Dore was in the county of Derbyshire until 1934. Under the Sheffield Extension Act of 1933 (which came into operation on 1 April 1934) Dore was incorporated in the city of Sheffield.

# Church registers and records, monumental (gravestone) inscriptions and cemeteries

The parish of Dore was formed out of the ancient parish of Dronfield in 1844. Dore and Totley townships were constituted one ecclesiastical district in 1844 but in January 1878, a portion together with a part of Norton was made a separate ecclesiastical district called Abbeydale and in 1924 Totley was constituted a separate ecclesiastical parish.

Diocese of Sheffield, faculties from 1914 onwards (which detail changes made to Anglican church buildings)

Dore was in the Diocese of Lichfield until 1884, when it became part of the newlyestablished Diocese of Southwell. The parish was subsequently transferred to the Diocese of Derby on its formation in 1927, and, at the time of the creation of the county of South Yorkshire in 1974, Dore was transferred to the Diocese of Sheffield.

#### Clubs, Societies and Charities

#### Courts

The Magistrates Court (or Petty Sessions court) records deal mainly with minor offences and licensing the sale and consumption of liquor. Records of the Sheffield Division cover the borough and City of Sheffield and records of Upper Strafforth and Tickhill Division of the West Riding of Yorkshire cover areas outside the borough such as Handsworth, Ecclesfield and Bradfield, c. 1870 - 1976. (Sheffield Archives: MC)

There are also records of the Court of Quarter Sessions from 1880. (Sheffield Archives: QS)

#### **Electoral Registers and Poll Books**

Sometimes known as Burgess Rolls or voters' lists, in essence, electoral rolls are lists of people that are entitled to vote. The Sheffield Local Studies Library has a comprehensive collection from 1841 onwards. #### **Family and Estate Records**

There may be records of landed families such as title deeds, leases, surveys, accounts etc.

For example, copy of Articles of Agreement between Christopher Pegge and the Duke of Newcastle, by which Pegge agrees to sell the Manor of Dore [Derbyshire] in mortgage to Mr Cradock, 30 Oct 1704 (Sheffield Archives: BM/1010)

There may be further records available at both <u>Derbyshire Record Office</u> and Sheffield Archives.

#### **Hospitals**

Sheffield Archives has records from over 50 hospitals, including annual reports, photographs and administrative records.

As Dore was in Derbyshire until 1934 older records will be at <u>Derbyshire Record</u> Office.

#### Land, Building and Property Records

The Local Studies Library has a collection of sale particulars (often with plans) dating from the late 18<sup>th</sup> century; for instance, there is a sale plan for 'Valuable Agricultural Estate' at Dore 'easily adaptable to Gentleman's Country Residence with two small trout streams' (Eadon and Lockwood, 1930) (Sheffield Local Studies Library: 21 October 1930). In addition there are a few planning applications from Norton Rural District Council which included Dore (Sheffield Archives: CA208a-b), as well as Sheffield City Council (Sheffield Archives: CA206), etc. There may also be planning applications at Derbyshire Record Office.

There are also deeds to properties and records of land valuations which detail owners and occupiers at Sheffield Archives. For example: Lease of land by John Ward of Dore, Derbyshire, yeoman, to Richard Shemeld of Sheffield, ironmonger of a leadmill or smelting house at or near Dore with all drains, dams, goytes, water, watercourses, weirs, shuttles, easements etc. 27 Jan 1626/7 (Sheffield Archives: MD6282)

A search of the Archives and Local Studies online catalogues and the card indexes may reveal more relevant entries.

As Dore was in Derbyshire until 1934 some land, building and property records may be at <u>Derbyshire Record Office</u>.

#### Maps

There are large-scale maps of the Sheffield area from 1853 to the present day. Comprehensive coverage of Sheffield and partial coverage of the surrounding areas is available at Sheffield Local Studies Library. Sheffield Archives has incomplete historic coverage of most of South Yorkshire. As Dore was in Derbyshire County and Norton Rural District until 1934 records of the poor law and local government will be available at both <u>Derbyshire Record Office</u> and Sheffield Archives.

#### **Schools**

Sheffield Archives has records from over 200 schools, including admission registers and head teachers' log books (diaries). For instance admission registers of Dore Primary School, 1965 - 2000 (Acc. 2009/129) and The Microcosm (formerly Dore and Totley High School Magazine), 1963 – 1964; 1965 – 1966 (Sheffield Local Studies Library: 373.4251 S). Information on archaeological sites and ancient monuments is held by the <u>South</u> Yorkshire Archaeology Service's Sites and Monuments Record.
