2008 BASEBALL REVIEW

The word that comes to mind for the 2008 team is progress. The baseball program took another step toward reaching its goal of an America East tournament bid, and eventual championship. The 2008 record of 18-31 was an improvement from the previous year and saw the Hawks conference record reach 10-13. The 2008 squad posted the most victories at Hartford since 1996 and the fifth highest total in program history. The 2008 team also recorded the highest conference winning percentage since 1995, and finished one game away from making the America East tournament.

With seven seniors on the team, the thought was that 2008 would be a veteran ball club throughout the season. The senior class was present in the lineup and on the mound. Adam Grap, Adam Bowser, and Bill Perry were mainstays in the lineup all year. The threesome accounted for 62 runs, 128 hits, 12 home runs, 68 runs batted in, 26 doubles, and 26 stolen bases while hitting .286 combined. Senior pitchers CJ Browne, John Coury, Pete Moraski, and Marc Toomey accounted for 45 appearances, nine starts, 105 innings, and 73 strikeouts.

As the season unfolded and the Hawks worked into America East conference play, the younger players started to make an impact as well. Sophomore pitchers Chris Greiner, Zach Turner, Kyle Perry, Brendan Floyd, Steve Sobocinski, and Bob Rogers combined for 26 starts, 176 innings, and 67 appearances. Greiner led the staff going 6-1 with a 3.65 earned run average and four complete games. Reliable junior Weston Szymanski earned his 16th win at Hartford with 11 starts and four complete games in 2008.

Newcomers Mike Amendola, Andy Drexel, Matt Walker, and Simon Kudernatsch each started 43 games or more in 2008. As a group they produced 98 runs, 184 hits, 46 doubles, 13 home runs, and 92 RBI while hitting .297 combined. Brady Stouffer and Ben Sobocinski, two players who have started almost every game in their career at Hartford, continued to make an impact on the program. Stouffer was limited last year due to injuries but still started in 35 games, hit five home runs and three triples, and scored 22 runs. Ben Sobocinski hit over .300 while leading the team in hits, for the third year in a row, with 57, and stealing 14 bases. For the second year in a row, Hartford was the best defensive team in the conference, leading the league with a .969 fielding percentage.

Bowser, a senior, finished his career at Hartford first in sacrifice hits (27), second in stolen bases (43), tied for third in games played (177), and fourth in at-bats (589). Perry finished his career as one of the all-time best players at Hart-

ford. Perry is first in at-bats (628), third in assists (410), tied for third in games played (177) and hits (179) and tied for fifth in doubles (37). Browne finished his career tied for second in appearances (60).

COACH CAL'S THOUGHTS ON 2009

"Our returning players look stronger, more mature physically and have a better understanding on what they need to do to get ready to play mentally," said Calcaterra. "The newcomers seem to have made a smooth transition into the program in the classroom and on the field. Our freshmen have blended in well with our upperclassmen and the chemistry of the club looks good."

"The coaches and I have taken pride in the ability to recruit athletic players," continued Calcaterra. "We have led the America East in fielding percentage the past two seasons and I would like to believe that playing good defense has become a staple in our program. I feel the 2009 team will once again be very solid defensively."

"I like our potential at the plate this season and believe we will be tough outs up and down the lineup," the head coach expanded. "We have a nice mix of left-handed and right-handed hitters with speed at the top and bottom of the order."

"Pitching and defense is the key to winning in baseball," said Calcaterra. "We know we have the defense, now our pitching has to come together. The one question mark will be the development of the pitching staff as the season progresses. I'm looking forward to watching who will be the pitchers to step up for us this season."

"As in the first three years as head coach, we will once again have freshman players make an impact this season," continued Calcaterra. "More importantly, our seniors will need to provide leadership, guidance and support to the younger players as we work throughout the year. Brady, Ben, and Weston were the first three recruits I signed to play for me





at Hartford and they will leave their legacy, whether in the record books or with one of their teammates.”

OUTFIELD

The 2009 Hartford baseball club has two key additions to the outfield, joining the two returning outfielders from a year ago. Senior **Drew Sgro** (Bristol, CT), who played 31 games in 2008, will once again provide strong defense and a left-handed bat in the lineup. Sophomore **Rodger Wilmot**

(Freehold, NJ) will return after playing a part-time role in his first campaign. Wilmot has improved his offense and defense to vie for the starting position in right field. Freshman **Andrew Siano** (Springfield, MA) has been impressive this fall both defensively and offensively and won the starting job in center field for the spring. Siano brings great speed and athleticism and solidifies the outfield. Freshman **Chris Suchy** (West Springfield, MA) will make an impact this season in either corner outfield spot. Suchy is athletic in the field with speed and provides a left-handed hitter with power to the lineup. Adding depth to the outfield in 2009 will be infielders **Brady Stouffer** (Gaithersburg, MD), **Ben Sobocinski** (Waldorf, MD), and catcher **Andy Drexel** (Pequea, PA). All three players have and will see action in the outfield to provide options for the ball club.

INFIELD

The 2009 Hawks return four starting infielders that led the America East in fielding last season. Versatile is the best way to describe the infield at Hartford. Patrolling the middle infield for the fourth straight year will be Stouffer and Ben Sobocinski. Stouffer battled shoulder and knee injuries last year and split time at short and center field. Now healthy, he will again start at shortstop this year and will go back to the leadoff spot in the lineup. Stouffer is one of the most athletic players at Hartford and will see time in the outfield and on the mound as well.

Ben Sobocinski returns for his final season at second base after being an all-conference performer at second base (2007) and shortstop (2008) the past two years. He led the 2008 Hawks in at bats, hits, runs, and walks. He will be a major factor on the mound for the Hawks in 2009 and will be counted on to provide quality innings in

the starting rotation. Sophomore **Simon Kudernatsch** (Czech Republic) returns after an America East All-Rookie season at second base last season. He started slow during his first season in the United States, but finished strong compiling a .362 conference batting average.

Sophomore **Matt Walker** (East Lyme, CT) returns to first base after starting 43 games last season with five home runs and 11 doubles. Walker looks to hit in the cleanup spot after hitting there most of his rookie year.

Graduated first team all-conference third baseman Bill Perry has left a question mark at the “hot corner”. Sophomore **Bobby Gorski** (Sewell, NJ) should be poised to take over at third. Gorski is a good sized corner infielder who has made improvements in his overall game and can move to first base as well.

Backing up the middle infield is sophomore **Jason Freethey** (Manchester, NH), and freshmen **Victor Santana** (Plainville, CT), **Cory Beahm** (Burtonsville, MD) and **Jared Canney** (Plymouth, MA). Freethey is a good athlete and has improved his game to handle all three infield spots and will play a contributing role in the infield in 2009. Santana can play second base and provides a scrappy lefthanded bat. He could see time as a designated hitter as well. Beahm is one of the best fielders at Hartford. He is very good defensively and will make a major contribution to the 2009 team. Beahm will also be counted on to provide depth in the pitching staff. Canney will provide depth at second base as well as in the outfield. His strength is in his offensive ability, and he will fight

for the starting designated hitter spot.



CATCHING

The 2009 backstop will be one of the best catching staffs that coach Calcaterra has worked with. Junior **Mike Amendola** (North Babylon, NY) returns after starting 45 games, mostly behind the plate. He led the team with a .331 batting average and 31 RBI and was second on the team with 54 hits and 14 doubles. Amendola is a very good athlete who can hit, run, and throw, and will see time at first base as well. Drexel, a sophomore, returns after a successful freshman



campaign where he hit .291 and led the team with 15 doubles. Drexel played in 47 games with the majority of action coming in left field. He is a strong, athletic catcher who can run, throw, and hit. Drexel has the strongest and quickest arm on the staff and provides power from the left side of the plate. Freshman **Alex Bulger** (Plainville, CT) will provide quality depth in the staff. He is one of the best receivers and blockers on the staff. Bulger will provide solid innings behind the plate throughout the season. Freshman **Mark Sargente** (Commack, NY) rounds out the catching staff and will provide a backup and bullpen catcher for the pitching staff.

PITCHING

The main term that describes the pitching staff is maturity. The 2009 staff returns 10 pitchers from last season and two conference starters. Senior **Weston Szymanski** (Mt. Airy, MD) will enter his final campaign with 16 wins in his career, three shy of tying the Hartford all-time record. Szymanski led the team with 11 starts, 71.1 innings, and four complete games. Ben Sobocinski will need to provide quality innings on the mound in his final season as a starter. He has been an everyday position player and used mainly out of the bullpen as a closer the past two seasons.

The majority of the arms in 2009 are in the junior class. **Chris Greiner** (Elkridge, MD), **Kyle Perry** (Feeding Hills, MA), **Brendan Floyd** (Severna Park, MD), **Zach Turner** (Burtonsville, MD), and **Bob Rogers** (Fairfield, CT) look to improve on their sophomore campaigns. Greiner returns after a very successful 2008 season as a starter. He led the team with a 6-1 record, 3.65 ERA and 56 strikeouts. Greiner earned first team All-New England honors and pitched in the all-star game at Fenway Park. Due to an offseason injury Greiner will red-shirt the 2009 season.

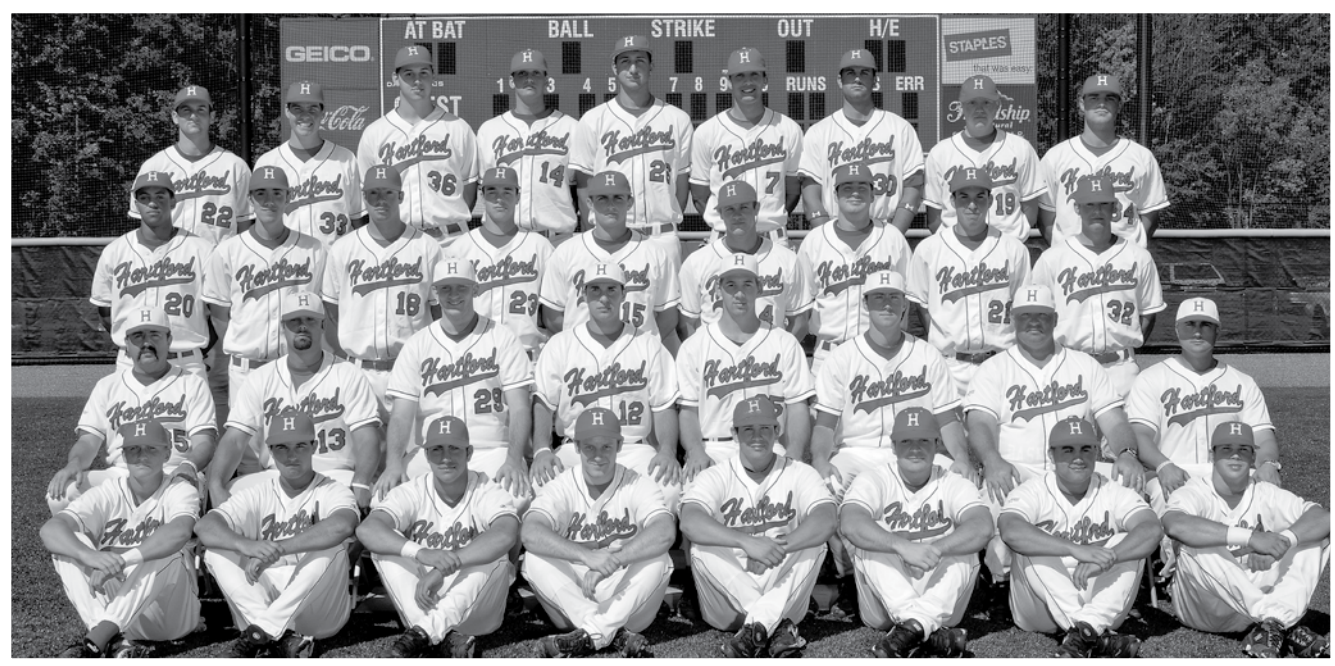
Perry is a returning starter and reliever and finished with 38 innings a year ago. He could find himself in a starting role again this year or counted on to win games in relief. Either way, Perry will be a mainstay and a major factor on the 2009 Hawks staff. Floyd pitched in a

limited role in 2008 as a starter and out of the pen, throwing 17.2 innings. He has the size, velocity, and the off-speed complement to step up and be a conference starter for the Hawks in 2009. Rogers returns for his third campaign after coming out of the bullpen a year ago. He has a live arm and an off speed pitch to complement his moving fastball. He will be counted on to provide depth and pick up quality innings this season either as a starter or out of the bullpen. Turner returns after being third on the staff in starts with eight. He was used as a starter and out of the pen in 2008 and will likely pitch in that capacity again in 2009.

Sophomores **Steve Sobocinski** (Waldorf, MD), **Matt Govoni** (Southington, CT), and **Justin DiConzo** (Weymouth, MA) return for their second campaign after pitching in a limited role last season. Steve Sobocinski has made great strides this year and will have more of an impact on the mound for the Hawks in 2009. Govoni has also made major strides in his game and will solidify the bullpen in conference action and could see mid-week starts. DiConzo was an outfielder who made the transition to the mound last year with 10 appearances and a 4.50 era. He will provide a lefthanded arm out of the pen and could see starts in non-conference action as well.

New additions to the staff for 2009 will be freshmen Beahm, **Myles Kelly** (Dunbarton, NH), **Andrew Smith** (Sound Beach, NY), and **Mike Thatcher** (Willington, CT). All four newcomers will have to provide depth and pick up quality innings for the 2009 club. Beahm will be a dual player in the infield and on the mound. Kelly has made a great transformation this fall to put him in a position to pitch early in his career. Smith will provide depth as a right-handed bullpen arm, while Thatcher will provide depth out of the bullpen as a left-handed relief pitcher.

Jeff Calcaterra took over as head baseball coach at the University of Hartford on December 1, 2004. He is the 12th head coach in program history and will begin his fifth season at the helm of the Hawks this spring.

This season, Calcaterra has put his squad in a position to battle for an America East Championship. The Hartford program continues its rise under the leadership of Calcaterra, who last year brought the Hawks within one game of their goal of making the America East Championship. The Hawks increased their win total from the previous season in overall wins, 18 which is the most since 1996, and conference wins, 10. The Hawks conference winning percentage was the highest since the 1996 season.

The Hawks return a veteran pitching staff and infield, while bringing a wealth of potential in this year's recruiting class. Calcaterra instills defense and pitching in his teams. The Hawks defense has been the best in the conference in each of the last two seasons, last year sporting a .969 fielding average. Leading returning pitcher Weston Szymanski enters his final season three games shy of the most wins in school history. The Hawks also return Ben Sobocinski, one of the most well-rounded players in programs history. He led the Hawks offensively in each of his first two seasons and has been the team's closer for all three. For his career, Sobocinski has the ability to leave as the best hitter in school history, just 52 hits shy of the all-time record, leading the way last season with 57 hits in 186 at bats.



Also Looking to improve upon last season's success is junior Mike Amendola, who led the Hawks with a .331 batting average. He finished with 54 hits, second most on the team, while also leading the team with 31 runs batted in. He also finished second in doubles with 14, while adding two triples and four home runs.

This past summer saw a lot of success for Hawks players. Chris Greiner, who was the leading pitcher a year ago, was named first team All-New England and then went on to lead the Haymarket Senators in the Valley Baseball League. Amendola was named to the All-Star team in the Atlantic League, while Sobocinski earned all-league honors in the Cal Ripken, Sr. Collegiate Baseball League.

"This is a wonderful time for Hartford baseball," said University President Walter Harrison. "Terrific coaches who are both knowledgeable and dedicated building a great program, and who care deeply about their student-athletes. A fantastic new field that is the equal of any in the Northeast. A competitive team that is capable of winning the America East Conference title. Even a university president who knows a little about baseball and wishes he were good enough to play for Hartford. If I had any eligibility left, I would love to be part of this team."

The talent that Calcaterra is able to recruit was evident on the field in just his second season. His first full recruiting class consisted of the team's top pitcher and top hitter, and five players cracked the top five in Hartford's single season record book. Szymanski led the pitching staff with a 3.38 ERA and was second on the team with 27 strikeouts. Sobocinski led the team in batting with a .291 average and played in all 49 games. He finished with 51 hits in 175 at bats and drove in 19 runs. Opposing teams also began to see the aggressiveness that Calcaterra instills in his players, most notably on the base paths where the Hawks stole 86 bases, led by a school record 21 from rookie Bryan Propst.

Sobocinski ranks fourth all-time in assists (331) and fifth in hits (170). He also holds single season records in at bats (second, 186), hits (fifth, 62) and assists

(second, 152). Senior Brady Stouffer has placed himself all over the single season and career record books in his first two seasons. He holds single season records for at-bats (first - 192; fifth - 185), stolen bases (fourth - 16), sacrifices (second - 11) and assists (tied for third - 136). Stouffer has also reach career marks in stolen bases (fifth, 34), and assists (fifth, 286). Szymanski and Stouffer have each received America East All-Rookie awards, while Sobocinski was an America East All-Conference Second Team selection in 2007.

Coach Calcaterra's second recruiting class had a major impact on the 2007 club which saw a pair of freshmen, Chris Greiner and Kyle Perry, pitch in the starting rotation. Greiner led the staff with 10 starts and threw a 3-0 shutout with 13 strikeouts, second most in school history. Freshman Greg Cinelli was fourth in batting average in 2007 and joined Greiner as America East All-Rookie Team members.

"We are pleased and excited to add Jeff Calcaterra to our staff," said Director of Athletics Patricia H. Meiser at the time of his hire. "He brings a wealth of experience to our program as a player, coach and clinician. We believe Hartford baseball will experience a resurgence under his leadership."

In his 11-year tenure in the Big Ten, Calcaterra coached 20 players who were drafted and signed professional contracts. While at Indiana, Coach Cal helped guide the Indiana career (30) and single season (12) wins leader, Brian Partenhiemer, in 1997. His pitching staff led the Big Ten in strikeouts (456) in 1999, and had 2007 Arizona Diamondbacks pitcher Zach McClellan drafted in the third round in 2000. Calcaterra oversaw 28 players earn All-Big Ten honors, two Big Ten batting champions in Matt Braugher (1996) and Vasili Spanos (2003), Big Ten Player of the Year and third round draft pick Kennard Jones (2002), All-American Spanos (2003), and two-time Academic All-American Ryan Parker (2004, 2005).

A Michigan native, Calcaterra was a three-sport athlete while attending Brother Rice High School in Birmingham, MI. He was named All-State in football and baseball his senior year. Coach Cal was recruited to play Division I football and baseball but chose to play college baseball at Indiana University. Calcaterra lettered four years at Indiana as a catcher from 1989-92, where he received his degree in sport management. A team captain for the Hoosiers, he garnered All-Big Ten honors in 1992 and was named the team's most valuable defensive player. Calcaterra's best season at Indiana came in his junior year, when he batted .322 with 10 doubles and 25 RBI. That season he also reeled off a streak in which he threw out 27 consecutive runners from behind the plate.

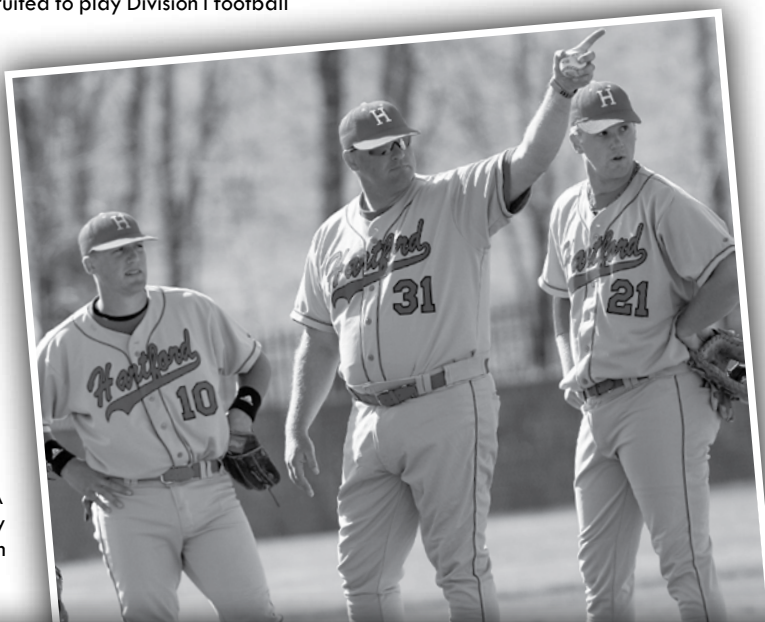
Calcaterra was drafted by the New York Yankees and played for the minor league Gulf Coast Yankees in 1992 and 1993. He was converted into a pitcher in 1993, but sustained an arm injury that ended his career.

Coach Calcaterra has become a regular on the coaching clinic circuit over his 13 years as a coach and has been regarded as one of the best catching clinicians in the country. "Jeff is one of the best instructors and communicators in the game," said Dick Birmingham, ABCA Hall of Fame coach. "He is a sought after clinician because he is very articulate and communicates well with coaches and players. He can offer a different aspect to both pitchers and catchers as one of the few players to play both positions."

Ormaechea begins his third season at Hartford. He will work with the infielders and hitters and serve as the team's first base coach.

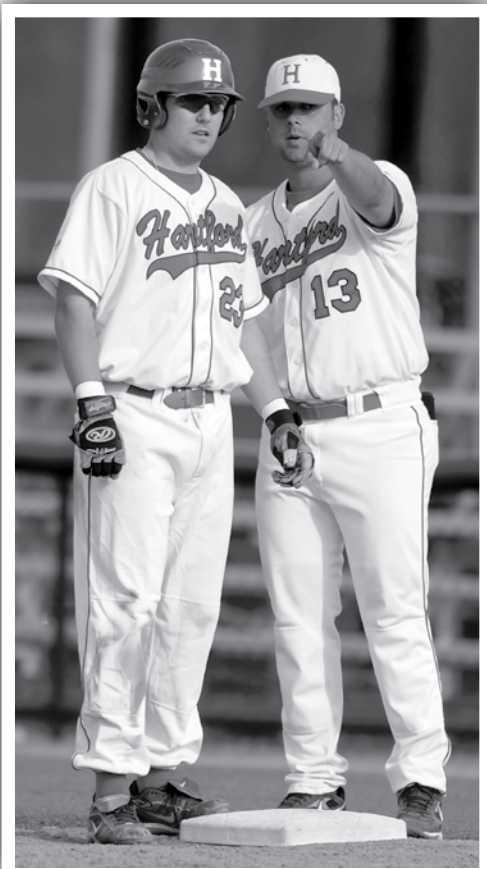

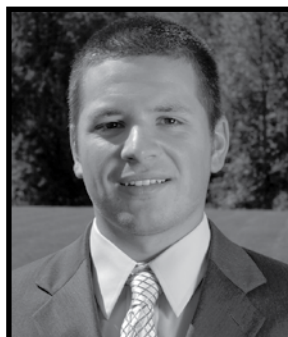

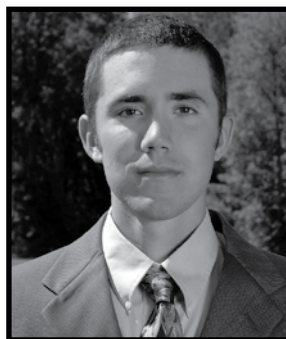

ABOUT AMERICA EAST...

Since its modest beginning as a men's basketball-only conference in 1979, America East has evolved into one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences with a commitment to broad-based, competitive athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity and missions of the member institutions.

Each of the nine institutions - University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont - offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition.

Progressive in its approach to its more than 3,200 student-athletes, America East recognizes champions in each of its 21 sports: men's and women's basketball, baseball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, women's golf, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, and women's volleyball. America East also conducts the nation's most comprehensive academic recognition program for student-athletes.

With a geographic footprint covering the Mid-Atlantic to Northeast regions of the United States, America East has a population base of more than 50 million people and nearly 30 million television homes. America East member institutions include more than 106,000 students on the nine campuses and boast nearly one million living alumni.

LEAGUE HISTORY...

To see how far America East has progressed, consider the conference was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion receiving an automatic bid to the NCAA Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1988-89 academic year. At that time, the conference's Board of Directors made a new commitment to an all-sports association, creating the North Atlantic Conference by establishing an office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program.

The North Atlantic Conference merged with the Seaboard Conference (the league in which Boston University, Hartford, Maine, New Hampshire, and Vermont, among others, competed in women's basketball) in 1989 and the NAC looked to establish conference championships in several men's and women's sports.

The conference changed its name to America East prior to the 1996-97 academic year and moved the conference headquarters to its downtown Boston in 1997.

In 2005, America East hired Patrick Nero, most recently the Director of Athletics at Maine, as the conference's third commissioner.

The conference office moved its headquarters to Cambridge, Mass. in July, 2007.

ATHLETIC SUCCESS...

America East enters its 21st year of all-sports championship competition on the heels of one of the most successful seasons in history as five of its 10 team sport champions won at least one game in the NCAA Championship and two other teams received at-large tournament bids. In addition, one student-athlete won a national championship and 20 others garnered All-America recognition.

Hartford defeated Syracuse in the first round of the NCAA Women's Basketball Championship. It marked the second time in three years the Hawks had won a game in the NCAA Tournament. Vermont earned a bid to the WNIT and defeated Dartmouth, 69-50, in a first-round game at Patrick Gymnasium. America East is only one of four Non-Football Bowl Subdivision Conferences to have received multiple postseason bids in each of the past four years. Hartford's Danielle Hood was selected in the third round (32nd overall) by the Atlanta Dream of the WNBA, becoming just the second America East player to be drafted.

Vermont and Boston University each earned berths in the NCAA Men's Soccer Championship. It marked the first time since 1996 that America East received multiple bids. Vermont downed Dartmouth in the first round to give America East at least one win in the NCAAAs in six of the last seven years. America East finished the season ninth out of 22 Division I conferences in the Ratings Percentage Index (RPI) and was one of just two leagues to have five teams in the Top 55 of 202 schools (38. Boston University, 40. Vermont, 48. Hartford, 53. New Hampshire, 54. Binghamton).

UMBC won its first-ever America East Men's Basketball Championship and recorded a program-best 24 victories. Vermont's Marqus Blakely became the first player to win both Defensive Player of the Year and Player of the Year honors in the same season. He also garnered All-America honors from the Associated Press.

UMBC overcame a nine-goal deficit to upend Albany, 14-13, in the finals of the America East Men's Lacrosse Championship. The Retrievers, which won a school-record 12 games, were edged by national semifinalist Virginia, 10-9, in the first round of the NCAA Championship. UMBC finished the season ranked No. 6 in the USILA poll. Albany and Stony Brook were also ranked at one point during the season. Five America East standouts were chosen All-Americans by the USILA with UMBC's Terry Kimener receiving second-team recognition.

Boston University defeated New Hampshire, 2-1, to claim its second America East Women's Soccer title in three years and its third straight NCAA berth. It was just the second

time the top-seeded team did not win the tournament and the first time a team has won the title on the road since 1996.

Albany defeated Cleveland State, 3-0, in the NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship to become the first America East team to win a match in the tournament. Stony Brook's Jackie Ahlers, a unanimous choice as America East Player of the Year, earned AVCA All-America accolades.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS...

America East institutions boasted a pair of Academic All-Americans in 2007-08 while another 19 were tabbed All-District selections.

A total of 18 America East teams received Public Recognition Awards by the NCAA under the Division I Academic Progress Rate (APR). The APR provides a real-time snapshot of a team's academic success and the academic progress of student-athletes.

America East honored a top-scholar athlete in each of its championship sports: Alex Felce (Stony Brook men's cross country), Cathy Parker (New Hampshire women's cross country), Sarah Hudak (Boston U. field hockey), Connor Tobin (Vermont men's soccer), Elizabeth Cook (Hartford women's soccer), Jacqueline Kane (Binghamton volleyball), Brian Lillis (Albany men's basketball), May Kotsopoulos (Vermont women's basketball), Rory Quiller (Binghamton men's indoor track & field), Carmen Lagala (Vermont women's indoor and outdoor track & field), Brenno Varanda (Binghamton men's swimming & diving), Tina Cantwell (UMBC women's swimming & diving), Michael Stephan (Stony Brook baseball), Juliana Carrillo (Hartford women's golf), Steve Ammann (Albany men's lacrosse), Michaela Hardy (New Hampshire women's lacrosse), Ashley Waters (Maine softball) Ilan Shvartz (Stony Brook men's tennis), Cornelia Carapcea (UMBC women's tennis), Jordan Horwitz (New Hampshire men's outdoor track & field).

More than 2,250 of America East's 3,200 student-athletes were named to the Academic Honor Roll after receiving grade-point averages of 3.0 or better. Included in that total were 1,015 student-athletes who earned a 3.5 or better and were named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Vermont was awarded the America East Academic Cup for the fourth-straight year as its student-athletes compiled a 3.14 grade-point average, which tied for the best mark in the award's 13-year history. Overall, America East student-athletes compiled a 3.02 GPA during the 2007-08 academic year.

COMMISSIONER'S CUP...

Boston University took home the Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. Commissioner's Cup for the third straight year and sixth time in the last seven years. The conference award annually recognizes the highest scoring athletic program in America East as determined by a points system, which rewards a school for success both during the regular season and at championship competition in the league's sports. Boston U., which won six league titles, three regular-season crowns and had four runner-up finishes, tallied 378 points, the most in three years under the current nine-member configuration. The Terriers won regular-season and tournament championships in field hockey, women's soccer and women's lacrosse, while also capturing titles in women's indoor track & field, women's outdoor track & field and women's tennis. Boston U. was also the runner-up in women's cross country, women's basketball and men's and women's swimming and diving.

AMERICA EAST IN THE PROS...

Several America East athletes have extended their playing careers beyond the collegiate level.

Former Hartford baseball star Jeff Bagwell, the 2004 National League Most Valuable Player, hit 449 career home runs in 15 seasons for the Houston Astros. Joe Nathan, who played at Stony Brook, has been selected to three All-Star games in five seasons as the closer for the Minnesota Twins. Carlos Pena slugged 46 home runs and drove in 121 runs to earn Comeback Player of the Year honors with the Tampa Bay Rays in 2007. Former America East Players of the Year Mark Sweeney (Maine) of the Los Angeles Dodgers and Kevin Mench of the Toronto Blue Jays are also on 2008 Major League rosters. Several other former America East players, including five draft choices from 2008 alone, are presently in the minor leagues.

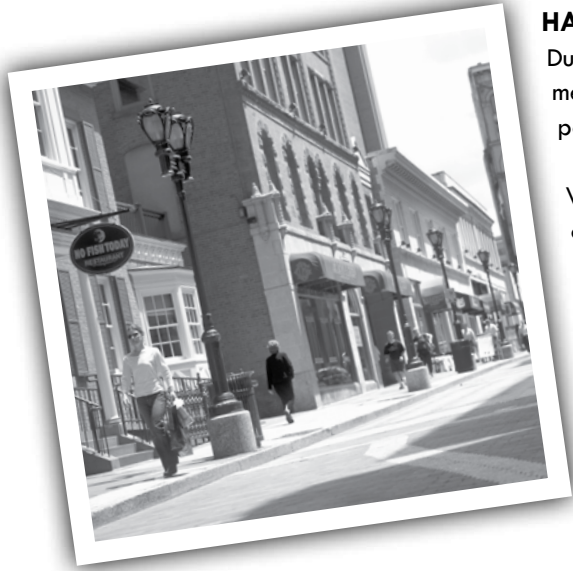

HARTFORD AND THE REGION

Dubbed “New England’s Rising Star,” Hartford is enjoying a renaissance fueled by the development of its riverfront. With retail and residential development taking off, downtown Hartford is poised to become a 24-hour hub of culture, arts, and entertainment.

Within Hartford’s borders, one can tour the home of Mark Twain, mingle with 5,000-plus years of art at the Wadsworth Atheneum, and explore history at the oldest state house in the country. The Bushnell and Hartford Stage Company offer traveling Broadway shows and other award-winning productions.

The XL Center and New England Dodge Music Center offer top-name concerts while the former is home to the American Hockey League’s Hartford Wolfpack.

The surrounding Connecticut countryside offers unlimited and varied get-away possibilities, including skiing, spring garden tours, fall festivals, and two of the world’s largest casino and entertainment complexes.

Hartford boasts an extraordinarily active arts and entertainment scene with nearly 200 arts, cultural and heritage organizations. The experts agree: *Places Rated Almanac* ranked Hartford among the top six percent of North American cities for arts and culture. Greater Hartford also runs the 10th-largest United Arts Fund in the nation, demonstrating its strong commitment to the arts.

It’s no wonder noted economist Richard Florida has ranked Hartford in the “Top 20” of cool places to live, work, start a family and have fun.

PROFESSIONAL SPORTS IN CONNECTICUT

Connecticut has been the home to many professional or semi-professional sports teams or events. The only current professional team in Connecticut is the Connecticut Sun, a member of the Women’s National Basketball Association. The CT Sun are housed in the Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, CT.

The Hartford Wolfpack, an American Hockey League affiliate for the New York Rangers (NHL), are one of three minor league teams who call Connecticut home. The New Britain Rock Cats (Minnesota Twins, MLB) and the Connecticut Defenders (San Francisco Giants, MLB) also have their home fields in Connecticut towns. Joining them on the semi-professional ranks is the Connecticut Crush (Women’s Football).

TRANSPORTATION

Hartford is just a two-hour drive from New York or Boston. Bradley International Airport—gateway to Southern New England—is just minutes from the Capital City. The region is also a part of the AMTRAK system and is home to a number of major bus lines.

LODGINGS

Downtown lodgings include the Hilton Hartford Hotel, Hartford Marriott, Crowne Plaza, Sheraton Hartford Hotel, Holiday Inn Express, Residence Inn Downtown and historic Goodwin Hotel, which offer luxury hotel rooms within an easy walk of the convention center and Adriaen’s Landing. If that’s not enough, there are more than 6,000 hotel rooms within the Greater Hartford region offering visitors a variety of accommodations ranging from casino hotels to quaint New England inns.





SMALL CLASSES, BIG OPPORTUNITY

At the University of Hartford, classes are small, but the list of academic offerings is not. The University is a comprehensive, independent institution, offering educational and career programs in 89 undergraduate and 33 graduate areas of study in its seven schools and colleges. It prides itself on providing the intimacy of a liberal arts college with the creativity and intellectual excitement of a university.

While the range of studies offered at the University is diverse, so, too, are the people. Enrolled are 4,842 full-time undergraduates, 853 part-time undergraduates, and 1,671 graduate students, representing 45 states and 49 countries. The full-time student-to-faculty ratio is 14:1.

TRADITION

The University of Hartford dates back to 1877, when the first of its original three schools was founded. The Hartford Art School (1877), Hillyer College (1879), and The Hartt School (1920) joined in 1957 to form the University of Hartford.

The origins of the University can be traced back to the wife of Mark Twain. Mrs. Samuel Clemens, along with Harriett Beecher Stowe of Uncle Tom's Cabin fame, formed an art society that later became the Hartford Art School.

EXPANSION

The University has undertaken several ambitious building projects over the past half decade. A \$34-million Integrated Science, Engineering, and Technology complex, which included major renovations to the adjacent Dana Hall (one of the original buildings on campus), opened in 2005. On its heels, new turf athletics fields brought a much different look to the opposite end of campus, benefitting students, faculty, staff, alumni, and community residents.

The new Renée Samuels Center opened in January 2007, providing the Hartford Art School with new space for its photography and media arts programs.

In fall 2007, Hawk Hall, a five-story residential facility for first-year students and its adjacent Alumni Plaza, a new outdoor gathering place for students, greeted students returning to campus.

Now open just a mile from the University's main campus, the Mort and Irma Handel Performing Arts Center houses five dance studios, four theatre rehearsal studios and two black box theatres. It is a vibrant center for dance and theatre instruction and performances at one of the key gateways to the city of Hartford.

The University of Hartford also houses two public magnet schools on its campus—an elementary school for students from Hartford and several neighboring towns and University High School of Science and Engineering, which saw its legacy class graduate this past June.

QUALITY

The University prides itself on its growing academic reputation, best illustrated by a consistent year-to-year increase in applications (more than 12,000 received annually) and selectivity (the University's acceptance rate is lower than at any time in its history). The educational experience takes place in small, supportive classroom environments.

LOCATION

The charm of the suburbs and the opportunities of the city all come alive at the University of Hartford. Situated on a 340-acre,

wooded, suburban campus, the University borders Hartford, West Hartford,

and Bloomfield. Midway between Boston and New York City, downtown Hartford, only five miles away, is gaining a name for itself.

CAMPUS ACTIVITIES

Numerous social, recreational, and entertainment alternatives exist for students on campus. More than 100 groups, clubs, and organizations, including campus media, student government, fraternities and sororities add to student life. The Campus Activities Team (CAT) is a student-run organization whose sole purpose is to schedule events for student enjoyment.

The University of Hartford has gained a national reputation for the quality of cultural activities and fine-arts exhibits on its campus. The Hartt School and the Joseloff Gallery of the Hartford Art School are highly respected. Lincoln Theater, the Sports Center, and three auditoriums host numerous special events throughout the year.

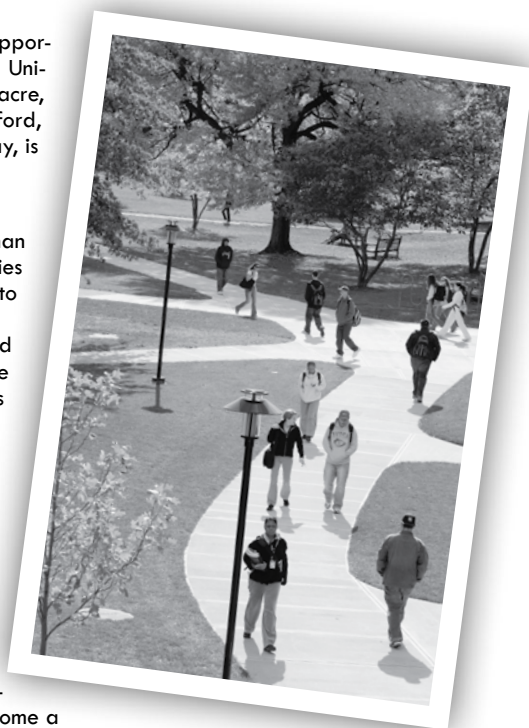
STUDENT LIVING

The University of Hartford offers five different housing options, all with the security and tranquility of a suburban campus. Students begin in traditional residence halls as freshmen, but may opt for three different types of apartment-style living during their upperclass years.

Food options are plentiful on campus, with two traditional dining facilities, a sit-down restaurant, nighttime eatery, deli, premium coffee outlet, juice and smoothie bar, and the Village Market, the University's own on-campus grocery store.

More than 7,300 students (5,600 undergraduates and 1,700 graduate students) study at the seven schools and colleges of the University of Hartford, which is classified as a doctoral research-intensive university by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. The institution has seen a 15 percent increase in undergraduate enrollment, and a 23-percent increase in degrees awarded, over the past decade. A highly visible figure on campus, President Harrison is known for his enthusiasm for student life and University activities, and is fondly referred to as Walt by many students.

During President Harrison's tenure, the University has undertaken a vigorous and comprehensive building campaign. Many of the University's residence halls have been renovated, and Hawk Hall, the University's new five-story, 208-bed residence for first-year students, was completed during the summer of 2007. The oval-shaped Alumni Plaza, constructed out of concrete of various colors and finishes, now provides students with a large gathering spot on the residential side of campus.

At the heart of this construction campaign are three major new additions to the University's signature academic programs: The Renée Samuels Center of the Hartford Art School (opened in January 2007), the Integrated Science, Engineering, and Technology Complex (opened in 2005), and the Mort and Irma Handel Performing Arts Center (opened in September 2008), which houses the Dance and Theatre divisions of The Hart School. The Handel Center, located in the Upper Albany and Blue Hills neighborhoods of Hartford, one mile east of the University's campus, also contains space for community activities.

Two buildings have been renovated to house two of the University's leading liberal arts programs: Psychology (East Hall) and Communications and Cinema Studies (Abraham Hall). In 2006, the University opened new state-of-the-art athletic fields for soccer, lacrosse, softball, and baseball.

The University's vibrant relationship with the Greater Hartford community is a hallmark of President Harrison's tenure. The University has become a recognized leader in helping to improve public schools. It is the only private university in the country with two public magnet schools on campus—the University of Hartford Magnet School and the University High School of Science and Engineering.

President Harrison's community involvement is extensive. He serves on the boards of directors of the Connecticut Conference of Independent Colleges and the Hartford Consortium of Higher Education. He is currently the president of the board of the Hartford Stage Company. He serves as trustee or director of a number of other Hartford-area organizations, including the Greater Hartford Arts Council, Saint Francis Hospital and Medical Center, the Connecticut Science Center, and Suffield Academy. He is also a director of WorldBusiness Capital, an international finance firm based in Hartford.

Reflecting his longtime interest in intercollegiate athletics, President Harrison chairs the National Collegiate Athletic Association's Committee on Academic Performance, the group charged with implementing academic reforms among the nation's leading intercollegiate athletic programs, and serves on a number of other NCAA committees. He is the immediate past chair of the NCAA Executive Committee. He also serves on the Presidential Advisory Committee of the Association of Governing Boards.

All this is a long way from President Harrison's beginnings as a scholar of American literature and culture. A native of Pittsburgh, he graduated from Trinity College in Hartford in 1968, then earned a master's degree from the University of Michigan in 1969. After an interim of three years to serve as a captain in the United States Air Force, President Harrison earned a doctorate from the University of California-Davis. His doctoral dissertation, "Out of Play: Baseball Fiction from Pulp to Art," was one of the earliest scholarly treatments of baseball and its place in American life.

In 1982 President Harrison left full-time teaching to take an administrative position at Colorado College. He joined Gehring Associates University Relations Counselors in 1985, becoming president of the firm shortly thereafter. In 1989 President Harrison moved to the University of Michigan, where he became vice president of university relations and secretary of the university.

President Harrison and his wife, Dianne, a scholar of 19th-century Victorian literature and mystery literature, make their home in Russell House, the president's residence at the University of Hartford.



Director of Athletics Patricia H. Meiser

Pat Meiser, in her 16th year at the University of Hartford, serves as the director of athletics and special assistant to the president.

One of only 22 women director of athletics among the 329 institutions competing at the Division I level, Meiser has 37 years of experience in coaching and athletics administration. In May of 1999, she was named one of the nation's top 50 women's sports executives by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal, and in June of 2006 she was named the Northeast Region I-AAA GeneralSports TURF Systems Athletics Director of the Year.

At Hartford, Meiser heads a team that is responsible for growing the athletics and academic quality of the program, enhancing revenue and extending the program into the community.

In Meiser's tenure, seven sports (women's basketball, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's golf, women's golf, men's tennis and women's volleyball) have won America East Conference championships and either reached NCAA Division I tournament or national postseason play. Basketball, in particular, has emerged with Meiser's hiring of Jennifer Rizzotti and Dan Leibovitz. The women's basketball team has been crowned America East Conference champion and reached the NCAA Tournament in 2002, 2005, 2006 and 2008. The men's team set a school record with 18 wins in 2007-08 and advanced to the America East Championship finals for the first time in school history.

Revenue enhancement has also been an area of growth for Hartford under Meiser's leadership. This has taken place through an expanded fund raising and alumni relations effort, development of a corporate sponsorship program, implementation of a licensing program and successful grant submissions. Most significantly, Hartford athletics embarked on a \$10 million athletics capital campaign in April of 2003. The campaign, called Home Field Advantage, funded the renovation of the existing soccer and lacrosse field, the relocation and construction of a softball field, the construction of a baseball field and will include construction of a track surrounding an all-purpose field. The ground breaking for Home Field Advantage took place in April of 2005, and Phase I of the project was completed in 2007. Phase II is presently under way.

Meiser's commitment to academics is well documented and demonstrated through the success of her student-athletes. Hartford has been among the leaders in The America's East's Academic Cup standings each of the past 10 years. The Hawks won the Cup in 1996-97. This past academic year, the average student-athlete GPA was 2.98.

Reaching out in the community is important for Meiser. She is past chair of the Greater Hartford Convention and Visitors Bureau and her appointment came at a critical time as the city opened a \$350 million convention center. Meiser was named a Connecticut "Woman of Merit" by the Girl Scouts in June 2000. She is a board member of both the Connecticut Special Olympics and the Connecticut Women's Hall of Fame. In October of 2007, Meiser served as Co-Chair of the CWHF Gala that celebrated the 35th anniversary of Title IX. The evening brought together the top female Olympians and national champions with ties to the state of Connecticut.

Meiser has also been involved with various intercollegiate committees and organizations at the conference, regional and national levels. She serves on the Executive Committee of NACDA and is a past President of the Division I-AAA Athletics Directors Association (NACDA), has been a professional sport liaison, member of the soccer rules committee and active as a NCAA Certification representative. Over the years, she has also served a variety of roles in the America East Conference and is presently a member of the Executive Committee.

Prior to joining the Hawks, Meiser was the associate athletics director for administration and senior women's administrator at the University of Connecticut. During her 10 years at Connecticut, she played a pivotal role in the rejuvenation of the athletics program.

Before arriving at Connecticut, Meiser was the head women's basketball coach and a tenured faculty member at Penn State (1971-81). She gave the first women's basketball scholarship at Penn State in 1974 and advanced the program to Top-20 status in the late 1970s. In addition, she coached the Gold Medal-winning East team in the inaugural 1979 National Sports Festival.

Meiser holds a bachelor's degree in health and physical education (1969) from West Chester University and a M.Ed. in education (1971) and an MBA in business administration (1986) from Penn State. She is a native of Lancaster, PA, and has four children: Katherine, 36, wife of Jason Steadman of London; Christopher, 34, husband of Renee Jansen, Boston; Julie, 32, wife of Robert Rioux of State College, PA; and Daniel, 30, West Hartford. She also has one grandson, Lincoln.



The University of Hartford celebrates its 25th year competing at the Division I level in 2008-09. Division I competition in all sports began in 1984-85, and the ensuing 24 years have been keynoted by success. The following is a sampling of some of the achievements.

Hartford has fielded NCAA or national tournament teams in six sports: women's basketball (2002, 2005, 2006, 2008), men's golf (1985-95, 2001, 2007), women's soccer (1989-92, 1994-95, 1997-2002, 2006), men's soccer (1991-92, 1996), men's tennis (2002) and women's volleyball (1993). The Hawks have also received ECAC postseason bids in baseball (1988, 1992) and volleyball (1991).

The Hawks sport conference champions in seven sports: women's basketball (2002, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008), men's soccer (1991, 1992, 1996, 1999), women's soccer (1991, 1992, 1993, 1994, 1995, 1997, 1998, 1999, 2002, 2006), men's golf (1988-95, 2001-02, 2004, 2006-07), men's tennis (1990, 1991, 1995, 2002), women's golf (2005) and women's volleyball (1993).

In addition to team success, Hartford players and coaches have received a multitude of individual honors. The awards have ranged from All-American distinction and national Coach of the Year honors to conference Player of the Year, All-Conference, individual tournament championships and others. All-Americans have been crowned in the following sports: baseball (2), men's basketball (1), men's golf (6), men's lacrosse (3), men's soccer (2) and women's soccer (11).

Three former Hartford student-athletes stand out among those who have played professionally.

Vin Baker, who starred as an All-American on the basketball court for the Hawks, played 13 seasons in the NBA. A four-time NBA All-Star, he averaged 15.0 points and 7.4 rebounds per game in 791 career games. Baker was picked eighth overall in the June 1993 NBA draft. At the time he was the highest draft pick ever from a Connecticut college or university.

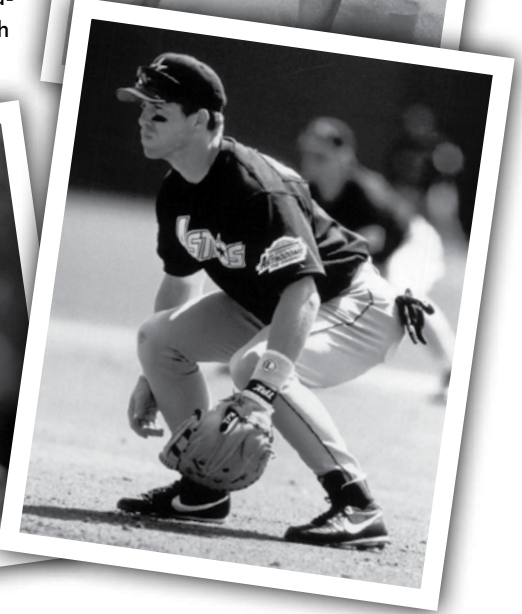
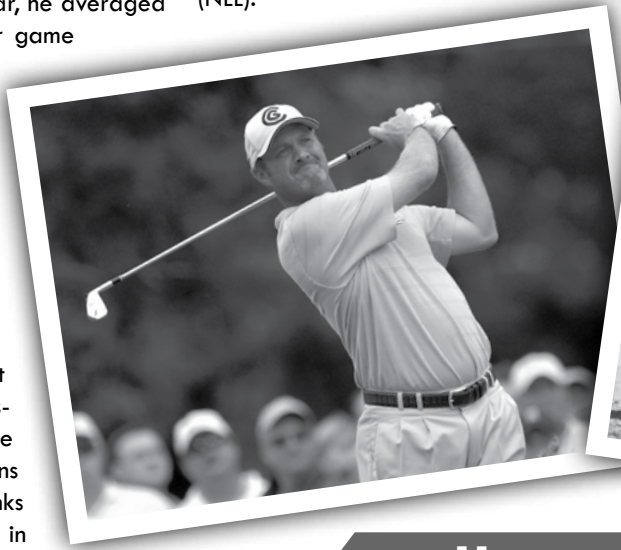
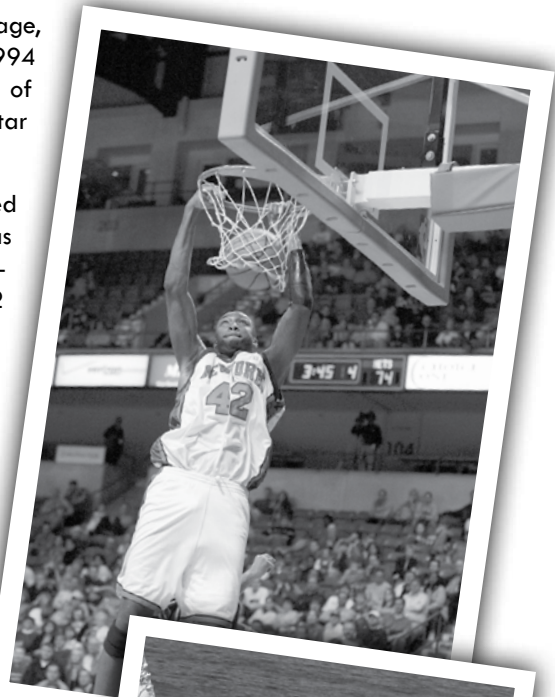
Jeff Bagwell, who played third base for Hartford from 1987 to 1989 and is the New England career leader in batting average at .413, played first base for the Houston Astros. In his 16 years with the Astros he hit .297 with 449 home runs and 1,529 runs batted in. He ranks among Houston's career leaders in

batting average, slugging percentage, home runs and RBI. He was the 1994 National League MVP, 1991 Rookie of the Year, and was a four-time All-Star (1994, 1996, 1997, 1999).

Men's golfer Jerry Kelly, who topped the Nike Tour in earnings in 1995, has been impressive in his 12 years playing on the PGA Tour. He's topped \$2 million in earnings in three of the past six seasons, and he played on the United States President's Cup team in 2003. In 2002, Kelly was sixth on the PGA money list and finished in the Top 25 at 13 tournaments, including wins at the Sony Open in Hawaii and the Advil Western Open.

Men's golfers Tim Petrovic and Patrick Sheehan have also enjoyed success on the PGA Tour. Petrovic, now in his seventh season, broke through in 2005 with his first career victory at the Zurich Classic. Sheehan is in his fifth year on the PGA Tour and has topped \$3 million in career earnings.

Other Hartford athletes who are currently playing in the professional ranks include Danielle Hood (European Basketball League), Tracey Kelusky (National Lacrosse League), Earl Snyder (minor league baseball), Chris Doyle (USL First Division soccer), Daniel Antunez (USL), Saralyn Smith (AVP), Rory Glaves (NLL), Todd Richard (NLL), Derek Sudons (NLL), Jason Clark (NLL), Josh Wasson (NLL) and Matt Holman (NLL).





At Hartford, academics and athletics go hand in hand. The academic success of Hawk teams is most evident by the number of student-athletes named to the America East Academic Honor Roll every year (189 in 2007-08).

In 2007-08, nine programs had team GPAs of 3.0 or higher (on a 4.0 scale). They were women's golf, women's tennis, women's basketball, women's cross country, women's soccer, men's tennis, women's softball, and women's indoor and outdoor track.

Recently, two teams were honored with team academic awards (volleyball and softball), and 2008 women's soccer graduate Elizabeth Cook was twice named to the Academic All-District teams by CoSIDA.

Participation in athletics is important, but it represents only one aspect of the individual's college experience. Academic achievement is of prime concern. Since student-athletes are required to commit a large percentage of their time to athletic activities, the University realizes the need for a support program to assist student-athletes in achieving their individual, academic, personal, and athletic goals. The University of Hartford is committed to its student-athletes as total persons.

The Athletics Counseling program consists of the following: study hall; tutors; academic progress reviews; academic recognition awards; study skills training; academic orientation; senior exit seminar; newsletters; career services; drug, alcohol, and eating disorder programs; personal counseling; and various academic and sports-related workshops. Thus the student-athlete is provided with a variety of resources, all aimed at academic, personal, and athletic development.

An earned-run average above 3.00 isn't usually outstanding, but when it refers to grade point averages, it's considered an all-star performance. This past fall, 14 of 30 baseball players achieved a grade point average of 3.0 or higher. More impressive is that the University of Hartford Department of Athletics as a whole posted a grade point average of 3.07. Of the 328 total athletes

this fall, 178 earned a GPA of 3.0 or higher with 11 students earning a 4.0. The baseball team's spring 2008 grade point average of 2.93 was the highest among the nine schools that sponsor baseball in the America East Conference.

Assisting the student-athletes are two full-time academic counseling professionals who facilitate a wide range of support services. Academic evaluation and support, personal counseling and assisting the department's compliance officer in regard to eligibility are a few of the services offered. Many people work together to make the academic support system a success for student-athletes at the University of Hartford. Through effective teamwork, the Hawks are winning big in the classroom. The baseball team's influence is also felt on campus and in the community. The team is active in the department's Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and is involved in a variety of community service projects.

JEFF BAGWELL

Jeff Bagwell, the 1994 National League Most Valuable Player, is the University of Hartford's most prominent baseball alumnus. The recently retired Bagwell played third base for the Hawks from 1987 to 1989. He left as the program's all-time leader in batting average (.413), runs batted in (126), and home runs (31). His career batting average was a New England collegiate record.



Bagwell's rise to major-league stardom was swift. Drafted in the fourth round by the Boston Red Sox in 1989, he

played two seasons in the Red Sox system before being traded to the Houston Astros at the very end of his 1990 season. The next spring, he earned a starting job - at first base - with the Astros and went on to win the National League's Rookie-of-the-Year award that year. He was then the Opening Day first baseman for the Astros for 14 consecutive years.

The 1994 campaign was the highlight of Bagwell's 16-year major league career. Playing just 110 games, he led the majors in RBI (116) and was second among National League leaders in batting average (.368) and home runs (39). Bagwell won numerous postseason awards, culminating in his selection as National League MVP. In 2000, Bagwell belted a career-high 47 homers while driving in 132 runs and scoring 152 runs, becoming the first player in NL history and only the fifth in ML history to post a 45-homer, 100-RBI, 150-run season, joining Babe Ruth, Joe DiMaggio, Jimmie Foxx and Lou Gehrig. In 16 years, Bag-

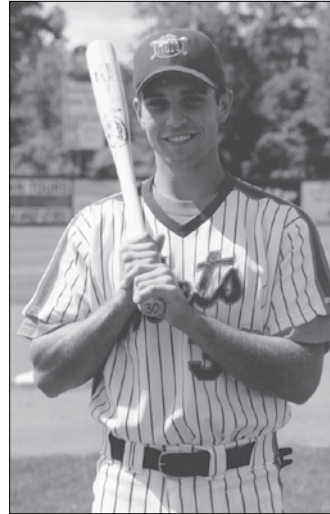
well hit .297 with 449 home runs, 1,529 RBI and 202 stolen bases. He is the Astros' career leader in homers, batting average and slugging percentage (.540). Bagwell was selected to the All-Star team four times (1994, 1996, 1997, 1999). He posted six-straight 30-homer, 100-run, 100-RBI seasons ('96-'01), becoming just the fourth player in major league history to do so (the list includes Ruth, Gehrig and Foxx). He joins DiMaggio, Hank Aaron, Frank Robinson and Ted Williams as the only five players to record 300 homers, 1,000 RBI and 1,000 runs in their first 10 years of Major League Baseball.



Of Hartford's 13 major league draftees or free agent signees (See Box), three are still involved in baseball. In addition to Bagwell (Astros organization) and Snyder, Gary LaRocque, a 1975 Milwaukee Brewers draftee, serves as a Senior Special Assistant to the General Manager for the St. Louis Cardinals.

EARL SNYDER

In June of 1998, Earl Snyder '98 was selected in the 36th round of the baseball amateur draft by the New York Mets. After attending extended spring training, Snyder was assigned to the Pittsfield Mets of the New York-Penn League. In November of 2005 he was signed by the Cincinnati Reds to a minor league contract with an invitation to spring training.



In 1999, Snyder moved on to Capital City of the South Atlantic League (A). He tied for the South Atlantic League lead with 28 homers, while placing second in RBI (97) and fifth in total bases (247). Snyder spent the 2000 season with the St. Lucie Mets of the Florida State League (A), where he batted .282 with 25 home runs and 93 RBI

and was selected to play in the FSL All-Star game, which he won for his team with a game-winning two-out, two-run homer. Snyder was promoted to AA Binghamton for the 2001 season, playing in 114 games, batting .281, and finishing second on the team with 20 home runs and 75 RBI. He was promoted at the end of the season to AAA Norfolk, where he batted .474 in six games and participated in the International League playoffs.

In 2002, Snyder was involved in the eight player trade that sent Roberto Alomar from the Cleveland Indians to the New York Mets. He had three stints with Cleveland and had a pinch-hit single on April 28 at Texas in his major league debut. He spent most of 2002 at Buffalo (AAA) where he led the team with 19 homers in 110 games. In 2003, Snyder was claimed off waivers by the Boston Red Sox. He spent the 2003 season with the Pawtucket Red Sox (AAA), where he finished third in the International League with 22 homers. In 2004, Snyder tied the Pawtucket franchise record for homers in a season (36) while also setting the season record for RBI (104). He was called up to the 2004 World Champion Boston Red Sox where he started at third base against the Toronto Blue Jays on August 18. Hitless in his first three trips to the plate, he came up in the bottom of the eighth and singled to left field amidst a standing ovation from the Fenway Park capacity crowd. He joined the Cincinnati Reds organization in 2006, playing with the AAA Louisville Bats in the International League.

Snyder is the Hartford record holder for career hits (222), home runs (53), RBI (173), total bases (423) and runs (146). He also owns five single-season records and is in the top five of 23 offensive categories.

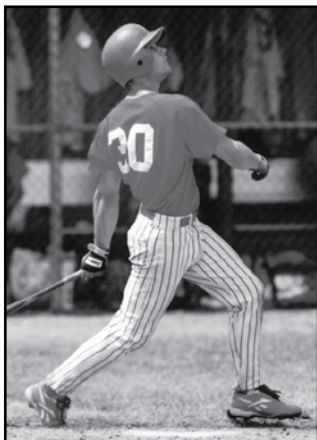
