National Register of Historic Places Continuation Sheet

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The Elizabeth Kunkel House was built in 1907 and is located on U.S. Route #11, 2.4 miles north of Martinsburg, West Virginia. It is situated on the west side of the road above a gently sloping lawn. The house is at the top of the rise with all outbuildings in the rear yard. All buildings are in excellent condition.

The two-story, gable roofed house is an "L" shape of Late Victorian Gothic design and measures forty feet across the front by fifty feet deep. It is built of novelty siding on a stone foundation. The one-story, three-bay entrance porch has a hip roof over Tuscan columns with no balustrade. The double doors of the main entrance both have a single vertical glass panel and are highlighted by a full width transom. The exterior door and window trim is reeded and all fenestration has the open triangular pediment of the period, a very nice effect. Two projecting, gabled bay windows flank the entrance porch. Both gablets have a full cornice pediment with returns. The tympanum is shingled in an imbricated pattern with small 1/1 double-hung sash windows with peaked pediment, rather fanciful. The shingle pattern is repeated on a course between the first and second story of the bay windows. All windows are 1/1 double hung sash and all have shutters except those on the front facade.

On the north side is a two-tiered recessed porch with pantries. The balustrade is intact behind the screening. Over the basement doors is a small, hip-roofed frame foyer type entrance, an addition for moisture protection.

The plan of the house features a central hall with one room on each side. These are large, spacious, sunlit rooms, twenty-five feet by twenty feet. The ell is two rooms deep. In the hall, the main entrance is flanked by panelled, double pocket doors that lead to the living room and parlor. The trim in the hall is finely decorative and is symmetrically molded with tall rounded corner blocks. The hall is "L" shaped and the main stair is located in the back ell, behind the parlor, and consists of a two-flight, open-well stair with turned balustrade and a single newel of heavy Gothic design. The newel has two vertical panels and a carved sunburst on each side, and a heavy cap.

There are only two fireplaces in the house, one in the living room and one in the kitchen. The mantel in the living room is a very heavy Gothic piece with the bed moldings projecting over the cartouche, decorative applied panels on the frieze, end blocks, and heavy shaped pilasters. Also in this room is a handsome two-tiered, double, panelled door built-in corner cupboard. Between this room and the kitchen is a large pantry with built-in cupboards.

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On the second floor, there are two large bedrooms with bay windows in the front; an arched entry leads from the main hall to the ell where there are closets and a single bedroom. This room has plainer trim and a winder staircase with a board-and-batten door that leads to the attic.

Three subsidiary buildings stand behind the house. These include an early 20th century frame smokehouse (contributing), an early 20th century frame storage building (contributing), and a noncontributing 2-bay frame garage that is less than fifty years of age.

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The Elizabeth Kunkel House meets Criterion C of the National Register because it is a rare and significant example of Late Victorian Gothic rural domestic architecture in Berkeley County.

The Kunkel farm was part of a tract of land that had belonged to Henry St. George Tucker. In 1864, 145 acres was sold to W.W. Rutherford of Pennsylvania. Elizabeth Kunkel was his daughter and she inherited the farm in 1886. She resided in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania, and, at her death in 1917, the Kunkel farm passed to her grandson John Kunkel. She also bequeathed \$1,000.00 to the Dauphine County Historical Society of Pennsylvania, among other generous bequests. John Kunkel sold lots from part of the farm after World War I as a residential development that is known as Kunkel's Addition. Kunkel was among the first to develop land on the north side of Martinsburg. Today "Berkeley Plaza," the major shopping center in the county, is located on part of this farm. Kunkel was instrumental in beginning the development of this area of the county.

The Elizabeth Kunkel House is an excellent example Victorian Gothic (1907) rural domestic architecture. Berkeley County has some examples of fine Victorian era domestic architecture in the city of Martinsburg but examples are very rare in the rural areas. Most farms in area have pre-Civil War period houses and only occasionally, rarely in fact, is there a Victorian period farmhouse. Because of the far greater numbers of examples of pre-Civil War architecture, Victorian architecture is not much appreciated. It is deemed to be not old enough and therefore alterations, particularly removal of the front porch and panelling the rooms, is almost always done. Removing the front porch is intended to make the house appear more classical, more like area pre-Civil War houses. The Kunkel House has not been altered significantly and it is an excellent representative of its period and style. It is also located in a busy and visible area and the house and outbuildings have a certain amount of visual impact on passers-by on U.S. Route #11. It is hoped that, by recognition of Victorian era rural architecture, appreciation of this period and style will help preserve and perhaps encourage restoration of these few, but deserving, period dwelling


The Kunkel House is a tall, skillfully carpentered residence featuring two steeply pitched Gothic dormers containing tall Gothic windows. These dormers surmount three-sided, two-story bays that are faced in combinations of novelty siding and imbricated wood shingles. These features, in addition to the superb woodwork of the interior, provide an unusually well-preserved example of Berkeley County's early 20th century architecture.
