

Sherwood Forest Camp

Some History from Boshkung Lake - by John Irwin

n the fall of 1933, construction on the main lodge of Sherwood Forest Camp began with logs felled from the property site. The main lodge also known as the dining hall was completed by the spring of 1934. This unique, historical building is still standing and remains occupied by my wife Eleanor and me. The building holds priceless memories for many campers including myself. There are artifacts including a stuffed Owl from 1936, the Paddle rack, and hand made tables and benches. The summer of 1934 saw the arrival of the first campers while the summer of 1964 saw the exit of the last campers. In 2009, the original building celebrates 75 years of history.

Construction of the dining hall, called the Lodge, was the work of Victor Arnold MacBrien, Sam Furguson and Cecil Irwin. Working with only hand tools, as there was no electricity on the property during the construction phase, these resourceful individuals utilized horses and a model T Ford as their source of power, along with their personal sweat and determination. Highway 35 was being built north from Minden at the same time

The following year (1935), Mr. MacBrien found another job and was unable to continue with construction but Sam Furguson and Cecil Irwin built three log cabins to be used to accommodate the youngest boys.

I became a Sherwood Forest camper during the month of August 1942 and 1943 with seven other 5 and 6 year old boys and we were housed in Cabin



"C". Cabin "C" is today still standing and owned by the Oliver family.

My uncle and aunt, Cecil and Jean Irwin, operated Sherwood Forest Camp very successfully for 30 years. The camp closed after the 1964 season. My wife, Eleanor and I acquired the Lodge in 1967 and it has served as our summer cottage for 40 years.

The unique architectural features most admired by visitors to the Lodge include the large central fireplace constructed with an intriguing counterbalanced hood that is raised and lowered from the floor to a height of about five feet. The other unique piece of construction is the entrance steps to the main lodge which are comprised of a large rock brought from the north shore of Maple Lake, pulled by a team of horses with the help of rollers, and a large pine log found waterlogged on the bottom of Beech River, cut to form the second step. These two features are shown in the painting exhibited with this article.

The painting is of particular interest because it was painted in 2008 by

Robert John Paul MacBrien, the son of Victor MacBrien, who shaped the logs by hand with his axe and helped put them in place.

While my wife and I, our children and grandchildren have enjoyed many fun-filled years at the Sherwood Forest Camp Lodge, we have recently built a new cottage just south of the Lodge on the beach remembered by former campers as Pine Point with more modern amenities and more energy efficient utilities. Therefore, we hope to find

some new and equally adventurous people to acquire Sherwood Forest Camp Lodge. •

The Minden Food Bank

A Great Need Exists for Minden and Surrounding Communities

▼he Minden Food Bank started in the late 80s in the basement ▲ of St. Paul's Anglican Church as an emergency "food cupboard" for those experiencing emergency situations or the inability to feed their children. By 1992, the demand for assistance had grown so great that the space and resources of the church were no longer sufficient. Hence, the Minden Food Bank began renting space in the back of Valumart located on Hwy. #35 in Minden and became a registered charity. Several years later it again moved to larger quarters in the old IGA building on Bobcaygeon Road and finally, in 2005, relocated to it present address at 37 Bobcaygeon Road (beside Axis Drug Store).

The Food Bank is operated by a thirteen (13) member volunteer Board made up of representatives from all the Minden churches, as well as area representatives from the Legion, the Rotary Club, the township and the local health unit. It serves a large geographic area including Kinmount, Norland, Minden, Algonquin Highlands, Dorset and parts of Dysart.

By Christmas 2008, the Food Bank had 180 registered families and by the end of January 2009, they had 198 families receiving assistance. The Food Bank is serving 493 people including 195 children and 298 adults. Demands on the food bank will continue to increase due to the economic conditions and the difficulties of managing on government allowances. The elderly in rural areas are becoming the newest clients of food banks.

The Food Bank is open every Monday and Wednesday from 11:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. During this time people in need may come to the Food Bank to pick up food. New clients must set up a file which contains personal demographics such as the size of the family, ages of adults and children and employment income or social assistance income. Clients can identify the types of foods they prefer such as Corn Flakes versus Fruit Loops. Any food allergies are noted at the time of registration. New clients can receive food the same day they register. While the hours may seem limited, it has proven to be the best time for clients to come. In the event of an emergency outside of the Food Bank hours, people may call Barbara Walford-Davis - Chair of the Board at 489-1715 or Bill Obee – Vice Chair/Treasurer of the Board at 489-3333. The Minden Food Bank also offers assistance to fire victims and others in dire need due to circumstances beyond their control.

Clients are allowed to receive food once a month. However, if an emergency arises special provisions can be made. Each person that applies for, and picks up food, must show identification which is matched to their file. The Food Bank also assists many "working poor" families and individuals who cannot make ends meet on minimum wages. All clients must provide income information and source(s) as well as monthly expenses including rent, utilities, heating etc.

The Food Bank supplies special food supplements such as Ensure for a short time to individuals too sick to eat regular or pureed food. The Food Bank does not replace or duplicate assistance provided by the Cancer Society or other community services. New mothers unable to nurse or who have a baby on special formula, can also receive supplements Personal toiletries for men and women, baby diapers and regular baby food are also available to those in need.

The Minden Food Bank is staffed entirely by volunteers. There are approximately thirty (30) volunteers but this number drops in the winter months when some volunteers head to warmer climates. Volunteer tasks include looking after the clients, stocking shelves, breaking down large quantity food donations into small portions, cleaning freezers, helping during special food drives, and assembling Christmas food and toy baskets. Currently volunteers work a three (3) hour shift and there are always at least two (2) volunteers per shift. The Food Bank works closely with the parole system, where anyone convicted of a non-violent or nonsexual crime and assigned community work by a judge, may do that assigned community time with the food bank.

The Minden Food Bank receives food from the Ontario Association of Food Banks. Major grocery stores also send product when shelf life is within six (6) months of being discarded. Several times a year, the Food Bank receives frozen food and dry goods from larger Food Bank centres in Peterborough or Lindsay. The Minden Food Bank volunteers drive down to these cities and pick up the food donations. There are food drop boxes located just

inside the front doors of the Minden IGA and Valumart. Both food stores also participate in special food drives at Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas. The local Tim Horton's holds a food drive every November for two (2) weeks. Brown paper bags to be filled with food donations are included in the Minden Times newspaper. The brown bag donations are then dropped off at Tim Horton's for pickup by the Food Bank.

The United Church of Canada has been very supportive through Mission and Service, and the Minden Food Bank is very grateful to have received \$4,000 a year for the past three years. The Township of Minden Hills also provides \$3,500 year. The Boshkung and some other Lake Associations have been financial supporters of the Minden Food Bank for the past

several years.

Costs incurred to run the Food Bank for 2008 include rent, insurance, utilities, membership dues, phone and internet services, purchased food/toiletries and meals on wheels. Expenses in 2008 were over \$60,000.00 and of that, about 70% was spent on providing food to clients.

WHAT THE MINDEN FOOD BANK NEEDS FROM YOU:

- Volunteer time on a regular basis or for special food drive functions.

- Donations by cheque made payable to the Minden Food Bank mailed to The Minden Food Bank, Box 893, 37 Bobcaygeon Road,

- Minden, Ontario, K0M 2K0, or dropped off in person during business hours. Tax receipts will be issued in February of each year.
- Donations of non-perishable food (with current date(s) of expiry), in drop boxes at the IGA, Valumart or a new location at That Place in Carnarvon (just east of Hwy. #35, on Hwy. #118 East.) All food must have a shelf life of one year or less. Food banks are not permitted to provide clients with food items past their shelf life or expiry date.
- Donations of non-perishable food at any Boshkung Lake Association gathering, such as the Annual Meeting, the Regatta or the Golf Dinner or when closing your cottage in the fall.

Stanhope Township Trivia

From The Stanhope Museum: "Did-ja-know?"

The Stanhope Museum website has about 200 old photos of people and places that you can browse - and even buy!

Did you know:

- Contrary to popular belief,
 Boshkung does not mean
 "meeting of the waters"; it means
 "place of grassy narrows".
- Stanhope's lakes have an interesting history of names according to old maps and documents:
- Boshkung was called Bushconk, Bushkank, Bosking, Buskank, Bosking, and Buscong
- Beech was Sawamishi
- Maple was Ninatigo or Ninatiko
- Kushog has been known as, or labelled, Kashagawi, Cushog, Koo-Shog, and Kashagawigamog
- Little Hawk was Pipikwabi
- The land surrounded by Kushog, Boshkung and Halls Lake was, for a long time, called The Island because it seemed to be surrounded by water.
- 4. The "H" in Boshkung seems to have evolved over time and old timers still call it Boskung. An application to the Post Master General in 1877 to get a post office at "... the Pritchard Settlement on the Island". This application was one of at least five submitted for the same location. Prior applications were submitted in March, April and August of 1875 and in December of 1877.

- On the hand drawn map that accompanied the application, Boshkung is labelled Bushkonk and Kushog is labelled Little Koshcawigamog. The post office was finally granted -- under the name Boskung. It opened on July 1, 1878 at the home of Joseph Beatty and closed on June 4, 1964 at the home of the late Martin Brothers on Buckslides Rd.
- "Downtown Boshkung" is the four corners where Boshkung Lake Rd., Walker Line and Buckslides Rd. all meet.
- Buckslide Road was named after Daniel Buck who, in the 1880s, built a timber slide to get logs from Kushog to Boshkung. It was called Buck's Slide and eventually became Buckslide.
- 7. In 1904 a home called Moorefield Lodge was built on the northwest corner of the Boshkung Narrows. Teachers and early travellers including travelling ministers boarded there, making Moorefield Lodge one of Stanhope's first 'hotels'. It burnt down in 1964 and was never rebuilt.
- 8. Remnants of Native camps have been discovered all over Haliburton County, including the site of the Matabanick Inn.
- 9. Early settlers often enjoyed a little game of baseball to while away the pleasant summer evenings. The teams were from Maple Lake, Boskung Lake and Minden and it's said that the players from Boskung didn't think twice about travelling by horse or buggy to

- Guinn's Corners (Hwy. 118 and Kushog Lake Rd.) for practice after a hard day in the fields.
- 10. The big grey house at Buttermilk Falls was supposed to have second story built on top that would be hotel rooms. The drawings refer to the place as The Cascades Inn.
- 11. Half of Carnarvon is actually in Minden township. The township dividing line is East and West Roads which means that Zion Church is in Stanhope township but Pine Reflections (and the old Carnarvon Garage) is in Minden township. That means Stanhope has no village or town.
- 12. The first recorded settler in Stanhope was a Mr. Isaac Hunter who lived between Little and Big Boshkung in 1857.
- 13. Stanhope was once the topic of a Ripley's Believe it or Not column. According to the cartoon, pioneer Thomas Mason would have died on May 31, 1863 when a log rolled on him and slit his throat if not for the quick thinking of Mrs. Peggy Hewitt who took her sewing kit and stitched Thomas' neck closed with an ordinary and cotton thread.
- 14. Murder is listed only once in Stanhope's old hand-written death records. In 1896 William Henry Sawyer was beaten to death at Maple Lake by Thomas and Matthew Thompson when Thomas Thompson went into a jealous rage over an incident between his wife and Sawyer.

- 15. In 1896 Stanhope suffered a diphtheria epidemic during which schools were closed and all public gatherings, including church services, were forbidden.

 Stanhope council passed a motion to have Minden pay \$60 "as compensation for the stamping out of the diphtheria epidemic caused by the negligence of the Minden Board of Health in handling their own epidemic".
- In 1904 smallpox swept through the township and the same curfews were imposed.
- 17. Stanhope had the first telephone system in Haliburton County, and the first call was placed on November 29, 1921 from Rogers' Store in Carnarvon to the Clair Sisson farm on the Grass River. The Stanhope Municipal Telephone System was absorbed into the Dysart system in 1957.
- 18. The first person to take a Free Land Grant in Stanhope was Mr. William Cooper who settled on Lot 8, Concession 8 (west of Halls Lake) on October 1, 1870.
- 19. The farming was so bad in Stanhope that in 1927 the

- government relocated families from Hindon Hill (up the Brady Lake Rd.) north to "New Ontario". The Toronto Daily Star printed a story about the relocation scheme.
- 20. The Stanhope Museum grows the watermelon-like Citron in its Heritage Gardens and then makes Citron Marmalade from a 100-year-old recipe. The marmalade won First Place in the Culinary Historian of Ontario annual food contest in February 2009. Get yours at Heritage Day!
- 21. There was a post office at
 Buttermilk Falls from 1937 until
 1972. It was only open in the
 summer. Other post office
 locations were Halls Lake, Maple
 Lake, Little Hawk Lake, Hindon
 Hill, Boskung, and Peterson's
 Corners.
- 22. There was a post office in Stanhope called Winston, from 1900 until 1905 but records don't say where it was located and no one remembers it.
- 23. The Boshkung Millennium Book Committee donated all the taped interviews for the book to the

Stanhope Museum. Find out how you can help preserve our history by contacting the Museum.

Learn all this and more about your surrounding area and lakes at the Stanhope Museum on North Shore Rd. Hours are Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Saturday from 11 - 2 from mid-June until Labour Day. Admission is by donation. The museum is 100% volunteer and you're welcome to help out.. ◆





The Haliburton County Studio Tour

The Haliburton County Studio Tour is an annual arts event that takes place every year on the weekend before Thanksgiving and on Thanksgiving weekend. The studio tour is free... just provide your own transportation.

The studio tour was formed 20 years ago by a small group of dedicated local artists and craftspeople. 



Lake Steward Report

Barry Hicks

This lake steward report is coming to you from McMootlin Rock on Boshkung. Jane Moote (FFD), who was elected last year at the annual meeting has taken on the role as Co-Lake Steward. She and Barry Hicks will be working together to inform you of our beautiful lake's health.

The total phosphorus reading for 2008 is 6.2 ug/L. This reading comes from the Ministry of the

Environment Lake Partner Program. We send in readings and samples annually and they provide us with this information. Anna DeSalles from the Ministry in Dorset, tells us that Boshkung is in good shape. See chart and graph for more detailed information.

Total Phosphorus

Spring turnover phosphorus concentrations on Boshkung have been consistent since 2002 at around 6 μ g/L. This is normal for a dilute lake on the Canadian Shield. These concentrations are indicative of excellent water quality. Boshkung is classed as an oligotrophic lake. This means that it is low in nutrients and thus should not experience algal blooms.





Secchi Depths

Average annual Secchi depths are also consistent in Boshkung although there may be a slight increase in 1998 (see graph below) which may be the result of only having one Secchi measurement that year (instead of an average of many as is usually the case).

It is more difficult to see a change in water that is already quite clear which is the case of Boshkung.
