Last year was a remarkable mixture of successes and challenges for Toronto General & Western Hospital Foundation (TG&WHF). In a year shadowed by SARS, a tough investment climate and a major power failure, we can look back and see that the hard work and the generosity of our community prevailed. Toronto Western Hospital will become home to the *first and only* Gamma Knife in the province, now that the Ontario Ministry of Health and Long-Term Care has committed to fund the \$1.1 million annual operating costs.

The Foundation must raise \$7 million – \$5 million for the machine and \$2 million to build and fully outfit a new Gamma Knife Centre within the Krembil Neuroscience Centre. TWRI's outstanding research teams work in close collaboration with clinicians in the Krembil Neuroscience Centre (KNC) – the resulting translational research is accelerating the development of exciting new treatments.

Mary and Jim Connacher have supported excellence in medical care, education and research at Toronto General Hospital and Toronto Western Hospital for over two decades. Two years ago, Jim and Mary, who was Past Chair of Toronto General & Western Hospital Foundation's Board of Directors, decided to support Dr. Lyanne Schlichter at Toronto Western Research Institute.

Dr. Schlichter has, in her own words, 'a love affair with cells'. Her research into immune cells in the brain has therapy implications for Alzheimer's, stroke and multiple sclerosis, to name a few.

"Lyanne is looking at how brain cells interact under damaged conditions," says Mary. "No one else in North America uses her exact approach. It's exciting work that promises to impact many neural disorders."

The Connachers are helping Dr. Schlichter by supporting her research costs. These include everything from the scientist's own salary and technician recruitment costs to purchasing lab equipment and ensuring a safe environment. Government agencies will not consider awarding grants to scientists who do not have these essential costs covered.

When donors 'Support a Scientist', they are helping researchers like Dr. Schlichter over what can often be a huge hurdle – securing major grants that get their projects to the next level. We sincerely thank Mary and Jim for their generous commitment.







A grateful patient

During a vacation in 2003, Paula Shields became seriously ill. Within two weeks after she returned home she was admitted to Toronto General Hospital's Intensive Care Unit struggling to breathe.

Dr. Heather Ross, Medical Director of the Cardiac Transplant Program, identified acute inflammation of the heart muscle walls – not what she expected to find in a healthy, 29-year-old female. Paula's heart was so badly swollen that only a transplant would save her.



Paula was connected to a Left Ventricular Assist Device to keep her heart functioning until thankfully, a heart became available for transplant. "I still can't believe I was so close to death," says Paula. "I'm enormously grateful for my donor's heart and for the expert care I received here ... I got my life back. Now every day is like a gift."

For patients like Paula Shields, our new Transplant Centre at Toronto General Hospital represents a second chance at life. It will play a crucial role in meeting the future needs of patients all across Ontario and nationwide.

"Within ten years, over 20,000 people in the Greater Toronto Area alone will need organ transplants," says Dr. Gary Levy, Medical Director of the Multi-organ Transplant Program. The program is Canada's largest with a legacy of achievements to its name, including the recently celebrated 20-year anniversary of the world's first lung transplant. Building on this expertise, the new Transplant Centre expects to double the number of transplants it performs over the next five years.
