie and Lilly sense that everything is not what it seems. They exchange anxious glances and are not re-assured by Charlie.

Charlie and Jamie head for the Paradise Club to meet Mr Skinner. Charlie is high on adrenaline and happily throws himself around on the dancefloor, oblivious to everyone, with Jamie as his chaperone. The midnight hour strikes but apparent

disaster does too because Mr Skinner doesn't appear. Jamie is horrified that Charlie's response is to down a bottle of vodka and they're still in the club when the cleaners start.

The next morning it's the hangover from hell for Charlie and Jamie still desperately trying to find something real to cling onto. They go back to the Pad and Ernie turns up, anxious to check they are okay.

Now Jamie's reality is starting to distort – Charlie seems to be retreating from the real world, is he talking to himself or, as he claims, to HQ via the microphones planted in the Pad? He picks Jamie and Richie up from school and seems to be becoming more and more eccentric. Things are starting to unravel, for the first time ever Jamie questions Charlie, he gets no answers and doubt and realisation is seeping into every pore. Finally, he can take no more and runs frantically to Mr Skinner's in search of answers.

Mr Skinner tells him everything – the realisation is too much for Jamie and he has to get away from his father. He asks Ernie if he can move back in but there's a tussle when Jamie goes back for his bag and the only way Jamie can calm Charlie down is by re-assuring him that he knows Ernie is working for the 'other side' and he's only moving back in to find out what's going on and regain their imaginary £2million. Jamie manages to calm his father down.

Next day at school though the challenge comes again from Dean but this time there's enough rage in Jamie and as soon as Dean dares mention his father – CRACK – he's out for the count. Jamie runs to tell his dad he did it – this time he was a tough cookie but Charlie has gone from bad to worse and starts to crack up in front of Jamie. He gives Charlie comfort and holds him close but then decides to take control of his father's life for him. His father needs him now and Jamie rises to the challenge and brings in the help Charlie needs.

Ultimately Jamie realises Charlie is not the person he thought he was. He is living in his own reality and Jamie is going to have to accept him on those terms and love him just the same for it.

Director's Statement

I've been burning to tell this story all my adult life. It is personal, exploring the special relationship I shared with my late father. This is my funny, heartfelt, fast-paced, adrenalin-rushed coming of age film.

This bleakly comic world will be perceived through Jamie's eyes. Jamie heroworships his father Charlie, but as the film progresses and Jamie grows older, he comes to understand that his father is occupying a quite different reality. As the twists and turns of Jamie and Charlie's relationship intensify, their flat becomes physically distorted, while in the world outside, perceived enemies lurk around every corner. The film will feel like an urban nightmare but shot like a dream.

I Know You Know is a film about growing up, finding out who you are, how life works, and how to operate it.

It is also a film about love.

CHARLIE AND JAMIE are a real double act. Jamie copies Charlie with his actions, his mannerisms, the way he walks, the way he conducts himself, and his body language. When Charlie cricks his fingers, so does Jamie. When Charlie smokes a cigarette, Jamie sucks on a lollypop! They even think in sync. They are inseparable, even though Charlie is on a secret and dangerous mission. As this mission unravels, Jamie will start to go his own way more grow into his own person.

JAMIE is a funny mix of innocence and naivety, yet he's smart and streetwise. When this assignment is over, Jamie thinks their lives will be transformed forever. Initially Jamie feels protected by Charlie, but as his understanding deepens he becomes the protector, even when his own father thinks Jamie is the enemy. We will search for a real kid that can embody the special qualities that make up the complexities that is Jamie.

Jamie and his classmates will be full of energy and excitement for the future, unspoilt kids, working class, real and funny. But at school we will see what Jamie sees: hundreds of swarming rowdy potential bullies, all sorts of shapes and sizes and ethnic mix – reminiscent of my own memories of school in Cardiff. These scenes will be largely hand held to create a sense of overwhelming chaos.

CHARLIE lives in his own reality – an undercover agent, always on an important mission, always on the move. Life for Charlie is highly charged and on the edge. He is unpredictable, explosive, yet kind hearted and fiercely protective of his Jamie. This makes his collapse from reality all the more poignantly comic.

In the run down streets of Cardiff, THE FLAT is a temporary refuge for Jamie and Charlie, who wait for the fulfilment of their mission and a better life. Jamie

transforms his room to reflect his hopes and dreams with strong bright colours, boyish posters and his obsession with rockets. As Jamie and Charlie's life crumbles, so does the flat. A ripped socket, a broken hi-fi. Along with Jamie we are watching and wondering if the flat is shrinking or if it is our imagination. Eventually, the flat disintegrates until there is nothing left. The more tragic it becomes, the funnier it will be.

Outside the flat THE STREETS are completely deserted. It's just Jamie and Charlie left in this world of semi-derelict, crumbling buildings, waste rubbish, and paranoia. On the streets, reality can be distorted. Street lamps will flicker to their own pulse. Slow-motion will enhance Jamie's awareness of potential threat. Whereas shooting from a helicam following Jamie racing on his BMX will create the energy needed for the more exhilarating sequences. Other shots will look down from high building as we follow Charlie's mini. The camera will be a voyeuristic expression of Jamie and Charlie's paranoia.

I will use a lot of reflections of people in windows whilst shooting through mirrors, doorways, windows and cars creating a sense of spying for an audience.

The film is set in THE EIGHTIES and Charlie and Jamie are rocketing towards the American Dream. While wealth, riches and material gains seduce, satellites, radio waves and Reagan's Star Wars, make the world an uneasy place.

Statement on filming I know you Know from Robert Carlyle.

I was attracted to the project because of the script. In fact it was all about the script - it's a beautiful script. It came at the right time as my father had died eighteen months earlier. Like Jamie, I was also brought up just me and my dad so I recognised the tightness of the bond between the two of them it creates. I rediscovered things about my own father in the script and the filming.

Being a true story makes it more relevant. I loved *Human Traffic*, it's the epitome of the rave movement and I wondered what had happened to Justin since. When we met there was an immediate bond because of the pain about our fathers. I admired that he stuck with this project so long. Justin is coming from the right place to tell this story, as it is a tribute to his father. It's a wonderful thing to honour his father and it is good for me to interpret that.

I set out to make the best job for Justin. He gave good guidance. It was difficult to play his father while he was directing himself as a kid. He'd lived it which remained paramount in my mind throughout. The love that Charlie has for Jamie is what makes the film work. I have two sons and a girl of my own which helped me play Charlie. It would have been different without that, less honest.

When we told Arron he had got the part I also told him that Sally, the producer, had given me my first part in a film. *Riff Raff* was both of our first films. I've done a lot of stuff with kids — I enjoy it. They humble you. When they are at ease it blows you away. Kids are more natural, they don't have to consciously strip all the acting out. It keeps you grounded. Arron is a good one. We got on very well. We talked about everything and he responded to me. In the end the whole crew was like a father to him.

The hardest part was getting the accent right. The Welsh accent is the hardest in Britain. I was very aware of getting it right. I had tones of Burton and Hopkins in my head but in the end I went for a more neutral tone with some Welsh vowels. I listened to a recording of the real Mr Fisher and Uncle Ernie – recorded just after Justin's father's death. To hear the story through the notes of the people who loved him was an incredible experience. I think its made it a rich and truthful film.

Interviews with other cast and crew members

Arron Fuller as "Jamie."

Arron Fuller is thirteen and I Know You Know is his first acting role.

Arron: "I like Justin and I get on with him really well. It's a bit weird because I am being him because it's his story about him. And it's a bit sad too because the real Charlie has passed away.

We do drama classes at school and I like them and I have always wanted to be an actor and be on the telly like Arnold Schwarzenegger. When my teacher came up to me and asked me if I wanted to audition for a film with Robert Carlyle in it, I didn't know who he was. But then I saw a picture of him and straight away I recognised his face.

I went for an audition and I got down to the final lot. Then when they told me I was going to play Jamie I just went NUTS!

I learnt the script by just keep reading it in the morning and then again later on. I can remember it all but I think I got the part because I can cry. I don't know why but I can just make myself cry. I really like doing this film but while I'm here I have to do schoolwork. I hate that.

I like really working with Bobby. At first I felt embarrassed but now I just think of him as Charlie. I think Jamie should live with Charlie because he's his Dad and he loves him and he shouldn't go and live with Ernie and Lilly. But when Charlie goes nuts I think he has to go and live with them then.

The best bit about doing this film was that I got to drive the car. I sat with Bobby and put my foot on the accelerator and I steered the car towards the cameraman. That was brilliant! There weren't any worst bits. Except when I had a cold.

I'd definitely want to do it again. I want to be the next Robert Carlyle!"

I Know Your Know training programme

As with many of Parallax's films, on *I Know You Know* we wanted to offer a training scheme where young people could gain experience in their chosen area within film making. In particular we wanted to give an opportunity to those who otherwise would not have the chance to work in film. For example, people of different backgrounds, different ethnic minorities and different classes.

Together with the Film Agency for Wales and Inclusion through Media, an Equal Project, we devised a structured scheme providing nine places. Each trainee assistant would be assigned to a specific department for the duration of the shoot with a structured support system alongside them. The aim was for the trainees to develop their skills and understanding of their chosen department and a training mentor and gain first had experience of their chosen craft and discipline.

The Parallax training scheme is slightly different as it aims to develop young people who are on the whole people that have been traditionally under-represented or exclude from the mainstream film industry eg. Women, young people from minority ethnic groups, disabled people or people from low-income backgrounds. Through developing this diverse team we aimed to network them into the wider film practice, providing them with the ladder of opportunity.

The areas in which we sought the trainees to participate were the following:

- Camera
- Lighting
- Sound
- Art
- Production
- Floor
- Editing

With help from the Swansea Institute based CIRIC (Creative Industries Research and Innovation Centre) to whom we are extremely grateful we were able to recruit all the trainees needed on the film for which the competition was fierce! All of the trainees that participated on the film were highly professional, motivated and creative individuals. We wish them all luck in the future and feel sure that that they will go far in their chosen careers.
