SPECIAL PROGRAMS

Allied Health Sciences

The Allied Health Sciences Magnet program is a four-year program that provides college preparatory/Honors students with an innovative, diverse, and comprehensive curriculum that fosters academic growth and enables students to reach their goals to become part of the health sciences professional community. Students will participate in field studies and experiences uniquely designed to understand the concepts and skills associated with this field and develop a broader awareness of health-related careers.

AVID

The program, based on a national program, identifies students who have been performing at average levels, presents them with the tools to move successfully to high level courses, and prepares them for a four-year college. The success of the program depends on educating the whole child by unifying six important elements of education: students, curriculum, faculty, tutors, parents and community. The program is designed to enhance the academic preparation of the student through encouragement, academic tutoring, and training in organization, time management, note taking, and questioning techniques.

BioHealth Sciences

The BioHealth Sciences Magnet Program at Ridge View High School in conjunction with the nationally recognized Project Lead the Way Biomedical Sciences[™] program offers highly achieving students a dynamic curriculum that uses real world experience and hands on learning. Students with interest in exploring the variety that health sciences offers will find PLTW's Biomedical Sciences[™] program to be a fantastic doorway for medical professions. Students in this fouryear program will participate in a rigorous and comprehensive program that will include Honors and AP science courses. Students will also broaden their academic knowledge in health sciences through experiential learning to create ethical professionals who lead through citizenship, leadership, and commitment.

Scholars Academy

The Scholars Academy Magnet is for highly motivated students. The curriculum uses a strong interdisciplinary approach with the humanities, science, math and the fine arts. Instruction is based on lecture, Socratic questioning, seminars, and coaching. Communication and technology are emphasized. Students have the option of completing an independent research project or taking two interdisciplinary seminar courses. Students who are selected and successfully complete this program will earn a minimum of four college credits in Advanced Placement courses and will have a transcript and a special diploma that indicate their successful participation in the Scholars Academy.

School for the Arts

The School for the Arts is designed for students who have special talents and serious interests in the arts fields—visual art, band, orchestra, chorus, dance, creative writing and drama. The curriculum has been designed to encourage creativity and critical thinking in all areas. Located in Richland School District 2, one of the most rapidly growing school districts in South Carolina, Ridge View High School serves both suburban and rural communities. The school is twenty minutes from Columbia where state government, the University of South Carolina, and Fort Jackson are located. EXPLANATION OF TRANSCRIPT

The South Carolina Legislature required all public high schools to implement the South Carolina Uniform Grading Scale Policy beginning in the 2000-2001 school year. The policy required all existing letter grades to be converted to numeric grades. The grading scale designated the quality points for each number grade and gives weighted credit to Honors, Dual Credit, and Advanced Placement courses.

A student who elects to retake a class already passed will receive credit for the second grade only.

Excessive absences are denoted on the transcript by FA, and a 0 in the credit earned column.

Please note the two approved exceptions to the implementation of the Uniform Grading Scale Policy. First, all "A" grades earned prior to 2000-2001 were converted as a 96. All "B" grades were converted as an 88. All "C" grades were converted as an 80. All "D" grades were converted as a 73. All "F" grades were converted as a 61. Second, the Uniform Grading Scale Policy states that there are differences in the weighting of AP, Honors courses, and Dual Credit.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

Twenty-four credits (as shown below) are required for a high school diploma in South Carolina. Students must also pass HSAP (i.e. the "Exit Examination" — English and Math sections) to qualify for a South Carolina High School diploma.
