They at times become frustrated and uptight just like any one of us. Executive Director's Report

Summer greetings to all of you! Once again some of us attended the Disability Concerns Conference. Following Psalm 21, 'I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt. Open wide your mouth and I will fill it,' we were reminded to allow God to feed us in childlike dependence on Him. Dr. B. Mook spoke about disability and well-being, reminding us that disability makes the world a better place. We assume there is only one world, but there are many worlds, one example is the world of the blind or the aged. We need to embrace another world, it is an enriching experience.

Health is not the absence of illness and disability, but the strength to live with them, to live in a harmonious relationship with God. Healing then, is the acceptance and integration of the disability. Many individuals with a disability transcend their disability and enrich our world. The church can break down the walls as we remember we are all created in His image. Therefore we are an inviting and an inclusive church, where all members can take part according to their abilities. Engaging with others will enrich us.

Behind the scenes we have been busy with numerous pieces of legislation which come our way. Staff has been updated about the requirements under the Health and Safety Act (OHSA) and the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA). The latter has five standards which are being reviewed by staff.

Many of our staff have been attending workshops and college courses as we continue to stress the need for ongoing education as we support individuals with diverse needs. Working in our group homes is rewarding, but not always easy and we are encouraged by the positive outlook of the community and the Board of Directors. We wish all staff God's guidance in their day to day tasks.

We also wish the residents strength from above. Most of you love the social interaction, the church community and your friends, but at times you wish you could change things, your job, your housemates or the rules. Remember you too have a task among God's people and you are surrounded by those who love and respect you.

The Board has also started to visit parents to see what lives among them. This too is an effort to serve you better. It also offers an

opportunity to talk about your support for Anchor and to express your appreciation.

Again the issue of who will decide for my children came up. Naturally aging parents are thinking about these issues. I highly recommend parents to take the role of Power of Attorney or appoint their children. This field is quite complicated and may need involvement of a lawyer. I hope you have taken a look at our renewed website which was set up for us by Jo-Anne VanIperen. Definitely a helpful tool! We can still do much more, so if you have any thoughts, let us know. We truly appreciate all those who have promoted Anchor through fundraisers, from Karen's Bootcamp, to computer services from ISService.ca, Arborwood Tree Service, Women's' League Day, Snow Mobile Rally, Young People's breakfasts..... and not to forget Toonies for Anchor by many of our schools, choir performances and more. The last concert we enjoyed was the Hosannah Choir with Herman DenHollander, accompanied by Andre Knevel and Joyce Postmus joined by the Anchor Band with Riese Heemskerck.

All these events keep Anchor in our minds and hearts and help finance special projects in and around our homes. Naturally, there is also a lot of 'behind the scenes support' as in our regular members, a number of businesses who support us steadily, collections and other forms of support.

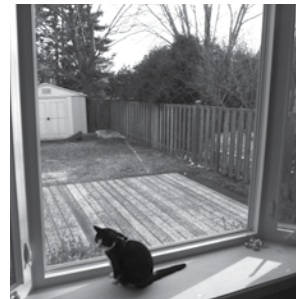

BEACON REPORT

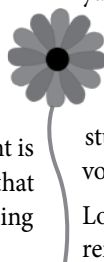

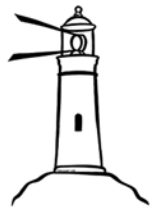

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE

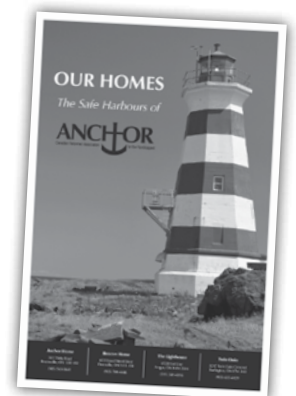

TREASURER'S REPORT

Life is not always a bed of roses. The apostle Paul himself relates some of the difficulties he went through during his ministry. He writes to the Corinthians “we were harassed at every turn – conflicts on the outside, fears within”. He pleads for the Corinthians to “make room for us in your hearts”. It is these words of chapter seven in 2 Corinthians that made me think of the 29 residents of the Anchor homes. It is quite evident in the amazing support that Anchor receives from so many different sources that people, businesses, and congregations have made room in their hearts for the cause of Anchor. We thank and praise the Lord for moving their hearts and for the ongoing encouragement received.

Although at the end of the first four months of this year the financial records of the Anchor Association again show a shortfall of almost \$53,000, there was sufficient funds in the General Account to pay the bills. The “surplus” from previous years allowed for a healthy bank account; we could even set aside monies for a Future Growth Fund – a fund set up for the purchase of a fifth home. Of course, this endeavour (the purchase of a home) would require membership approval. Nevertheless, we are already saving for its eventuality as the necessity is there. Although so far we have never turned anyone away, the four homes are full to capacity. Recent requests for future placement as well as for respite care caused a bit of scrambling and re-evaluation. Currently a room is being constructed in the basement of the Anchor home in Beamsville to accommodate respite care for those who need to stay at the home for a day or a week.

Tentative calculations for a fifth home with four residents indicate that Anchor would need an additional income of \$178,000. [The figure does not include the initial cost of the home, nor does it consider a number of unknown factors related to the home; e.g., taxes, maintenance, specialized staffing.] Would Anchor association be able to afford such an increase? I am convinced that it can. It is a matter of “making room”. The Lord Jesus has prepared a room for us (John 14:2), how can we do less for those who go through life with various difficulties? It is our corporate responsibility to help – the Corinthians saw this in early New Testament times. We are so much farther in time, place and circumstance. It comes down to a mere matter of making room in our hearts. When the call comes for support, will you be there to do your part?

We ask that you keep us in your prayers as there is a lot of planning that is being done for another home. We also encourage you to come to the Annual General Meeting when this item will be presented. We pray for the Lord's blessing in the Anchor Association and we recognize that all things are in the hands of our Heavenly Father.
